

### Bombed Negro Church Reopens

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI)—The doors of the 16th Street Baptist Church opened for worship services Sunday for the first time since a bomb killed four young Negro girls and injured 19 other members of the congregation. Some of the members wept. Some smiled. Many embraced as if they had not seen each other in a long time, perhaps since they worshiped together on that terrible Sunday almost nine months ago.

Attendance at Sunday school was a little below normal, but the renovated sanctuary was almost filled for the regular worship service. "Some of the kids have not come back yet," said Mrs. Clevon Phillips, who was teaching Sunday School when the bomb exploded. "Their parents are afraid to let them come back," she said.

Mrs. Phillips said she had just been released from a hospital, explaining "my nerves are shot."

A glass-encased sign in front of the church read "Sept. 15, 1963." That was the date of the bombing and police still have made no arrests despite an intensive investigation.

"The church looks very different, very beautiful," said Deacon Claude Wesley. The sanctuary has been remodeled since he was there last, on that day when the bomb went off.

Cynthia, Wesley's young daughter, died in the blast. So did three other girls, Addie Mae Collins, Denise McNair and Carol Roberts.

There are new stained-glass windows in the church, and new paneling in the sanctuary. The basement has been remodeled. All this was damaged when the bomb exploded.

The Rev. John H. Cross baptized 14 persons, 12 of them new members of the congregation. The Rev. H. O. Hester, a white clergyman who is secretary of the Department of Missions of Alabama Baptist Convention, gave the sermon. Neither mentioned the bomb.

## \$750,332 Spent By Burns On Campaign

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Mayor Hayden Burns of Jacksonville reported today that he spent \$750,332 to win the Democratic nomination for governor.

This was a few thousand dollars less than Gov. Farris Bryant spent in his 1960 campaign but the 1964 primary cost a good deal overall. Total expenditures reported by the candidates thus far add up to \$2,694,965, a record in Florida. The 1960 campaign, which had six major candidates and several lesser contenders, cost about \$2,154,817.

The total for the 1964 primary is not yet final. Burns reported total expenditures of \$750,332 and contributions of \$801,347 leaving him a balance of \$51,015 to start his general election campaign against Rep. Charles Holley, St. Petersburg Republican. Holley reported today total expenditures of \$501,691 against contributions amounting to \$22,016.

Miami Mayor Robert King High said he spent \$194,223 and received \$302,261, giving him a balance of \$8,039. In the final week before the runoff primary, Burns said he spent \$167,509 and collected \$175,150, most of it in chunks of \$500 to \$1,000. High said he spent \$16,003 and collected \$8,108 in the final week.

# Dearborn Rebuilding

## New Seminole Plant Rising On Old Site

Reconstruction of the Dearborn Electronic Laboratories, Inc. building which was 80 per cent destroyed by fire last January, is now under way.

The company designs and manufactures a line of capacitors, PFI filters and other allied electronic components for the aerospace industry. According to Eamonn D. A. Geoghegan, newly named general manager, the new complex, being built on the old site, will adjoin the winding department facilities which were left unscathed by the fire except for minor smoke and water damage.

The winding department resumed operations a few days after the fire. The new complex, being built of non-combustible materials and is designed with compartmentalized fireproof barriers. The contractor is the Shoemaker Construction Co. of Sanford.

Geoghegan said today that construction will be completed by the end of August and the plant will be in full production by October.

On the day of the fire Dearborn was provided temporary office space by the adjacent firm, Dynamotronics. Inc. Geoghegan thanked Dynamotronics and other firms in the area for their offers of assistance.

The new building will incorporate an enlarged "Class III clean room" Geoghegan declared for winding, film assembly and engineering departments. The area will have equipment which will filter dust from particles in the air as small as 0.3 microns.

Despite numerous reports of layoffs since the fire, personnel, numbering about 120, have been fully employed. Geoghegan said that when the new facilities are completed a double shift may have to be established. This would boost the number of personnel to approximately 200 within a year.

Within five weeks after the fire Dearborn shipped its first substantial order of capacitors and within two months the firm was back to 100 per cent production.

