Here's an old recipe for hearty Dutch Pot Roast. Why not give it a try? Mix 1/4 cup flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper and rub into all sides of the meat. Brown over medium heat a 5 to 6-lb. beef pot roast in 1/4 cup oil heated in a heavy kettle or Dutch oven. Slip a rack under the meat, then add 1 can (1 lb., 13 oz.) tomatoes, 1/2 cup water, 5 peppercorns, 3 bay leaves, and 2 quartered onions. Cover lightly and simmer gently about 3 hours, or until almost tender. If needed, add a little more hot water during cooking. Then add 3 quartered onions, 8 small carrots cut in half, and 4 or 5 quartered potatoes. Continue cooking about 30 minutes longer, or until meat and vegetables are tender. Remove meat and vegetables to platter, and keep warm. Make 8 to 10 servings. Then make gravy. Skim off excess fat from liquid in kettle, remove bay leaves and peppercorns. Shake in a jar 1/4 teaspoon flour and 1/4 cup of water for each cup of pot roast liquid. Add to liquid.

Casselberry Council's Oyster Bid By Citizen

A "citizens forum" which follows each Casselberry City Council meeting resulted in a "surprise" for members of the council last night when one citizen suggested that he was working to have the council suspended by Gov. Claude Kirk.
Sam Gerson told the four man-one woman council that he will request Governor Kirk to remove them from office. His reason: That the city council, through its confirmation of municipal judge Thomas Freeman, a Sanford attorney, had violated their individual oaths of office.
Gerson claimed that Freeman had violated his constitutional rights in ordering that he (Gerson) be removed from a political meeting 1 1/2 months ago.
During the city's confirmation of municipal appointees several weeks ago, Gerson had requested that the council not reappoint Freeman.
Gerson also claimed that he will take legal action to have Freeman disbarred from his law practice due to the incident.
(Editor's note: The Herald endeavored to permit Freeman to offer a rebuttal to Gerson's remarks but was informed Freeman was out of the city.)
In his opening statement, Gerson requested the city fathers to investigate the possibility of the city going into the garbage collection business. Gerson's statements were taken under consideration by the council.

