



# STEWART'S WASHINGTON LETTER

By CHARLES P. STEWART  
WASHINGTON, Mar. 20.—Having dug up some more evidence and a little money, the redoubtable Col. James A. Owenbey of Colorado, who tried to keep the Senate from confirming President Coolidge's appointment of Harlan F. Stone to the federal supreme bench, is back in Washington again, still very much on the warpath.

In fact, more so. At any rate, he's more formidable, being better heeled financially.

He expects to increase the size of his war, too. Every additional dollar he gets his hands on will be just that much more ammunition for him. "I'll be a millionaire again before I die," he assured me. The colonel's only 72.

Colonel Owenbey was so sore when the Senate confirmed Stone, that he declared he was going to quit the United States and renounce his citizenship and spend the rest of his life elsewhere.

But he soon realized that that wasn't what he really wanted to do. He really wanted to stop here and go on fighting.

He was broken, however, and warfare calls for money. So the colonel pitched in and in a year he cleaned up \$15,000 as a mining expert, which isn't so bad for a man of his number of summers.

The colonel's hostility toward Stone is incidental to his sentiments concerning a litigation in which the present supreme justice's then firm of Satterlee, Canfield & Stone appeared as counsel against him for the estate of the late J. P. Morgan Sr.

Colonel Owenbey had had Colorado mining interest with Morgan. When the latter died, his estate's lawyers demanded an accounting, making large financial claims against the colonel.

They weren't having much luck in court in Colorado, so they switched to Delaware, where the company the colonel had stock in was incorporated.

There they dickered a peculiar, old and nearly forgotten law, a long-neglected survival from Colonial days, and so used it as to deny Owenbey the right of defense and to take from him property he says he had refused \$1,500,000 for.

The colonel considered this so unfair, on Satterlee, Canfield & Stone's part, that he insisted no member of that firm ought to sit on the federal supreme bench.

The Delaware legislature seems to have had its doubts about the law, too, for its attention called to the matter by the Owenbey case, it repealed it.

This was too late to do Owenbey any good.

Fate, on otherwise, from a layman's standpoint, Satterlee, Canfield & Stone hadn't done anything out of the way, from a lawyer's, and most of the senators are lawyers.

They couldn't see why a law firm isn't entitled to do its best by all legal means, for its clients.

So Stone got his supreme court job.



Saturday Half-Holiday

As the summer approaches business men and workers of all kinds turn their thoughts occasionally to that respite they are accustomed to receive in the middle of the week, the Thursday half holiday. During the hot days of summer it proves a great relief to them and one to which they look forward to with great zeal.

No doubt custom long established will compel Sanford stores to observe the Thursday half-holiday this summer, but while there is yet time for argument, it might be wise to consider the feasibility of changing the half-holiday from Thursday to Saturday.

While Thursday comes at a nice time in the week to break a long stretch of work from Sunday to Sunday and affords a sort of half-way station where the weary worker can rest a moment before continuing to his final destination, it is indeed more of a convenience than a necessity.

The Miami Herald in speaking of this subject seems to be in favor of the Saturday half-holiday. It says: "The Saturday afternoon holiday has proven very satisfactory in those cities where it has been tried."

While the plea for a Saturday half-holiday may be wrong, it would at least pay merchants and other interested parties to make a thorough investigation into what so many other important cities have found to be practical and beneficial.

Again Muscle Shoals

After seven years of discussion, Congress has finally taken another step in the disposition of Muscle Shoals, that great potential asset of the American farmer which has lain practically dormant since the close of the World War.

The House has passed a resolution calling for the lease of Muscle Shoals, and the Senate has accepted the bill with reservations, and casual followers of the power plant's history are exulting over what they interpret as the lovely settlement of a long disputed question.

Several times in the past few years the final disposition of Muscle Shoals has seemed imminent, yet the adjournment of each Congress has left the issue still undecided for future sessions to grapple with.

And now it appears that history is to repeat itself, and a definite lease of Muscle Shoals will be effected no later than this Congress is concerned by lack of time, for the report on the lease authorization bill scheduled for April 1 has been postponed until April 26, and as Congress is to adjourn in May, it is extremely unlikely that a final disposition of the power plant will be effected before the next session.

The lease bill as passed by the House and approved by the Senate calls for a joint committee of both houses to negotiate with bidders for a fifty-year lease of Muscle Shoals, the lease to manufacture nitrates and distribute electric power on an equitable basis to states adjoining Alabama.

The wisdom of leasing the plant to private interests who will have no government treasury to protect poor management has been recognized for seven years, by nearly everyone but Congress. Farmers who need low priced fertilizer and manufacturers awaiting power supply before founding new plants, are hoping that Congress will be able to appreciate the economical advisability of early action.