## North Orlando Charter Amendments Completed

## Boy's Faithful Dog Didn't Understand

BETHESDA, Md. (UPI) — Roger Rosander, 16, and his dog stood on the bank of an old canal and watched a neighbor and his son swimming.

Roger realized he was not a good swimmer but Wednesday's 100-degree Washington area weather was miserable. And when Lee K. Buchanan, 23, of Bethesda, and his son, Mark, 14, reached the far shore, 250 yards across, Roger and his retriever jumped in the water and started after them.

Halfway over, Roger floundered and began flailing his arms. The elder Buchanan came swimming to the rescue. He got Roger in a life saving grip and started pulling him to safety.

But only 20 feet from shore, Roger's dog attacked Buchanan, obviously believing his master was himself being attacked. The dog clamped down on the man's free swimming arm. Buchanan vainly tried to shake the animal loose. In the struggle, he lost his grip on the boy. Roger's limp body slipped beneath the water. Hours of dragging failed to locate it.

## Reds Capture Laos Outpost

VIENTIANE, Laos (UPI) — Communist Pathet Lao forces today were reported to have captured the important government outpost at Muong Kheung, scattering the 1,300 neutralist troops into surrounding hills.

Reports of the new Communist victory came as U. S. Ambassador Leonard Unger and Laotian officials considered whether to continue American reconnaissance flights over Pathet Lao positions on the Plain des Jarres.

Official sources in Washington said the U. S. flights, which resulted in two downed American jets last weekend, had been suspended and probably would not be resumed until Unger and neutralist Premier Souvanna Phouma reassess the situation in Laos.

Muong Kheung is in the battle area which has been surveyed by the U. S. photostatic planes since May 21. Souvanna requested the flights to determine the disposition and movement of Pathet Lao and Red North Vietnamese troops which had routed his forces from the Plain des Jarres.

## Marines Claim Chute Record

CHERRY POINT, N. C. (UPI) — The U. S. Marines claimed today that a parachuting team from three leatherneck bases broke a world parachuting record held by the Russians since 1961.

The team of nine, from Cherry Point, Camp Lejeune, N. C., and Quantico, Va., made a night jump of 41,100 feet, freefalling to a height of 1,800 feet before opening their parachutes, on June 7.

The Marine Corps announced yesterday that the Parachute Club of America (PCA) and the Federation Aeronautique Internationale must certify the jump before it goes into the record books but added that officials of the PCA were on hand for the jump at Ft. Bragg, N. C.

## Control Board Meets Friday For Ruling

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — The Board of Control will be advised here Friday of progress toward giving Florida clear title to sites in Pensacola and Orlando for the construction of new universities. Escambia County will sell \$1.5 million in bonds to purchase a 1,000-acre tract eight miles north of Pensacola for an upper-level two-year university.

The Orange County Commission is formulating a plan to obtain a 1,235-acre tract 12 miles northeast of Orlando for a four-year space-oriented university.

The 1965 Legislature will be asked to finance building construction for the new colleges. The college bond program approved last November provided \$1.4 million for an administration building at Pensacola and \$200,000 in construction planning funds for the university at Orlando.

The Board of Control will also hear progress reports on a legal education study being explored by the board staff to determine whether or not another law school is needed. Another report on a study to determine the need of expanding oceanography programs in Florida institutions will also be heard.

At a future date, a board spokesman said, national experts will be hired to help draft specific recommendations.

ing them all cluttered up with gags from ambitious politicians. Now I'm not against politicians, I realize that they are

a necessary evil and more often than not I'm downright sorry for the poor clucks particularly those who lose but it seems to me we ought to find a better method of selecting our officials than we have at present.

Television commercials are bad enough but political announcements and speeches are worse. They will stage a good old western gun fight between followers of Johnson and Goldwater, or employ Marshall Dillon as a bodyguard for the candidate for Democratic Comptroller.

If Hazel made up her mind she was going to sell her boyfriend as a candidate for governor she would set all his opponents on their ear and wind up by electing him with a landslide.

