CAMPBELL, Pa. (AP)—The Pennsylvania, a battleship, was scuttled near Kowajalein Feb. 10, the Navy announced today.

Cost Of Decontamination Of Radioactivity Is Too Large

PEARL HARBOR, Mar. 4 (AP)—The battleship Pennsylvania, survivor of the Pearl Harbor debacle and two atomic blasts, was scuttled near Kowajalein Feb. 10, the Navy announced today. "Damage received at Okinawa, was mainly responsible for the Pennsylvania's unseaworthiness and not damage inflicted during the atomic bomb tests" at Bikini in July, 1946, the Navy said.

Two other warships, termed victims of "progressive deterioration," also were scuttled last month. They were the destroyer Tippecanoe, sunk Feb. 3, and the attack transport Banner, sunk Feb. 16. The Navy said the Pennsylvania could not have remained afloat much longer in Kowajalein lagoon. She was towed there after the Bikini atom tests. She was considered a possible menace to shipping if she sank in the lagoon, as did the Prinz Eugen. Both were guinea pigs of the Bikini tests.

Off Okinawa, 59 hours before the war ended, an aerial torpedo ripped the Pennsylvania's stern and killed 20 men. She was commissioned Mar. 16, 1916. She had a displacement of 33,000 tons and was 60 feet in length with a beam of 106 feet, three inches. She carried 12 fourteen-inch guns, 16 five-inchers and many smaller weapons. This is how the Pennsylvania ended her days: Sixteen sailors manned her on the last run. In her forty days, the Pennsylvania carried 130 officers and 2,300 enlisted men.) She rode ignominiously at the end of a tow hawser, her once powerful engines silent. At the designated spot, the crew opened the seacocks, removed the condenser plates, scrambled to the deck and boarded a tug. Her stern dropped beneath the waves, but for two and a half hours the Pennsylvania resisted, she floated. Navy planes circled overhead. Then she slipped to her grave. The Navy said the three ships sunk were radioactive to a degree they could not be used for scrap without extensive decontamination. They were so unseaworthy that they could not be towed to the United States mainland without danger of sinking.

English Austerity Curtails Falconry Art WOLFEBORO, N. H., Mar. 4 (AP)—England's austerity program has seriously curtailed the ancient sport of falconry, according to one of the world's most enthusiastic devotees of hunting with a bird. Captain C. W. R. Knight of Rosshire, Scotland, visiting State Fish and Game Director Ralph G. Carpenter today with his 11-pound Scotch golden eagle, "Mr. Ramshaw," explained that English folk these days resent losing a chicken or two. "They used to gladly accept payment for the chicken, but now are more likely to eat the falcon," he said, so Mr. Ramshaw has had little practice in recent years and the 20-year-old bird with a six-foot wingspread is not of condition. "Falconry is not being done here but the hunter as many people think," Captain Knight said. "When the bird catches something, you have to go and take it away from him before he eats it."

Rev. E. K. Beckett Professor Reveals Interesting Facts On Infants Health

CHICAGO, Mar. 4 (AP)—The newborn baby is tiny but tough. In many ways he makes a full-blown adult stack up like a No. 1 baby. Dr. Clement Andrew Smith, assistant professor of pediatrics at Harvard Medical School, listed these among baby's strong points: Babies have been known to go five, ten and even as long as 14 minutes without breathing immediately after birth. The body temperatures of babies exposed to chilling or covered by too many blankets have ranged from less than 90 to 102 degrees.

These changes in internal temperature will not do the baby any particular good, but on the other hand neither do they signify as much harm as they might in an adult," he said in a paper prepared for a clinical conference of the Chicago Medical Society. Babies apparently are born with more water in their bodies at birth than after. For this reason it is sometimes considered wise not to feed them for two up to five days after birth. This is especially true of premature infants. Baby also has disadvantages, the first being his small size. A baby has proportionately a much larger surface area than an adult. That causes a heavy loss of body heat to make up for, this an infant must breathe faster and his heart beats faster. Dr. Smith suggested that doctors regard babies as "extraordinary physiological organisms," not merely miniature children.

Dewey Says Feud In Truman's Party Creates Inflation

ALBANY, N. Y. (AP)—Governor Thomas E. Dewey of New York said today the "quarrelling" Truman Administration threatens the nation with "inflationary inflation" by "profuse waste" of public funds.

He added that the government's "conduct of both our domestic and foreign affairs has been so weak and incompetent that it has failed in both fields." Dewey fired the blast in a telegram to a national Wisconsin friends for supporting his candidacy for the Republican presidential nomination. "We are together in a good cause," the Governor told the 22 Republican who filed petitions yesterday for the Wisconsin presidential primary April 6 as a full slate of Dewey pledged delegates to the GOP national convention.

