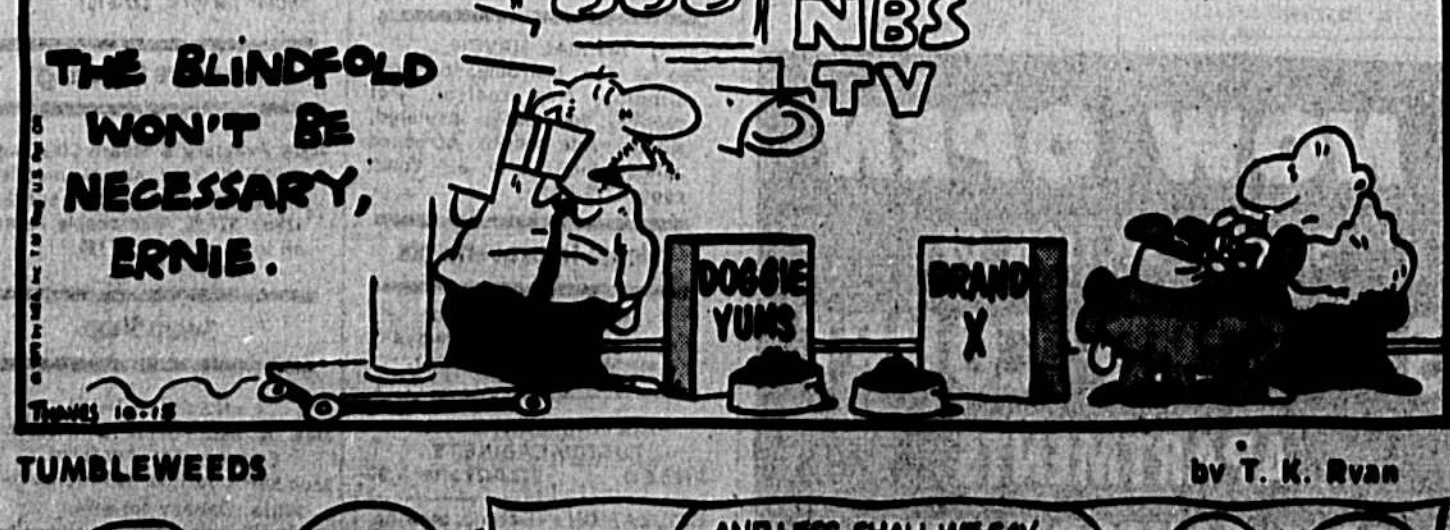

Quake Damage In Millions California Aftershocks Continue

EL CENTRO, Calif. (UPI) - Aftershocks today repeatedly jolted and rolled through the Imperial Valley, following an earthquake that caused millions of dollars in damage Monday but no deaths and surprisingly few major injuries.

The vibrations of Monday's quake, at 6.4 on the Richter scale the strongest to hit the U.S. mainland in more than eight years, were felt in tall buildings throughout the southeast corner of the nation, from Phoenix to the Pacific.

Destruction struck the southern Imperial Valley, a desert farming region just north of the Mexican border. Walls buckled, ceilings fell in and gas and water lines ruptured in the cities of Calexico, Brawley and El Centro.

Fire broke out, a highway bridge collapsed, cracks opened in roads, mobile homes toppled off their foundations and plate glass windows sprayed spears of shattered glass.

An irrigation canal was damaged, raising a fear of flooding.

A 500,000-gallon gasoline tank rose and dropped with such force the bottom seam split. Gasoline was pouring out at a rate of 25 to 50 gallons a minute, as firemen labored to contain the growing pond of flammable liquid.

The Red Cross said 40 to 100 persons were injured, including about 30 across the border in Mexico, but apparently only three were hospitalized, including a woman who suffered a heart attack.

Thousands of residents of the area slept outdoors in the warm desert air as hundreds of aftershocks, large and small, continued through the night and into the morning hours.

"We have only been counting those registering above 4.0 today," said a spokeswoman at the Caltech seismological laboratory in Pasadena.

"We've had four since midnight, and dozens of smaller ones - just tons of them."

"These aftershocks are keeping us on our toes," said Carl Schwettmann, assistant Imperial County county fire chief. "We're just hanging loose until this jelly bowl settles down."

