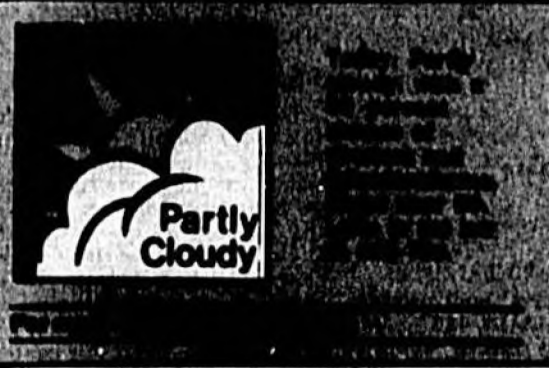

Armed robbery investigated

The Sheriff's Office Major Crimes Section is investigating the armed robbery of the 7-11 store at West State Road 48 and Upeala Road near Sanford. The robbery occurred about 12:20 a.m. this morning. The suspect walked into the store. He told the clerk he was holding a syringe filled with the AIDS virus. However, the clerk did not see any syringe. The suspect took money from the cash register. He ran from the store. A witness said he saw the suspect drive away in a small Nissan or Toyota truck. The clerk was not hurt. This is the second time this month that the same suspect has robbed this 7-11 store using the same method. The first robbery occurred about 11:15 p.m., Tuesday, September 9. The suspect did have a syringe in his hand during the first robbery. The suspect is a white male in his 30's. He is 5'10" with light, curly brown hair. He has a small lump on the side of his face.

Grand jury and land deals

A federal grand jury will meet today to address questionable land deals in Seminole County through its land acquisition division.

Last month federal agents subpoenaed files from the county offices associated with the widening of Tusawilla Road and the purchase of the Chubb properties.

A county investigation last year led to the firing of Joyce Suber as land acquisitions manager. Suber, who is trying to get her job back, is suing the county for age discrimination and sexual harassment. An investigation by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement is ongoing.

Desegregation: Computer to aid parents' school choice

The "event" which has school officials and parents talking lately has been likened to an NBA DRAFT.

The event is the random selection process that will be used to assign students to schools in the Sanford area under a desegregation plan. In the

past months, the plan, instituted by the Seminole County School Board, has come under fire by parents concerned about their children's education.

The desegregation agreement was made with the federal government in response to a suit filed in the early 1970s against the county's school district. The consent decree seeks racial equity for students in six elementary schools, two middle schools and one high school.

Under the plan, Goldboro Elementary would become a magnet school. Sanford and Lakeview Middle schools would also offer magnet programs as would Seminole High School. Attendance zones for elementary school students would be formed for Idylwild, Wilson and Wicklow in the northwest and Hamilton, Midway and Pine Crest in the northeast.

On Tuesday, Joe White, a software computer specialist, demonstrated the program that is designed to offer controlled choice to parents.

County's plan energized by husband, wife team

Kevin and Kathy Fall were born in the building where they work - the Seminole County Services Building (the former Seminole Memorial Hospital).

They're the home town kids who grew up together, married three years ago and now work for the

county.

Kevin, 33, and Kathy, 28, are key contributors in the 1998 Comprehensive Plan that is being evaluated and drawn up. They spent a good part of the summer visiting residents at a series of community meetings.

To be sure, Kevin, a capital program analyst and Kathy, the county planner who made a report to the Board of Commissioners at

a work session this week, have a feel for what will improve the quality of life for the citizens here.

"The community meetings were the first critical step in identifying issues," Kathy Fall said. "We really felt the passion of these people. They had a lot of questions and ideas. It was a very positive experience."

The 18 community meetings began in May, and concluded in

August. They helped evaluate the success and/or failure of the County's Comprehensive Plan since it was adopted in 1991. The county has changed dramatically since then.

The county's population was 301,965 six years ago and has grown to 844,750. Since the old plan, the county has changed both the way it thinks about long-range See County, Page 4A

Officials admonish school board member

Seminole County school officials have admonished a school board member for intimidating administrators and staff.

In an e-mail memo to board member Bob Goff, school superintendent Paul Hagerty accused Goff of undermining the efficiency of the school system. In his memo, Hagerty said Goff went too far when he ordered, in an intimidating fashion, school district attorney,

Ned Julian Jr. to investigate a matter concerning Seminole High School.

