ALHAMBRA, Calif. - Rodney King was convicted of running over his estranged wife but acquitted of battery and assault with a deadly weapon - the car.

King, 31, whose 1991 beating by Los Angeles police led to trials of four officers and rioting after their acquittals to state court, was ordered Thursday to return to court Aug. 6 for

Defense lawyer Edi M.O. Faal said he expects King to get fined, not jail time for the misdemeanor bit and run conviction.

Prosecutors argued that King's wife, Crystal, was injured after King tried to force her out of lus car during a light in July 1995. She testified she suffered arm and head injuries when King drove off as she reached back into the car to get her purse.

Faal argued that Mrs. King filed the charges in a bid to get money from King, who received a \$3.8 million settlement from Los Angeles to settle his beating case. Mrs. King denied the claim.

12-year sentence for stealing shoes

TAVARES, Fla. - Stealing two pairs of shoes has landed an 18-year-old repeat offender in prison for 12 years.

Eugene Isom, of Clermont, was given the harsh sentence Thursday after a judge said he ignored warnings to stay out of trouble.

"I warned him." Circuit Judge Jerry Lockett said shortly after a shaken isom was led out of the courtroom. "I told him he would go to prison for 12 years if he strayed

outside the law. Then, he and his friends stole the shoes." Isom was sentenced last year to 11 months, 29 days in the Lake County jail for burglary and joining three other teens in stealing 31 pistols, shotguns and rifles from a Groveland

He was given 12 years probation on the charge of armed burglary, on the condition that he stay off the police blotter. Police said the boys also broke into Groveland Elementary

School and Groveland Middle School, causing heavy damage and taking a stereo, two-way radios and other equipment.

Robaina demands return of hijacker

MEXICO CITY — Cuba is demanding the United States return a police officer who hijacked a plane at gunpoint and forced it to land at the U.S. naval base at Guantanamo Bay where he requested political asylum.

Cuban Foreign Minister Roberto Robaina said Thursday the return of Lt. Col. Jose Fernandez Pupo is required under a migration agreement signed in May 1995, when the United States was trying to cope with the aftermath of a flood of rafters from the island.

"In acts of this type, there cannot be mechanisms that indicate that if you do this, we will hand him over and if you don't, we will not hand him over because that would be vio-lating the migration agreements." Robaina told reporters in

Robaina's comments were carried by the Cuban government's Prensa Latina news agency and monitored in Mexico.

White House spokesman Mike McCurry said Monday the
United States had three options for Fernandez Pupo: return
him to Cuba, prosecute him in the United States or grant him

political asylum. U.S. officials said earlier this week they were questioning

Fernandez Pupo, who asked for political asylum after arriving at Guantanamo on Sunday. Using a gun, he diverted a domestic flight from Santiago in eastern Cuba to the base.

The plane later took off with the remaining 16 passengers

and crew and flew to its original destination. Guantanamo City, a few miles from the naval base.

Robaina said he thought U.S. officials were taking "a little long" to question Fernandes Pupo.

The 1995 migration agreement called for the United States to return Cubans who tilegally leave the island. In return, Cuba promised not to harass those who are handed back.

The two countries reached the agreement after tens of thousands of Cuban refugees tried to reach the United States by raft in 1994, prompting President Clinton to end a longstanding open-door policy.

Carolinas brace for Bertha

MYRTLE BEACH — Wind gusts topping 60 mph, heavy rain and high surf lashed the Carolinas today as Hurricane Bertha strengthened slightly and spun closer to land. The storm sent more than 250,000 residents and vacationers fleeing inland on

The eye of the 400-mile wide hurricane was expected to hit land around midday near Georgetown, just 25 miles from where Hurricane Hugo slammed ashore in 1989 with winds

The eastern Carolinas braced for widespread flooding as Bertha made its slow march north. Winds had been as high as 115 mph when the hurricane battered the Caribbean, killing six people. The wind weakened to 80 mph Thursday, but strengthened to 90 mph by this morning. Still, forecasters said

it should lose much of its punch over land.
"Once it gets over land, it'll probably just become a nor'easter," said Jerry Jarrell, deputy director of the National Hurricane Center in Miami.

