The Board accepted the resignation of V. H. Sley, Geneva member of the Beck Hammock Drainage District board.

Upon motion of Commissioner C. B. Searcy, seconded by Commissioner Boston Steele, the Commissioners designated the Seminole County Sentinel as the publication which will this year carry the delinquent county tax roll.

All county officers rendered reports of activities during January, as well as reports for the last six months of 1931.

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James G. Sharon, county judge, reported incomes as follows: private fees as county judge, \$738.70; marriage hunting, occupational license fees, \$773; county court fees, \$700.20; salary as judge, \$250; salary as juvenile judge, \$100...

Sheriff J. F. McClelland reported the following incomes: fees and costs of criminal and insanity cases, \$2778.84; fees and costs of civil cases, \$726.81; attendance at all courts and county commission meetings, \$648; feeding prisoners, \$1788.15; all other commissions and remunerations, \$1034.87; commissions on collections, \$147.07, totaling \$7118.74.

E. A. Douglas, clerk of court, reported incomes as follows: All sources, including filing fees, tax redemptions, and criminal and civil court costs, \$6930.66. Expenses amounted to \$5907.93, covering \$706.31 for office supplies, and the following salaries: A. M. Weeks, \$955; E. L. Burdick, \$955; Olive LeZette, \$660; Norene Norwood, \$660; Helen Douglas, \$240; M. W. Douglas, \$410; V. McDaniel, \$235; Mary Earle, \$245; extra help, \$270, and \$571.62 for all other expenses.

O. P. Herndon, Justice of the Peace, reported incomes amounting to \$1084.51, from the following sources: criminal case fees, \$918.39; civil case fees, \$57.72; coroner, \$108.40; miscellaneous, \$10; His expenses amounted to \$30 for telephone, and \$26 for miscellaneous office supplies, leaving a net of \$1033.51.

(Continued from Page One) section to the international settlement, a neutral zone shall be arranged.

Mr. Thomas was not explicit about the use of American troops, but said the proposed neutral zone would have to be occupied by the troops of the neutral powers which have forces in the international settlement, and one of these powers is the United States.

Andre Tardieu, French minister of war, and Foreign Minister Dino Grandi of Italy, briefly announced their governments had sent instructions about the peace proposals to their representatives at Tokyo and Nanking with a view of taking the steps indicated by Mr. Thomas.

Dr. Weizsaecker, the German spokesman, said he would immediately inform his government so that it would be able to take any measures necessary in order forthwith to convey adequate instructions to its diplomatic representatives in the two capitals.

"I am particularly glad," he continued, "because it was we ourselves, the Japanese government, who asked the representatives of Great Britain, the United States and France at Tokyo to take concerted action such as was required."

"My government put forward that request without any hesitation. We felt that this was a time which called for exceptional measures."

The Japanese delegate's remarks seemed to surprise the spectators. Action under the program outlined by Mr. Thomas will require several days to reach the definite stage. First Nanking and Tokyo must have time to make formal replies.

The delineations of the neutral zone will mean difficult negotiations. The authoritative view here was the zone would be very thin at first and then gradually, by diplomatic pressure, backed by the presence of military forces, made wider.

After the zone becomes a reality, in case the plan goes through, then the ultimate negotiations for settlement still will remain—direct between the two parties, or through a neutral mediator.
