

New Revolution In Mexico Looms As Troops Take Field

Disquieting Reports Of Military Movements And Political Agitation Are Revealed

Unrest Is Due To Calles Enemies

Rebel Group Demands Exile Of Ex-President By Cortes Gil

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 18.—(INS)—A new revolution in the northwestern states of Mexico appeared imminent today as disquieting reports of troop movements and political agitations were received here. Disturbing reports were received from the states of Sonora, Durango, and Chihuahua.

Gen. Juan Carrero, minister of war, is said to have taken over the Southern Pacific Railway. It is reported that Governor Carrero, of Sonora, has sent an ultimatum to President Portes Gil, demanding the banishment of former President P. Elias Calles, Gen. Carrero and former minister of industry, commerce and labor, Luis V. Morones.

Although President Portes Gil has declared against a censorship of the press, the government has established headquarters in the frontier cities. He is said to have taken over today that Gen. Francisco Manzo, military commander of the state of Sonora, has established headquarters in the frontier cities.

The hostility of the Valenzuela group centers upon former President Calles, who is said to be directing the campaign to put Arce or Pascual Ortiz Rubio in power.

Guillermo Valenzuela, former minister to London, and one of the severest critics of the administration, is the most outspoken leader of the agitation against the former President Calles. Valenzuela has bitterly attacked Calles and his regime in nearly every political speech he has made during the past 10 days, for which he has been openly charged in the chambers of deputies with being the instigator of revolt in the northwestern states. These charges, however, have not lessened Valenzuela's popularity.

"If I am called a rebel it is because I have attacked in no uncertain terms the proceedings of the Calles government," he declared in a speech to a group of adherents at Cajeme, the home of the late General Alvaro Obregon.

He accused the Calles administration of "underhand practices, poisoning and assassination," adding: "I declare with pride that I am in full rebellion against the school of the Calles system and the institution of Calles."

These words have had a powerful effect in Mexico in public opinion, added Valenzuela. There is open opposition to law and morality."

Jardine Will Join Firm That Has Big Branch In Sanford

The recent announcement in Washington that Secretary of Agriculture W. M. Jardine will relinquish his cabinet post Mar. 4 to become special counsel for the Federal Trade and Vegetable Growers Inc., has occasioned general interest in local shipping circles because of the Federated's extensive connections in Sanford and Seminole County.

The Federated maintains offices in the historic Temple, marketing a large portion of Seminole County's annual output of celery and other vegetable products. The sales corporation, which is officially advised of Secretary Jardine's acceptance of the post, said that it was in the hands of the cabinet official and that it expressed general satisfaction over the announcement that he will become connected with their firm.

Wet, Dry Debate Is Argued In Senate

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—(INS)—One of the most dramatic political battles in the history of the Senate was staged this afternoon between Senator James A. Reed (D-Mo.) and Senator William E. Borah (D-Idaho) over the Jones bill, increasing penalties for dry law violations. Reed denounced the proposed law as a "disgraceful and degrading" measure, declaring it meant the surrender of the law and the power of reason and charity. He charged prohibition had resulted in widespread disrespect for law, provoked universal defiance, corrupted government and led to a horrible increase in the use of deadly drugs. Borah, in reply, declared that the cause of prohibition was not at issue. He asserted the same arguments had always been used against control of the liquor traffic and asserted that the bill would prevent a corruption law from passing all that occurred in the enforcement of the dry law.

WOMAN IS KILLED IN MOTOR WRECK NEAR ORLANDO

Collision Ends In One Death And Injuries To Several Others

WINTER PARK, Feb. 18.—(INS)—One dead and nine persons injured was the toll of an automobile collision in Winter Park yesterday morning, when two sedans crashed at the intersection of Fairbanks and Orlando avenues.

Miss Alice B. Cony, of 30 East McMillan street, Cincinnati, Ohio, was killed in the accident and Grace H. Cony, her sister, was seriously hurt, as was Dr. M. Bristol, head of the sociology department of the University of Florida, Gainesville.