He predicted Bertha would move toward Raleigh, N.C., on a path away from the coast, and be downgraded to a tropical depression over central Virginia by Saturday. It probably will dwindle to a rainstorm by the time it reaches cities in the Northeast, he said.

At 8 a.m., Bertha's eye was about 140 miles south of Wilmington, N.C., moving north at 10 mph, and hurricaneforce winds of at least 74 mph extended out 115 miles from the center. A gust of 64 mph was reported near Wilmington this morning and one of 58 mph at Myrtle Beach, the hurricane

Flooding posed the biggest problem today, with Bertha pushing storm surges of 6 to 8 feet above normal high tide.

Expenses from Bertha tallied

DAYTONA BEACH - Hurricane Bertha sent Florida neither rain nor wind, yet still managed to flood coastal towns in six counties - with red ink.

From the Georgia border south to Sebastian Inlet, city managers and police departments broke out the calculators Thursday to tally up all the overtime sheets. fuel vouchers and other expenses paid to let needed people work through a night-long evacuation ordered by Gov. Lawton Chiles.

Jacksonville Beach officials estimated the city spent about \$10,000 on overtime pay. standby pay, preparing city facilities for the hurricarie, and getting city records, such as computer tapes, ready to move to a secure facility, said Roy Paxson, assistant city manager.

But Paxson said the near-miss hurricane was a useful exercise. "We're relieved, but feel the training was invaluable," he said.

Chiles agreed. "We know being prepared saves lives," he said in a statement voicing relief that the hurricane had passed.

The tiny Flagler Beach Police Department spent about \$2,000 in overtime. All 10 officers worked double shifts.

Compared to the costs of municipalities. though. Bertha took a much bigger bite from hoteliers and other tourist-dependent businesses who suddenly lost all their customers Wednesday afternoon.

"It's a very expensive exercise." said Brian Lansberry, manager of the Casa del Mar hotel in Ormond Beach, who lost \$11,800 Wednesday night and could lose as much as \$21,000 if guests who checked out Wednesday don't return for the remainder of their stay. "That sort of kills the month right there.

Evelyn Fine, director of Mid-Florida Marketing and Research Inc., said Lansberry's plight is typical. "These people that left yesterday are probably not going to come back," she said.

Wednesday's losses totaled \$750,000 for beachside hotels in the Daytona Beach area. and about \$1.6 million for restaurants. shops and other businesses that depend on visitors. Fine said. July is third busiest month of the year for Daytona, she added.

"The only ones who benefited by it are Home Depot, Builders Square and grocery stores," said Barry Allen, manager of the

Tropical Winds Hotel.
Allen estimates he lost about \$6,000 Wednesday night when 70 guests checked out. He said he hopes to have 40 or 45 Thursday, but doesn't know how many

return. At the Sea Turtle Inn in Neptune Bea visitors checked out throughout the de Wednesday and two banquets had to a cancelled, said Kim Thompson, the directs of catering. An estimated 200 people would have eaten at those functions, she said.

Expensive as Wednesday's near-miss was though, it was a pittance compared to the costs of cleaning up and rebuilding had the storm hit.

State Division of Emergency Management spokeswoman Molly Payne said her agen-

cy's expenses were insignificant. 'It would be primarily overtime staffing. What becomes more costly is when we deploy a team of people into an area to perform a specific task, and we never reached that stage," Payne said.

For the Division of Emergency Management itself, those administrative costs of gearing up the center for day-and-night operation to monitor the hurricane's passage have been less than \$15,000, she said. That doesn't include the cost to individual counties that also activated their

Lansberry agreed that a false alarm, though costly, had its merits.

'It's better than the alternative," he said.

2 arrested in slaying of tourist

GATLINBURG, Tenn. - The silver 1989 Mercedes-Benz that brought death to the German tourist who drove it will be returned to Florida with a teen-ager accused in the vaca-tioner's murder. Covered in black fingerprint dust, the im-pounded car was readied Thursday for an 800-mile journey back to Fort Myers, as evidence in the Monday night's carjack-slaying of lawyer Gerd-Ulrich Ladwig, 50.

