Attorneys Plead Their Case Against Eckerson Cannery

Describe Contracts Of Plant With Growers As Subterfuges To Evade Price Law
Carlton Among Defense Group
Decotes To Present Arguments Against Law This Afternoon

Declaring that the contracts of the Eckerson Fruit Cannery with growers for canning of grapefruit are merely "subterfuges to escape or circumvent" the growers' cost guarantee law, attorneys for Nathan Mayo, commissioner of agriculture, concluded arguments in the Court House this morning before Circuit Judge Millard B. Smith for dismissal of the attack on the resolution of the Citrus Commission setting the minimum price of 32 cents on Florida grapefruit.

Judge Smith granted a motion of E. R. Bentley, attorney for a large growers co-operative, to participate in the case as a friend of the defendant and also a motion of Glen Grimes, attorney for the Florida Citrus Commission, to take part in the first court test of the minimum price law.

Representing Commissioner Mayo, were former Governor Lloyde E. Carlton, A. G. Carter, assistant attorney general, and Mr. Pierce of Tampa, attorney for the Agriculture Commission. George A. DeCottles, representing the local canning company and was scheduled to present his arguments against the law as the hearing continued this afternoon.

Declaring that the Eckerson contracts are merely a device in which the company seeks to evade the minimum price regulation, Mr. Carlton asserted that the law was enacted by the Legislature for the protection of the entire industry and applied to the contracts of the individual grower in that he is a part of the industry.

Touchton Case Put Off Until Next Session

Postponement Given On Plea Of Defense Attorney That His Health Interferes

Circuit Judge Millard B. Smith today granted a verbal motion made by E. F. Housholder for continuation until the next term of the Circuit Court in November of the case against W. C. Touchton, Jr., charged with manslaughter in connection with the drowning of two DeLand girls when the auto in which they were riding plunged through an open drawbridge across the St. Johns River just west of here early on the morning of Dec. 23.

Mr. Housholder sought continuation of the case, which was set for trial Monday, on the grounds that ill health prevented him from defending his client at this time.

Mr. Touchton was arraigned last week and entered pleas of not guilty to the charges of drunken driving and culpable negligence set out in the information against him after a motion for severance was granted in the trial of Touchton and his companion, J. E. Weathered, who were jointly charged in the information. Weathered has not been arraigned, and it is expected that his arraignment will be postponed until after the trial of Touchton.

Charges of manslaughter were returned in an indictment by the present Grand Jury which charged the companions of Myra Machen and Mildred Mercer with drunken driving and operating an auto on the highways in a "culpably negligent manner."

Steps Are Taken To Revise Taxes Hurting Business

Heads Of Committees Call On Treasury To Present Plans

WASHINGTON, Mar. 3.—The chairman of the Senate and House tax committees called on the Treasury today to submit recommendations for revising taxes which "act as a deterrent to business."

Chairman Harrison (D-Miss) of the Senate Finance Committee and chairman Daughon, (D-NC) of the House Ways and Means committee in a letter to Secretary Morgenthau said that their committee members were in sympathy with the administration's efforts to encourage business.

Meanwhile Morgenthau, appearing before the House coinage committee, testified that the \$2,000,000 treasury stabilization fund had never been used to "rig the market" for government securities.

Chairman Harrison (D-Miss) of the Senate Finance Committee warned the Nation yesterday that it faces "economic confusion and chaos" if the "enormous" Federal spending is continued and the national debt continues to mount.

Observing that substantial reductions could be made in spending by emergency agencies, Harrison said he would like to see a conference of responsible officials in the government, "from the President on down," called to map an economy program.

Many Seek Pardon Board's Clemency

TALLAHASSEE, Mar. 3.—Five persons, sentenced to death, and 64 others, sentenced to life imprisonment, will ask the State Pardon Board for clemency when it meets here Mar. 14. Those under death sentence are Clyde Hyler, of Jacksonville; Carnival Graham, of Leon county; Charlie Henderson, of Orange county; Arthur Jordan, of Marion county; and Richard Smith of Brevard county.

Hollywood Doff's Hat To Florida As Film Is Commenced

OCALA, Mar. 3.—Hollywood moviemakers doffed their hats today to Florida, and admitted on the location here for a new Tarzan film that Mother Nature had done for the Sunshine State something the combined brains and money of Hollywood has thus far failed to accomplish.

They referred to Florida's clear Silver Springs, which they find to their liking for under-water pictures.

"We've spent fortunes in Hollywood for huge tanks," they declared, "and have planted fresh vegetation in them every shooting day. We've installed expensive filtration machinery, and hired the best engineers. None of them has produced what we could term photographically clear water. But in Florida's springs we find the ideal setup."

One MGM official, who is here with Johnny Weissmuller and a company of 20 shooting jungle and under-water scenes at Silver Springs for the new Weissmuller, Maureen O'Sullivan film "Tarzan in Exile," told how his company sunk \$100,000 in a single tank, only to get disappointing results.

Joseph W. Jarrell Is Indicted Again On Lottery Counts

Grand Jury Asks Pardon Board To Ignore Jarrell

Appeal Reveals 'Cuba' Operator Continues To Flout The Law

An appeal to the State Pardon Board to uphold the law enforcement agencies of Seminole County in the conviction and sentence of Joseph W. Jarrell for violation of the State anti-lottery laws was made this morning by the Grand Jury in a letter which said that Jarrell has continued to violate the lottery laws even while his case was in the courts and pending before the Pardon Board.

"We know that he (Jarrell) continued to operate a lottery during the time of his trial," the Grand Jury said, "and continued throughout his appeal to the Supreme Court, in utter disregard of our laws and in defiance of our law enforcement officials, and he has never at any time shown any inclination to stop his illegal occupation or respect the law."

