# Bingo Eyed By Longwood VFD

LONGWOOD — The question of the propriety of the city's volunteer fire department holding regular bingo games to raise funds for purchase of equipment has been referred to Attorney General Robert Shevin by City Attorney S. Joseph Davis Jr.

Davis told the City Council state law provides that non-profit corporations or veterans organizations may conduct such games, but a question remains whether an arm of municipal government can be included.

Councilman E. E. Williamson, senior member of the board, continued his opposition to the proposal with the statement, "I do not think it will be good for us."

In other action, Council: Voted no objections to an inquiry from County Planner David Farr to a proposed change of zoning on a tract on Seminole Blvd. from agricultural to commercial to permit construction of a "mini-

warehouse." Farr told the board the County Commission was seeking a recommendation before permitting the rezoning.

Mayor Kenneth Brown said the city would prefer that the tract be annexed to the municipality but does not object to the zoning if an easement is provided for drainage across the C. A. Hobbs property into Fairy Lake.

Accepted the plans submitted by architect Richard Bennett for expansion of the city hall with three new offices to the west. The plans were ordered put out to bid with bids to be returned June 8.

Approved on recommendation of City Engineer William Palm the final plans for Lake Ruth Subdivision subject to revisions to be made in the plans. The mayor was authorized to execute the plat for the development when reviews are completed.

Authorized the mayor to execute plat for Longwood Pines after recommendation is received from Palm. This subdivision is to be built on the extension of Georgia Avenue east.

Granted permission to the parks and grounds committee to construct and place playground equipment on a section of city property next to the cemetery and at a location near the city ball field.

Approved a plan suggested by Councilman Dick Crenshaw to start a trash pick-up service for city residents wishing the service at a fee of \$1 monthly. Those desiring the service are to either call city hall or drop a postcard to the city. Charges for the service are to be included in monthly water bills.

Approved closing of city hall on Monday, May 29, for Memorial Day.

Agreed to permit the volunteer fire department to sponsor a boy scout troop and for the troop to hold regular meetings in the municipal building at city park.

# Jai Alai Is Billed For Fire Fighting

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Bill for services rendered was ordered sent to the owners of the Orlando-Seminole Jai Alai Fronton by Mayor Lawrence Swofford today to compensate for the assistance given by his city's fire department in extinguishing the blaze at the sports arena Monday afternoon.

Swofford told The Herald when it came to his attention yesterday that city equipment and men were at the fire he immediately ordered their return to the municipality. And firemen who responded to the call were "severely reprimanded." Fire Chief Thomas Siegfried is on vacation.

The mayor said he thoroughly agreed with the position taken by the City of Casselberry and its mayor, Curtis Blow, Monday in refusing to answer call to the fire.

He continued that Altamonte city policy is identical to Casselberry's. Swofford said his city's fire department has instructions to answer calls inside the city, the Suburban Fire Control District and other areas protected under a contract, as well as to assist the Cities of Casselberry, Longwood and North Orlando under a mutual aid agreement.

"Altamonte has no agreement with the Jai Alai Fronton for assistance at fires," the mayor declared.

Longwood Fire Commissioner William Klosky, whose department was at the scene of the fire for nearly five hours, informed The Herald today consideration will be given by the city to billing the Fronton for services.

Klosky added that thought is being given to requiring the Longwood Fire Department to follow similar policy to that in Casselberry and Altamonte.

# City Kills Districting Vote

Sanford City Commission in a 3-2 vote last night defeated the effort to have the City of Sanford divided into voting districts. Candidates for the City Commission would have had to seek election in their home districts.

The Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce and the Sanford-Seminole Jaycees sought to have the question placed on the December general ballot for the voters to decide.

On a motion by Gordon Meyer and the help of Julian Stenstrom and A. A. McClanahan, the request to let voters choose whether to establish four city districts from which to elect commissioners was defeated.

Meyer, in outlining his opposition for districting, read a prepared statement, which purported to show that districting is restrictive. He explained he was defeated in his first try for the city office, but he explained, "I did not come back to this board and try to change the rules because I was a loser."

Stenstrom said districting would bring "utter confusion" to the commission.

McClanahan said the proposal was "regressive" and would not change the elective process.

Meyer said he does not believe districting would accomplish what the people who made the proposal had in mind but stressed "it should go to the voters."

Morris agreed the matter should be put to a vote and forecast the time will come when districting will be needed. "I can see why the commission would not afford the people the right to be heard on this," he added.

George Crossley, Jaycee president and co-chairman of the Chamber committee who brought the proposal before the commission, commented today, "This is a black-white racial proposal, it goes far beyond that."

# Stenstrom Applauds Mooney And Herald

Douglas Stenstrom, Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce chairman, this morning outlined for the Chamber board of directors the work of his committee, Stenstrom's and National Affairs Committee, and also the President of the Sanford-Seminole JCs, that they are in a meeting with two weeks ago advised Crossley, "Before you support an issue, you'd better remember that you get \$200 a month from the city." # Herring Requests Audit Of Accounts

Speaking by telephone from Titusville, Herring disclosed he had been in Tallahassee Monday conferring with Edgar Dunn, the Governor's legal officer, over allegations made by Herring that he (Herring) "seemed to feel he was traveling on a constant expense account" in handling the duties of 18th Judicial circuit state attorney's office.

Herring said Dunn had been told to "put his investigation of Herring on ice" since the state attorney had requested a complete "100 per cent" audit by the state of his accounts.

The state attorney said he asked for the audit to "clear the air." (See earlier Bross story on page 3).

Herring further disclosed he had been requested by George Warner, state comptroller's official, to bring a declaratory action in Brevard County to determine several points of law, primarily the interpretation of several statutes covering transportation expenses, which have never been adjudicated.

