## County Greetns Proposed Tax Cut With Glee, Gloom

Seminole County officials today reacted with glee or gloom, depending on individual economic philosophy, to a congressional committee's proposal to cut income taxes by 10 per cent and up gasoline taxes by 30 cents a gallon.

Tax cuts of up to \$12 billion a year have been urged by the Congressional Joint Economic Committee to help pump up the economy and head off what the panel called possibly the nation's worst recession in 35 years.

The committee's tax-cut proposal Sunday was joined by other recommendations by Andrew F. Brimmer, dean of the Harvard business school. Brimmer proposed a one-time 10 per cent cut in 1974 federal income taxes on salaries up to \$13,200.

The committee also urged Congress to consider enacting a gasoline tax increase to help force a reduction in demand. As an example, it said a tax of 30 cents a gallon would cut gas consumption by 500,000 barrels daily.

"That would not affect us in any shape, form or fashion," according to Roger Harris, Asst. Supt. of Finance for the Seminole County School Board.

Although Harris felt governmental agencies wouldn't be affected by an increased gasoline tax, Sanford City Manager Pete Knowles said it depends on the way the law is written.

"Political subdivisions are exempt from federal taxes, but they can write the law so it doesn't exempt political subdivisions. That would really hurt," Knowles said.

"I can tell you it would. It would really hurt us in this year's budget," said Fred Taylor, the school system's director of transportation.

"We'll just hope that it doesn't happen, but if it does, we'll really be in bind," Taylor said. The increase would about double the cost of gasoline to governmental agencies — if it affected them.

The Congressional Joint Committee, warning that unemployment will hit 7.5 per cent by next summer, said a minimum of \$10 billion in tax relief should be enacted immediately.

The relief should be aimed at low and moderate income persons, according to the committee.

"In my estimation if they really want to dampen inflation, they should apply it to the middle and low income people," Harris said.

"If you want to get money in the economy, you've got to get money to the poor."

Knowles agreed, but with some reservations. "I think 10 per cent at one time is excellent — if they couple it with some inflationary controls," he said.

Casselberry City Manager Harry Hug said, "It has got to give more cash in hand to the majority of the wage earners. I would think it should increase the purchasing power of the country."

A voluntary system of wage-price guidelines also was advocated by the committee's Democratic majority to give President Ford authority to roll back selected wage and price hikes he found inflationary.

The committee's report argued that the only way to fight both recession and inflation is to use monetary stimulants and intervene in some wage price cases.

It proposed that any tax cuts now could be offset later by elimination of the oil depletion allowance and other tax changes.

Other recommendations include:

- Expansion of federal public service programs and unemployment compensation.
- A rollback of oil prices but an increase in the price of new natural gas.
- A less stringent monetary program than the one being followed by the Federal Reserve Board.

Police in Seminole County today were investigating a rash of holiday weekend thefts and burglaries involving thousands of dollars in gifts and property.

Sanford police detectives were probing 47 burglaries and thefts in which victims listed everything from bicycles, jewelry, firearms, food and small appliances to alcoholic beverages as missing.

Patrolman D. H. Whitmore said a white male made off with eight new bicycles, valued at \$450, from the front of Eagle Family Discount Store, Fairway Plaza Shopping Center, Sunday afternoon.

Manager Charles Eaton saw a man at the bicycle display, noted six bikes were missing and went to call police. Officers said when Eaton returned from making the telephone call the last two bicycles were gone — and so was the man.

Police reports said another unidentified man had kept clerks busy with questions about items in the rear of the store, apparently while the other man was taking the first six bicycles.

Detectives were busy today compiling lists of thousands of dollars worth of other items taken in Sanford weekend burglaries.

Some of the other thefts included:

- Jewelry, watch and other items, total value more than \$200, from the home of John V. Charron, 2201 Oak Avenue.
- Shotgun, rifle, camera, jewelry and old coins, total value \$843, from home of Mrs. Willie Fisher, 100 Scott Drive.
- Beer, wine, chewing gum and a ham, total value \$188 from Victory Beer Gardens, 302 Sanford Avenue.
- Portable television, value \$160, from home of Blanche Cunningham, 1320 Myrtle Avenue.
- Walkie-talkie radio and compasses valued at \$125 from Monroe Harbour Marina, Holiday Isle on the lakefront, after smashing a window to gain entry.
- Patrolman John W. Foster reported that burglars after prying open a window, took the time to unwrap presents under the Christmas tree at the home of Terry Tenney, 1513 Summerlin Avenue.