Hagerty had commented previously, through e-mails and at board meetings, on Goff's methods of attaining information from staff members.

In an Aug. 13 memo, Hagerty referred to Goff's requests and demands of staff to produce reports. Hagerty cited a recent example where Goff asked staff member Jean Crampton for a transportation analysis of several scenarios and then requested the

report be presented at a board meeting without the knowledge of the other board members. In the memo, Hagerty suggested when detailed reports are requested by board members, that other board members need to have a common understanding and that valuable staff time was being used to fill requests. Hagerty subsequently directed staff to provide information requested to all board members.

Goff, who is out of town, said he did not wish to comment until he sees the memo.

The public will have the chance to comment on proposed toll rates for the Seminole Expressway, which functions as a portion of the Central Florida GreeneWay, at a workshop today.

Officials from the Florida Department of Transportation will make a presentation at the Lake Mary High School cafeteria, 655 Longwood-Lake Mary Road, from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m.

Seminole Expressway Project 2 will extend the Central Florida GreeneWay from the end of the ex-

isting expressway at U.S. Highway 17-92 for about 6 miles to an interchange off Interstate 4 in Seminole County.

The proposed toll facility will include toll ramps at U.S. Highway 17-92 and at the County Road 46A interchange. New toll ramps will be constructed north of Lake Mary

Boulevard. The Toll Rate Development Workshop is being held to receive public input, said Terry Denham, district director of planning and programming.

Denham said a toll rate public hearing will be held later this year to formally set the toll rate.

LEHIGHVILLE, Pa. (UPI) — A state and consumer service agency says that long distance providers are using a switchboard system to make international calls.

The Department is receiving complaints about a scheme in which long distance providers use a switchboard system to make international calls. The switchboard operators are using a phone system to make international calls.

Because there is nothing actually wrong with the phone network, there is little that long distance providers can do to prevent this type of fraud. Businesses should educate their switchboard operators about the scam to avoid being victimized.

If someone suspects that a call is not legitimate, they should

ask the switchboard operator the company for which they work and the name of the operator.

Tell the switchboard operator you will contact the police if the call is not legitimate.

Help operators identify the company for which they work and the name of the operator.

opportunities to use your writing in print. Take advantage of opinion pieces for magazines and newspapers. Capitalize on your interest. Write for local newsletters.

I've done a lot of freelancing, confesses Girard. Writers need to market themselves, even after they have been published. Girard supplied handouts at the seminar with examples of her work for newsletters and other publications. Included with the handouts were book marks Girard had made commemorating her newest novel, *A Husband for Christmas*, scheduled for release in October.

Know your market. You are showing your ignorance if you're sending the wrong things to the wrong places, said Girard. "The Writers Market is a must." The Writers Market provides the names of thousands of publications with addresses and editor's names. The book, updated yearly, also provides writers with information about the business of writing. Specific genres have their own newsletters, such as *Children's Writer and Reader's Digest* and *Romance Writers of America*. These newsletters provide up-to-date market trends. They also provide opportunities for writers to get into print. Girard points out, "Go to writers' conferences, editors and publishers do. Join local writers groups. They offer writers a forum to exchange

A nanny's dictionary

Some years ago, as the Robespierre-like "political correctness" movement was taking root in colleges across the country, my son, Tom, was the editor of the student newspaper at Wesleyan. He was being pressured by his staff to mandate that the term "freshman" be used henceforth to identify all incoming students. "Freshman" would be tossed into the dustbin of sexist history. "Freshwoman" would also somehow be discriminatory.

Tom, even at the risk of defecation, would not be moved, insisting that language should not be politicized. Ideological distortions of language have not, of course, been limited to colleges. I have watched its tendrils creep into mainstream newspapers and magazines as well as the epiphanies of politicians. But I never expected to see a guide to "correct" language as a special section of an otherwise reputable dictionary.

The newest edition of Random House Webster's College Dictionary boasts more new words than any of its competitors. To their credit, however, none of its competitors has a chapter like Random House's "Avoiding Inappropriate and Offensive Language." Ungrateful, I do not want a nanny dictionary earnestly instructing me on how to avoid being insensitive and/or offensive. If I want to be offensive, I know how to do that, and I don't need a dictionary dedicated to making me feel guilty for not meeting its standard of propriety.