Alfred William Thomas Rhiner, 19, was arrested in the car two days ago in this Great Smoky Mountains tourist town. He waived extradition Thursday to face murder, grand auto theft. and robbery charges in Ladwig's

Before Rhiner left Florida, he took time to change, said Deputy Tim Hetz, spokesman for the Lee County Sheriff's office in Fort Myers. "He put on a suit so he could wear a suit to drive the Mercedes."

He was dressed differently Thursday - a T-shirt and baggy shorts accented by handcuffs

and leg shackles.

Officials with the Lee County
Sheriff's office refused comment
on this, the third violent death of
a foreign visitor in the Sunshine
State this year and the 13th
since 1992.

But they did issue a statement suggesting that Rhiner and an accomplier were motivated by the Mercedes to prey on Ladwig.

Rhiner admitted his involvement in the shooting and implicated another man, Jami Lee, 23, who was arrested Thursday at Lee's home in Alva. authorities said. Lee was charged with murder, auto theft and robbery.

Three indicted in lottery fraud case

MIAMI - In a novel scheme to launder drug

money, a Florida Lottery employee and two other men collected nearly \$500,000 by turning in winning tickets bought from South Florida lottery players, authorities said.

According to a federal indictment unsealed Thursday, Jose M. Dominguez, 37, Eric Arias, 65, and Carlos Tejas were involved in a scheme to buy winning tickets for more than they were worth. Though they took losses they worth. Though they took losses, they "legitimized" drug proceeds.

The ingenious scheme may be the first of its

kind in the nation.

"We're unaware of this having taken place anywhere else," Michael Sheehan, spokesman for U.S. Customs in Miami, said Thursday. "Any given state ... has a lottery and is susceptible to this type of crime."

State lottery officials agreed.
"I know of no major case resembling this," said

spokesman Ed George. "You can trust the lottery, but you can't trust the person on the street that wants to buy your winning ticket."

Dominguez was the lottery department's marketing representative for the Miami retail district and delivered tickets to area stores.

Arias and Dominguez were arrested early Thursday. Tejas, whose age was not available, was already behind bars on an unrelated drug

How did the trio find out who had winning tickets?

"You have a winning ticket cashed in at a retail store. Or you ask about what to do with the winning ticket. It is through that process that you find out 'Oh, we've got a big winner here,'" said Sheehan, whose agency spearheaded the months-long investigation.

The trio was charged with conspiracy and money laundering. If convicted, each man could spend 25 years and pay \$750,000 in fines.

In one case, a player bought a winning "Fantasy Pive" ticket in 1991 from the Western Union

store that Arias owned.







Minimum wage for inmates?

TALLAHASSEE - U.S. Sen. Bob Graham wants to follow up the Senate's bill to raise the minimum wage to \$5.15 with a measure of his own to make it clear that prison inmates aren't included

Florida inmates make 15 to 25 cents an hour, nowhere near minimum wage, but prisoners have tried to invoke the law in federal lawsuits, the Florida Democrat said in introducing the bill Thursday.

Florida Republican U.S. Sen. Connie Mack is among the cosponsors.

Graham said the bill, like a similar House measure by fellow Florida Democrat Karen Thurman and Republican U.S. Rep. Charles Canady, would "shut down what's become a flood of prisoner lawsuits attempting to get back pay and require minimum wage."

But a Miami attorney who filed a pending class-action lawsuit on behalf of Juan Gambetta and 550 other Florida state prison just a grab for minimum wages

"The knee-jerk reaction is to say what a horrible thing that inmates who are incarcerated should be paid a minimum wage. But bad laws have been written on knee-jerk reactions," said attorney Victor Diaz.

Lawauit plaintiffs didn't return a message for comment left with Diaz, and the attorney declined to give numbers or the locations of plaintiffs.

He said the lawsuit, pending before the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Atlanta, was aimed at preventing use of low-wage prison labor to com-pete unfairly with companies paying regular workers.

Seven federal appeals courts have ruled against similar lawsuits filed in other states, and the U.S. Supreme Court refused to review those rulings, said attorney Wilbur Bruton, who represented Florida's prison industries program, Pride of Florida.

