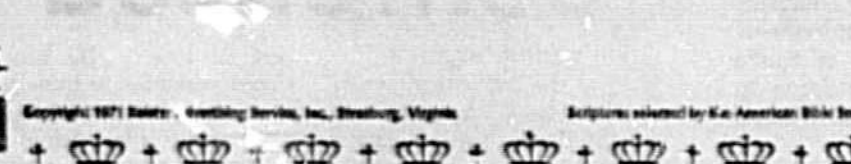

Nun Finds Role Steadily Changing

NEW YORK—She is 39 years old but looks at least 10 years younger. She dresses unattractively, her hair and complexion make-up with dexterity. She has three college degrees, including a Ph.D., has an interesting job and is a staunch Women's Lib era- tionist.
She is a nun—1971 style.
Bern Mary Harris in Brooklyn and reared with her brother, now a newspaper pressman, by her widowed mother, who taught in the New York public schools, she became Sister Maria Crucis when she entered the Order of St. Joseph in 1950.
"I think maybe at the deepest level you can define yourself as who you are, or you can define yourself as what you are, and I think for me as a person I have to define myself as Maria rather than as a sister," she said, "and I would say that I am quite a strong supporter although I think the terminology 'Women's Lib' has had a bad press. When I say yes I support the service of the church, I may not be referring to the same things you are, or certainly that many of the people I speak to refer to."
"What, then, was she referring to?"
"The first and foremost thing that I feel Women's Liberation has pointed out is that in men and women both there are masculine and feminine elements. I feel that all of society—male-dominated society—would benefit very much from using masculine and feminine characteristics."
"In other words, you don't have the cognitive, dominant types over here and the emotional types over there, which I think is the way we tend to think of men and women?"
Sister Maria has arrived at her ideas after 22 years in the religious life. She decided to be a nun in 1950, at the age of 18, after her freshman year at St. John's University. What influenced her choice, she said, "I had a look back at my life, and I would say that I'm not sorry."
After taking her final vows, she went back to school, getting her bachelor's degree at St. John's, her master's in theology at Manhattan College and, this year, her doctorate in education.
The 180-member order in which she serves is composed mainly of teachers and nurses.
"Has she ever been tempted to leave in the last few years?"
"Oh, sure," was the ready response. "I think any sister in these times is likely to be tempted. But with society being what it is, I don't know of many better, richer alternatives."
"I think people in religious orders today have redefined what 'staying' and 'leaving' and 'out' mean. Religious orders as we have known them do not exist, so it is difficult to leave something that doesn't exist."

To Top Current \$430 Billion Debt Ceiling Hike Coming

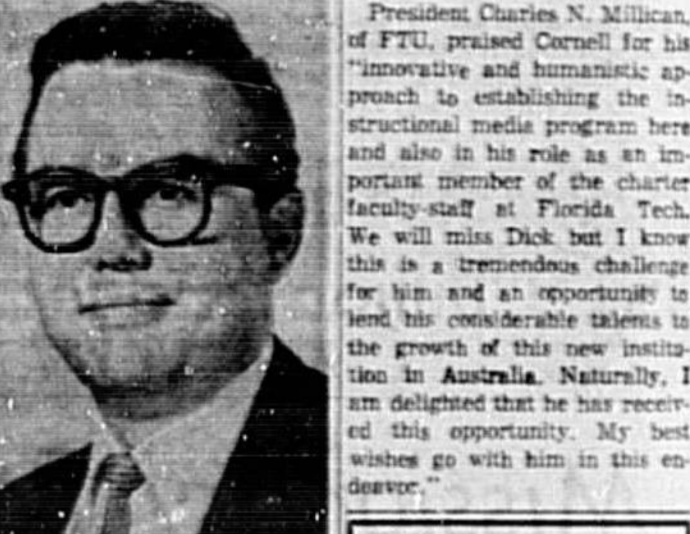

WASHINGTON (AP) — Government officials say the Nixon administration will be forced in the next few weeks to ask Congress to again raise the national debt ceiling by a near-record amount.
Treasury aides said Thursday the current \$430-billion ceiling is expected to be exceeded by March 31 unless Congress, as it usually does each year, raises it to raise it.
Last year Congress boosted the debt limit by a record \$25 billion, trimming only \$5 billion from the government's request. Officials indicated the new re-

