Housing Projects Rent Strike Seen

A rent strike against the Sanford Housing Authority by tenants may be in the offing unless efforts to resolve complaints are at least partially successful. This was divulged to The Herald by two members of the tenant council, who have met with Gordon Bradley, Sanford Housing Authority director, and members of a U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) team investigating the operation of the city's federally-funded housing projects.

If a rent strike is launched against the housing authority all monies that now go for paying rent would be placed in escrow accounts to be held until the complaints are resolved, it was said.

Tenants have been meeting to formulate a policy that would bring some changes to certain housing project regulations, which require tenants to be charged rentals based on anticipated income of families as opposed to actual income. Other complaints evolve around the requirements that force entire families to vacate apartments when an unmarried member becomes pregnant.

Many of the four Sanford projects have ranges that allegedly shock apartment dwellers and there are refrigerators that do not function properly.

The tenants are expected to bring their complaints to the City Commission tonight when Rev. Joseph Smith, tenant council member, will ask for inclusion of black persons on the authority board, which is now composed of five white men, in spite of the more than 80 per cent black occupancy of the housing units.

Other items to be brought before the City Commission tonight by Rev. Smith include proposals for improving the city's Goldsboro area, a predominantly black section.

The City Commission also will continue discussion of seeking a suitable site upon which to construct a security-police complex. Architects are expected to have information relative to probes of the soil at Marshall Avenue and 25th Street, one of the suggested sites for the police building.

The Commission has scheduled also consideration of the Airport Authority Act implementation and each of the five commissioners is expected to bring seven names to submit in "secrecy" from which seven persons with the highest number of votes will be selected.

In Friday's column, we openly challenged both the Seminole County Commission and the County School Board to offer an explanation on when, if ever, we taxpayers could expect a rollback of the millage as a result of the huge increase in county tax assessments.

We've been obliged by Commission Chairman Greg Drummond with a couple of important reasons, and will offer these to you today; but again, we issue an invitation to the School Board to also respond.

Essentially, there are millage items that are either new or stand out when viewing the county budget. As an example, it was the mandate of the voters (Nov. '70) for Parks, Mental Health and a Juvenile Detention Center.

By pulling the lever—it carried a \$284,000 price tag. (Remember, that's just for the acquisition of the land(s) and building, and still leaves the problem of financing for the administration of these three items.)

Sheriff's Budget . . . this has been increased 19% from the budget when Sheriff Polk took office.

Employee's Salaries . . . by raising same, it still puts 'em 10% below the local market. (An asterisk reminds any of us to cite an instance of an "over-salaried" job.)

State Rights-of-Way . . . this for the acquisition of necessary rights-of-way TODAY, at TODAY'S COSTS for future construction.

Studies . . . required by Federal Government to keep Sanford and other municipalities eligible for federal sewage grants—\$25,000.

Studies . . . to provide solution to availability of potable water, this decade—not 10 years too late—\$21,000.

Water Registration Office . . . this includes the cost for 1171 Corporate Tax Refundation. (Now is this being handled at the same time as the national primary? 3/72. It would amount to a huge savings.) We're talking about \$38,000.

