### Kill 'Star Wars' Or Brace For New Arms Race

WARSAW, Poland (UPI) -Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev put it very simply. President Reagan's "Star Wars" program could lead to a new, expensive and deadly arms race.

Moscow, Gorbachev said, will Introduce new measures to counter 'Star Wars' if the U.S. goes ahead with the project, but he proposed more mutual reductions if the plan is dropped.

"We shall not permit the balance of strategic and military parity to be upset." Gorbachev said Friday, addressing Warsaw. pact heads of state who renewed the East Bloc's 30-year-old milltary alliance

If the preparations for Star-Wars continue, we shall not have any choice but to take counter measures, which will include the strengthening and perfecting of nuclear arms. The said in a statement carried by the official news agency PAP.

Gorbachev referred to current disarmament negotiations between the United States and the Soviet Union "We have already suggested that both sides reduce. strategic offensive arms by one quarter by way of an opening move, the official Soviet news agency Tass in Moscow quoted him as saying in Warsaw


We would have no objections to making deeper mutual cuts. All this is possible if the arms sice does not begin in space.

Is a gray area in the law. Crossing into it can lead to injury, anguish and regrets as a recent southwest Seminole County case dramatically illustrates.

This despite the fact that all except convicted felons have the right to bear arms within the confines of our homes and on our property. Although we can arm ourselves the question of when we can use those weapons hinges on several factors, which may not be considered or even known to the gun-bearing resident who makes a split-second decision

To justifiably use deadly force while on his own property, including yards and carports as well as place of his right if "that force is necessary to prevent imminent death or great bodily harm to yourself while you're resisting another person's at-

"We're talking aggravated assault, rape, robbery, things like that, upon you or an occupant of your home," Marblestone said.

You must believe that deadly force is necessary to prevent imminent death or great bodily harm to you or another person. You have to perceive the intruder to be a real threat

### Insuring Yourself Against Life's Legal Complexities

The rich can hire the legal creme de la creme, and the destitute get their legal help for tree. But members of the middle class - the majority of defendants and plaintiffs in this country - have been hardest hit by the escalating cost of legal defense - until now

About 33,000 Florida families have found an inexpensive way to get all the legal help they need through legal insurance - a policy similar to dental and health insurance plans but pro-

viding legal services. While there are no group policy holders in Seminole County, at least three Orange County organizations offer the legal plan to its members; the Orange County Police Benevolent Association, the Federal Credit Union of Orlando. and the Orlando Postal Service Credit Union. There are 44 organizations in Florida participating in group legal See INSURANCE, page 5 A

### U.S. Retaliates For Shooting By Expelling Soviet Official

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The State Department has given a senior Soviet military attache seven days to leave the country and held out the prospect of further retaliation for Soviet actions following the killing of a U.S. Army major in

According to the State Department, Assistant Secretary of State Richard Burt called in the Soviet charge d'affaires, Oleg Sokolov, and informed him Friday that Lt. Col. Stanislav Ivanovich Gromov is being expelled and has seven days to leave the country.

Gromov is listed as the third-ranking of 17 military attaches at the Soviet Embassy in Washington, A U.S. official said Gromov was selected for expulsion on the advice of the Pentagon, which described him as "very active" in collecting defense information for the Soviets.

Burt, according to the official, also warned Sokolov against the Soviets expelling an American military attache in response, saying the United States "does not want to get into a fruitless cycle of retaliation and counter-retaliation and suggested strongly that the Soviets need to recognize the depths of U.S. concern in the case."

Maj. Arthur Nicholson was shot to death March 24 while on a surveillance mission termed routine by the U.S.

### Reagan 'Anguished' But Firm

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Although "anguished," President Reagan remains resolved about next week's European journey and his controversial visit to a German cemetery where Nazi SS troops are buried is still on his itinerary.

On Friday, the full Senate without dissent urged Reagan to cancel his trip to honor the German war dead at the Bitburg cemetery, a trip suggested by West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl.

Chief of staff Donald Regan described Reagan late Friday as "anguished" over the widespread protests against the trip in an interview with independent radio network reporters.

"Here's a man that spent all of his life in Hollywood dealing with members of the Jewish faith," said Regan. "All his life he has been a supporter of the Jewish people and the state of Israel."

### On Tuesday, You'll **Be Working For Yourself**

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - The average Florida family will work until Monday just to pay its federal, state and local taxes for the year, a budget-watchdog group reports.

Florida TaxWatch inc., a government-monitoring organization primarily funded by business, said the median Florida faimly this year has to devote 84 of 260 working days - or nearly one-third of the year - to meets its tax

Only after Monday, will the average family, in effect, start earning income for itself.

The national Tax Foundation has computed the national "tax freedom day" as Tuesday this year.

"The national date is slightly later than Florida's because our state and local governments take proportionately less from taxpayers' pockets than other states take from that citizens, although the gap is steadily narrowing," Florida

### House Panel Passes State Plan

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) -- The House Appropriations Committee approved a version of the Comprehensive State Plan Friday after abandoning an attempt to debate each of 269 proposed amendments.

The full House was scheduled to take up the committee's handiwork - a version of the plan Gov. Bob Graham and the Cabinet spent much of the past year fronting out - on Tuesday morning. Another version of the plan is pending in the Schate.

The plan is an attempt to guide Florida's growth into the next century. It would toughen environmental protection laws and spur both qualitative and quantitative improvements to the state's tranportation systems, schools, hospitals, prisons and other services.

According to estimates by Graham and House Appropriations stall, the state would spend between \$32 billion and \$34 billion if each of the plan's provisions were enacted today. Accounting for inflation, House leaders expect the plan to cost nearly \$100 billion by 1995

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) - Five NASA astronauts, two civilian scientists, a pair of (cisty monkeys and two dozen doomed rats are set to take off aboard the shuttle Challenger Monday on a weeklong Spacelab science expedition.

The rats, which will be sacrificed after the flight, and the squirrel monkeys are simply going along to test sophisticated space cages that will be used on future Spacelab life science missions.

For commander Robert Overmyer, co-pilot Frederick Gregory and crew members Don Lind. Norman Thagard, William Thornton, Lodewijk van den Berg and Taylor Wang, the flight means seven days of two-shift, around-the-clock work.

'We have a very specific mission, that is, to maximize the scientific return from Spacelab." Overmyer said in an interview.

The beauty, of course, of a 24-hour operation is that you're doing scientific data return for 24 hours. That's like a flying a 14-day mission in a one-shift operation, so you really maximize the science return."

Thornton and Thagard, both astronautphysicians, each have a previous shuttle mission to their credit as does Overmyer. Wang is a physicist at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in

A 30-hour fluid dynamics experiment will study the behavior of small drops suspended by sound waves. The study could yield valuable information about containerless processing, which in turn could prove useful for metallurgy and chemical engineering.

Pasadena, Calif., and van den Berg is a scientist with EG&G Energy Measurements Inc. of Goleta.

"I think probably the most significant thing from my standpoint, we are sending scientists into orbit to operate the experiments they have originated," said Lind, a physicist-astronaut who has waited 19 years for his first space flight.

The shuttle fliers plan to conduct 15 ambitious experiments throughout the Spacelab mission to study materials processing, life sciences, Earth's environment, astrophysics and fluid dynamics. Twelve of the experiments are sponsored by American scientists, two by French scientists and one by researchers in India.

In addition, two small satellites will be launched from canisters in the payload bay near

One, called NUSAT, will be used to calibrate air traffic control radars and the other, called GLOMR for global low-orbiting message relay satellite, will be used by the Navy for controlling oceanographic sensors. Such a system eventually could be used to track enemy submarines.

NUSAT weighs about 115 pounds and is valued at \$1.5 million, mostly in donated parts and labor, Glomr is a \$1 million 150-pound satellite.

Challenger's mission marks the second flight of Spacelab, a \$1 billion European-built laboratory module carried in the shuttle's 60-foot-long payload bay and connected to the ship's airlock by a 19-foot-long tunnel.

The laboratory module is 23 feet long and 13 feet wide, providing a roomy shirt-sleeve environment for the crew.

"The whole Spacelab series is a preview to the space station," said Lind. "This is a major national science facility and we're doing some very, very good things for a lot of fields.

Challenger last flew in October. The spaceship was grounded in November because of trouble with its heat insulation tiles and repairs were not completed until early March.

Mission managers originally planned to include four squirrel monkeys on the flight. But 95 percent of the species carries a non-human herpes virus and the space agency decided late in the program to include only virus-free subjects.

Four such specimens were found but only two could be trained in time to operate their cages' food and water systems

The monkeys will not be sacrificed but the rats will be killed after the flight for a series of medical studies to learn more about the physiological changes that occur during weightlessness

Four of the two dozen rodents will have surgically implanted sensors that will radio vital data to recorders during the mission. Barring an emergency, the crew has no plans to interact with any of the animals during the flight other than to observe them periodically to ensure they are comfortable

Thornton observed the behavior of six rats during the eighth shuttle mission and he said by the end of that flight, "some of those rats literally were doing backwards somersaults."

"They were enjoying weightlessness and the monkeys - I can't wait to see what the monkeys do I just wish the cages were larger so we could see their full repertory.

During the first day of the flight, a wide-field camera will be used to make a survey of the sky in the ultraviolet region of the spectrum.

Ultraviolet radiation is given off by young high-temperature stars and by massive stars nearing the end of their lifetime, and such radiation is reflected by interstellar gas and dust. Ultraviolet astronomy could offer insights into the distribution of matter in the universe.

Gorbachev, in criticizing Reagan's \$26 billion Strategic Defense Initiative to develop a space-based shield to shoot down incoming missiles, said, "Whatever the authors of these plans say, their aim is clear.

They want to achieve the ability to conduct an unpunished first nuclear strike. Our attitude is fundamentally different - outer space cannot be used as an arena for military threat." Gorbachev said.