quest could come close to that amount.
The 1972 fiscal year deficit currently is estimated at \$28 billion, largest since World War II.
Treasury officials said the increase requested will depend on the size of the deficit projected for fiscal 1972. That figure will be disclosed in a few weeks when the new budget goes to Congress.
As of Dec. 30, the national debt subject to the limitation was at \$428 billion and still climbing. A fall in government revenues, new expenditure programs and additional tax relief granted by Congress are con-

Candidates Seek Votes In Florida

Sen. Henry Jackson warned "hypocrisy is going to be a major issue" in the March 14 presidential preference primary as four Democratic presidential hopefuls set their campaigns rolling across Florida today.
New York Mayor John Lindsay and Sen. Edmund Muskie, D-Maine, planned to join the Washington Democrat and New York Congresswoman Shirley Chisholm on the stump for the Florida vote.
Jackson toured Florida's west coast sleeping in Tampa Thursday after a three-day motorcade through small Panhandle towns where he stressed the bus issue and endorsed the space shuttle program.
During a speech at the opening of his state headquarters in Tampa, Jackson singled out Lindsay in a speech on busing of school children.
"One thing I can't stand is hypocrisy," Jackson said. "What do you think of a fellow preaching in a black church when he sends his children to school in Connecticut?"
Lindsay planned to open his campaign in Tampa today. This tour includes a speech at a black church on Sunday.
In his North Florida campaign, Jackson said he was the only contender for the nomination who sent his child to a public school where busing was in force.
"People in Florida don't want bifurcating ideas from people in big cities who can't run their own cities," Jackson said in the New York City mayor.
Meanwhile, Sen. Muskie was to open his Florida presidential primary effort with an address in the state capital today before leaving for a swing through central and south Florida.
Muskie planned a speech in Orlando, St. Petersburg, Tampa and Miami. He was in New Hampshire Thursday.
Also in Tallahassee, Mrs. Chisholm told a cheering audience of students at Florida State University Thursday she could be the kingmaker in 1972.
The fiery Brooklyn Democrat said a lot of "male chauvinists" have tried to convince her that she, Sen. George McGovern of South Dakota and Linda, in the same primary race would fragment the liberal vote.
"Let Mayor Lindsay and Sen. McGovern get together and toss a coin. Why should I step back?" she said.
The former teacher said she is a few credits away from receiving her Ph.D. degree and would match her qualifications to run for president with those of any of her male opponents.
"If you contrast my qualifications with some of the gentlemen who have been president of the United States you might find that I would be number four or five on the list," she said.

Governor Will Air \$1.5 Billion Budget

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Putting his corporate income tax to work for the first time, Gov. Reubin Askew is recommending a 1972-73 fiscal year budget of about \$1.5 billion. The exact total will be announced by Askew at a news conference today.
It was known, however, that Askew came in slightly lower than anticipated revenue, which was pegged at \$1.49 billion in December and revised upward since then to \$1.53 billion.
The budget for the fiscal year ending on June 30 is \$1.35 billion, meaning that Askew's second budget as governor of Florida will show an increase of about 10 per cent.
Much of the money to pay for the added state spending will be coming from the \$10 million to be raised next year in the corporate income tax that became effective on Jan. 1.
But before the corporate income tax can be put to work on new state programs, it must make up the difference in repealed taxes such as \$45 million in revenue provided by the sales tax on household utilities and apartment rentals. Those taxes faded out of existence on March 1.
Initial reaction to the budget from legislators who have discussed it with Askew was good. Askew discussed the document in generalities about 10 days ago with House Appropriations Committee Chairman Marshall Harris, D-Miami, and Senate Ways and Means Committee Chairman Louis de la Parte, D-Tampa.
"What he talked about seemed very reasonable," Harris said. "But Harris said he was waiting to see what Askew had to say about state pay scales because "the biggest issue facing us this year is the adequacy of our state salaries."