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# Six Rail Bridges Smashed By Jets

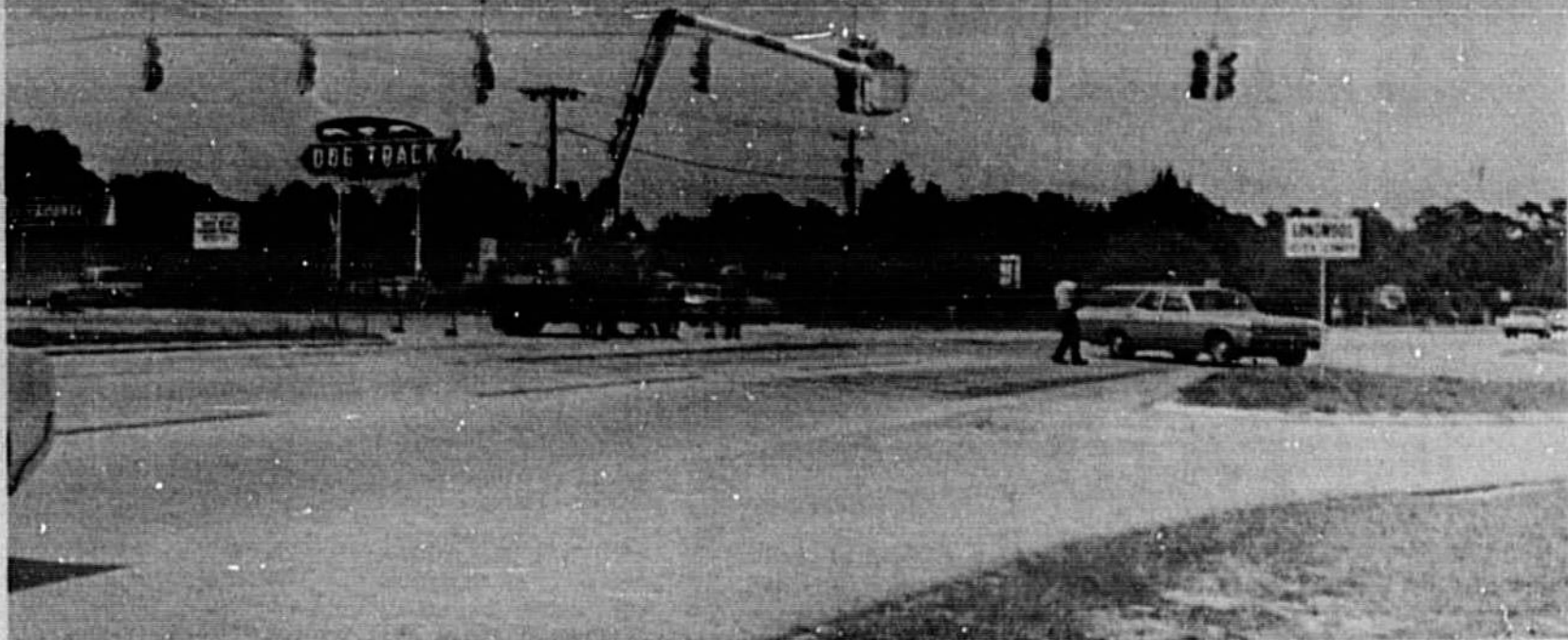
SAIGON (AP) — U.S. fighter-bombers destroyed six bridges on North Vietnam's northwest railway line to China and set off five large secondary explosions in an attack on the transformer station that supplies power to military installations in the Hanoi area, the U.S. Command announced today.

In the ground war, South Vietnamese forces reportedly repulsed new attacks on the northern defense line at the My Chanh river and on An Loc, 60 miles north of Saigon. But much gunnery fighting was reported in the Mekong delta 45 miles southeast of Saigon, and Viet Cong forces there were reported to

have seized about 30 per cent of Da Nang, a district capital.

The U.S. Command said American bombers flew more than 1,000 strikes against targets in North Vietnam during the past three days.

The northwest rail line, one of two over which China sends supplies to Hanoi, was reported hit Monday in an area about 110 miles northwest of Hanoi and about 50 miles south of the Chinese border. The Air Force F4 Phantoms used laser devices to direct their bombs within five feet of the bridges, military sources said. The Hanoi transformer station, which is eight miles northwest of the city, was hit by Air Force Phantoms last Saturday.

## Man, 80, Woman, 20, Charged Longwood Resident Slain

What first appeared to be a natural death of a 47-year-old Longwood woman Monday afternoon was diagnosed as murder. An 80-year-old man and a 20-year-old woman, both of Longwood, have been lodged in the county jail in first degree murder charges.

L. L. Kriz, sheriff's investigator, said Buster Ralph Jackson, 80, and Edith Ann Conley, 20, occupants in a house with Myrtle A. Johnson, at 105 Oak Lane in Longwood, were jailed without bond Monday after an autopsy report discovered the Johnson woman

had died from a .22 caliber bullet wound in the chest.

Kriz said he was called at the Longwood home of Jim Bass late Sunday afternoon to view the body of Mrs. Johnson, who, he was, told had died after an illness.

The body was without any sign of bleeding, the detective said, and was taken to Seminole Memorial Hospital for a routine autopsy to determine cause of death.

Dr. G. V. Garay, hospital pathologist, advised Kriz a bullet wound was discovered and the woman had died as a result of internal hemorrhaging, when the slug sliced the

artery.

Warrants were immediately obtained charging Jackson and the Conley woman, who claimed no knowledge of the shooting. However, a .22 caliber pistol was found in the house by Kriz and late Monday afternoon Sheriff John Polk flew to the State Crime Laboratory at Tallahassee to check the ballistics with the gun and the markings on the bullet recovered from the dead woman's body.

This morning Sheriff Polk revealed ballistics tests showed the slug taken from the woman was fired by the gun retrieved by Kriz.

The detective told The Herald that neutron activation tests were taken of the two suspects to determine who had fired a gun and these results are expected back from Washington in a few days.

At that time, it is expected that the charge on one of the suspects will be changed to accessory to murder.

Kriz reported the dead woman was from Ormond Beach but had been living in the Longwood house with Jackson and Mrs. Conley.

Bass, the home owner, is a truck driver and was reported to be in Minnesota at the time of the shooting.

## Village Growth Is Pictured In Major Budget

NORTH ORLANDO—With only three departments under consideration last night at a meeting of Village Council, the municipality faces a gigantic budget for the coming year.