The agency said the agreement to extend the East bloc defense treaty was signed by leaders of the seven pact states. Czechoslovakia, Poland, Hungary, East Germany, Bulgaria, Romania, and the Soviet Union. The treaty was extended for 20 years

'So long as NATO exists and the threat to European and world peace also exists, the socialist countries will strengthen their defensive alliance, and increase their efforts of Chernenko's illness.

for the sake of disarmament. peace and the dissolution of military blocs," the agency said.

"The unanimous decision to prolong the treaty is dictated by the necessity of maintaining the infallible security of the allied countries. Considering the extent of the threat of war, the Warsaw Pact will continue to undertake steps to keep their common defense capability at appropriate levels," PAP said.

Gorbachev's presence at the Warsaw Pact summit marked his first trip abroad since he came to power on March I following the death of Soviet President Konstantin Chernenko.

Western observers said the decision to hold the summit in Warsaw and Gorbachev's presence at the meeting demonstrated Moscow's tacit approval of the policies of the Polish leader, Gen. Wojceich Jaruzelski.

Polish and foreign journalists were not permitted to cover the summit, initially scheduled for January but postponed because

### U.S. Retaliates For Shooting By Expelling Soviet Official

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The State Department has given a senior Soviet military attache seven days to leave the country and held out the prospect of further retaliation for Soviet actions following the killing of a U.S. Army major in East Germany.

According to the State Department, Assistant Secretary of State Richard Burt called in the Soviet charge d'affaires. Oleg Sokolov, and informed him Friday that Lt. Col. Stanislav Ivanovich Gromov is being expelled and has seven days to leave the country.

Gromov is listed as the third-ranking of 17 military attaches at the Soviet Embassy in Washington, A U.S. official said Gromov was selected for expulsion on the advice of the Pentagon, which described him as "very active" in collecting defense information for the Soviets.

Burt, according to the official, also warned Sokolov against the Soviets expelling an American military attache. in response, saying the United States "does not want to get into a fruitless cycle of retaliation and counter-retaliation and suggested strongly that the Soviets need to recognize the depths of U.S. concern in the case."

Maj. Arthur Nicholson was shot to death March 24 while on a surveillance mission termed routine by the U.S. government.

### Reagan 'Anguished' But Firm

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Although "anguished." President Reagan remains resolved about next week's European journey and his controversial visit to a German cemetery where Nazi SS troops are buried is still on his itinerary.

On Friday, the full Senate without dissent urged Reagan to cancel his trip to honor the German war dead at the Bitburg cemetery, a trip suggested by West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl.

Chief of staff Donald Regan described Reagan late Friday as "angulahed" over the widespread protests against the trip in an interview with independent radio network

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - The average Florida family will work until Monday Just to pay its federal, state and local taxes for the year, a budget-watchdog group reports.

Florida TaxWatch Inc., a government-monitoring organiation primarily funded by business, said the median Florida faimly this year has to devote 84 of 260 working days - or nearly one-third of the year - to meets its tax

Only after Monday, will the average family, in effect, start carning income for itself.

The national Tax Foundation has computed the national "tax freedom day" as Tuesday this year.

"The national date is slightly later than Florida's because our state and local governments take proportionately less from taxpayers' pockets than other states take from that citizens, although the gap is steadily narrowing." Florida TaxWatch said.

### House Panel Passes State Plan

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - The House Appropriations Committee approved a version of the Comprehensive State Plan Friday after abandoning an attempt to debate each of 269 proposed amendments.

The full House was scheduled to take up the committee's handlwork - a version of the plan Gov. Bob Graham and the Cabinet spent much of the past year troning out — on Tuesday morning. Another version of the plan is pending

The plan is an attempt to guide Florida's growth into the next century. It would toughen environmental protection laws and spur both qualitative and quantitative improvements to the state's tranportation systems, schools, hospitals, prisons and other services.

According to estimates by Graham and House Appropriations staff, the state would spend between \$32 billion and \$34 billion if each of the plan's provisions were enacted today. Accounting for inflation, House leaders expect the plan to cost nearly \$100 billion by 1995.



# Monday's Shuttle Flight A Spacelab Mission

**UPI** Science Writer

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) - Five NASA astronauts, two civilian scientists, a pair of feisty monkeys and two dozen doomed rats are set to take off aboard the shuttle Challenger Monday on a weeklong Spacelab science expedition.

Challenger's blastoff, scheduled for noon EST. on the 17th shuttle mission follows the landing of its sistership Discovery by Just 10 days.

The rats, which will be sacrificed after the flight, and the squirrel monkeys are simply going along to test sophisticated space cages that will be used on future Spacelab life science missions.

For commander Robert Overmyer, co-pilot Frederick Gregory and crew members Don Lind, Norman Thagard. William Thornton, Lodewijk van den Berg and Taylor Wang, the flight means seven days of two-shift, around-the-clock work.

"We have a very specific mission, that is, to maximize the scientific return from Spacelab." Overmyer said in an interview.

The beauty, of course, of a 24 hour operation is that you're doing scientific data return for 24 hours. That's like a flying a 14-day mission in a one-shift operation, so you really maximize the science return."

Thornton and Thagard, both astronautphysicians, each have a previous shuttle mission. to their credit as does Overmyer. Wang is a physicist at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in

A 30-hour fluid dynamics experiment will study the behavior of small drops suspended by sound waves. The study could yield valuable information about containerless processing, which in turn could prove useful for metallurgy and chemical engineering.

Pasadena, Calif., and van den Berg is a scientist with EG&G Energy Measurements Inc. of Goleta.

"I think probably the most significant thing from my standpoint, we are sending scientists into orbit to operate the experiments they have originated," said Lind, a physicist-astronaut who has waited 19 years for his first space flight.

The shuttle fliers plan to conduct 15 ambitious experiments throughout the Spacelab mission to study materials processing, life sciences, Earth's environment, astrophysics and fluid dynamics. Twelve of the experiments are sponsored by American scientists, two by French scientists and one by researchers in India

In addition, two small satellites will be launched from canisters in the payload bay near

One, called NUSAT, will be used to calibrate air traffic control radars and the other, called GLOMR for global low-orbiting message relay satellite, will be used by the Navy for controlling oceanographic sensors. Such a system eventually could be used to track enemy submarines.

NUSAT weighs about 115 pounds and is valued at \$1.5 million, mostly in donated parts and labor. Glomr is a \$1 million 150-pound satellite. Challenger's mission marks the second flight of

Spacelab, a \$1 billion European-built laboratory module carried in the shuttle's 60-foot-long payload bay and connected to the ship's airlock by a 19-foot-long tunnel.

The laboratory module is 23 feet long and 13 feet wide, providing a roomy shirt-sleeve environment for the crew.

"The whole Spacelab series is a preview to the space station," said Lind. "This is a major national science facility and we're doing some very, very good things for a lot of fields."

Challenger last flew in October. The spaceship was grounded in November because of trouble with its heat insulation tiles and repairs were not completed until early March.

Mission managers originally planned to include four squirrel monkeys on the flight. But 95 percent of the species carries a non-human herpes virus and the space agency decided late in the program to include only virus-free subjects.

Four such specimens were found but only two could be trained in time to operate their cages' food and water systems.

The monkeys will not be sacrificed but the rats. will be killed after the flight for a series of medical studies to learn more about the physiological changes that occur during weightlessness.

Four of the two dozen rodents will have surgically implanted sensors that will radio vital data to recorders during the mission. Barring an emergency, the crew has no plans to interact with any of the animals during the flight other than to observe them periodically to ensure they are comfortable.

Thornton observed the behavior of six rats during the eighth shuttle mission and he said by the end of that flight, "some of those rats literally were doing backwards somersaults."

"They were enjoying weightlessness and the monkeys - I can't wait to see what the monkeys do. I just wish the cages were larger so we could see their full repertory.

During the first day of the flight, a wide-field camera will be used to make a survey of the sky in the ultraviolet region of the spectrum.

Ultraviolet radiation is given off by young high-temperature stars and by massive stars nearing the end of their lifetime, and such radiation is reflected by interstellar gas and dust-Ultraviolet astronomy could offer insights into the distribution of matter in the universe.

"They want to achieve the ability to conduct an unpunished first nuclear strike. Our attitude is fundamentally different - outer space cannot be used as an arena for military threat," Gorbachev said.

The agency said the agreement to extend the East bloc defense treaty was signed by leaders of the seven pact states. Czechoslovakia. Poland, Hungary, East Germany. Bulgaria, Romania, and the Soviet Union. The treaty was

extended for 20 years. "So long as NATO exists and the threat to European and world peace also exists, the socialist countries will strengthen their defensive alliance, and increase their efforts

tor the sake of disarmament, peace and the dissolution of military blocs," the agency said.

'The unanimous decision to prolong the treaty is dictated by the necessity of maintaining the infallible security of the allied countries. Considering the extent of the threat of war, the Warsaw Pact will continue to undertake steps to keep their common defense capability at appropriate levels," PAP said.

Gorbachev's presence at the Warsaw Pact summit marked his first trip abroad since he came to power on March 1 following the death of Soviet President Konstantin Chernenko.

Western observers said the decision to hold the summit in Warsaw and Gorbachev's presence at the meeting demonstrated Moscow's tacit approval of the policies of the Polish leader. Gen. Wojceich Jaruzelski.

Polish and foreign journalists were not permitted to cover the summit, initially scheduled for January but postponed because of Chernenko's illness.

### IN BRIEF Fire Kills Up To 80 At Mental Hospital

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (UPI) - Firefighters searched the charred interior of a mental hospital today for more victims of a fire that killed as many as 80 patients, many of them sedated and trapped in their beds.

The DYN news agency said 80 people were killed in the blaze early Friday at the seven-story Saint Emiliene clinic in the neighborhood of Saavedra, a middle class section of the Argentine capital.

Public health secretary Teodor Pugo said that of 410 padents, only 200 escaped unharmed. He estimated the number of dead at between 50 and 60, but was unable to give a precise account of the others.

