

Salm Granted Separation And Wife Secures Divorce In Paris Tribunal

PARIS, Apr. 12.—(INS)—(Count Ludwig Salm von Hoogstetren and his American heiress bride, the former Millicent Rogers, have been both divorced and legally separated by the French courts, it was learned by International News Service today.

Two decrees were handed down in the Seine Tribunal on Monday. One of them granted a divorce to the countess; the other granted a legal separation to the count. Little Peter, son of the couple, is in the custody of the wife.

The countess and her mother have been living here temporarily for the divorce proceedings, occupying a luxurious apartment. Count Salm has been living at an obscure hotel.

Separation proceedings had been commenced in New York last year, but were withdrawn, the withdrawal being followed by reports of a settlement in which the Austrian nobleman was said to have received about \$400,000 from H. H. Rogers, Standard Oil magnate and father of the countess.

Count Salm had no difficulty in backing up his charge of desertion

with proof that his wife had refused to return to him or live with him. In view of the absolute proof offered by both sides the court had no alternative but to grant the demands of both parties.

The Countess was gleeful over the outcome of the litigation.

"The best part of it all is that I get the custody of my boy, Peter," she declared in an interview with International News Service. "The agreement was that the Count should see Peter every three months so if the court allows 'this private agreement' to stand it means that I will have my boy."

The wish of the Countess was gratified for the court's judgment was that the agreement between the two parties, dated Feb. 27, 1927, settled the question of the child's custody.

The Countess backed up her accusation of "injurious relations" with a letter from Count Salm, in which he had written to her:

"Because of the attitude of your family and yourself toward me, I wonder how I ever lived with you as long as I did. Luckily everything is now over between us."

AVIATORS BEGIN SECOND DAY OF ENDURANCE TEST

Clarence Chamberlain And Bert Acosta Confident That They Will Be Able To Break 49-Hour Record

NEW YORK, Apr. 12.—(INS)—Despite murky skies which carried a threat of rain, aviators Bert Acosta and Clarence D. Chamberlain, who are attempting to break the world's record for sustained flight, were still up in their Bellanca monoplane at 8:30 o'clock this morning, exactly 23 hours after they took to the air from Roosevelt Field.

The aviators hope to stay up for 50 hours. The world record for sustained flight, established by Droughin and Landry at Etampes, France, is 45 hours 11 minutes and 59 seconds.

From dawn to 8:30 o'clock the monoplane thrummed in a three-mile circle over the beacon light on Mitchel Field.

At times Acosta and Chamberlain flew at from 600 to 800 feet to avoid low clouds. They were not hampered by the slight ground haze that prevailed.

Last reports from them, in the form of a dropped message, said that all was going well and that this morning they planned to soar over New York City.

If their test is successful they plan to start preparations for the New York-to-Paris flight immediately, using the same plane which will be overhauled and equipped with a new motor.

Seven hours after they took the air Acosta and Chamberlain reported:

"It is less tiresome so far than riding in an automobile we have not begun to feel the effects of the trip."

Hour after hour they clung to the vicinity of Mitchel Field, their motor humming sedulously. At dusk floodlights were switched on at Hadley and Mitchel fields and a special fog-piercing lamp shot up its glare at Curtis Field.

Spectacular Blaze Burns Self Out In 38-Story Structure

NEW YORK, Apr. 12.—(INS)—A spectacular fire, 38 stories in the air—the most fascinating and inaccessible blaze in the city's history—burned itself out early today. It had started in the scaffolding near the top of the 38-story, \$10,000,000 Sherry-Netherland apartment hotel, at Fifth Avenue and 50th Street, and burned brightly throughout the night.

More than half a million people, at one time or another witnessed the blaze, it was estimated.

Giant sparks rained from the loads and huge brands crashed down upon structures from half a deck around like rockets from the sky.

Every unit of the city's fire department was called out but all efforts to fight the blaze were ineffectual, and it burned brightly in the night, far above the reach of hose lines.

The fire was unlike anything ever seen in the city, and there was no way firemen, with every known modern equipment, could reach it. This was deeply resented by Fire Chief Kenon who said:

"It is assinine for anybody to put up a forty-story building in a crowded neighborhood and then cover the outside with inflammable material."

In aviation circles that Acosta and Chamberlain will succeed in their venture unless weather conditions take a turn for the worse.
