

Police investigate murder-suicide

Initial clues point to husband killing wife, then turning gun on himself

LONGWOOD — A Seminole County probation officer for three years, was killed in an apparent murder-suicide late Monday.

At approximately 9:20 a.m. Tuesday, Seminole County

Sheriff's Office deputies responded to 222 Acorn Lane in unincorporated Longwood. After breaking out a window in the tan duplex, deputies found the 29-year-old Amy Lohrmann and her husband, John, 35, with fatal gunshot wounds.

"One of the officers she worked with was aware she was in the process of leaving her husband," said Phil Stalvey director of the county's community services department. "When she didn't show up for work, he went to her place."

Several nearby residents claimed to hear screaming and

gunshots in the night, but never reported them to police. According to resident Diane Norton the string of duplexes have been a place of frequent disturbances.

"I know someone fights like crazy over there," Norton said. "The police have been over there numerous times."

SCSO spokesman Steve Olson said investigators aren't sure who shot who, but suspicions are that John shot Amy and then himself. Initial investigations also point to John being an ex-

St. Johns buys wastewater plant

The St. Johns River Water Management District Governing Board voted to buy the site of an abandoned wastewater treatment facility in southern Seminole County to convert into a stormwater project that will reduce pollutants draining into lakes Howell and Jesup.

The 10-acre property will collect and treat stormwater from a 500-acre area that now drains directly into Lake Howell, which flows into Lake Jesup. The Board voted to pay \$360,000 for the property, located east of U.S. 17/92 and Kawanee Trail, and west of Lake Howell and State Road 436.

"Using small parcels within the Lake Jesup basin for these types of projects will allow the agencies working together on the restoration of the lake to reduce the pollutants that continue to degrade water quality," said William Kerr, chairman of the District Governing Board.

Plans are to use as many of the facility's existing structures as possible. The Board's vote is contingent upon approval of the city of Maitland, which owns the property in the unincorporated area of Seminole County. The Maitland City Council is scheduled to consider the contract at its Oct. 22 meeting. As a condition of the acquisition, the proceeds from the purchase are to be used for stormwater improvement projects in Maitland.

Lake Jesup has been degraded by decades of stormwater and agricultural runoff, and wastewater discharge. Efforts have been ongoing to reconnect the lake's floodplain to the lake, restore the lake's shoreline vegetation and to identify ways to improve the lake's circulation with the St. Johns River.

Jail escape thwarted

Ill-fated plan called for breaking into jail before breaking out

SANFORD — Seminole County deputies foiled a jail escape plan Sunday when an informant tipped them off to the potentially dangerous scheme.

Christopher Wysocki, 23, of Orlando was arrested Sunday night while sitting in a stolen green 1998 Ford Mustang outside of the jail in a restricted area. According to Seminole County Sheriff's Office

spokesman Steve Olson, Wysocki was about to aid inmate John Kovacs, 46, of Titusville in a jail escape.

"With the help of his buddy, they were going to attack the correction officer," Olson said.

Deputies learned of the escape plan Sunday afternoon from a "source inside the jail," said Olson. By knowing the exact day, a time-frame within a two-hour window and the possible method of the escape, a deputy was waiting for Wysocki's arrival.

"The source did the right thing," Olson said. "Let's say this thing fails, there's the

Grocery store owner Mamie Dinah dies

SANFORD — Mamie Dinah, a well-known Sanford businesswoman, died Tuesday, Oct. 9, 2001, at South Seminole Hospital. She was 95.

She was the owner of Dinah's West Side Grocery, which operated for 56 years on 18th Street. Before starting her business, Dinah worked as a cook on a ship traveling between Sanford and Jacksonville.

"She told me she always wanted to own her own business," said her granddaughter, Sanford City Commissioner Velma Williams. "Her philosophy was you had to be in control of your own destiny."

Dinah was an astute businesswoman, whose store was one of the most popular on the West Side. In addition, she owned a

rooming house next door to the grocery.

"She always said hard work would pay off," Williams said. "She saved her money, and when she spent it, she spent it wisely. She stressed the importance of being strong financially."

Williams said her grandmother was "a very giving person" who helped others in the community. In fact,

Dinah's West Side Grocery provided credit to many in the Goldsboro community. "One young man told me just

the other day that his first experience with credit was with my grandmother," Williams said. "He told me he knew some people took advantage of that trust but that she never said anything unkind about them. That's just the way she was. She led by example."