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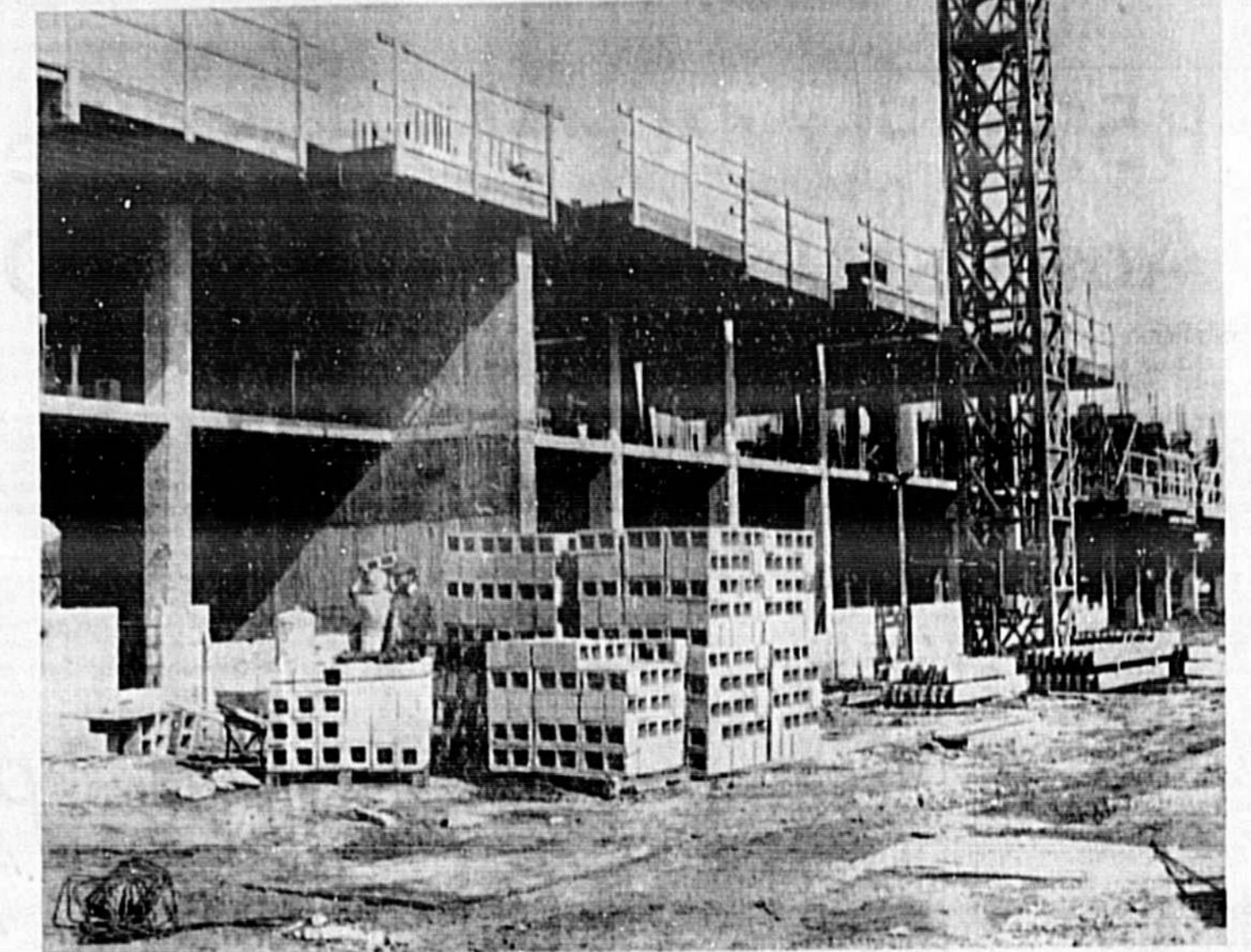
Six Killed In Prison Break Try

Young Attorney Is Sought For Questioning In Probe

SAN QUENTIN, Calif. (AP) — The San Francisco Chronicle reported today that an Oakland attorney is being sought for questioning in the investigation into Saturday's bloody breakout try at San Quentin Prison in which Soledad Brother George Jackson and five others died.

The paper said prison authorities identified him as Stephen Mitchell Bingham, 23, and said he was the lawyer who visited Jackson Saturday afternoon. The Chronicle said prison authorities reported that Jackson, minutes after leaving Bingham in the visiting room, produced a .38-caliber pistol and launched his abortive escape attempt.

Bruce Bates, Marin County district attorney, confirmed that Bingham was being sought, the Chronicle said. Bates would not say precisely why. The Chronicle said Bingham is a grandson of the late Hiram Bingham who served as Con-

Big Tree Expansion

Only three parcels of land are needed to enlarge Big Tree park, it was announced this morning at a County parks acquisition committee meeting.

The three parcels of land total about 165 acres and negotiations are underway to add those to the entire park.

Robert Overstreet is the owner of some 60 acres of the outstanding property being sought for the Big Tree site. Appraised at \$1,200 per acre, Overstreet is said to be asking about \$1,500 per acre.