Round figure total of the anticipated budget for the police and fire departments and the city office is \$75,000. Other budgeted areas are still under council's personal but Mayor Granville Brown indicated he wished the budget "framed" by a workshop meeting on June 12. Deadline for completion of the budget is July 1, with the budget to become effective on Oct. 1.

A question was posed as to the date of effectiveness of the new village charter, should it be ratified by the electorate, and Mayor Brown told council the date is June 13. Quere were then directed as to the interim budget period between June and October, and Mayor Brown advised a quarterly budget be prepared.

Councilmen, in taking note of the mushrooming budget, attempted to ascertain anticipated income for the municipality. Mayor Brown said that the Winter Springs development is building homes at the rate of one every two weeks. He said that on June 1 North Orlando Highlands will commence work upon apartment units.

Councilman Victor Miller conservatively "questioned" a \$50,000 income from building permits alone. Relative to the budgets, Miller told council that the budget for the police department, as submitted by Councilman Troy Pflanz, showed an overall figure of \$25,200 for salaries of three full time patrolmen at \$6,000 annual starting salary and the salary of Chief Walter Bachelor. Maintenance is \$11,734 and purchase of a new car patrol car \$3,260.

Pflanz's total figure was \$40,300 for the police department. Chief Bachelor submitted his own budget figures to council which included three full time patrolmen and two part-time patrolmen. Total salaries for the men and the chief's salary is \$31,900. This also includes three cadets at \$700 each yearly, with one assigned to court administration.

Chief Bachelor cited fixed expenses, car payments, etc. at \$2,736 yearly and vehicle expenses (two) at \$3,600 yearly. Maintenance, he said, would approximate \$600 yearly, plus \$400 for a loty and the expense of \$4,600. Miscellaneous expenses are \$1,226. Chief

## Whalen Gets Life On Robbery Plea

In a negotiated plea, Michael Whalen, 34, Orlando, pleaded guilty this morning before Circuit Judge Clarence Johnson to charges of armed robbery.

The court accepted his plea, and adjudicated the defendant guilty. Whalen was immediately sentenced to life imprisonment at a state prison.

Whalen, attired in Navy blue slacks, with a sky blue sport jacket, displayed no emotion during the proceedings, standing before the bench with one arm behind his back, fist clenched.

Whalen was sentenced in the Feb. 7, 1972, robbery of Walter Barone, manager of the Casselberry ABC Liquor Store. Barone told investigators he was abducted at gun point from his home and forced to drive to the store. There, he said, he was robbed of \$1,700 by Whalen and Fulton Perkins, also charged in the incident. The pair warned Barone he would be killed if he disclosed the robbery to anyone.

In the negotiations, the state dropped charges of use of a firearm in commission of a felony, the second count of the information in which Whalen was charged. The state also dropped charges of kidnaping in another information which was consolidated with the offense in which Whalen was sentenced.

Whalen still faces trial on charges of first degree murder of Richard Franklin Day, assistant manager of the Casselberry ABC liquor store. Investigators disclosed that Day also was forced to hand over a large sum of money to his killers before they drove him to Trinity Preparatory School campus and stabbed him several times in the chest.

Perkins, who faces all of the same charges as Whalen, pleaded guilty the week of May 1 to first degree murder. He, too, was sentenced to life imprisonment by Judge Johnson.

The state, in Perkins case, in the negotiated plea, dropped charges of kidnaping, robbery and use of a firearm in commission of a felony.

## Auxiliary Cops' Rights Bring On Big Argument

NORTH ORLANDO — A routine discussion of a job description and code of conduct for the police auxiliary erupted into heated argument between Mayor Granville Brown and Police Chief Walter Bachelor.

The controversy arose over a stipulation cited by the mayor in which he proposed that auxiliary policemen not be permitted to wear side arms. Chief Bachelor immediately took umbrage at this remark, and told village council, "The auxiliary police won't stay on the force unless they can carry side arms and can protect themselves when assisting a patrolman."

Chief Bachelor went on to contend, "I wouldn't go out (on patrol) without a gun... maybe in England where they have more respect for authority, but it's asking a lot for an unpaid employee."

Miller shot back that they are not paid because they are not responsible to the village, and maintained the present policy of hiring the auxiliary is inadequate with insufficient information upon the men.

"They are all fine men," Miller said, "but they are not licensed patrolmen."

Miller went on to cite Florida statutes in which patrolmen must meet the Police Standards Board requirements, and thus fulfill the full time requirements to carry a weapon.

Bachelor said newcomers are carefully screened and taking courses in the use of firearms with the purpose of assisting an officer. "Telling a man to stand

# Swofford 'Stings' County Council

ALAMONTE SPRINGS — Couched in stinging sarcasm, Mayor Lawrence Swofford Monday afternoon sent a reply by mail to County Commissioners Chairman Greg Drummond setting forth his "several suggestions" for solution of the traffic congestion problem at Interstate 4 and SR 436.

"I will offer several suggestions," the correspondence states. "However, your record, and that of the other members of the Board, does not indicate that you have the desire or the ability necessary to accomplish this. The fact that neither you nor any other member of the Board has offered a suggestion or recommendation to improve the traffic condition at this intersection indicates a lack of leadership and ability so badly needed on the Board of County Commissioners."

The "suggestions" listed are as follows:

"1. There must be a real desire to have this situation corrected by the Board of County Commissioners of Seminole County, since you are the governing body and control

the funds necessary to acquire the right-of-way.

"2. It would be necessary to adopt a strong resolution requesting the State Department of Transportation and Bureau of Roads to construct an adequate interchange to serve this area; also, pledging finances for the cost of the right-of-way. As you know, you have made several mistakes recently concerning rights-of-way at this particular intersection. The first mistake was withdrawing the resolution requesting the Department of Transportation to acquire the rights-of-way. Another mistake was issuing building permits for the ... fried chicken (restaurant) and the five-story office building, since you withdrew your resolution requesting right-of-way for a proper interchange. This indicates to me that you and other members of the Board have no desire to see a proper interchange constructed at this intersection."

Swofford further suggested that the Board "unanimously oppose the first and second phases of the proposed plan now under consideration" and urged that "you review the proposed

plan, which is a total waste of taxpayers' money. The estimated \$500,000 could be applied to a proper interchange."

