Quake Damage In Millions California Aftershocks Continue

EL CENTRO, Calif. (UPI) - Aftershocks today repeatedly jolted and rolled through the Imperial Valley, following an ear- the bottom seam split. Gasoline was pouring out at a rate of 25 to thouske that caused millions of dollars in damage Monday but no deaths and suprisingly few major injuries. The vibrations of Monday's quake, at 6.4 on the Richter scale the strongest to hit the U.S. mainland in more than eight years,

were felt in tall buildings throughout the southwest corner of the nation, from Phoenix to the Pacific. Destruction struck the southern Imperial Valley, a desert

farming region just north of the Mexican border. Walls buckled, ceilings fell in and gas and water lines ruptures in the cities of Calexico, Brawley and El Centro.

Fires broke out, a highway bridge collapsed, cracks opened in roads, mobile homes toppled off their foundations and plate glass windows sprayed spears of shattered glass. An irrigation canal was damaged, raising a fear of flooding

Libya And Iran Hike Price Of Crude Oil

Libya and Iran have raised the cost of their crude oil past the official OPEC price ceiling of \$23.50 a barrel and analysts predict other members of the oil cartel will make similar price increases.

Libya, America's No. 3 oil supplier, raised prices on all grades of crude by \$2.77 - or 11.7 percent - to between \$25.57 and \$26.27 a barrel, the Petroleum Intelligence Weekly in New York reported Monday.

The Libyan action violated OPEC's pricing policy for the second half of 1979 that set a minimum of \$18 a barrel for Saudi Arabia's benchmark crude and allowed members to charge a maximum of \$25.50 a barrel for the cartel's best quality crude.

San Salvador Free?

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador - Two young army colonels who led the ouster of President Humberto Carlos Romero in a bloodless coup said today a joint civilianmilitary "revoluntionary junta" will lead the country until free elections can be held.

The two youngest colonels in the army were in control following the overthrow of Romero by a six-man junta Monday. Romero, together with his family and several key military aides, fled aboard a Guatemalan plane to Guatemala, apparently en route to the United States. possibly to Miami.

Col. Jaime Abdul Gutierrez and Col. Arnoldo Majano said in a proclamation over the radio from their military headquarters at San Carlos they would begin an "emergency program" to help the country recover from its annual 100 percent inflation.

Americans Win Nobel

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (UPI) - American Theodore W. Schultz and West Indian Sir Arthur Lewis won the Nobel economics prize today for their research into the problems of developing countries.

Schultz, 77, the Charles L. Hutchinson Distinguished Service professor at the University of Chicago from 1952 to 1972, is now professor emeritus there. Sir Arthur, 64, is James Madison professor of political

economy at the Woodrow Wilson School of Princeton University. Born in St. Lucia in the West Indies, he ha lived in the United States since 1968.

Chad Undergoes Autopsy

TIJUANA, Mexico (UPI) - Pieces of Chad Green's organs have been removed by a team of doctors to find out if cancer or Lastril-induced cyanide poisoning killed the 3-year-old boy, central figure in a dispute over the controversial cancer treatment.

It will be two to three weeks before the results of an autonsy by the five-man team of Mexican and U.S.

pathologists are known. The Greens defied a Massachusetts court order nine months ago and spirited their tow-headed son to Mexico to obtain the controversial doses of Lactrile to treat his leukemia. He died last Friday.

Prime Minister Quits

ISTANBUL, Turkey (UPI) - Prime Minister Bulent Ecevit handed in his letter of resignation to Turkish president Fahri Koruturk today, bringing an end to his 21month-old government.

Ecevit said his left-of-center coalition, now a minority coalition after a battering in special parliamentary elections, will continue ruling Turkey until a new government is formed.

Dollar OK, Gold Drops

LONDON (UPI) - The dollar opened higher on European money markets today, spurred on by its con-tinued advance over the weakened Japanese yen, while the price of gold again fell below \$400 an ounce. Gold prices fell by \$3 overnight in Zurich to open at \$398.50 an ounce and it was down by the same amount in

London, opening at \$397.50. Its violent fluctuations of the past two weeks appeared to be over. On the foreign exchange markets, the dollar continued to benefit from the pressures on the Japanese yen, depressed by soaring Japanese imports and reports that Iran and Libya have raised their oil prices.

