UMPIRE SHOWED HIS NERVE

Manager McGraw Relates Incident Showing Courage of Tim Hurst in Important Ball Game.

"I never saw an umpire display more nerve in a critical situation than the late Tim Hurst did one day in Cleveland years ago," said John McGraw.

"I was with the Orioles, and at the time we had to dress in a shack under the grandstand, adjoining another in which the Cleveland team dressed. In the Cleveland dressing room a small space had been set apart for Hurst to dress in, which led to a rather ticklish situation.

"In an important game we had Cleveland beaten 2 to 0, when they went to bat in the ninth and filled the bases with two out. Pat Tebeau was at bat and he jumped out in front of the batter's box to smash a slow drop which the pitcher delivered to him, driving the ball to the fence in left center for three bases. The runners scored, and it looked as if the game was over, but Wilbert Robinson, who was catching for us, called Hurst's attention to the fact that Tebeau had stepped out of his box, and Tim called him out, at which there was a riot.

"The Cleveland players were in a rage and threatened Hurst with all kinds of bodily harm, but Tim calmly walked down to their dressing room, donned his clothes and as calmly walked out without so much as glancing at the home team. It took real courage to do that, but Tim never flinched."

"Invisible Ship" May Be.

Navy Department officials say they have not yet evolved the "invisible merchant ship." In fact, the United States has not been any more successful in this respect than has Germany in her efforts to make U-boats invisible. It is true Thomas A. Edison and other members of the navy advisory board, together with naval experts, have been working for some time on the reduction of visibility of merchant ships.

Results to date are said to be important. By utilizing neutral colors and reducing the horizon line of freighters a substantial contribution has been made to the campaign against German submarines. The "decolorators," as this country calls its camouflage men, have made it harder for U-boat commanders to locate American merchant ships, but that is all so far.

Canada's War Saving Stamps.

The Canadian government has announced that an issue of war saving stamps is in course of preparation. These stamps will be used in connection with a plan to save in small amounts in the purchase of war savings certificates.

Special war savings cards will be issued having squares upon which the stamps purchased from time to time may be placed. When all the squares are filled the card may be taken to the postoffice and exchanged for a war savings certificate. The stamps will be in the denomination of 25 cents and the cards will contain spaces for 24 of them and one 10-cent postage stamp (making in all, \$3.00). When filled the cards will entitle the holder to \$10 at the end of three years.

The stamps, which will be sold at the postoffice, will be of special design.

First to Sleep in Bathing. The first man to sleep in a bathtub is believed to have been an early victim of a hotel proprietor whose house was "full up" and who blithely charged the haggard guest \$4 for the privilege. Hotel men promptly took to this scheme most kindly.

