

\$10 Million Voc-Ed Program Readied For Legislature

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Education officials are preparing a \$10 million vocational education program for the Legislature, but Gov. Claude Kirk says guidelines should be established before the money is granted.

Education side Bill Maloy said the governor will propose to the Legislature that it be the line on new education spending and instead fund a \$10,000 study that would include guidelines for a statewide job preparation program.

"It's just a difference in priorities," Maloy said.

Education Commissioner Floyd Christian and State Rep. Kenneth "Buddy" MackKay, D-Ocala, who is working on the vocational education package, were reluctant to discuss the possibility of conflict with the governor.

Christian said the package will be aimed at immediate education problems.

"We can just talk about it until we're blue in the face, but you've got to have programs and you've got to have money," Christian said.

Maloy said he can understand any apprehensions that Christian and MackKay, chairman of a House Committee on Vocational Education, may have about Kirk's proposal for a study.

"They may feel that we're just playing around not wanting to spend any money on it," Maloy said. "What we're really saying is if we're going to spend money, let's do it wisely."

The package of bills being prepared by the department and the House committee calls for two appropriations: \$10 million to upgrade vocational education equipment and \$600,000 to train vocational counselors in education colleges.

Also in the package are bills to establish a new formula for financing vocational education and a definition of the term to allow expansion of job preparation programs into junior high and elementary schools.

Cecil Golden, associate education commissioner for planning and coordination, said the \$10 million appropriation would enable local school systems to upgrade their programs by purchasing costly equipment.

Golden said equipment in some vocational education fields must be upgraded every year.

"It's not like where you get an algebra book and use it for five years because algebra stays the same," Golden said.

MackKay said his committee learned there is a serious shortage of vocational counseling and the counseling bill would be a major start toward training new ones.

"The vast majority of the counselors have got to be prepared in comprehensive counseling," MackKay said.

Maloy said it is the governor's position the new formula for vocational education should not be created and new funds should not be poured into counseling and equipment until an overall direction for job preparation programs has been determined.

"I think the thing we're saying is in the long run you have to be more specific about what you want these things to do," Maloy said. "Whether you want to put more money into a formula, more money into counseling that hasn't done the job up to this time."

"You have to get in there and do the dirty work and say if we're going to get to this point we're going to have to do it by about 25 per cent," Christian said. "This is the most critical age of the package is to make vocational education available where it is most needed."

"It will enable us to have more money to generate new programs at the junior high level," Christian added.

He indicated in January he would include a "job ready" program for all school children in his budget, but he was informed by state education officials such a program would cost around \$80 million.



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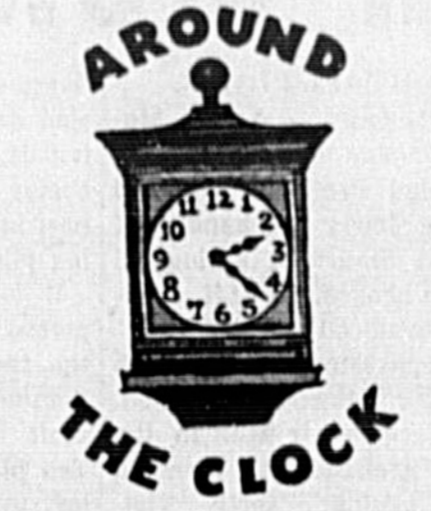
'Lost' Property Owners Sought By State Aide

Comptroller Fred O. Dickinson Jr. has announced that during the period of March 11-March 25 his office is attempting to locate some 1,100 persons who are owners of abandoned property. One method of locating the "missing owners" is by publishing their names in 45 newspapers in Florida. If an address has been furnished, the comptroller's office also directs a mailed notice to that address.

Dickinson states that relatives, former neighbors and friends of persons sought have been helpful in efforts to trace these elusive people. "Since 1962, as a result of the Abandoned Property Act, more than one-half million dollars has been restored to the control of legitimate claimants," the comptroller noted.

Should owners not be located, their funds are deposited in the State School Fund, earnings of which are distributed to the various school systems of Florida.

The principal amount continues to earn interest from investments but is available to a qualified claimant at any time he can prove his right to the property.

Inflation Comes To City

Sanford Caught In Bind

Sanford City Commission last night fell victim to one of its own devices and the result will be an extra cost to the city taxpayer of \$4.26 per running foot to pave 400 feet of Elm Street, located off 25th Street.

The situation came about when a group of Elm Street residents, led by Rev. Robert G. Welch, of the Church of God of Prophecy, which is located on the street, appeared before the Commission to request the paving of the street on an arrangement whereby the city pays one third, and property owners on both sides of the street pay the remaining two-thirds at one-third each.