The bill would also give businesses \$11 billion in tax breaks over eight years. A House version would offer \$7 billion in tax breaks. The differences must be worked out before the pro-posal can go to President Clin-

"That bill got so controversial and partisan we ... decided to introduce this as a freestanding bill to bring it to the attention of

Congress and the American public," said Graham.
The "Prisoner Minimum Waste

Prohibition Act" will go to Senate Judiciary Comm Senate Labor Committee, or both, he said.

In addition to Mack, co-spon-sors include Sens. Harry Reid, D-Nev.; Mike DeWine, R-Ohio; Byron Dorgan, D.N.D.; and Richard Bryan, D-Nev.



Air Force jet crashes into house; child dead, mom burned

PENSACOLA, Fla. - When Malissa Rodgers heard an airplane outside she knew it was too low and going to crash. A second later it plowed into a home across the street.

An Air Force 7-16 fighter plane trying to make an emergency landing at Pensacola Regional Alport slammed into the home Thursday, killing 4-year-old Sean Cannon and severely burning his mother, Robin Cannon, 31.

"The house exploded into a ball of fire and pieces of airplane scattered everywhere," Mrs. Rodgers said. Some of the debris landed on her lawn.

The pilot, Capt. Frederik G. Hartwig, 35, of St. Paul, Minn., ejected and landed in a tree a couple blocks from the wreckage. He was treated at Pensacola Naval Hospital and was in good condition, said Air

Force Mai, Jerry Ronne.
His Fighting Falcon was among 80 planes from the 20th
Fighter Wing flying from Shaw

Air Force Bese, S.C., to Eglin Air Force Base, about 50 miles east of Pensecola. Officials said the jets were being evacuated because of Hurricane Bertha.

Air Force officials said they were unsure why he was trying to land at Penascola Instead of

The dead boy's grandfather was angry that Hartwig was so far from the base.

"I don't know why he came in here over a populated area trying to land at a municipal airport when you're having engine trouble," Jim Cannon told The Miami Herald. "There's Eglin over yonder surrounded by a thousand miles of woods."

"If they don't court-martial that bastard, I'm going to kill him.'

The jet's single engine had failed 20 miles north of the air-

It came down in a tree-shaded neighborhood of nest brick ranch houses only a mile from the airport where five days earlier a mother and son were killed in an accident aboard a Delta Air Lines plane.

Mrs. Rodgers' husband, Thomas Rodgers, and a visiting friend, Charlie Parker, rushed across the street, broke a window and pulled Ms. Cannon from the burning house.

"My wife had tried to restrain her from going back into the house," said Jerry Struble, who lives two doors away. Barbrara Struble's clothing was stained with Ms. Cannon's blood. 'She just kept saying, 'I want

my baby, I want my baby.' The guys ran back to the house to see if they could get in, but it was well engulied by then," said Linda McDonald, who works two blocks away.

Yvonne Griffith was in her car at a stop sign when the jet plunged into the house a block away. When she went to help, she said she saw the child inside the house as it burned.

His mother was in critical condition with severe burns at the University of South Alabama Burn Center in Mobile after being flown there by helicopter, eaid Bernie Grappe, spoint for West Florida Regional ical Center in Peneacola.

Rescuing HIV infants from ACLU dogma

In recent years, several New York newspapers and magazines have reported the rage and hopelessness of women, many of them black and Latina, who have discovered for the first time that their very young children are infected with

"They should have told me," said one furious woman. "so I could have taken care of myself -and him."

These women were subject to the state's strict confidentiality law that was part of the epidemiological test of all infants to track the geographical spread of the infection leading to AIDS. If an infant tested positive for HIV, the results were not routinely given to the mother or her doctor because of discrimination against people with AIDS. The information shouldn't get out. But the results of tests for other diseases were revealed.

Every year, some 1,200 to 1,400 infants test positive in New York state. Seventy-five percent are simply carrying their infected mothers' antibodies and are not truly infected. But 25 percent are leaving the hospital without treatment; these children, their infection undisclosed, are prey to devastating opportunistic attacks on their immune systems.