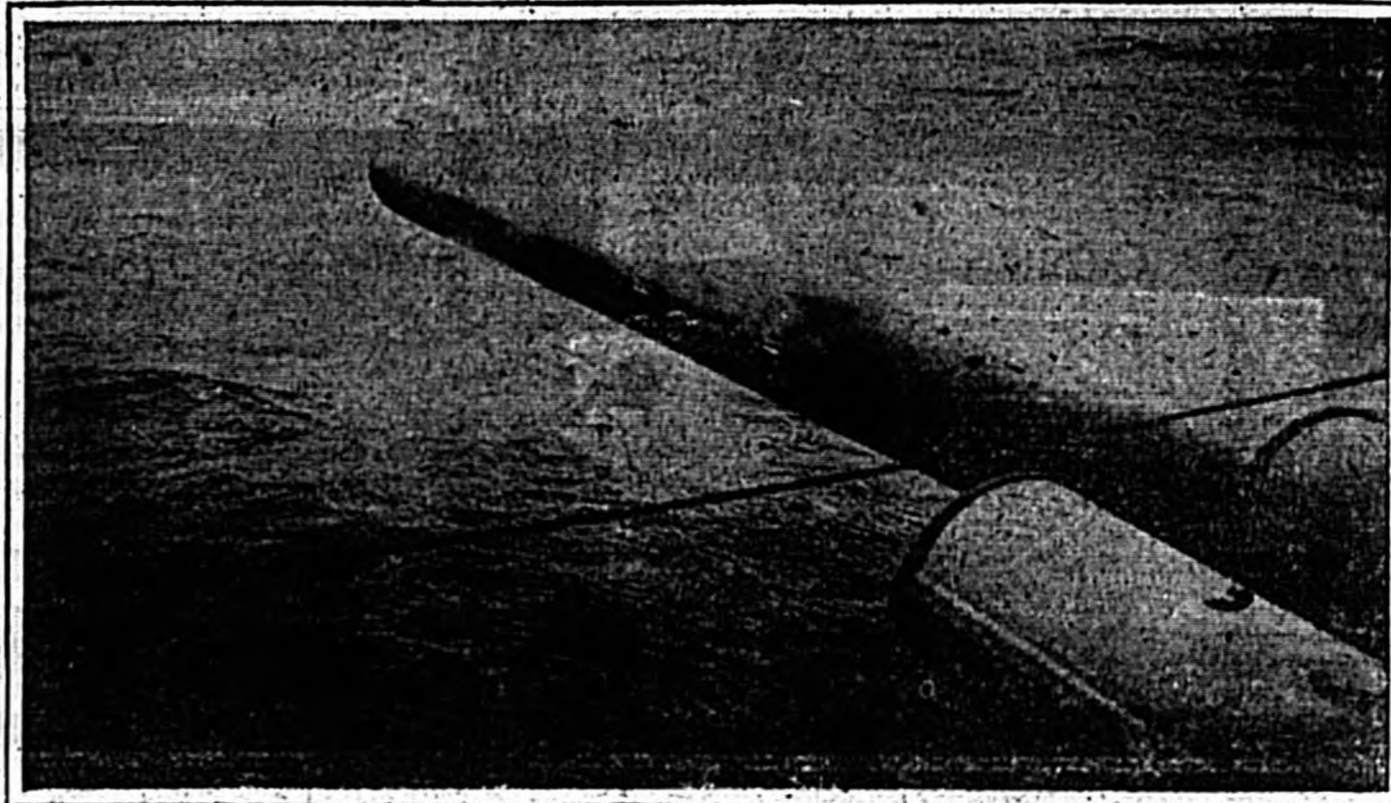

FIRST "RAINBOW" DIVISION GETS INTO CAMP

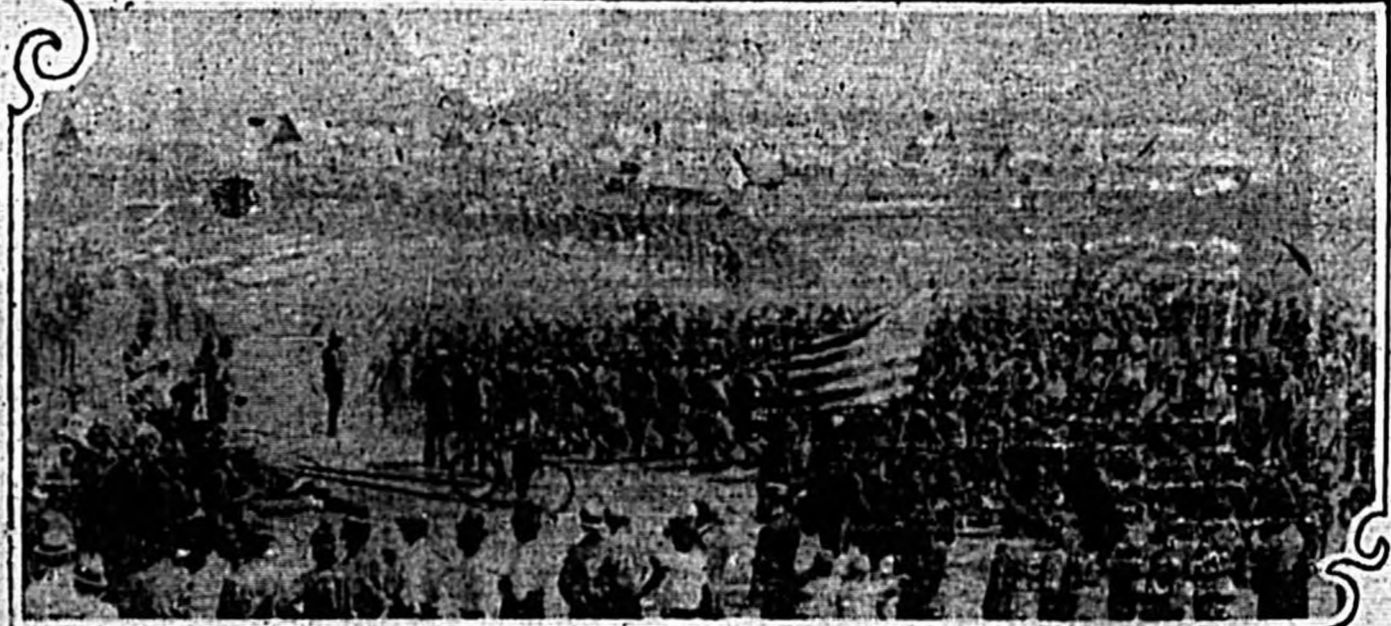

MODERN BOY CRUSADERS MARCH TO BATTLE