Jeane Sheidlower, a senior editor of Random House Reference & Information Publishing, tells me his new progeny "is nothing like a 'speech code,' but rather a straight-forward, frank, and we hope uncontroversial examination of types of language that can unintentionally offend."

But this secular catechism also tells us that we should avoid "emphasizing the differences between people." Consider the authors over the centuries who have grievously sinned in this regard.

We must also, says the policy-making nanny, think of language as a way "toward rectifying the unequal social status between one group and another."

Among the guidelines for gender-neutral language, "businessman" is of course, prohibited, and the leading approved alternative is "business person." "Businesswoman" won't do.

Included is my favorite neutral replacement for "chairman." To show "heightened sensitivity," you are advised to use "chair." Then what do you call that on which the "chair" is sitting? Moving to ways of not offending entire countries, it is no longer sensitive to say that a country is "underdeveloped." Least that description hurt the nation's feelings, you have to refer to it as a "developing" country, even if it isn't.

One used to be able to call someone "elderly" because that's what he or she was. But the Random House nanny tells us to say "older person" or "senior citizen." Since the nation's prison population increasingly consists of "senior citizens," I trust they will be treated with appropriate respect by

their keepers.

So devoted are these docents of sensitivity that they deplore writing "Arab man denies assault charge." The properly inoffensive way of putting that is "Man denies assault charge." Why not "Human being denies assault charge"? Thereby men as a whole would not be offended.

Also to be avoided in public: "sweetie, dear, dearie, honey." Even among people who like each other? Years ago, I was in a room with a civil rights lawyer who had gone through some of the fiercest battles on the Southern front. He had also represented women in gender discrimination cases. That day, in talking to a young woman, a lawyer, he used the term "honey." There was no sexual meaning to the word.

The young woman was furious and verbally horsewhipped him for a long time. He kept shaking his head at what one word had cost him. Words certainly can wound, but quickness to be offended by any language that might be "inappropriate" does chill the way we live with each other.

But the language nannies will continue to multiply. Think of what they have done to "Consider the lilies, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin." In the Contemporary English Version, that Biblical passage has been made more accessible to us all: "Look how the wildflowers grow. They don't work hard to make their clothes."

Or "What is man, that thou art mindful of him?" That King James passage has become, in the New Century version, "But why are people important to you?"

Or as T.S. Eliot said — in a line that could apply to the lamers of language — "We had the experience but missed the meaning."

Two cars — identified as a Volvo and a Chevrolet — were parked on railroad tracks at Sixth Street as Wynn was traveling on Pecan. The assailant got out of his vehicle and had a confrontation with Wynn. The assailant then pulled a gun — later identified as a .22 Ruger — and fired it off into the sky while threatening Wynn.

The assailant was allegedly urged by a female to stop as she repeatedly grabbed his arm, but he did not stop. The assailant started shooting towards Wynn as he tried to run to his car. Wynn dived through the window into his car, and the assailant followed him firing the gun into the car standing three feet away. Wynn was able to escape through the passenger side. The assailant gave pursuit, threatening and firing at Wynn the whole way.

Wynn eluded the assailant by hiding in a wooded area as he headed west on Sixth Street. He sustained a bullet to the foot which came in from the front and went out the bottom. He also was grazed twice — on the head and the arm. Skiba said that the reporting officer also found a round from the gun in Wynn's vehicle. Sanford Fire and Rescue personnel responded and took Wynn to Columbia Medical Center, Sanford, where he is recovering.

Skiba said that the incident is still under investigation.

A similar incident occurred at 6:19 p.m. Wednesday night at the corner of Eighth Street and Mulberry Avenue. Sanford Police Investigator Terry Mullin arrested and charged Larry Felton, 38, of 620 W. 4th St., Sanford, with use/display/concealment of a weapon that was used, attempted murder and aggravated battery.

According to Skiba, Reginald Bellamy, 27, of 1015 Holly Ave., Sanford, who gave a positive identification, was shot at by Felton seven times near the Castle Brewer Park

area. Felton allegedly came to the driver's side of Bellamy's car hitting the window and rear view mirror. Felton then went to the passenger side where he continued to fire into Bellamy's car.