Dinah was active in her church, New Salem Primitive Baptist Church.

"She was a very God-fearing person," Williams said. "She prayed every morning and every night and whenever she need to in between. She passed that along to us, and to this day, I follow her example."

She was always active in the PTA at Crooms Academy and was an outspoken proponent of education.

"She was always telling us

## Lyman High plans Shakespeare production

Lyman High School's LymLight Productions will perform William Shakespeare's "A Midsummer Night's Dream" in the Lyman High School Auditorium from Nov. 1 to Nov. 3.

"A Midsummer Night's Dream" is a two-act comedy about two sets of lovers, mischievous fairies, love potions and ill-trained actors. The play begins as Egeus, Hermia's father, refuses to let her wed Lysander, her one true love. He wants her to wed Demetrius, the one true love of Helena.

Hermia and Lysander agree to run-away in to the woods outside Athens. A lovesick Helena pursues Demetrius into the woods as he tries to woo Hermia back to him.

Meanwhile, an amateur group of

actors practices a play in the woods for a royal wedding. Some misunderstood directions from an impish fairy cause the fairy queen and the actors' lives to mingle. A comedic plot untangles.

The production of "A Midsummer Night's Dream" will mark the end of the 35-year old Lyman auditorium. The new Performing Arts Center adjacent to the campus will open in late November. 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# State regulators warn public of Top 5 investment scams

With the recent interest rate cuts by the Federal Reserve pushing yields on fixed investments like certificates of deposit and bonds to their lowest levels in years, Florida securities regulators issued a list of the Top 5 investments to be wary about.

With many investors, particularly those who are dependent on interest income, worried by volatile stock markets and the terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center buildings and the Pentagon, Florida regulators warned against investing in bogus promissory notes, viaticals, exotic offshore investments and other high-risk or fraudulent investment promising high returns.

"When evaluating an investment, you should remember that risk and reward go together," said Don Saxon, director of securities for the Florida Department of Banking and Finance (DBF). "If someone is promising you high returns with no risk, be

very, very skeptical, ask lots of questions and get it in writing."

Here is a list of the five investments, ranked roughly in order of concern or prevalence:

- **Promissory Notes** — Promissory notes are short-term debt instruments. Investors should stay away from notes promising high returns — upwards of 12 percent monthly — from little-known companies. Many of these high-risk notes are sold by independent insurance agents, state regulators warn. In Indiana, 18 elderly investors lost nearly \$1.4 million in a promissory note scam. An 80-year-old woman lost her life savings of \$324,000. Although praying with their victims to gain their trust, the perpetrators diverted their money to offshore bank accounts and used it to buy expensive cars and make first-class business trips to China, India and Greece.

- **"Callable" CDs** — Older investors beware: these higher-yielding certificates of deposit, while appropriate for some, won't mature for 10 to 30 years,

unless the bank — not the investor — "calls" or redeems them. Redeeming the CD early may result in a substantial loss, upwards of 25 percent of the principal. In Iowa, a retiree in her 70s invested more than \$100,000 of her 97-year-old mother's money in three callable CDs with 20-year maturities. Her intention, she told her broker, was to use the money to pay her mother's nursing home bills. State regulators say sellers don't always disclose the risks and restrictions of callable CDs.

- **Internet Stock Pitches** — Con artists frequently use the wide reach and relative anonymity of the Internet to "pump and dump" stocks in little-known companies, often claiming tragic events such as last month's terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center buildings and the Pentagon will push up the stock price. Many states have Internet surveillance programs that watch for fraud or investigate investor complaints. State securities regulators urge

investors to ignore anonymous financial advice on the Internet and in chat rooms.

- **Prime Bank Schemes** — Scam artists, often operating over the Internet, promise investors returns as high as 300 percent through access to the investment portfolios of the world's elite banks. Purveyors of these schemes often target conspiracy theorists, promising access to the "secret" investment used by the world's wealthiest families. In North Dakota, state securities regulators say a small group of salesmen, including a local pastor, used religion and family ties to bilk investors out of \$2 million in a prime bank scheme.