Manufacturers Look To Sanford

Several manufacturing concerns are looking at Sanford with an eye toward locating plants here in Seminole County.
This was disclosed at today's meeting of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce Industrial committee of 25, with a joint effort by other industrial and contracting groups, including David Kelley, Seminole Industrial Development Authority, James Ryan, Seminole County Board of County Commissioners, Sanford Airport Authority, and John Krider, Chamber of Commerce.
Krider disclosed a national firm is interested in acquiring the vacant Inmex Corporation building on Grepsville Avenue and the adjacent 34 acres. He said a decision on this industry moving to Sanford is expected to meet Thursday.
Another firm with an eye toward Sanford is an air-cooled generator manufacturer. Krider said, "This company is looking at two separate county locations." He added, and explained it would employ from 400-500 persons.
Krider said he was "delighted" to see Fleetwood Mobile Homes moving into Sanford and said it was a joint effort to bring them here.
Sanford Manufacturing Company, a sewing factory that had moved several months ago, will not re-open. This was disclosed by Krider, who said the building which has been repaired probably will be sold. He said there was still another firm looking at the county, but did not reveal any names.
Ryan revealed that an advertising project to attract industry had been developed by the port and industrial development boards.
Named Seminole County Economic Development Program, the industrial recruiting material will be sent to a list of prospects to advertise the county's attractions.

Skyjackers Head Toward Africa

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — A shot-gun-wielding man and a woman with baby hijackers Pacific Southwest Airlines jet from Los Angeles to Tampa today and then asked for a bigger plane which officials said the hijackers wanted to take to Africa.
Officials said whether they got the plane was up to the FBI, which had cleared the airport.
The request came as the Boeing 727 was being refueled following a four-hour flight from the West Coast that began Tuesday.
Passengers said the black woman companion covered the passengers with a pistol and warned them to "look forward or somebody's going to get shot."
The PSA commuter plane was on route from San Francisco to Los Angeles when the hijackers took over. The hijackers allowed 134 passengers and a stewardess to leave the plane at Los Angeles but ordered the pilot and nine other PSA employees to accompany them to Florida.
Paul MacAllister, assistant director of the Hillsborough County Aviation Authority in Tampa, said at the time the request was made for a plane to fly to Africa, there were no aircraft in the airport that could make the flight.
All flight operations were shut down at the airport and police set up roadblocks to keep arriving passengers away from the airport. The red, white and silver 727 was taking on 8,000 gallons of fuel from two fuel trucks, MacAllister said, when the request came for a larger plane to take the hijackers to Africa.

Fairy Lake Project Wins Nod

LONGWOOD — Despite objections from the residents of the city's Wildmere section on all aspects of the planned development of the E-Backs Fairy Lake tract, the zoning board Thursday night approved the development. A 2.2 acre parcel of the city to the City Council for public hearing.
The four-member board, only Rep. Jack Lindsey, its temporary chairman, refused to vote on the issue, explaining he did not have enough information to make a decision.
C. A. Hobbie, the developer, and his planner, James Zimmerman, of Tallahassee, and engineer, Robert Semuels, of Enterprise Technology Corporation, of Orlando, talked in favor of the planned mall development, assisted by board member, Dick Creswell, owner of the city's office, who traveled to Pensacola one week ago to see similar developments.
The residents of the Wildmere section objected to all aspects of the planned development estimated to cost some \$28 million and have 622 rental apartment units and 260 patio homes.
The protests ranged from the anticipated increase in population it would bring, the possible pollution of Fairy Lake it would cause, the traffic it would generate onto city streets and the amount of additional taxes at \$74,000 annually which the development would eventually pay when it completed in seven to 10 years.
"The objection raised by former councilman James Brown that the development would not pay through ad valorem taxes for services necessary and future residents there would probably purchase cigarettes in neighboring Casselberry, Hobbie said it is planned to have a neighborhood store and a washeteria in the development.
Mrs. William Rabon of Wildmere said Fairy Lake has, on occasion, caused in the lake from one coin laundry in operation. Rabon asked, "Are all the members of the board and the City Council for this development despite the views of the neighboring property owners and Mrs. Rabon added, "And get their necks chopped off at the best election!"
Rev. Lindsey explained the zoning board is not an elected body.
Creswell elicited agreement from Hobbie that something might be worked out to site the planned sewer package plant to be located on land near Seminole Boulevard to serve the Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club. Creswell said he understands the dog track will annex to the city if the city can provide sewer service.

