



Calling state-enacted legislation a "multi-billion dollar ripoff," County Commissioner John Kimbrough says he sees it as one of the major evils facing county government in the coming new

To combat state enactment of bills with no funding attached, the Republican commissioner plans to submit a list of programs that are mandated by the state, but paid for by local

In a memorandum to the board, the Office of Management Analysis and Evaluation (OMAE) has prepared the necessary documentation which prior to next year's legislative session will be presented to the legislative delegation from Seminole County.



Safety Last

We're at the beginning of a brand new year full of endless possibilities. What kind of year will it be? We could make it the best one ever; we could blow it completely; or we could "muddle through" ending it in just about the same predicament we started it. We really don't have any certainty about how it will come out. At this stage it's all unknown. The unknown is always troublesome and ambiguous. If only we had a way of seeing what's ahead, we feel we'd be more relaxed about the future. The fact is we probably wouldn't but most think we

"Safety First" has been a motto of industry and traffic experts for many years. It's a great motto as far as it goes. It has helped reduce industrial and automobile accidents. When we're working, driving, or walking in traffic it always pays to think "Safety First."

However, in the way we live life - in the way we approach this New Year - it is a terrible motto. "Safety Last" or "Live Dangerously" would be a far better approach no matter what

Religious Roundup

WASHINGTON (AP) - Most young people today are not antagonistic toward organized religion, but are inclined to evaluate it on their own rather than accept it automatically, a new study finds. The study, commissioned by the U.S. Catholic Con-

ference Education Department's office of research, says that a "confrontation with faith" now occurs earlier in life than before, that it usually has come at college age, but it's now hitting at the high school level. Many youths, concerned for values of autonomy, are

"confused" by the very freedoms they demand, the study says. It adds that organized religion, along with other support systems of family and peer groups, "can be a najor force but today's adolescent will assess it more critically. Assemblies of God church here has the fastest growing Sunday school in the nation, says Christian Life Magazine in its comparison of 1976 statistics from local churches. The Westside classes grew by 71 per cent to a total attendance of 3,116, up from 1,825.

PHEBA, Miss. (AP) - A small, rural church of 130 members near here, Hebron Baptist Church, has inherited \$2 million, and isn't sure what to do with it all. Interest on the money, bequeathed from the estate of Mrs. W.A. Adair, a life-long member who was buried in the church's little cemetery, will run to about \$200,000 a year, while the church's budget this year is only \$8,000. Miami Hotel Strike Spreads To Two More

MIAMI (AP) - As hotels and nightclubs girded for the usual New Year's Eve crowds, a strike by hotel workers spread to two more luxury hotels here when negotiations reached an impasse.

By Thursday, the Sheraton Four Ambassadors and Dupont Plaza, both in downtown Miami, were hit by the strike along with the first group of hotels - Doral Country Club, Doral Beach, Deauville, Eden Roc, Carillon and Shelborne.

Smathers Returns \$2,000

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - By signing a \$2,000 check, Secretary of State Bruce Smathers says he has fulfilled a two-year-old campaign pledge to return part of his salary to taxpayers.

But Smathers says there's no legitimate way to return the money to the state so Thursday he gave the check to the Religious Heritage Council Inc. to help pay for the new Capitol's prayer room.

Voters To Get Revision Issue TALLAHASSEE (AP) - There can be

no doubt that the framers of Florida's 1968 Constitution wanted the recommendations of a revision commission submitted to the voters in 1978, says Atty. Gen. Robert Shevin. "To conclude otherwise grossly violates the

very clear intent of the drafters," he said in a brief filed Thursday with the Florida Supreme Shevin submitted the brief to support Gov. Reubin Askew's request for an advisory

Tourists Flock To Florida

MIAMI (AP) — Thousands of tourists are in Florida to celebrate New Year's despite a recent cool spell, jammed highways, a hotel strike in Miami and Miami Beach, and an abundance of "No Vacancy" signs.

The parade of fun seekers, water lovers and just plain tired folks found sunny skies, little rain and temperatures in the 70s Thursday after a series of cold fronts sent thermometers into the 40s.

At the country's most southernmost city, Key West, campgrounds and trailer courts were at capacity. One drive-in theater admitted overnight guests who came to sleep rather than see movies.

State Hampered On Roads

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - Rising costs and a sagging rate of growth in the gasoline tax have hampered the state's ability to build and repair roads, a Senate committee reports. The Transportation Committee reported Thursday on road-building problems and offered a number of possible solutions for senators to consider.

It listed a one-or two-cent-a-gallon gas tax increase or a one-or two-per-cent sales tax on gasoline as possible solutions to the problem. However, the report did not endorse a particular solution.

Glisson Switches To Demos

After Christmas Comes Depression

It may happen to you the day you throw out the Christmas tree. Or the day the relatives all finally go back up north. Or maybe the day your five-year-old comes to you with the pieces of the first shattered Christmas toy. "It" is post-Christmas depression.

"This is a time of year when people feel they should be relating to each other - and often they are not," says Dr. Robert Edelman. Edelman is a clinical psychologist with the Center for Psychological Services, Altamonte Springs. Edelman doesn't believe that Christmas necessarily creates new problems, but that it brings to the foreground problems which already exist.

"Often the family members have problems in their own

relationships with which they are not coping. During the holiday season there may be extra guests, the exchange of gifts or other stress situations. A lot of people simply become distressed by the entire situation." Edelman specifies financial over-extension as a particular Christmas problem which can cause drastic post-

Christmas depression. "People over-extending themselves financially relates sometimes to families where the giving of love revolves around the giving of gifts," he says.

"Over indulgence of material goods leads to problems

later on," says Edelman. The problems extend far beyond

Christmas for the children who come to believe that love is represented by the quantity of gifts received. "Children don't learn to delay their desires, for one thing," explains Edelman. "They feel they should have whatever they desire - right then."

