No word is used more frequently in these our days. Love. Have you ever tried to define "love?" Do you feel that your riends think in the same channel as you when you use the word "love?" And are you certain that your use of the word reflects Biblical usage?

We love to think of John as the "apostle of love." Is it because we have studied the whole body of writings-five books in the New Testament-ascribed to this apostle? Or have we been satisfied with detaching a phrase or two on love from the huge bulk of his writings? Even a cursory glance at two small passages are revealing:

"Love, then, consists in this not that we have loved God. but that he has loved us and has sent his Son as an offering for our sins.

Reflect prayerfully on these words. By divine inspiration love is defined as consisting in GOD'S SENDING JESUS TO DIE ON THE CROSS FOR OUR SINS. Would you have defined it in that way? God always does things differently

By divine inspiration we are instructed HOW to love. How? As Jesus did on the cross. To love means to save people from sinning and the results of sinning. Jesus laid down his life on the cross to do away with sin and its evil after-effects. That was his supreme expression of love. We have no right to use the word love in a religious context or homily unless it is in this same context of the CROSS, "Love as I have loved

Love and sin are inextricably related in God's way of thinking. To love another is to help him escape the mess of sin-as Jesus did. Love and keeping the commandments are inextricably related in God's way of thinking, for by observing the commandments we avoid sin, "you will live in my love if you keep my commandments." (John 15)

Are we willing to accept God's definition given to love in John's Gospel? Or should we proudly think that man "come

Battleground In Senate

Foreign Policy Collision Is Inevitable

Even the pink mist of detente can't hide a basic foreign policy collision that is shaping up on Capitol Hill. The battleground will be the

The key sectors will be the deployment of American troops overseas, presidential power, military aid to old allies like South Korea and Nationalist China, trade relations with old friends and foes alike, the world energy crisis and the true depth of the U.S. commitment to Israel and its reason for being.

The leading protagonists will be even more familiar: Sens. Mike Mansfield, J. William Fulbright, William Proxmire and Stuart Symington on one; President Nixon on the other.

For many the debate will seem repetitious, even monotonous. The issues are not new. But all are interconnected and the timing suggests momentous decisions. Strong tides are running world affairs and some propose Washington reverse the course of two generations. In a sense, President Nixon finds himself a

victim of his own success. The end of the Vietnam war, the Moscow-

Peking summits of 1972, the "carrot" of potentially lucrative Communist markets, the optimism connected to independent West German and Japanese policy moves have combined to touch off what some call "a race for peace." Others call it "a race for isolationism."

The White House complains that men who agonized most of Mr. Nixon's Vietnam policy and his summitry have not even paused to analyze his successes. Instead, they charge, Nixon critics are trying to seize on the moment to dismantle the entire framework of U.S. alliances and global defenses

Critics of the President acknowledge his successes, albeit grudgingly, but complain that he cannot capitalize on them because of Pentagon opposition and his own deep-rooted anti-Communist attitudes and those of conservative Republicans. These attitudes, they claim, prevent the United States from reaping the

In recent times there was the Teapot Dome scandal of President Warren G. Harding's administration but soon afterward, in 1924, Calvin Coolidge won the White House easily. There were scandals by the dozen during the time of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, but he won four terms easily. Harry Truman used to laugh off scandals in his own administration and seemed to get particular delight in ridiculing criticism of what some called at least unethical conduct by his White House jester, Harry Vaughan.

Not all politicians and not all White House aides, or Senate aides or House of Representatives aides are dishonest or unethical. Very few are. But, the public is more amused generally than angered when one gets caught with his hand in the cookie jar-or with an electonic bugging device. It's all

Now concentrating his efforts on police reporting and photography, along with motorsports, Taylor appears as a guest columnist for "As I See It," a column he originated three years ago. The column comes in the wake of Mills being relieved of his job as head basketball coach at Seminole High this week.)

It's a long trip back from Lakeland, Merritt Island, or even Longwood, when you're riding on a school bus, carrying a team that has just lost a game. Especially if it's a team coached by Joe Mills.

How well I remember those trips, made in dead silence. No one said anything, not even Mills. It wasn't because he didn'thave anything to say, it was just that the players knew

what he was thinking. Only one thing is demanded from a basketball player by Milis, and that a 200 per cent effort . . . or better. It's not a request, but an ultimatum. You've got to work to play for Joe

While the wins greatly outnumbered the losses, each defeat was a shocking blow for Mills. But surprisingly he never blamed them on the players, but instead spent hours picking out the things he should have done differently.

Oh, Mills said what he wanted to say. But it came after arriving back at the school or the next day in practice. And sometimes, practice was held as soon as the team arrived back at the school.

Sure the players groaned and complained, but each one of them would be the first to stand up and protect their coach if someone else made mention of his coaching strategy or late night practice sessions.