- **Viatical Settlements** — Originated as a way to help the gravely ill pay their bills, these interests in the death benefits of terminally ill patients are always high risk and sometimes fraudulent. It works like this: a gravely ill person sells his or her life insurance policy to a viatical broker for between 40 to 80 percent

of the face value. The broker then sells the policy to a pool of investors, with an estimate of when the insured will die. Investors' profits quickly dwindle if the insured fails to die "on time." In a new twist, state regulators say "senior settlements" — interests in the death benefits of healthy older people — are now being offered to investors as "safe and guaranteed" alternatives to CDs and other fixed investments.

Before purchasing any investment, DBF urges investors to ask the following questions:

- Does the investment meet your personal investment goals? Whether you are investing for long-term growth, investment income or other reasons, an investment should match your own investment goals.

- Are claims for the investment realistic? Some things really are too good to be true. Use common sense and get a professional, third-party opinion when presented with investment opportunities that seem to offer

unusually high returns in comparison to other investment options. Pie-in-the-sky promises often signal investment fraud.

- Has the seller given you written information that fully explains the investment? Make sure you get proper written information, such as a prospectus or offering circular, before you buy. The documentation should contain enough clear and accurate information to allow you or your adviser to evaluate and verify the particulars of the investment.

- Are the seller and investment licensed and registered in your state? Call your state securities regulator to find out. If they are not, they may be operating illegally. To get the name and number of your state regulator, visit [www.nasaa.org](http://www.nasaa.org) or look in the white pages of your telephone directory under "government."

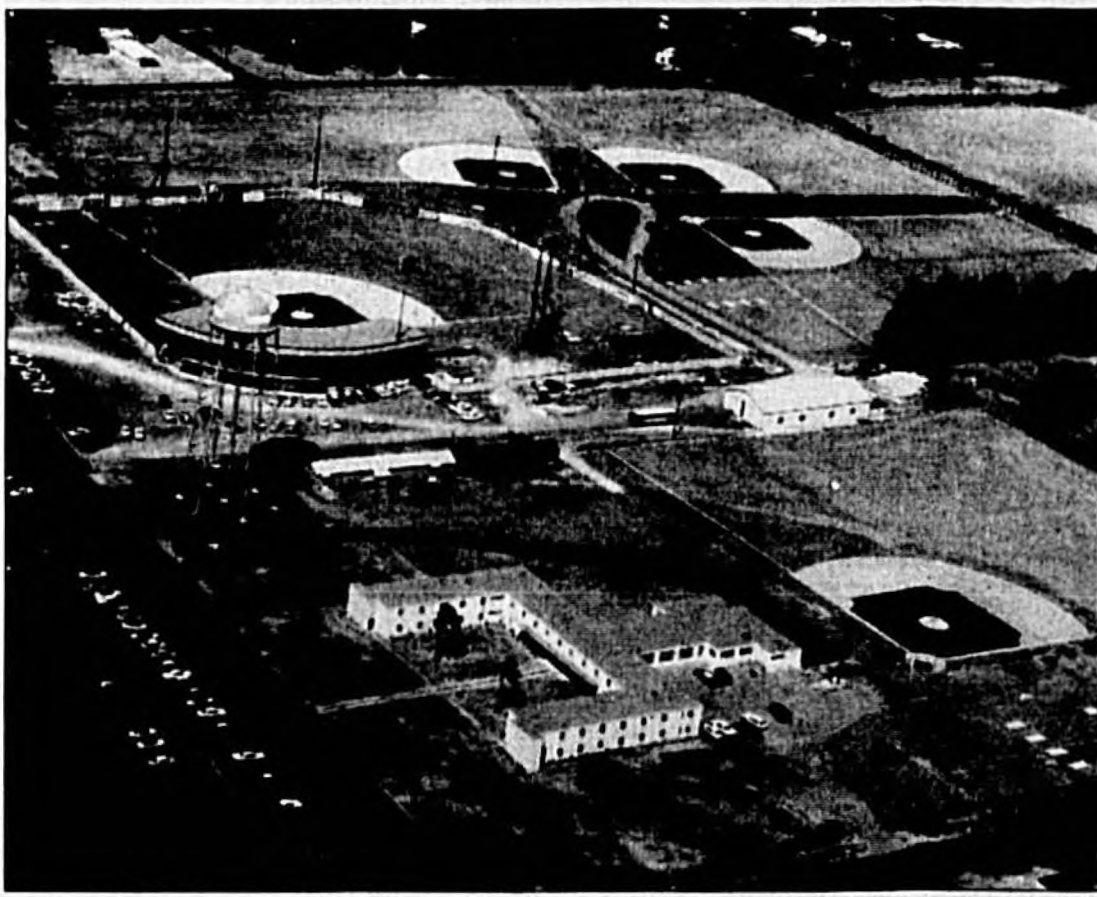
"The folks in the stands will see a lot of great softball and plenty of home runs," Lessard said.

law enforcement officer from out of state, said Olson.