Black Leaders Divided Over Israel-PLO Question

By United Press Internations Prominent civil rights leaders who made recent overtures to the Palestine Liberation Organization are being attacked by two of their colleagues for increasing friction between blacks and Jews.

In Israel Monday, Bayard Rustin, a former associate of the Rev. Martin Luther King, singled out the Rev. Jesse Jackson of Chicago, saying his recent meeting with PLO chief Yassar Arafat was a "catastrophe."

In Kansas City, Mo., National Urban League President Vernon Jordan indirectly denounced Jackson and the Rev. Joseph Lowery, president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, for their meetings with the PLO. Meanwhile, in East Lansing, Mich., former U.N. bloodbath at this crucial time." Carter, after speaking Monday night at a \$1 million, 11,000-person Democratic Party fund-raiser, wound up a two-day foray into the Midwest today with a town hall meeting in suburban Dolton.

"As a Democrat and as president, I'm not afraid." Carter said. "In fact, I look forward to tough political fights and, with your help, we will not lose those fights ahead."

NASA Auditors Harassed?

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Audits exposing waste and mismanagement in the space program have been suppressed and the auditors have been harassed by an official of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, a former auditor has told Congress.

In a Sept. 7 letter to Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., chairman of the Appropriations subcommittee that funds NASA, Raymond Knight charged that both he and / immediate supervisor have been subjected to severe harassment in recent years from NASA headquarters over their audit reports.

Knight, one of whose audits revealed substantial quantities of moon rocks and soil samples are missing, said he chose to take early retircment last June "because of the unfortunate conditions involved with performing audits and reporting the result."

Lights, Action — Landing

CAMP LEJEUNE, N.C. (UPI) - An amphibious landing by Marines at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, part of President Carter's plan to display more U.S. military presence in the Caribbean, has been delayed - partly to accommodate television.

Planners of the exercise have rescheduled the landing from dawn to 8:30 a.m. Wednesday to make it safer for the Marines who will land aboard boats and helicopters, and to insure good media coverage.

Some 2,000 Marines from Camp Lejeune and Cherry Point and New River air stations are participating in the training exercise. The marines will stay at the Guantanamo Naval Base for about a month.

Recruiting Probe Nears End

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (UPI) - A six-month investigation of alleged malpractice by Army recruiters should be concluded by the end of October, an Army spokesman said

A 54-member team has investigated 17 recruiting districts across the country since the probe began in Charlotte in May. So far, 165 recruiters and officers have been relieved of duty.

The Army expects to make public a summary of the recruiting problem by Nov. 15. The alleged malpractice includes coaching recruits to help them pass the entrance examination or falsifying their education, criminal, birth, medical or Social Security records.

Air Force Ousts Homosexual

POPE AIR FORCE BASE, N.C. (UPI) — Capt. Robert Coronado, convicted of conduct unbecoming an officer for his homosexual dalliance with an Army enlisted man, has been ordered dismissed from the Air Force.

A five-officer military jury Monday ruled Coronado should be dismissed, but decided against an active prison sentence. Dismissal is a standard penalty for courtsmartial involving officers and amounts to a dishonorable discharge.

The verdict will be automatically appealed to the U.S. Court of Military Appeals after the decision is reviewed by Maj. Gen. Thomas Sadler, 21st Air Force Commander a McGuire Air Force Base, N.J.

At The Root **Of Hypocrisy**

We can sympathize with John Connally's com-plaint that at this stage the 1980 presidential campaign isn't a fair fight. He says federal law is making it easier for non-candidates for president to raise money and get publicity than it is for people such as himself who admit they are running. Mr. Connally is right, of course. The political

news is sounding like something out of Alice in Wonderland. In the real world, there is a word for a man who

talks as though he wants to be president, who acts as though he wants to be president and commands a following of people determined to make him the president. The word is candidate.