Second largest landowner of the three is the Pilioian family, which says its 40 acres, appraised at \$5,000, is not for sale at any price.

The Pilioians have asked that they not be "bothered" by the county and that the county seek land elsewhere on which to build its park.

George Shantz is the owner of five acres, for which he is seeking \$15,000 for the parcel. Also brought up in this morning's meeting was the question of whether it is ethical for the county to use the same realty companies, Anderson Realty and St. Johns Realty, for both the appraising and negotiating of land.

Robert Anderson of Anderson Realty, stated it is not unethical and by doing so the county will save not just hundreds but thousands of dollars by using the same agents for both appraising and negotiating.

It was pointed out by Commissioner Sid Vihlen that the county did advertise for appraisers and took bids for same. It was Vihlen who brought to the meeting word that certain realty companies in the county are upset over the fact the same realty agents are used for the appraising and land negotiations.

The committee expressed the hope to have the ordinance posted and ready for first reading in September and second reading in October.

Annexation Bids Will Be Pondered

ALBAMONTE SPRINGS—This burgeoning municipality will see more growth with the second reading at a meeting of City Council tomorrow at 4:30 p.m. of three petitions for annexation and another request for annexation.

Council undoubtedly will approve the annexation of the Valley Forge Country Club property which the developer plans to utilize for an office park on one side and a motel

upon the other. The motel will adjoin Village Green Apartments. The area is being zoned R-3 multiple family dwelling district. A portion of the property which is owned by the Altamonte Land, Hotel, and Navigation Company on SR 436 is being deleted from the annexation.

Also to be annexed is the Musgrove property which is in the Palm Springs section of Sanlando. This property is adjacent to Crane's Root and east of I-4, adjacent to city property. The R-3 zoning on the property encompasses eight lots, which are presently zoned A-1.

Another tract to be annexed is San Sebastian, north of SR 316 and south of SR 114. One portion of the land is being zoned C-2, another R-1AA. This property had been delayed in annexation because of the fact that a legal description of a small portion had inadvertently been overlooked.

A petition will be presented to Council for annexation of several lots located off Pecan Avenue.

There will be a public hearing on vacating of certain streets on a dedicated right-of-way in the Sanlando tract. According to City Clerk Mrs. Jane Richards, a massive development is being initiated in this area and the streets are not needed as they were originally planned. This property lies in the Crane's Root area, in which a shopping mall is being planned, among other developments.

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Licensing Ordinance Nears OK

CASSELLBERRY—Proposed occupational license for the city received finishing touches by the three-member Council committee during a work session. The recommended ordinance was to be turned over to City Attorney Kenneth McIntosh today for polishing before it is submitted to the full Council in work session.

Among the items agreed upon by Council Chairman Edith Doerr, Vice Chairman Harry Sambrook and Councilman John Lighty were that the ordinance will take effect this year immediately following adoption and businesses will be given a 60-day grace period to comply.

Fee for most occupations will be \$25 annually for the period Oct. 1 through Sept. 30. Failure to comply would carry a penalty of fines not exceeding \$500 and/or 90 days in jail. Non-profit organizations whose functions are for charitable, religious, educational or civic improvement purposes would be required to obtain a license but would pay no fees.

Among the fees agreed upon by the committee were: Electric, power, water, sewer, gas or telephone companies, \$500; auctions or flea markets, \$100, with mandatory review by the business license review

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Rejects Presidential Election Ky Causes Viet Political Crisis

SAIGON (AP) — Vice President Nguyen Cao Ky's refusal to participate in the Oct. 3 presidential election, plunged South Vietnam today into its gravest political crisis since the Buddhist uprisings of 1966. Ky proposed that he and President Nguyen Van Thieu both resign from office to pave the way for a new election. He said this was the only way to avoid the prospects of dark days in the history of the nation.

There was no immediate comment from the presidential palace, but political observers doubted that Thieu would agree to Ky's proposal. The U.S. Embassy, which successfully maneuvered Ky back on the ballot was a "force ordered by President Nixon in a vain attempt to prevent the issuance of a left Thieu unopposed, raised the brief statement saying it regretted the vice president's decision. Officials at the Western White House in San Clemente, Calif., also expressed regret but indicated they will take more than token opposition.