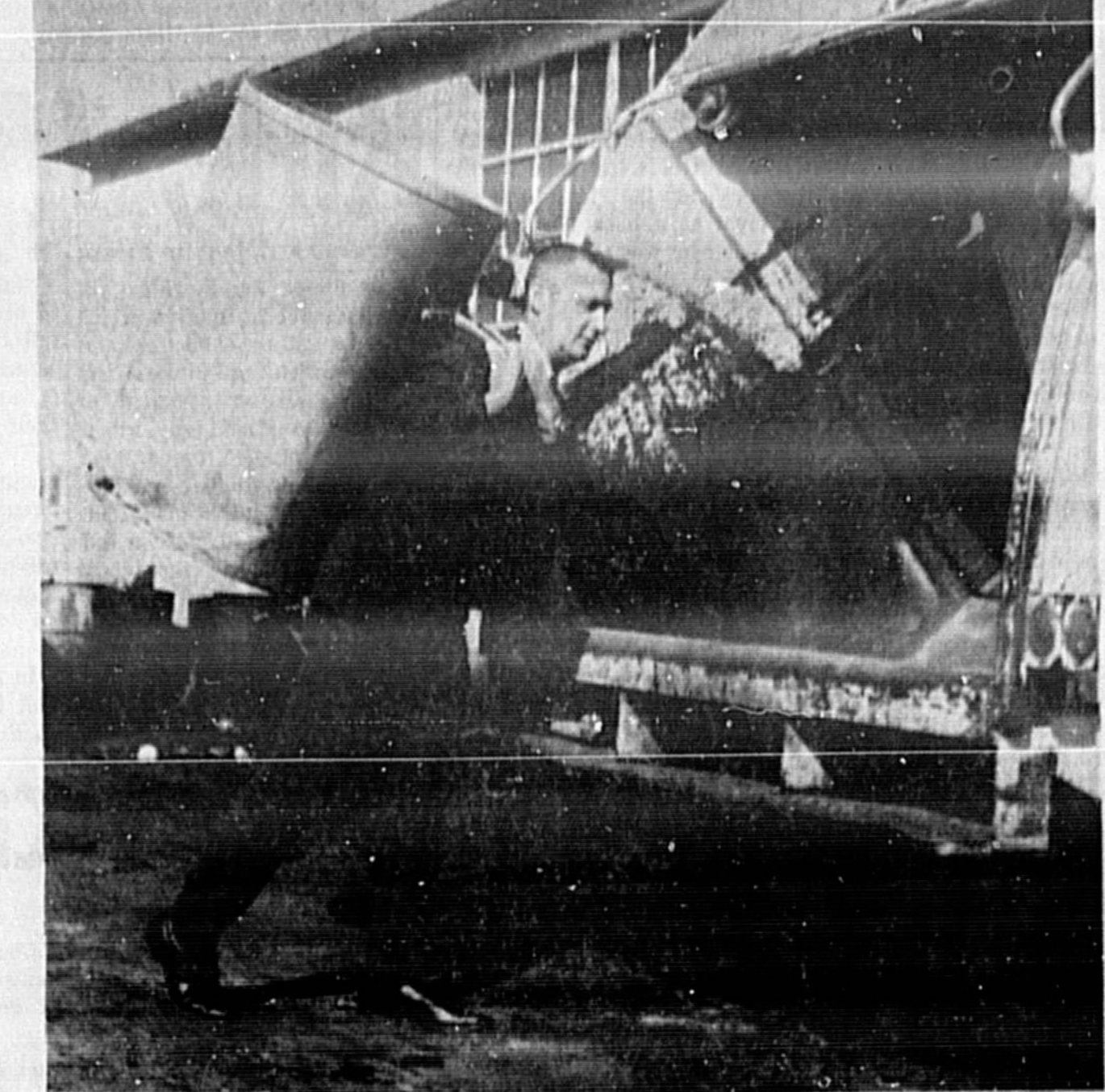

Adjacent Property Owners Profit City Gives Away Lake Front

Sanford City Commission last night gave away a four-block portion of Seminole Boulevard adjacent to the adjacent property owners after receiving a request from the Seminole County Commission advising that body had agreed to vacate its interest in another portion of Seminole Boulevard adjacent to the city-owned property.
The County Commission had been petitioned by certain property owners to abandon its interest in the street, which lays along the lake front.
County is understood to have tabled the request pending what action, if any, the Sanford commission took.
A news source said the reason for the petition for abandonment came from certain property owners who objected to the area being used as a fishing pier.
Commissioners Lee P. Moore, J. A. Crapps and Thomas McDonald voted to abandon the property but kept a right-of-way easement for utility lines.
The release of the property will channel all traffic through Second Street and will leave no future road for providing traffic flow into the Mayfair area as that section expands.



Land Giveaway Held 'Illegal'

Granting of the city-owned lakefront property between Mellonville and Virginia Avenues to adjoining property owners, as approved by the City Commission in a 3-0 vote last night, was illegal, in the opinion of former Commissioner Earl Higginbotham.
"They are giving away hundreds of thousands of dollars of taxpayers' property," said Higginbotham, "along with valuable riparian rights clear to the center of the St. Johns River channel in Lake Monroe."
The former commissioner said further: "Those property owners who will receive this land should be made to pay for it. The taxpayers have a right to be paid for that property. Why, one of the present city commissioners (Dr. W. Vincent Roberts) lives there."
Higginbotham said it was illegal for the city to vacate the Seminole Boulevard right-of-way along the lake without a public hearing. He said the City Commission had considered several times previously vacating the property but always voted to retain it, that some time in the future the city may desire to extend the street through to Virginia Avenue.
He pointed out that the city was required to purchase a small strip of land when it constructed Holiday Isle. In clearing title for the island it was discovered a very small strip along the lakefront had never been deeded to the city of Sanford by a DeLand resident. The city purchased the strip for \$2,250.

Tote Men's Gripes Learned Hard Way

Did you see Sanford's newly-elected City Commissioner Gordon Meyer toting garbage on the city garbage truck yesterday? He didn't lose his job. He was doing some personal research. He wants to know why the city can't keep laborers as late men on the city's garbage trucks.
"So I rode the garbage truck for five hours yesterday," said the tired commissioner, "and believe me, I found out I wouldn't take the job for \$3 an hour."
From 6:45 to noon Meyer, ordinarily self-employed as an agent for State Farm Insurance, toiled garbage for the City in the Wynwood and Pinescrest sections of Sanford.
He wanted to see what the problem was—why six of the 10-man team have quit, despite an increase in pay (to \$1.90 an hour) since Jan. 1.
The commission had decided at its Feb. 9 meeting that the city would not require garbage to be placed at the curb. Members resolved to try to solve the problem by again raising the wages of these men. A study is now being made to determine what wages should be paid to these men and what the cost to the city will be.
For \$2 a month the city resident is entitled to eight garbage and four trash pick-ups a month. "I think it's the greatest buy of all the city services," said the worn-out Meyer.

