Tenants have been meeting to formulate a policy that would bring some changes to certain bousing project regulations, which require tenants to be charged rentals based on anticipated income of families as opposed to actual income. Other complaints evolve around the requirements that force entire families to vacate apartments when an unmarried member becomes pregnant.

Many of the four Sanford projects have ranges that allegedly shock apartment dwellers and there are refrigerators that do not function properly. The tenants are expected to bring their complaints

On Blood Of Others

MIAMI (AP) - For the past 14 months third grader Sheryl Faulkner has lived on borrow ed blood she's had pumped into her veins during 22 hospital

Her own body's refusal to produce white cells necessitates almost weekly trips to Jackson Memorial Hospital for life-extending transfusions so far amounting to 58 pints of blood. Sheryl's rare disease, known as aplastic anemia, has prevented her from participating in the

"normal" activities of an 8-yearold child. She cannot rough-house with the other children in her Miramar neighborhood. Her teacher must come to the house to give her instructions. She is plagued

by sores on her legs that won't heal due to the condition, and even the most minor cuts could cause her to bleed to death be cause her clotting ability is almost nonexistent. Her first hospital visit lasted

five weeks and cost \$4,900. The cost of the blood is \$35 a pint, and friends of the family have been able to repay only 45 pints to the blood bank. Yet she has managed to survive five major infections during her illness, including spinal meningitis, while her family struggles to pay the cost of her

Most Often Used Drugs

At present marijuana, "speed," LSD, amphetamines and barbiturates are the most often used drugs, Poik said, Hard drugs such as cocaine and heroin are coming more into use. but no figures are available and Polk was basing his opinions on the frequency of drugs found in the county, "There is no real concentration of drugs in a single county area, but recently it seems that more arrests on violations have been made in South Seminole, near Orange County the sheriff elaborated. Polk said there is no doubt the traffic is county-wide,

There have been several deaths in the county directly attributable to narcotics. Perhaps the most pitiful example was the reported death of a 17-year-old Sanford youth, who died from hepatitis, a liver disease, caused by a dirty needle used to "shoot heroin."

Terry Parish died a week after he was admitted to Semnole Memorial Hospital. He never had a chance to live since his liver was almost gone when he was hospitalized after losing consciousness. Terry had run the gamut of drugs, trying them all before "graduating" to the hard narcotic-heroin. From a broken family. Terry had run away from home, lived with the hippies in San Francisco for a spell, before returning to his mother, Helen Fay Parish, who told his "story" to

'Get Even With Everyone' Terry's sister, Phyllis, Said her brother started on drugs "to get even with everyone."

She did not explain what she meant by getting even but indicated it had something to do with his history of environmental problems that had burdened him ever since he was a child.

Drugs were a form of escape from reality that Terry could not or did not choose to face.

But, escape is not the only reason for drug addictions, Some persons start on drugs because of a dare or to be "with it" as

some of their friends suggest. (Part two of this report will deal with types of drugs