The mayor in concluding the letter, copies of which were directed to C. A. Benedict, of the County Engineer's Office, William Bush, suggested that the DOT and the Bureau of

## Charter Vote Due In Longwood Soon

LONGWOOD — A zoning board with "teeth and muscle" is created in the new charter proposed for the city by a named two month ago to study and make recommendations on a new document to replace the 1920s vintage one currently in use.

Mayor Kenneth Brown has stated the hope the charter will be ready in time for a referendum (under home rule provisions of the state constitution) of the voters of the municipality in late July.

The zoning board provision was whipped into shape Monday night by three members of the advisory body presented by Chairman James Brown, a former council chairman; Donald Schreiner, and unsuccessful candidate for Council in the 1971 election, and Rod Cable, new resident of the city and active member of the Jaycees, with assistance from attorney Ned Julian Jr. subpoenaed by City Attorney S. Joseph Davis Jr.

Members Rev. W. L. Holcomb and Robert Duffey were not present.

The provision as agreed upon by the group gives the board additional power while protecting the rights of all the people of the city. Actions taken by the zoning board will be a final, but right of appeal to the Council will be permitted to anyone during a certain period of time. The time mentioned Monday night was 15 days. After the appeal period has passed, the Council will be required to ratify by adoption of ordinance for whatever means necessary the decisions of the zoning board.

## Bross Answers Herring

Jerry Bross, of Titusville, Brevard County solicitor and a GOP candidate for the 13th Judicial Circuit state attorney post, now held by Republican incumbent Abbott Herring, today refuted countercharges made against him by Herring, who said he used his own car and he was acquitted in a Court of Record.

Commenting on Herring's statement that he had been indicted in Miami in 1965 by the Dade County grand jury for soliciting business by ambulance chasing, Bross said the charge was a misdemeanor and added he was acquitted in a Court of Record.

"The local grievance committee of the bar association found no probable cause as did the Florida Bar Association of Governors," Bross added.

The candidate stressed he was the only attorney ever judicially determined not to be an ambulance chaser.

Discussing the \$3.91 only expense charged to the taxpayers as a result of his office, Bross said he used his own car 99 per cent of the time while driving better than 27,000 miles since having the job as Brevard County solicitor.

He further advised he paid for his own meals, since, as he said, "I must eat a meal anyway and there is no reason for charging the county for it."

Another recommendation of the charter committee, also concerning the zoning board, is that all petitions for annexation be referred to that group for study on the zoning aspect and the City Council will be required to hold public hearings on annexations prior to final action.

The elections section was also beefed up to make mandatory by the zoning board and a districting ordinance (immediately after adoption of the charter).

The current districting ordinance will be abandoned under the new charter since the Council will no longer be a five-man board elected from districts. The new proposal makes the mayor a member of Council to be elected at large. The remaining four councilmen will be required to reside in geographical districts as nearly equal in population as possible.

The attorney was asked to redraft the charter with the changes agreed upon and adding the sections concerning fire and police departments and municipal court.

## Turner Pleads Innocent To Charges In Jax Court

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — For Glenn W. Turner, it was a characteristic gesture. He flipped back the cuff of his dark green coat and revealed a gold watch chain.

"Do you know what the watch says?" he asked newsmen who surrounded him Monday after he pleaded innocent to six criminal charges based on operations of some of his businesses.

"It says 'To Glenn W. Turner, the greatest guy in the world, from Glenn W. Turner, the greatest guy in the world.'"

A tuxedo pulled to the curb and Turner made a dramatic exit.

Resplendent in his three-piece green suit, including a vest with a double row of brass buttons, and a pair of white boots, Turner was silent inside Judge Hudson Ollitt's criminal court room.

An Orlando attorney, James Russ, waived reading the charges and entered innocent pleas for Turner to each of them.

Turner strode down two flights of stairs in the Duval County Courthouse, as if to avoid newsmen. But when his taxi wasn't at the curb and a group of reporters were, the Orlando millionaire gave them one of his sales talks.

"Anyone with intelligence can become rich and happy," he said.

He told how he was born in a hospital charity ward to sharecropper parents in South Carolina and overcame the handicap of a cleft palate to become a super-salesman and head of a conglomerate with 63 companies.

Noting a woman reporter, Turner said sex should be no drawback to success.

"I have five women presidents," he said. "One of them is a 27-year-old black woman, only she doesn't know she's black because nobody tells her she is."

Turner went on to blast the grand jury system. "They didn't give me a chance to defend myself," he declared. He criticized State Atty. Don Nichols and Florida Agriculture Commissioner Doyle Conner, who has the state's new Consumer Services Division in his department.

"I'm protesting, just like the young people," Turner said. "Only I'm doing it differently. I'm protesting the government that is trying to tell me that I can't take a person with \$2,000 or \$5,000 and make them wealthy."

He is charged with deceptive trade practices, security fraud, operating a pyramid club and conspiracy to violate lottery, securities and trade practices laws.

Nichols said these are believed the first charges against Turner, although his companies have been made defendants in civil suits in several states.

The 44-year-old lawmaker was elected to the Florida Legislature in 1963 and has been reelected without opposition each term.