Two SIC Seats Filled, Third Remains Open

Sanford City Commission at last night's meeting filled two of three openings on the Sanford Industrial Commission (SIC) and delayed naming a third pending the receipt of a recommendation from the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce.
Commissioner appointed John Meyer, United States Bank president, and re-appointed Carl Schilke, Harcar Aluminum Products president, to new three-year terms on the industry recruitment board in line with a recent understanding with the Chamber of Commerce over city industrial operations.
Commissioner W. Vincent Roberts, in moving for the two additional openings, was not bound to accept the chamber's recommendation but indicated a formal bid had been worked out with the chamber, City Commission and SIC each recommending a man to serve on the industrial board when annual openings occur.
The names of the three men to be considered by Commission in making the three yearly appointments to the board.
At present there are six SIC members and the three additional openings would bring the board up to full nine-man strength.
Since the terms are staggered, three openings on the board occur each year.

Pentagon 'Stole Millions'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. William Proxmire, a leading congressional critic of arms spending, charged today that the Pentagon has "stolen \$10 billion of the peace dividend" supposedly gained by the Nixon administration's military expense cuts. "When one looks beneath the vast armaments generated by the White House, the Pentagon and the Budget Bureau about cuts in the defense budget for fiscal year 1971," Proxmire said, "one is struck by the administration's military expense cuts." Proxmire said in a prepared Senate speech, "Even after generous allowances are made for inflation and pay raises, double counting and unaccountable items, we just about \$10 billion." "Where did \$10 billion disappear? The answer is that the Pentagon is keeping it. They are not cutting back as much as their press releases suggest."