A decade later, 19-year-old "Janet" is no longer a baby model but a student in her final year of study at the International College of Fine Arts in Miami.
Her field is fashion designing and she plans to start her own line of children's clothing when she graduates this spring.
Janet was "discovered" by New York photographer, Leo Aarons, while she was exploring Central Park as a diapered tot. She became a beaming cover girl for Good Housekeeping magazine and other publications at the age of six months.
In the next eight years, the dimpled face was recorded on film, by her estimate, some 14,000 times. Her cherubic smile came into homes on calendars, advertisements, Christmas cards, chocolate boxes and national magazine covers.
She remembers her baby modeling days well:
"My mother and I would go into New York City at least three times a week" from their home in Westchester, N.Y., she recalled. "It was a very relaxed situation posing for the camera and lots of fun."
But the assignments often called for perseverance, especially when working with animals, she said.
"I remember I had to lie on a parakeet for two weeks so it would get to know and trust me," Janet said. "The friendship blossomed into a best-to-beat photo."
"Another time," Janet said, "I was supposed to pose with a lamb. It ran around the studio for three hours until finally it was so weary, it couldn't resist any longer and stayed still for the pictures."

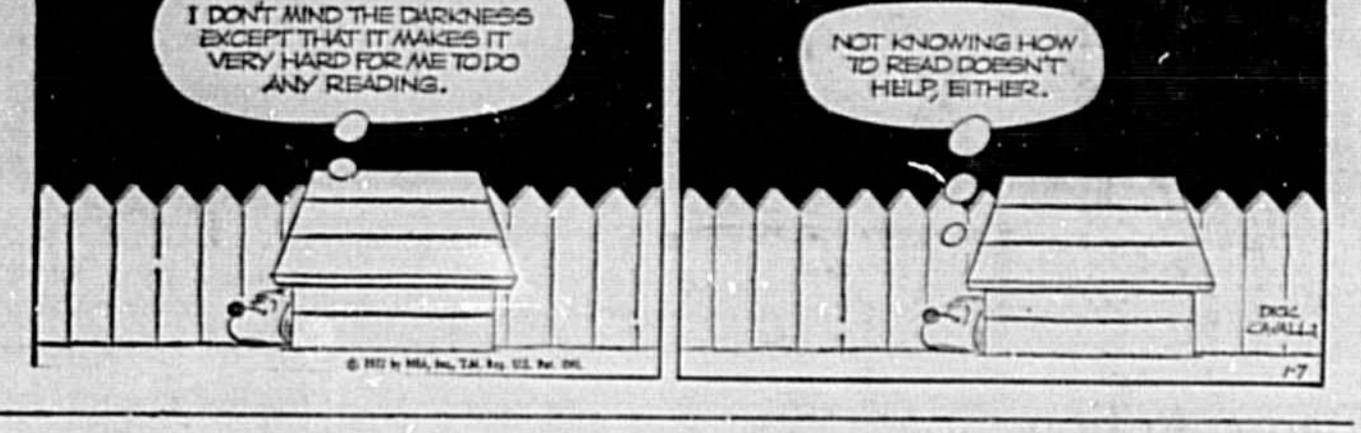
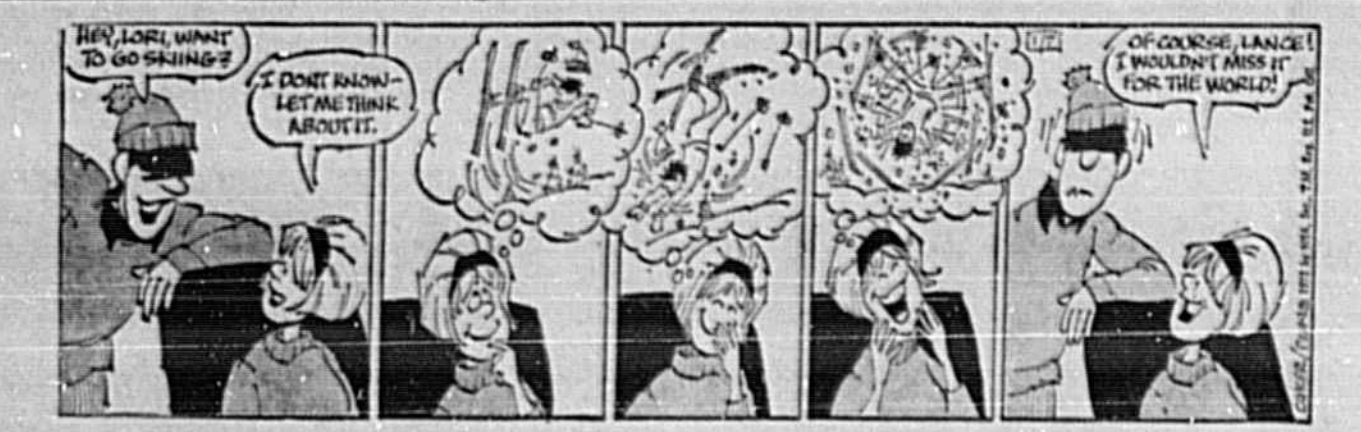