Post-Christmas depression strikes single people as deeply as it does family members. "People who are away from home, people who are isolated, find the absence of family support can be distressing," says Edelman. Dr. Werner Metz, director of the Seminole County

Mental Health Association, adds: "I don't have the latest

creases around the Christmas holidays. People who are

alone when everyone else is getting together can become particularly depressed." So when the last evergreen needle has been vacuumed up, when the last present has been put away — or when the last of the strangers in your hotel have all gone their own way leaving you once again alone, what do you do when

"There are the usual kinds of remedies which people seek for themselves," says Dr. Edelman. "They may chat with friends, go to the beauty parlor, buy something new to wear. But if depression doesn't respond to that they should seek professional help."



FBI Chief's Job Isn't Political

President-elect Carter believes in the "general principle" that the heads of the FBI and CIA should change with administrations, but on this one we believe he is only half right.

The Central Intelligence Agency is the president's eyes and ears for the world beyond our borders. By tradition and constitutional authority, any president holds enormous responsibilities in foreign affairs.

He needs a CIA director in whom he has total confidence. Thus it makes as much sense for a new president to name his own man to head Central Intelligence as to head the State or Defense departments. Appropriately, CIA Director George Bush announced he plans to resign.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation fulfills a quite different function, however, investigating federal crimes with jurisdiction inside U.S. borders. Since law enforcement ought to be blind to politics and highly professional, there is no compelling reason for FBI directors to be shifted with each new administration

Indeed, the Senate has twice passed a bill that would create 10-year, nonrenewable terms for FBI directors. One aim of that bill was to end the kind of entrenched, career-long directorate exemplified by J. Edgar Hoover, who stayed on for more than four

But an equally important aim was to insulate the FBI and its director against routine change with each new presidency. By giving him a term appointment, it would not have kept a new president from dismissing the FBI chief, but it did seek to provide some protection against White House political pressures.

If the president-elect is determined to make an immediate change, he can do so, but he will have to force the issue, and we hope he will ponder carefully whether the precedent he sets is worth it.

The price of oil sold by the 13 member nations of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries is going up on Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates will put a 5 per

cent increase into effect on that date, and maintain the price for

The other 11 OPEC members will increase their prices 10 per cent on Jan, 1 and another 5 per cent on July 1-if the market will bear those increases.

There is some doubt about the market because Saudi Arabia, already the biggest oil producer, has unused production capacity which, if turned into the market, would tend to hold the price down for other producers. Even the smaller oil price increase will have a serious

impact on the world economy, however. It will impede economic recovery, which is already faltering. We can be grateful to the conservative Saudis for their effort

to hold the increase down. But the larger lesson is that our own national economy remains dependent on decisions made by a few willful men who met in a tiny shiekhdom half a world away from New York and

The hard fact is that we are more vulnerable to OPEC action today than we were three years ago at the time of the Arab

oil boycott. The American people and their leaders have been unwilling to take the actions and make the sacrifices necessary to reduce our dependence on imports of foreign oil.

We want to achieve energy independence but we want it to be painless. That is impossible Our economy has been hurting so much from inflation and depression during the last three years that perhaps we haven't been able to afford the steps necessary to achieve energy in-

But the time is at hand for ending government controls that keep prices artifically low on domestic oil and gas. There should be a plan to phase out these controls over a period of years, so that the powerful forces of the free market can come into play, ending waste, promoting conservation and encouraging new production of oil, gas and out vast undeveloped corl deposits.

The department said Thursday that people who smoke, chew or sniff tobacco spent nearly \$16.6 billion for tobacco this year, compared with \$15.6 billion in 1975. More than 90 per cent of the money went for cigarettes.

Bucks, Gobblers Went To School This Season

Editor's note: Hersey Huffman, known to friends and fellow sportsmen as Herky, has hunted and fished in Florida for 30 years primarily in the Central Florida area. He has hunted and fished most of the southern and southwest states as well as Utah, Wyoming and Idaho. Herky has also had the opportunity to hunt and fish in the Bahamas, Alaska, Guatemala, Belize and Honduras.

Local hunting reports are diminishing as bucks and gobblers have gone to school during the latter part of the season. Ken McIntosh of Sanford was given a new turkey call for Christmas by his daughter, Martha, and bagged a 13-pound gobbler the same day. Eddie Colbert brought in a nice eight-point buck, Chet Knox hunting out of the same camp bagged an eight-point buck and a wild hog. Gordon Butcher hunting the Summerlin pasture had an excellent season bagging several nice bucks and turkeys. Nathan VanMeter of Casselberry came in with a wild hog hunting in the public area east of Osteen. With hunting season fast approaching its conclusion it's time

to oil the reels, clean out the boat, shape up the tackle box and get ready for what could be an excellent fishing season. Rainfall has kept rivers and lakes in top shape and with additional rain spaced at the right intervals the water should maintain a good level. Speckled perch have been strong on any given day and spotty

on others. Best results have been to move around with a jig or Beetle Spin or drift with minnows until you can locate a few, fish the area, then move again as the action slows. Specks should pick up this next moon and be in full swing as the spawn continues to its peak. If the weather takes a turn for the better, the sow bass will be roaming looking for a place to start their spawn. Look for sand bars in coves and little out-of-the-way spots, then work them with a worm or your favorite surface lure. If the water level holds, we should have an exceptionally good season on big bass.

Remember unless you want a trophy to hang on the wall it's to everyone's benefit to turn loose the female bass if she is not injured. If the fish has been hooked deeply or has injured her gills, you may as well keep her for the frying pan. Don't handle fish intended to be released. This will disturb the membrane that acts




