The Florida Education Association (FEA) has named a team of eight to investigate the state of county level education in Florida. The team is expected to report in four months.

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WASHINGTON (UPI)—The National Education Association (NEA) announced today an eight-member team to investigate the state of county level education in Florida. The team is expected to report in four months.

The Florida Education Association (FEA) asked for the investigation "to determine whether local conditions at the state or county level have prevented the State of Florida from meeting the educational needs of its children."

Owen Love, NEA's legal counsel of the National Commission on Professional Rights and Responsibilities, said the investigation team is composed of distinguished educators from all parts of the country. Each of the eight is from a different state.

He said the main purpose of the team is to take a look at the investigation on the program and then recommend corrective measures. Just because the FEA asked for the investigation does not mean that individual public officials are going to be investigated and punished, Love said.

"The political atmosphere in Florida is such that it is a natural thing to be considered in the operation of schools because of the public and are part of the system in a democratic society," Love said. "The team is expected to examine the state's tax structure, its ability to pay for adequate schools and possibly the operation of individual school systems, the NEA said."

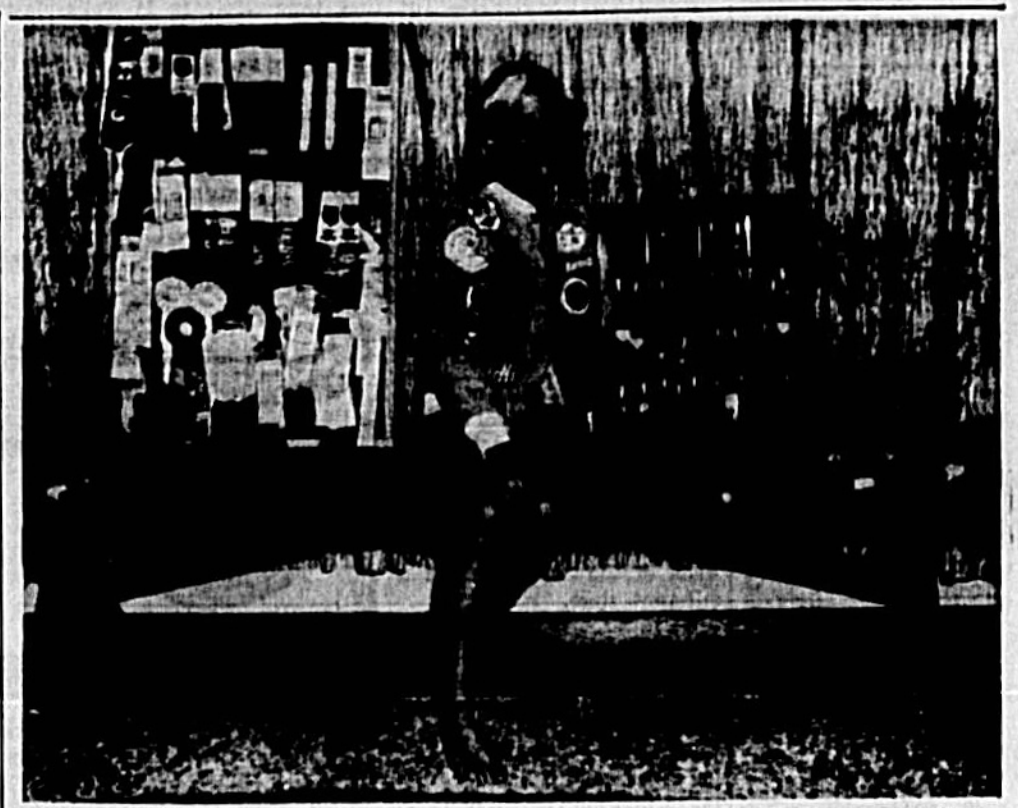

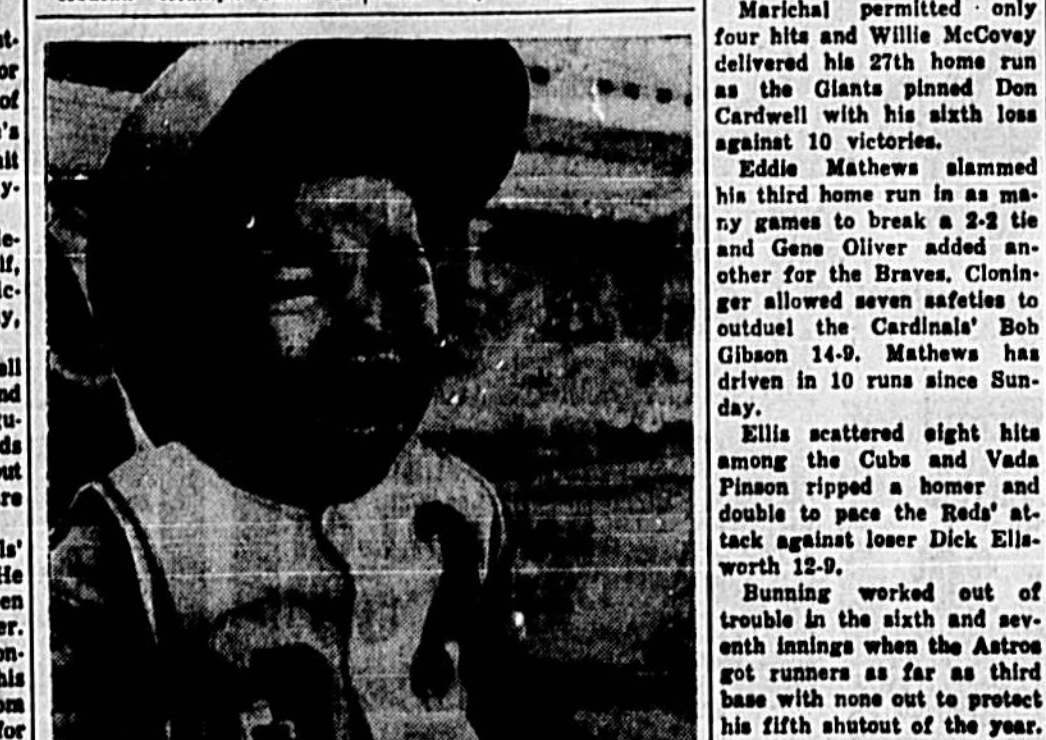

Injury Jinx Leaves Packers, But Other Clubs Still Afflicted

It follows that good conditioning makes for fewer injuries, then the Green Bay Packers might have a head start in regaining the National Football League title.

The Packers, one of the most crippled teams in pro football last year, have Coach Vince Lombardi glowing with pride as they prepare for their first real test of the season Saturday night against the New York Giants.

