In a paid political advertisement appearing in last hight's Herald, supporters of Francis Whitehair declared that in the local race for state senator we "supported a candidate who had not had any previous political experience" and "took the stand that past political experience is not necessary." This, the advertisement dubbed "Editor-

While consistency is not a jewel which we regard priceless nor is experience the only consideration which might have induced our support of one candidate or anther in the state senate race, we think it only fair to our readers to point out to them that the statements contained in the Whitehair ad simply are not true and to remind them that we supported neither candidate in the state sen-

The only reference which we made to the state senthe only reference which we made to the state sen-charges throughout the entire campaign was to uphold the right of Mr. Boyle, our assistant state attorney, to vote for whichever candidate he chose, and if he liked, to shout his preference from the housetops, a right which we continue to uphold, not only for him, but for every other free born American citizen.

This, we submit, is a far cry from supporting one candidate over another or from taking the stand that "past political experience is not necessary." Political experience, of course, is not everything, but it is something, and all other things being equal, it might be the deciding factor. We say this now, as we would have said it at any other time, without the or being incomistent.

But resort to such misleading propaganda is typical of

the Whitehair campaign. If he is inconsistent, then charge your opponent with being inconsistent. If he is backed by the political machines of the big cities, then accuse your opponent of being supported by the machines. If you cannot tell the truth, then make it a whopper.

Too Fast A Pace

Excessive speed increased again in 1938, according to an analysis released by The Travelers Insurance Company.

Three years ago, in 1936, the company states, 32.6% of all persons killed as the result of some driver's lawlessness met death because of speed. In 1937 that percentage rose to 36.8%. Last year, 8,410, or 39.6% of the total of 32.000 persons who died in automobile accidents, were killed because of exceeding speed limits.