Crooked Land Schemes

Every once in a while something frightful has to happen to take all the joy out of life. A second payment unexpectedly falls due or a check is returned marked "insufficient funds."

Now comes Professor Joly of the University of Dublin, who literally makes our hair stand on end by declaring that the earth's crust is steadily getting hotter and hotter and that some day human beings of necessity will be swimming around in a sea of molten lava.

As a matter of fact, it wouldn't surprise us in the least if Professor Joly were a large land owner in Greenland or Iceland and was trying to start a boom of one of his subdivisions.

After a thorough inspection of Florida, which included all the major cities, I can unhesitatingly say there need be no misgivings as to the stability of Florida. In my judgment the future of Florida is assured.

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Tampa's development is based upon a remarkable combination of climate with its appeal to tourists, year around agriculture in many branches, manufacture and distribution possibilities for a great and prosperous territory due to excellent rail and water transportation, low fuel cost and reasonable labor costs, all of which will assure future rapid substantial growth.

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


## RACING MEET OPENS AT NEW SEMINOLA COURSE TODAY

### Florida State League Heads Meet At Orlando

#### SANFORD CLUB PROTESTS 1926 BALL SCHEDULE

Plan Advanced Would Prevent Team From Playing Here Until First Week In May

#### Hauselt Elected To League Office

Six Clubs Represented In Conference Held To Outline Program

Following the adoption of a schedule for the Florida State Baseball League, during a meeting of the league held yesterday in the Anguill Hotel, Orlando, Vanice E. Douglas, president of Sanford club, succeeded in having the action nullified, and insisted on a move whereby copies of schedules submitted at the meeting yesterday are to be mailed to each club which in turn is to mail their vote in to the president of the league. This action was taken when it was discovered that the schedule as adopted did not give Sanford a home game until May 3, with the season opening in four of the cities on Apr. 22.

Mr. Douglas and W. J. Hardy, vice-president of the club, represented Sanford. The meeting was called at 1 o'clock, following the Orlando Kiwanis Club luncheon at which the following baseball executives and sports writers were present:

Schedules Considered  
J. B. Ascher, president of the club, after discussing various matters remaining for disposal by the league, brought up the schedules for consideration. One of them had been prepared by E. A. Hood, assistant to the president of the Bradenton club and the other by President Ascher. The latter's schedule was favored by the Sanford authorities owing to the fact that it gave this city an afternoon game on July 3, which is to be a holiday.

On the schedule submitted by the Bradenton representative, Sanford would have 500 miles more to travel than any other club in the league and local fans would also be prevented from seeing the team in action until May 3. The latter schedule was adopted and then came the move by Mr. Douglas which resulted in vacating the action. What schedule will be adopted in the mail vote is not known but the season opening is expected to remain the same date, Apr. 22.

Hauselt Named Vice-President  
Before proceeding with other business, E. J. Hauselt, of Orlando, was elected to the office of vice-president of the league. President Ascher announced that many applications had been received for positions of umpires and that he was going to select the arbiters within a few days.

Final details relative to the use and purchase of tickets were closed by the A. J. Reuch Company, who adopted as the official ball of the league.

Mike Sexton, president of the National Association of Minor Leagues, was present and assisted in the final organization of the league. Mr. Sexton warned the various club presidents that drastic penalties would be inflicted on any club violating the salary limits, or other rules as laid down by the association.

Six Clubs Represented  
All the clubs were represented except St. Petersburg and Ft. Myers. They having advised officials of the league to act for them.

Following the meeting, the league officials and newspaper men were guests of President Ascher at the Orlando park where an exhibition game between Cleveland and Cincinnati was witnessed.

#### Baseball This Year In Honolulu Called Best Season-Of All

HONOLULU, Mar. 20.—(AP)—Baseball is having its most successful season in Honolulu. More than 100 teams are contesting here in about two dozen leagues in which more than 2,000 players are enrolled. Many internationalists are represented including Portuguese, Hawaiian, Japanese, Chinese, Porto Rican, Filipino and Korean.

How many of the fight fans of today remember the correct name of the boys of the squared ring? Of a list of 100 of the old timers, not one, from records, used the same name inside the ropes as he did on the streets.

They chose "handles" which in some cases were made to fit by dropping or changing a letter or two, or by changing the spelling to retain the same pronunciation. Freddie Cole chose the latter way of spelling Kohl. The majority, however, discarded their own names and sailed under "nickers" which made Irishmen of Jews and Poles, but brought home the bacon just the same.