In my book there is nothing more boring than to see some poor owl sitting behind a desk glaring under the lights and trying to convince a more or less non-existing audience that he is God's chosen to be their savior. Maybe if I owned a radio or television station I might feel differently about it, but if I did, I think I would try to figure out a way to give my political patrons a better break even if I had to let my hair down and tell 'em to go find another rat hole for their campaign funds, or come up with a new type of program that folks would listen to and believe.

### LBJ's Aid Bill Gets By House Almost Intact

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House has approved President Johnson's \$3.5 billion foreign aid bill virtually intact for the first time in the 17-year history of the program.

The authorization bill, which sets a ceiling on aid spending but does not actually appropriate the money, was the smallest ever submitted. It won passage Wednesday night on a 230-175 vote and now goes to the Senate, where action is not expected until later this month.

A total of 58 Republicans joined 174 Democrats in voting for the bill, with 115 Republicans and 60 Democrats voting against.

Johnson, who had described his program as a "bare bones" request, hailed the vote as "wise and prudent." He said that "those members of both parties, who rightly concluded that this not the time to be cutting a carefully drawn measure, deserve the thanks of their countrymen."

But the battle is only half over for the administration. The aid appropriations will come later in a separate bill, and opponents have promised to attempt to cut it again.

The President, in submitting the measure, had sought a total of \$5,516,672,400 in foreign aid. The House made a net reduction of a mere \$27,000.

### Dixie Senators In Last Stand

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Weary southern senators began a last stand against the civil rights forces today with no hope for victory and little for saving the defeat.

The lead-off, Sen. Richard B. Russell, (D-Ga.), promised a fight to the bitter end but conceded that chances of pushing through any significant amendments were slim. Sen. George A. Smathers, (D-Fla.), foresaw a possibility of "major" amendments, but Sen. Russell B. Long, (D-La.), said the South could only hope for a "few minor changes" if any.

There were reports of a split in southern ranks after yesterday's cloture vote. Some southerners were said to have recommended seeking agreement with civil rights leaders on a few amendments while others were reported to be holding out for a no-compromise fight to the finish.

Sen. Herman E. Talmadge (D-Ga.), discounted the reports of strategy differences. "There is no southern strategy any more," he said. "There's nothing you can do. The gag rule prevails."

In statements following the cloture vote, most southerners held out hope for weakening the bill and limited themselves to dire predictions of its impact on America.

"Race relations, by this vote ... have suffered a blow from which they may never—in our lifetime—recover," said Sen. James O. Eastland, (D-Miss.). He said the bill would have a greater impact in the north.

"This has been a sad day for America," said Sen. J. Strom Thurmond, (D-S.C.), implementation of the bill, Thurmond added, would begin "a second tragic era of reconstruction."

Sen. Spessard L. Holland, (D-Fla.), said the vote forced action on a bill which will "widen the breach between the races and swell the tide of bitterness which these proposals have already created."

"Majority rule is not always the wiser choice, especially on a group of racial issues which are relatively unfamiliar to senators from many states," Holland said.