Dr. Bristol was in a sedan driven by his wife, and they were accompanied by Mrs. C. R. Dawson of Gainesville and her small son. They were proceeding west on Fairbanks avenue, and at the Orlando avenue intersection the car collided with another sedan, operated by W. D. Hunt, a guest at the Morgan hotel, Daytona Beach.

One of the cars swerved in the crash and broke off a light pole at the west side of Orlando avenue.

Alice Cony was riding in the rear of the Hunt sedan, which also contained her two sisters, Grace and Carrie, besides Mr. Hunt's wife, their daughter, Grace, and Algerian French of Cincinnati. The party was going south on Orlando avenue on a pleasure trip to the Look tower at Mountain Lake.

Two Carry Ambulances were called to the scene from Orlando, and removed the injured to the Florida Sanatorium in three trips.

Miss Alice Cony died of a fractured skull, according to examining physicians, and Dr. Bristol was found to have suffered an incomplete fracture of the pelvis. Miss Grace Cony received a fractured pelvis and collarbone, while her sister Carrie, was severely bruised and shocked.

Mr. Hunt was cut on the head, and Mrs. Hunt sustained injuries to her chest, besides being seriously shaken up. Miss Grace Hunt was bruised and sprained, as was French.

Taken To Home

Dr. and Mrs. Bristol were taken to their home in Gainesville with Mrs. Dawson and her child yesterday afternoon by ambulance. Mrs. Bristol was shocked and bruised and Mrs. Dawson suffered contusions. The boy was not hurt.

The Cony sisters were winter visitors in the state, and were guests at the Morgan hotel in Daytona Beach. A brother in St. Petersburg was not notified of the accident and arrived in the city last night.

OVIEDO WOMAN DIES OF BURNS IN HOME BLAZE

Mrs. Elizabeth Clark Trapped By Flames Which Followed Explosion Of Gas Heater

Husband Unable To Go To Her Aid

Victim Believed To Have Made Effort To Refill Heater

Trapped in her home by the explosion of a gas-line heater, Mrs. Elizabeth H. Clark, 58, of Oviedo, was burned to death early Sunday afternoon in a fire which destroyed the house and all its furnishings.

Mrs. Clark perished while her husband, William A. Clark, looked on helplessly, prevented from entering the house by flames which quickly enveloped the dwelling and forced it to the ground within a few minutes. The charred body was not removed from the house until it was practically demolished.

The woman is believed to have met her death in the explosion, which is believed to have occurred when she attempted to refill a gas-line heater. She made no outcry, according to Mr. Clark, who was in the attic and saw the blast, which also rocked the house. Hurrying down a ladder on the outside, Mr. Clark found the dwelling ablaze.

He called to his wife and receiving no response, he attempted to enter the house, but smoke and flames impeded his progress.

The tragedy, which occurred shortly before 4 o'clock, cast a pall of gloom over the little town today as friends and neighbors made plans to pay final tribute to Mrs. Clark, who was widely known and liked. Funeral services were scheduled for 3 o'clock this afternoon at the Oviedo cemetery with Rev. C. W. Mathison, pastor of the Methodist Church, officiating.

Mrs. Clark with her husband, a former army officer, had made her home in Oviedo for the past three years. She had previously lived in California. During her residence in Oviedo she had been active in the social and church life of the community.

Young Bride Is Held For Knifing Spouse Who Is Near Death

CHICAGO, Feb. 18.—(INS)—Monte Tenness, 26, nephew of the same name, was reported near death today from a knife wound inflicted by his 19-year-old bride of seven months. The stabbing of young Tenness occurred in the couple's "honeymoon flat" early yesterday during a quarrel, Mrs. Helen Tenness, the wife, told the police. She was hysterical when arrested.

"I don't want him to die," she sobbed, pleading that her husband forgave her. Tenness refused to admit that his girl wife had stabbed him, but when shown her signed statement, he admitted the "truth of it," she did it."