Witnesses said the fire began shortly before midnight on the fourth floor of the building, where elderly psychiatric patients were housed. Its cause was not immediately

Some of the unharmed patients were transferred to other psychiatric hospitals around the city, while others were given temporary shelter by families in the neighborhood. Still others wandered off into the streets.

### Troops Ordered To Sidon

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) - The Lebanese army ordered troops to the Sidon area and a general strike was called in Christian east Beirul today to protest the storming of seven Christian villages by Palestinian and Moslem fighters.

Lebanese soldiers reported early today to southern Lebanese army barracks at Kfar Falous and Salhiyeh in the Sidon area where Palestinian and Moslem fighters stormed a group of Christian villages Friday.

The army command order was issued after some 1.500 parents and students in Christian east Beirut marched on the Defense Ministry. They were protesting the army's failure to provide security for Christian villages overlooking Sidon after Beirut-based "Lebanese Forces" militiamen withdrew as part of a cease-fire.

Hundreds of Palestinians and leftist Moslem fighters stormed seven mostly abandoned villages in apparent revenge for five weeks of shelling and fighting in Sidon and nearby refugee camps.

#### 4 Die In Racial Violence

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (UPI) - A black policeman opened fire on a crowd of about 500 blacks attacking his home, fatally shooting a man as renewed racial violence killed four others in black townships,

A police spokesman said the crowd apparently was walking to a wake Friday at the home of a victim of the violence in Cradock's Lingilithe black township, about 125 miles north of Port Elizabeth, when the group began stoning the policeman's home.

The officer fired a shotgun, killing one man and slightly injuring three others, the spokesman said.

Black mobs have in the past attacked blacks for being what they called "government stooges."

The Eastern Cape region, with Port Elizabeth at its hub, has been the focal point of anti-government violence in the past months. Since the beginning of the year at least 135 Macks have been killed in the unrest

### Ortega Seeking Aid From Soviets; Warns U.S. Against Backing Rebels

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (UPI) — President Daniel Ortega, leaving for Moscow to seek aid for his country's troubled economy, warned Prestdent Reagan's Nicaragua.'

Ortega left for Moscow Friday amid reports from Washington that Reagan, stung by Tuesday's congressional vote against \$14 million in aid to the Contra rebels, would seek a "full family" of measures to pressure the leftist government away from its Markint course.

"It would appear that President Reagan lus not resigned himself to Congress' decision and is insisting on new measures, new actions, and another package of financing for counterrevolutionary forces." Ortega told reporters before his departure.

"After all this over the \$14 million, we can see the American people want a peaceful solution, not the violent path the Reagan administration is imposing. This violent path will result in American youth having to join a war against Nicaragua." Ortega said.

Reagan's "completely misguided" policies, including a veto of funding from the Inter-American Development Bank for the country's war-shattered economy, were part of the reason for his Moscow trip, the 39-year-old president said.

County's chief law enforcement officer. Sheriff John Polk doesn't worry about such legal niceties. He said the situation would be clearly black and white if someone entered his home while he and his wife slept.

"I'll tell you," Polk said, when people break into homes they know the penalty and I guarantee you if they break into my home at night and nobody's there but my wife and myself and we're in bed, if I see somebody walking by I'm going

"It's my personal feeling if somebody breaks into your house, especially at night, like a cat burglar, they will kill you if they have to

"It's a threat to my life if they come into my house. That house doesn't belong to them and they've got no damn business in there." Polk said.

As he sees it the fact that an intruder was in his home would in itself be a threat to life and safety.

"I'm going to kill 'em," Polk said, despite Marblestone's cau-

Marblestone also said that if a person is on your property, has approached your house, but not entered, they haven't yet committed a crime and "you'd better not shoot." But he added, "every case is separate and distinct."

A naked man with a knife in his mouth entering the home of a woman alone, would, he said, probably be perceived under the law as a situation in which the use of deadly force in self-

defense would be justified.

But, Marblestone said, "If it's 12-year-old kids and you hear them say, 'Let's go in and steal the cookies,' and you know all they're going to do is break in and steal the cookie jar and leave, you shoot that kid, you're going to be indicted by the grandjury for murder."

If you catch a person lurking outside your home, or even crawling through a window. Marblestone said, you can't use deadly force to persuade them to stick around until police arrive. You can, he said, attempt to detain a suspect for the police. but unless they present a threat to your life or there is an imminent danger of you suffering great injury at the hands of the suspect, you had better take care how you handle the situa-

If you're holding at gunpoint a burglar who has just tried to take off with your TV and you any case based on racial imdrop your gun and it accidentally fires and wounds the intruder, Marblestone said you may be charged or the shooting may be determined "excusable" or "Justifiable," it all depends on how authorities evaluate your particular case.

Even if you aren't arrested immediately, that doesn't mean you're off the hook. Lawmen may continue to probe the case and turn their findings over to the State Attorney, who after a review of the allegations might decide there was criminal conduct on your part and you should have to face the legal

The State Attorney could also call on a grand jury to review the case and decide if you should be

Bar For a small fee each month, policy holders and their families can receive legal help ranging from will preparation to defense in criminal cases, according to Wes Graham, vice president of Midwest Mutual, one of the largest of seven companies offering such services in Florida.

Some companies offer individual policies as well as group plans, although the group plans generally offer wider coverage.

The Florida Bar was the first bar association in the United States to promote legal insurance, according to John Harkness Jr., executive director of the Bar. And according to industry figures, the number of Florida residents buying legal insurance has doubled in the past two years.

Florida Insurance Department (FID) figures show premiums for legal insurance jumped almost 100 percent between Dec. 1983 and Dec. 1984. During the first nine months of 1983, policy holders paid about \$289,000 in legal insurance premiums. During a similar period in 1984, the total amount of premiums surged to \$543,000, indicating not necessarily higher premiums but more subscribers, FID said

The popularity of legal insur-

ance is growing because the need for a lawyer in day-to-day living is increasing, prompting a search for inexpensive ways to get legal advice, Graham said.

Low cost, easy access and quality of service are the major selling points, he said.

A recent Bar survey of Florida lawyers shows average hourly tees run from \$75 to \$150. The legal insurance plans provide the same quality of coverage for 'minimal cost," Harkness said, and under most policies, the attorney's bill is paid in full:

The plans do not cover court costs and filing fees. Attorney's are paid a prearranged rate for their work. The rate reflects the usual cost for various services. Graham said. This new form of low-cost legal

aid is not expected to clog the courts because the majority of claims are for legal matters that do not require a court appearance, Graham said. Midwest Mutual - whose business has doubled nationally

since 1982 - offers only group plans while other companies. such as Pre-Paid Legal Services Inc. of Florida, offers individual plans as well as group rates. ing legal insurance, five are

authorized to provide just legal Midwest Mutual and Bankers costs his company pays for. Multiple Line Insurance Co., provide other types of insurance

Midwest Mutual group members pay a flat monthly fee of house, he said. Another 25 about \$8 for one-person coverage and about \$10 a month for family coverage. Midwest has more than 10,000 members in next largest group of claims one group plan serving retired involves civil suits, followed by Florida. A second plan covers workers of the Dade County School Board.

The group plans are similar to medical insurance plans.

A company, or group, takes out a policy and then offers the services to its members. If a member of the group or an employee wants the coverage, the premium is usually deducted from his or her paycheck.

When a participant wants legal advice, he gets a form from the group or employer, selects an attorney from a list of participating lawyers, and makes an appointment.

### Campbell Gets Nudge For The Stretch Push

Special to the Herald All season long, Cliff Campbell had been waiting for the push. Although there have been others on the track, the multi-talented Seminole High senior had been virtually running alone.

Like a sleeping glant. Campbell wasn't making a lot of noise. People knew he was there; they knew what he was capable of doing, yet, there wasn't much reason for alarm. Campbell was just biding his time, winning races

quietly. Now, given the necessary Incentive - the nudge -

Campbell has awoken. Friday night in the Class AAAA, District 9 meet at Lake Howell, Campbell ran Florida's fastest quarter mile this year, 47.6. The clocking was just .1 seconds off his best, run last year. Campbell nees to strut his stuff; coming off an ankle injury, he had something to prove.

With the Regionals next Wednesday and the State Meet following, the competition will get serious. For Cambell, It's time to get ready, to get down to business, and he knows it.

"I was running faster last year because I had better competition," he said two days before the District meet. "I think I'm doing pretty good. but I could do better. I know I can run faster if I have somebody in front of me."

That hasn't been often but coming into the District 9 competition. Campbell was ranked third in the state, according to Seminole Coach Ken Brauman.

Like Campbell, Brauman suggests a lack of competition has kept the standout quarter-miler from equalling last year's performance. He adds, however, that Campbell has indeed improved. "I think he's matured as an athlete a great deal," said Brauman

about Campbell, whose previous best in 1985 was 48.1. "He has much more confidence in his ability, because of that, he's worked harder."

Campbell contends that Brauman has helped parlay that hard work into success. "He's shown me how to run a quarter, how to be loose, how to hold my hands, and breathing techniques - things I hadn't really learned before," suggested the 5-foot-10%, 175-pounder.

He adds the squad's numerous other stars have made it easier to excell. "They give me support, knowing if I get hurt, they'll be somebody to fall back on," he said.

Brauman came to Seminole two years ago from Palatka, replacing Hank Daviero, With philosophies and a winning tradition in 11 years, he led Palatka High to 10 district titles, seven regional crowns and two state championships.

The coach, though, returns much of the credit to the star performer, suggesting Campbell was a winner even before his arrival. "First of all. he's an excellent athlete." Brauman said, "He has the ability to become a great quarter-miler someday. You have to start with that ability. Secondly, he has the desire to become better.

"He's a very smooth runner, too. He runs smooth the entire race. And he has a tremendous attitude, very coachablc.

The soft-spoken Campbell downplays his emergence as a standout. "I had a little speed, and I just kept working," said Campbell, who began running track as a freshman and started concentrating on the 440 a year later. "I had the desire, and it came naturally."



