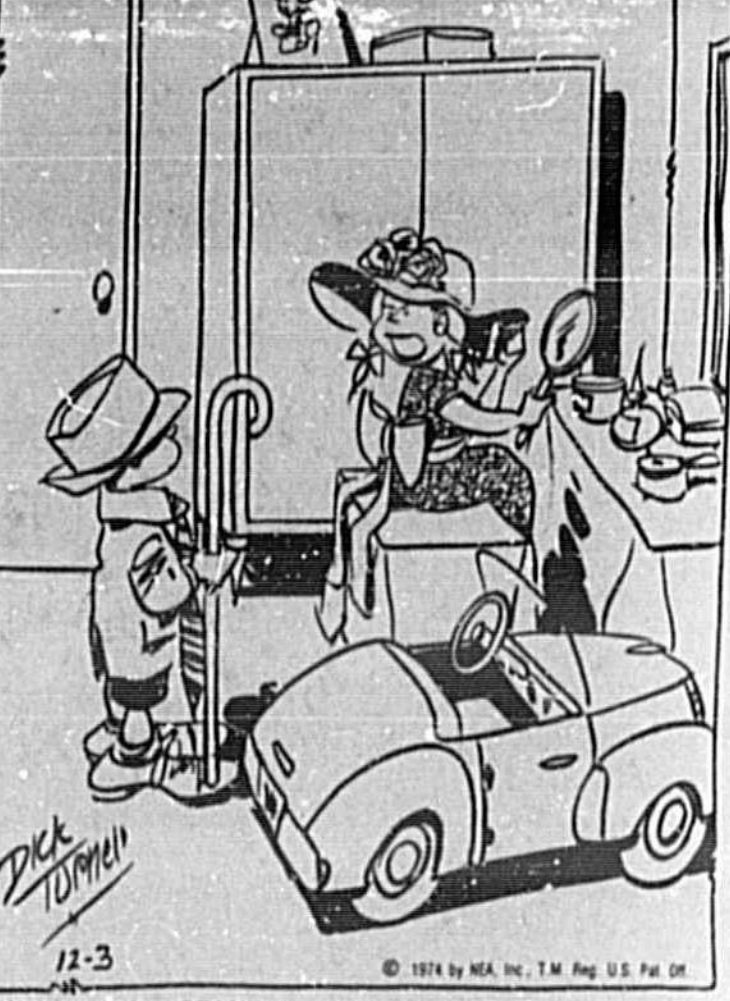

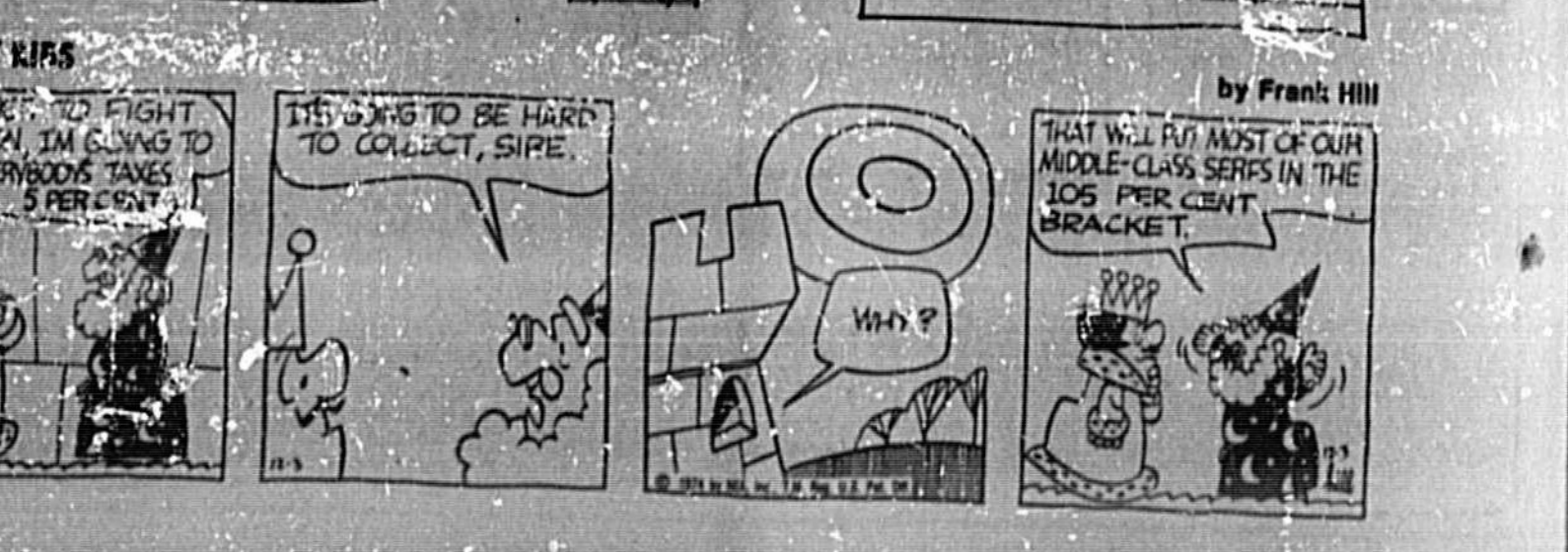

McClanahan, Morris Are Re-elected



Incumbent Sanford city commissioners A.A. McClanahan and John G. Morris won new four-year terms Tuesday as 26 per cent of the city's 7,011 voters cast ballots over the city in an afternoon session today at city hall.

McClanahan and Morris will be sworn in for their new terms Jan. 7.

Both commissioners had prepared for runoff campaigns, but they were re-elected in each case with more votes than the total garnered by their opponents.

In the race for commission seat three, McClanahan had 900 votes, while contractor Alfred DeLattibaudiere got 361. Part-time reporter Mrs. Stella Woodhouse had 252 and auto dealer Guy Thornton took 250 votes.

Morris regained commission seat four with 853 votes. Clothing salesman E.O. "Eddie" Keith was second with 599 and retiree Delbert Euga garnered 199 votes.

The returns are unofficial

until city commissioners canvass the returns and count 20 absentee ballots in an afternoon session today at city hall.

McClanahan and Morris will be sworn in for their new terms Jan. 7.

McClanahan, who came within 10 votes predicting his vote gathering strength, said, "I'll continue to represent all the people to the best of my ability and spend the time necessary to do the job."

"I'm really happy I'm not in a runoff," the retired Navy officer said. "I was all geared up for a runoff campaign, however."

Morris, too, was ready for a runoff, and noted 19 of his four-

eight-foot political signs — plywood, posts and all — disappeared Tuesday from locations over the city, as estimated their cost at \$400.