Skiba said that Bellamy was struck in the face and the right upper arm, and he is currently recovering at Columbia Medical Center.

planning and how it will administer those activities. Functionally, planning activities are organized into 5 long-range planning teams:

1. Environmental.
2. Land use/Infrastructure.
3. Community Development.
4. Economic Development.
5. GIS/Information Support.

"Not everyone in the community agrees on certain issues," Kathy Fall said. "At one of the meetings, one person said he was all for economic development but his neighbor and friend got up and said he was against it."

"We had 582 different issues brought up at the meetings," she said. "Many of them didn't have much to do with the Comprehensive Plan but gave us a clear idea of what is important to the people who live here."

Big, Big, Big topics were public safety, water/sewer, mass transit, U.S. Highway 17-92, and density of housing.

The county commissioners were given packages that contained all the concerns. The Evaluation and Appraisal Report will be transmitted to the Department of Community Affairs in January 1998 and the final document will be presented to the BCC for action in July 1998.

Remarks from participants varied:

"Nice to tell someone who seems to care what is bothering you," one citizen said. "County Staff actually asking for our opinions," said another.

"Would like to see more coordination between the county and the School Board, especially in the planning for schools and future growth area."

"Let more people know about these meetings!" someone suggested. "Where are the commissioners?" asked another. "Got any soda?" "Start on time" were other suggestions.

"What's going to happen to our comments?" many wanted to know.

"Each comment counts," Kathy Fall said. "What people think is very important to us. We've learned a lot. The new plan will show it."

would take place during a public event where the parents and students could watch the screen and immediately learn of the school they would attend. He said school representatives would be on hand at the event to answer questions.

"My experience is people get excited and become more interested in the school and choices," White said. He said students can begin participating in their new school on the same day as the event.

The actual numbers change as the selections are being made and the students name and school appears on screen when the assignment is complete. White said a paper list will be posted for those who cannot attend.

For the Goldsboro assignments, applications to parents will be distributed Nov. 3 and are due Nov. 21. The actual event, which will be held at the Educational Support Center on East Lake Mary Boulevard in Sanford is scheduled for Dec. 17. Parent notification will be Jan. 7, 1998.

For cluster school assignments in 1998, applications will be distributed Jan. 12 and collected Feb. 12. The public event will be held March 7 and

parent notification will be March 13.

Sherry O'Leary, consent decree facilitator and magnet school coordinator for Seminole County, said the school district has a marketing campaign in place to further inform parents and students of the magnet and cluster school programs.

As part of the campaign, school representatives will speak to parents on Oct. 1 at the Educational Support Center. On Oct. 13, O'Leary said, all students in the county in grades K through eight — about 55,000 — will receive a 12-page color brochure highlighting the schools involved in the magnet and cluster programs. There will be videotaped presentations broadcast on Channel 24 and public relations packages distributed to radio, newspapers and television, she said. In addition, there will be cluster caravans, where buses will take parents and students around to the schools in the cluster zones. Each school will hold special presentations during the early evening.

O'Leary said the campaign, including the fee for a marketing consultant, cost about \$31,000. White's fee was an additional \$10,000, which will be covered by the county, O'Leary said.

A question and answer time allowed those in attendance to get a little personal with the author. "Do you work on computer or write your work out with pen and paper?" someone asked. Girard laughed. "I like to use a pencil and a legal pad because it doesn't make noise. The muse usually comes to me in the middle of the night."

The Internet can be a great resource for writers. Girard said the Internet saves her time on research. Publisher updates are available on the Net. It connects writers with other writers. Girard suggests that writers should create their own Home Page. "It's another way to keep your name out there. And you never know when an editor might be lurking about," Girard will be a guest speaker on a chat line October 14, at 9 p.m. Interested writers and readers can converse with Girard by using keyword RomanceRealm or FictionalRealm.

The author offered some additional tips. Education never stops. She encouraged writers to take classes such as computer and creative writing courses. Girard sets five year goals for herself. "Four to think about it, and one to get busy and do it." Perseverance is a necessity. "Paper your walls with rejection slips. They are great character builders." Always meet your deadlines. Don't overlook contests. The entries are often read by editors. Girard's final words of wisdom. "Find your own voice and someone will take it."