# Newborns Need Extra Attention To Survive

One of the kittens arrived dead. The owners said it was barely breathing when they started for the clinic. A fourth kitten had died earlier that morning. They were just about 4 weeks old now and both kittens were so weak that they barely noticed the commotion going on around them.

A quick physical exam showed that the animals were extremely pale, were covered with fleas, and their body temperatures were low. When told about the anemia the owners asked why it had happened and what could be done about it.

This is a fairly common problem which occurs when you have a flea infestation when young animals are present. "We have discussed what medically should be done after you have adopted a young cat or dog, but what should you consider.

with newborn animals.

Many animals which are conceived never live long enough to be born. Some are lost to genetic problems and infections while still in the uterus. If death occurs early in pregnancy there may be little indication of a problem since the embryo is usually absorbed. If a serious problem occurs later in pregnancy the fetus may be aborted or stillborn. For those that make it to the outside world there are still few guarantees. Some of these animals will be born under owners whose sense of responsibility stops at simple ownership.

Now these new additions are exposed to all the problems of the adult world without the adult capacity to deal with them. Their immune system, which protects them from many infectious agents are still developing. Some protection from disease is passed to the fetus in the womb and this is added to by the first portion of the mother's milk, the colostrum. Unfortunately the mother can not pass on the same degree of protection from some of the common parasites such as fleas and intestinal worms. In fact the mother often acts as the carrier for these problems.

Hookworms and roundworms can be passed from mother directly to offspring. Both have a short preparent period (time for the worm to gofrom egg stage to a reproductive adult) of less

than three weeks. Problems from the worms can start two and a half weeks after infection. At the same, time the fleas are becoming a problem Remember from our flea discussion that a new generation of fleas can be produced every three weeks. The newborn is not capable of removing these large numbers of fleas so that they are continually robbing the animal of blood. As the anemia progresses the animals become depressed and sluggish. They eventually quit nursing and die from a combination of anemia, hypoglycemia flow blood sugar), and hypothermia flow body temperature.

Let's go back to the exam room and see what the vet recommends "Something must be done soon or these two will be lost also." The exam needs to be cut short. The owner has only two options at this point, do nothing and they will most likely die, or go for broke and transfuse

We will take for granted that the owner opts for treatment. The kittens were taken to the treatment area and placed on a heating pad while blood is collected from a donar cat kept at the hospital. The kittens are given the blood immediately after collection. The amount of blood given varies with the size of the youngster and usually amounts to 2-3 teaspoons (10-15 cc/s).

The blood provides not only red blood cells but also some energy in the form of blood proteins and blood sugar

Often the response to the transfusion is rapid. The animal's attitude may dramatically improve and it will begin to increase its activity. Killing the fleas is as important as the transfusion. Usually this is done with a compound containing pyrethrins which are comparitively safe. Keep in mind that these compounds often contain alcohol which if put on too heavily can decrease the body temperature by causing an increase in evaporation. To better control the application it is better to spray the material on your hands and apply with you fingertips especially around the face, cars and nose.

Followup treatment at home is also important. Energy intake must be maintained, the animals kept warm, and the fleas kept off. The pyrethrin compound may be used every few days if needed from supplements should be given for 10 days to two weeks since each red cell that was lost contained a small amount of the body's iron content. Production of new red blood cells is dependent on iron being present. Without it recovery may be slowed but don't over supple-



President Reagan, whose two campaigns for the presidency have demonstrated a deft ability to strike a sonorous religious chord among people, has recently hit some sour notes with two major faith groups

Those troubled by recent presidential words and deeds include large numbers of Roman Catholics, including Pope John Paul It's ambassador to the United States, and most of the leadership of U.S. Jewish organizations.

Reagan's problems stem from two separate events, both of which unfolded with the rapidity of Washington's cherry blossoms in spring his decision to forgo visiting a and participating at the time.

Reagan's problems with U.S. Jews began at a March 21 news conference when he said he had decided to pass up an opportunity to visit the Dachau death camp because Germans have had unnecessary "guilt feelings" imposed on them, and that "few-(Germans) are alive that can remember even the war, and certainly none who were adults

The problem was compounded when it was announced that Reagan would honor members of the SS, buried at a military cemetary at Bitburg, Germany

"The visit to a cemetary with SS is to me inconceivable," said Elic Wiesel, chairman of the United States Holocaust Memorial Council and a foremost authority on the destruction of 6 million Jews during the

On two successive days, Reagan made statements implying papal support for his request for \$14 million in aid for the Nicaraguan rebels, one of the most bitterly tought issues early in his second term.

### Doubters Attack Faith Fundamentals

Not everyone is a believer like you and me. It might be reassuring to be told that the reason for the lack of faith on the part of non-believers is that they don't know their Bible.

That, however, is not always the case. Most of the scholars who addressed the International Symposium on Jesus and the Gospels at the University of Michigan this month were Bible and clergymen. One was an ordained Anglican priest.

They raised such questions as Did Jesus really live? What evidence is there that he was divine? Was he a magician?

Jesus books 'scholars' who have no standing

If he meant this condemnation to apply to Smith, he was probably wrong. A Roman Catholic scholar who disputed Smith's thesis called him nevertheless "a first-rate scholar." Another acknowledged Smith's "reputation as a meticulous scholar and theologian."

In any case, The Secret Gospel wanted to follow him, exorcism—threw theological circles into turmoil. There had been nothing like it since The Passover Plot escapes, foreknowledge and became a best-seller a decade

It was in that book that Hugh Schonfield contended that Jesus planned his own crucifixion. arranging to be given a drug on the cross that would render him unconscious and make him appear dead. He then was removed from the cross by accomplices who took him to a tomb, where he was resuscitated.

# Clergy Malpractice Suit Gets Underway

Two born again Christians are among jurors who will decide if a church should be held liable for the suicide of a man who had sought counseling from the religious group's pastors. The case is believed to be the first clergy. malpractice lawsuit to go to trial.

Opening statements in the \$1 million suit filed against Grace Community Church in 1980 by the victim's father. Walter Nally, began Wednedfsu. The trial is expected to last two months.

Although the trial will be held at the Glendale courthouse, jury selection before Superior Court Judge Joseph Kalin took place at the Burbank Hollday Inn because of the unusually large. pool of 150 jurors called in the

Nally's lawyer, Edward Barker, who earlier said it might be difficult picking a jury because of the emotional issues involved, said he was pleased

Barker said he considered it a victory to get the case to trial-

Church attorney Samuel Ericsson insisted the issue did not belong in court.

Nally filed the suit against the church, one of the largest in Los-Angeles County, one year after his son, Ken. 24. killed himself with a shotgun blast.

Nally claimed the church's pastors were negligent in giving advice to the troubled young man in the final days of his life.

The suit accuses the Rev. John MacArthur and three other pastors of "outrageous conduct" for allegedly discouraging him from seeking professional psychological help because of their blas against secular counseling.


The suit was dismissed for insufficient grounds in 1981, but was reinstated by an appeals court last year. The California Supreme Court decided the appeals court ruling could be used as law for the case, but could not with the panel chosen in just two - be quoted as precedent in future similar cases. 



Dr. Jean Bowers, head paychologist for the Seminole schools, said the district's paychologists spend a great portion of their time performing IQ tests on students to determine if they have learning disabilities or are exceptionally intelligent.



# Kent State, Then And Now

### Protesters Give Way To Career-Oriented Students And ROTC Cadets

By Elizabeth Neus

KENT, Ohio (UPI) - Kent State - once a rallying cry for Vietnam protesters - is just like any other college these days. Career-oriented students hit the books, administrators worry about enrollment and uniformed ROTC cadets

roam the campus unharassed. It was a different story on May 4, 1970.

On that warm spring Monday 15 years ago, four students were killed and nine others wounded when National Guardsmen fired on them during a protest of the U.S. invasion of Cambodia.

To this day, no one knows why the National Guard fired.

Some speculate the guardsmen may have thought the crowd, swelled by students on their way home from noontime classes, was closing in on them; but many pictures taken that day show relatively few students near the Guard.

For three days before the shootings there had been numerous anti-war rallies and arrests and the campus ROTC building was burned. Gov. James Rhodes called in the Guard, saying he feared the presence of outside agitators and additional violence.

The killings made Kent State a focus of national attention for several years, and a symbol of the angry divisions of the Vietnam era.

"On campus, they refer to it as "the shootings," or 'May 4, 1970,'" says campus spokesman Jan Zima "Off campus they just call it "Kent State" -'Oh, we don't want another Kent State' - and that speaks paragraphs and volumes without explanation.

The campus, located in a small middle-class town in northeast Ohio, is peppered with reminders of the shootings. The school hands out brochures with a map of the shooting site and a

brief article explaining May 4 and its altermath. as well as a reprint of an alumni magazine article detailing the events of that day.

There are also memorials as varied as an M-1 bullet hole in a sculpture made of quarter-inchthick steel and the creation of a center to study peaceful ways of change. A sociology professor who was there that day teaches a class on the shootings and subsequent events.

A student organization holds candlelight vigils and commemoration ceremonies every year in the Prentice Hall parking lot where Jeffery Miller. Alltson Krause, William Schroeder and Sandra Scheuer were killed.

In January, the Kent State board of trustees approved the construction of a school sponsored memorial many felt necessary to heal the

emotional wounds that still linger-"I suspect the events of May 1-4 are going to be more than just a footnote to the Vietnam War." says KSU president Michael Schwartz. "One of the most important domestic events (of the Victnam era) happened here. If history is used properly, it's a beginning."

Sociology professor Jerry M. Lewis, who was in the line of fire in 1970 and teaches a class called "May 4 and Its Aftermath," says the current administration's willingness to discuss the

shootings is a dramatic change. "You can understand that," he says. "Universities don't want rapes brought up, they don't want lecherous profs brought up, they don't want buildings failing down, they don't want anything had brought up if they can avoid it because of

enrollment. "Kent State ... is the ultimate thing you don't bring up."