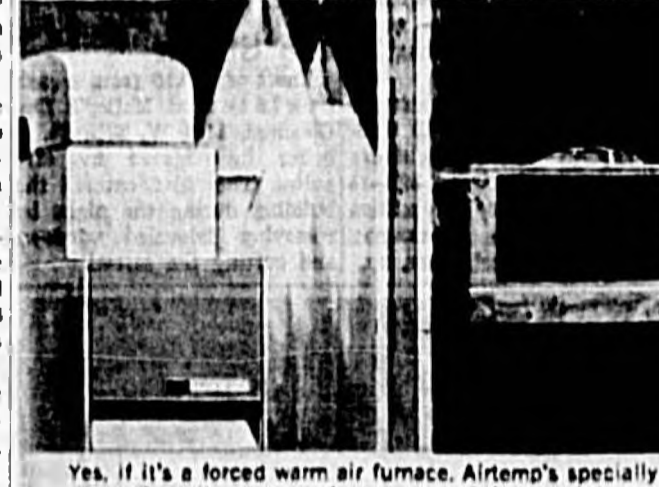

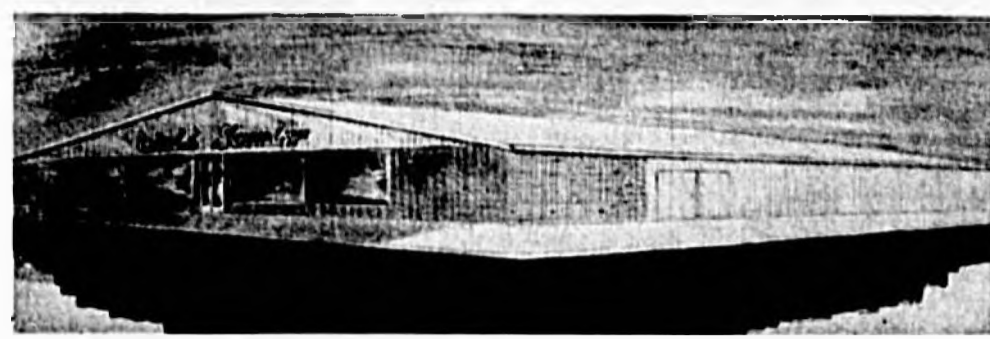

The unusual order was made Wednesday by Superior Judge Macklin Fleming, who said the order would be issuance of a court injunction forbidding the actress from doing another film.

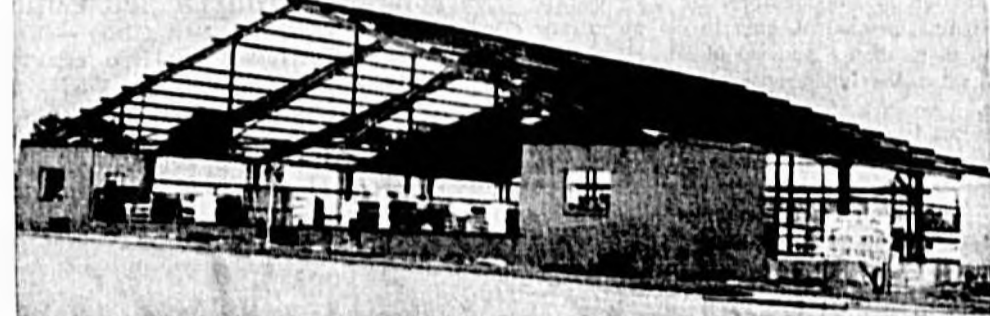

## Publisher Sees Speedy Printing Process

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — A Florida publisher today envisioned electron guns and lasers being used to produce a printing plate for an entire newspaper page in little more than one-half minute.

John H. Perry Jr., president of the Perry Publications Inc., told a mechanical conference of the American Newspaper Publishers Association (ANPA) the information that would appear on the page would first be stored in a computer.

Perry said an electron gun would project this information to a sensitized sheet of film—similar to a photo darkroom enlarger—that is used in the offset lithographic printing process.

"When the time comes to produce the page, the electron gun would sensitize the entire page onto film in 33 1/3 seconds," Perry said. "This would be at the rate of 1,500 characters per second."

He said his newspapers, a leader in the use of computers and printing automation, are currently negotiating to purchase an electron gun.

"... the computer industry is already sufficiently entrenched in the newspaper business to solve the problem of fitting the page generator into the picture," he said.