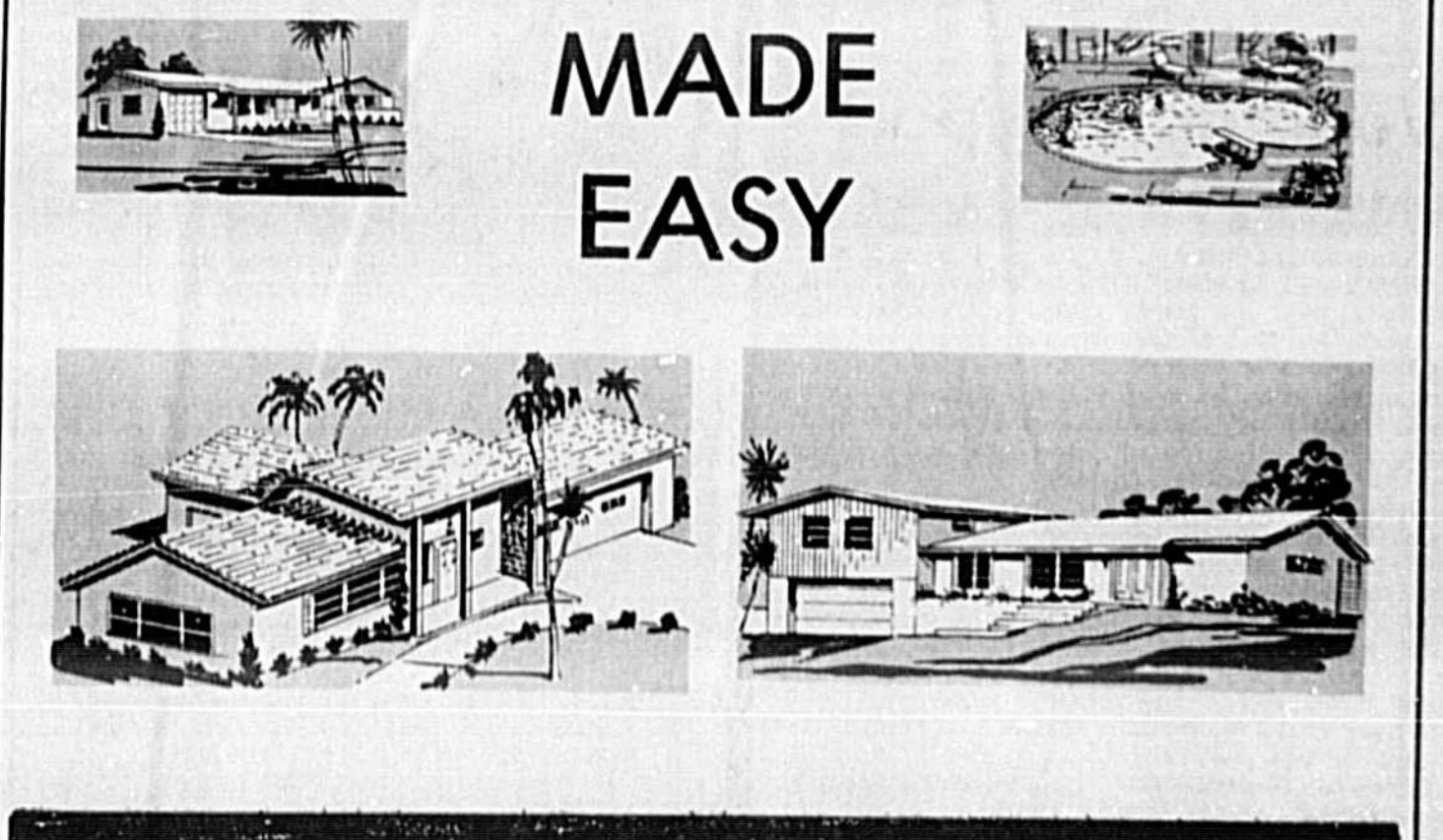
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# Nixon, Brezhnev 'All Smiles'

## Paths To World Peace Sought

MOSCOW (AP) — All smiles, President Nixon and Communist party chief Leonid I. Brezhnev met in the Kremlin today for the first formal session of their summit meeting to search of pathways to world peace.

Moments after a faraway chime sounded the hour of 11 a.m. Nixon and Brezhnev led their delegations into the ornate Catherine Hall in the Grand Kremlin Palace from opposite sides of the big room. After exchanging handshakes, small talk and smiles, they sat down facing each other across the conference table.

Nixon was flanked by Secretary of State William P. Rogers and Henry A. Kissinger, the President's assistant for national security affairs.

Sitting on either side of Brezhnev were Premier Nikolai Podgorny and Premier Alexei N. Kosygin.

Before serious business began, Podgorny offered Nixon a package of Ukrainian cigarettes, commenting, "They are not bad."

Nixon, who smokes an occasional cigar, lit up the pack, placed it back on the table.

Nixon and Brezhnev held an unscheduled exploratory meeting Monday afternoon after the President's arrival in Moscow. They met for nearly two hours in Brezhnev's Kremlin office for a "businesslike and frank" preliminary discussion of international problems and U.S.-Soviet relations.

White House press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler reported.

The President and Mrs. Nixon were entertained on their first night in Moscow at an official Kremlin dinner in the evening at which Nixon and Soviet Premier Nikolai V. Podgorny both talked of cooperating to restrain the arms race, promote world peace and seek friendlier relations between their two countries.

Nixon and Podgorny also made veiled references to the Vietnam War without breaking any new ground. But Podgorny's failure to mention Nixon's order for the mining of North Vietnamese ports seemed to suggest that the war would cause no public pyrotechnics during the visit.

Nixon, who said before his arrival that he believed the two governments were approaching the talks in a cooperative fashion, told the dinner guests:

"Because we are both to proceed on the basis of equality and mutual respect, we meet at a moment when we can make peaceful cooperation a reality."

In a similar vein, Podgorny said:

"We approach these talks from realistic positions and will make every effort in accordance with the principles of our policy to achieve positive results and try to justify the hopes placed in ... the Soviet-American summit meeting."

Nixon indirectly alluded to frequent complaints about Soviet arms shipments to Hanoi by saying:

# Soviets Emphasize Friendly Relations

The Soviet reception of President Nixon, like the advance Soviet press treatment of the visit, gives the impression that the Kremlin will do considerable lengths to prevent any look of failure for this summit.

It seems significant that President Nikolai Podgorny chose this moment to expand the Moscow litany about the need for better Soviet-American relations. Up to now the stereotyped sentence has gone: "Better relations with the United States are both possible and desirable, but not at the expense of any third country or people."

Podgorny, speaking at a Kremlin dinner, made it read "not merely good, but friendly relations."

This is a curious time for Soviet leaders to be talking about "friendly" relations with an American president who has just ordered the mining of a Communist nation's harbors to prevent the flow of Soviet war material to North Vietnam.

But Podgorny stressed that the Russian leaders are eager for positive results. Evidently the men in control won't permit either Vietnam or the Middle East, the two main sources of tension, to damage chances. If they must talk about the two areas, they will. That's going to make their allies nervous, even though the Russians may be neither willing nor able to concede anything.