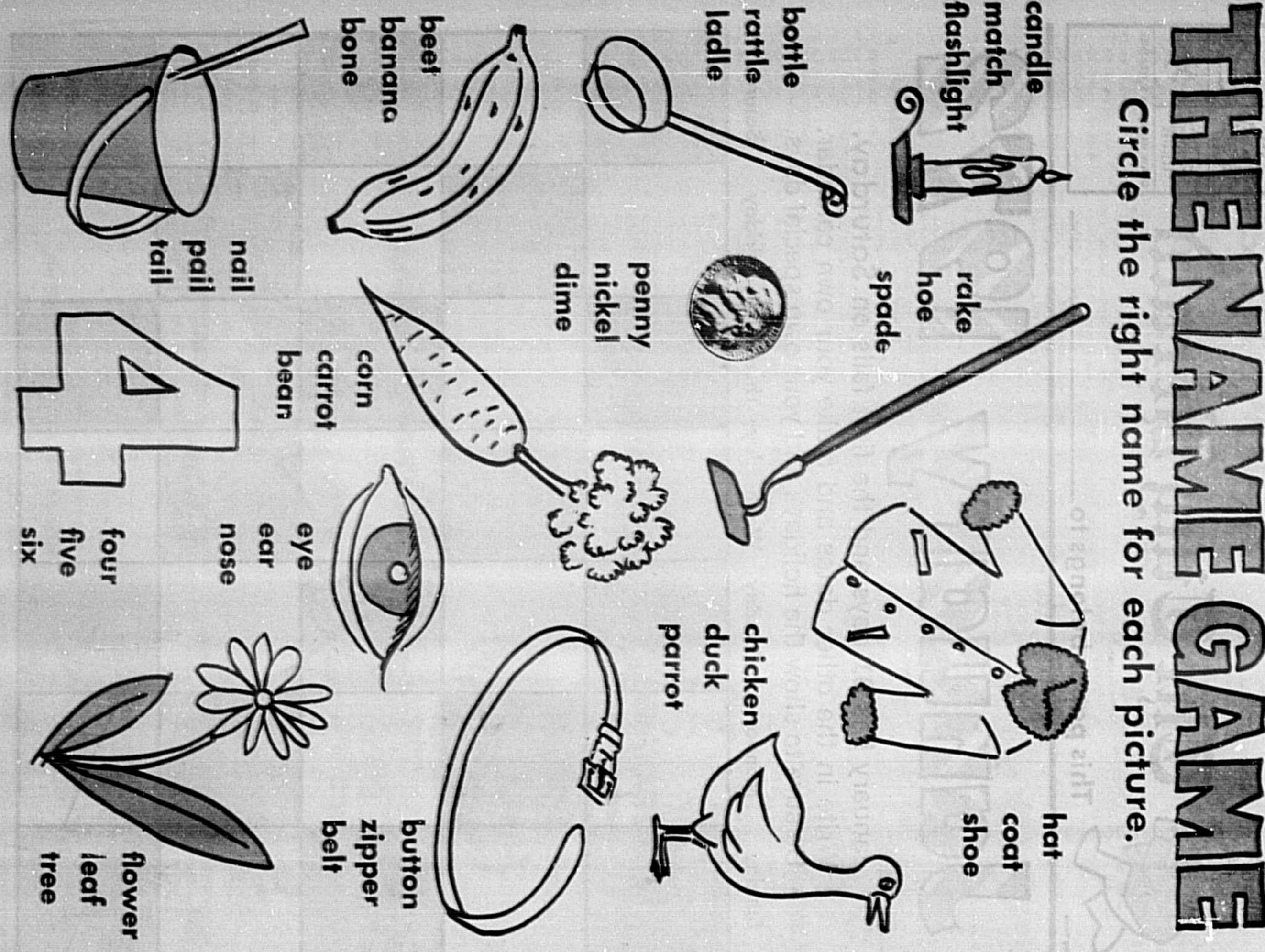

Attorney Cleared Of Girl's Charge

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Prosecutor John Rudd today dropped morals charges against Rep. Hugh Grainger and said he "questioned the credibility" of the lawmaker's accuser, Florida state coed Stephanie Stapleton. Grainger (D-Jacksonville) was arrested by Tallahassee police in early December on charges of asking the 19-year-old Miss Stapleton to pose for lewd pictures and for serving alcoholic beverages to a minor.

In Jacksonville, Grainger, a real estate and mortgage broker, said he had not been officially notified that Rudd's office would not prosecute.

"I have not confirmed this with my attorney and I'd rather talk with him before I make any statement," he said. Rudd said he planned to meet with his lawyer, Murray Wadsworth, of Tallahassee, in the next day or so.

"I've taken the position I'm not taking any action," said Rudd, Leon County prosecuting attorney. He said he questioned Miss Stapleton in the company of her attorney, V. Craig McCaughren, of West Palm Beach, and Assistant City Police Chief Billie Bennett, on Saturday in his office.

"During this conference Miss Stapleton repudiated some material statements previously reflected in the Tallahassee police department report attributed to her."

"Due to the repudiation of some previous reported facts and a question as to the credibility of the witness, I am of the opinion that criminal charges should not be filed by this office," Rudd said in a written statement.

"If further inquiry is to be made, the grand jury is available. This action does not attempt to judge the defendant guilty or innocent, but is rendered on the improbability of securing a conviction."

Auto Theft Ring Cracked — Sheriff

A statewide auto theft ring, specializing in the stealing of rental cars and reselling them, has been broken by a combined force of Sanford, Seminole County, Orlando and Florida Bureau of Law Enforcement officers with the arrest of two men during the weekend.

Sheriff John Polk announced late Saturday that Stephen Tyler Toler, 27, Titusville, was charged with possession of stolen property. Chief Deputy Duane Harrell disclosed that Richard Carl Schultz, Lake Avenue, was arrested Sunday on possession of stolen property charges by Det. Tony Calangelo.

