Contractors Are Protected By New City Ordinance

Non-Resident Is Required To Pay \$100 Fee For License

A City ordinance designed to protect local contractors from outside competition and an ordinance regulating the construction of sidewalks, residential driveways and filling station approaches were placed on their final reading and unanimously adopted at a meeting of the City Commission in the City Hall last night.

The ordinance which would require contractors "not a resident of the City of Sanford," to pay an annual license fee of \$100 was the third such municipal statute drawn up by City Attorney Fred E. Wilson and was worded as follows: "Any person who is not a resident of the City of Sanford and who is engaged in the business of contracting for the construction of sidewalks, residential driveways and filling station approaches shall be required to obtain a license from the City of Sanford before entering into any contract for such work."

Solons Hear Of Subs Off U.S. Coast

Admiral Says Coast Guard Aviator Saw U-Boat About 200 Feet Under Water

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Congress learned today one of the submarines reported off the Florida coast in the early days of the neutrality patrol was spotted 200 feet below the surface of the ocean by a coast guard aviator.

Admiral R. R. Waesche, coast guard commandant, told the House appropriations sub-committee the report "caused some excitement" and that the aviator was called subsequently by telephone for a detailed account. He said the aviator gave an accurate description. He did not identify the submarine.

Waesche said the coast guard's neutrality patrol work had been hampered by lack of underwater sound detectors on surface vessels.

He included \$1,800,000 in estimated expenditures for the year to install the devices on 70 vessels. He said the equipment's details were a closely guarded secret.

The request for funds to equip the boats with detectors was turned down by the committee.

Earl Browder Is Sentenced To Four Years In Prison

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Earl Russell Browder, the Communist Party leader, was sentenced today to four years in prison and fined \$5,000.

The jury of 11 men and a young woman deliberated only 45 minutes on the verdict after hearing Browder himself in a singular, unemotional, defense. He pleaded guilty to more than 100 counts of conspiracy to defraud the Federal Reserve Bank.

Brushing aside his attorney, George Gordon Battle, Browder took the floor with the statement that he was a correspondent school teacher.

The sentence was pronounced immediately after the jury was polled and a defense motion for his freedom was denied. It specified that two-year sentences on each of two counts must be served consecutively. The maximum prison sentence would have been 10 years.

National Leaders Bow In Grief At Rites Of Borah

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—(AP)—President Roosevelt and other national leaders bowed in grief yesterday at a state funeral for the "revered elder statesman," Senator William E. Borah of Idaho.

Many brushed tears from their eyes in the hushed half-gloom of the Senate chamber as congressional chaplains prayed over the slate gray steel casket containing the remains of the man who came out of the west 33 years ago to win fame in some of history's most momentous debates.

After the ceremony the doors were locked, and the body lay in solitude, except for an honor guard of policemen until the time came at 1:10 P. M., to start the long journey back to Idaho, where burial will take place Thursday in Boise.

Protest Note To British Is Made Public By Hull

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Secretary of State Hull last night made public the text of a stinging note to the British government charging that American ships passing through the Straits of Gibraltar are being delayed three times as long as Italian vessels by the British blockade.

The charge was contained in an aide memoire handed to Lord Lothian, British ambassador here, last Saturday. In it, Hull demanded assurance the British government will cease discriminating against American vessels.

The note was made public by Hull only a few hours after he had summoned Lothian to another conference at which they were understood to have discussed the British embargo on American tonnage and the controversy over British interference with United States mails on the high seas.

LAKELAND, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Another cold wave will pass over Florida during the next 36-48 hours, the frost warning service today announced.

Temperatures tonight will be "much colder" than those during the brief respite following the three-day frigid period over the weekend.

Tomorrow morning the temperature will be "slightly above the danger point for truck in central and southern districts" and Thursday morning frost and freezing may extend into the mucklands of South Florida, the warning said. Small craft all around the Florida coastline were cautioned against strong winds today and tonight. Extreme northwest Florida forecast for tonight was 20-24 degrees on the coast, and to 18-22 in the interior. For peninsula Florida it ranged from near 26 at the Georgia line, to 18 in Gainesville, and 35 in Central Florida.

Lumpkin Outpoints Elmer Ray To Win 10-Round Bout In Orlando

ORLANDO, Jan. 22.—Frank Lumpkin, promising young local negro heavyweight, gave away a 10-pound weight advantage and then went on to take a clean decision from Elmer Ray, veteran Palatka negro heavy, here last night in a 10-round fight billed for the Southern negro heavyweight title, before approximately 600 rabid fans. Lumpkin, obviously in better physical condition than the heavy-listed Palatka, shook off a bad first round and came back in the late rounds to outpoint and outbox the rugged Ray, who slowed up as the bout progressed, to cop the win. The fight was a popular one. It topped off the five-bout card presented at the American Legion Arena as the inaugural promotional venture of Ernie Stephens, new Legion promoter. Lumpkin and Ray, both smart fighters with ample punching power, were pretty evenly matched. And even when the decision was announced, scattered boos swelled with the sound of cheering, before the match was so close that following the fight, a rematch over the 15-round distance at a later date was announced by Stephens. Ray requested the return bout. The Lumpkin-Ray battle was easily the savior of the fight card, which otherwise was little more than mediocre. According to the official scorecard, Lumpkin was credited with nine of the 10 rounds, while one round, the seventh, was rated even. The Sentinel scored

Lumpkin with seven rounds, Ray with two and called the second even. Ray was given the first and 10th rounds. Ray, a cat-like fighter, bored in during the first round to a cautious, jabbing boxing. Lumpkin rallied in the second, scored as even, to settle back in during the first round to a cautious, jabbing boxing. From there on out to the 10th, Lumpkin held an upper hand while Ray waited for an opening that he might shoot a knockout blow. It didn't come, for Lumpkin turned out to be a smart boxer. Williams outlasted the fast but light-punching Cuban, scoring three knockdowns in the final two rounds before knocking Datta out. Tony Monin, a bobbing, weaving 140-pounder, kayoed Joe Rodriguez, 125-pound Tampa, in the third round of their eight-round semi-final bout. Rodriguez, a game little-fighter who five times went to the floor before he stayed put, didn't approach Monin as a boxer. Bobby Holland, Orlando brawler, blasted ill-conditioned Hod Williams of Tampa, into oblivion in the third round of their six-round preliminary heat. Williams floored Holland in the first, but the rugged Orlandoan came back to thoroughly thump the tired Williams.