Mills Always Had Time

I spent much of the first year I covered the team asking questions. I didn't really know or understand the game, but regardless of whether or not the Seminoles won that night, Mills always had time to go out for a coke and answer my questions, filling me in on his evaluation of the game, player performances and especially his coaching performance.

Over the course of two years, those conversations changed. I didn't ask as many questions, but Mills asked more. I really can't remember giving too many "yes" or "no" answers to the questions I don't think he expected me to. And they weren't items for my newspaper stories, although the conversations certainly gave a greater understanding of the situation and made those stories a little easier to write.

Joe Mills wanted to win, and I wanted him to win. Tears came to my eyes that Saturday night, in Stuart, when the Seminoles were defeated in the final game of the regional tournament, losing to host Martin County before a packed gym of Stuart fans.

Martin County scored the first 11 points of the game and led 50-19 at the half. But I still hadn't given up on "my" team. And they didn't give up either, fighting back to within 10 points before foul trouble and a player with a broken nose became too much to overcome.

It Was 'My' Team

I call it "my" team, and I felt like I was just as much a part of it as any one player. After the Tribe did the "impossible," winning the district tournament, it appeared that financially I would have to miss the regional tournament. But that didn't happen, Mills wouldn't let it. I shared a room

with the coaches and I was a part of the team . . . my team. There were some shocking losses, but there were also some big wins. Take for instance last year when the Seminoles were playing a home and away series with Gainesville. Sanford had about as much chance of beating

Gainesville as David had against Goliath. But David was the Seminoles, and Goliath was Gainesville. The slingshot was Mills and instead of a stone they used a basketball. The gates were thrown open and SHS students admitted free. The final outcome was a win for Sanford ... impossible ... but true.

Mills wasn't one on the players, but he won that game He has won some others. You won't find too many high school basketball coaches with a better knowledge of the game . you'll find even less than know how to apply it as well.

More Than Just A Coach

Mills is more than just a great coach, he's a fine citizen of this city. He's active in his church and in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes

Mills must hold the world's record for the most technical fouls without ever saying a word of profanity. As upset as I've seen him get, I've never heard a "bad" word come from

And I've watched as he has carried his coaching duties far and above the call of duty. Like hauling players home after practice and to and from the school for games. Sure, some coaches might do that for their key players, but Mills had done it for all his players, the best and the worst. It's these "little" things that are such a big part of Mills

success as a coach. When he made the big step from junior varsity coach to head coach some six years ago, he faced a task even UCLA coach John Wooden would shudder about. In the entire history of Seminole High, there was only one winning season. It came in 1961 when the Tribe notched 20

After 12-12 and 13-13 seasons, Mills took the first team that was entirely his product, and produced a 20-8 record, a new school mark for wins that wouldn't stand long. Two years later his team notched 22 wins.

Mills' work with basketball players goes far beyond his high school team. He has played a key role in making the Sanford Recreation Department's youth basketball program the success it is.

Through his efforts in this program, he was worked with hundreds of boys, and its surprising how many of those were the ones that later turned ou! to be SHS varsity cagers. I've watched Seminole High basketball take a giant step forward during the last few years, and I hate to think that it

was all a wasted effort. I've seen coaches come and go, and many times it was for the best. I've even offered to buy one-way tickets out of town, but never have I been too upset by seeing even a coach

But never have I been so upset as I was by the move made this week. It seems like a bad dream . . . I just wish I would hurry and wake up.

Hopefully it's not too late for something to be done. We can't afford to lose Mills, because I don't think there's a man walking that can fill his shoes.

To the ones that made this decision: Who are you trying to

# Boycott Ends, Prices Up

The week-long meat boycott officially ends today as its eaders differ on battle plans to continue their protests, but the price of meat holds its own.

Meat sales remained off in most parts of the nation with some price reductions by retailers, but there was no general An Associated Press spot check of prices of eight meat

items on Monday and again on Thursday showed only scattered changes. The boycott continued to take its toll of layoffs at meat

packing houses, and livestock markets reported trade was generally light. izaders of the boycott have announced plans to meet in Washington next Wednesday to discuss future moves.

One of the directors of Fight for Inflation (FIT), the organization that sparked the boycott, said the group will ask members to send contact their congressmen expressing sup-

port for what he said is a recommendation by the House Banking and Currency Committee that meat prices be rolled back to the Jan. 10 level. FIT plans to boycott meat on Tuesdays and Thursdays, with other week-long boycotts called as necessary.

Ethel Rosen of the Women's War on Prices in Chicago said her group is urging consumers to continue the boycott on Tuesdays and Thursdays. In Louisville, Ky., Patty Twyman, leader of that city's

boycott action, called for a one week extension of the boycott. The farmer answered our boycott by withholding his livestock from the market, now we're answering him with our own holding action. We'll see who can hold the longest," she