Calangelo reported that six cars had been recovered in the foray against the ring that operated between Jacksonville, Miami and Tampa.

Toler is in the county jail in lieu of \$5,000 bond but Schultz posted a \$10,000 bond Sunday and was released.

Sheriff Polk stated Toler was arrested at the Jai Alai Fronton and agents recovered one of the vehicles. "More arrests are anticipated," Calangelo reported.

Working on the case were Sgt. William Lykens and Lt. Charles Fagan, Sanford police; Det. Charles Simmons, Orla radio police; Paul Legg and Calangelo, Seminole County, and Florida Department of Law Enforcement agents, Calangelo said.

The car theft operation "bust" came just two days after Seminole County investigators arrested 15 persons in connection with the breaking of a large scale theft ring specializing in the burglary of homes, vehicles and business establishments.

Ten men were arrested Thursday night and five more were arrested Friday, including a 16-year-old juvenile.

The Friday arrests on a number of stolen property charges included Donald W. Goodall, 21, Winter Park; Richard Earl Goodall, 19, of 281 Church Street, Longwood; John Beaulieu, 20, Tollgate Trail, Longwood; and Steven W. Bennett, 20, Jessup Avenue, Longwood.

\$100,000 Library Given Trinity Prep

Trinity Preparatory School is the recipient of a memorial library building. It will be known as the "Newton Dyceman Rich Library" and has been given by Mrs. Newton Rich and her two daughters, Mrs. Marcia K. Rich McKeithan, of Winter Park, and Mrs. Kenneth A. Conley, of Falls Church, Va.

The architect is James Gamble Rogers of Winter Park. The building, which will cost in excess of \$100,000, is intended to be a learning laboratory and will provide lecture rooms, audio visual projection rooms, conference rooms for use of inter-department programs, areas for displaying art in its several forms, as well as providing in-house conditions for individual study. The library building will itself be a key building on Trinity's multi-million dollar campus.

The gift of a library building comes just at the time when Trinity had announced its new humanities program. The present library area will be converted into an art studio and music studio.

Trinity is a co-ed college preparatory school, grades seven through 12, located near Goldenrod on State Highway 408. This year the school has 342 students enrolled.

Building Charge On Agenda City Will Consider Sale Of Land

A request by five Sanford residents to purchase the 14-acre city-owned tract, first designated as the site for the relocation of the Sanford Zoo, is expected to come before the City Commission at tonight's 8 p.m. session.

The property, located on Seminole Boulevard, west of French Avenue and adjacent to The Sanford Herald, is reported to be under consideration as a site for an apartment complex, if the city and the group can arrive at a fair price.

City Commission at one time indicated the property could be used for the zoo but later the County Commission advised that a larger land tract located just these along northern U.S. 17-92 would be available for the zoo. City Commission understood them to place the acreage on the open market for sale and an appraisal was authorized.

Another agenda item to be discussed and possibly enacted from the city zoning and planning board that a \$400 capital improvement charge be placed on each new dwelling unit to be constructed in the city.

The charge was recommended in the zoning board's new annexation report to the Commission as a means of obtaining funds to provide water and sewer improvements.

Mr. and Mrs. Rich came to Winter Park about 17 years ago. Rich died January 1970. Even after his retirement, he continued active in his business, the LeMyer's Company of Chicago. He was chairman of the board of LeMyer's, the largest electrical contractor in the United States.

Mrs. and Mrs. Rich for many years were active in philanthropic activities both in Orlando-Winter Park area and in Chicago area. Rich was one of the founders of Trinity Preparatory School.

In accepting the gift, Rev. Canon A. Rees Hay, headmaster, said, "This library building advances Trinity's academic program many years in one stroke. We had not anticipated such a gift. 1971 was a special year for us. To just finish one building and begin another is exciting."

According to a hospital spokesman, the boy's condition is "fair." He is in the hospital pediatric section.