The Grand Jury's letter to the Pardon Board in full is as follows: "Seminole County Grand Jury, Spring Term, 1939.

"Sanford, Florida, March 3, 1939. To the Honorable State Board of Pardons, Tallahassee, Florida, Gentlemen:

"We, the Grand Jury of Seminole County, Florida, for the Spring Term, 1939, now in regular session convened, understand that an application for a parole or pardon will be presented to your Honorable Body by and in behalf of one Joseph W. Jarrell of this County.

"We have knowledge, both as individuals and as a body, that petitions are being circulated addressed to the State Board of Pardons and requesting that Board to pardon or parole said Joseph W. Jarrell who was convicted by a petit jury of Seminole County in December, 1937, for violation of the State Lottery laws and sentenced to serve one year in the State Prison.

"We know further that the State Supreme Court affirmed his conviction on February 6th, 1939, and Governor Cone has granted a sixty-day reprieve. It is common talk in Sanford and Seminole County that this reprieve was issued in order that Jarrell would have time to apply to the Pardon Board at its regular meeting in March for a pardon or parole and the general impression seems to be that powerful political influences will be brought to bear in an attempt to assure favorable action by said Board.

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"It is our opinion and belief that a vast majority of the citizens of Sanford and Seminole County are wholeheartedly in accord with the determination of our law enforcement officials to rid Sanford and Seminole County of the Cuba and Bolita lottery racket, which in the past has taken such a toll from our people and from legitimate business channels. Petitions are easy to circulate and there are always a goodly number of irresponsible and weak people who can be talked into signing. We do know, however, that the responsible, substantial and law-abiding citizens of our community are not signing the petitions now being circulated and that the general public believes that Jarrell should serve the sentence he justly deserves." Convicted 'Cuba' Operator Accused On Eve Of Appeal From One Year Sentence

Law Violation In 5 Counts Charged

Grand Jury Action Follows Testimony Of Many Witnesses

Joseph W. Jarrell, convicted "Cuba" operator, was indicted a second time by the Seminole County Grand Jury today for conducting a lottery in Seminole County. The indictment was included in a presentation to Circuit Judge Millard B. Smith late this afternoon.

Jarrell was charged in five counts for violation of the State's anti-lottery law between the dates of Nov. 30, 1938 and Jan. 18, 1939. The indictment followed closely on the heels of Jarrell's published intentions to seek a pardon from a one-year sentence passed by the court after his conviction for a similar offense in December of 1937.

Jarrell is at liberty now by virtue of a 60-day reprieve granted by Gov. Fred P. Cone, after a mandate of the Supreme Court, affirming the sentence and conviction of the lower court, was handed down.

The action of the Grand Jury followed the appearance of a large number of witnesses who were summoned for testimony. Many of them were believed to be sellers for the Jarrell ring.

In an indictment returned by the Grand Jury on Nov. 22, 1937, Jarrell was charged with conducting a lottery in Seminole County on six counts, one of which was later quashed.

Following a two-day trial during which a veritable parade of prosecution and defense witnesses took the stand, a jury, composed of men from every section of the county, returned a verdict on Dec. 11, 1937 of "guilty as charged," thereby holding him guilty on all five counts set out in the indictment.

With Forguson and Danny Boy Altman leading the charge, the Feds forged ahead, holding the favored Ocalans scoreless for the rest of the period and taking a 14-0 edge at the half.

The first half was comparatively slow as each team appeared to be feeling the other out, but after the intermission the Feds got started and the Ocalans were unable to check the Feds offensive.

The Sanford club met the Robert E. Lee five of Jacksonville at 8:00 o'clock this afternoon. Other pairings offered what is expected to be one of the best games of the tournament in the first contest of this morning's session, with Andrew Jackson of Jacksonville, top-seeded, meeting Landon of Jacksonville at 10 o'clock.

At 11, the Daytona Beach Buccaneers, fourth seeded, tackled Gainesville. In the first game of the afternoon session, the Orlando Tigers, second seeded, met DeLand's Bulldogs in a game which is expected to extend the Orlando lead more than they had figured.

The Robert E. Lee quintet ranked below the Orlando Tigers in their standings in the Big Ten Conference at the close of the season and the Feds' took the highly touted Tigers into camp by the one-sided score of 44 to 27 in their first encounter. If the Feds continue their form, the Lee cagers will find the Sanford boys a hard team to beat.

The winner of this contest will play the winner of the DeLand Orlando match in the semi-final round at 8:30 o'clock tonight.

Marston Recalls Old Victory Over Jones

PHILADELPHIA, Mar. 3. — (AP) — Sixteen years is a long time. But Max Marston remembers it as though it happened yesterday—his victory over Bobby Jones, that led to his winning the 1923 National Amateur golf championship in Chicago.

Marston, now a 47-year-old broker who has reached the stage where he "prefers to play golf with his friends," terms his Jones victory "the greatest of a long career in tournament golf."

Jones, who two months earlier had won the National Open, was two up at the halfway mark in the second round 36-hole match. Jones had broken par by four strokes and seemed an easy winner. However, Marston, who prefers match play to medal-because he likes the "competitive spirit" came back with three birdies on the last 18 to win, 2 and 1.

From there Marston went on to beat Jess Sweetser, 1 up in 28 holes, in the final.

"I guess I'm one of the few of the old crowd left," he mused recently. "I played in my first tournament in 1905. That sure is a long time ago. Haven't been able to play much except on weekends lately and you know weekend golf doesn't help you in tournament play. I'll probably try for the National Open this year since it's in Philadelphia, but I'll have to qualify first."

After losing his national title to George Von Elm in the 1924 semifinals, Marston continued to be a top-notch golfer for years.