Police and sheriff's deputies patrolled central areas of El Centro and Calexico during the night to prevent looting. The windows were broken out of about 75 percent of the stores in the area.

The All-American Canal, which carries irrigation water, was damaged "extensively" about 15 miles east of El Centro, sheriff's deputies reported.

In Boston, California Gov. Edmund G. Brown suspended his presidential campaign swing through New England to fly to the quake area today.

"There is some worry about the American canal," said an official in Brown's party. "We won't really know how serious it is until after an inspection Tuesday, but we may have to do something about the water flow to prevent flooding."

Three 500,000-gallon tanks at a Southern Pacific oil pipeline facility outside El Centro sprang leaks. Some 35 firemen fought the worst leak, pumping water into a gasoline tank, skimming off the gas as it floated to the top, and building dikes to hold in the flow.

"The first quake lifted the tank right off the ground and that split the bottom seam," Schwettmann said.

Firemen said chances were "very slim" the gas would be ignited, but estimated it would take until early Wednesday to empty the tank.

In Mexico, about 30 persons were injured in the border city of Mexicali, most of them cut by flying glass.

Mexican authorities said about 100 homes, mostly adobe huts, were heavily damaged, along with the airport terminal, and two banks suffered ceiling cave-ins.

Longwood Auditing Subject For Attorney General?

Can an accountant conduct a municipality's annual audit when he during the course of a year provides financial advice to officials of that city, both privately and publicly?

This question is to be posed to Florida Attorney General Jim Smith by the city of Longwood, the city commission decided Monday night.

The question involves the certified public accounting firm of Fitzpatrick and Hartcock, which has been auditing Longwood's accounts for more than 18 years.

While an answer is being sought from Smith's office, the city commission agreed to have Hartcock conduct the city audit for the 1978-1979 fiscal year.

"We have a deadline to get the audit into Tallahassee," Commissioner J.R. Grant said today. "We can't hold up the audit waiting for an opinion."

The question about Hartcock handling the city audit in view of the assistance he renders to the city bookkeeper and city manager in financial affairs of the city has come up several times in the past. It has also come up in the past that Fitzpatrick has done accounting work for Grant privately for more years than he has worked for the city.

In addition, Hartcock is accounted for the law firm of Stenstrom, Davis, McInosh and Julian, the city's attorney.

The real question appears to be whether Hartcock can audit accounts on which he may have advised the city, Grant said.

City Bookkeeper F.D. Downey said Hartcock provides her with advice when she seeks it on various accounting procedures.

The city has budgeted \$1,500 for the annual audit and \$400 for other services, mostly the advice, during the year, Mrs. Downey said.

Grant said the question that surfaced concerned the city's federal revenue sharing fund and whether the fact that Hartcock works privately for Grant and the law firm might present a conflict.

"I don't see any conflict. And I don't see anything wrong," Grant said. "The man has done a good job for the city and ought to be complimented."

"Two-thirds of the people in public office in the county are well as a lot of doctors and other professional and business people have Hartcock as their accountant," Grant said, adding Hartcock or Fitzpatrick are also auditors for the cities of Lake Mary and Sanford.

Grant said the questioning may be the beginning of a movement to find a new accountant.

Special Counsel Issues Report Carter Cleared In Lance Loan Probe

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Special counsel Paul Curran said today he has found no evidence of criminal wrongdoing in his investigation into loans from Bert Lance's National Bank of Georgia to the Carter family presidential campaign.

Curran delivered a bulky report to Attorney General Benjamin Civiletti and said there is "no room for doubt" in his conclusion that no money was diverted from the Carter peace warhorse to Jimmy Carter's 1976 presidential campaign.

"Every nickel and every penny have been traced into one of the warhorses," Curran said in a statement. "And no funds were unduly diverted in other directions." He said there also was no evidence to support filing of criminal charges with respect to alleged irregularities in loans from the National Bank of Georgia to the Carter warhorse in Plains, Ga.

Curran said he personally interviewed President Carter under oath during his investigation. There had been allegations that some of the \$7 million in loan money was diverted illegally to the Carter campaign at a time when it was starved for cash. The probe also focused on evidence Lance's bank allowed the Carter peace warhorse a \$600,000 check overdraft.

Former Attorney General Griffin Bell appointed Curran to conduct an investigation of the charges last March in the face of demands from congressmen that the sensitive probe be handled independently of the administration.