### Pete Knowles' Retirement

Tuesday will be the last day City Manager Warren E. Pete Knowles serves Sanford in his official capacity as the city's chief administrator.

Knowles officially joins the ranks of the retired Tuesday, ending a career that spans 32 years. Only the first seven of them beginning in 1953 - not as city manager, but as city engineer.

No matter how you slice it, 32 years in one city, 25 of them as city manager, is a long time, and it's not commonplace.

The prime reason for that is, it isn't easy for an administrator to survive the political changes in a municipality's evolution. especially the changes that come with new city commissioners with fresh ideas.

But Knowles not only has survived all those years, he's won the respect and admiration of every commissioner he's served under. Indeed, a public official recently remarked that he was pleasantly surprised to see Knowles survive, even when commission candidates in the past had run for office successfully on the promise they'd "get" Knowles. That public official also observed that after Knowles' potential adversaries gained office, it didn't take long for them to realize that the last thing they wanted to do was to fire Pete Knowles. Not because of any intimidation. Not because of any fears. But because they came to know what others had known all along: One would have to search far and wide to find an administrator as qualified, as dedicated, as totally committed to serving his community in the best possible manner, as Knowles.

What they also quickly learned was that when Pete Knowles attended city commission meetings, he was fully prepared to answer any and all questions on any agenda issue, regardless of its complexity.

And when some city commissioners in the past confessed their utter confusion on a particular issue, and their reluctance to without expert advice, they found that the advice Knowles was able to provide was generally the best course the commission could have taken.

And Knowles' expertise in municipal affairs was not limited to Sanford. More than once Knowles was called upon by other city managers and public officials in cities throughout Seminole County to guide them through some complex problem. Some of those calls for help came from managers around the state, and sometimes from cities in other states. Knowles' reputation carried outside the United States, too.

It is because Knowles always came through when the chips were down and expert advice was needed that he not only survived as long as he did, but also earned the respect of so many over the years A respect surely envied by his peers.

Sanford is much better off today for having had Pete Knowles at the administrative helm.

### RUSTY BROWN Hitting The Open Road

The multi-million-dollar hotel industry is smart to be vying for business from women these days

After all, we are an important marketing target, now making up 30 percent of this country's travelers - up from just 2 percent a decade ago. Furthermore, women are more likely than men to tack vacation time onto a business trip. which can mean more money for the hotels.

All this does not mean that businesswomen expect special treatment. We don't like segregated "women's floors," for example, That was an idea that the Hilton Hotel Corp. introduced in the late '60s. But most women considered it reverse discrimination and didn't like II.

We do, however, expect our rooms to have as many skirt hangers as pants hangers. We like lotions, shower caps, fragrant soaps and good lighting in the bath.

A few years ago, Best Western International, the world's largest chain of innkeepers with more than 50 million guests annually, developed a set of guidelines to attract the burgeoning female market. These included such room items as full-length mirrors, dead-bolt locks, security peepholes in the doors, and a third sheet on top of the blanket.

The guidelines also recommended good lighting in hallways and parking areas and convenient access to trons, froning boards and hair dryers.

Ramada linis were among the first to install well-lit lobby bars that are much less forbidding to women

As a corporate vice president told me, "I will go into an open bar or an atrium, but not a darkened lounge where a man is apt to think I'm there to be picked up."

She appreciates a maitre d' sensitive enough to realize that a woman eating alone prefers a table on the side rather than a conspicuous spot in the middle of the room: There are too many oddballs who keep passing by and asking if you wouldn't like some company. That's not asking for special treatment. That's just being aware of a fact-of-life harassment." The executive feels it's no different than a hotel providing traveling executives male or female - with secretarial services if needed.

A 1984 survey of 286 women travelers in the Minneapolis St. Paul area indicated that businesswomen like 24-hour room service with menus that include lighter foods such as salads and soups. They also like delivery of local newspapers, The Wall Street Journal or USA Today, as do businessmen.

### **Apartheid Decision**

The battle against American complicity in the policies of South Africa will soon move from the streets back into the committee

That doesn't mean that the almost daily arrests outside the South African Embassy in Washington will come to a halt, or that the growing protests in cities across the country will slacken or

It does mean that the demonstrations and continued unrest in South Africa itself - coupled with that country's brutal response - has made it likely that Congress will impose some sanctions on the apartheid regime this year. The anti-apartheid movement

succeeded in getting strong legislation through the House in 1984.

If passed by the Senate, it would have prohibited bank loans to South Africa, forbidden the sale of Krugerrands (the South African gold coin) in this country, banned new American investments in South Africa, and forbidden the sale of American computers to the Pretoria government.

In modified form, the Housepassed legislation, now called the Anti-Apartheid Act of 1985, is pending in the Senate.

Other legislation pending in both Houses would apply more stringent restrictions, including barring all trade with South Africa, denying South African planes landing rights in the United States, and ending present investments by American corporations in the white-ruled

Two votes taken in Congress this year give some hint that sentiment has shifted in favor of some kind of legislation against South Africa. On March 27, the Senate Foreign

Relations Committee voted 16 to 1 for a bill that would require President Reagan to report in two years on South Africa's master-race policies, and to determine then whether the United States should impose sanctions. On April 3, as the latest round of killings by South African security forces continued, the Senate passed a non-binding resolution condemning South Africa for the persecution of its voteless 72-percent-black majority.

The Senate asked Secretary of State George Shultz to report on the carnage, and the House Democratic Caucus called for passage of legislation punishing South Africa for its brutality.

Action on the legislation began in mid-April with hearings on a bill introduced by Sen. Richard Lugar, R-Ind., chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee. Last year he urged the administration to speak out more forcefully on the issue. Now Lugar will ask the committee and the Congress to approve forcing all American firms doing business in South Africa to subscribe to a voluntary code. It calls for equal pay for all workers, job training, a desegregated workplace, and investments aimed at improving the living conditions of black workers.

The Lugar bill, and the pending Anti-Apartheid Act, are just two of more than 20 pieces of legislation that would affect U.S. relations with South Africa. Supporters of the anti-apartheid movement believe the number of bills and resolutions pending demonstrate the depth of feeling against South Africa.

# Sickness, **Feedback**

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) - Two scientists aboard the shuttle Challenger next week will try to combat space sickness with thought control in an experiment to del termine if biofeedback can minimize unpleasant symptoms

The ailment affects about 50 percent of those who fly in space and its treatment is a major concernt to NASA scientists

Symptoms include reduced stom! ach activity, changes in blood flow to the hands and feet, vomiting and in some cases nausca. While the symptoms tend to disappear in two to four days, the sickness is art unpleasant distraction that reduces efficiency.

"Unlike sea-stekness where you have a lot of vomitting and nausea. here you just have a sudden episode. of vointting and it's over," said Dr. William Thornton, a physician; aboard Challenger who has closely; studied the malady.

"The bowels, or the stomach? have stopped. The stomach just absolutely stops. You just don't feet good. You'd like to go off in a corner

During Challenger's mission. Taylor Wang and Lodewijk van den! Berg, both civilian scientists on board to operate materials processing exeriments, will take turns wearing sensors and a Dick Tracy wrist unit that will display heart rate, respiration, sweat and bloods

# Was Bomb Test Report Squelched?

WASHINGTON - When a U.S. White House panel may have been spy satellite reported an apparent nuclear explosion in the ocean off South Africa in September 1979, President Carter appointed a panel of distinguished scientists to determine exactly what had triggered the satellite's signal.

After atudying the matter for several months - including evidence from the CIA and the Pentagon - the panel of scientists concluded that certain discrepancies in the satellite's signal were probably not caused an an "earth" event, such as a nuclear blast but by a "space" event, possibly a collision with a small meteoroid.

How did the scientists reach this surprising decision, which contradicted evidence that the satellite had, in fact, accurately reported a nuclear test?

Rep. John Conyers, D-Mich., and the Washington Office on Africa, a public-interest group, think the

southern Africa "Camp David" agreement, which would have been a foreign policy triumph for the president. Such an agreement might not have canceled the Tehran hostage crisis - which erupted while the panel was still deliberating - but it would have helped

Frank Press, who was Carter's science adviser, discounts the suggestion of political pressure. "I don't remember any political considerations at the time." he said.

The Conyers-Washington Office on Africa draft report makes much of the fact that a Navy Research Laboratory study, which was done at the time and concluded that there had been a nuclear explosion, was "suppressed" by the White House and apparently disregarded by the scientific panel. The details of the Navy study have been kept under wraps until now.

Press said the White House panel had been briefed by the Navy

researchers, but received only "preliminary" information. As for the Convers Washington Office on Africa draft report's criticism of a lengthy delay in the release of the White House panel's report, Press said that the information was under review for several months.

Actually, the White House panel's conclusion was judiciously ambiguous. What it said was: "Although we cannot rule out the possibility that this (satellite) signal was of nuclear origin, the panel considers it more likely that the signal was of one of the 'zoo' events (unexplained anomaious signals obtained from Vela satellites), possibly a consequence of the impact of a small meteoroid on the satellite."

Footnote: Several members of the White House panel said they still believe the explosion was nonnuclear and that nothing was "suppressed."

# It's Time To End Nuclear MADness

Freedoms Foundation Features The press calls it "Star Wars." The Soviets call it "the militarization of outer space." The Pentagon calls it "SDL" The American public, quite understandably, doesn't know what they're all talking about.

They're talking about the President's Strategic Defense Initiative - a plan announced on March 23, 1983, to develop a system that would defend the United States from a nuclear missile attack. Since the debate on this subject is so important, some common myths about it should be debunked.

First, the objective: despite the catchy "Star Wars" label, the idea of ballistic missile defense has nothing to do with starting a war. To the contrary, its purpose is to stop war by shooting down an aggressor's missiles or warheads while they are in flight.