"The relationship has been strained from what I hear," Olson said. "We have to investigate this as a major crime, but we are not looking for any other suspects at this time."

Amy Lohrmann was seen the night before her death at about 6 p.m. by Olson. They both worked out in the same gym, he said. She was characterized by her coworkers as a compassionate and loving person.

"She cared about her work and would go that extra step to help people she supervised," said Judge John Sloop who worked closely with Amy. "She would go out in the evenings — on her own time — to let them know she was there to help, which is pretty extraordinary. She was more than just a probation officer. She was a counselor."

Centre on U.S. 17/92 to become a SuperCenter, a combination discount retail and grocery store. That project began after residents in the Lake Forest neighborhood successfully blocked Wal-Mart's plans to build a facility on SR 46.

In July, the City Commission annexed nearly 22 acres on Rinehart Road and rezoned the property PD (Planned Development) to allow a 132,000-square-foot Sam's Wholesale Club. The city's Planning and Zoning Commission will consider Thursday whether to approve site plans for the project.

chance someone can be hurt. That was the concern of the source, that someone might get hurt."

The plan allegedly had Wysocki getting into the fenced area of the jail and prying open a door with a crow bar. He would then help Kovacs overpower a corrections officer and flee. They were going to try to leave the country, said Olson.

Unlike many planned escapes, this one was unconventional as Wysocki was allegedly planning to break in rather than Kovacs breaking out.

"It had many flaws, but you just can't dismiss it," Olson said. "In their minds they probably thought it was laid out well."

Wysocki was charged with auto theft and aiding a prisoner escape. He had been in and out of the jail himself since March. He faced drug charges and dri-

ving on a suspended license, and was just released on Friday.

Kovacs has not yet been charged in the alleged escape plan, but the investigation continues. He has been detained in the jail since May and is awaiting a trial on a robbery charge.

To sign up call the HETC at (352) 625-2804. Registration is free but space is limited for both workshops. "The Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission has offered these workshops around the state for the past six years and they've been so successful that they have become annual events," said Ron Bielefeld, FWC waterfowl biologist and

workshop coordinator. The one day workshops will be packed with just about all the information hunters need to get started duck hunting in Florida. By the time it's over, participants will know what to wear, what equipment to use, how to set up the hunting area, how to identify ducks, proper hunting ethics, where to go, how to get there, and more! In addition, there will be a live retriever demonstration, as well as instruction on post-hunting activities such as how to legally transport birds, how to clean them, and even a few recipes on how to prepare them for the supper table. 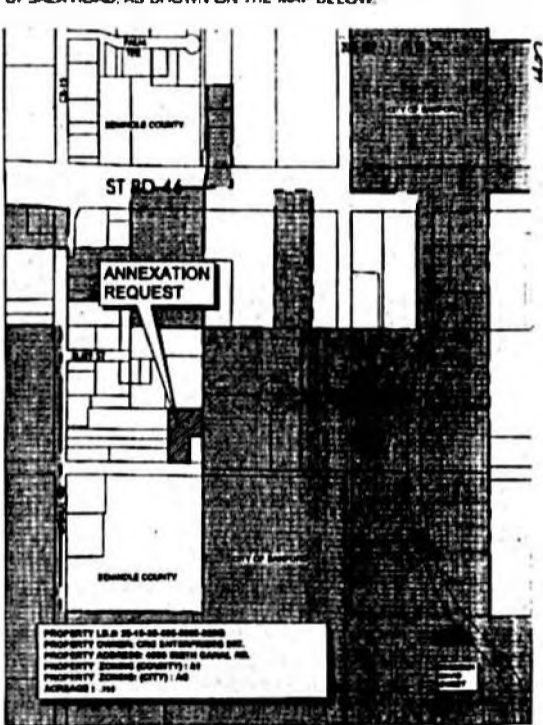