Listed as missing were a cassette recorder, tape player and stereo photograph amplifier and speakers valued at \$195.

Officials were taking inventory at Seminole High School's vocational garage classroom to determine the value of tools taken by thieves, who climbed a fence and entered by a window. Police found some tools scattered over the school campus.

At Sanford Grammar School tools, cookies and crackers were taken after the facility was entered via an unlocked door, police reported.

Longwood police reported weekend burglars took \$150 cash and broke into a cigarette vending machine at Crusty's Pizza on SR 434 west of SR 427 early Sunday.

Sgt. Greg Manning said the thieves entered the restaurant via a rear restroom window.

Seminole County Sheriff's deputies today were also probing a number of weekend burglaries and thefts.

## 'Furloughs' Begin For Stromberg-Carlson Employees

Stromberg-Carlson Corp. furloughed 575 employees today for a two-week period, leaving the telephone equipment manufacturing firm with a 225-man work force to handle only present commitments and emergency service, a company spokesman announced today.

The furloughed employees were primarily production line personnel and will return to work at the Sanford company on Jan. 6, said Joseph Hartwig, industrial relations manager.

Hartwig said the furloughed employees will "all be paid for at least three days of holiday pay and retain company benefits." He also said the majority of the employees will have some basic eligibility for unemployment, depending on the total length of employment time with the company.

"We are in a situation where we are trying to meet customers' commitments we have on hand and any emergency type service that would be required," Hartwig said.

The company laid off 99 employees indefinitely during the first half of December.

Hartwig said that he does not foresee any more layoffs "at this time," but that future cutbacks will depend on the economic situation.

Hartwig said the furloughs were caused "simply by the lack of orders." The company manufactures telephone equipment for independent telephone companies.

The number of telephone orders are down because of the "extremely high" prime interest rate, low home telephone sales caused by slow construction and low PBX sales, according to Hartwig.

"The telephone companies themselves have been trying to obtain rate improvements to meet rising costs, but they are experiencing delays from the Public Service Commission in getting rate improvements," Hartwig said.

The company is experiencing its first general layoff since opening operations in 1971. The company normally maintains a 900-man work force.

Hartwig said approximately one half of the furloughed employees live in the Sanford area, while the remaining employees live throughout Seminole County.

Hartwig said the furloughing was a general move for the firm's other three plants located in Rochester, N.Y., Camden, Ark., and Charlottesville, Va. The company is a subsidiary of General Dynamics Corp. of St. Louis (NYSE).

## Time Is Money In Some Cases

State Treasurer and Insurance Commissioner Tom O'Malley's Orlando office recovered \$88,000 in October in refunds of policyholder's money in three counties, including Seminole, an official said today.

"This refund resulted from questions asked by individual citizens who took the time to contact the commissioner's representative," Deputy Commissioner Bill Cecova said.

A representative from O'Malley's Orlando office is in Sanford the second Thursday of each month. Citizens with insurance problems may contact him at the Seminole County Courthouse at 1 p.m.

An O'Malley spokesman urged persons who need insurance policies explained or feel a company is not meeting its obligations under the terms of the contract to contact him.

Cecova said the best way to get in touch is by letter or in person, since agents need to know absolute details before taking a claim to an insurance company for a refund.

The following services are available to Seminole residents:

- Assistance in receiving payment of valid claims.
- Answers to questions relating to all types of insurance.
- Assistance in complying with compulsory automobile insurance laws and financial responsibility laws.
- Answers to questions concerning insurance agents and insurance companies sales activities.

An Orlando representative said the office doesn't rate companies, but can readily provide consumers with information about which companies are licensed in Florida. The Orlando office is also responsible for answering citizens' question in Lake and Orange Counties.

## Tax Cuts Are Urged By Economic Group

WASHINGTON (AP)—Tax cuts of up to \$12 billion a year have been urged by the congressional Joint Economic Committee to help pump up the economy and head off what the panel called possibly the worst recession in more than 35 years. At the same time the committee urged Congress to consider enacting a gasoline tax increase to help force a reduction in demand. As an example, it said a tax of 30 cents a gallon would cut gas consumption by 8 per cent or 500,000 barrels a day during the first year. The federal gas tax now is four cents a gallon.

