No persons under 18 years old will be accepted.

Chet Marek, chairman of the Blood Bank committee said that blood donations will be credited to the bank of the donor's choice and a special Blood Reserve is being set up which will be available to all Navy and Marine Corps personnel and their families, plus any emergency ruled by the blood bank committee.

Membership in the Gallon Club (eight times) provides lifetime credit for the donor, spouse and minor children. Credits are transferrable through the National Blood Banks Clearing House, Maek said.

Vegetable Market

In New York Monday, Florida endive and escarole were slightly stronger, each selling for 1.50-2.00, mostly 1.75-2.00 per crate. Some small escarole brought 1.25-1.50. Romaine lettuce was higher at 3.00-3.50, with some large 2.00-2.50, and big Boston type brought 3.50 per crate for the best, with fair quality at 2.50-2.75. Cabbage, celery and Chinese cabbage were all slightly lower. Crates of cabbage sold for 2.50-3.00 with one mark at 3.25, and some small size and some very large at 2.00-2.25. Celery ranged mostly 3.00-3.75 for 2 to 3 dozen size, with some 2 dozen low as 2.75 and 4 dozen brought 3.50 per crate. Cartons of 18 film wrapped celery hearts were 3.75. Chinese cabbage was 2.00-2.75, mostly 2.00-2.50 per crate. Turnip tops were slightly weaker at 1.50-1.75 per bushel basket and mustard greens were unchanged at 1.50-1.75. Bunched collards in celery crates were lower at 2.75-3.00, and bunched turnips were 2.00-2.50. Curly parsley in crates of 5 dozen bunches sold for 2.50-3.00 and plain type ranged from 2.75-3.50 with a few at high as 4.00. Radishes were mostly unchanged at 75c and 1.25, mostly 1.00 per bushel of 30 6-oz. film bags and 1.50 per basket of 24 bunches. Water cress brought 18-20c per bunch.

In Central Florida Friday, cabbage was lower at 1.75 per crate, and 1.50-1.75 per 30 lb. sack. Celery was unchanged, ranging from 2.25 for crates of 6 to 8 dozen size to a low of 1.75 for 1 1/2 doz. Crates of 21 celery hearts, film wrapped, sold for 4.00. Endive and escarole brought 1.00 a crate, romaine lettuce was 2.00 and iceberg type ranged from 1.50-1.75. Radishes were 75c per basket.

Flights Probed By Cuba Critics

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate Preparedness subcommittee investigating the Cuban crisis summoned the Air Force intelligence chief today presumably for questioning about air reconnaissance over the island last fall.

Chairman John C. Stennis, D-Miss., called Maj. Gen. Robert A. Brielweiser to testify behind closed doors as the inquiry resumed.

Prodded as a result of a news magazine story, the Defense Department said Tuesday that responsibility for aerial reconnaissance of Cuba was shifted from the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) to the Strategic Air Command (SAC) a day or two before offensive missiles were found there Oct. 14.

The story appeared in Newsweek.

According to Dr. Hawley H. Sells of Tampa, president of FTHA, the organizational structure of FTHA and its affiliates in being redesigned to improve the quality of program activities being carried on at both the state and local levels by insuring maximum utilization of all combined resources, including funds and personnel.

Boy Scout Expansion Program 'Outlined'

A tremendous expansion of camping facilities for Boy Scouts of the area was outlined Monday by C. D. Caldwell, Executive Director of the Central Florida Council of Scouts.

Speaking to members of the Sanford Rotary Club, Caldwell predicted that by 1970 the present council of 12,000 scouts will have reached 26,000, and the present program of camping will be hopelessly overrun.

The Council presently has some 250 acres at Camp Lamoche, and plans call for the acquisition of 550 more acres to make a total of 800 acres, all on one side of the lake, which Caldwell said has "a mile-long strip of sandy beach."

A set of colored slides were shown by Scout director Tom Albert, which outlined the plans further.

"Boys camp the year-round," Albert pointed out. "But facilities are so far below our needs that campers must often make reservations two to three months in advance."

Plans call for more campsites, more facilities, equipment, storage space, and improvements of other weekend campsites scattered around the central Florida area.

"Boys are our greatest natural resource," Albert said. "The real objective of working with boys is to build good men."

Caldwell pointed out that the excellent facilities at Camp Lamoche received a highly favorable 88 percent efficiency rating from inspectors last summer.

Plans for a fund drive are now underway in several of the six counties involved, with a goal of \$260,000 set as a long-term investment.