"But she was just hysterical. I don't want her prosecuted or anything," Tenness' right lung was punched by the blade and physicians held little hope for his recovery.

E. L. DOHENEY JR. SON OF OIL KING, SLAIN BY FRIEND

Demented Secretary Shoots Young Scion And Then Kills Self

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 18.—(INS)—Murdered by his closest companion for eight years, E. L. Dohoney Jr., was dead today in a dramatic climax to his sensational connection with the Teapot Dome scandal. Hugh Punnett, his confidential secretary and trusted friend, shot him in the back of the head Saturday night, and then ended his own life, police declared.

Dohoney was 36 years old and the father of five children. His father was in a state of collapse today as a result of the tragedy. Dohoney was a member of the Los Angeles San Diego diocese of the Roman Catholic Church. Burial will be strictly private.

The fatal shooting occurred within an arm's length of Dohoney's wife and Dr. E. C. Fishbaugh, the family physician. The quest for the \$500,000 Dohoney mansion was the scene of the shooting. Punnett, body was found near that of his employer. The shooting occurred through the head end of Dohoney's life. District Attorney Baron Pitt declared he was thoroughly convinced that the double tragedy was an irrefutable case of murder and suicide.

Late Saturday night, Dr. Fishbaugh was urgently summoned to the Dohoney home. He and Mr. Dohoney approached the guest bedroom. Punnett, dressed, dashed in and sent a bullet through his head. Dohoney was dead on the bedroom floor. He had been shot by Punnett only a few minutes before the physician's arrival, but Mrs. Dohoney had not heard the shot.

The elder Dohoney collapsed when his gaze fell upon the body of his only son. At his home today the family stated that though the oil king's heart was broken over the loss of his boy he was "holding it all in a few minutes before the physician's arrival, but Mrs. Dohoney had not heard the shot."

HOOVER PARTY LEAVES MIAMI FOR CAPITAL

MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 18.—(INS)—The special train carrying President-elect Herbert Hoover and his party back to Washington left here at 10:30 o'clock this morning.

For nearly a month, the President-elect has been at the Penney estate on Belle Isle, working some big playing as much as possible. He has fished intensively, acquired a good coat of tan and added a little additional health to an already rugged constitution. With this morning's departure, however, he plunges into administrative work and practical politics of a highly concentrated nature. A thousand-one matters await his attention.

The Hoover special will arrive in Washington at noon Tuesday 1:30 P. M. to be exact. Almost from that moment on, he will be "up to his neck" in the high-pressure sort of work of which he is capable as are few others. One thing fortunately is off his mind. During the stay in Miami Beach, Mr. Hoover has determined upon the 10 men who will comprise his cabinet. Who they are is any story which the exception of Andrew W. Mellon, scheduled to remain as secretary of the treasury, and Henry W. Stimson, universally reported as the next secretary of state. The remainder will become known when their names are sent to the Senator for confirmation on Mar. 4.

Determination upon a cabinet has not released the President-elect from the importunities of the hunters nevertheless. Upon his return, he will make his headquarters at his home, instead of at the Mayflower Hotel, thus eliminating the prospect of annoyance at the hands of some of them, but many of these "deserving Republicans" will find their way to 2300 S. Street.

Banking Stability Is Revealed In Record Made During Year

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—(INS)—The increasing stability of the American banking structure, both within and without the federal reserve system, was disclosed today by the announcement of the reserve fund that bank failures declined heavily in 1928.

During the past year 491 banks closed their doors as compared to 592 in 1927. These banks had deposits of \$184,000,000 at the time of failure. Only 13 banks in the federal reserve system collapsed in the year, a drop of 51 from 1927. These institutions had deposits of but \$22,000,000 also a decided decline. Nonmember bank failures numbered 418, compared to 538 the year before, and had deposits of \$154,000,000, a decrease of \$120,000,000.

The year was characterized by an increasing tendency toward consolidation of banks, particularly in the national system. This of itself indicated a move toward a concentration of the banking power, although not to a alarming degree. It was pointed out that many more consolidations could be made to good advantage, and this tendency is strengthening the banking system and is a satisfactory source of the country's financial stability.