Radio Hanoi said the Supreme Court's reversal putting Ky back on the ballot was a "force ordered by President Nixon in a vain attempt to prevent the issuance of a left Thieu unopposed, raised the brief statement saying it regretted the vice president's decision. Officials at the Western White House in San Clemente, Calif., also expressed regret but indicated they will take more than token opposition.

Hanoi said. "But to make it look like a true and legal election, Nixon had to have two candidates. So he ordered the puppet regime court that had thrown Ky out to put Ky back in."

Despite Ky's refusal to campaign, his name will appear on the ballot in accordance with the election law's provision that "candidates do not have the right to withdraw" after the Supreme Court's final posting of the election list.

He said Gen. Minh's withdrawal from the race upset Thieu's "design to use an open slate as a screen to conceal electoral fraud. This event prompted the Supreme Court on Aug. 21, in the most hasty and most bizarre fashion, to include our slate in the second posting of the list of candidates, and this despite the fact that we had refused to file an appeal."

B52s Fly 20 More Strikes Against Communists In DMZ

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. B52 bombers flew nearly 20 more strikes just below the demilitarized zone today, and South Vietnamese infantrymen reported finding bodies of 76 North Vietnamese killed by earlier B52 raids.

The South Vietnamese 1st Infantry Division found bodies of 76 North Vietnamese soldiers about 15 miles south of the DMZ in an area where B52 bombers hit earlier. He said the infantrymen also found nine machine guns, four rocket launchers and 14 assault rifles.

The spokesman reported only one ground action in the area below the DMZ, a fight near Fire Base Alpha 4. He said government troops killed four North Vietnamese and suffered two men killed and 14 wounded.

The U.S. Command announced that three American fighter-bombers attacked anti-aircraft and missile sites inside North Vietnam Sunday in two separate strikes. A communist said results of the strikes were not known, but the American planes were not damaged.

The strikes were the 50th and 51st "protective reaction" attacks reported in North Vietnam this year. The U.S. planes hit at gun and missile sites 38 and 118 miles northwest of the demilitarized zone, military spokesmen said. Two of the U.S. planes were on a bombing mission over Laos when they were fired upon by anti-aircraft guns inside North Vietnam, spokesmen said.

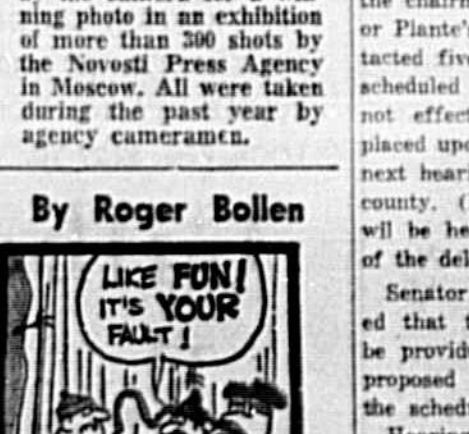
Legislation Deadlines Are Fixed

Juveniles Caught In Theft

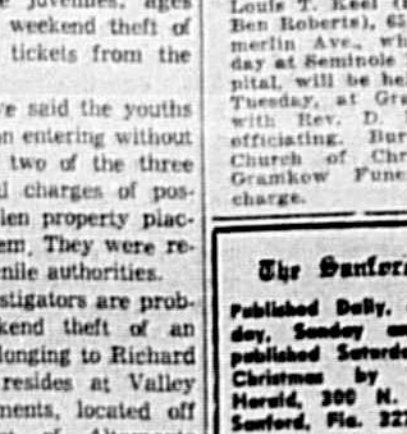

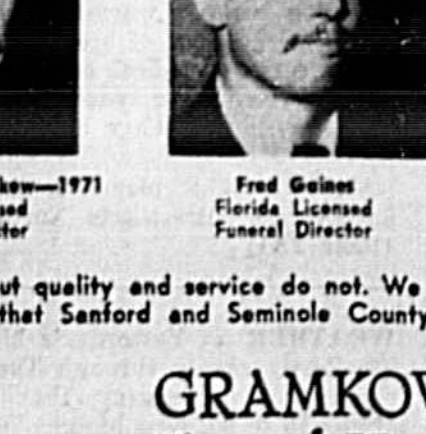

Wage-Price Freeze May Go To Court

WASHINGTON (AP) — Texas Gov. Preston Smith says he will obey the courts if they rule he cannot implement a six-year wage-price freeze.