Getting Home:

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Abraham Ribicoff, D-Conn., told a Senate banking subcommittee today that "getting to work and getting home again is just as important as getting to the moon."

But, the former cabinet officer said, Congress is spending billions to reach the moon, but is merely talking about spending millions to help commuters.

Ribicoff's statements were prepared for presentation to the subcommittee in support of a mass transportation bill aimed at helping cities solve their traffic problems.

Sen. Frank Lausche, D-Ohio, opposed the bill. He said it was unwarranted interference with state and local affairs.

Ribicoff disagreed, but said each state and region should work out its own solution to its own problems. "No single answer can or should come from Washington," he said.

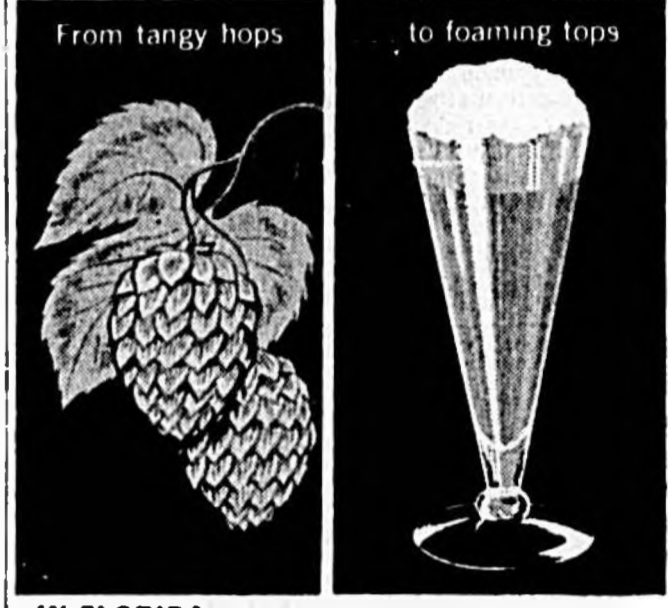

Two Believed Dead In Kitty Hawk Jet Crash

TOKYO (UPI) — U. S. Navy authorities today disclosed the death of one officer and probable death of another as a result of an airplane crash Monday aboard the aircraft carrier Kitty Hawk. A third officer was seriously injured.

Lt. John C. Shoemaker, Oak Harbor, Wash., was killed. Lt. Cdr. James J. Wilson Jr., also of Oak Harbor, was presumed dead and Lt. Cdr. William R. Cary, of Oak Harbor, was injured.

An enlisted man, aviation mechanic 2C Charles M. Eustace, was recovered from the sea without serious injury.

Congress Okay On Tax Bill Seen

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy said today he believes Congress will pass a tax reduction bill including "important elements" of the revenue-raising reforms contained in his original proposal.

The chief executive told a televised news conference that his final position on whether to accept a tax cut bill without reforms would have to depend on what Congress finally does with his requests.

But he indicated that "the best program in the one we sent up which provides for \$13.5 billion in tax reductions and \$12.5 billion revenue in tax reforms."

U. S. Disrupts Talks, Reds Say

GENEVA (UPI) — The Soviet Union today charged the United States with disrupting nuclear test negotiations in order to equip West Germany with atomic weapons.

Soviet negotiator Semjon K. Tsarapkin said it was "obvious" the United States was not prepared to reach agreement since its foreign policy "is aimed at the nuclear armament of Germany and the creation of a NATO multinational nuclear force."

"Through practically disrupting talks on both the number of inspections and the technical details of them."

U. S. Ambassador Charles C. Stello told the 17-nation conference that the fundamental requirement to break the nuclear deadlock is some flexibility on the part of the Russians "to match Western reasonableness."

Forest City's Second Cave-In

Residents of Forest City today were becoming a bit apprehensive that their community may be "going down the drain."

George Janssen, who resides at the end of Forest Lake Drive West, awoke one morning two weeks ago to find a large hole right outside his rear door.

This morning Janssen arose to find a still larger hole next to the west line of his property. This hole measured 25 feet in diameter and 17 feet deep.

Road Supt. J. C. Lavender, who investigated today, said he had been informed by neighbors in the vicinity that their wells have been pumping muddy water and sand for several weeks.

He added only time will tell if this pumping is the cause of the cave-ins. He barricaded the present hole and said he will let it stand for some time to "await developments."

The present hole is to the west of Janssen's property line and immediately north of the very end of the Forest Lake Drive West right-of-way. And it is just east of the property line of a Forest Lake Academy-owned citrus grove.

Actually, Lavender said, the hole is in the middle of an old dedicated road right-of-way which has never been accepted by Seminole County.