SOLONS MAY ACT TO SAVE AIR MAIL TO PANAMA CITY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—(INS)—Congress may take speedy action today to prevent the historic air mail flight of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh from ending in tragedy because of forced abandonment of the Pan-American route for which he blazed the trail. Unless legislation is enacted to save air mail route from Miami to Latin-America must be abandoned, Rep. Clyde Kelly (R-Pa.) declared.

The return of "Lindy" newly engaged and again acclaimed for his flying feat, was expected to dispel the opposition which has blocked the measure in Congress. Because of a deficit in legislation, Col. Lindbergh was unable to accept all the mail offered for the return trip from Panama.

The omission of one word in the law under which the Latin American route was established caused all the difficulty. Congress provided that the postoffice department could contract for all mail "from" the United States to foreign countries; but the law did not say "to" as well as "from."

After the contract with the Pan-American Airways Company was signed, comptroller-general McCall ruled that the postoffice department could pay for mail sent to a foreign country but not pay for mail brought back from such a country. On such instructions from the postoffice department, Col. Lindbergh declined to accept many sacks of mail on his return journey, just completed.

He was allowed to bring mail from the Panama Canal Zone bearing United States stamps, and was allowed to carry free some mail from the Republic of Panama. This was done on request of the state department, which desired to pay a courtesy to the Latin republic.

Rep. Kelly is in charge of a bill which would extend provision of the air mail law to permit payment for mail brought from foreign countries. "I plan to call up the bill in their house and ask unanimous consent for its passage," said Rep. Kelly. "If unanimous consent is refused, we will seek to suspend the rules."

"It is highly necessary that the legislation be passed quickly. The Pan-American air mail service is in operation. Obviously the contractor cannot make money if he cannot carry return mail, and if the postoffice department cannot carry out its end of the contract the air mail line will doubtless have to be abandoned."

Jackie Fields Wins From Baby Joe Gans In 10 Round Fight At New York Arena

Pretender To Throne Of Welterweights Has Strengthened His Claim By Beating Negro From Pacific Coast

NEW YORK, Feb. 16.—Jackie Fields, pretender to the throne of all the welterweights, made his plea before the court of last appeal in the great big city last night, and scored over Baby Joe Gans, fellow-Californian, in the course of 10 somewhat lively rounds without laying himself open to the charge of inciting to riot. Fields won clearly, almost ostentatiously, but nobody had to be penalized half the distance to the goal line for unnecessary roughness.

The punch that abruptly discontinued Sergeant Sammy Baker and Pete Meyers, lashed out with much violence throughout the evening, but B. J. Gans retained the perpendicular from flagfall to finish and even went so far as to ply the crown pretender with a right cross upon the van dyke from time to time. The performance left some doubt as to whether Fields has the punch his recent record seemed to indicate, although, in truth it must be conceded that B. J. Gans went into retirement behind a barricade of gloves, elbows, and shoulders almost every time the going became hostile.

As a matter of fact, Fields fought a good fight, whereas B. J. Gans "caught" one. It isn't any man's elch to play at top speed with a human octopus and, if Fields' chance for the title with what Joe Dundee is to depend on what happened last night, then I, for one, say let him have it.

Fields was a real good fighter in taking at least seven of the 10 rounds, one of those busy fighters who punch, punch, punch, and that to vary the monotony punch, punch, punch some more. great area that was twice inundated by the waters of Okechobee at the cost of several thousand lives and the loss of millions in property fell upon Mr. Hoover, again recording with black lines the high water mark reached; buildings left as shambles; swamps; dust and more dust; acres upon acres stretching out as far as the eye could see, once obviously under cultivation but now overgrown with weeds; more acres already reclaimed and showing sprouting sugar cane, beans, tomatoes, potatoes and other truck against the dark brown background of tremendously rich soil; negroes and whites alike, still living in tents and temporary shacks erected for them by the Red Cross; more swamps and more dust.