This would have worked out alright had not the price quoted the church group been a 1966 price of \$2.17 per running foot instead of the new inflated estimate of \$11.70 a square foot.

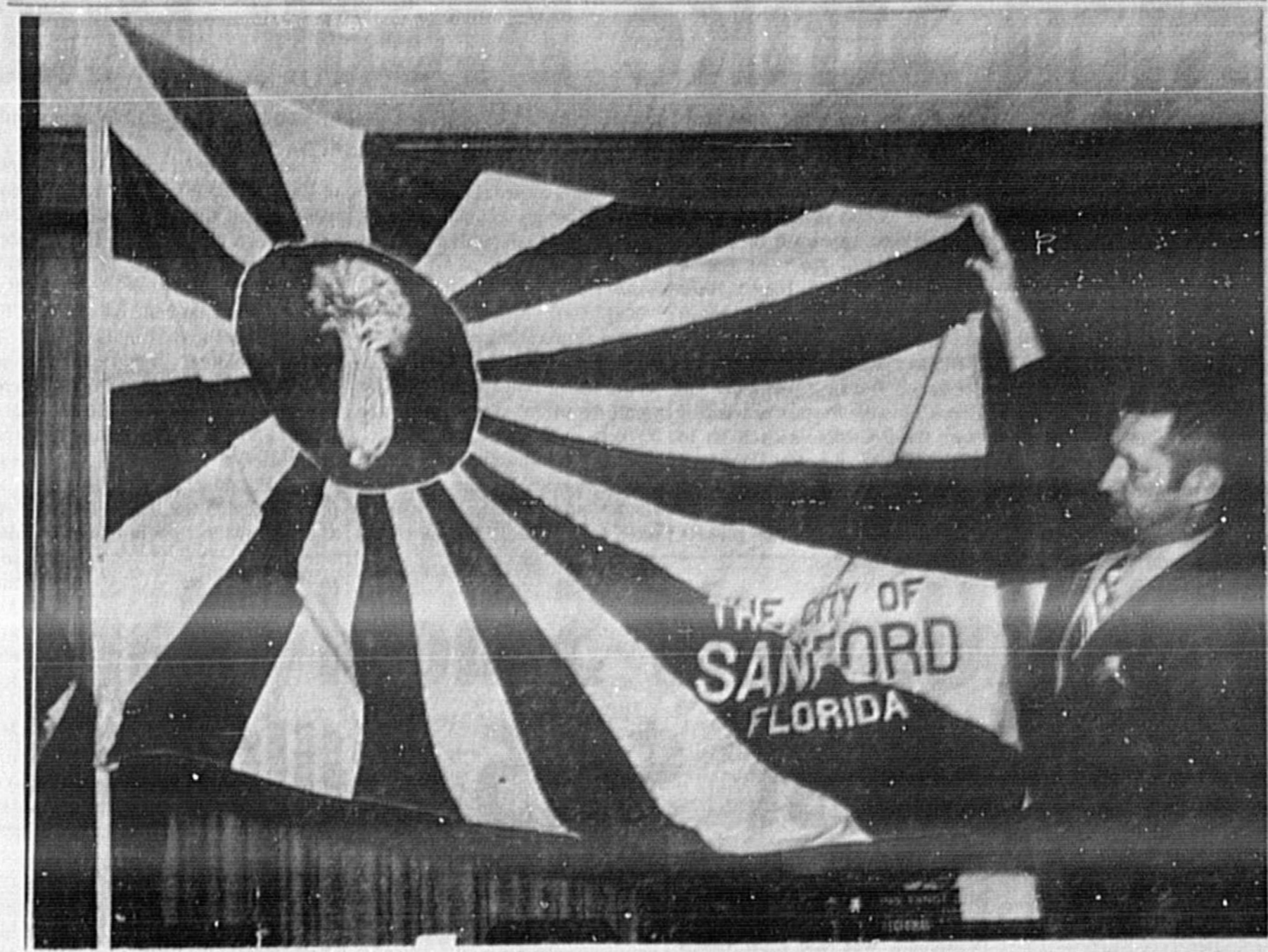
Rev. Welch presented a check to City Manager W. E. Knowles before last night's meeting for the property owners share of the cost of approximately \$1,736, leaving the city to pay the remaining \$4,944 of the total paving costs.

Still further complications could arise over the paving of the north-south streets in the city's Georgetown section by those property owners living adjacent to the affected streets.

Costs to these property owners who have volunteered to assist themselves via the city tax rolls will be the current price of \$11.70 per running square foot over a five-year period.