The dedication is so old, he added, it has never been determined who deeded the right-of-way to the county.

But this morning Forest City residents were quipping and wondering about the future of their community. Will it stand or will it fall?

Hillbilly Stars Die In Crash

CAMDEN, Tenn. (UPI) — Hawkshaw Hawkins, Cowboy Copas and Patsy Cline, stars of country music's famed Grand Ole Opry, were killed in the crash of their small plane Tuesday night during bad weather, authorities reported today.

The three, along with Miss Cline's manager, Randy Hughes, were en route to Nashville, home of the Grand Ole Opry, from a benefit show in Kansas City when their plane went down.

Highway patrolmen who reached the scene of the crash, about three miles from this West Tennessee town, indicated back this morning that four bodies were found in the wreckage.

A fire tower watchman first spotted the wreckage after dawn broke across the hill country where several residents reported they had seen the Piper Comanche plane circling.

Thunderstorms raked portions of Tennessee during the time and visibility in the Camden area was reported poor.

The three stars and Hughes landed at Dyersburg, Tenn., about 4 p.m., then took off for Nashville with fuel for three hours.

Mrs. Hughes said in Nashville that her husband, who was piloting the plane, had telephoned from Dyersburg and said the four "would be home soon."

Capt. Frank Jones of the Eastern Air Rescue Center at Robins Air Force Base, said there were reports that the plane later was seen circling with its engine off.

Mrs. Cline, of Winchester, Va., was named "outstanding female vocalist" last year by country and western music publications. She became a Grand Ole Opry regular in 1959. Among her biggest hits were "I Fall to Pieces," "She's Got You," and "Heartaches."

Hawkins was a West Virginian who had been with the Opry eight years. His wife in Jean Shepard, another Opry star. Jones of his letter known songs were "Slow Poke," "Soldier's Joy" and "Twenty Miles from Shore."

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Posse Grabs Florida Swamp Rat Fugitive

CAMILLA (UPI)—A crafty Florida fugitive who used "swamp rat" tactics to elude a posse and bloodhounds for four days in the winding sloughs of southwest Georgia was captured Tuesday night on the banks of the Itchaway Creek in Mitchell County.

James Nelson Shearer, an expert backwoodsman wanted for shooting the police chief of Arlington, Ga., told officials he deftly blazed a zigzagging trail in and out of waist deep water to throw sensitive-nosed hounds off course.

But the wily, will-o'-the-wisp escaper fell capture to two hunting lodge operators he thought did not know his identity. "The hounds couldn't get an accurate nose in his scent when he waded in the water," said Georgia Bureau of Investigation (GBI) agent McCullough Harris. "He would brush against growth first on one side of the creek bank and then the other in order to leave scents everywhere."

Harris said Shearer had just departed from a row boat he had stolen when he walked upon G. B. Cox and Donald Hayes near their river view hunting lodge about 10 miles west of Newton.

The two men, who earlier yesterday had been with a 100 man posse searching for Shearer, recognized the fugitive and "threw a deer rifle on him before he could turn around," Harris said. The captors said Shearer had a 22-caliber pistol he had taken last Saturday from Police Chief J. H. Taylor in his belt but made no attempt to reach for it.

Big Boston type lettuce ranged from \$2.50-\$3.25 per crate of 24 heads, and Romaine was \$2.50-\$3.25, with some small and fair quality at \$1.50-\$2.00. Watercress sold for 15-18 cents per bunch. New Rate Hike Seen Coming By 'Truckers'

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The Public Utilities Commission ruled out a handful of "discriminatory" official rate-making distances between Florida cities Tuesdays, substituting new mileage that may result in rate hikes by truckers.

Immediate effect of the mileage revision would be to cut shipping costs in many instances, particularly on East-West traffic across the state. But the long range effect may be rate increases. Trucking industry rating bureaus are already looking over the ruling to determine its effect. Commission Chief Counsel Lewis Pattaway said a great many of the truck lines were now operating in the red and lower rates, based on shorter mileage, would cut into revenue.

The commission gave the Florida Intrastate Rate Bureau 45 days in which to submit revised rates based on the new mileage tables.

The order put into the commission's rate-making record books new mileage between Florida cities, which is used by truckers for setting shipping costs to the public. The new distances in nearly all cases are shorter than the mileage used in the past 30 years.

In most instances in the past, the mileage was based on railroad miles of many years ago between two given cities. In most cases, highway miles are shorter. That isn't true, Pattaway said, in North-South traffic, where most railroads parallel highways.