And although the 75 percent are healthy when they get home, the mothers are infected, and in their lack of knowledge, they can infect the child

year, New York hospitals have been required to at least ask new mothers if they want to be told the test results. Of 18,150 mothers surveyed in the month of May, 11,200 never answered the question and 1.038 did not want to know. As the number of

dead and dying infants increased, a . t a t e assemblywoman. Nettie Mayersohn tried for three years to get a bill passed

requiring mandatory

testing of all newborns - with the results given to their mothers, who did not have to sign consent

Mayersohn is a Democrat, a feminist, and in 1989, the National Organization for Women

named her Legislator of the Year. Since she started to spread the word of these careless deaths. Mayersohn has been bitterly

opposed by the National Organization for Women, gay groups, AIDS activists, some medical organizations and the American Civil Liberties Union. They charge that mandatory testing of infants - which reveals the fact that the mothers are

infected - is a violation of privacy. Also, they say, forced testing would lead mothers to flee the health care system. There is no evidence of that, but there is growing evidence of mothers cursing the ignorance in which they were kept for their "protection."

The ACLU and others demand that mothers be counseled to take the test voluntarily. That approach has had only scattered success in New York's hospitals. Moreover, many poor women do not get to a hospital before giving birth. So they get no prenatal counseling of any kind at

At last, in June, Nettie Mayersohn's bill passed both houses and was signed by Gov. George Pataki. In the assembly, she was given a standing ovation.

Travelgate doesn't add

WASHINGTON - Highly confidential Justice Department documents on travelgate puncture a fanciful conspiracy theory that has been hurled by House Government Reform and Oversight Chairman William Clinger. R-Pa., and other Republican leaders.

The Justice Department's "prosecution memo," which prompted the indictment of former travel office chief Billy Dale, contains a treasure trove of evidence justifying charges of embezziement, a litary of incidents of travel office mismanagement - and not a tinge of proof that politics played a role in the decision to indict. Nevertheless, Dale has become a cause celebre among Republicans since being fired by the White House in 1993.

Clinger has charged the Clinton administratiin with launching a "political prosecution" of Dale. He also says the FBI was recruited by the White House to "harass" the travel office employees.

The prosecution memo even presages Daie's defense: "Dale will probably make the big-picture argument that this prosecution is simply an effort by the Clinton administration to avoid further embarrassment."

The allegations defame hundreds of career FBI agents and prosecutors -- as well as grand jurors and the judge who ruled on the evidence presented to the jury. If provable, however, it may represent an impeachable offense. So where's the GOP's smoking gun? Clinger and House Speaker Newt Gingrich

are strangely reticent to respond.

Clinger spokesman Ed Amorosi breezily offered one conspiracy theory. "There's implicit pressure, it doesn't have to be explicit." Amorosi told us. "I think documenting evidence of a grand conspiracy probably can't be done. But anyone familiar with the Justice Department knows that a prosecutor has a fair amount of discretion about which cases to bring to trial.

Amorosi said Clinger refuses to approve the release of the prosecution memo because of the amount of "unsubstantiated material" against Dale and the fact some of it is "thin."

Dale's attorney, Steven Tabackman, strikes a more Freudian note.

'The political context of this case affected the quality of the assessment of the evidence, whether consciously or subconsciously," he told us. A former federal prosecutor, Tabackman added: "Had I been putting this case together. I know I would have felt the pressures to go forward. I think there was too much riding on it. ... I'm not talking about direct, overt political pressure. I would be very surprised if there was a phone call (from the White House to Justice)."

Release of the prosecution memo, which outlines the government's evidence, has been flercely resisted by Justice and Clinger, who has demanded public disclosure of thousands of other documents relating to the travel office.

The August 1994 memo, which we have obtained, weighs all the evidence and shows how career law enforcement officials tirelessly tracked down every last deposit and disbursement, both in the travel office and the Dale household. Justice's Indictment Review Committee recommended unanimously that

the proposed indictment be approved by Lee J. Radek, chief of Justice's public in-tegrity section.

