

### Credit Important In Business, Rotarians Told

"Doing business on credit goes all the way back to the Egyptians," Paul Lewis, Credit Bureau director told the Rotary Club Monday.

"It continued on through the Roman times and then to England and up to the present when 97 percent of our gross national product is sold or bought on credit of one form or another.

"The first credit bureau was in Brooklyn in 1871," Lewis said, "and it was a little black book, carried in the coat pocket of a man, and listed the names of all the people who did not pay their bills."

Lewis asked for a show of hands of any person in the audience who did not have at least one credit card in his pocket, or a running charge account in at least one store.

Not a single hand was raised.

"Credit customers are the best people in town," Lewis said. "They are people who want to use the ready and convenient way of doing business. They have money to spend and will stay with the store where they have an account, if they are treated well."

In closing, Lewis made his often repeated statement.

"Your credit reputation is more valuable than any amount of money you might ever have in the bank."

# Reus, 'Bums' Slipping

The San Francisco Giants today celebrated a clubhouse celebration worthy of a pennant clincher — and who's to say it wasn't a prelude to the real thing?  
Certainly not the faltering Cincinnati Reds, whose clubhouse door was bolted tight Wednesday night after the "Jekyll-Hyde Giants" tied one record and set another in a 14-0 romp that moved them to within four games of first place in the National League.  
Only a month ago the Giants were counted out of the race but today they are riding a seven-game winning streak and have won 13 of their last 15 games in a drive that recalls the "miracle pennant" of 1951.  
It was difficult to tell which was more lustrous — the Giants' clubhouse celebration of their thirteenth five-homer, 13-

run ninth-inning rally that made a shambles of what had been a close duel between winner Juan Marchal and Cincinnati 18-game winner Joey Jay.  
Orlando Cepeda, Felipe Alou, Jim Davenport, Willie Mays and John Orsino homered and Cepeda and Willie McCovey each had two hits in the rally. The five homers in one inning tied a major league record previously shared by the 1939 Giants and 1948 Philadelphia Phillies and the 12 runs were the most ever scored by a major league team in a ninth inning.  
The Dodgers plunged to their ninth straight loss when they bowed to the St. Louis Cardinals, 8-7, and the Pittsburgh Pirates edged out the Milwaukee Braves, 7-6, in the other National League games.  
In the American League, the New York Yankees beat the Los Angeles Angels, 8-4, in 10 innings

and opened up a three-game lead when the Cleveland Indians downed the Detroit Tigers, 4-2. The Minnesota Twins defeated the Chicago White Sox, 4-0, the Baltimore Orioles scored a 7-5, 12-inning win over the Kansas City A's, and the Boston Red Sox routed the Washington Senators, 9-4.  
A four-run eighth-inning rally, featured by Ken Boyer's homer and Curt Flood's decisive single enabled the Cardinals to extend the Dodgers' longest losing streak since 1944.  
The Pirates spotted the Braves an early three-run lead on Frank Thomas' grand slam homer but pulled out the victory on Dick Stuart's ninth-inning single.  
Roger Maris tripled home the tie-breaking run and scored the winning run in the Yankees' 10th-inning triumph over the Ang-

# There's Only One King, Ruth's Buddies Say

NEW YORK (UPI) — Babe Ruth's former teammates wished Roger Maris and Mickey Mantle luck today, but agreed there always will be "only one home run king" — no matter who breaks his record.  
The Babe's former Yankee teammates all pointed out that "records are made to be broken." And they all added that Maris and Mantle look like the ones who can do it.  
"These kids are great hitters and either one of them is capable of breaking the record," said Jumping Joe Dugan. "But even if Maris and Mantle both do it, the Babe is still the king in my book."  
That was pretty much the same sentiment expressed by Wally Pipp, Bob Meusel, Jimmie Foxx and Bill Dickey, all of whom played on the same club with Ruth during his prime.  
Meusel, who now lives in Downey, Calif., and Dugan, a resident of Allston, Mass., both confessed some reluctance to seeing Ruth's all-time mark of 60 homers go by the boards.  
"The Babe was one of us," said Dugan, still sharp-eyed and surprisingly spry at 64. "He was part of my generation and we don't like to let it go."  
"When and if it does fall, it will be the end of more than a baseball record. I say good luck to both Maris and Mantle, but I won't be heart-broken if they don't break the Babe's mark."

The 65-year old Meusel, who used to draw gasps of admiration from the crowd with his amazing throwing arm during the 10 seasons he played left field for the Yankees from 1920 until 1930, insisted Ruth "would have hit a lot more than 60 homers with the modern ball."  
"I'd like to see the Babe retain his record," he said bluntly. "I think Maris or Mantle has a good chance to break Ruth's mark, but the Babe was a better home run hitter. The ball today is a lot livelier than the one we played with, so it makes a big difference."

## KC Thinking Of Moving Franchise?

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI)—The future of major league baseball in Kansas City travels in Charles O. Finley's briefcase, according to the city's General Manager Frank Lane.