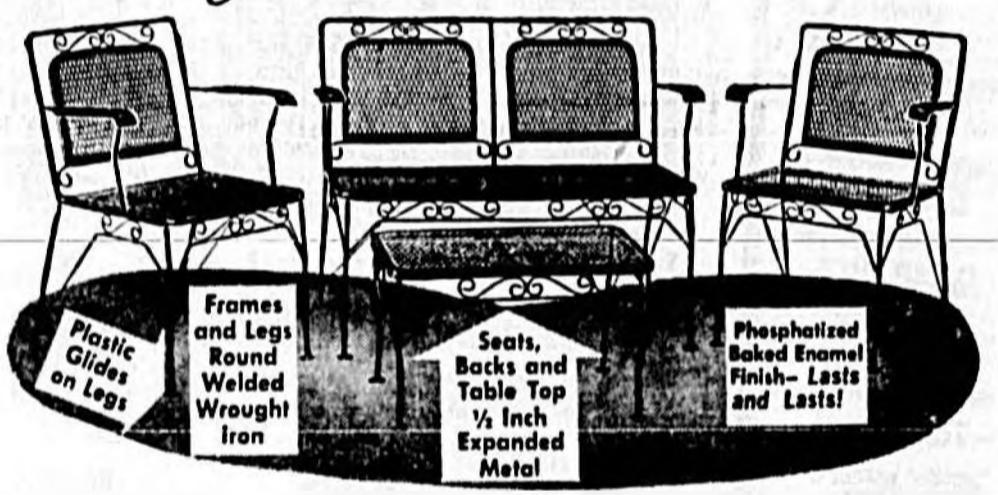

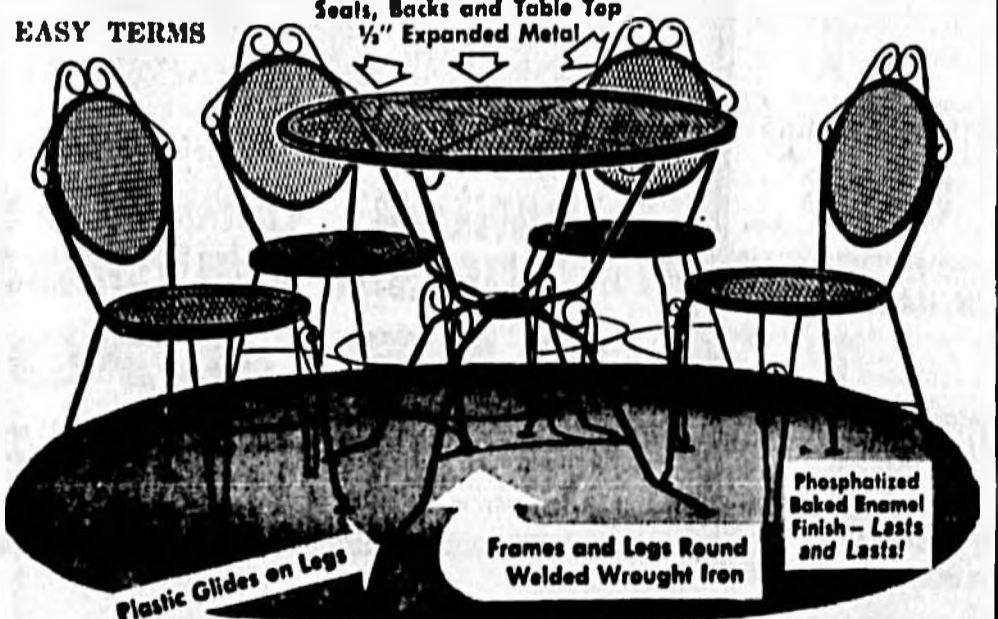

Now that the Senate has

voted to shut off debate on the civil rights bill, it is given a fair chance of passage.

Responsible Negro leaders already are preparing their people for the fact that the civil rights bill, even if passed in its present form, is no panacea or cure-all.

Public education — The bill states clearly that assignment of pupils may be made for "reasons other than race, color, religion or national origin." The measure says specifically the bill shall not be used to achieve a racial balance in any school by requiring the transportation of pupils from one school to another or one school district to another in order to achieve racial balance.

Public accommodations — Most eating places, places of entertainment and for-hire lodgings of more than five rooms could not exclude guests on the basis of race. The bill sets out detailed instructions of how to get a

civil rights case into federal court.

## GOP Governors Lose Zest For Campaign

CLEVELAND (UPI)—Most Republican governors, demoralized by political developments at the annual Governors' Conference, had little zest today for the 1964 election campaign.

Unlike the prospective majority of delegates to the GOP National Convention next month, only a minority of the 16 Republican governors want Sen. Barry Goldwater nominated for the presidency.