Leonid I. Brezhnev, the Communist party general secretary who is running the Soviet show now, lost no time in having a first meeting with the President. He may even be braving the meaningful scowls of party and military conservatives by displaying such eagerness.

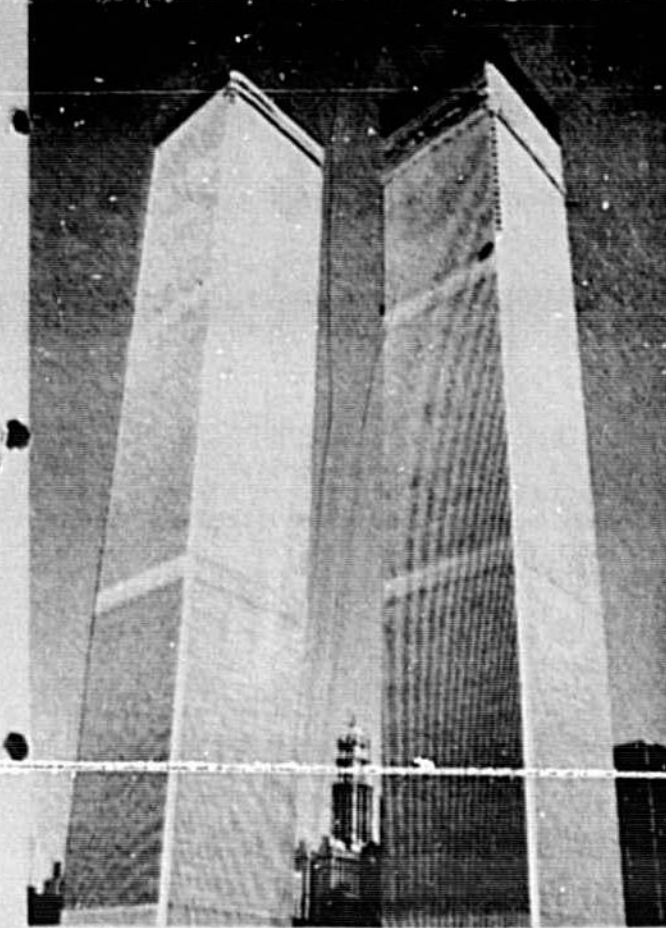
Brezhnev and the Soviet media have built up a lot of hopes in the U.S.S.R. and abroad that the summit will contribute to eased tensions, however. The party chief most likely wants to deliver.

In testimony to this probability, one striking feature of Soviet press publicity has been a tendency to treat Nixon with marked respect and even with an occasional hint of faint praise.

U.S.A., the publication of Soviet Americanologists, said last month Nixon had shown more realism than some Americans who still contend that the ideological struggle will continue causing dangerous tension. It spoke approvingly of Nixon's view that there are "fairly good opportunities" for better U.S.-Soviet relations on some specific questions.

In Moscow's eyes that was "realistic." Also realistic in the Kremlin view is the idea that ideological war must go on, whatever improvement may come in government-to-government relations.

Published Soviet analyses fall short of crediting Nixon with what Moscow would consider an enlightened attitude but imply that Washington has been forced toward better relations because of a U.S. popular mood that makes it "increasingly difficult to speak directly against the normalization and betterment of these relations," as U.S.A. put it.

# Cabinet To Approve New Jax Building

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)— Cabinet approval of a dredge and fill permit for a \$250 million Jacksonville plant building offshore nuclear power plants is considered certain, following Monday's 3-2 Pollution Control Board vote for the project.

The Cabinet was scheduled to act today on an application to dredge and fill 240 acres of Back River, a lagoon on Blount Island in the St. Johns River. But there was a strong possibility action would be delayed.

At least four of the seven Cabinet members have expressed approval of the project, which is also sought by Portsmouth, Va.

Joel Kuperberg, director of the trustees of the Internal Improvement Fund, said when the Pollution Control Board approved the project he didn't know what recommendation he would make to the Cabinet.

Kuperberg, who told Cabinet aides last week he feels the project is being studied to approval without adequate study, has expressed reservations about ownership of the submerged land and the request to waive the \$1 per cubic yard fee for sale of fill.

The Jacksonville Port Authority, which owns the land, would fill 4 million acres for Westinghouse and Tenneco corpn., which have formed a combine to build the nuclear plants.

Robert Peace, managing director of the Port Authority, said the companies would get an option to purchase the land at \$2,000 a acre—a total price of \$1.4 million for 900 acres.

Kuperberg contends the land is worth \$35,000 an acre—a total price of \$33.5 million.

The Pollution Control Board, acting through economy vs. ecology arguments, accepted the contention of Jacksonville boosters that whatever environmental damages would occur in the Back River would be outweighed by 10,000 new jobs and a \$100 million annual payroll.

"The economic values, together with the social values, far outweigh the ecological values," said David Levin, chairman of the board.

Levin had considered abstaining from the vote because

# Conflict Of Interest Ruling

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)— A city official who has a law practice or other business regulated by the state must file a sworn public statement disclosing the interest, Atty. Gen. Robert Shevin held today.

The opinion was rendered to four members of a city council who asked Shevin to keep both their names and their city secret. Shevin is permitted to issue such opinions when standards of conduct of public officials are at issue.

Shevin said the state law requiring disclosure of outside interests relates to all businesses which are licensed or regulated by the state.

"A city official who is an officer, director, agent or member of, or who owns a controlling interest in any such business entity must file a sworn statement disclosing such interest," said Shevin.

In other opinions today Shevin said:

—Told Martin County Judge Mallory L. Johnson that a minor who is 18 years old is eligible to obtain a license to carry a pistol or repeating rifle if his or her "disabilities of nonage" have been removed by court order.

—Told Broward County State Atty. Philip Shaler that the new state uniform traffic code that took effect this year could make and enforce its own traffic regulations for the Florida Turnpike—separate from the state uniform traffic code that took effect this year.

—Said in separate opinions that a county solicitor seeking higher office and a county commissioner seeking reelection in a different district both must resign their current posts to seek the new ones. But he said the resign-to-run law does not apply to members of the Florida Judicial Council or county attorneys.