## Stock Prices Drop

NEW YORK (AP)—General economic worries drove prices lower on the stock market again today. The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials was off a point near the opening and declines held a 2 1/2-point lead over gainers on the New York Stock Exchange.

Brokers said investors were unable to see resolution to the country's economic troubles, and were worried by last week's figures showing a sharp drop in durable goods orders coupled with a continued rapid rise in prices. Although a number of economists called for an income tax cut over the weekend to stimulate the lagging economy, President Ford is said unlikely to take any economic action before January.

## Lady Bird Honored

VAIL, Colo. (AP)—Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson got a birthday greeting from President Ford, who took time out from his Colorado skiing vacation to telephone the former first lady at her Texas ranch.

Sunday's conversation lasted eight minutes and included a personal chat between Mrs. Ford and Mrs. Johnson, according to a White House release. The 54-year-old Mrs. Johnson's 82nd birthday. She lives at the LeJ Ranch in Johnson City, Tex., which for many years was a presidential visiting spot.

## Life 'Unsheltered'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Her life in the White House will be sheltered, says Susan Ford. "I'm not the sheltered type person," she delights in sneaking out of the White House unnoticed for an evening on the town. She giggles when the gold wedding band on her left ring finger is mistaken for her own. "It's my grandmother's," she says. And she confesses to a "white lie" when she says that her mother reminds her of putting her feet up on her father's Oval office desk.

## Wallace Eyes Future

WASHINGTON (AP)—Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace faces both physical and political uncertainties as he decides whether to make a fourth bid in 1976 for the presidency. Some close associates of the 54-year-old Wallace, who last month won his third term as governor, are unsure whether he will run for the Democratic presidential nomination.

# Attorney 'Meets The Law'

# These Laymen Do Their Homework Well

Editor's note: This is the last of a series dealing with the state of utility operations in Seminole County. Today, the writer reviews the many independent utility firms that serve communities.

If you live outside a municipality in Seminole County, you probably receive your water and sewer service from one of the 21 private utility firms that operate in 39 different certified areas.

If so, you and 20,000 others are the beneficiaries of a check on "general housekeeping" by a plant operator's certification and other operational procedures.

If the office finds anything that does not conform to county utility regulations, they ask for a voluntary compliance from the firm. According to Inspector Cowan, most of the firms are cooperative and will comply immediately. But in the case of a "management situation" that impedes compliance, the firm is then called in for a public hearing in front of the county commissioners, who sit as the Utility Control Board.

## ANALYSIS

The five-year-old control office is staffed by Director Bill Dale and three inspectors: Operator-Inspector Douglas Cowan, Mechanical Inspector Brian Johnson, and Chief Inspector R. M. Parmelee. They visit the 40 utility plants in the county on a regular basis to

check on "general housekeeping" by a plant operator's certification and other operational procedures.

There's A Bitter Outlook For Sugar

WASHINGTON—Bakers blame farmers and refiners. Consumer advocates blame producers and the U.S. Agriculture Department. Producers blame increased world demand. Some congressmen blame the Soviet Union and oil-rich Arab nations.

Their controversy is sugar. The question is its price—400 per cent higher in U.S. markets than it was just a year ago. And to why it's so, there is simply no one answer.

At least that was the prognosis from recent Council on Wage and Price Stability hearings on skyrocketing sugar prices. "Everyone blame(s) everyone else," said Albert Rees, council chairman, whose agency by the end of the year will write a report on the causes and possible cures for the high sugar prices.

But a prehearing council staff report brought out one point on which consumers, bakers, food processors, sugar producers and the Agriculture Department agree: "The basic economic reason that sugar prices are high is that since crop year 1970-71, the world has consumed more sugar than it has produced and, hence, has seriously depleted its stocks."

"Because we in the United States import about one-half of the sugar we consume, we are directly affected by this worldwide problem," the report states.

Furthermore, the report stated, "the short-run outlook for sugar prices is not encouraging. The supply-demand situation will probably remain very tight for the next year or two at least."