They knew even before they heard from former Vice President Richard M. Nixon that the conference this week offered the last chance to organize formidable competition for the Arizona senator.

Twelve years ago at their Houston meeting, the astute Thomas E. Dewey of New York lined up most Republican governors in a tactical move which led to the defeat of Sen. Robert A. Taft's bid for presidential nomination.

There was no Dewey on the scene this year and no candidate with the stature of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, who won the nomination from Taft at the 1952 convention.

In 1964, four years after his two terms in the White House, Eisenhower seemed to be marching up the hill twice within a month against Goldwater only to march down again.

When Eisenhower came here for a meeting with the Republican governors, he convinced them that he had accepted a Goldwater nomination as inevitable.

The Goldwater opposition includes governors both in the small states and the populous industrial states. But those from the industrial states were the ones most worried. They contended that Goldwater at the top of the ticket would be a drag on candidates for congressional and state offices.

## Federal Court Removes Cape Picket Line

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—A federal court order today removed a picket line which space officials said cost the government \$1 million a day and hampered progress on efforts to put men on the moon.

Construction workers started back to their jobs on \$215 million worth of space projects, but officials indicated they expected it to be Friday before the full force of 3,800 workers was back on the job.

The order of U. S. District Judge George Young went into effect at 7 a. m., EDT.

The workers, who belong to 14 building and trades unions, walked out Monday morning. They declined to cross a picket line thrown up both at the Cape Kennedy launching site and the Merritt Island moonport adjacent to the Cape by the Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees, one of 11 unions on strike against the Florida East Coast (FEC) Railway.

The maintenance men are protesting use of non-union personnel on FEC freight trains serving the spaceport on government-owned tracks. The unions have been on strike against the FEC since January, 1963.

MOSCOW (UPI) — A New York couple left Moscow's International Airport for the United States in disgust today, disillusioned with life in the Soviet Union after five years of hardship.

"I was a Communist in America, but I will never be a Communist again," said Mrs. Mollie Block, 32.

"America is the only place for us," said Morris Block, her husband, 44. "We never want to leave again."

The couple was interviewed just before boarding a plane with their daughter, Joanna, 13.

"The main thing we couldn't stand was the lack of freedom here," Mrs. Block said. "We were fed up with life

under Russian communism. Our friends were afraid to come and visit us, and we couldn't read the things we wanted to read."

The Blocks left New York in 1959 and went to Poland, hoping to obtain asylum in Communist China. When they ran into difficulties they accepted Soviet residence and set up housekeeping in the Black Sea port of Odessa.

The U. S. Embassy here helped the Blocks get visas to return to the United States. They said they had not taken out Soviet citizenship.

Mrs. Block said they raised the money to pay for the trip back to New York by selling all their possessions. "Look at us," Mrs. Block said. "Just rags and bundles. These are all our worldly possessions."

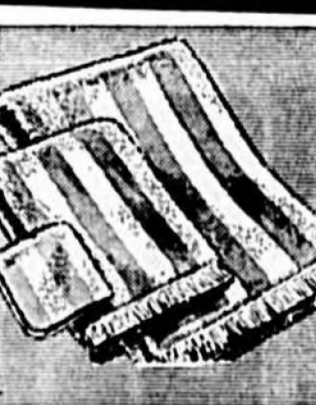

Jessie Morgan's family likes peanut butter. So she concocts this recipe using it.

**PEANUT BUTTER BREAD**  
2 cups flour  
4 tps. baking powder  
1 tsp. salt  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 cup milk  
1/2 cup peanut butter  
Sift flour and measure. Sift with baking powder and salt. Add peanut butter and sugar, working the peanut butter in to dry ingredients with the tips of fingers. Add milk. Mix lightly but thoroughly. Pour into well-oiled baking pan. Bake in hot oven 420 degrees about 30-35 minutes. Makes 1 small loaf.

Now here is Florence Eaton's APPLESAUCE DATE MUFFINS.