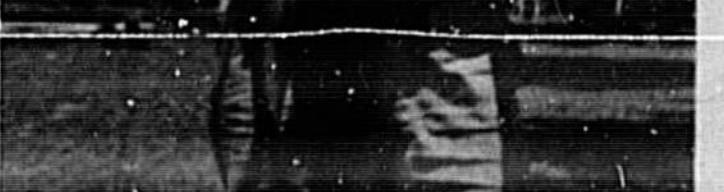

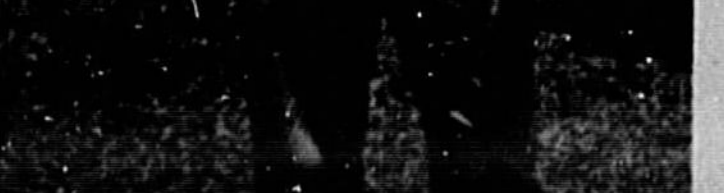

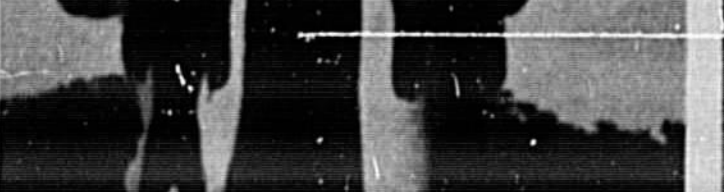

## Visual Capabilities Of Drivers Studied

By MARILYN GORDON

A program, sponsored by the Highway Safety Foundation, in which some 500 drivers in the Central Florida area will be given visual tests as part of a nationwide project to determine causes of accidents, is being conducted by Frank Fowler, a human factors psychologist at Rollins College.

"Our purpose is to take a series of measurements on the visual capabilities of drivers, who either get cited for traffic violations or become involved in traffic accidents. We, then, compare these results with those of drivers whose records are accident and violation free. If there are some visual differences between the two groups we try to find a way of correcting the visual problems of drivers as a whole," Fowler said.

The Highway Safety Foundation is a private, non-profit organization, formed in 1960 and headquartered in Ohio. The Foundation's objective is to achieve increased highway safety and thus a higher quality land transportation system.

The objectives of this vision study, performed with the same type of equipment used by the state to re-examine drivers, are not to prevent people from driving, but to find deficiencies which can be corrected. Additionally, the information obtained will be useful in determining whether the vision standards across the country, to examine drivers for items, are truly relevant to automobile driving.

"The Foundation believes that the money and human energies that could be used to expand our social and economic well-being are being used to replace what we already have, but is being destroyed through accidents," explained Fowler.

"And with all the research going on, very little is known about how and why traffic accidents occur. Society often labels the driver as the culprit even though the roads, traffic control systems, vehicle and surrounding factors may help to produce his failure," he continued.

In order to gain a greater understanding of the causes of accidents, the Foundation uses teams of specialists who visit the accident scene, interview

those involved and analyze selected accidents in depth.

"We are interested in what caused the accident, what aggravated any resulting injury or property damage, and what can be done to prevent these accidents from happening in the future," Fowler explained.

Fowler, a human factors and systems analysis specialist in industry, examines the involvement of the driver from all aspects.

"Simply stated, you analyze an accident as much as you would an accident in business if you were called in as a consultant. All the facts leading up to and after the accident are examined and then meshed together. The causes are determined and solutions to future accidents are proposed," he said.

Fowler has high praise for the cooperation he has received from Judge James Byrne, Casselberry traffic court.

"Many people are a little reluctant to take a test even with the reassurance that it has nothing to do with their court appearance. Judge Byrne really sells them on the need for the research. He has done such a good job we are now using two machines to handle all the volunteers," related Fowler.

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## Thousands Expected Dade Facing 'Inundation'

MIAMI BEACH (AP)—Miami Snowplow Co. melted Monday amidst charges by coalition leaders that unprepared South Florida officials will be inundated by thousands of young people flowing into Miami for this summer's two political conventions.

"There will be tens of thousands of young nondelegates who will be coming to Miami this summer," said Lynn Slavitt, spokeswoman for Snowplow, at a news conference. "The authorities have not even begun to make any practical, sensible plan for this influx."

A steering committee of the 32-group coalition, which was made up of representatives from Miami and other nondelegates. The coalition's evaporation was criticized by Dr. Eugene Nagel, who warned last week that emergency medical care needed for the conventions is a "mind-boggling" prospect.

"If they (Snowplow) drop out at this point, I think it indicates they would never have survived the summer anyway," Nagel said. "If they are doing it to dramatize the need by a self-immolation, that's something else and I have no comment on it."

Mrs. Slavitt also presented a \$8 million itemized budget which Snowplow would be needed to cover the care and feeding of 100,000 demonstrators for an eight-week period between the opening of the Democratic convention July 10 and the end of the Republican nominating session Aug. 24. She

called the budget "conservative."

Listed on the budget were items such as portable toilets, 300 lounge depressors for the medical tent, \$1,716,904 for 1,113 cases of canned beef stew and even Yiddish language interpreters.

Meanwhile Dade County Manager Ray Goede was meeting in Washington today with White House aides and other federal officials to seek logistical support for the needs of nondelegates at the conventions.

## Meat Containers Subject Of Suit

MIAMI (AP) — Gulf States Paper Corp., which makes opaque, plastic foam trays for meat packages, has filed suit against Dade County asking for a preliminary injunction to block implementation of its clear packaging ordinance June 18.

However, as of Monday afternoon, Dade County authorities said they had not been notified officially that the county was being sued to block the new ordinance.

Dade County households will buy all of their pre-packaged fresh meat in clear plastic packages under the ordinance passed by the county commission last January. Most of the clear plastic trays used for meats are manufactured by Monsanto Co.

Walter Simons, executive vice president of Gulf States Paper Corp., has charged that the clear plastic trays are not suitable for "the tropic type of climate."

"The plastic trays cost about 26 per cent more than paper or wax trays, and this cost must be passed on to the consumer," Simons said. "Dade retail stores selling packaged meat would pay \$400,000 to \$500,000

more annually for clear plastic trays under this ordinance, and they would have to pass the cost on to the consumer."