An amendment was offered to the motion to bring the future figures up to current costs, but because of the over-sight the city will have to honor the low \$2.17 price for the Elm Street project.

The Georgetown paving project is to be presented at a public hearing on those affected property owners at an April 27 public hearing since the residents of that area are referring a tax lien on their property until they have paid the costs at \$11.70 figure.

City-CAP Hassle Simmers

The long simmering hassle between the Seminole Composite Squadron of Civil Air Patrol and the Sanford Airport over the use of one of the airport buildings by the group came to a boil, then cooled off during last night's Sanford City Commission meeting.

Appearing with a number of the air group was Don Knight, squadron commander, as spokesman in seeking commission help in keeping Building 17 at the airport for its headquarters.

Knight said City Manager W. E. Knowles had given the group until April 1 to vacate the structure which it has occupied since receiving permission from Don Rathel, Sanford Industrial Commission director, upon the city receiving right of entry to the former Navy base nearly a year ago.

In a Feb. 20 letter to Knight, Knowles requested that Knight furnish written evidence of corrective steps taken by his group to maintain the building in a proper manner.

Knowles, in a memo to commissioners, said, "The airport manager talked with the CAP personnel on several occasions regarding taking care of the building and their personnel; there was no cooperation forthcoming. CAP personnel violated the regulation by driving on the runways and taxiways."

In another item, commission approved hiring of Gerald Dake Planning Consultants of Jacksonville to do urban renewal survey work in preparing a request to the federal government for funds at a cost to city of \$1,250.

In other actions, the commission:

Asked Mrs. Glenn L. Edmondson to write E. Pave a set of legislative delegation letter seeking help in the way of a special lease law to control the roaming dogs in the city.

Approved first reading of an ordinance to rebuke the tank farm area north of Fulton Street between French Avenue and Myrtle Avenue from M-1 industrial to C-2 commercial over the request of J. Edwin

Shinholster, attorney for Realty Trust Company, owner of property in the area, who asked that "tank farm" operators be given a chance to work out their problems with the city.

Ordinance will become law after second reading scheduled for April 13 commission meeting.

Commissioner Thomas McDonald warned Knight his group would be "kicked off" if it continues in the future to do those things that caused the confrontation.

City Eyes CATV Contract

A workshop is set for 7:30 p.m. March 30 by the Sanford City Commission to deal with the four proposals received by city from community antenna television firms.

Commissioner Gordon Meyer moved to set the special session after the matter was presented on last night's city commission agenda. Because of the importance of the proposals, Meyer felt the matter deserved consultations from each of the city's commission members in a bid fashion.

Commissioner Thomas McDonald agreed and suggested that each bidder have a private audience with the commission in an interval of 20 minutes each and that a decision be made after hearing each firm.

This proposal received unanimous approval.

Seminole Commissioners have discussed passage of similar ordinances to discourage the rock festivals here but, thus far, no action has been undertaken.

In past state festivals there have been narcotics sold and several fights among persons attending the session that usually last around the clock but no festivals have been promoted in Seminole County thus far.