Tornado 'Rips' 'Bama

BESSEMER, Ala. (UPI)—A tornado ripped sections of this Birmingham suburb Tuesday, causing damages estimated in the millions of dollars to at least 100 homes and businesses.

Repair crews worked through the night with bulldozers and dump trucks in downtown sections clearing

out brick walls and rooftops buried into the streets. National Guardsmen patrolled the street to keep out looters and sightseers.

At least 12 persons were hospitalized with injuries from the winds. Mayor Jess Lanier, who said the "amalgams would run 'in the millions," said "it is fantastic that nobody was killed."

Another tornado, "roaring like a freight train," struck the northwest Georgia town of Cave Spring Tuesday night, injuring two persons and damaging several houses. The twister uprooted several trees and flung one across a power line plunging about half the town in darkness for several hours. Witnesses said the Cave Spring tornado struck about 7 p. m. EST and lasted about two minutes.

High winds, described as a tornado, also struck the Rock Run community near Piedmont, Ala. Tuesday

night, injuring three persons in the wreckage of their home. Winds also wreaked damage at Gadsden and Homewood in suburban Birmingham.

Tennessee was lashed by a storm center Tuesday and heavy rains swelled rivers to the flooding stage. Numerous streets and roads in Knoxville were impassable because of high water from an overflowing creek.

The tornado here caught flagpole sitter Marshall Collins atop a 45-foot pole near the area most damaged. Collins, in a promotion stunt for a local radio station (WY AM), said "I thought I had had it."

Colinus of San Pablo, Calif., said he was going to come down, but the storm was on him before he could leave his perch. He rode out the storm on the pole.

'Mac' Defeats Budget Attack

LONDON (UPI)—Prime Minister Harold Macmillan moved ahead today with his plan to coordinate nuclear defense with the United States after beating down an opposition attack on his record peacetime defense budget.

Macmillan's Conservative party government Tuesday night defeated a Labor party motion of no-confidence in the House of Commons by a vote of 333-237. A separate Conservative motion on the government's policies was carried by 323-237.

The victories were expected, since Macmillan has a 101-member majority in Commons. The reduced margin on the second vote resulted from the early departure of Conservative deputies from the chamber.

Paved improvement of all of State Road 415 in Seminole County, from the Osteen Bridge to French Avenue, will be requested of the State Road Department by the County Commission this afternoon at DeLand.

Inclusion of that portion of the state road within the city limits of Sanford, known as Celery Ave, was informally approved by the Commission Wednesday afternoon.

Chairman J. C. Hutchison reported today the Commission had received a formal request from the City of Sanford Wednesday to include Celery Avenue from the city limits to French Avenue. A telephone poll of the Commission members was made and all agreed.

The Commission previously had agreed to request of the SRD a paved improvement to a 22-foot width of SR 415 from the city limits to the Osteen Bridge. The State will be requested to accomplish this improvement of the primary highway with state funds but, if necessary, to use county secondary road funds to complete the project as quickly as possible in order to eliminate present unsafe driving conditions.

The Commission was scheduled to meet at 3:30 this afternoon to formally approve the resolution which will be presented to the SRD at 4:30 this afternoon at DeLand.

General Hutchison pointed out the SR 415 project will be presented in two parts: (1) Pave SR 415 from the city limits to the Osteen Bridge, using secondary funds, if necessary; (2) pave Celery Avenue from French Avenue to the city limits.

The chairman explained the Commission will not request the State to use county secondary funds for the paving of SR 415 (Celery Avenue) within the city limits. City Manager W. E. Knowles, asked if city funds are available, said this is not necessary since Celery Avenue is a state primary road.

Otherwise, General Hutchison said, the resolution to be presented to SRD this afternoon asks for road improvements in the county as have been published previously in The Herald.

One of the primary requests is for the four-lane widening of 23rd Street between French and Melonville Avenues.

Area 'Sectionalism' Blasted By Frederick

The issue of "sectionalism" injected into the campaign for Seminole County's House seat in the March 26 special election was blasted today by former Rep. Gordon Frederick, Democratic nominee for the Legislature.

"I am sure," he charged, "that they (the people) have seen many counties in which the ugly issue of sectionalism has resulted in a lack of progress for the entire county."

Surprise was expressed by both Frederick and his Republican opponent, Jan Fortune, when queried relative to an active Democrat's announcement of a south county campaign for representation in the Legislature.

Mrs. Hope Bennett, long time Democrat and a former member of the Casselberry board of aldermen, told The Herald today that "Democrats and Republicans alike, feeling the need for representation from the south end of the county, are pooling their forces to place Jan Fortune, GOP candidate, in office on March 26."

