Co-Ordination, Speeding Up Of Defense Program To Be Duty Of 13 Members

Seven Civilians To Be Included

Senate May Expand Navy Air Arm Beyond FDR's Plan

WASHINGTON, May 25. (AP)—President Roosevelt, it was learned today, has decided to revive the "council of National Defense"—in the World War a board of six cabinet officers and seven civilian experts—to co-ordinate, and speed up, the nation's extraordinary \$3,297,011,352 defense program.

Informed authority said the President already has compiled a list of names from which council members may be chosen, but the identity of the men on the list is a closely guarded secret.

Administration aides have been studying the 1916 Enabling Act to determine what revisions may be necessary. Word that the Defense Council is being revived with force was given to the press by a spokesman of the President's office.

Belgian Archives Taken By Officers Of German Corps

WITH THE GERMAN ARMY, May 25.—The story of how a daring parachute corps officer rushed straight to the Belgian foreign office when Brussels fell and seized archives which "will make the world prickle up its ears," was told to me yesterday by an authentic German military source.

Among the parachute jumpers who landed in the vicinity of Brussels, I was told, was a daring officer who in peacetime, served in Adolf Hitler's chancellery as a liaison man to the foreign office. He also was an assistant chief of protocol.

As soon as the Belgian capital surrendered he rushed into the city with the first troops and headed for the Belgian foreign office.

Cypress Company Asks Permit For River Dredging

The Wilson Cypress Company of Palatka has made application to the U. S. Engineers in Jacksonville for permits for two projects in the St. Johns River which would facilitate the movement of timber in the river, according to information received today from the Chief Administrative Assistant in the Engineer's office, H. T. Brock.

The permits requested are for the construction of a canal into the company's property two miles north of Lake Monroe. The proposed canal would have a width of 35 feet and would be seven feet deep. The canal would extend from the river into the applicant's property for a distance of approximately one mile. The material dredged from the canal will be deposited on the applicant's upland property, the notice said.

On that Empire Day, you saw the ideals of France, you saw peace upon which our Commonwealth of Free Peoples is founded. Ours were gathering, but I felt that in the days ahead we shall emerge with a new and better development, without suffering the previous onslaughts of war.

State Denies Convict Tale Of Brutality

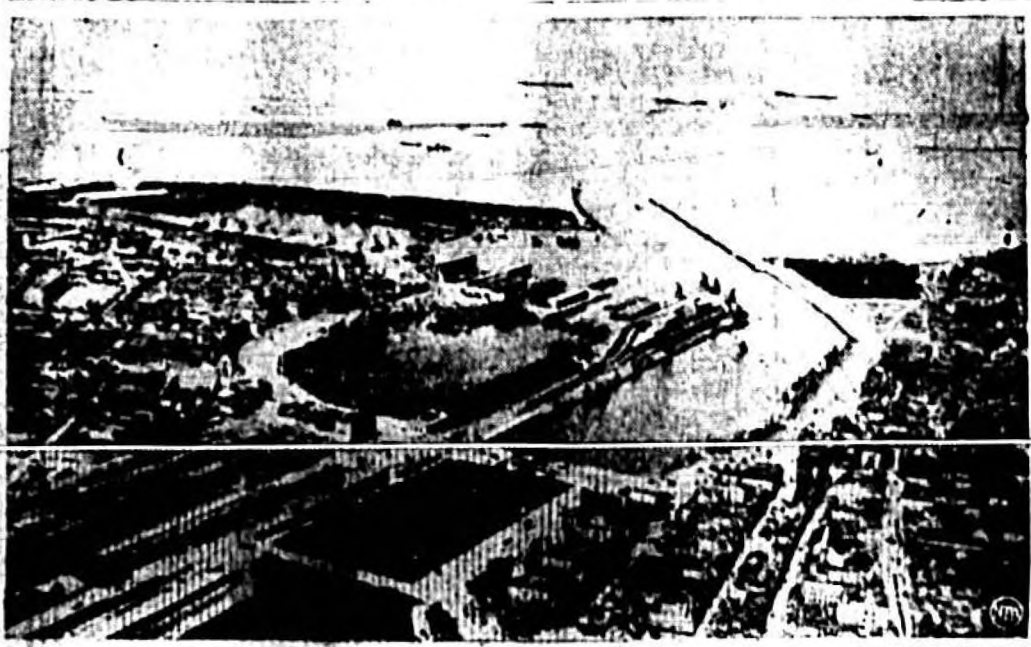
California Refuses To Extradite Men; Accuses Guards Of Killing Prisoners

TALLAHASSEE, May 25.—(P)—Florida today sent to California a 30-page denial of prison brutality charges.