Changes Hauid  
"K. O." Brown followed Freddie Cole's lead and bid farewell to Valentine Dragon for the duration of his ring life. Jake Kilrain changed a letter and rearranged J. J. Killian to give him the identity which became so wide-spread during his climb to fame.

But not a few of these changed and in their place came appellations which alleged youth and ability, some true and some false. Among the most popular seemed to be "Young." Fourteen of the hundred wore this title, with "K. O."s, Jacks, Jimmies, Mikes and Steves following in close competition.

Jack Round, Wildcat, Dixie Kid, Louisiana, Gunboat, Cyclone, Shaugh, Ted John, Big Frank, Country, Yankee, Ginger, Curley, Irish, Swat, Corporal, Milwaukee, Chief, Miner, etc. The names alone were a book in themselves and suggested everything by a letter of the alphabet.


Babe Ruth Swings One Of Lightest Of Bats Manufactured

#### Johnny Risko Has Easy Time Beating Paul Berlenbach

NEW YORK, Mar. 20.—(AP)—Johnny Risko of Cleveland, who pulled his hand out of the doughpan and pushed them into a pair of boxing gloves not so long ago, today has a good chance to put his hands on dough of another kind.

The former baker last night bested the light heavyweight boxing champion, Paul Berlenbach, almost insensibility in a 10-round scuffle at Madison Square Garden. **Youngsters Of The Future May Never See Circus Parades Of Father's Time**

PERU, Ind., Mar. 20.—(AP)—The annual circus season this year will lack one of its greatest thrills for the children.

The circus parade, it has been decided by showmen here, is to be abandoned. The high priced performers, especially the Europeans, will not parade. The big circuses now visit only the large cities, it is explained and noon-day traffic problems and the growing distance of the circus lot from the railroad make the parade physically impossible.

Ten years ago there were twenty circuses with a train of ten or more railroad cars. Now there are only a dozen, but these have expanded until the largest circus in the country travels with 1,500 persons, and the smaller ones carry about 600.

The three circuses which spend the winter here have finished their winter overhauling, which includes inspection, repair and a fresh coat of paint.

There are about 250 on the parade grounds.





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

New York, Mar. 22.—(A-)  
A safe deposit box, which police believe holds a part of the \$500,000 loot of numerous crimes in four states alleged to have been committed by a gang led by Richard Reese Whittemore, escaped convict, was sought today.

Police also were working on evidence tending to link the gang to seven murders committed in a little more than a year in Baltimore, Buffalo, New York City and New Jersey.

As a result of evidence found on one of the seven men under arrest, state officials were undecided today whether they would permit the extradition of Whittemore to Baltimore, for trial for slaying a Maryland penitentiary guard during his escape last year.

Among the murders laid to the gang's door are those of three former members of the gang—Simon L. Golden, whose body was found in Trinity churchyard in December; Chicago Tommy Langrell and "Spiky" Kenny, who were found dead in New Jersey.

The seventh supposed victim is former Police Captain Victor Helwig, who disappeared after a band recently held up two jewelers on fifth avenue and escaped with \$150,000 of unset diamonds.

Helwig, then employed as a private detective, first told police he believed he had been killed by the gang.

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### Jail Confinement Disgrace To Woman Dry Officer So She Attempts To Kill Self

EL PASO, Texas, March 22.—(A-)  
The colorful career of Daisy Simpson, who established a record of law enforcement unages for one of her sex, seems doomed to a tragic end in an El Paso hospital.

With a self-inflicted bullet wound in her abdomen, the 36-year-old former prohibition agent, whose methods of apprehending dry law violators were so drastic as to bring the censure of federal courts upon her, hovered on the verge of death today.

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### REVIEW IN OIL CASE ORDERED BY HIGH COURT

Lower Court Decision Cancelling Leases With Doherty Subject of 2nd Hearing

All Phases To Be Studied In Case

WASHINGTON, Mar. 22.—(A-)  
The Supreme Court agreed today to review lower court decisions cancelling the oil leases and contracts which Edward L. Doherty negotiated with Albert B. Felt, as secretary of the interior.

MIAMI, March 22.—C. L. Holt, 26, a traveling salesman, was shot and almost instantly killed by Sunday by Police Officer W. W. Whitkamp, who was said to have fired "in self-defense."

Holt was one of two other occupants in an automobile driven by I. Q. Martin, Buena Vista technician, arrested by Officer Whitkamp on charges of exceeding the speed limit as he passed through the downtown section.

Martin had convinced the officer that he was not violating the law, and was preparing to leave when Holt, alleged to have been drinking, was said to have drawn a pistol on the policeman, who fired a single shot.

The bullet entered just above the heart and caused Holt's death a few moments later. Holt's relatives were believed to be residents of La Grange, Ga.