"Finley has blueprints of a proposed stadium with him," Lane charged Wednesday. "Four or five of the players have seen the plans, and some sportscasters and sportswriters saw them in Dallas last week."  
"Beyond the shadow of a doubt, Charlie has been considering a move of the franchise," Lane said. "I know what I am talking about when I say this move has been in Finley's mind for some time."  
Lane, fired Monday by Finley, said the Athletics owner contemplated moving the franchise to Arlington, Tex., which is located midway between Dallas and Fort Worth.  
"But you can't move a home where there is no house, and there's no place to play major league baseball in Arlington," Lane said. "A stadium would

have to be built and that would take time. If Finley is thinking about Arlington as a site for his franchise, he won't be able to move until after the 1962 season because it will take at least that long to build a suitable stadium."  
Finley, contacted in Los Angeles, denied he has any intentions of shifting the franchise to another city.  
"I'm national chairman for the National Tuberculosis Association Christmas Seal drive," Finley said. "I flew out here to have pictures taken for the annual campaign. It has nothing to do with baseball whatsoever."  
It had been rumored that Finley would move the club to the West Coast if he were unable to find a suitable site in the Dallas-Fort Worth area.  
"It's a shame that I can't fly out to do a humanitarian job without being accused of coming to Los Angeles to see about moving my franchise," Finley said.  
Lane said the reasons given by Finley for his firing were untrue. Finley, in announcing that Lane was fired, charged that Lane had given him bad advice in recommending that Joe Gordon be discharged as field manager; that Lane had gone over his head on many trades and policy moves; and that Lane embarrassed field manager Hank Bauer by "chewing him out" in front of the players.

# Oh My Aching Feet Says Scout After Rugged Hike

After several months of planning, saving and working, Boy Scouts of Troop 311, started out early on the morning of July 22 for our first out-of-state trip.

With 10 excited boys and two leaders in two station wagons loaned to us by Viner Plumbing and Casselberry Utilities, we took off waving to our overjoyed parents. Our sponsors, the Casselberry Lions Club, paid all expenses of insurance coverage for the trip.

Our first stop was at Manatee State Park on the Suwannee River and at the next stop, Florida Caverns State Park, we camped overnight and visited the attractions there. Before leaving, most of the boys went into an old Indian Cave where, by using our flashlights, we did some interesting and exciting exploring deep into its depths.

From here, we took off for a full day's drive to Biloxi, Miss. The travel between stops was far from boring for there were many things to see along the way.

When we arrived in Biloxi, we found the scout camp where we were to stay five miles out of town had a nice pool which we took advantage of almost immediately.

Next morning we started on the 21-mile hike through Biloxi which covered points of interest along the Civil War Centennial Trail including the Jefferson Davis Home and Memorial, the Chapel where he worshipped, the Lighthouse and Keeler Air Force Base.

The medals we received upon completing the hike made the sore

and aching feet, and many blisters, thoroughly worth the effort.

Next day we left camp and drove eight miles down the scenic Gulf Highway to Gulfport, Miss., where we took another hike on Ship Island Trail where half the course is on the mainland and the remainder on the island. To cross the water, we rode the boat, Sundowner II. On the trail we visited the port, the marine life aquarium, and several ships and on the island we saw Fort Massachusetts, the Lighthouse and the shell covered

beach. We received another medal for this hike.

Five of the scouts also made the Jefferson Davis Memorial Trail to earn a third medal. While they were on this hike, the remainder of the group went to New Orleans where the boys rode a trolley car, visited the famous French Quarter and crossed the Mississippi River by ferry.

Saying goodbye to Biloxi, we headed for Pensacola Naval Air Station to tour the base and at Eglin Air Force Base we spent the

night at Camp Robin, their Scout Camp.

There we toured the climatic hangar where any temperature can be created and at the time we walked across the building there was ice and snow on the floor in the 25 degrees below zero simulated atmosphere.

Driving north we stopped at the small town of Castleberry the only other town of the name in the U. S. We spent the night in Alexander City near Horseshoe Bend Trail where three members of our

party hiked 18 miles. Andrew Jackson took this rugged trail during the War of 1812 to defeat the Creek Indians in the Battle of Horseshoe Bend. This hike truly was the roughest of the trip since it led across the hilly, rocky and hot country of northern Alabama.

The seven scouts not making this hike went to Chattanooga, Tenn., to visit sites of several Civil War battles on Lookout Mountain and in Chickamauga Battlefield. Camp was made at Harrison Bay State Park.

The group reconvened north of Atlanta, Ga., and visited the historic Andersonville Confederate Prison before heading for Florida (tired but happy!) WE HAD A BALL!