Sunnyside Up: Food for the brain

Sing and strum forever, J.U. Lee

In the evenings when the sun has set and he feels a song in his heart, J.U. Lee strums his banjo to celebrate life. His wife and duet partner, Wanda is there to accompany him.

Lee has written dozens of wistful folk songs about Central Florida, rural life in Sanford, vanishing hammock-cloaked dunes and the Old Dixie Highway.

His "Black-eyed Susy" evokes images of Lee's childhood on the west side of Sanford (his mother's nickname was Susy) and "Atlantic Coastline Railroad Man" celebrates his father's life as a railroad engineer.

"A good many of the songs I've written are connected to my family and they give me a good feeling no matter when I sing or play them," Lee said.

They're a particularly good pick-me-up these days for a man who underwent cancer surgery and had his tonsils removed a couple of weeks ago. He's now on radiation five days a week, not able to sing just yet but more than able to strum on the banjo.

For the first time in 22 years he is without his familiar beard. "Last time I shaved it was when I got married," Lee said from his home in Flagler Beach. "Our children never saw me without it.

"From what I've heard about others have gone through because of cancer, I feel blessed," he said. "I lost something I really didn't need in those tonsils. I am on radi-

tion but I haven't had to do chemotherapy like others have. I'm a little swollen, a little sore but soon I'll be fine."

Maybe, we asked, he'd write a new song something like "I Hadn't Shaved Since My Wedding."

What he would most like to do is start performing again with a new acoustic group in Sanford known as *Upsala*.

"There's five of us who've been together awhile now," Lee said. "My wife, Wanda is in the group along with Andy Thomas, who has been singing with me since we were in the 10th grade at Seminole High School. That's about 30 years. Kristy Hamilton is in the group and so is Billy Jickell, who plays the mandolin.

Earlier in the summer before the cancer surgery, Lee was elated to be part of a production at the Cultural Arts Center in Deland. His musical tape was used as a scene setter for The Trial of Marjorie Kinnari Rawlings. His "Pickin' Oranges" was used with a slide show preceding the play.

"J.U. is just a person walking through life very calmly,

and enjoying it," says his sister Ann Gordon. "He writes about what he sees and he sings and plays what he has written. He's a very positive person, who sees the best in everyone and everything."

The Lees have a wonderful repertoire of folk songs, none more unusual than "The Ballad of Helen McConnell." It's a tune his longtime fans never stop asking to hear.

The ballad relates to a true story of Helen McConnell, a 61-year-old Oak Hill woman who was shot dead on the back porch of her home by a sheriff's SWAT team in 1991. An investigation cleared the SWAT team of any wrong doing. Ms.

McConnell, the story goes, fired on the deputies and was brandishing a gun at the time of her death.

"The song is neutral in trying to determine fault in the case," Lee said. "It's a description of events in typical ballad format...but it isn't neutral in the sense the situation was tragic and had tragic results."

J.U. Lee will celebrate his 46th birthday in a couple of weeks.

Here's hoping he's singin' and strummin' better than ever.

His is the music that makes us glad. Our first request is his delightful, "New Blue Jeans."

Her letter was an insult to the many children who are capable of achieving beyond the low expectations of many adults.

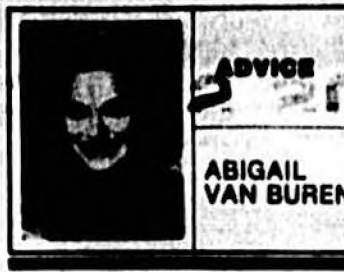

We should applaud these parents for the difference they make. I know.

Magic obtain Harper, O'Bannon for Scott

ORLANDO — Orlando Magic General Manager John Gabriel announced Wednesday night that the Magic have obtained 14-year NBA veteran guard Derek Harper and former college national player of the year Ed O'Bannon from the Dallas Mavericks in exchange for forward Dennis Scott. "Dennis will be missed," said Gabriel. "He was the second player ever selected by our franchise and played a key role in the success of this team in the '90s. We wish him well."

Harper (6-foot-4, 206-pounds) is only the second player in NBA history (after Isaiah Thomas) to register at least 15,000 points (15,131), 6,000 assists (6,157) and 1,800 steals (1,841).