"The trial team ... has concluded that despite (Dale's) defenses, the only reasonable explana-tion for the evidence is that Dale was stealing money," a related Justice Department memo reads. "There is, at bottom, no legitimate business reason for Dale's transactions. ... Moreover, a cash

the funds that Dale was stealing. Tabackman notes how swiftly a federal jury acquitted Dale of charges he embezzled \$68,000 from a fund to which news organizations contributed in order to cover expenses incurred while traveling with the president. However, in 1994 Dale offered to plead guilty to one count of embezzlement. pays a fine and serve no more than 60 days in jail. The Justice Department rejected the deal, which Tabackman told us would have included an "apology" but no acknowledgement that Dale stole money.

Dale didn't share his alibis with the FBI, which might have forestailed an indictment

which might have forestalled an indictment. because Dale's camp (before Tabackman entered the case) decided it "would have better luck springing the explanation on us and the jury at the same time," according to a DOJ

Tabackman argues that Dale innocently co-mingled the travel office funds with his own money over the years in a "good-faith, but disastrous decision."

The White House made its own disastrous decision when it summarily fired seven longtime employees of the travel office at the behest of Clinton cronies who wanted a piece of the travel office operation. But the Justice Department's own documents hardly flesh out the dark political plots that White House enemies have alleged.

Everett Koop -who served two Republican presidents as surgeon general and oversaw a landmark study on the subject of addiction -- said that Dole had "either exposed his abysmal lack of knowledge of nicotine addiction, or his blind support of the tobacco industry." The Democrats quickly devised a "Butt Man" costume from wire mesh and canvas and began dogging the famously thin-skinned Dole at every campaign appearance.

After three weeks, the GOP candidate was fully primed and ready to blow. On NBC's "Today Show," Katie Couric asked him about his support of the tobacco industry. Well, Dole groused, they have a right to participate in the political process. "As far as know, they're in a legal business."

WASHINGTON - Of course President Clinton is playing maximum politics with the minimum wage increase. And Bob Dole tried to, too, after lodging that catchy complaint against Clinton.

But this one is a Democratic issue, a nagging headache for leaders of the Republican Congress, particularly for Dole be-fore he left the Senate.

Indeed, the legislative pileup produced when Democrats held everything else hostage to the minimum wage increase was a major barrier to Dole's original campaign plan of running for president as the Senate majority leader who could get things

It became an issue that galvanized Democrats in the Senate, and shored up the once-shaky alliance between Clinton and their congressional minority. But for Republican divisions, it wouldn't have passed, probably wouldn't have come to a vote at all.

He did endorse an increase, on May 24, a day after the House approved its bill overwhelmingly. "I think there should be an increase in the minimum wage," he said in the Senate.

But he came to that point grudgingly, and making an issue of it now is at best a curious campaign tactic. Still, the Dole camp tried. "Bill Clinton is playing maximum politics with the minimum wage," Dole's spokesman. Nelson Warfield. said. He said Clinton "should know full well" that Dole is on record for an increase, then pointed to Clinton's "ellence on this issue" during his first two years in office.

Clinton said it was Dole, not he, who opposed an increase, and any implication to the con-trary is simply false.

He said if Dole changed positions to support it, that's good.
"I hope he will say so, and urge the leadership in the Senate and the House of his party to send me the bill right away." Clinton said.

"As a result, trials become but one incidental step along a path of ever changing facts and cap-ital defendants spend an inces-sant amount of time on death row without a final adjudication of their cases," Wells wrote.

In a footnote, he pointed out that death row inmates are kept in cells that are 6 feet by 9 feet with a ceiling just 9% feet high and let out to exercise only four

ours every week.

Bomb rips through bus

MOSCOW — A bomb ripped through a Moscow bus during morning rush hour today, the second such attack in two days. Twenty-seven people were injured, eight of them seriously, police said.

President Boris Yeltsin and Moscow Mayor Yuri Luzhkov blamed terrorists and promised tough measures. Police closed all main roads in and out of the city and blanketed its subway system and bus stations.

Bus No. 48 was headed for the city center when the bomb exploded at 8:20 a.m. near the Rizhaky Bridge in northeastern Moscow, about 5 miles from the Kremlin.

The front of the bus was demotished, and blood and broken glass littered the street and sidewalks. Police spokesman Alexander Cheredishov said 27 people were injured. An earlier police report that a passenger was killed was incorrect, he said.

