ATLANTA, Ga., July 16.—Apparently Uncle Sam believes that it pays to play for he is spending \$4,000,000 for additional athletic and recreational equipment to be used by soldiers overseas and in continental United States. It was disclosed by Colonel Laurence W. Young, Chief of the Special Service Branch, Fourth Service Command.

Why I Swear

After 2 Years In Greenland, Florida Weather Is Fine

CAMP BEANING, Fla., July 19.—Any soldier who feels like snubbing on his top kick's shoulder over the hot weather worries of an army camp or for that matter any civilian who looks upon food and gasoline rationing as unbearable hardships would do well to take a lesson from six new members of an ordnance company at Camp Beaning, who have just returned to this country after two solid years in Greenland. These men, part of the first American Expeditionary Force to occupy Greenland, are Sgt. Joseph W. Balmowski, 112 Swarth Road, Shenandoah Heights, Pa.; Sgt. Len Fowler Jr., 606 Henry St., Louisville, Va.; Sgt. Robert H. Mahon, 115 Joseph St., North Madison, S.D.; Sgt. Richard H. Hoyt, Grovesville, N.Y.; Pvt. Thomas L. Abel, 3014 Fourth Ave., Brooklyn, N.Y.; and Pvt. Clarence E. Beck, Route 1, Har-

ton, Ky. Greenland was pretty lonely, all six agreed. "We didn't see a white woman for the whole two years," said Hoyt. "It sure was wonderful to get back to America." The only people they ever saw, except fellow soldiers, were occasional Eskimos, who traded skins and walrus ivory for candy and cigarettes. Mail took three months to reach them, when it did arrive. The weather was cold and windy the year around, gales of 70 miles an hour frequently blowing down tents and scattering equipment. The intense cold required many changes in equipment and in the usual methods of maintenance. Guns needed a special oil to keep the parts from freezing, while automobile batteries and other parts had to have especially careful handling to keep them functioning. Greenland can run a vehicle faster than any place I have ever seen in my three years in the army," Fowler said.