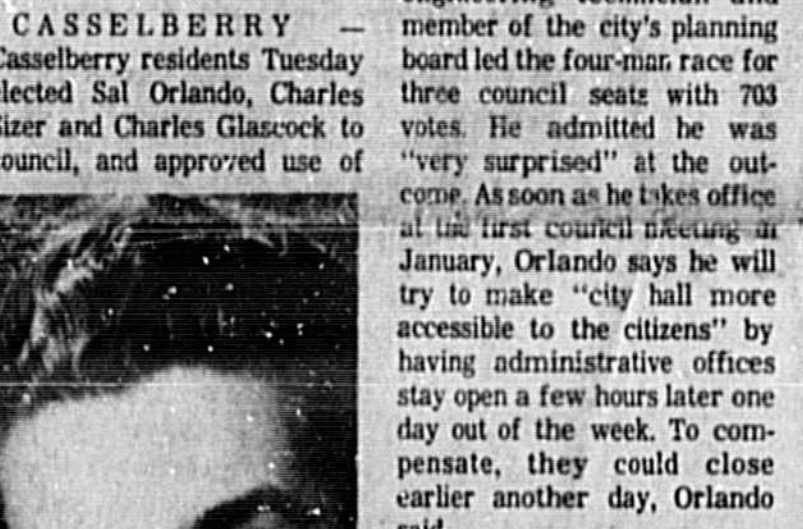
DeLattibaudiere, sporting an imitation straw campaign hat with the words "Win, Win," congratulated McClanahan on a good race but told bystanders, "They haven't heard the last of me yet."

Thornton said he's not bitter about being defeated in his first bid for office. "But I am disappointed at the low voter turnout. I will work with the commissioner in any way I can," he said.

Thornton said he has no plans to run for a commission post in 1976 but said such a decision,

flourish in their drinking water. Sal Orlando, senior engineering technician and member of the city's planning board led the four-man race for three council seats with 703 votes. He admitted he was "very surprised" at the outcome. As soon as he takes office at his first council meeting in January, Orlando says he will try to make "city hall more accessible to the citizens" by having administrative offices stay open a few hours later one day out of the week. To compensate, they could close earlier another day, Orlando said.

Orlando says that most working people don't have a chance to get to City Hall during normal 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. five-day-a-week operating hours.

Incumbent Charles Glascock, second in the field with 631 votes, felt that "the people of Casselberry took a good look at the candidates" and voted accordingly. Glascock, who had not spent a cent on his campaign until last Saturday, had been the only candidate in the county to do so. On Saturday, Glascock said, "I took some old wood and made 18 signs. It cost me \$20."