But the Democratic governor repeated Sunday that he thinks the President cannot override the state law permitting the Sept. 1 raises.

"It would be our guess that this ought to be carried to the Supreme Court to determine whether or not the president of the United States, any president, has the authority to void a law which has been duly enacted by the people of our state," he said.

The Justice Department has said it will file suit this week to prevent the pay increases.

Smith said he would obey a possible temporary injunction pending appeal and "if the courts hold with them the government, will of course we'll have no alternative."

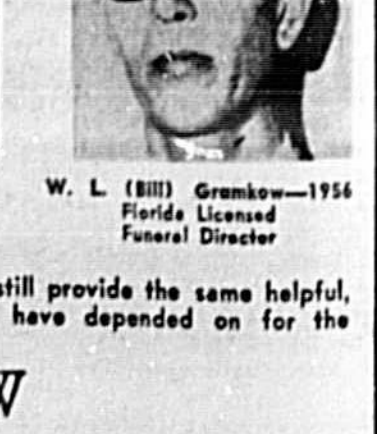

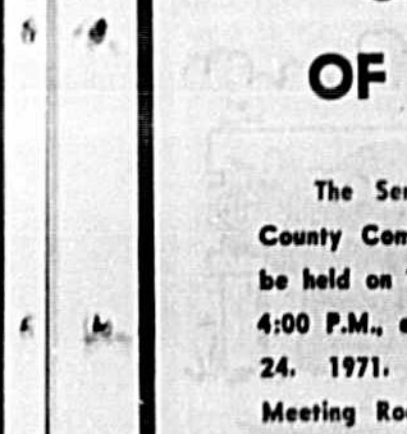

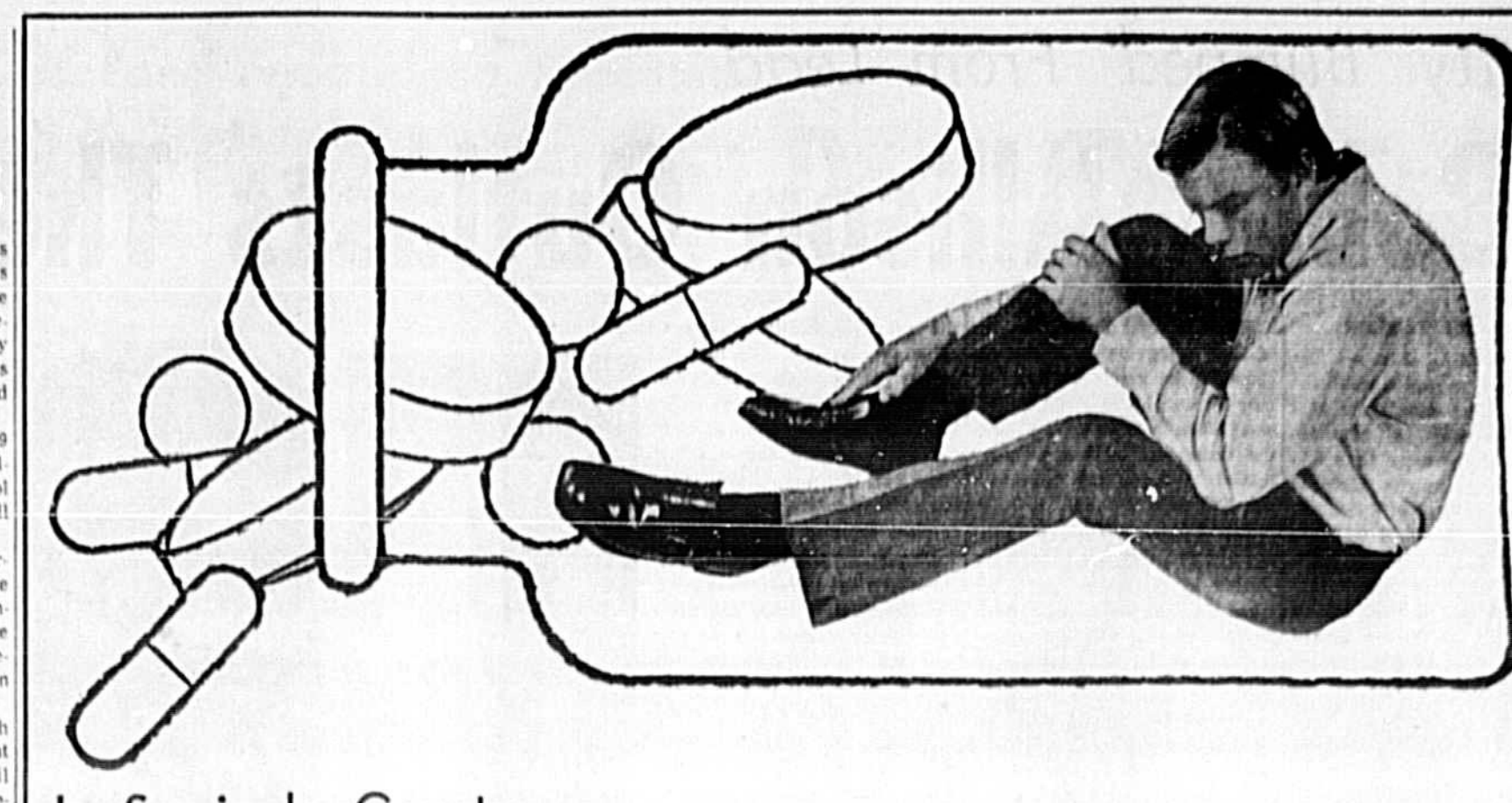

Campbell's Chicken Soup Contaminated

CAMPDEN, N.J. (AP) — The Campbell Soup Co. has recalled thousands of cans of chicken vegetable soup processed in a Texas plant after the discovery of a deadly botulism toxin in a sampling taken in one day's output.
The firm said Sunday it has already recovered about 36 per cent of the soup processed at Paris, Tex., and distributed in 16 Western and Southern states. It said more than 86,000 cans are still in circulation.
"To our knowledge, no illness has been reported as a result of eating the soup," a Campbell spokesman said.
He added that the recall order applies only to chicken vegetable soup processed at the Paris, Ark., plant, which was contaminated when the contamination was first found.

Mobsters, Molls On Payroll FBI Informers Are Well Paid

EDITORS NOTE: It was disclosed recently that the federal government spent \$12 million in 1970 for housing, feeding and paying informers—including mobsters and their molls—in exchange for information on the underworld. The FBI had the longest list of these "special employees" with 296. They were paid \$2.2 million and the following is a behind the scenes look at how this money is spent and how the FBI recruits informers.