The reason Lombardi is happy is because this year's Packers squad is the best-conditioned team he's ever had at this stage of the year. In a game as rough as pro football, it usually follows that the team with the fewest injuries is the one to beat for the title.

"This has been, by far, the finest camp since I've been here," Lombardi said Tuesday. "It has more spirit, more determination and less anything than since I came in 1959. It is the best conditioned squad ever at this time of the year."

It hasn't been all peaches and cream, however. The Packers' lost tight end Ron Kramer when he played out his option and went hard hit when rookie end Allen Brown tackled him in the end zone Saturday night with a shoulder operation.

But several of the other teams have been hit harder by injuries. Cleveland has lost flanker Paul Warfield for an indefinite period with a shattered collarbone and the Washington Redskins will be without the services of last season's rookie of the year, Charley Taylor, with a fractured ankle.

The American Football League's Houston Oilers are another team with a serious injury. It was learned Tuesday that rookie flanker Larry Elkins, injured in last Saturday's exhibition game, will be out two months with body trauma to his knee cartilages.

The Giants announced Tuesday that end B. C. Owens has retired from pro football. Owens gave up football to devote more time to his job as a public relations man.

In other developments the Colts dropped halfback Dave Hoppman and fullback John Eumczyk, both rookies, from the roster. The Pittsburgh Steelers asked writers on tape to look for the return of the St. Louis Cardinals' seventh round draft choice Frank Roy of Utah.

Florida Appeals For Tourist \$\$\$ To Come South

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Development Commission members got their first look Tuesday at Florida's \$163,427 tourist and industrial advertising program for coming months.

