# What 'Disney World' Means To County

"Wonderful—more than we ever dreamed of." Sanford Mayor Joe B. Baker summed up the opinion expressed today by local civic and business leaders of the plans for "Disney World" between Orlando and Kissimmee, as announced Thursday by Roy Disney and Gov. Claude Kirk at Orlando.

"Influence on this community," said Mayor Baker, "should be tremendous. Many of the tourists en route to and from "Disney World" are bound to stop in Sanford and Seminole County.

"The new motel and marina on the lakefront will entice many of the tourists to stop off here, and it should be a tremendous help to the business people of this area."

Baker concluded: "We must get busy now and get ready for it."

"This points up just what we said last week, about getting ready now with a super peripheral year-round attraction in the Sanford area," said Chester E. Merrill Jr. and A. J. Thomas, builders of the new Holiday Inn motel on the lakefront fill.

"It is not enough," they stated, "to sit back and wait for the tourists to come to us. We must offer some entertainment—some attraction that will take them off the super highways other than at "Disney World."

"We repeat, Sanford should expedite its plans to move its five new into new, modern and attractive quarters. Even enlarge it."

The business partners repeated their offer to "pick up the tab" for one quarter of the cost of a professional survey of the area to determine what type of attraction would bring tourists here.

"Worldwide interest in Central Florida is now focused because of "Disney World," said John Alexander, chairman of the Seminole County Commission, "and it's bound to benefit the entire area, including Seminole County, economically. In new residents, in new investment money, in new business."

"Seminole County will develop according, and more and more with the impact of the new complex."

Alexander, who attended the briefing Thursday at Winter Park, said he was "tremendously overwhelmed with the plans for "Epcot," the city of tomorrow."

"Seminole County Chamber of Commerce has always reflected the viewpoint that Seminole County and Central Florida eventually would be recognized as the greatest place in the world to live and play," said President DeWitt Mathews.

"This has come to light with the tremendous plans for "Disney World." Seminole County will directly benefit by the millions of tourists who will come through our area. We in Seminole County welcome the opportunity to be partners in progress."

# Sanford Gets Court Approval To Enter Courthouse Fight

The City of Sanford was permitted to intervene as a party defendant in the courthouse-injunction suit against the county by Circuit Court Judge Roger Dykes in hearings held in chambers Thursday.

Motions to dismiss the suit which were made by Harold Johnson, county attorney, however, were taken under advisement by Judge Dykes. The judge indicated ruling on the motion can be expected within the next two weeks.

It is now expected Sanford City Attorney William Hutchison will seek affirmative relief from the court and request the judge give a declaratory decree as to whether or not Sanford is the county seat.

Attorneys for the complainants in the suit (three South Seminole residents) and the county were requested by Judge Dykes to submit a list of citations of precedent cases and applicable Florida laws concerning the suit.

Arguments presented by Johnson to support his motion for dismissal included his contention the court has no jurisdiction over the actions of constituents of local officials unless fraud can be proved and that complainants in the suit have adequate remedy at large (the ballot box) for their complaint.

Harlan Tuck, attorney for the complainants, cited laws requiring public notice be published 30 days before the county commission takes action to build a courthouse.

Statutes were not presented requiring a public hearing on such a matter.

## Herald Survey Reveals... Church Attendance Down

Do people go to church today more than they did 10 years ago? Sanford ministers, in most cases, say no.

A survey of churches around the county and in Sanford by The Herald today revealed that, in general, it is falling the individual is not attending services or participating in church activities as regularly as those of a decade ago. Reasons given range from pressures of the economic world to the increased trend toward spending the weekend camping or fishing.

Another opinion was that although perhaps people are not attending as many meetings or services, they are remaining identified with their individual churches but are not allowing themselves to be recruited because they already are so busy with civic, community or school activities of comparative value.

"Some are rebelling against the church as an institution and don't see the ideology of what the churches are doing," one minister pointed out.

A minister of education in a Sanford church said, "I hate to say this, but as I see it, fewer people realize the importance of church in their lives today than those of 10 years ago. In my department, I find a lack of enthusiasm of anyone being willing to accept responsibility. Outside demands on the individual make him want freedom from something so he'll have time of his own and when he gets it, he doesn't know what to do with it."