Beyond that consensus, definitions of the problem and its solution are varied. Rep. Peter Peyser, R-N.Y., charged at the hearing that the Soviet Union and oil-rich Arab countries had colluded to drive up the price on world markets.

"This is a deliberate effort to further create financial problems for the poorer countries in the world and generally lend to the economic crisis that many countries are facing due to the price of oil," Peyser testified.

But Treasury Secretary William Simon countered that such a conspiracy theory is "one idea we can dismiss immediately."

Simon said his department has studied large recently placed orders for sugar from the Soviet Union and Arab nations, and "we can find no evidence of a conspiracy between them to hoard or drive up the price of sugar."

Carol Tucker Foreman, executive director of the Consumer Federation of America, pointed to the Agriculture Department as a culprit in the sugar price rise.

A "gross mistake" by the department last January, she charged, was its public prediction of a million-ton increase in U.S. sugar consumption, which then, tipped off a price jump.

Even without the boost in prices discouraging sugar consumption, the estimate was excessive, she said. But the main gripe CFA and other consumer groups were alleged profiteering "by sugar companies whose windfall profits," they say, have caused the price rise.

Those increased prices amount this year to more than 400 per cent for the Amstar Corp., the largest sugar refiner, and 1,200 per cent for Great Western United Corp.

The parade of critics of the South Korean regime sometimes appears endless. But the criticism, like that being spooned out regularly by former U.S. Ambassador to Japan and Harvard Prof. Edwin O. Reischauer, is so heavy that it is refreshing to hear for a change a thoughtful American view on the other side.

Whenever American businessman T. Jefferson Coolidge Jr., writes a letter to the editor of the New York Times or Washington Post he is immediately knocked for supporting the regime of President Park Chung Hee, just because Coolidge has some business interests in Seoul.

Prof. Jerome A. Cohen, another Harvard instructor who makes a mini-career out of criticizing the Seoul government on the chicken a-la-king luncheon circuit, says of Coolidge's statements: "They (American businessmen in South Korea) have to make noises favoring Park in order to stay in business there."

Coolidge bristles at such comments. But he believes both Reischauer and Cohen, though mistaken in their views, are at least helpful in the sense that they are directing much-needed American public attention to the Korean question.

Coolidge takes strong exception to Reischauer's call (made before a congressional subcommittee) that U.S. forces should be withdrawn from South Korea and the professor's further suggestion (in a magazine article) that the U.S. line of defense be drawn at the Korean Straits (i.e., the waters between Korea and Japan).

Fourteen years ago, Coolidge—who played football (center) at Harvard on the same team with Sen. Edward Kennedy (end)—founded a private development and venture capital corporation in Korea.

"My associations have expanded beyond the commercial sector," Coolidge told a congressional hearing recently, "to conclude charitable and educational activities in Korea as well as extensive personal friendships. In short, Korea has become for me a second home after Boston, Mass."

Speaking as a "private individual with a deep and long concern for Korea, its people and our (U.S.) own foreign policy interests," Coolidge said a U.S. troop withdrawal from Korea would endanger the delicate power balance in the area. Such a move would also "end any constructive influence we might have on the policies of the Republic of Korea government."

Reischauer said a U.S. troop withdrawal would be a "signal" to President Park to end repressive political practices. Coolidge says it would be a signal all right, but to Communist Pyongyang as much as Seoul. "Such a signal would more likely be misconstrued by Kim Il-sung in North Korea as an invitation to increased military adventurism against South Korea."

On drawing a defense line in the Korean Straits, Coolidge said: "I question whether we can clearly see Japan's stability as a line of defense."

The U.S. presence there guarantees a front line of defense for Japan under the U.S.-Japan Mutual Security Treaty. It is a shield behind which Japan has built an industrial machine that is the envy of the rest of the world.

Bible, Murder Link Pondered By Police

MIAMI (AP)—Detectives say they're investigating possible links between a missing page from a Bible and the ritualistic slaying of a 9-year-old Pennsylvania boy. Miami homicide detective Edward Carberry said he would compare the Bible with another to see if the missing verses provide any clues in the throat-slashing death of Arnold Zeleznik of Fort Washington, Pa.

Exhumation Sought

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP)—An attorney for the late Paul John Knowles, accused slayer of seven persons, says he "ask for Knowles' body to be exhumed to clear up 'discrepancies' regarding his death." Knowles was shot to death last week by authorities who said he picked the lock on his handcuffs and tried to grab an officer's gun in an apparent escape attempt.