Curran, a Republican and former U.S. attorney from New York, told a news conference today he was delivering two reports - one to Civiletti and the second to Congress.

He said "both legal and ethical considerations prohibit me from publicly disclosing the full contents" of his report to the attorney general, and that the report to Congress was incomplete because of grand jury secrecy rules.

Lance, one of the president's closest friends and advisers, resigned as bank director in 1977 during an inquiry into his financial dealings. He later was indicted on bank fraud charges.

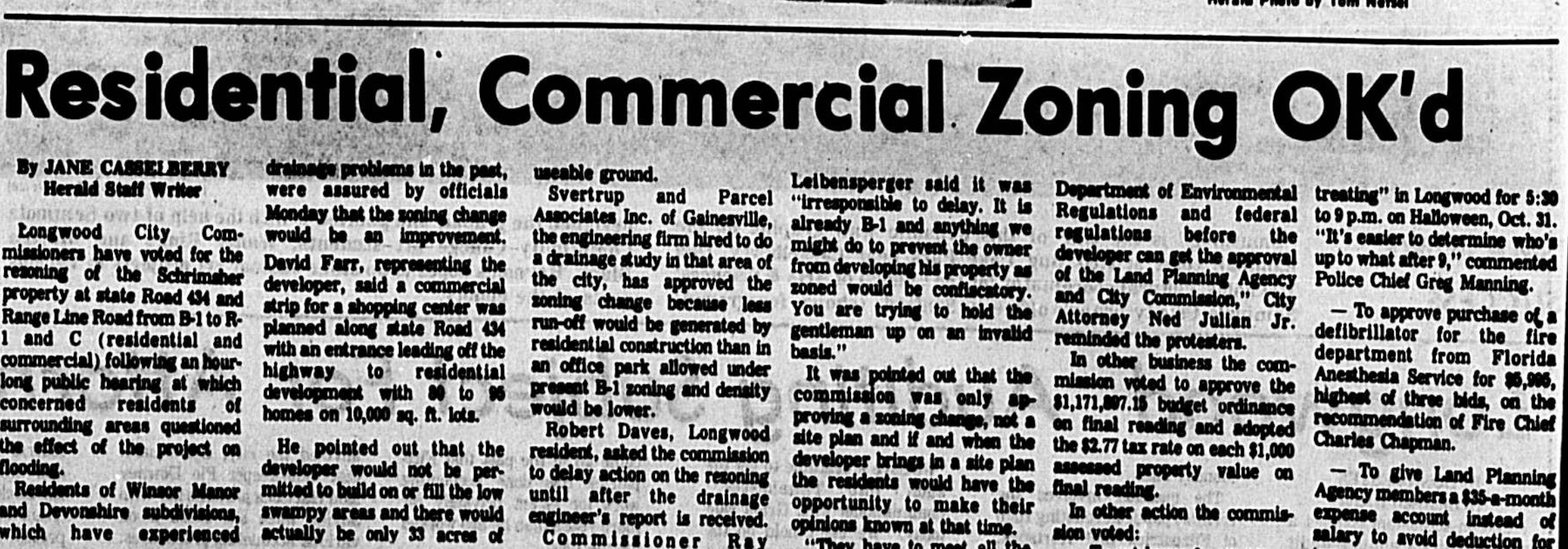

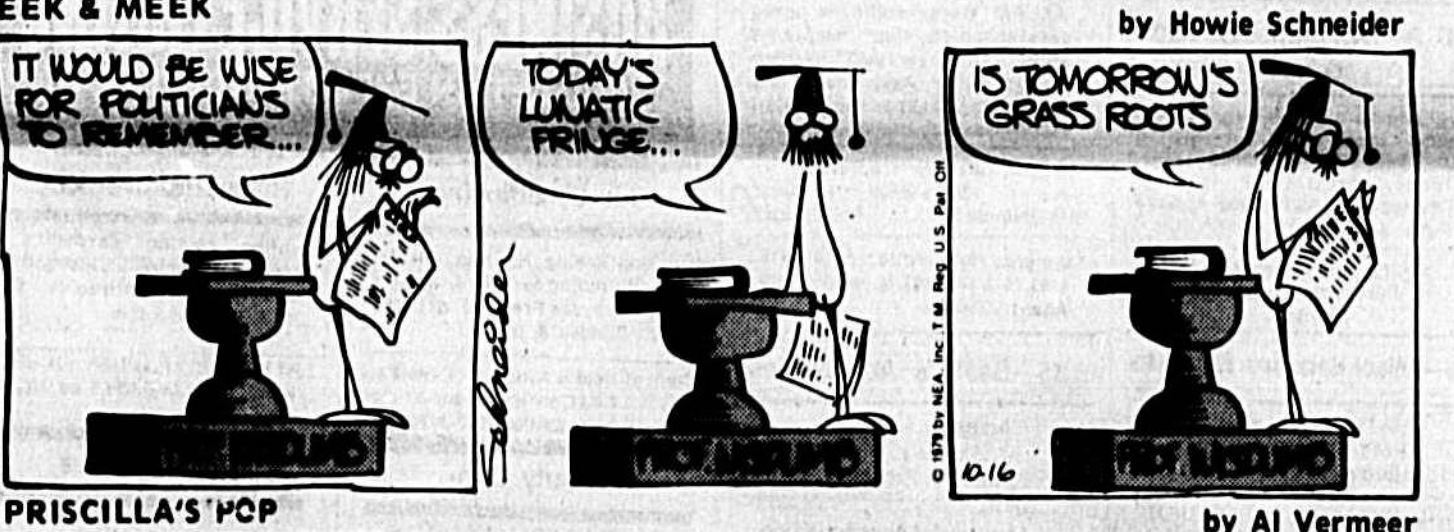

Heart Attacks Could Have Several Effects

DEAR DR. LAMB — My wife, age 70, suffered an acute heart attack a year ago. Several months before she had begun to lose her immediate memory. She forgets almost immediately what she has done, started to do or was told. She remembers well things that happened years ago. When she talks with others, she appears to be completely normal but usually she doesn't remember the incident at all.

She was a cigarette smoker but she stopped after her heart attack. While she was hospitalized with the heart attack she became very confused and disoriented, not recognizing her surroundings or the fact that she was ill.

Recently I was told by a nurse that an artery leading to her brain could be opened surgically and an increased blood flow might correct or improve her memory problem. Is this possible? If so, where would I find the proper specialist to inquire further?

DEAR READER — Your wife's problem may be related to increased fatty-cholesterol deposits in the arteries. The disease that causes heart attacks is really in the arteries and not the heart muscle itself. That same disease of the arteries can affect arteries throughout the body, including those to the brain. For that reason the same disease can cause either a heart attack or a stroke.

About 20 percent of the people who have problems with memory, learning problems and other manifestations of poor function of the brain, which are sometimes called senility, really have an underlying disease. And in about one out of four of this group the underlying disease is fatty-cholesterol deposits in the arteries. It is true that in some cases the circulation to the brain can be improved by routing the blood around obstructed arteries. Sometimes