Harper, from Palm Beach Gardens, concluded last season ranking fourth on the active NBA

assistants and steals list. He trails just John Stockton (2,531), Michael Jordan (2,165) and Clyde Drexler (2,081) on the active steals chart and Stockton (12,170), Mark Jackson (6,825) and Kevin Johnson (6,442) on the active assists chart.

Harper also ranks 10th on the NBA's all-time three-pointers made list with 968.

"Derek brings a wealth of experience," added Gabriel. "This acquisition gives us positional flexibility with Afernee Hardaway and improves our defense. For Ed O'Bannon this is a new opportunity. He was the ninth overall selection of the 1995 NBA Draft and his talent is still untapped."

Harper, who was originally drafted by Dallas with the 11th overall selection in the 1983 NBA Draft out of Illinois, has averaged 13.9 points,

5.7 assists, 2.4 rebounds and 1.7 steals per game over the course of his 1,068 game career. He has also seen action in 90 playoff games. He played the first 10 seasons of his career with the Mavericks, before playing two-plus seasons with the New York Knicks.

Returning to Dallas last season, Harper averages 10 points and 4.3 assists in 29.5 minutes of play per game. He saw action in 75 games, while making 29 starts.

O'Bannon (6-foot-8, 220-pounds), originally selected by the New Jersey Nets out of UCLA, has averaged 5 points and 2.5 rebounds per game over the course of his two-year, 128 game career with the Nets and the Mavericks. Last season, the forward averages 3.7 points and 2.3 rebounds per game.

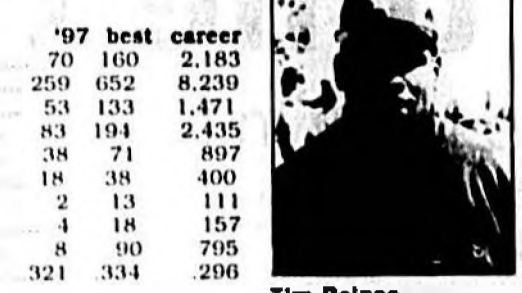

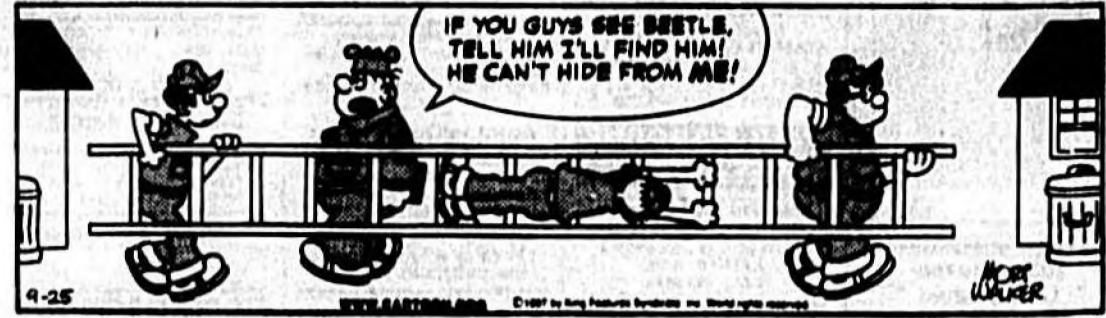

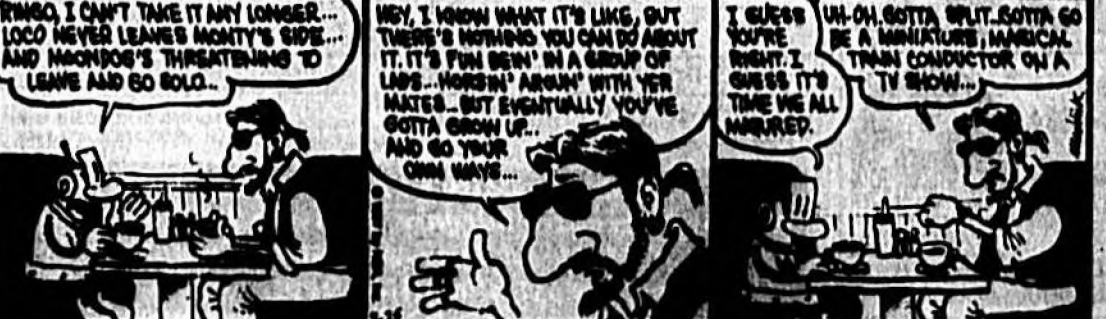

Is detergent residue a health risk?

