A Basic Need

Does Seminole County need a fulltime Juvenile Counselor ?

The duties of this office probably are more varied than any other officer of any other court. It is a job that takes a great deal of time and ability if the Juvenile Court is to properly dispose of the various types of cases that are referred to it from day to day.

Additional funds for the coming fiscal year were requested of the County Commission to enable the court to have a fulltime counselor. It has been indicated that this request will not be fulfilled. Because of this the present counselor will have to operate under the present very difficult condition which means part time as a truant officer and the other as counselor.

The fundamental idea of the juvenile court is to rehabilitate rather than punish. No juvenile court can be very effective without a counselor to do the investirating and supervising of children. It is facetious to speak of having a juvenile court, if it consists of only a juvenile judge to whom a child is brought by a law enforcement officer, and who is limited to looking into a crystal ball to try to find out what caused the child's troubles, then giving out with a few well chosen words about 'ter hear it is word bay and honing that will do the trick.

A skilled counselor can go out and find the basic cause of the child's misbehavior or neglect, make dependable recommendations to the judge, and see that the judge's orders or started out. To enable the juvenile court to give the service demanded of it, it is imperative that the citizens of Seminole County be enlightened to the truism that no one can work effectively without proper tools and that no juvenile court judge can do what is expected of him unless funds are provided for the employment of at least one full time court counselor.