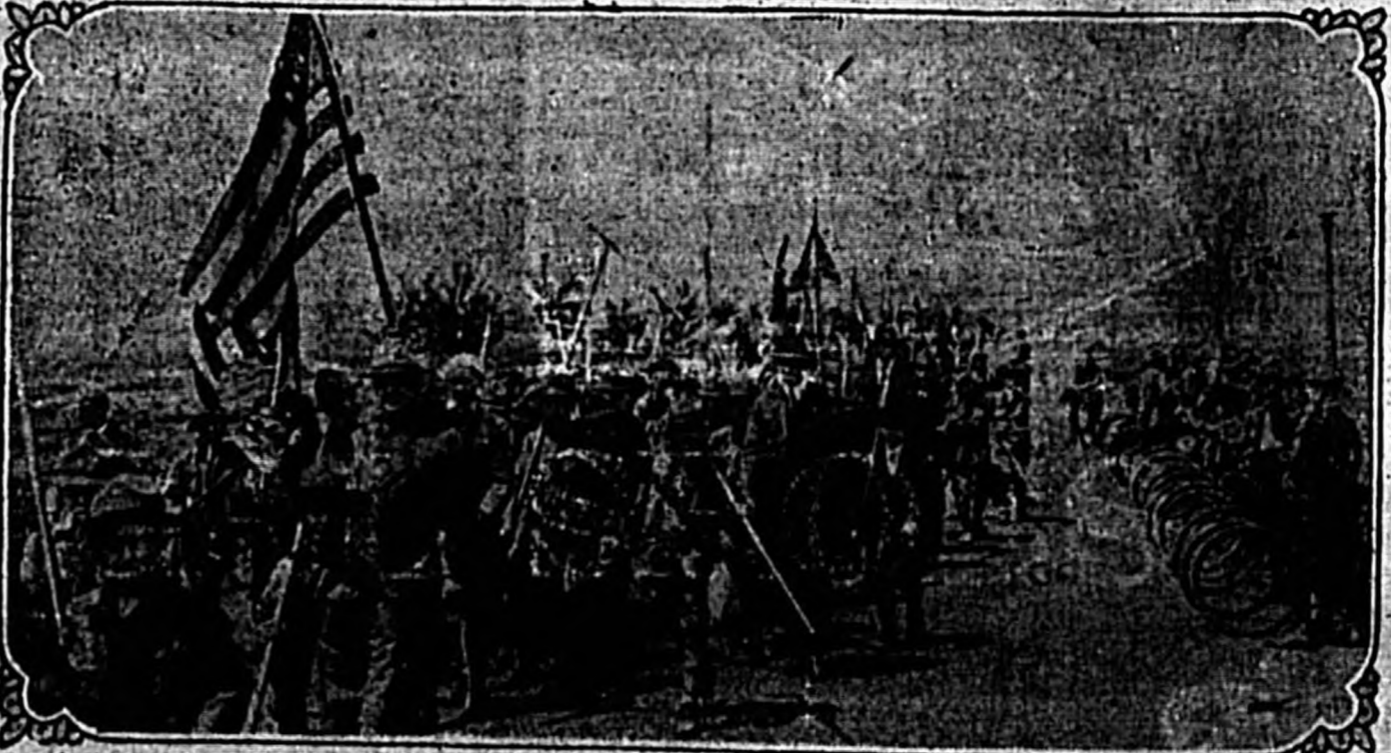


Photo by American Press Association. Boy scouts of Washington being led to fields which they are cultivating to aid in increasing the food supply.