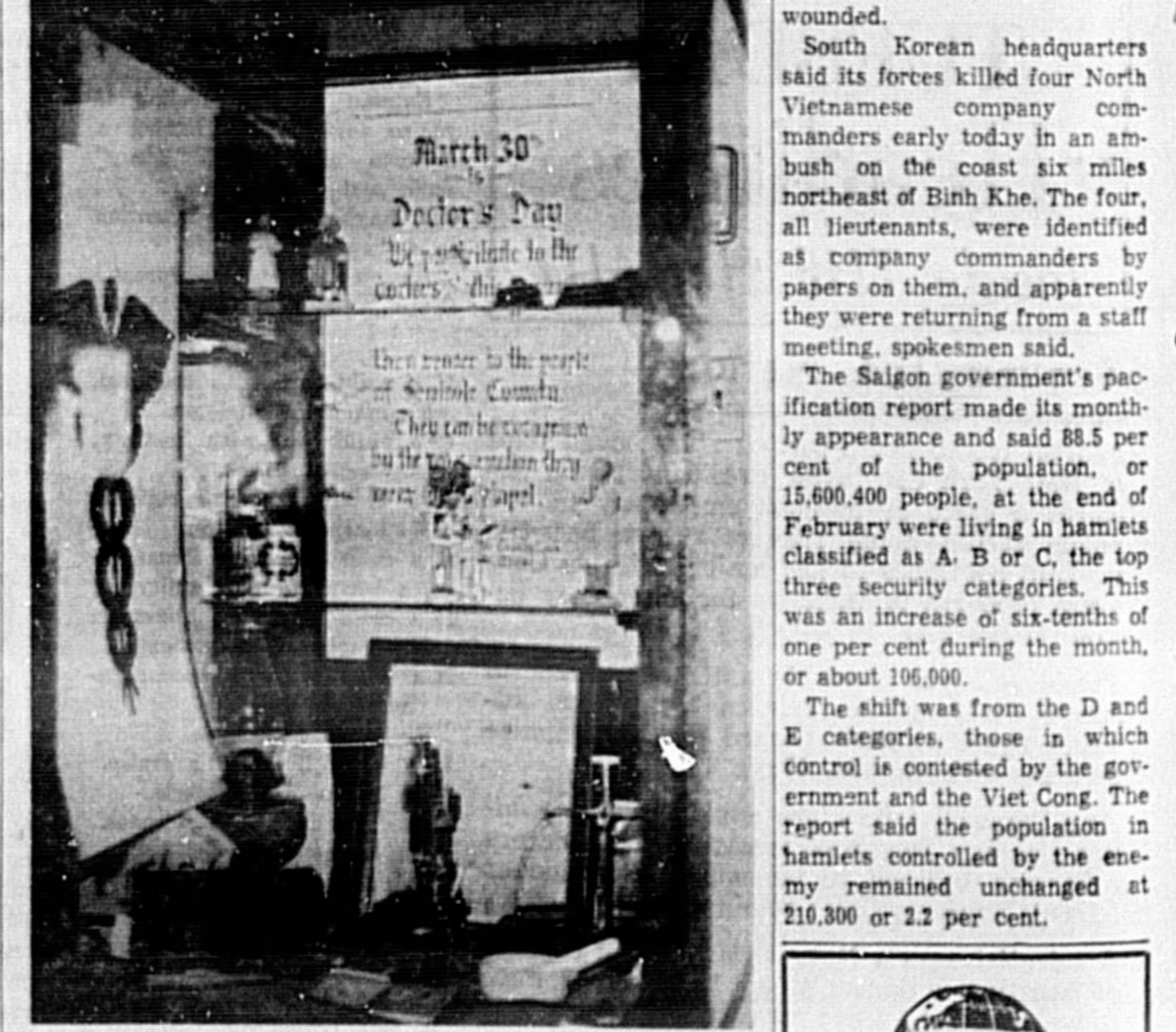

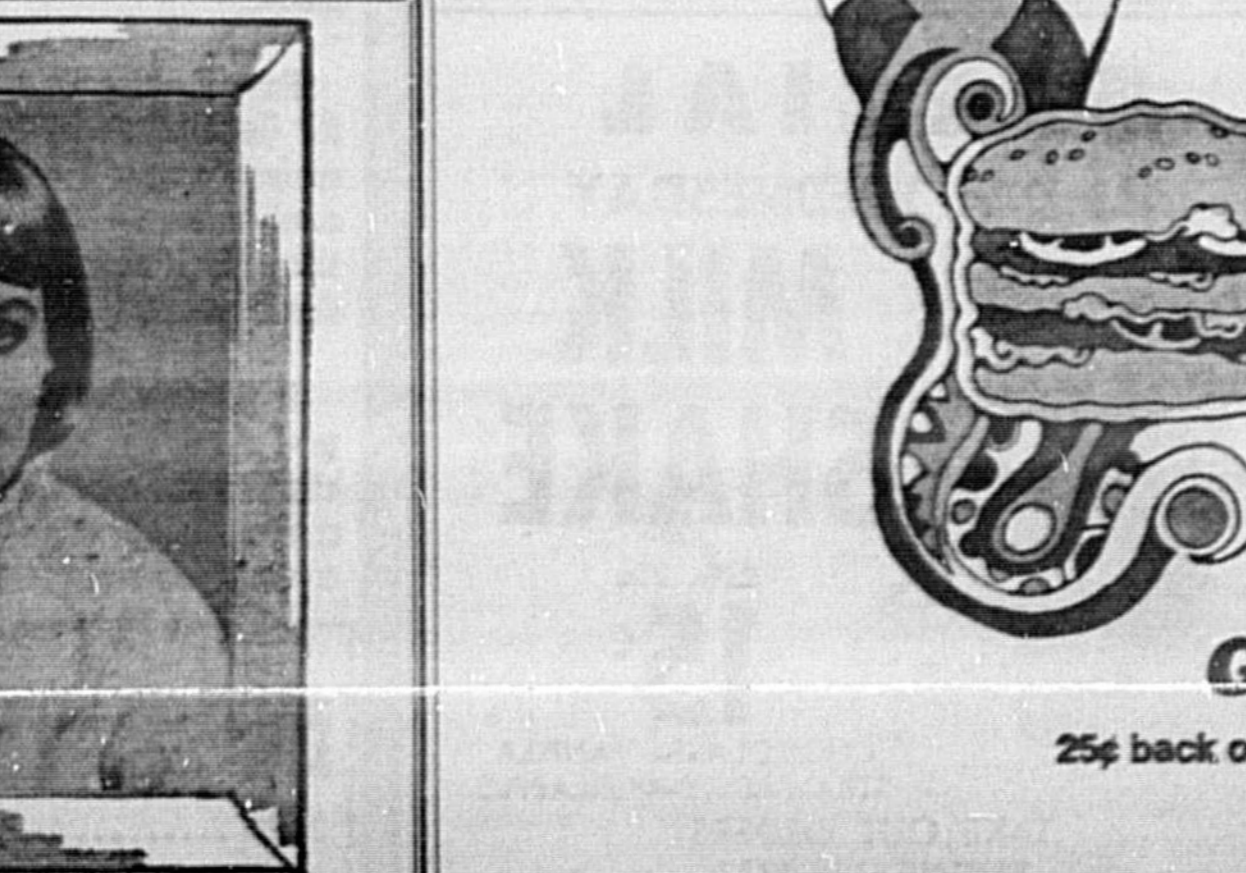

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Inflation Better Than Recession, Nixon Opines

NEW YORK (AP)—Inflation is expected to cut in half the already slim projected budget surplus for 1971, a surplus the President had said he counted on to slow inflation.

What happened to bring about the change? If the battle against inflation had been won, the move would be more understandable. But it hasn't. Inflation is somewhere between 6 and 8 per cent.

Some support for the President's action comes from a review of economic statistics.

"I believe the action is in the long-range interests of better education and improved health care," the President told the American people as he sat before the television cameras.

"But most important," he added, "I believe that this action that I have just taken is in the vital interests of all Americans in stopping the rise in the cost of living."

In mid-March the President's economic stability program more than a year ago he warned the American people not to expect him to release grip on the economy until inflation also had been conquered.

In order to root out inflation, it is generally agreed, some

produces so many short-range problems that it might take an utterly insensitive or daring administration to bring it off.

Critics of the administration are now chuckling aloud that they know it all the time, asserting that Nixon's determination was made up mainly of rhetoric and when the kitchen really got hot he would turn on the air conditioning.

County Splits In Road Race

Seminole County Commissioners John Alexander and Greg Drummond, who attended a meeting yesterday in Tallahassee, announced that the designation was made by the state Department of Transportation (DOT) to a joint House and Senate sub-committee on transportation on road needs in the Central Florida area for the next 20 years, returning both favored and discouraged by the action taken by the committee.