It is through this region the Florida plan to restore an inland waterway, which would not only connect the east and west coast of the state, but also furnish a flood control outlet to prevent Lake Okechobee from again being blown out over the top.

Before in congressional committee of the present time a bill is pending to extend \$10,000,000 for the project, a hearing was given to the Florida plan, and the committee was told that the government was to pay the whole cost, rather than the \$1,000,000 recommended by the committee.

BALIEFF AND HIS NOISY RUSSIANS RETURN TO STAGE

"Chauve Souris" Is Pot Pourri Of Pleasure By Famous Troupe

NEW YORK, Feb. 18. — (INS) — STOMP-stomp-stomp. STOMP-stomp-stomp. STOMP-stomp-stomp.

You never heard such a noise in your life as three Moscovites. The Russians have come back to town. They'll drop a tear and stamp on it, they'll make a smile and dance on it.

"Chauve Souris" means a pot pourri in any man's language. Little bit of that. Something for there's a little bit of this and a one to pick up or pick on.

This Russian troupe comes over the water every so often like a rainbow. And new tricks they bring—some of the toys of the stage, some old tricks newly painted.

And, of course, the Big Chuckle himself, was with the troupe. Rather expect Christmas without Santa Claus than Chauve Souris without M. Nikita Balieff.

Balieff, the legend that Russia is traditionally sombre. Nikita is round like laughter, suave like diplomacy. He is a master of the medium of other people's emotions. He is the guide of a host of inter-entertainers, a person to imitate more easily than to analyze.

Balieff is the Strange Interlude in person, filling the dental cavities of his production like a platinum phonograph needle. He appears through the medium of stage-drops and changes the dramatic pace to while away the time pleasantly. He is a business to talk to, the audience and make them like it.

He is the potential hero who will make the audience walk out slowly in a satisfied smile.

It is a very delicate career, an Interlude. For who can say, when an audience will run out instead of walking even when there is no consideration?

However, I am turning away from the question of the audience. Balieff, I suspect, that accident suggested this new position in entertainment for him.

The great Balieff probably attempted to inform the audience at one time that the act would be delayed because one of the ladies of the ensemble fractured her garter.

My thesis is that he attempted to convey the information in the very best English he could muster and with dignity and sincerity.

But much to his amazement, the audience, instead of registering displeasure at the delay, appeared vastly amused at M. Balieff's shattered English and demanded more of it and worse if possible.

M. Balieff, while unaware, of what makes Americans join eyes in gazing upward at infinity during lunch hours, was astute enough to continue talking. And he has continued to talk, at constant intervals for many seasons, and is always careful not to make himself entirely understandable and break the charm.

The troupe is noisy, colorful, sophisticated and naive in turn. In one spectacular scene entitled "The Midnight Review," Napoleon salutes the ghosts of this famous marsh.

And there is an exquisite tableau "Fragment of an Etruscan Tomb" whose classical facade is suddenly grotesqued into modernity by an imitation of Charlie Chaplin.

Merita Gost, who presents the troupe in association with Balieff, is a new flowing fire for his own sportsmanship.

Balieff, the Strange Interlude, stands out like a "micro-organism" in the world of the stage. He is a unique figure in the world of the stage.

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PROFESSOR SAYS WOMEN WILL BE WORLD LEADERS

Declares Eternal Contest Between Sexes Favors Fairer Type

OAKLAND, Feb. 18. — (INS) — Women will be the rulers of the next generation.

Two-thirds of the great world leaders in the next few centuries will be women.

The eternal struggle between the sexes is being won rapidly by women and a return to the matriarchal rule is inevitable.

Such were the bursts of shrapnel, fired today against male vanity by Anthony C. Blanks, professor of the public speaking department of the University of California.

Professor Blanks, sprung from a family dedicated to militant campaigning for the rights of women, based his assertions upon the results of a life time of study of the historical developments of woman-kind.