these are obstructed arteries in the neck. More recent studies have attempted to reroute arterial blood through operations involving the head itself.

Not everyone with such arterial changes can benefit from surgery. Simply put, if there's a lot of disease in all the arteries, it's difficult to find any way to improve the blood flow through any mechanism that's available.

Nevertheless, there are people who can benefit. I think all older people who have such symptoms deserve a good medical examination. A good place to start is with the neurologist. He or she will be able to look not only for problems of circulation to the brain that might be cured but for other medical disorders that affect the brain and might benefit from medical treatment.

As the issue of The Health Letter I'm sending you explains, there are a lot of things you can do to minimize the changes with aging in some people and there are probably some things that can be done to prevent such changes.

Many of these changes could be prevented with diet, exercise, efforts to keep the blood pressure low, keeping the cholesterol level low and avoiding cigarette smoking.

Here is another problem hand from our British friends. The bidding is poor but fancy. North's jump to three hearts is one of those splinter bids designed to show spade support and not more than one heart.

South ruffs the opening heart lead in dummy, notes that seven spades or seven diamonds were both very

good contracts and then stops to figure out how to play safe for six spades.

After the heart ruff, the safety play for six is for declarer to play a spade to his ace, lead a small spade to dummy and finesse the 10 spot. This play would cost him the contract if East produced the jack of spades and was able to give his partner a diamond ruff, but that would only happen if diamonds were breaking 4-0.

After the play of the spade 10, South makes seven since West holds the jack. If South had played queen, the hand would have collapsed and he would be down at least two.