New U. S. Inspection Service. The food products inspection service established by the Department of Agriculture under the authority of the food production act, was made available November 1 to shippers of fruits and vegetables in two large markets—New York and Chicago.

It is thought likely that for some time inspections will be made mostly of cars of produce concerning the condition of which there is some dispute.

graph, telephone, letter, or in person. Applications must contain a complete description of the shipment, including the name and address of the shipper and receiver, car number, initials and routing, contents and the particular condition concerning which inspection is requested.

Inspectors will certify as to the condition of fruits and vegetables only. No charge will be made for the service. An inspection certificate will be issued regarding each car or lot inspected and the original delivered or mailed to the shipper or his representative.

The food production act of Aug. 10th, 1917, authorizes the Secretary of Agriculture to investigate and certify to shippers the conditions as to soundness of fruit, vegetables, and other food products when received at important central markets designated by the secretary under rules and regulations prescribed by him.

Information concerning the service may be obtained from the Chief of the Bureau of Markets, United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

PUBLICITY PULLS PROGRESS

"PRODUCING NOT PROMOTING" BOARD OF TRADE RESULTS BY THE SECRETARY

Again the citizens of Sanford have demonstrated their "pull together" spirit and on Tuesday last gave freely their time and cars for more than four hours assisting their Board of Trade in entertaining the delegation of fifty five persons arriving in Sanford, on the Clyde Steamer Osceola. The party represented New England undertakers and through the efforts of State Secretary F. L. Miller, the party was persuaded to come up to Sanford; Mr. Miller making the boat trip with them from Jacksonville to Sanford. Ad DeLand landing, the party was met by Messrs. A. P. Connelly and O. L. Taylor, who represented the Board of Trade. On arrival at Sanford the following citizens with their cars met the party and also gave them a fifty mile drive through Seminole and Volusia counties: Mayor J. D. Davison, leading the drive, G. F. Smith, Roy Tillis, T. B. Huff, John Meisch, C. M. Hand, J. G. Hurley, Felix Frank, Mrs. Joe Harrold, Mrs. F. L. Miller, L. P. McCuller, A. E. Yowell and A. P. Connelly. At luncheon Messrs. McCuller, Hand and Taylor drew special mention because of their size, the guests maintaining that this was due to the excellent lettuce produced in Sanford. Mrs. Harrold and her famous Buick "Six," drew the title of "lady speed king," because of her dexterous high speed driving—twice during the trip, reviving methods had to be resorted to in order to bring back to earth one of her party. Anyway, the Board of Trade sincerely appreciates the fine spirit shown and also thank the many others who tendered their cars and time if needed. Truly there is a wonderful spirit here and it is breaking into realization fast and such a spirit will yet make Sanford the leading city of central Florida.

Trade told of the good accomplished and expressed himself as satisfied with results. M. E. Dole, one of Geneva's most progressive men couldn't help from making two speeches and both were to the point and sound arguments. Rev. Guttenberg advocated the spirit of co-operation as the needed remedy for moral life. Col. Malnes, always a leading progressive and a hard worker for the interest of his county delivered the goods in his address, as usual. Judge Dickinson, vice president of the Board of Trade told of the weight an organization could have and was having in bettering conditions for the county and for Sanford. E. T. Woodruff, chairman of the Board of Trade Waterways committee and who will represent the organization at the Miami convention, Nov. 27th to 30th spoke interestingly on the subject and made it clear as to the advantages to be derived from the active work being given this project through the Board of Trade.

O. L. Taylor, head brakeman of the Peoples Bank walked from Sanford to Geneva Tuesday night in order to be present for supper. That morning he also walked together with A. P. Connelly, from Sanford to DeLand Landing to meet the Osceola, get breakfast and return to Sanford with the undertakers. Mr. Taylor took a suit case with him in order to bring a supply of fish home, but as L. M. Rehbinder, C. E. Henry and E. A. Douglass formed themselves into a committee to prevent this Mr. Taylor threw away his carpet bag and returned to Sanford and has since been under the doctor's care because of over eating.