But in the world of the Federal Elections Commission and the Federal Communications Commission, one can be running for president like a greyhound after a rabbit and still not be a candidate. This is what irks Mr. Connally and no doubt discomforts the seven other Republicans who have "announced" their candidacy for the 1980 GOP nomination.

Mr. Connally and the others have come under a different set of campaign financing laws from those which govern the activities of "unannounced" gandidates. The latter include Ronald Reagan and Howard Baker, who are known to be as interested in a lease on the White House as Mr. Connally. But they are not considered candidates in Alice's world, which was created by Congress to make elections more fair.

The FCC's rules for broadcasters, also laid down in the interests of fairness, require that equal time be offered to all candidates if publicity is aired about one of them. Those rules do not apply to pronouncements by Mr. Reagan or Mr. Baker. Nor, on the Democratic side, do they apply to Sen. Edward Kennedy or Gov. Jerry Brown, whose realworld intentions are easy to see but who remain invisible in Wonderland.

So it was that Mr. Brown had to stop in midsentence and back up the other day during a television interview. He had let it slip out that he is elevision interview. President Carter coyly says he will let us know in December whether he plans to run again, while his political minions work feverishly on a noncampaign for his support in Florida's Democratic caucuses. But what else can he do, when Mr. Kennedy's followers have poured money and manpower into Florida for a non-campaign on behalf of their own non-candidate?

Election laws that make a distinction between "announced" and "unannounced" candidates where none may really exist are at the root of all this hypocrisy. Many were passed in the wake of the Watergate scandals, which seemed to call for reform in the way presidential campaigns are financed. The reforms were supposed to elevate the standards of honesty and fairness in politics, but they are having just the opposite effect.

When improved car safety, which may require added weight, conflicts with better gas mileage, which means lighter autos, which goal should prevail? The answer, unfortunately, is far from ob vious. Tens of thousands of federal workers, many of them highly specialized technical experts, are involved in the drafting of regulations. No president could possibly review more than a tiny handful of these regulations each year imself, which means the White House staff would wind up screening the bulk of those that seemed controversial enough to warrant executive attention. (Here comes Ham Jordan et

With no offense intended to President Carter, who has a stronger scientific and technical background than most who wind up in the Oval Office, presidents (and their staffs) are generalists, ill-equipped to deal with some of the very technical calculations that figure in the development of many regulations.

That Was A Failure

The German Democratic Republic - or East Germany, as it still sticks in most Western minds - is observing its 30th anniversary as a state, and by most measures it must be rated a considerable success.

What originated as the Soviet occupation zone of a shrunken, devastated and divided post-World War II Germany has developed into one of the world's top dozen industrial economies. second in the Soviet bloc only to the USSR itself. It actually has the bloc's highest gross national product figured on a per capita basis-\$4,834 per year for each of its 17 million inhabitants. The comparable Soviet figure is \$4,080.

The Soviet Union and East Germany are each other's leading trade partners, with the former dependent on East German industry for some precision items that would be attainable otherwise only in the West.

East Germany also has acquired a certain stature outside the bloc. No longer shunned as Cold War pariah by the West, it has diplomatic relations with the major powers and is a member of the United Nations.

Most significantly for its own needs, it is not only recognized but virtually courted by the other Germany. In return for giving West Germans visitation access to their relatives in the East, it has been the beneficiary of favorable economic agreements that in some respects amount to virtual subsidies by Bonn.

East Germany, clearly a going concern and the pride of the Soviet satellite system, has reason to celebrate the achievements since the enactment of a constitution - an act that sealed the division of Germany in our time. (A year earlier, the merger of the Western occupation zones intitiated the political evolution of the West German Federal Republic.)

Yet all is not well in the GDR. For all the accomplishments of the past 30 years, it has failed to impress one important group - the people. There is, according to reports of most outside observers, an indifference among the mass of East Germans toward what is supposed to be their state. They do not identify with it or its