The commission will spend \$247,000 for a three-pronged appeal to northern tourists during the fall, Christmas holiday and winter periods. The fall tourist advertising program will cost \$110,000, the holiday program \$104,000 and the winter period \$53,755.

New York Now Bagdad-On-The-Sahara

WATER II

NEW YORK (UPI)—Long ago this glamorous, vertical city was called Bagdad-on-the-Hudson, but now it is Bagdad-on-the-Sahara. That's a job, caused by a water shortage in the nation's largest city.

Not a desperate shortage in the sense that people are actually thirsty. What New Yorkers are going through is inconvenience rather than tragedy. You can get water in restaurants only by asking for it. Hydrants are padlocked instead of being opened to cool off street children. Air conditioning is being used fewer hours in some buildings. Some New Yorkers may be taking fewer baths, although as a patron over many years of the Lexington Avenue subway system, this correspondent can testify there always has been a large anti-bath line among the city's residents.

New York City's plight is instructive because it is a perfect example of how haphazard preparation and stupidity of city officials can bring about a shortage of such an essential thing as water. The warning sign has been flashing red for years. In 1961 the city's reserve water supply stood at 624 billion gallons; in 1964, 572.3 billion; on July 23, 1965, 258.3 billion. In one day it can and has dropped 3 billion gallons.

The city uses about 1.8 billion gallons a day. The irony of it is that two of New York's five boroughs — Manhattan and Richmond — are islands and are surrounded by water. By a simple process of tapping the Hudson River above Poughkeepsie, New York could have had all the water it needed years ago.

Instead, it uses a system of reservoirs which over the years have proved inadequate as the population increases. But there is a quicker solution than tapping the Hudson or building more reservoirs immediately at hand and all it needs is an ounce or two of political courage. New Yorkers waste 400 million gallons of water a day. The reason for that is that they pay a flat rate for their water — around \$11 a year for a home owner. Once you pay that, you can use all you choose, and two leaky faucets in your home can dribble away thousands of gallons a year.

The answer is to install water meters everywhere and charge according to what is used. The answer is why this was not done years ago is that owners of homes and apartment buildings don't want to do it, and the city officials don't want to offend so many voters by doing it.

Universal installation of meters to prevent a water shortage is not a theory. It is a proved fact. Philadelphia now has universal metering. Daily consumption has dropped from 400 million gallons to 285 million. When you pay for something you are disinclined to waste it.

You fail to detect a sense of crisis as you walk through the New York streets. The city abounds in watering holes and cafes, and citizens brooding about the water shortage realize that gin and tonic will stave thirst and ale will stave a sense of well-being. The bars are crowded and beer flows like, shall we say, water?

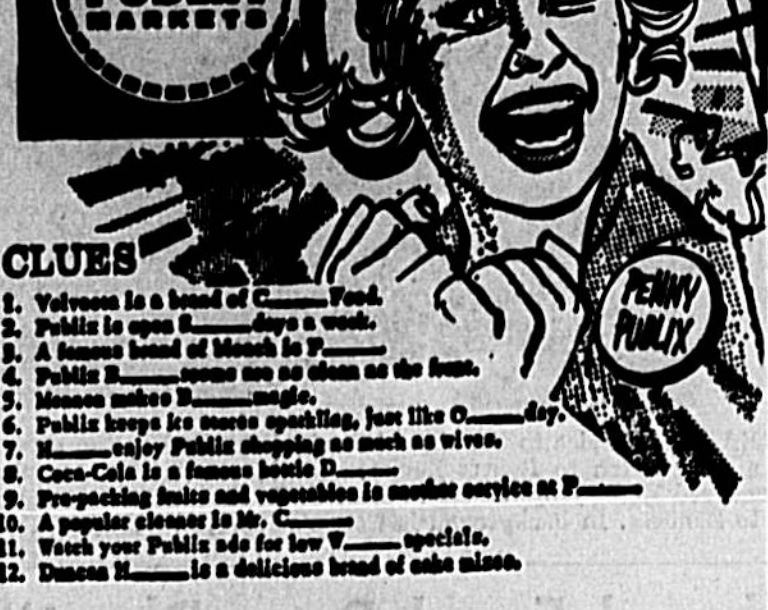

Preparation Key To Safety In Hurricane

GAITHERVILLE (AP)—Hurricanes should not be taken lightly. These tropical storms can inflict heavy damage on both the indifferent and unprepared who are not adequately protected, says A. M. Potts, Safety Leader with the Florida Agricultural Extension Service.