On the plus side, Drummond stated that Red Bug Road has been taken into the state road program and will be extended to carry traffic to Florida Technological University, Maitland Boulevard from U.S. 17-92 diagonally to Red Bug Road. Red Bug Road has been designated as a primary road in Seminole county. In Orange county where Maitland Boulevard has been designated in the five-year road program but Orange county must pay for construction of secondary road funds as well as paying for the right of way also from secondary road funds. Thus Seminole county has emerged the victor over Orange county with the designation of this section as a primary road. Drummond

continued that SR 434 has been designated as a four-lane road from I-4 to SR 427.

On the negative side, Drummond stated that the inter-county belt-line in the western loop from the 20-year program. I-4 south to Orange county is in the five-year road program as a state road with 90 per cent federal funding and 10 per cent state funding as a primary road. In the eastern loop in Seminole county which will be in the 20-year program the county will provide the road.

Drummond further stated that west SR 46 four-lane County

has been temporarily shelved due to Lake County not wishing to designate four lanes at this time.

Wetiva Springs Road has been designated as a county road in the 20-year program. The road will run diagonally from the Lake Mary interchange southwest past Wetiva Springs to Orange County. A limited access road to improve traffic will run north. Further, an extension of Bear Lake Road to Wetiva Springs in the 20-year program.

HEW Answers Schools

Latest action in the continuing confrontation between the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) and the Seminole County District School Board over occurred yesterday when the HEW replied to exceptions made by Douglas Stenstrom, school attorney, to the Review Board in trying to save \$683,000 in federal funds due to be cut from two of county's six federal programs.

John L. Wodatch, HEW attorney, said the citing by Stenstrom of the Orange County federal court decision allowing all Negro schools could not be applied to Seminole county since the particulars were of a different type.

Wodatch accused Seminole County of operating a dual school system. HEW said black and white pupils, and said since the federal government neither created nor perpetuated the dual school system in Seminole County, it should not be held financially responsible for its operations.