DEAR DR. GOTT: Do hand-washed dishes retain detergent? Is this a medical concern?

Now that our children have left home and there are just the two of us, it seems silly to use the dishwasher for only a few items. It's equally silly to rinse the dishes thoroughly, only to re-wash them later in the dishwasher.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I agree with you. Your position makes good ecological sense and saves you the additional cost of running an expensive appliance.

To my knowledge, detergent residue on dishes and eating utensils does not constitute a health hazard. I suggest that you and your spouse hand-wash your dishes together, rinse the items thoroughly and save the dishwasher for the times that you entertain dinner guests.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I was referred to a surgeon for repair of a hernia. He said I was a poor surgical risk (at age 82) and that I'd have to stop my Coumadin medication at least five days before the operation. What is your opinion?

DEAR READER: Hernias rarely cause problems unless they become strangulated. A portion of bowel can become wedged in the hernia opening, causing pain and intestinal obstruction. In such cases, emergency surgery is necessary to prevent gangrene of the bowel. This is why most patients opt for elective hernia repair before the situation reaches critical proportions.

I don't know why you are taking Coumadin, an anti-coagulant, but clearly the medicine has to be stopped before surgery so that the operation won't cause uncontrolled bleeding. However, during the period that you are Coumadin-free, you could suffer a stroke or similar complication.

Therefore, you have a tough decision. Do you risk such complications to get the hernia repaired or do you sit tight and hope that it doesn't strangulate? This is a choice you will have to make in close cooperation with the surgeon and your family physician. I can't advise you further because I am not fully informed about the size of your hernia, your general state of health or the potential effects that the operation could have on your well-being. You need to discuss this fully with your doctors before deciding how to proceed.

tion therapy, yet my experience bolsters your criticism. My husband of 38 years suffered angina that did not respond to nitroglycerine and other drugs to improve heart-circulation. He chose chelation instead of angioplasty. Now, after several treatments, he is pain-free. I believe you are wrong to discourage such therapy.

when it obviously helped my husband. DEAR READER: In addressing any type of medical treatment, a responsible doctor must examine scientific studies to see if it is effective. This has not been true of chelation, a therapy promoted to reduce arteriosclerosis by injecting a variety of "chelating" agents into the bloodstream. While your husband may have enjoyed some apparent benefit, chelation has not been shown to be consistently effective in treating angina and heart disease. (It is an accepted method of treating heavy-metal poisoning, however, from lead and arsenic).

Until the appropriate investigations have been reported, I'll maintain my position: namely, that chelation is still an unproven and questionable method of treating various heart disorders.

WIN AT BRIDGE

Pass can be the call of choice

Samuel Johnson was talking about libraries when he said, "Knowledge is of two kinds. We know a subject ourselves, or we know where we can find information upon it."
In bridge, an opening bid supplies information to partner (which is often good) and to the opponents (which is sometimes bad). This deal is an example of the latter. It was declared by English expert David Stevenson.
That the West hand has 13 high-card points is true. Yet it is a debatable opening bid, given that three points come from a singleton king. Also, queens and jacks (quacks) are overvalued at two and one, respectively.
Stevenson, after winning the first trick with dummy's spade ace, returned the spade nine, which ran to

West's queen. West switched to a low diamond, South capturing East's king with his ace. Now declarer made the key play: He led a club to dummy's king. When it lost to East's ace, Stevenson had all the information he needed to place the missing honor cards. East had already shown up with seven points (the diamond king and club ace). Surely West had the remaining 13 — including the heart king — for his vulnerable one-diamond bid, even in England, the land of the thin opening.
After ruffing East's club return, Stevenson placed the heart ace on to the table, nodding as if it were nothing less than his due when West dropped the king.
Always keep track of the high-card points. This will often furnish the clue to find the winning line, especially when an opponent has bid — and sometimes when he hasn't.