Africa Eyes New Look

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP)—South Africa's foreign minister says 1975 may give the map of southern Africa a "completely different appearance" as concessions are granted to the black majorities.

Analyst Held In Teenager's Death

A 22-year-old held on \$100,000 bond on a second-degree murder charge in the Sunday shooting death of a Sanford teenager was scheduled for first appearance in County Court at Sanford this afternoon. Quintin Cornelius Faison, 28, Seminole Gardens, West Sixth St., Sanford, was jailed after the youth, shot in his apartment, was dead on arrival at Seminole Memorial Hospital Sunday morning, police said.

'Fish Viewer' Aids Jobless

If it's any consolation in this time of joblessness, the Florida State Employment Service is geared up to provide the fastest, most complete assistance possible — through the State and Central Florida Job Bank — with a high-speed communications network.
Born during the boom times of the early '70s (Seminoles' population soared from 83,692 in 1970 to 125,069 in 1973), the Job Bank is still a boon in these more troubled times.
Until this year, the jobs in the Sanford area could get daily news of jobs only in Seminole County, according to Ralph Prescott, manager of the Sanford state employment office.

These listings are converted to computer printouts which are then reduced to 3-by-5-inch plastic "Micro Fiche" cards. These cards and the printouts are distributed the next morning by registered mail to each office within the area by the central office.
Partly as a result of the communications speed-up, Prescott says, the placement rate has increased 20-per-cent over last year. However, other factors affecting the increase are area growth, and possibly expansion of the local office staff from 7 to 14 persons.
The most visible sign of the conversion to electronic wizardry is the Micro Fiche itself. Resembling a television set, and referred to as "The Fish Viewer," the device is actually a sort of slide projector. The small Micro Fiche card is enlarged on a screen and thus the job-seeker can scan the computer print-out on the screen.
Locally, the job-seeker can get the same information by scanning the computer printouts themselves.