Second, we should understand that, for all the billions we now spend on defense, no part of our defense establishment actually defends the U.S. from nuclear attack. If we are attacked, our only option is to launch a retaliatory nuclear strike, since we have no capability to shoot down incoming

In all areas of defense except nuclear strategy, it is common sense to deter-

aggression in two ways: I) by being SALT, must be added to the numerous existing hardware, such as heastcapable of self-protection (the shield). and 2) by being capable of retaliation (the sword). When it comes to nuclear deterrence. U.S. policy has been to forgo self-defense, and to wield the sword without the shield

Nuclear "deterrence" is achieved when our military capabilities convince a potential adversary that an attack on the United States would be a big mistake. Under the SALT and ABM Treaties of the 1970's, the U.S. and the Soviet Union decided to achieve mutual assured deterrence by prohibiting defensive systems, and by limiting the size of offensive nuclear arsenals. Deterrence was to be based on the knowledge that the side initiating a first-strike nuclear attack would experience the same holocaust, after retaliation. This threat of Armageddon is the basis of today's nuclear security: it is the theory of "Mutual Assured Destruction," or "MAD,"

If arms control had worked according to design, there might not be reason to be dissatisfied with the current state of affairs. But arms control has not engendered mutual restraint: the Soviets have added 3,400 warheads just since the signing of SALT II in 1979. The Soviet buildup, permissible under

Soviet treaty violations, including Soviet ABM developments in violation of the ABM Treaty of 1972

The U.S strategic deterrent needs to be modernized to deny the Soviets the ability to gain a crippling first strike potential. But are offensive forces the only way to ensure security? Must the nuclear balance "ly only on the threat of destruction"

These are the questions that led President Reagan to propose a Strategic Defense Initiative. His desire is to create a defensive system that will threaten missiles, not cittes, and "save lives," rather than "avenge them" Such a system would strengthen deterrence, making war less likely, and end our sole reliance on the MAD concept. offering instead hope for survival.

How would it work? A defensive system, as presently envisioned, would use both existing and new technologies. to intercept missiles at various points in their flight.

First, we would use ground radars and surface-to-air missiles around our missile silos to protect them from attack. This could be done with technology that has long been avail-

Other layers of defense would operate in space. These defenses could use

seeking missiles launched from satellites or the projectile which stopped a dummy missile 100 miles above the earth in a successful test last June. Or they could use new technologies, now under research and development, to create space-based weapons to stop missiles at other points in space before they descend through the atmosphere toward their targets.

The mere existence of such a layered system, even if it is less than perfect, would greatly reduce the likelihood of nuclear war. No Soviet commander. knowing that the vast majority of his nuclear warheads would not reach their targets, would be likely to launch a first-srike against the U.S.

The concept of ballistic missile detense is revolutionary because, for the first time in the nuclear era, it offers protection to populations. In addition to deterring a superpower first strike, it would offer protection against a nuclear missile that might be launched some day in the future by a terrorist nation

To people who are concerned about nuclear security and the effectiveness or morality of deterrence, this system represents a peaceful, hopeful use of American technology that deserves consideration and support

### **Medicare PROs Decide On Care** Reimbursement

Q. I was told I need to have surgery, but a PRO would have to judge if was reimbursable by Medicare. Can you tell me a little about what a PRO is?

A Although not widely known outside the hospital community, a new program was begun late last year that will affect use of hospital services by Medicare beneficiaries. Peer Review Organizations, mandated by Congress in the Social Security Act of 1983, must "certify" the appropriateness of hospital admissions by Medicare beneficiaries.

The PRO program was begun to guarantee Medicare patients do not have unnecessary surgery and to make sure patients are not admitted to hospitals needlessly. Studies have shown that the probability of having surgery depends in part on a physictan's "practice style." Some doctors recommend surgical procedures far more often than others. Generally, differences in physician behavior are explained more by "practice style" than by differences in the patients treated

PROs were also established to assure care is provided in the most appropriate and least costly setting. Where indicated. PROs will require that surgery be conducted on an "outpatient" basis. without an overnight stay in a hospital. PROs also have responsibility for assuring that minimum quality-of-care standards are maintained, despite pressures to offer care in less costly

What does the PRO actually do? Hospitals have set up a system for the review of Medicare patients being admitted for elective surgical procedures. Physicians have to explain to the PRO why a specific surgical procedure is necessary and whether inpatient or outpatient care is indicated.

The PRO also requires that certain patients with diagnoses such as pneumonta, asthma or bronchitts be specially reviewed before they are discharged. This is to prevent premature patient discharge.

What will happen if the PRO decides that a proposed surgical procedure does not meet PRO guidelines and should not be covered by Medicare?

Your physician may appeal such a decision. It will also be possible to arrange for a second optnion.

If the PRO still disagrees with the physician after the appeal process, the PRO can deny Medicare coverage for physician and hospital services. The patient should be advised of this dental. and of the fact that he or she will have to pay the full cost of care before being admitted to the hospital.

PROs are a new program and there are many questions about how they will work and about their ultimate effectiveness. Whether or not they will improve the quality of care is also a question that will be studied.



Aids is not a homosexual plague. It is a national plague. The number of cases continues to grow at an alarming rate, and it has now spread to heterosexuals, threatening the country with an

epidemic unequaled in modern times. Make no mistake about it. The 9,600 cases reported since the sexually transmitted disease was discovered in 1981 are just the tip of the iceberg. The number of people infected with AIDS is expected to mushroom in coming years to the tens of thousands. A million Americans may already have been exposed to the virus that causes AIDS. Most of them don't know it, and they continue their sexual practices, spreading the disease still further. The incubation period can be as long as five years before symptoms develop. How many more people will be exposed

The majority of Kent State students today are barely old enough to remember the shootings, and some people question why the issue is continually discussed, whether it be in class or the pages of the student newspaper.

'Most people are a little tired of hearing about it," says Allison Krause's mother, Dorts, "What else is there to say?"

Zima says students are conservative and growing more so.

"Kids simply have their heads down and they're charging," said Zima. "They have seen their parents go through some rough economic times and they've decided they're not going to go through that.

'Students are apathetic now," says Rac Murphy, 24, one of Lewis' students. "That urge to stand up for something is not there.

Lewis takes a kinder view: "If this were the 1970s, they would be liberal activists (judging) from the kind of social concern I hear them talk about. I don't think they'd be the kind of student

who would give up a whole quarter to work on the anti-war movement."

The big issue now is not so much that the students have changed but that politics have changed," says Alan Canfora, who was wounded during the 1970 protest and still works with the May 4 Task Force. "There's no draft, no unpopular war. I much prefer the situation now to the turmoil then, but things could change.

Emotions still run close to the surface in many quarters when the shootings are mentioned in 1977, campus officials decided to build a new gymnasium annex on part of the shooting site. and sparked a two-month protest.

Today, the gym annex is one of the busiest buildings on campus, and the only controversy comes from a shortage of court space:

"We had asked that the site remain the way it was," Doris Krause says coldly. "We think they could have left it the way it was."

"The pain is still there every day of your life." says Sarah Scheuer, Sandra's mother. "She'd be about 35 now. You wonder. A parent wonders. Would she be married? Would she have gone on with her career? You always wonder.'

opposed by the administration but appears to have considerable support in the Senate particularly among Democrats.

Lugar's bill would require the president to propose economic sanctions only if progress toward eliminating apartheid is not made within two years.

Kennedy and Welcker pleaded for passage of their bill to prohibit new investment in South Africa by U.S. firms.

### Jim Squires Takes A Shot At Murdoch In Book About Controversial Publisher

By United Press International Arrogant Aussie: The Rupert Murdoch Btory, by Michael Leapman,

(Lyle Stuart, 288 pp., \$14,95). This is the book that should not be judged by its cover. The "Arrogant Aussie" title and the jacket montage of some of the wilder Murdoch newspaper front pages may give the browsing book buyer the idea that this is going to be a "Godzilla eats the world press" hatchet job, along the lines of the Time magazine cover with the headline "Aussic Press Lord Terrifles Gotham" when Murdoch took over the New York Post.

No such thing, Leapman, a British 'journo" who worked on two London papers before Murdoch acquired them, has done what reads like a piece of fair reporting in tracing the controversial publisher's progress from the Australian outback to the English and American big

The reviewer has no first hand knowledge of the events attending the creation of the Murdoch empire, but from the internal evidence of the book, Leapman seems to have tried hard to give everyone his say. The author obviously is no Murdoch sycophant, but like any good pre-New Journalism reporter does not let his personal preferences overwhelm his story.

For example, his accounts of the highly publicized departure of editor Harold Evans from the London Times and of Murdoch's acquisition of the Chicago Sun-Times put both events in a somewhat different light than many of the thore heated anti-Murdoch stories of the

He does make this clear: Murdoch is an old-fashioned kind of newspaper proprictor who, without apology or subterfuge, injects himself and his opinions into the operation and editorial policies of most of his publications. Murdoch takes the position about his employees: "Who eats my bread, sings my song."

But there also is another question here. It is argued in pubs and bars near newspaper offices almost everywhere there is any vestige of a free press, and while some may see it as a basic issue of principle, others view it as a matter of

students takes up most of the school psychologists' time. Mrs. Bowers said there are some who provide counseling

Some of us do it but that is not one of our main thrusts," she said. "Most of the time we feel the (school) counselors can do a better job.

Ms. Bowers said one of the reasons for leaving the counseling to school consclors is the psychologists' "spasmatic" visits to the schools. "We go in one day a week," but the counselors

are there every day. But the psychologists are available to provide consultation to school counselors if they need it. When it is determined that children need more in-depth counseling. Mrs. Bowers said they are referred outside the

district to a private psychologist. One of the reasons school psychologists cannot provide individual counseling for students is there are a large number of pupils they must deal with each

Each of the 10 Seminole County school psychologists are assigned to what Ivan Bowers calls "school clusters." The number of schools in a psychologist's cluster is determined by enrollment. He said some psychologists have as many as six schools they provide service to, while others have only four schools, but all have about the same number of stu-

dents to serve. With that type of workload, Mrs. Bowers said, "there's not much time for an ongoing counseling program by psychologists." but it has been done by some occasionally.