Glascock, a retired army lieutenant colonel who is active in the family hardware business in Casselberry, hopes to have the council working on a "charter revision plan" to update the document. One of the most glaring mistakes of the present charter, he said, is the scheduling of city elections for Dec. 3, instead of in November with the general elections. The voter turnout — 925 out of a 4,025 registered voters in a city of almost 15,000 — might increase by shifting the election date.

Charles Sizer, 30, will become the youngest council member. Sizer, the only candidate to actively campaign in town, said he has a "mother and homemaker" during her campaign for the council seat held by Dan DeFerman, polled 55 per cent of the vote to defeat former councilman Tom Radloff.

Two-thirds of the voters pulled the lever for George Perkins, even though he was unopposed for the office to which he was appointed last June. He filled the unexpired term of Don Myers, who resigned.

Lormann Wins Mayor's Seat

LONGWOOD—The Lormann name was made again in this city Tuesday as voters elected the third member of that family to city government.

Setting a record, at least for the Central Florida area, James (Jim) Lormann, son of the late Mayor A. R. Lormann and incumbent Councilmember June Lormann, was elected mayor of his community of 8,300 persons.

Believed to be the youngest mayor in the area at 23, Lormann made plans at a victory party last night to ride with his mother and wife, Marcia, in the Sanford Christmas Parade, Thursday. He will attach to his car the same flag—a blue field with one star bearing the word "mayor"—that his father had used year after year in the parade.

Gerard T. (Jerry) Connell, a relatively new resident — he has lived in the city only 18 months — and director of research and development at Martin Marietta, was elected to the district five city council over four opponents.

Hess Upset In Lake Mary

LAKE MARY — A "new broom" swept clean when 56 per cent of this city's 982 voters elected newcomers Walter Sorenson as its mayor, and Lillian Griffin, Martin Bacon Sr., and Burt Perinchieff as councilmen Tuesday.

Sorenson defeated Lee Wheeler by 68 votes, 304 to 236. Lillian Griffin was the highest vote-getter in her unopposed bid for seat no. 2 with 487 votes. Bacon tallied 308 votes to defeat former Mayor Margie Hess' 220 votes in the race for council seat no. 3, and Perinchieff amassed the largest margin of victory over his opponent, Irvin Blankenship, 334 to 206.

There are 20 absentee ballots which will not affect the outcome of any of the races. The absentee ballots will be counted today.

A total of 543 people voted. When his son's victory was announced, Mrs. Lormann burst into tears, saying this was far better than her own election a year ago.

Of the 1,854 registered voters, 44 per cent — 809 — cast ballots. The election was canvassed today. The new officials take office Jan. 6.

"It's times greater — but that much rewarding, too." Gaining top priority according to Sorenson will be implementation of a land-use plan for Lake Mary. "We've got to have one before we can even talk about items such as parks or anything else. Insofar as annexation is concerned, I'm going to judge each application on its own merits."

The new mayor readily recognized limited resources as the biggest problem confronting this one-year-old city. "I'll say this," said Sorenson, "there won't be any increase in taxation. Before that ever happens, we'll go to the public with a referendum and let them decide if the projects they're considering are worth the extra expenditures to them via increased taxes."

Bacon exuded confidence on his victory. "I felt I was going to make it all the time. The neighbors sought my entry and I believed them when they said they'd support me in this election." He pledged his cooperation to the mayor and extended this time around were

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Voters Tuesday elected a second woman to city council and gave an overwhelming vote of confidence to the man appointed to the governing body six months ago to fill an unexpired term.

Sandra Glenn, also tagged herself a "mother and homemaker," during her campaign for the council seat held by Dan DeFerman, polled 55 per cent of the vote to defeat former councilman Tom Radloff.

Two-thirds of the voters pulled the lever for George Perkins, even though he was unopposed for the office to which he was appointed last June. He filled the unexpired term of Don Myers, who resigned.

The new councilmen will take office Jan. 7, 1975.

WORLD IN BRIEF

Japan's Prime Minister Promises Social Justice

TOKYO (AP) — Takeo Miki, 67, Japan's next prime minister, today promised a vigorous program based on social justice and reform of the ruling Liberal Democratic party. Miki said he will make an early public statement about his personal wealth, the issue that brought about Kakuei Tanaka's resignation as prime minister. Miki will be formally elected to head the government Monday at a special session of the Diet, Japan's parliament.