Sir Ed. Putnam is also ill from the effects of a square meal obtained at Geneva Tuesday night. He is strongly in favor of more and frequent Board of Trade dinners and insists that all should be held at Geneva.

J. G. Ball, manager of the Fernald Hardware Co. was given back his two dollars by Editor Holly. Mr. Ball had offered this to induce Mr. Holly to call on him to speak but owing to his stuffed condition in ten minutes after sitting down to supper he forgot entirely the speech he had been rehearsing for the past two weeks.

During the entire program C. K. Lucas and T. S. Huff remained at the table. At 10:30 p. m. the score stood: Lucas, 14 perch and 3 black bass, Huff, leading with 14 perch, 3 bass and 5 mullets to his credit. V. C. Collier fell out of the race after the tenth lap but stood up well under a total of eleven, three pound bass.

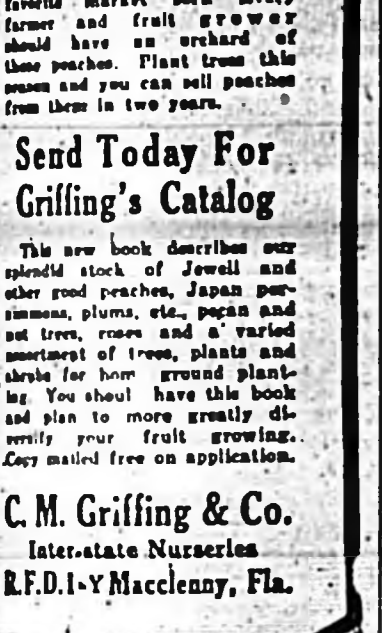

 The food production act of Aug. 10th, 1917, authorizes the Secretary of Agriculture to investigate and certify to shippers the conditions as to soundness of fruit, vegetables, and other food products when received at important central markets designated by the secretary under rules and regulations prescribed by him.

The Chief of the Bureau of Markets of the department is charged with the establishment and supervision of this service. For convenience in administration the important central markets designated by the secretary have been divided into six divisions or districts, with a supervising inspector responsible for each division.

An Ordinance Regulating Dogs

Be it ordained by the mayor and city council of Sanford, Florida: Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any owner or owners of any ferocious or vicious dog to permit same to roam or run at large within the corporate limits of the city of Sanford, Florida. Section 2. A dog at large within the meaning of this ordinance is deemed to be any dog roaming the streets of the city of Sanford not under leash and muzzled with iron muzzle or securely chained and muzzled while kept on the premises of the owner. Section 3. That on complaint being made to the chief of police that any dog within the city limits is a ferocious or vicious animal, it shall be the duty of said police to fully investigate said complaint, and if upon investigation he finds that the animal in question is of a ferocious nature and snaps at people, or attempted to bite people, said dog within the meaning of this ordinance shall be deemed to be a ferocious and vicious animal. Section 4. That it shall be the duty of the chief of police to report to the mayor of the city of Sanford his findings and recommendations on any complaint made to the chief of police regarding any ferocious or vicious dog, and thereupon the mayor shall issue an order under the seal of the city directed to the owner or owners of said dogs, to forthwith remove and keep removed from the city limits said animal, or to keep said dog securely chained, fastened and muzzled at all times, within the discretion of the mayor. Section 5. That should any owner or owners of ferocious and vicious dogs within the meaning of this act fail to comply with the order issued by the mayor to keep said animal securely chained, fastened and muzzled, or to remove said animal and to keep said animal removed from the corporate limits of the city of Sanford, Florida, it shall be the duty of the chief of police forthwith to cause such vicious or ferocious dog to be killed. Section 6. Any person or persons who in any way interferes with the police or hinders any officer in the performance of any required duty under this ordinance with reference to dogs, shall upon conviction thereof be fined not more than \$25.00 or imprisoned not more than ten days, within the discretion of the mayor. Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage and approval by the mayor. I hereby certify that the foregoing ordinance was duly passed by the city council of Sanford, Florida, on the 16th day of October, A. D. 1917.