Cops shot, wounded

BELFAST, Northern Ireland — Three policemen were shot and slightly wounded in Catholic neighborhoods in north Belfast early today after days of Protestant riots leading up to province-wide marches commemorating 17th century battles.

They were the first police officers shot in Northern Ireland since 1994, when the Irish Republican Army began a 17-month cease-fire in its campaign against British rule. There was no indication who fired the shots.

The Royal Ulater Constabulary said two officers were shot in the Ardoyne neighborhood about 1:45 a.m. during clashes with youthe hijacking vehicles and throwing gasoline bombs. One was hit in the ankle, the other in the hand.

A third officer was shot in the arm 15 minutes later in nearby New Lodge Road, another Catholic stronghold.

WASHINGTON - A scoop of ice cream, a pint of milk and the bacon and bread for a BLT are all costing more these days because of hot, dry weather and short grain supplies.

That ien't supposed to happen: Farm prices usually have little to do with store prices.

But that was before record grain shortages, fueled by strong exports and a streak of bad weather in the Midwest, raised the index of farm prices a record 19 percent from last June.

Milk production has ebbed because of heat, high feed costs and a lack of good hay — and a gallon of 2 percent milk that cost \$2 last year is now closer to \$3 in some markets.

Despite his repeated efforts to block the separation of welfare and Medicaid, Dole suggested in a letter to Clinton that the new GOP strategy was his idea.

"In an effort to continue moving this critical issue forward, I have today asked Speaker (Newt) Gingrich and Majority Leader (Trent) Lott to pass a sweeping welfare reform bill for the third time in eight months," Dole wrote.

Later, Gingrich and Senate Republican leaders told reporters they had hoped to keep welfare and Medicaid reform linked, but were bowing to political realities.

Clinton agrees with most of what the Republicans are trying to do with welfare - turning it into a time-limited, jobe-oriented program.

But he opposes turning Medicaid into a block grant program with eligibility and benefit decisions made by governors. Most Republicans favor that.

Dole has repeatedly fought efforts to separate Medicald and welfare - back when he was Senate majority leader and since leaving the Senate to campaign.

When the idea of passing just welfare overhaul surfaced a few weeks ago, the Dole campaign was instrumental in getting Republican governors to write Lott and Gingrich opposing any bill that did not also turn Med-icaid into block grants.

Agreement reached: New York budget

ALBANY, N.Y. - After a record 101 days without a budget. tired state leaders and Gov. George Pataki reached final agreement Thursday on a \$66 billion plan that adds \$1.4 billion to what Pataki proposed in December.

New York has been without a budget since April 1. It is believed to be the longest delay ever for any state, according to the National Conference of State Legislatures.

"It was worth the wait and worth the fight," the Republican governor said.

Lawmakers planned to vote on individual bills late Thursday and complete passage by Friday.

The budget rejects many of Pataki's initiatives, particularly to cut social services, but gives him the reform of a workers' compensation system for which he fought bitterly.

The budget also instituted \$83 million in business tax cuts, increased funding for schools and expanded prisons and highway construction.

I think it's a compromise that works well for all of the interested parties and the people of this state," said Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver, a Manhattan Democrat.

Builders' continuing classes offered

Aug. 31 may seem far off, but this important date is just around the corner for building contractors. It is the deadline for license renewal and many are scrambling to get required continuing education hours prior to the deadline. While many classes are being offered to meet the State's re-

quirement for continuing education, builders have difficulty leaving a job for extended periods of time. Some find it inconvenient to be out of town to attend classes.

Now, builders can renew their license by taking classes locally thanks to a new University of Florida course called, 'Build Green and Profit'. cludes 6 modules, 2 credit hours each, which teach construction techniques incorporating energy and environmentally efficient practices. These programs will provide participants with an understanding of how the construction process and the selection of materials used for construction can be designed to minimize negative environmental impacts and help conserve natural resources.