MIAMI (AP) — Like the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, the FBI always gets its men, and according to testimony, the FBI wanted Al Featherston, candidate for lieutenant governor on the 1970 New Party ticket.
Featherston, self-labeled black revolutionary and founder of Miami's Black Army Militant Movement, recently was sentenced to four years in prison for teaching other blacks how to make bombs. He was arrested during a raid on a B.A.M.M. meeting, a raid set up by an informer.
The informer, Kermit Roberts, testified at the trial he was paid "around \$356 by the FBI" to attend B.A.M.M. meetings and report on Featherston's activities, in particular.
He testified he joined B.A.M.M. at the request of the FBI and was "getting paid based on 1 guess, the information which I reported on."
He added, "The FBI paid my expenses or dues contributed into B.A.M.M. I don't know how they rated the payments." He said he attended about 13 meetings and paid only \$5 in dues.
Roberts, a plumber, said he accepted the money "because I have two kids. That's my main reason."
In an earlier trial of Featherston which ended in a hung jury, Roberts had testified that he was paid "a salary" by the FBI during the three months he spied on his colleagues. He said he was paid \$15 a week plus expenses.
The payments received by Roberts were mere pocket money compared to bulkier checks paid to other informers.
A High Justice Department official said recently the government paid more than \$11,000 to relocate the wife and children of a convicted mobster, give his sentence reduced from 20 to five years and has recommended he be paroled in return for his testimony in a number of criminal trials.
The official said Vincent C. "Big Vinnie" Teresa, 42, self-admitted Massachusetts loan shark, had testified "in a number of trials, all of which had been successfully prosecuted."
Anat, from planting informers in the black organization, Featherston was "shadowed and then implicated" by FBI agents because of his visits to Cuba and other left-leaning countries, and for condemning Negro oppression, his friends claim.
"Two FBI agents came to me a year ago and said they would see to it that Al is put away," said Rev. Don Olson, director of the Center for Dialogue where the black activist frequented. Rev. Olson identified the agents as Leonard Peterson and "a Mr. Gettison."
"They wanted to recruit me as an informer and I refused," said the Lutheran church pastor. "They said they felt explosives were being stored in the church."

Blast Is Averted At Seminole High

An 18-year-old DeLand youth is being held by Sanford police after an incident today at Seminole High School, in which a piece of cloth was placed in the gasoline tank of a truck and set afire. Detective Gary Swain said David Alan Howell has been charged with trespassing after Patrolman Jack Petrunic found him on the school campus early today.
Three other youths also believed to have been on the scene are being questioned regarding the placing of a wick into the portable classroom mover's tank.
The Sanford fire department had to be called to extinguish the blaze from the oil-soaked rag that threatened the school and adjacent area with a massive fire had it exploded.
Swain said the explosion would have destroyed the mover and killed anyone in the area had the fire entered the massive moving machine's gasoline tank.
Two city employees happened by the school at 1:30 a.m. and spotted several youths in the area. They called police and Swain, Sgt. William Lykens and Petrunic were dispatched to the facility.
A wick and candle was reportedly found on one of the youths.

Effective At Freeze End Teacher Pay Hikes OK

School Supt. John Angel did everything but promise a morning gathering of the county's teachers the \$310,000 budgeted by the school board for a five per cent cost of living salary adjustment would be used for salary adjustments to be distributed after the 90-day wage-price freeze ordered by President Nixon expires. (Related story on Page 1B.)
Angel said the school administration will "take the \$310,000 and put it in a sack, under the table." Angel continued, "I don't see how anybody can take the money away from us." He added, "I can't promise anything or speak for the board but I think the money will find its way back into salaries, somehow."
The superintendent told this morning's gathering of over 1,000 teachers, "According to a bulletin issued Aug. 18 by the State Department of Education and put in a sack, under the table." Angel continued, "I don't see how anybody can take the money away from us." He added, "I can't promise anything or speak for the board but I think the money will find its way back into salaries, somehow."
According to Angel, the guidelines recommend any money budgeted for salary increases or adjustments affected by the freeze be held in escrow for possible salary adjustments after the freeze is lifted. Angel said state law will permit such distribution but final determination will have to be made by the federal Office of Emergency Planning which is administering the freeze.
Most of Angel's remarks centered on what he termed as the lack of public support and confidence in the school system. Angel said, "I run scared half the time because of the lack of confidence and support of our schools." He continued, "I believe a majority must be satisfied or they would make much more racket."
Angel said the results of the teachers' labors is reflected in the standardized tests given students. Angel said, "I don't care about the reliability of the tests. All I care about is how your students stack up against the students in the rest of the state." Angel cited the statewide senior tests as an example in which the ranking of Seminole County students rose from 19th in 1967 to ninth in 1970 when compared to the 1970 in the remaining 66 counties in Florida.