"Mentally, woman is forging ahead of man," said the professor, associated as a child with Susan B. Anthony, the great crusader for women's rights. "Mental superiority largely rests upon educational advantages and more women than men can be found in the universities."

Influence in Business "Already the influence of woman in business and politics is being felt, they are hitting a stride that will carry them to leadership within a few generations."

Throughout the ages woman has been man's chattel and slave. She has been debased in body, mind and soul. The great wonder is that within one hundred years the great miracle of feminine emancipation has been wrought.

"Guarded by locks, harem veils, duennas, spies, prison bells attached to their clothing, corporal punishment, a torture, execution, public stocks, ducking stools, class and sex laws, religious cant, nunneries and cloisters, public shame and double sex standards, it is no wonder that woman came to believe herself inferior."

"A three fold curse was upon woman at birth—mentally, physically and morally she has been turned the weaker sex."

"Only during that last 50 years has woman begun a militant successful rebellion. The war between the sexes at last has reached an even stage."

"Woman only needs now to believe the truth about herself, that she is man's superior in many things and his equal in all things, and she will rule the world."

"Men may work in the next generation, but women will be the rulers."

Becoming Superior "This will come about because woman is rapidly becoming the superior to man mentally and physically. Physically, she is perhaps his superior already for she has more opportunity for physical development through exercise in this world of city office work for men."

"Man sitting at his desk in sedentary occupations, is becoming soft and lacking in stamina. Woman goes about her household tasks, has opportunity to indulge in sports, gets into fresh air and is building up superior physical equipment."

"Mentally woman is forging ahead of man. Mental superiority largely rests upon educational advantages."

"In the majority of our universities and colleges a new phase in educational history of the world is being enacted. Women outnumber men two to one in a general survey of educational institutions."

"This phase can lead only to one logical conclusion—two thirds of the world's future leaders will be women."

Capone talked very little and drank even less. If indeed he took a single drink it was not a wild party in any sense, and it broke up well before two o'clock in the morning.

At the time many other parties in the Miami district were just hitting their stride.

The much publicized Capone is a gentle mannered, soft spoken man about five feet 10 inches tall and rather heavily built. He is dark complexioned and his black hair is thin in the front. His dark brown eyes gaze at you directly when he talks, which is seldom.

There are three faint scars across the left side of his face.

Capone's household includes two of his brothers and a half a dozen other men. They were in evidence at the party, acting in the capacity of waiters.

The Capone home is located on a small, man-made island, known as Palm Island. His mansion is set well back from the main entrance. He rarely leaves his place on the island as it has all the modern conveniences. He has his own swimming pool, tennis court and putting green. A year or more ago when Capone first came here there was local agitation to prevent his establishing a residence here but this has subsided.

(Continued) Capone goes to Miami or Miami Beach. He is usually accompanied by a companion or two. The other day he created a mild sensation in a department store when he tipped the clerks with five dollar bills.

(Continued from page 1) anything else, it prompted his early departure from Miami Beach. With only two weeks to run, he wants to make sure at the last moment there is not an influx of money bills that will unbalance the budget and leave the new administration at the starting line with a deficit.

In addition, the house committee are now nearing the end of their hearings on tariff, which, with farm relief, will constitute the two subjects to be taken up at a special session of Congress Mr. Hoover plans to call for April 15. The tariff question bears vitally on commerce, industry and agriculture, of all three of which Mr. Hoover is regarded as a profound student and it is his intention to be personally present to block anything he considers un-

economic.

Not the least of his problems is the immigration situation. Pending before Congress is an act repealing the "national origins" clause which would have immigration quotas on the nationalistic make-up of the states at the time of the revolution. The President elect, perhaps more than any other individual, is responsible for the movement to cancel the measure. If it remains on the statute books and the present situation indicates no great desire to remove it, Mr. Hoover, as president, will be compelled to proclaim it by executive order. He thinks it is unsound in principle and unworkable in practice. Array of opposing him is formidable opposition, led by Senator David A. Reed of Pennsylvania, usually a staunch administration supporter, and backed by such powerful organizations as the American Legion.