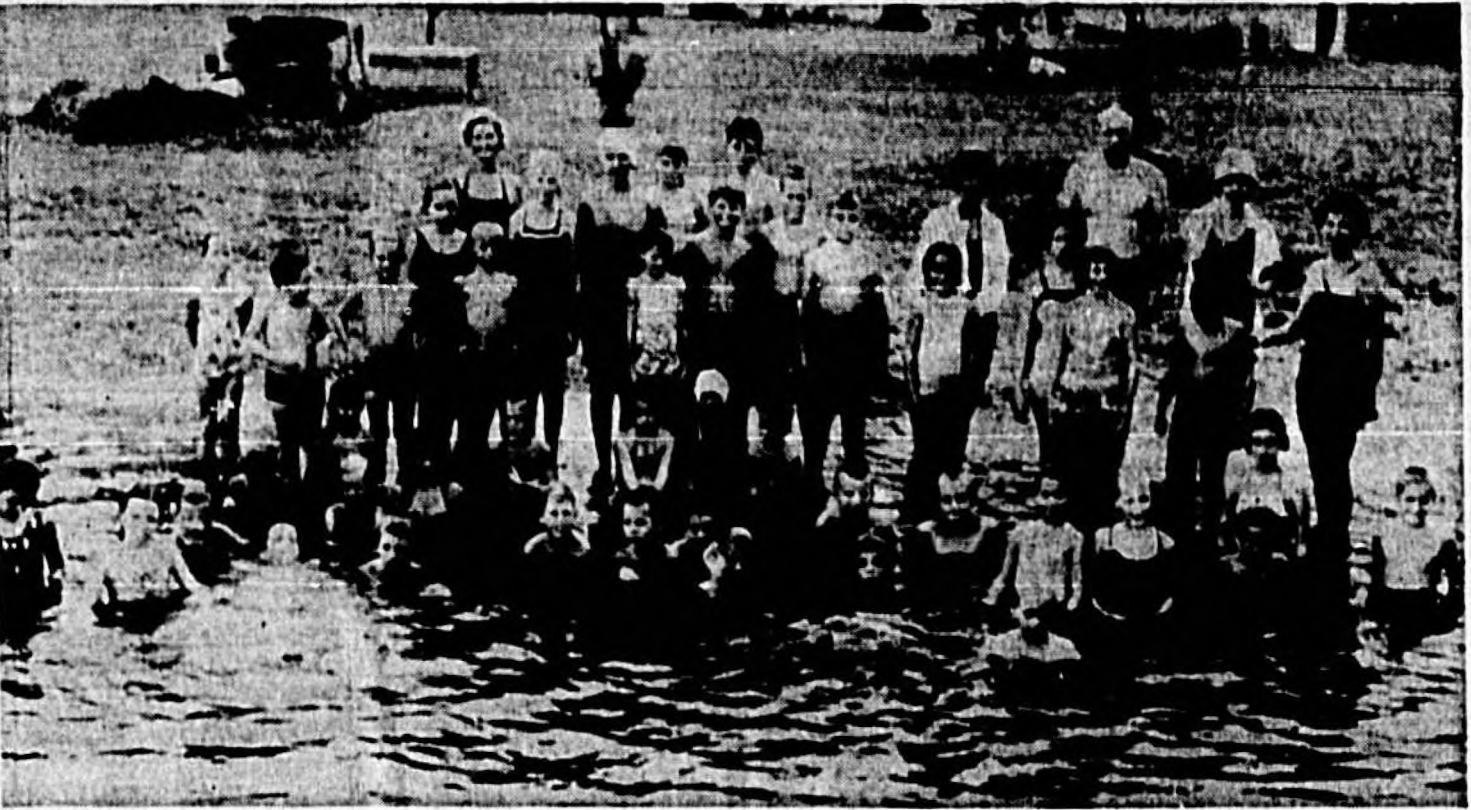
### Chuluota Meeting Is Well Attended

Hostess for the occasion, given for Catholic Women of North Orlando and Longwood, was Mrs. Edmund D. Jones who, with her husband and 13-year-old daughter, Pam, is transforming their Seminole County home to carry out traditions of the family ancestry. The decorating theme, too, is right in line with the family business, the China House Restaurant in Orlando, which is owned and operated by Jones and his brother. Although neither man ever has been to China, their parents came to the United States from Canton and handed down to their sons many of their old country possessions and customs which were to become the inspiration for the North Orlando couple's interior decorating.

Mrs. Jones (Wanda), who said that this theme was chosen because "it is so simple, yet so beautiful and distinct," added that most of the work was done as a hobby. The only professional service required was for locating the drapes and wall-to-wall carpeting in the living and dining areas.

Incidental accessory pieces include lamps for which the bases are in the forms of the goddess of fire and light; a dragon head from the costume used by paraders celebrating the Chinese New Year makes an excellent door stop and on prominent display is a golden serpent with a bell hanging from its head which is a museum piece.

To complete the picture, even the family pets are chosen from Oriental tradition. Ki-doy (bad boy) and Ki-Nusy (bad girl), a pair of thoroughbred Pekingeses, undoubtedly have ancient ancestors, who were among the chosen animals to bear trains of the robes worn by Chinese royalty.

The Jones now plan to extend their creative talents to include their back yard where a typical Oriental Garden eventually will blend its beauty and grace with the tropical setting.

Those attending the 3 p. m. until 6 p. m. afternoon event last week were served refreshments of fried won ton, egg roll, Chinese pork and ribs, subgum, tossed salad with homemade dressing and chinese cakes.