Mrs. Bennett continued: "Strong campaigns . . . in some cases, door-to-door . . . are being made in all South Seminole areas from Longwood to Forest City in Fortune's behalf."

"Regardless of party affiliation," she said, "we need a good man, and one with integrity, in office from this end of the county and we can put one in IF we can get the voters out on March 26."

Fortune, when asked about Mrs. Bennett's announcement, replied: "It's all news to me," adding, "but we are looking for all the support we can get."

Frederick stated: "I am somewhat surprised to learn that my opponent and his supporters are attempting to raise the issue of sectionalism in Seminole County. I understand that they are offering as one of my opponent's great qualifications the fact that he resides in the South end of Seminole County."

Frederick continued: "Frankly, I have enough confidence in all of the people of Seminole County to believe that they do not vote on the basis of sectionalism but that they vote on the basis of the candidate's qualifications. I am sure that they have seen many counties in which the ugly issue of sectionalism has resulted in a lack of progress for the entire county."

"I have never represented an isolated area of Seminole County but have at all times attempted to represent all of the people of the county regardless of where they might reside. I know that my confidence in the people of Seminole County is justified and I sincerely hope that this county will never be split by sectionalism. I hope the people of the South end of the county as well as the people in all other areas of the county will give me their support on the basis of my qualifications."

Altamonte OK's Water Bond Sale

The Altamonte Springs Town Council Wednesday night authorized the public sale of bonds in the amount of \$350,000 for the purpose of financing the new Municipal Water System. At the same time the advertising of bids for construction of the plant's water supply and distribution system was approved.

Scalded bids on both the bond sale and the construction will be due April 17. Each bond bid must be accompanied by a cashier's check for two per cent of face value. Specifications for construction bids, available at Glace Engineering in St. Petersburg or at the Altamonte Town Hall, will be priced at \$30 for each set.

Mayor Lawrence Swofford, in an unofficial report from the County Commission advised that appraiser's figures for rights of way on SR 427 from East St. to SR 436 through the town show that costs for 40 feet on the east side would come considerably lower than properties on the west side.

A break down of figures set the price a \$50,000 if 20 feet rights of way were taken from each side of the road; \$30,000 if taken totally from the west side and \$28,000 if taken on the east.

Swofford pointed out that although the county's decision did not agree with the town's recommendations, the town will derive great benefit from the additional 20 feet fronting the Town Hall.

In other business the council agreed to get an engineer's recommendations in solving drainage problems from the Hillcrest area onto Mallard Ave. properties.

Agreed to look into the possibility of building headers for a portion of Herald's Trail that is "washing away into a stream."

Gave Councilman Frank Gerhardt the authority to go ahead with plans for building a refreshment stand at the ball park after looking over blue prints for the structure.

Shelved for the present time purchase of a desk and chair for the Town Hall.

Segregation Law Junked By City

ALBANY, Ga. (UPI)—The City Commission of this south-west Georgia city has junked all segregation ordinances and decided to leave the race problems to individual citizens, it was announced today.

A spokesman said the commission took the action by a 6-1 vote Wednesday night, striking down all of segregation ordinances in a move aimed at bolstering its legal position. Racial disputes have plagued the industrial city of 55,000 for more than a year.

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Plea Made To Retain Wolf

An Altamonte Springs woman, who asked that her name not be used for publication, Wednesday night made a strong, and at times, tearful, plea on behalf of former Councilman John Wolf whose services as a part time policeman are not being used by the town at this time.

Wolf, permanently injured three years ago while fighting a fire at the Rosenwald Negro School, received monthly payment for 21 months from the town following the accident and later was hired by the town as a part time officer.

Recommending the entire police department two weeks ago upon recommendations of Police Chief Grady Hall for a 90 day trial period eliminated the services of Wolf to incorporate the use of six volunteer auxiliary policemen.

In answer to the woman, who asked that the town put Wolf back to work, Mayor Lawrence Swofford said, in part:

"Many taxpayers in the town are in sympathy with John Wolf. I'd like to remind you that this whole thing is only on a 90-day trial basis."

"No issue was intended and there was none until after the newspapers carried stories which were not true. I say again, John Wolf was not fired. . . . I say he quit after reading those newspaper stories."

"Although the townspeople feel morally responsible for Wolf, the town does not legally owe him a thing. He was in violation of the law at the time of the fire for he knew that the fire truck was not to go out of the town limits."

"You people elect officials to run your town and it cannot be run on sympathy. . . . we're getting too big."