The key to protection in preparation. By taking some measures before, during, and after a hurricane, you can guard yourself, your family and property against its violence.

First, keep well-informed when a hurricane or lesser tropical storm is detected. Thanks to modern hurricane warning services, there usually is plenty of time to prepare for a storm. Use radio and television stations will provide current information supplied by the U. S. Weather Bureau.

When the Weather Bureau determines that a particular section of a coastal area will soon be struck by a hurricane, a "hurricane warning" will be issued. Potts points out that everyone in this designated zone should immediately take all possible precautions. Once a "warning" has been announced, there's time to prepare but no time to waste.

When a "hurricane warning" is posted, residents should evacuate beaches and other low-lying areas immediately. Don't delay, since roads to safer areas may be blocked due to hurricanes winds or rain.

If you live in a reasonably safe area and your home is well constructed, stay home and make emergency preparations. Check everything outside your home that might be blown away or blown against the house. These items that include garbage cans, garden tools, toys, lawn furniture, awnings and other loose objects can become destructive weapons in hurricane-force winds. Firmly secure any object that might be blowing in the yard.

Beats should not be overturned. They can be sunk or damaged quite easily. Most smaller boats can be hauled out of the water and put on a trailer. After securing the accessories, let the air out of the trailer tires, and lash it down. A boat secured in water should have enough slack in the line to allow for pitching or riding waves.

The best place for a larger boat to weather a hurricane is in an inland creek or canal. Before securing, patch the craft away from docks, pilings, or overhanging trees.

House windows are vulnerable to either flying debris or wind pressure. Board up, tape, or put storm shutters on both large and small windows. Although tape may not keep a window from breaking, it is an effective way of preventing flying glass.

When the wind starts blowing, stay inside. Open a window on the side of the house away from the wind to equalize inside and outside pressure. After you crack the window, let it with toward to those trees. A hurricane may cause problems over or under failure. Potts recommends that all families stock up on the following supplies: food, batteries, candles, a gasoline camp stove or canned heat, a battery-operated radio and batteries. Buy food that requires no refrigeration and little preparation. Make sure you have plenty of water for drinking and bathing.

Medicare: Disabled Don't Mean Helpless

NEA Special Writer
You needn't be a helpless invalid in order to be a Social Security disability beneficiary.

However, you have to be disabled that you can't engage in any substantial gainful activity. In other words, it must be established that because of your physical or mental condition you are unable to do ANY kind of work for a living.

In the past, such benefits were issued only if it was shown the disability was expected to last indefinitely or to result in death. But this has been changed, effective July 1.

Now the law says—if you have a disability which (1) has lasted at least 12 months or (2) is expected to last that long or (3) is expected to result in death, you may start collecting such a benefit.

Provided, of course, you have worked long enough under Social Security to be eligible. Generally, you must have worked under Social Security at least five of the 10 years just before you became disabled.

When you apply for a disability benefit, the Social Security office gives you a special medical form to be filled out by your doctor and by hospitals and other institutions where you have been treated.

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Seminole Draft Call Hike Seen At 60%

President Johnson's decision to double the draft means that if you are a 19 or 20-year-old Seminole Countyman, your chances of being called up are somewhat great. Exactly how far the Selective Service will reach down depends on conditions in the local draft area. Mrs. Nordstrom this morning said the supply of 21-year-old eligibles is nearly depleted, thus making those men 20 and 19 next in line for induction.

However, Mrs. Nordstrom did not appear to anticipate many 19-year-olds being called up for service. The total number of men to be called during the next draft period (September) for Seminole County has not yet been established. It is expected, though, that the quota will be increased by 60 per cent over past months, according to Mrs. Nordstrom.

Bearing out this increase, the number called in the past few months—those who are not fathers have been retained in the 1-A classification. Their files, however, have been set aside, away from those eligible for immediate draft.