1 1/2 cups flour  
3 tps. baking powder  
5 tps. sugar  
1/2 tsp. salt  
2 eggs, beaten  
1/2 cup milk  
1/2 cup apple sauce  
3 tps. melted butter  
1/2 cup chopped dates  
Sift flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Combine eggs, milk, apple sauce and melted butter. Add to dry ingredients, stirring only until moistened. Fold in dates. Fill well-greased muffin tins 3/4 full and bake in 400 degree oven for 20 minutes. Makes 12 muffins.

Here also is Florence's CARROT FUDGE.

1 1/4 cups grated carrots  
1/2 tsp. lemon flavoring  
1/2 cup water  
3/4 cups sugar  
3/4 cup sweetened condensed milk  
Cook carrots, milk, sugar and water to soft ball stage (234-236 degrees). Remove from fire, add flavoring and cool to room temperature. Beat until creamy. Pour into buttered pan, pat down to 1 inch depth, and when firm cut in squares. The grain is likely to be a little coarse due to the grated carrots.

Now Irene Ross's PRUNE STUFFED APPLES.

8 tart apples  
1 tsp. lemon juice  
1 cup prune juice  
12 prunes  
Core apples. Do not pare. Fill centers with cooked, sweetened, pitted prunes. Combine lemon juice and prune juice. Pour over apples. Bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees, until tender. Chill. Serve with cream. Serves 8.

**FRENCH PEAS**

1 1/2 tbsps. butter or oil  
2 tbsps. water  
1/2 cup thinly sliced mushrooms  
1 1/2 cups fresh peas or 10-oz. pkg. frozen peas  
1 small onion, thinly sliced  
1/2 tsp. salt  
Melt butter and add the other ingredients. Cover the pan tightly and cook over moderate heat until the peas are tender, shaking the peas occasionally to prevent sticking. Cook fresh peas until ten-

der, 8 to 10 minutes. Makes 4 servings.

**Florence Eaton's BEEF STEAK ROLL**  
2 lbs. round, chuck or shoulder, cut 1/2 inch thick  
1 egg, well beaten  
flour  
poultry stuffing  
salt and pepper  
small strips pork  
1/2 cup water  
Pound steak. Spread with poultry stuffing to which the egg has been added. Roll. Skewer. Place in baking pan. Dredge with flour, pepper and salt. Add strips of pork and the water. Cover. Bake in moderate oven 375 degrees until meat is tender. Baste frequently. Serves 8.

**LIVER LOAF**

1 lb. liver  
1 1/4 cups cracker or bread crumbs  
2 eggs, slightly beaten  
1 cup milk  
1 large onion, diced  
1/2 cup diced salt pork  
1 tsp. poultry seasoning  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. pepper  
Boil liver until tender. Grind using coarse knife of food chopper. Add remaining ingredients. Mix thoroughly. Form in loaf. Bake in moderate oven, 375 degrees, about 45 minutes. If desired a little sage may be added. Serves 6.

**Mary Lewis's CHOCOLATE CHIP MERINGUE BARS.**

Sift together:  
2 cups sifted flour  
1 tsp. soda  
1/2 tsp. salt  
Combine in bowl:  
1/2 cup shortening  
1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar  
1/2 cup sugar  
Beat until light then add:  
1 tsp. vanilla  
3 egg yolks, beaten  
3 tbsps. water  
Beat until smooth. Gradually add dry ingredients beating well after each addition. Spread mixture evenly in a 9x13 by 8 by 2 inch pan. Sprinkle over top 1 pkg. (6 oz.) semi-sweet chocolate pieces. Then place in bowl 2 egg whites and beat until frothy. Gradually add, while beating, 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar. Beat until sugar is completely blended. Spread evenly over batter. Sprinkle with chopped walnuts. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

**CHICKEN-TUNA CASSEROLE**

3 cups diced cooked chicken  
1 can (6 1/2-7 oz.) tuna, drained, flaked  
1 cup diced celery  
1/2 cup finely chopped onion  
1 can (3 oz.) chow mein noodles  
1/2 cup silvered almonds  
Combine all of above ingredients in a large bowl. Mix thoroughly and set aside.