Exceptions were found, locally, in the Episcopal and Catholic churches, where, not only has membership shown a marked increase but active participation and attendance is regular.

In the county, also, ministers interviewed were enthusiastic, reporting growth and interest which, it is felt, is due to leadership and inspiration received on the local level.

"People used to go to church because that was the right thing to do. Now they come because they are seeking the inspiration and benefits of becoming involved in their mid-term studies and the cold New Jersey weather."

Protests of the "latest water rate increase of Casselberry Utilities" were heard at the special meeting of the Casselberry City Council Thursday evening.

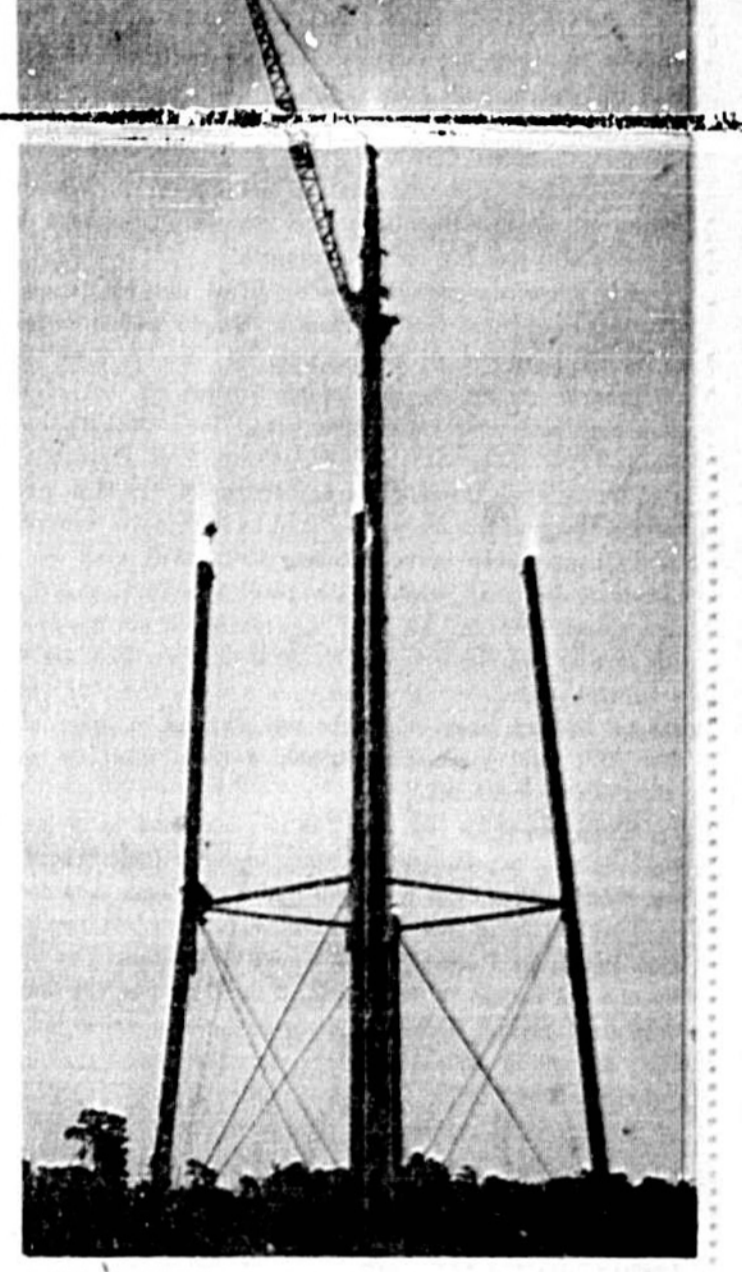

Someone said recently that "An atheist is a man without invisible means of support." This reminds me of the fact that our Christian faith is fortified largely by that which is unseen.

His experience was like being lifted out of the miry clay and having his feet set upon a rock. "I waited patiently for the Lord and he inclined unto me, and heard my cry. He brought me up also out of an horrible pit, out of the miry clay, and set my feet upon a rock, and established my goings."