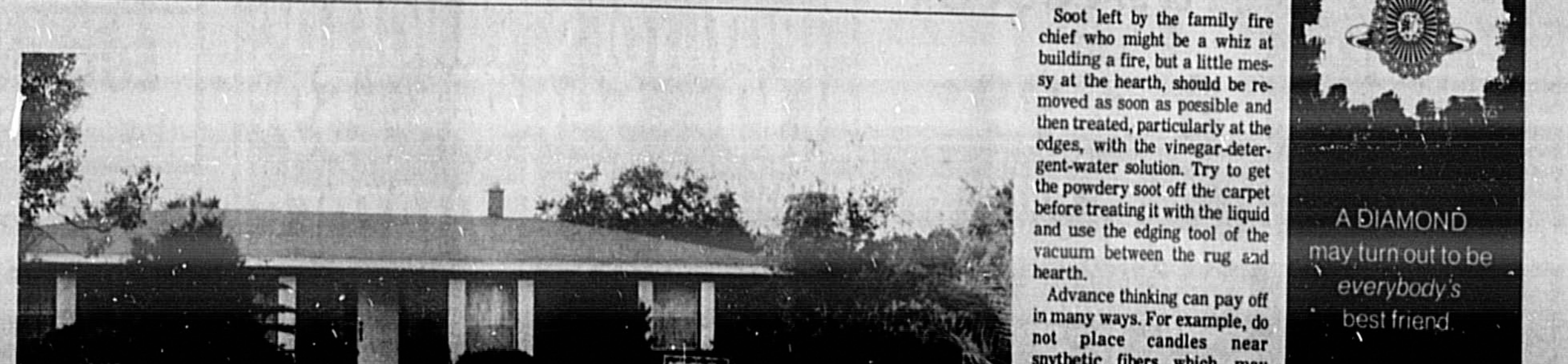

Plan Ahead For Party Cleanups

Hang the mistletoe high, bake the pumpkin pie, but be prepared for cranberry and pine sap stains. Dotted candle drippings and soot smudges.
Preparation may cut the costs of yuletide meriment cleanup.
Some practical persons may go too far, advising that you invest in a red and white rug if you are addicted to cranberries (or black and white rug if you have shaggy animals) but avoiding pine needles in a shag rug is worth a thought as you cope with just about any holiday stain.
The advice stresses preparation. Include stain removal ingredients in your Christmas shopping list. It's a grim thought, but not if you keep in mind that such items — mild detergent for delicate fabrics, white vinegar, dry cleaning fluid of the solvent variety, sponge and paper towels — are all that may be needed to obliterate stains.
After the carpet is dry, apply a dry-cleaning solvent. This double whammy should be used also for coffee, tea and salad dressing stains, but not on cranberries or alcohol where you use detergent, water and vinegar but skip the dry cleaning solvent.
Speed is important in coping with stains from alcoholic beverages, including wine. You might use the old "I think I've lost my earring" trick to in-

But for the past three months I have been experiencing congestion along with a gaseous or bubbly sensation in the chest and throat after each time I have intercourse. I feel like there is a freshly opened bottle of soda in my chest. There is no burning at all involved. I only get this during intercourse and it lasts for two or three hours. I can feel it coming on during sex when I have pressure on me. When this happens I start me coughing so I force myself to spit up as much as I can. There really is nothing to spit up. My husband has been very considerate and is also at a loss as to why this is happening.
Any advice you can give me on this matter will be greatly appreciated.
DEAR READER — It's a good bet that you don't have any sex problem at all. You should have a good medical examination, and particularly have your doctor check to see if you have a hiatal hernia. Women who have had children are much more likely to have this problem.
The pressure inside the abdomen while carrying the child helps to stretch the abdomen in such a way that there is a normal opening in your diaphragm to pass the esophagus tube to the stomach, which is immediately under the

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# Former Herald Staffer Witnesses Swearing-In Ceremony

Editor's Note—Chris Nelson, former staff writer for The Evening Herald is now a press aide for Congressman Lester Wolff (D-N.Y.). Nelson was present for the confirmation of Nelson Rockefeller as the first Vice President of the United States and writes of his personal observations surrounding the event.

WASHINGTON, D.C.— Nelson Aldrich Rockefeller, my old governor, was, as you know by now, sworn in as the nation's 41st vice president late Thursday night, the second man to hold our second highest office without a vote by the American people.

At the precise moment he raised his right hand, I was spooning in a late night roast beef at one of Washington's late night eateries.

For, in addition to our previous constituent relationship, we the governor and I, had something in common that day. Both had just gained a Washington job after several years absence from the federal public trough.

While my new position, as flack and general trouble shooter for Long Island Congressman Lester Wolff, was admittedly somewhat less exalted than Rocky's it was none the less welcome to me for various reasons, less and less clear, agreed to manage a campaign against U. S. Rep. Lou Frey.

Thursday, I sat in the House Press Gallery as the final debate on Rockefeller began, popping in and out before returning for the climactic moments shortly before 7 p.m.

The Chamber was perhaps one-fifth full as it was right up to the final vote, with various members giving impassioned speeches — one way or another — before being granted silence by the Speaker after their five minute allotment expired.

At one point, Secretary of the Interior Rogers Morton, a former Congressman from my parents' district in Maryland, created a small stir on the Republican side of the aisle as various GOP stalwarts rushed to shake his hand.

"Distributing oil leases, no doubt," quipped an old friend from the Gamnett newspaper chain as we watched from above.

"My Lord, what a bore," was the equally cynical verdict of a younger tyro as Morton's successor to the Maryland Eastern shore seat, arch conservative Robert Bauman, castigated Rockefeller in terms not heard since the 1964 Republican Convention.

Seminole County Congressman Bill Gunter earlier announced he would vote against Rockefeller in a strongly worded statement criticizing the House leadership for limiting debate to a mere five hours and the House Judiciary Committee for the shallowness of its hearings.

Gunter said he felt that serious questions still remained about Rockefeller's controversial gifts and donations even were the committee's failure to call Rocky's brother — Chase Manhattan Bank Chairman David.

Gunter's concerns echoed those of many on the negative side. A perhaps surprising supporter was Republican-turned-Democrat Ogden Reed, retiring after six terms in the House from New York, who could not resist a jab at his old sponsor, commenting, "I have known Nelson Rockefeller for many years and through various incarnations."

Reed, my old boss from The Hill some years ago, joined the majority of the New York delegation which, for a variety of overt and covert reasons, ended up supporting the multimillionaire politician.