It has been said that all or part of a draft board's personnel may find themselves no longer exempt. Students in certain "non-essential" courses of study could lose their deferment rights. This will, of course, vary from community to community.

Chances are those students actually enrolled on a full-time basis—for whom the Selective Service board has received a student's certificate from the educational institution—will be deferred. This exemption, however, is on a year-to-year basis, and the student who is placed on probation from his school can well find himself being called up. The same applies to the student who attends school spasmodically.

In the same way, it will probably be more difficult for a man to be deferred because of being in an important critical occupation—meaning an essential occupation in short supply in the area.

These critical skills, for example, might be engineering and teachers—or any person engaged in a field related to the health interest and safety of the nation. However, Mrs. Nordstrom was quick to point out that this is a fluctuating figure, and that the national average is 60 per cent. Seminole County men are anywhere between the normal for the nation.

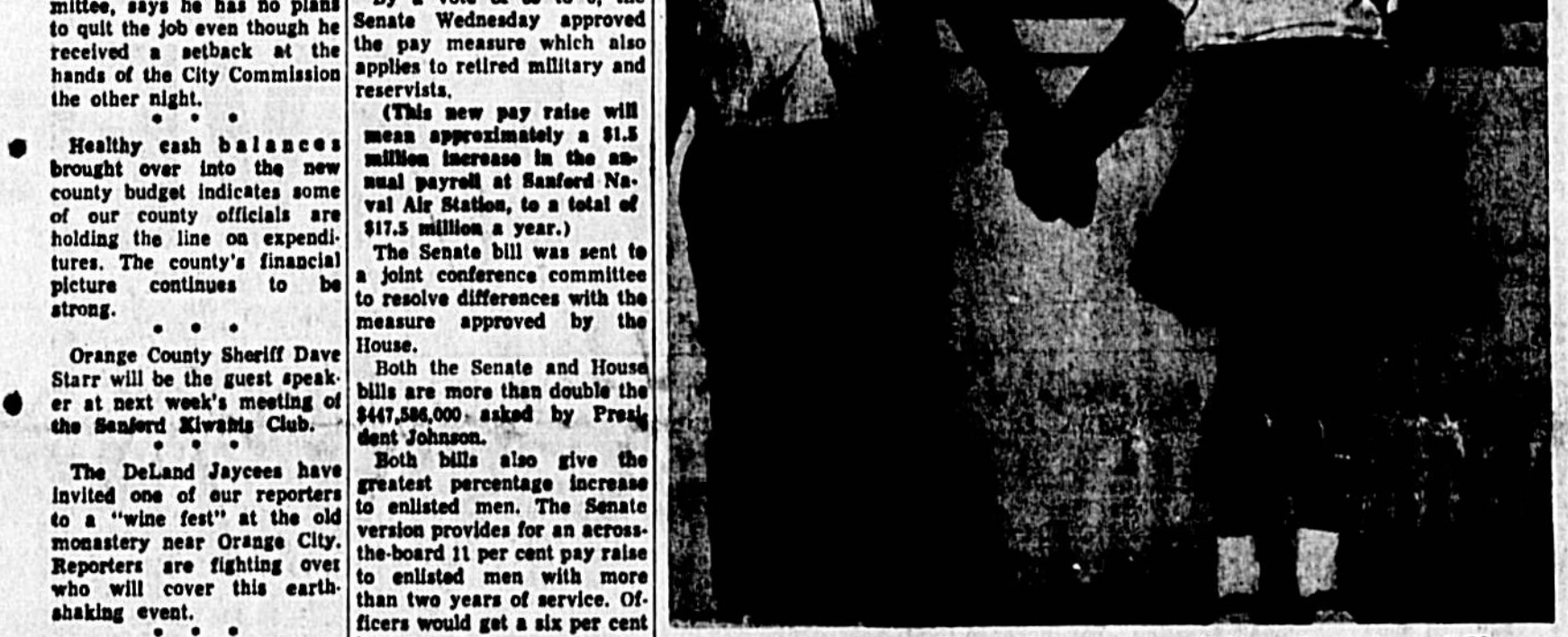