Simons cited a statement attributed in *Florida 32* to a merchandising vice president of the Grand Union Company, regarding a program conducted in Grand Union stores in Puerto Rico in 1970. Meat was packaged in plastic trays for about five weeks.

"The meat became discolored, seepage of the juices took place in packages of beef, veal and lamb, and a concentration of moisture occurred inside the trays which eventually formed small streams of water which collected in the grooves of the trays," Berhold was quoted as saying. "This water eventually caused the meat to turn greenish grey in color and ultimately a blue-black white."

# Arms Limitation Accord Seen With Nixon And Soviet Leaders

MOSCOW (AP) — President Nixon and Soviet leaders have virtually reached agreement on an arms limitation accord curbing erection of defensive antiballistic missile sites and freeing offensive nuclear missiles at their present levels, informed sources reported today.

As President Nixon met for the fourth time in the Kremlin with Communist party chief Leonid Brezhnev, the sources said the negotiators hope to be ready for the signing Friday of a treaty covering the ABM curb and a less formal agreement for the freeze on offensive missiles, both those based on land and

those on submarines and surface ships. The agreement apparently would not bar either country from installing improved missiles at existing launch sites.

It is expected that the agreement will provide for the use of reconnaissance satellites to verify that missile placements are not being increased by either country.

Nixon and Brezhnev are expected to hold both morning and afternoon sessions today and then to participate in the signing of an agreement for co-operation in space exploration, the third accord produced during Nixon's visit to the Soviet capital.

There was speculation that one of the goals of the space agreement might be joint orbital trips by U.S. and Soviet astronauts before the 20th birthday celebration of the United States in 1976.

The Kremlin emerged briefly from the Kremlin today for the first time since he arrived in Moscow on Monday to place a wreath at the tomb of an unknown soldier killed in the defense of the Soviet capital in 1941. The general public was barred from the area alongside the Kremlin Wall, but about 150 Muscovites watched impassively as Nixon's motorcade made the short trip through closed-off streets.

## Blackburn's Friend Beverly Tells All

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Beverly Roberts Mathews testified Tuesday she lied before a federal grand jury on behalf of her former lover Harlan A. Blackburn, identified by police as the "chief" of a central Florida betting syndicate, because she feared for her life.

Mrs. Mathews, who completed two full days on a witness stand in U.S. District Court Tuesday, testified she was closely associated with Blackburn in a central Florida gambling ring and that they were lovers for about seven of the nine years they were together.

Four of the original 60 defendants in the case are on trial on various lottery charges. There have been 49 pleas of guilty from various defendants, including Blackburn.

Mrs. Mathews made the following statements Tuesday.

— Blackburn likewise instructed her on what to say at his Jacksonville trial in August 1970—following his indictment despite her testimony — and that he instructed her to repeat her story when Mrs. Mathews, then known as Beverly Roberts, came up for trial in Orlando on a charge of perjury.

— That she made false statements at her own trial because Blackburn had masterminded assassination attempts on one of his gambling colleagues; had threatened a witness who had won immunity at her perjury trial, and had passed along implied threats against her.

— And finally, that she had come to distrust her attorney, including attorneys in Blackburn's organization, because she was forced to comply with false statements attributed to her, but which she had no part in formulating.

This testimony developed after a Tampa attorney, Arnold D. Levine, representing Coca Cola dogtrack owner John Newton Foutan, attempted to discredit Mrs. Mathews' direct prosecution testimony by branding her a liar, FBI informer and a person of questionable morality.

Her revelations about the alleged threats and assassination attempts came out on indirect questioning from assistant U.S. Atty. Bernard Dempsey after U.S. District Judge Gerald B. Tjoflat—over Levine's objections—allowed her to explain why she lied to the grand jury.

Blackburn has pleaded guilty to wagering charges and income tax fraud. He has not yet been sentenced.

## Against Sanford Court Action Looms Over City Districts

Failure of Sanford City Commission to allow voters to decide whether the city should be divided into voting districts for city commissioners may result in the filing of a civil rights suit against the city.

This was disclosed by Louise Crawford, Seminole Community Action employee and intermediary through which civil rights actions are forwarded to Washington.

A meeting of Seminole Neighborhood United Councils (SNUC) was held Tuesday night by black leaders to discuss what steps should be taken in view of the City Commission's Monday night three-two vote to prohibit

districting from being on the December ballot.

Rev. Amos Jones, Seminole Community Action director, said today a civil rights suit might be filed, if any citizen requests it. (The Herald has learned that several Sanford residents are now completing preliminary drafts before a complaint is filed with the U.S. Justice Department in Washington.)

Rev. Jones did not comment concerning this expected court action, but he stressed, "I don't see this as a black-versus-white problem." He commented, "Any fair-minded individual would want to give the people the right to express themselves and I am amazed that three

commissioners (Julian Stenzel, Gordon Meyer and A. A. McClanahan) do not trust the judgment of the same electorate who elected them, to vote on this issue."

Rev. J. E. Connelly, Negro leader and defeated candidate for the 1971 City Commission, today issued the following statement relative to the Commission action: "It is regrettable that the city suffered a setback due to the actions of three commissioners.

"Sanford can no longer remain as it was or it will be on the river of no return," Connelly continued.

He said, "We want and need better community relationships but this cannot be when three commissioners remove the right of citizens to involve themselves in their government."

He stressed "the fight is not over. . . action will be taken to force the commissioners to change their minds and put this issue on the ballot." By actions he indicated petitions from electorate or a civil rights suit.

Also, it has been reported that Orange County persons working for districting there have indicated a willingness to give aid to Sanfordites involved with the same issue.

Rev. Connelly, commenting to the press after the Commission had deemed districting, again stated, "No black man can be elected under the present Sanford electoral system to the City Commission."

With a declaration that efforts will be made to give support to whomever is running against Meyer in this year's election, Rev. Connelly said, "The attitude of this Commission needs to be changed."

"Often I hear commissioners say they represent the black community but I challenge this statement when city has 28.1 miles of unpaved streets and half of this is in the black communities of Georgetown and Goldboro," Connelly added.