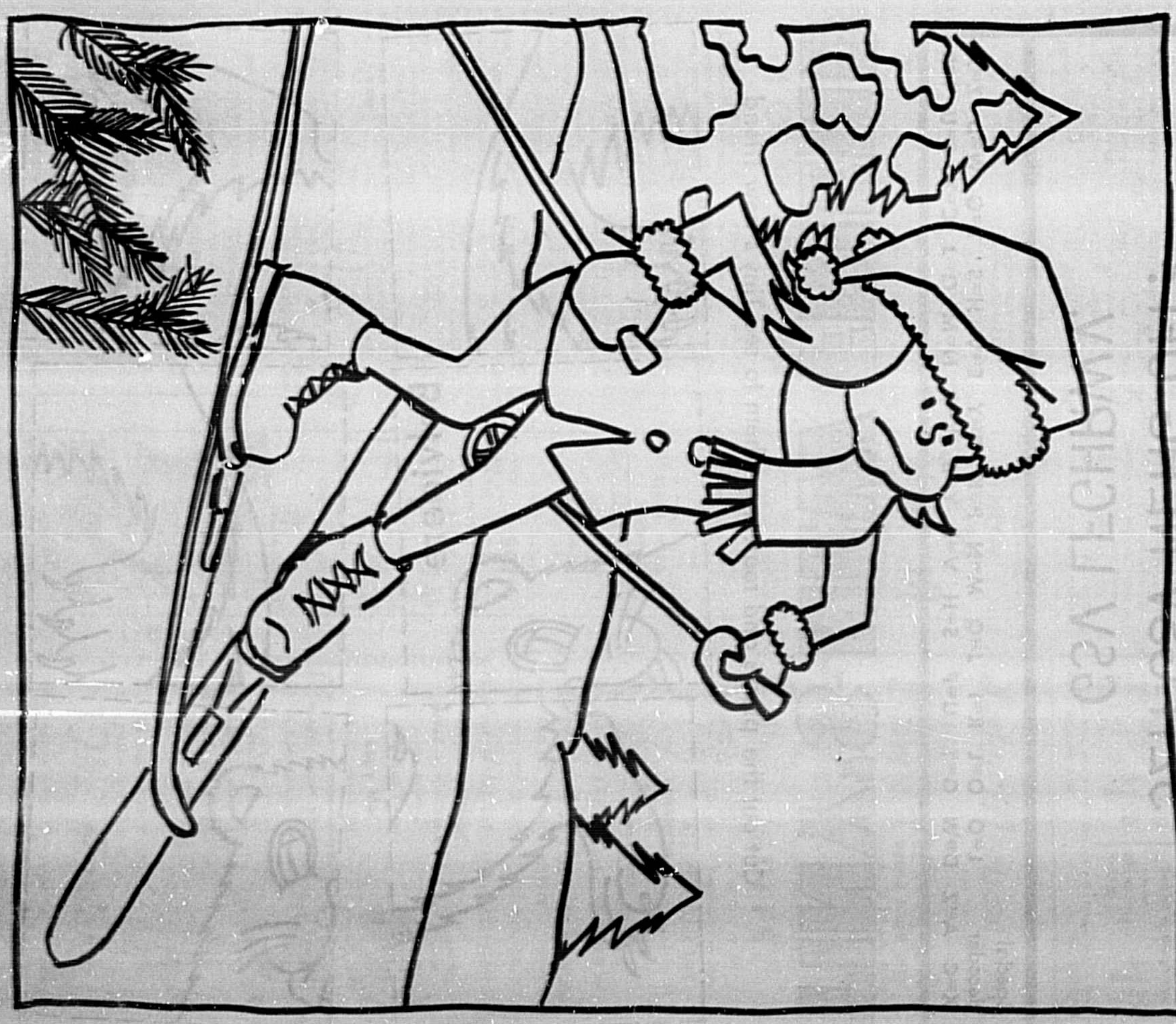
Cornelius is reported in "good" condition, the hospital spokesman added.