Arabs Buy French Tanks

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Saudi Arabia has concluded an \$800 million deal with France to improve its tank corps and is shipping in the United States for other arms, the Saudi defense minister said in an interview published today. The equipment reportedly will include France's AMX tank and an anti-aircraft missile. Diplomatic sources said the Saudis went to the French after the United States, heretofore the chief supplier of arms to Saudi Arabia, refused to sell them its newest model tank, the M60.

Secret Agreement Revealed

JERUSALEM (AP) — Foreign Minister Yigal Allon told the Israeli parliament that Egypt in a secret agreement last January agreed to let Israel ca. 20 and foreign ships bound to and from Israel to pass through the Suez Canal as soon as the waterway is reopened. Allon said that Israeli ships would be allowed to use the canal only after a permanent peace settlement is reached. Egypt has never allowed Israel to use the canal, contending that the two countries have been in a state of war since the 1948 Palestine war.

Congress Establishes Standards For Water

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress has voted to set up the first national standards for drinking water after the government said some water supplies may contain cancer-causing chemicals. The bill now goes to the White House where it faces a possible veto. "This is the first significant bill we've had to try to assure clean drinking water in this nation," the chief author of the legislation, Rep. Paul G. Rogers, D-Fla., said Tuesday. The House accepted on a voice vote the same bill which passed the Senate. The final action came about a month after the Environmental Protection Agency announced that possible cancer-causing substances were detected in some drinking water in New Orleans and Cincinnati. The announcement led to a surge in bottled-water sales. The EPA announced then that it was conducting a nationwide investigation to determine how widespread the possible problem is. The investigation is just beginning at about 100 sites around the country, an EPA spokesman said Tuesday. The bill would require a report on that investigation within six months. The legislation also would direct the EPA to promulgate interim drinking water standards

Watergate Lawyer Says Crime Admitted

WASHINGTON (AP) — A prosecutor in the Watergate cover-up trial says H.R. Haldeman confessed to a crime while testifying about the attempt to get CIA officials to curtail the FBI investigation of the Watergate break-in. During a private courtroom conference Tuesday with Judge John J. Sirica and defense lawyers, "assistant" prosecutor Richard Ben-Veniste said Haldeman "confesses to a crime, which I believe he has just done, to defrauding the United States through the misuse of the CIA for improper reasons."

Ben-Veniste was referring to Haldeman's indication right before the conference that Deputy CIA Director Vernon Walters' testimony was substantially correct. Walters testified earlier that Haldeman had said the CIA should tell the FBI to curtail its investigation and that Haldeman had expressed concern that the FBI probe could be "embarrassing" and lead to "high people."

The issue is whether Haldeman was acting from concern that the FBI investigation would expose secret CIA operations or from the desire to shield Nixon's re-election campaign.

William G. Hundley, lawyer for former Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell, said he would agree to Frates' proposal. But lawyers for Haldeman, former assistant Atty. Gen. Robert C. Mardian and Kenneth W. Parkinson, former lawyer for the Nixon re-election campaign, said they would not release the jury and expose its members to the publicity generated by the case.

Medical Scientist Cites Spread Of Lung Cancer

CHICAGO (AP) — "Cancer of the lung is rapidly approaching the dimensions of a national calamity in this country," a medical scientist warns. He cited an American Cancer Society estimate that 91,000 persons will be stricken with lung cancer in 1975 and that 81,000 will die of the disease during the year. Since 1958, the VA doctors have studied 8,000 patients with lung cancer, using 13 different treatments or combinations of treatment, including radiation, drugs and placebos, or sugar pills. Roswit reported on 1,279 of the 8,000 patients for whom there was some hope of treatment success. Even so, two years after treatment in this group only 3.3 per cent were still alive. And only 1.3 per cent survived for as long as five years. "That's a deadly piece of information, to say the least," Roswit told newsmen. He said

"A man who smokes two packs a day has about as much chance of surviving as a bull in Spain," said Dr. Bernard Roswit of New York. He added that death from lung cancer is rising among women. Roswit made the comments Tuesday in a report at the annual meeting of the Radiological Society of North America on a study begun in 1958 at a Veterans Administration hospital.

He told reporters that he has been giving paper 1 at the society's meetings for 25 years and that "this is the first time I've felt so deeply depressed."

He said that the majority of lung cancer cases will be too far advanced to benefit from surgery by the time they are diagnosed. And drugs and radiation offer little hope for either curing the

caner or extending the patient's life by very much, he added. The bill also authorizes \$156.5 million over three years for a variety of grants and loan guarantees for research, demonstrations and improvement of water systems. Environmental groups strongly support the measure. The Ford administration opposes some of its provisions on grounds of cost and what it terms the excessive role of the federal government in the enforcement. President Ford has not decided whether to sign or veto the bill, a White House official said Tuesday night.