Even though the Seminole school psychologists have a large workload already. Bowers said it's too early for him to tell if more should be hired for the next school year.

What I do each year is look at the backlogs" the psychologists. have. Bowers saidpsychologist is expensive. If I can get by with the status quo. I

Ann Neiswender, Director of Personnel for the Seminole schools, said the salaries paid school psychologists is about the same as school teachers.

She said the district has two salary classifications for school pyschologists - teacher-based school psychologists and psychologist specialists.

The county's salary range for a teacher-based psychologist is \$20,568 to \$26,738 a year, Psychologist specialists make between \$21,599 and \$28,723, Mrs. Neiswender said. She added the only difference between the two categories is the pyschologist specialists have a lew other duties that could include substituting for a school

principal II needed. To become a psychologist in the district. Bowers said the state requires a master's degree. with additional post-graduate work. Candidates must also be certified by the Florida Department of Education to work with students, he said.

Mrs. Bowers said that today there is not a shortage of school pyschologists, but it wasn't that way when she first started. "Some of us have been around a long time and when we first started there were just a few of us," she said. "But now there's no problem getting candidates," adding that the district has interns from UCF.

### Mussolini: 'If l Retreat, Kill Me'

MR.AN. Italy (UPI) - There are apartment houses in Plazzale bank, a metro station and a monument - but nothing to mark the spot where the body of - ish. Benito Mussolint was hung by the heels 40 years ago Sunday.

The monument in the square is not to the dictator who ruled Italy for more than two decades. It is to 15 hostages executed by German soldiers there eight months before Mussolint met the same fate at the hands of Italian partisans

Remembering their laseist past embarrasses many Italians. and to glorify it is illegal.

That does not mean the 40th anniversary this month of the fall of Mussolint's Salo Republic, his death and the final defeat of the German army in Italy are passing unnoticed.

The RAI television network is showing director Alberto Negrin's three-part film dramatization of Mussolini's years in power, "lo e ll Duce" (I and the Duce) starring Bob Hoskins, unfortunately very brutal," he Anthony Hopkins, Susan Sarandon and Annie Girardot.

And store windows display a new book about Il Duce's correspondence with Sir Winston Churchill.

But there is no outpouring of nostalgia over Mussolini's life or one. his death. Like the inscription on the rough granite column in who "fell in the name of liberty."

Writer Prime Levi, speaking today in the book lined study of his Turin apartment, agrees. Loreto, a department store, a Levi, a partisan during the war, was captured and sent to Auschwitz because he was Jew-

"I think to kill him was just. But to expose the bodies, especially the woman, in Piazzale Loreto was not right. It was very brutal," said Levi, who wrote about the war in his novel. "The Periodic Table."

Levi calls the execution "brutal but necessary."

"If the Allies had taken Mussolini alive they would have rehabilitated him, not as a leader but as a presence, because they feared the communists." Levi said.

"If he had killed himself his memory could have been rehabilitated in the way that Hitler's is now, instead he chose to fice in the uniform of a German soldier. It was a cowardly act and it makes it very hard to rchabilitate him."

"It was very simple although said. "And Mussolini dead in a little village says nothing, it had to be Milan and the bodies had to be shown."

Levi calls the execution "a just punishment for a man who invaded Italy with lies and rhet-

"Mussolini said, 'If I advance" follow me. If I retreat kill me. If I Piazzale Loreto, most Italians die avenge me," Levi said, "He prefer to remember partisans retreated and we obeyed him literally."

# Author Still Looking For A Happy Home

Beyond the Dragon's Mouth, Stories and Pieces, by Shiva Naipaul, Wiking. 424 pp., \$17.95).

The younger brother of V.S. Nalpaul, Shiva, at 40, shows a total lack of roots and no indication he may find any soon. if ever. This is a quality that, most likely, helps him write with such a sting.

This collection consists of two dozen stories and travelogues - most quite recent, a few going back to the mid-1970s, the oldest written in 1969. It is introduced by an autobiographical fragment that gives the book its title: Dragon's Mouth is the name of the strait between Naipul's native Trinidad and a spit of land jutting out from neighboring

It is the gate one must pass when one leaves the Caribbean Island by ship, as Naioul did when he first went to England in the early '60s, "the culmination of 18 years of dreaming, of intense longing.

"At last I was escaping from the island whose narrow confines and tropical sameness had always seemed like a

He finds many like him and later writes about them too, as in "Living in Earl's Court" or in a story about the Rastafarians in London. He often writes scathingly, feeling, perhaps, that because of his origins he knows the people from the Third World better than others do and is more justified in doing so.

An East Indian from the West Indies, he also fearlessly takes on Asian Indians. as in "The Sanjay Factor" and "Dying State." And he has made a reputation for himself castigating Africans in their newly independent lands.

He confesses his ambivalence, his lack of attachment, his fears of putting down an anchor. "Having to return to Trinidad nearly always fills me with alarm. It brings on this nightmare that, having once arrived there, I may never be able to get out again."

This is a common recurring mightmare of refugees who fled communist East Europe or Vietnam. Most have found happy homes in the West and their nightmares eventually go away.

### There's Buyers' Market In Florida

The real estate game has undergone some monumental changes in the last several years.

The rules that have guided generations are changing so quickly that anyone playing the game has a lot of homework to do. Selling a house can be every bit as grueling as buying one, particularly if you have done neither in several

The first decision a seller has to make is whether to do it htmself.

The advantage of selling it yourself is that you might save some money," advises Michael Briggs, director of education for Shannon and Luchs, one of the largest real-estate companies in the Washington, D.C.,

in general, real estate companies charge a 6 percent sales commission for their services. and in most states that is negotiable. Depending onthe asking price, that -commission can add up to a sizeable sum of money.

The main drawback to going it on your own is that the buyer also knows that you don't have a real estate agent and will be trying to save

some money, too.

'Il you've got a real hard ball buyer, he may expect to save it all, in which case you've done a lot of hard work and don't have anything to show for it," says Briggs. "Probably the biggest



# Kiddie Condos: Parents Buying Homes For Kids Going To College

goldfish, but it's the latest craze sweeping the nation's college campuses - student condominums

In this calculated age of computer students and business administration majors heading toward yuppie-dom, the trend of students and their parents buying condominums rather than renting apartments is growing in popularity.

Developers have been quick to seize upon the phenomenon.

"It's happening in all the college towns around here," said Nanette Fields, a real estate broker in Chapel Hill. N.C., home of the University of North Carolina. "Only freshmen are promised dormitory rooms (at UNC). If parents are going to be making investments anyway, this is a logical thing to do so their child can take advantage of it."

Fields refers to the

kiddie condos."

Parents looking for a tax break - or simply searching for a way to avoid throwing money down the often deep rent hole in college towns purchase the condominiums for their sons and daughters in college. Once the kids are out of school, the parents either sell the condos, hang onto them as rental property or keep them as retirement homes for themselves.

Some of the student condos are apartment conversions, but others are new units built as condominiums with college roommates in mind with bathrooms in each bedroom and fireplaces to spice up the deal.

Chapel Hill is one of the hotheds for this type of real estate transaction. - real estate offices flood parents of college stu-

brochures for condos with lots of facts and figures pointing to the advantages of investing in a condominum - but the trend is spreading nationwide.

At the University of Texas in Austin, real estate agent Carl Aratoon says there were only a handful of condominium projects near the campus four years ago but such projects number more than 100 now.

Says David Williams. president of The Midstates Group in Atlanta, which handles student condominums in Chapel Hill and Auburn. Ala.: "The parents are not only putting their child up for four years for free, but they also are getting an equal amount of money in the writeoff category. This is cutting the cost of education."

The rush was triggered in part by a change in Internal Revenue Service regulations in 1981 that now allows a homeowner to rent property to a relative and take investment tax deductions as well

# First Home: Be Sure You Want To Live There

The first-time housebuyer should sift through a wealth of information before making his decision, including potential tax advantages of his purchase, the property's resale value, and its location relative to future growth.

But first and foremost, he should consider how the house "feels" to him personally - does tt constitute a pleasant place to live:



# House Business Changed For Buyers, Sellers

In Washington too, it seems. There, the Bunches' real estate agent, Betty Randall, says she has never seen more houses being purchased. The firm she just left in Northern Virginia just had its best month.

But she has also never seen such caution, with sellers putting their homes on the market months earlier than the planned move and putting up with the inconvenience of showing it to buyers on Christmas, Thanksgiving and Easter.

"They just want to make sure they sell their homes," she says.

The intuition of the market place is responding to a variety of new circumstances. After decades of being a sanctuary of sorts from market risk, although suffering from periodic bouts of credit starvation, the tables have turned.

Now the risks are many but the supply of credit has become stabilized at expensive levels.

Buyers and sellers still have to contend with the possibility of drastic tax reform that will change the nature of their holdings, of an economy that keeps the best unalysts on the edge of their seats, and of new shifts in the makeup of the buying and selling population.

With hardly any public discussion, the economic underpinnings of the housing industry changed radically in the last five years.

Little did homeowners and potential buyers know that money market mutual funds were the death knell for those 9 percent mortgages and perhaps others in the 10 percent range as well. analysts say.

Buyers can keep watting for what used to be an inevitable downward cycle but it will not happen, says New Orleans consultant John Hebert.

"The minute you let the average Joe get 8 percent or 9 percent on his money, that was the beginning of the end." he said.

Wall Street's yields for the comman man soon had to be extended to banks and savings and loans. That meant savings and loans also needed higher income. The grateful saver found credit cost more even after the inflation rate slowed.

At the same time, mortgages were becoming far more popular for the biggest investors. The low-profile "secondary market" that bundles mortgages exploded in the last five years. Once a shelter from the money market storm, mortgages became big-time chips on the table.