'Lily-White' Board Protested Housing Rent Strike Is Promised

A Sanford Housing Authority rent strike was promised by tenants of the city's four federally funded, predominantly black housing projects in a protest-marked City Commission meeting Monday night.
Objecting to the "lily-white" composition of the Housing Authority board, which is appointed by the City Commission, the approximately 50 black tenants asked the Commission to dissolve the present board and appoint another, with five or more Negroes.
Led by Rutha Higgins, executive secretary of Seminole Joint Tenant Council; Rev. Joseph Smith, Goldsboro area committee spokesman, and Alfred DeLattrebaudiere, tenant council member, the tenants also protested the appointment of an airport authority consisting of seven members, one of whom is black.
Seminole-Orange Rep. Robert Milburn was among the persons crowding city hall and talking with reporters later, advised he had been invited to the session two weeks ago by Commissioner W. Vincent Roberts.
Milburn said he believes the tenants have some legitimate complaints and he would be interested in the outcome of the controversy since the act that created the Housing Authority was a general act passed at Tallahassee.

Police Site Still Unknown

"Well, back to the old drawing boards."
This may well have been the sentiment of the Sanford City Commission after disclosures by architects Gutman, Dragash and Maza that all three sites handpicked two months ago by the commission as potential locations for the city's new jail-security complex have drawbacks.
Previously the commission had tentatively picked sites on French Avenue at Ninth and Fourth Streets and on 25th Street west of Marshall Avenue, all sites owned by the city.
The two French Avenue sites are hampered by the lack of sufficient space for future expansion and parking areas and the Marshall Avenue 8.5 acres is large enough, but extensive muck removal, the use of fill dirt and use of piling, all at high costs would be required before the site is suitable.
Problems were made on the Marshall site and it was found that muck from one to four feet in depth would have to be removed and fill compacted done before the property can be used.
City Commissioners set a Thursday noon meeting to resolve from a list of city properties what site is most suitable for the jail complex.
In other action, relative to the same proposed 25th Street area of the jail, the commission denied requests from Phil Zull to utilize a portion of the Marshall-Hartwell Avenue site for a borrow pit and to construct a park. On a motion by Commissioner W. Vincent Roberts, the request was turned down.
There are no large water lines in this area and a large water main would be needed for fire protection, etc.

Elected by the Sanford City Commission in secret ballot last night were Dr. Robert Rosemond, Joe Baker, Scott Burns, John Daniels, John Mercer, John Fitzpatrick and A.K. Shoemaker Jr.
Rosemond received the highest number of votes cast, four. Baker, Burns and Daniels received three votes each. A tie-breaker ballot was needed to elect Mercer, Shoemaker and Fitzpatrick are members of the SIC.
The City Commission was asked (from the audience) to place three Negroes on the authority board. Daniels is black. Another black, D. C. McCoy, received only one vote.

Hospital Trustees Are 'Cleared' Of The Sunshine Law Charges

State Attorney Abbott Herring said today he has no evidence of criminal action that would be unverifiable by a grand jury indictment of Seminole Memorial Hospital trustees.
Herring said he had talked with Dr. John Johnson, medical staff chief; Robert Bessner, hospital administrator, and Gordon Freder.
"Editor's note: Florida's 'government in the sunshine' law prohibits public officials from holding secret meetings for conducting public business. Violation of the law is a criminal offense, punishable by imprisonment or fine, or both."
Herring said he is "not planning" on talking with Dr. Jonata or his replacement, Dr. G. V. Gary, who was hired by the trustees when Dr. Jonata's contract was not renewed. "The investigation is strictly between the medical staff and the trustees," Herring added.
At this point Herring is preparing to set up a committee to discuss the preparation of a pathologist contract without inviting any one.
Hospital medical staff members wrote to the Governor and requested an investigation of the trustees and this action was followed by a letter to the Governor by Charles Lansing, hospital trustees chairman, with a denial of the "Sunshine" law violation.
Lansing said, "Legally I do not know if we did or did not violate the hospital bylaws but, if so, it was done inadvertently and unknowingly."
Trustees have scheduled a special 7 p.m. meeting Wednesday at the hospital to discuss and presumably take action on adoption of rules and regulations governing the operation of the hospital laboratory, pathologist charges and a bid opening for the planned hospital addition.
The judicial council of the Florida Medical Association has scheduled a Sept. 25 investigation at Jacksonville into the replacement of Dr. Jonata by Dr. Gary.