Our national government is torn by bitterness and quarrel," he said. "Its prodigal waste of the money it has wrung from our people by taxes threatens to bring us to ruinous inflation." Dewey contended that "our task as Republicans is to restore integrity, competence and purposes to the national government." "Only in this way," he said, "can we build a stable industry and agriculture, maintain high standards for labor, develop a consistent and strong foreign policy and win a lasting peace." Dewey said he was "sure" that "most Republicans" there would be a "heartfelt unity and devotion to the great tasks to which our party will be called in November. These high purposes will require the best efforts of all Americans, working together for the good of all."

FCC Receives Suggestions To Set Up Complaint Bureau For Public WASHINGTON, Mar. 4 (AP)—The Federal Communications Commission got a suggestion today that it set up a "complaint bureau" to hear people who think they are injured by one-sided radio broadcasts. Saul Carson, radio writer for the New Republic and other publications, suggested it, FCC Chairman Wayne Coy commented, "I am interested in that proposal." Carson was testifying at the FCC's hearings on whether it should set up a "complaint bureau" to hear people who think they are injured by one-sided radio broadcasts. It could lead to the "destruction of every regulatory power vested in the FCC." Instead, he said, FCC should strengthen its efforts to see that diverse opinions are broadcast. Coy, when saying the idea of a complaint bureau interested him, told Carson: "The complaints from listeners are numerous. I assure you there is delay in handling such complaints, perhaps there is some other agency with the necessary power and closer to the source of the trouble which might perform the job." Commission staff members said that FCC would have difficulty in trying such a plan, because it were a licensing agency—we cannot regulate." Carson told the commission that radio's campaign for the right to editorialize is right now limited to commentators—was inspired by Justin Miller, president of the National Association of Broadcasters. Miller is using the issue, Carson said, in an effort to cause "the complete breakdown of every power possessed now by the FCC." A qualified right to editorialize was endorsed by Ernest Ernst, New York lawyer and author of "The First Amendment," a book critical of what he describes as a growing concentration of economic power in the newspaper and radio fields. Ernst said editorials should be permitted by locally owned and independently owned stations, provided the broadcasters steered clear of politics and religion. Where the station is the only outlet in a town, he said, no editorializing should be permitted. He said the FCC should not allow a newspaper owner who also owns a radio station to editorialize on the air, nor a network, nor an absentee-owned station.

It would be approximately five to six miles offshore. The range would replace the one now being used for gunnery practice off Anclote Key (Tarpon Springs) and Cedar Key. The Sarasota Chamber of Commerce, Yacht Club, Sailing Squadron, Guides Association and Merchants Association opposed the range. They argue it would hurt commercial and sports fishing in the area and would endanger lives.

Russia Using Jap PW's To Broadcast Soviet Propaganda

WASHINGTON, Mar. 4. (AP)—Russia is using Japanese prisoners of war in broadcast Soviet propaganda to their homeland.

A Moscow radio program recorded here by United States government monitors included the "radio voice" of one Toshio Kimura.

Kimura said that in Russia he saw no "jobless, idle" people, "let alone any food-playing, food-for-nothing, the sort of people we used to see in pre-war Japan."

Another voice, identified by Moscow as that of Mitsui Matsunaga, told the Japanese prisoners are well-treated "under the kind protection of the Soviet authorities."

"We see movies at least once in ten days," he added.

Nearly 20 months after V. I. day, Russia still holds 250,000 Japanese prisoners, American officials estimate.

Moscow started using prisoners' voices after broadcasting several thousand letters over the past five months addressed to their families in Japan. The same device was used by Germany in broadcasts beamed to the Allied nations during World War II.

Moscow combined in the program recorded here that the "humanitarian policy" is being hampered by a "reactionary elements, who are stooges of General MacArthur."

It asserted the broadcast letters are copied by a "Tokyo Hepatrites Assistance Association," and then sold to prisoners' families. The association, Moscow said, had the approval of headquarters of General Douglas MacArthur, supreme commander in Japan.

Chocolate Brownies

2/3 cup sifted flour,
1/2 teaspoon double-acting baking powder,
1/4 teaspoon salt,
1-3 cup butter or fortified margarine,
2 squares (2 ounces) unsweetened chocolate,
1 cup sugar,
2 eggs, well beaten,
1/2 cup walnuts, coarsely cut,
1 teaspoon vanilla.

Mix flour, baking powder and salt together. Melt butter or margarine and chocolate over hot water. Add sugar gradually to well-beaten eggs, beating thoroughly. Add melted chocolate mixture and stir to blend. Add dry ingredients and mix well, then add nuts and vanilla and mix.