As the debate drew on and on, congressmen and women wandered in and out of the House Chamber. The ex-governor's family of stately conversations would rise every

few moments to the point where the din overshadowed the debate, and the Speaker would furiously pound his gavel to demand silence.

Bella Abruzzo, the gentle lady from New York, launched one of the more vitriolic home grown attacks on Rocky, making repeated rude comments about the family's money, but also charging Rockefeller with arrogance, authoritarianism and policies which guaranteed special privileges for the rich.

## 'No Magic' In Bluebonnet Tilt

"There is no magic in winning football games," Holtz said after entertaining newsmen with a disappearing silver dollar and a rope trick. Holtz says his underdog Wolfpack cr. do enough tricks with a football to pull off an upset at the Astrodome in the nationally televised classic.

Holtz, a magician by avocation, has turned the Wolfpack around by vocation, bringing them to their third straight bowl game with a 9-2 record. Houston Coach Bill Yeoman's most famous trick was inventing the veer option offense which both teams will use in tonight's battle.

"When we first came out with the veer, it was almost like running against the bags (blocking bags)," Yeoman said. "It was something new and people hadn't adjusted to it. Now they're getting very subtle. They're getting (defensive) help from places they never thought they could be from."

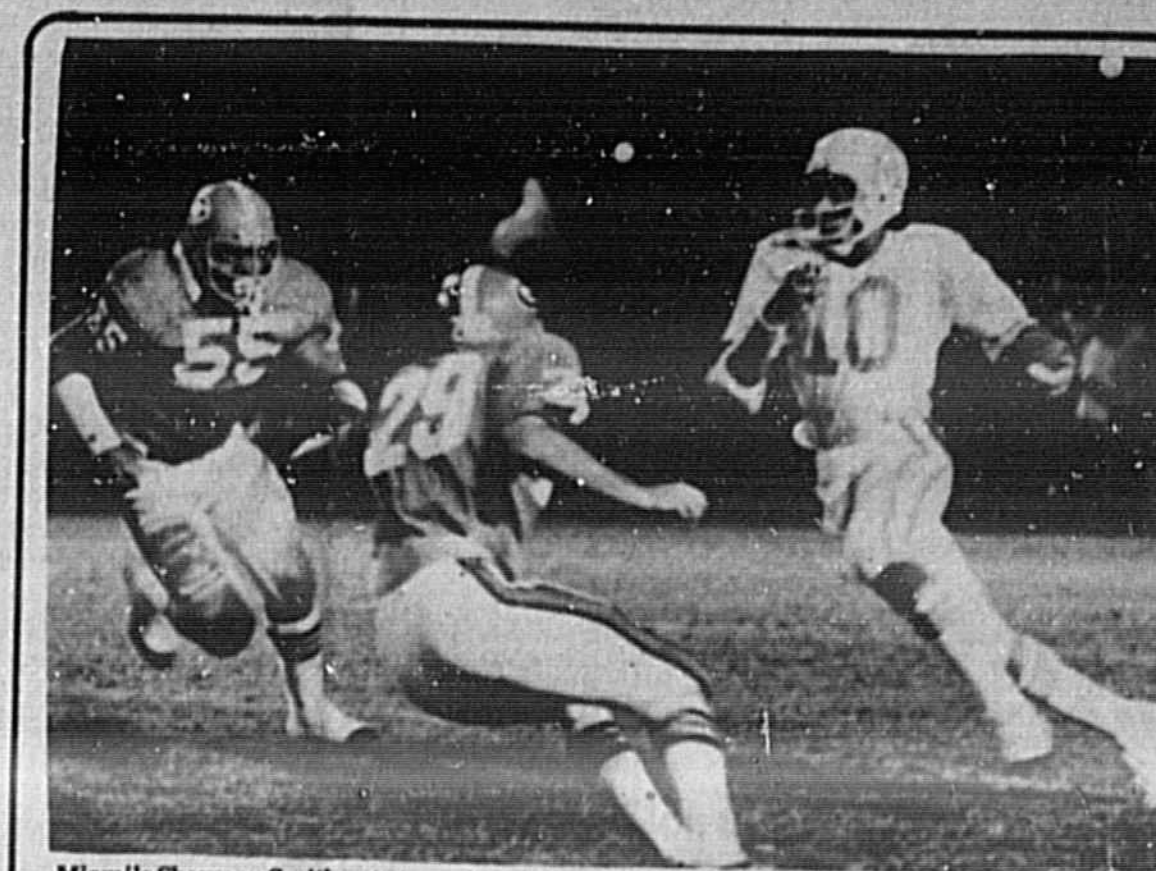

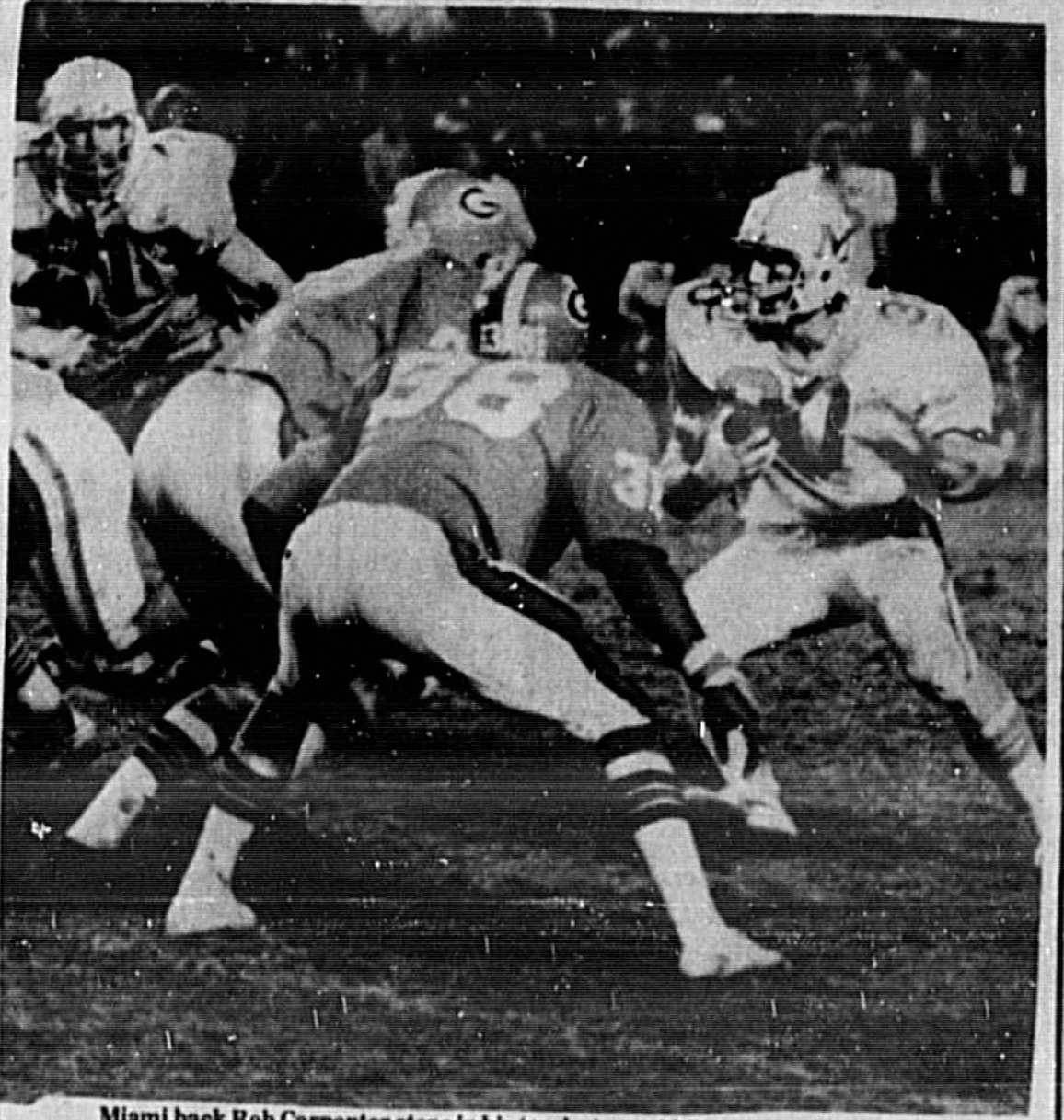