"Construction Operations to Reduce Environmental Impact" and "Green Materials" are two of the modules which promote these concepts. Consumers are looking for businesses which are "earth friendly", so building green is fast becoming a profliable marketing tool for the construction industry. This is explored in the module "Green

and Profitable Marketing". Other modules in the series include "Siting and Passive Design Features", "Energy and Water Conservation" and "Indoor **Environmental Quality"**

Husband's behavior pushes limit

DEAR DR. GOTT: My husband of over 20 years suddenly told me he can't live with me any more. Six months ago he moved out, he's changed his way of dressing and his hair style. He swears that he doesn't feel he's getting old and he blames me because I'm trying to make him old. He appears confused, depressed, ner-yous, tired and moody. He seems to have lost all of his stability. Financial support has been there, but normal everyday problems are being left up to me with our five teen agers at our home. Could be be going through a mid-life crisis or could be have a hormonal imbalance? I feel as if I'm going out of my mind and I need help.

DEAR READER: Your husband is not experiencing the usual type of mid-life crisis or hormonal imbalance. I'm concerned that he may be suffering from a serious emotional disorder, such as depression - or he may be dieverly manipulating you so that you'll want to end the marriage. More about that later.

Many men in their 40s suddenly realize that they're getting older. They don't like this, so they try to compensate by changing hair and dressing styles, picking a younger "new cook-ie," buying a sports car, and generally behaving as though they were in their teens and 20s. They incorrectly believe that they can halt the aging process tand gain longed for youth; by attempting to turn back the clock.

However, confusion, nervousness. instability and moodiness are usually not factors that are associated with the syndrome Similarly, so called "hormonal imbalances" (meaning diminished sexual ability) may cause partic and behavioral changes -- but not the emotional changes you describe.

Thus, there may be something else going on here. For example, your husbend may be inappropriately trying to deal with depression, or he may be suffering from early dementia that can cause inappropriate behavior. He should see a doctor for a complete examination and testing, such as blood analyses and a CT scan of his head, to rule out a treatable disorder.

On the other hand, he may be giving you a message that the marriage is over, for whatever reason. He could be consciously adopting a lifestyle and attitude that he knows full well will antagonize you and force you into divorcing him. He may already have a new, younger "friend."

No matter what the cause is for his obvious changes, professional help is mandatory. As I mentioned, medical evaluation is in order - or you might consider marriage counseling, if he will agree to it. Regardless of his mental state, you and the children have to tend to your own needs.

Get a good lawyer to protect your interests. Try to persuade your hus-hand to seek professional attention. Get your own house in order so that if

the situation completely deteriorates, you'll be protected.

To maintain your own balance, you should see a psychologist or psychia-trist. In this way, you'll be able to cope with the difficult situation and maintain your perspective. In short, get help - even if he won't. You owe it to yourself and your children.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Please discuss the skin allergy urticaria.


DEAR READER: The term urticaria refers to hives, allergic reactions in the skin caused by a wide variety of possible factors, ranging from pollen to drug sensitivity. In some people with urticaria, no cause can be discovered. The lesions itch

and have a characteristic appearance. Treatment includes cold compress es and oral anti-histamines, such as Claritin.

The condition is not harmful, for the most part, but the hives can be maddening. If the problem recurs, an allergist should be consulted and allergy tests performed.

Don't feer the worst

When you play in a team tournament. you and your partner sit, say, North-South at one table, while your teammates are East-West at the other table. It is the purest form of bridge, with the luck element as low as possible.

In today's deal, South, despite having only two leaves, decided to open

with one club. He wasn't too pleased when it was passed out! He was even less happy when he found that six clubs was laydown. Plus 170 looked like either als international matchpoints (IMPs) away if the opponents stopped in five clubs, or 13 IMPs out if they reached six clubs. No profit was possible.

At the other table. South did the normal thing, opening two clubs, strong, artificial and forcing. A moment later,

he was in six clubs


West led the heart nine. After winning with the ace, South drew trumps in two rounds. Now, though, instead of continuing with three rounds of spades. South led his club four to dummy's eight. Then he ran the spade jack. Happily, West won with the queen and cashed the diamond ace: one down. So, instead of losing IMPs,

our "heroes" won six!

South misplayed six clubs. His line gains only when West has specifically nine-doubleton of spades. Ruffing works whenever spades are 3-3 (or East has the doubleton nine-seven and South somehow guesses it). This is five-and a half times more likely.

The natural reaction after a bad result is to try to get the points back on the next deal. This usually results in more IMPs being lost. Fear the best, not the worst.