And the philosophy of the regulators came to reflect more of budget director David Stockman's conviction that the nation has tied up too much money in residential housing to the disadvantage of investment-starved economic sectors like manufacturing.

As rates stayed stubbornly high it became clear home ownership's favored position on the nation's investment priority list was being Jeopardized.

The result may be more efficient money, Hebert says. But also. "It's never going to go back down to the good old days," when savings and loans harvested cheap money and passed it on to the housing industry. 'Home mortgage money is sim-

# Here Are Some Tips For Your Moving Day

So you've bought that new house or are ready to trade your apartment for a condominium across town.

Do you leave the moving to professionals or do it yourself?

That depends on how adventuresome you are. how precious you consider your goods to be, and, in many cases, whether you have some energetic friends willing to trade a day's work for a few cases of beer.

la a long-distance move, don't lift a finger if your present or new employer is paying for your trip. Let the movers do the work. In many cases, the employer will pick the mover, saving you that headache.

If you are moving to another city on your own, you can move yourself - and save considerable dollars - If you only have a few roomfuls of furniture.

Be wary, however, if you have a bad back. Even in a cross-town move it sometimes is

best to bring in a moving firm to at least handle bulky appliances and things like convertible couches, and delicate possessions. They are insured against damage. You probably will not be.

Question: Going the do-it-yourself route, how do you pick a truck rental firm?

Answer: By comparison shopping, in other words, don't go to the nearest or most advertised truck rental firm and plunk down your bucks in haste.

The move-tt-yourself truck and trailer rental business is cutthroat when it comes to competition. They all want your business and are willing to bargain for it sometimes at substantial savings to you. One major rental firm

advertises that it will match any lower rate quote from a competitor. When shopping around, you find its basic quotes tend to be higher because it plans on coming down. It makes up the difference on customers

who pay the first quote,

no questions asked.

When it comes time to picking up the truck. local dealers may also throw in a few extra days. or a few hundred extramiles on your trip limitation, if you ask.

Most dealers also have on hand an array of materials to assist with the move ranging from hand trucks to help lug appliances and furniture padding to boxes of all shapes and sizes.

They also have, free of charge, booklets with tips on estimating the size of the truck you will need, packing and handling hints. Many also offer optional insurance that covers not only damage to the vehicle. but carries \$100 deductible coverage on your possessions.

Also, when comparision shopping for a rental truck, be sure to check the general age and condition of the fleet available. The older the truck and inferior the upkeep, the greater the chances of a frustrating and sometimes costly breakdown.

move yourself, and don't even care to get involved in shopping for a moving firm, there are bustnesses that make such arrangements for you. Check the Yellow Pages for "relocation" services.

One such firm, the Homerica division of Home Equity Inc., specializes in arrangements for corporate transfers of employees from one city to another.

Gary Gaylor, director of moving services at Home Equity's Danbury, Conn., office, provided some general tips on more mechanical than what to took for in a moving firm.

"More than anything. look for a carrier with the ability to pack, load and haul, unload and unpack. This way you have one supervisor for that moving process - the driver. Any labor he selects, he is responsible for," Gaylor sald.

"That provides a move of a much better quality, simply because the people who start at the origin see what happens at the destination, it

If you don't want to makes them more responsible about damage. and not being late on delivery. That's the prime objective," he said.

Gaylor suggested calling other carriers and asking about the reputation of the firm you are interested in.

"Know what kind of moves they do most of the time. If you are an individual, you wouldn't want someone who consistently does military moves," he said. "Military moves are low cost moves. Low cost suggests less service. It's personal and it is meant to be that way."

He also recommended sticking with a major van line. "Should a claim occur, should the load be late, there needs to be a resource within that organization that can solve the problem," Gaylord

There are two ways movers can figure prices under deregulation. One is the traditional method of charging interstate tarrif rates based on actual weight of the load.

The other is a binding estimate, in which the agent is bound by the price he quotes you when checking your household, regardless of whether the actual weight is over or under the estimate.

"The problem with this is taking someone's optnion for what the weight of that shipment is," Gaylor said. "It has always been our procedure to use a weigh ticket on every shipment. That's recommended for an individual, too."

If you decide to move yourself, with the help of your buddies. Here's one. other hint. Keep the beer on ice until after the heavy stuff and the most precious of possessions are off the truck and into the new abode.

### Some Are Puzzling

### Home-Buyers Face Array Of Mortgage Options

The good old days of buying a mortgage were more than cheaper they were a lot less complicated.

The times when shopping for a mortgage simply meant looking for the lowest rates are long gone. Now the home huyer has to consider adjustable rates, caps, indexes, teases, points, APRs, margins. buydowns, short or long terms, and - beaven forbid — the possibility of something called negative amortization.

That's only part of it. Read on.

A decision between two different kinds of mortgages may not come down to which is a better deal, but finding the one whose terms make it posable for you to be approved.

A bank will offer several kinds of mortgages with variations available. on each. It can get complicated.

"I've found the most knowledgeable individuals need to be told about ARMs, for 30 years were usually every six months a product at least three times before he understands what you're talking about. The average person may not be as knowledgeable about figures," said Helen O'Donnell, vice president of residential mortgages at Fleet Financial Group in Providence, R.I.

Fixed-rate 30-year mortgages were recently hovering around 13 percent, give or take a half percent. Adjustable-rate mortgages, or

around 10 percent, some a little lower.

Fixed-rate mortgages may vary by the amount of fees charged or some special incentives making it difficult to figure out what the best deal is over the long run-

That's one thing the buyer doesn't have to worry about. The lender is required to disclose the annual percentage rate, the effective rate of the mortage with all the complications considered.

Fees are figured in points, one point equaling I percent of the loan amount.

Choosing an ARM involves the obvious risk of higher interest rates in the future, but also the quality of some hedges against that possibility built into a mortgage.

"The customer can't just shop for a rate," said John Battaglia of the Boston Five Savings Bank. "They have to see what the caps are, and what the margin is."

Adjustable-mortgage rates are all based on some kind of index and interest rates are adjusted according to it,

or year, sometimes every three years.

the interest rate can change in any given period, and the highest rate the homeowner will ever have to pay through the life of the mortgage.

The most common caps on a 30-year ARM adjusted annually are 2 percent a year and 5 percent for the entire loan.

The lender also builds in a profit margin to the ARM that takes effect at the time of the first adjustment, as much as 2.5 percent, If the mortgage (2 percent cap) is taken out at 10 percent interest and the index goes down 1 percent at the end of the first adjustment period, the interest rate still goes up to 11.5 percent.

payment increases but allow the interest rate to fluctuate. If the rate goes higher than the payments, the difference is added to the balance, an effect known as negative. amortization.

The choice of a mortgage may also have a lot to do with what is available to an individual homeowner. Banks use a variety of criteria to decide whether a borrower should be approved but a couple of general guidelines play a big

Typically, lenders don't want the homeowner's principal, interest and tax payments to exceed 28 percent of gross income. They don't want those payments plus all other outstanding debt to be more than about 36 percent of gross carnings.

If the higher interest rate of a fixed mortgage makes those figures just slightly out of reach. the same applicant might qualify for a variable toan.

If the applicant has some cash but not a high enough salary, a buydown might help.

A homeowner who uses a buydown literally buys the opportunity to lower the interest rate for beginning of the mortgage. A one-year buydown lowers the intefest rate for the first year, probably by 1 per-

A buydown can cut the interest rate 1 percent for a year, at a cost of one Caps limit how much point up front. A 1 percent buydown on a \$100,000 mortgage at 13.25 percent would cut montly payments by \$78 - a savings of \$936 over the year that costs \$1,000.

Buydowns can cover up to the first three years of a mortgage. A buydown of 2 percent the first year and I percent the second is possible, and a 3-2-1 combination is the best available.

Borrowers who need a buydown to qualify usually need to show they'll probably make more money in the near future, often young newlyweds whose parents are paying the points for the lower rate.

Then there's the ques-Some mortgages cap tion of downpayments and length of the mortgage. Homeowners who want to build equity faster and can afford higher monthly payments may choose a 15-year term, but the vast majority take the 30-year route.

> Downpayments can vary, sometimes down to 5 percent. The best deal is available to veterans, who may be able to get a Veterans Administration-backed morigage without putting a penny down.

Homeowners who borrowed at an interest rate higher than the current market may want to refinance the mortgage - under the right personal circumstances

Refinancing involves initial charges just like the original mortgage and, assuming the rate is about 2 percent better, it may take a couple of years to make up the difference.

If the homeowner is planning on selling in the near future, the lower interest rate may not be worthwhile.

The biggest investment most people ever make is the purchase of a home and it's important to choose the right kind of homeowners' insurance to protect that investment.

"There are many kinds of coverages available and an array of options." says Nancy Golonka, vice president for consumer affairs and education for the insurance information Institute, a trade group. "It is wise, as in any other major purchase, to do some shopping around and compare coverages and minus depreciation. But

Homeowners' policies are designed to cover repairs or replacement of your house and belongings and to cover lawauits for injury or damage you cause.

Your house, garage and other structures on your property are covered, as is personal property. The policies also provide money in the event damage to the house forces you and your family to live elsewhere for a time.

Generally, a policy covers furniture and belongings for their "actual cash value," -which is their original cost

cost coverage," or what it would cost to replace the house or item at today's


Both these policies provide only limited coverage for valuables such as jewelry and furs, most often at a limit of \$1,000, Golonka says.

There are seven basic kinds of homeowners' policies insuring you against a variety of "perils." They are: the basic policy, known in the industry as 40-1; the broad form (HO-2); the special or all-rink form (HO-3); the renter's poli-

> The basic form insures your home against fire or lightning; loss of property from premises threatened by fire or other perils; wind and hail; explosions; riots or 'civil commotion''; aircraft and vehicles; smoke; vandalism and malicious mischief; theft: broken windows. Only a small number of homeowners buy this insurance because it provides less coverage than most people want, Golonka