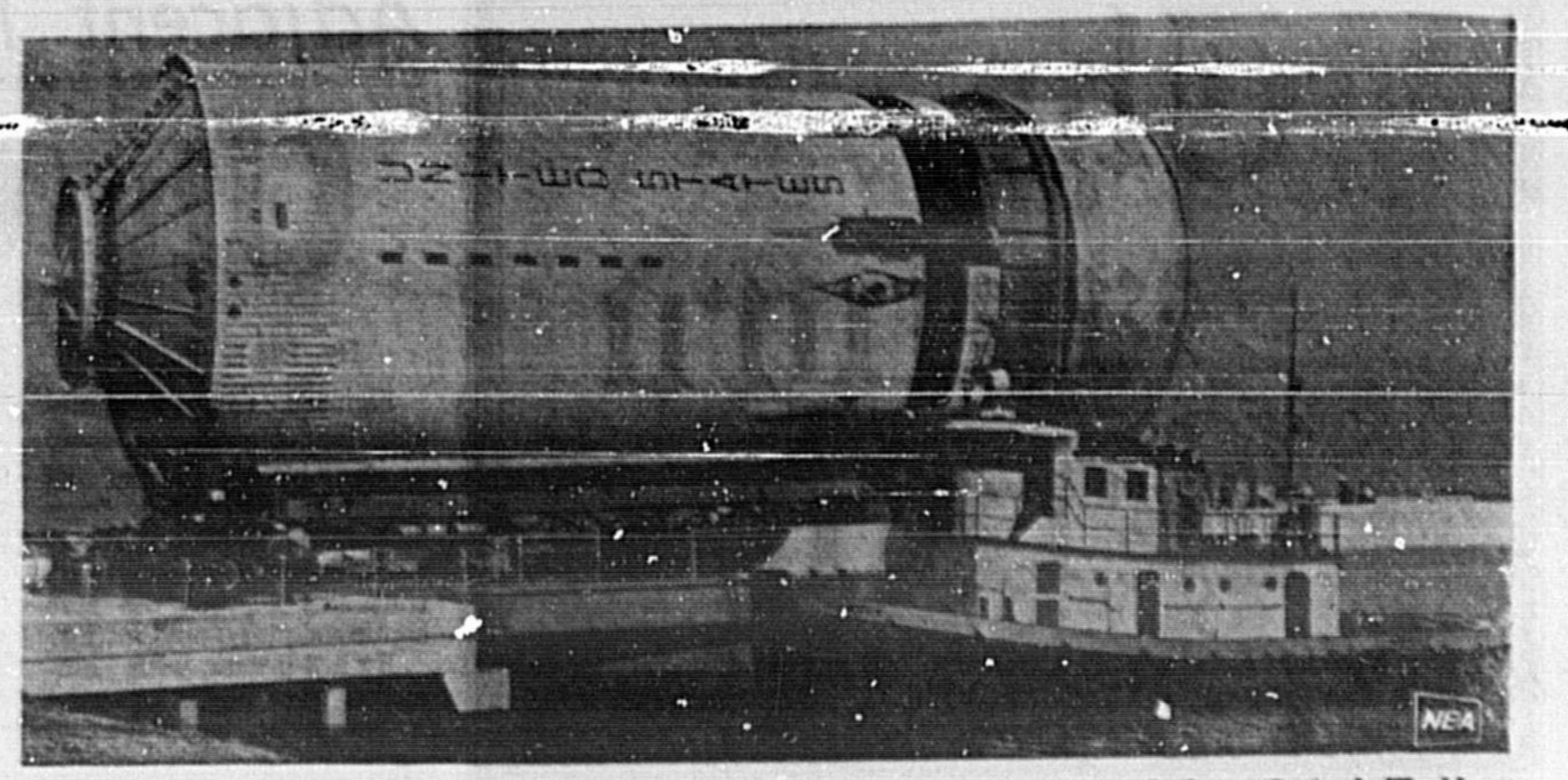
Altamonte Is Victor In Feud Vs County

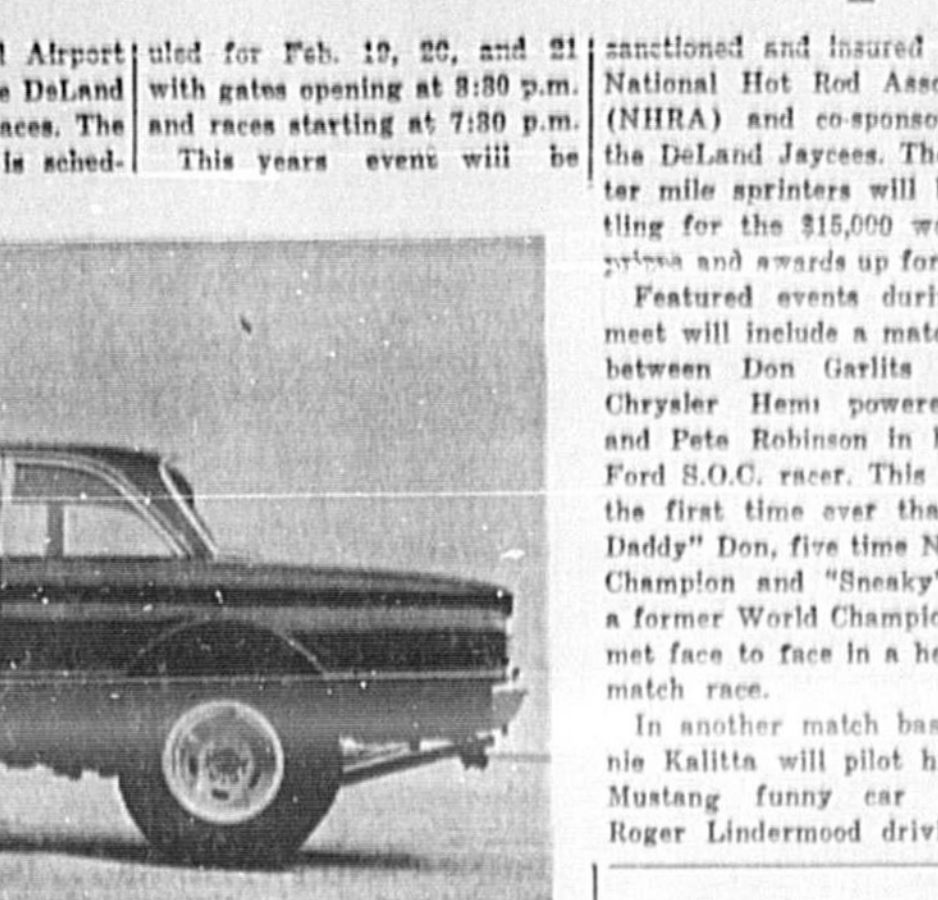