When he got his feet upon the rock and when he reviewed his blessings, he renewed his vows to serve God. "Sacrifice and offering thou didst not desire; mine ears hast thou opened: burnt offering and sin offering hast thou not required. 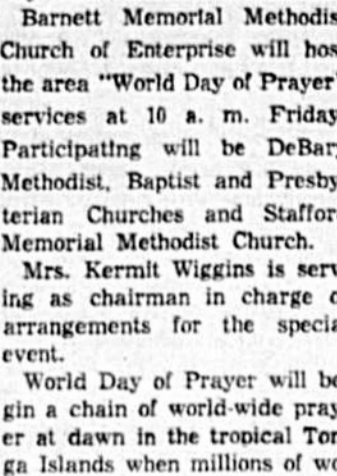

A night class is also conducted each Monday at Lyman for developmental reading on a voluntary basis for students who wish to improve their reading comprehension in preparation for college.

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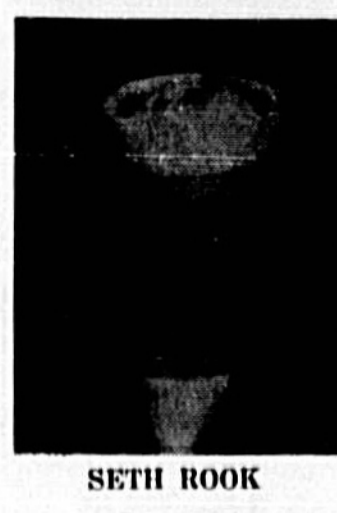

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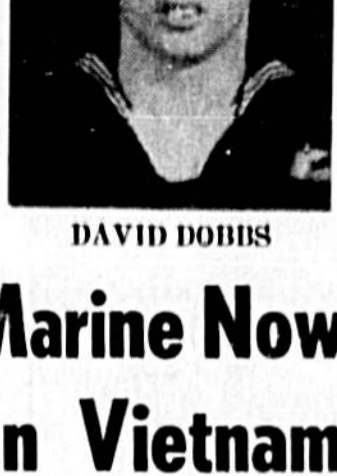
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'A Venture In Faith' Theme Of Methodist Mission



Rev. William Edd Timms, a resident of Sanford and a former pastor of the Geneva Methodist Church, will preach at Geneva beginning Sunday morning and continuing each evening at 7:30 p.m. through Thursday, it will be known in Sanford, Fla. as "A Venture In Faith."

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The nearly 600 Methodist Churches in Florida, including the 41 churches of the Deltona District, will hold six-day simultaneous preaching missions starting Sunday, a most important venture of Florida Methodism in a Century.

The emphasis is being called "A Venture In Faith" and has been heralded on all the news media. The Deltona, Melbourne, Miami, Orlando and West Palm Beach Districts will hold their missions Feb. 5-10. In March, the "Venture In Faith" will be held in the Jacksonville, Tallahassee and Jacksonville Districts holding their meetings, April 9-14.

The weeklong sessions will follow nine months of preparation involving planning sessions, prayer services, promotion and house to house visitation. 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# Utopia Under Glass Part Of Complex Of Disney World

ORLANDO (AP) — The world's first glass enclosed city — where more than 20,000 people will be able to forget about umbrellas — is included in the \$800 million dream of the late Walt Disney for Central Florida.

It may take a quarter of a century; it will take the postulation of private industry. But it is the core of Disney's plans for developing 48 square miles of scrub and swamp 16 miles southwest of Orlando.

Disney Productions, the entertainment empire forged by the creation of Mickey Mouse and Donald Duck, announced yesterday that a city of the future under a glass dome — will be the centerpiece of Disney World, the transformation of 27,400 Florida acres into a world showpiece.

The final film produced by the famous showman before his death Dec. 15 brought the message to a blue-ribbon audience of investors, newsmen and legislators who had gathered for a 25-minute movie that left them open-mouthed.

Disney said it himself. He would build a dome over 50 to 75 acres of a city called Epcot — experimenting with a futuristic community of tomorrow — to show the people of the future urban living at its best.

In conjunction with this, a "theme park" would be constructed as an extension of California's Disneyland and as an associate of the \$1.6 billion economic boost for Florida in the first decade.

Roy Disney, who took control of the huge firm with the death of his father, said that the city would snowball into an \$8.6 billion economic boost for Florida in the first decade.