Nazis Say They Have Encircled British-French-Belgians In North Of Flanders

Fighting Occurs In Calais Streets

French Claim German Salient To West Is Being Reduced

Powerful Nazi forces, driving steadily toward English Channel, have put Allied armies in northern France and Belgium—50,000 to 1,000,000 men—in peril of annihilation, it was asserted in Berlin today.

The high command said the Belgian, French and British armies in Flanders were completely encircled yesterday. Authorized German sources said the lightning strike of Hitler's blitzkrieg formations has resulted in the capture of the fortified town of Calais and that the British who would be "wiped out" within a week.

Development Of Locomotive Is Traced From 1801 To Present

The first development of travel by rail was the carriage drawn by a horse. There is no authentic information as to when power first occurred, but there is of the first heavy haulage on a prepared track in England when Trevithick had his first steam locomotive built in 1801. Between Trevithick's steam engine in 1801 and Stephenson's "Rocket" in 1825 came the Blenkinsop in 1813 and the "Porter" in 1814 and many others. (Continued From Page One) The American Red Cross, Mrs. Sharpe said that "As we sit and enjoy the security which our American citizenship gives us, we become smug. We hide our smugness behind nice and polite words. A ghastly and searing pain in the flesh, we call it. "A gnawing and paralyzing emptiness in the stomach, we call it hunger. "When a family's home is destroyed and its breadwinner taken away by sudden death, we politely say that family is "destitute."

"I urge you to look behind mere words. When the Red Cross asks you and other Americans for dollars to help the sick and wounded, the starving and suffering, think of the sum total of horrible human experience those words convey. Think of Europe's burning homes and broken families. Think of the homeless and miserable refugees, fleeing in fright to unknown terror in alien lands. Think of the mothers trying to comfort cold and hungry children who whisper and are afraid of the burbling shells and whining bombs.

"That is the stuff, modern war is made of. Battles no longer involve only military machines of the skillfullest nations. Modern war places masses of civilians—especially the women and children and the old people—right in the front lines. They bear every bit as much of the burden as the soldiers. And they have no way to protect themselves or their loved ones. "This is what makes the American Red Cross responsibility in this war tremendously greater than ever before. It will need more hospital equipment, more ambulances, more surgical dressings, and more warm garments, the number of these things that can be provided depends upon you," she said.

WARREN BONDS \$81,000 In County Bonds To Be Retired

AN OMAHA, IOWA, BOARD BEARING 6 PERCENT INTEREST TO BE PAID OFF JULY 1

The Omaha Board of County Bonds today authorized the purchase of \$81,000 in county bonds to be retired by the county on July 1, at a special meeting of the Board of County Commissioners in the Court House Saturday afternoon. County Clerk O. P. Herndon said today.

These bonds are the first of the county's \$2,100,000 refunding series of bonds to be called for retirement and represent a total reduction in principal and savings in interest for the county of \$200,000.

The retirement of these bonds is made possible by an agreement in the County's bond and interest sinking fund which has its principal source of revenue in the county's pre-war amount.

Under the provisions of the refunding agreement, the County will not be called to pay on all outstanding bonds until July 1, 1941, and on Jan. 1 of each year thereafter until the bonds are paid off.

The interest amount attached to each of the bonds which will be retired by the Board on July 1 will be worth \$2,000 if the bond was not retired until its maturity date. The total amount of the interest on the bonds is \$200,000.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—(AP)—President Roosevelt warned the nation last night to be on guard against the "unholy alliance" of foreign forces which, he said, seek to divide the people and to disrupt the preparedness program by creating dissension.

Reporting on the state of the nation's defense in his 14th radio "fireside" chat, Mr. Roosevelt called upon private industry for "the best, speediest and most efficient mass production of which it is capable" and offered governmental financial aid if it is needed.

On top of the billions now being approved by Congress, he said he would not hesitate to ask for more defense funds if they prove necessary.

Renewed his pledge not to surrender "the great social gains" made in recent years, and urged preparation for the country against any war in the near future.

ORLANDO, May 27.—(Special)—"Anti-Americanism will not find a foothold in Florida, if Senator L. Holland becomes the state's governor, and he will use every effort possible, whether governor or plain private citizen, to ferret out any 'fifth column' activities," Mr. Holland said today in speaking before a large Orlando audience.

Senator Holland expressed himself strongly upon the matter, one which has engendered fear among the neutral nations of Europe, declaring that he has nothing but contempt for the spies who violate the hospitality of the countries who befriended them.

"At this crucial period in our world's history, when the ruthless, maniacal warriors of Europe and Asia are attempting with every power at their command to destroy this present civilization, and to re-act it according to their own hellish designs, certainly no nation on the face of the earth can have the right to remain neutral, and economic, social, and economic matters upon which free nations have been founded unless it is their own nation, the United States of America," Senator Holland said.