1/2 cup milk  
1 can (10 1/2 oz.) mushroom soup  
1 can (10 1/2 oz.) celery soup  
Blend well. Pour over chicken mixture. Mix well. Place

**RED CHERRY ROLL.**

1 cup sugar  
1 tbsps. flour  
2 cups canned cherry juice  
1 tbsps. butter  
2 1/2 tps. baking powder  
1/2 tsp. salt  
2 tbsps. shortening  
1/2 cup milk  
2 cups canned red cherries, pitted  
Mix sugar with 1 tbsps. flour. Add cherry juice and cook 1 minute. Add butter. Let stand . . . Sift 1 1/2 cups flour with baking powder and salt. Cut in shortening until mixture is as fine as corn meal. Add milk, mixing until a soft dough is formed. Turn out on floured board, knead lightly for about 20 seconds, and roll into an oblong about 1/4 inch thick. Spread cherries on dough, roll like jelly roll, and press edges together. Cut in to 1 1/2 inch slices. Place slices in pan (greased) and pour cherry juice sauce over top. Bake in hot oven 425 degrees 25 to 30 minutes. Serves 6.

**Clara Marshall's APRICOT LAYER PUDDING.**

2 cups dried apricots  
3 egg whites  
1 1/2 cups boiling water  
1 1/2 tbsps. gelatin  
1 cup sugar  
1 pkg. sweetened lemon flavored gelatin  
2 tbsps. cold water  
10 marshmallows, diced  
Wash apricots. Cover with water. Cover. Simmer until soft. Add sugar. Beat until smooth. Add 1 1/2 tbsps. gelatin which has been softened in cold water. Stir until dissolved. Dissolve lemon flavored gelatin in boiling water. Chill until partially set. Beat until fluffy. Add the unbeaten egg whites. Beat until frothy. Add marshmallows. Beat until stiff. Fill a mold with alternate layers of the whipped gelatin and the apricot puree, chilling each layer until firm before adding the next layer. Chill until firm. Slice. Serve with whipped cream. Serves 6.

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# Lake 'Monster's' Return Brings Traffic Jam

SISTER LAKES, Mich. — (UPI)—The "Monster of Sister Lakes" caused a mammoth traffic jam Wednesday night in southwestern Michigan.

Area residents have been on edge in recent days since reports began circulating that the "monster" is back in the area. Cass County sheriff's deputies said the presence of the mysterious creature has been reported off and on for about two years.

Mrs. John Utrup of nearby Dewey Lakes, Mich., told sheriff's deputies the beast chased her into her home Tuesday night and she said she was saved when her dogs barked and drove the "monster" away.

Mrs. Utrup said he was nine feet tall and weighed 500 pounds. Other descriptions said it was covered with black hair up to its neck and had eyes that glowed like an animal that had a light shined in its eyes.

Various witnesses said the creature made noises "like a tamed goose" and "a baby crying."

Cass County Deputy Sheriff Ernest Kraus said deputies were dispatched into the area in which the "monster" had been reported. They were armed with deer rifles and would stake out the area "until we solve this."

But, deputies said the area was crowded with a flow of curiously seekers and all the officers were forced to direct traffic.

"We had all the men we could spare up there and had to get some help from Van Buren County" to take care of the traffic, a spokesman said. He said many cars were loaded with up to six people.

"We don't know what it is. We don't even know if it exists," the sheriff's spokesman said. "But there have been complaints by about 10 reputable persons and we have to check them out."

# Elizabeth May Visit Russia

LONDON (UPI) — Unofficial reports circulated here today that Queen Elizabeth II may pay an unprecedented visit to the Soviet Union next year.

The Queen plans at least two trips abroad in 1965 — to Ethiopia in February and to West Germany in May — and normally reliable London sources said the monarch's travel plans may be extended to include the Soviet Union.

It has been more than 50 years since any British sovereign has set foot on Russian soil.

Prince Philip, the Queen's husband, was personally invited to Moscow by Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev during the Soviet leader's visit to Britain a few years ago.

Soviet cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin, who lunched with the Queen and Philip during his visit to Britain last year, was reported at the time to have suggested a trip to his country by the royal couple.

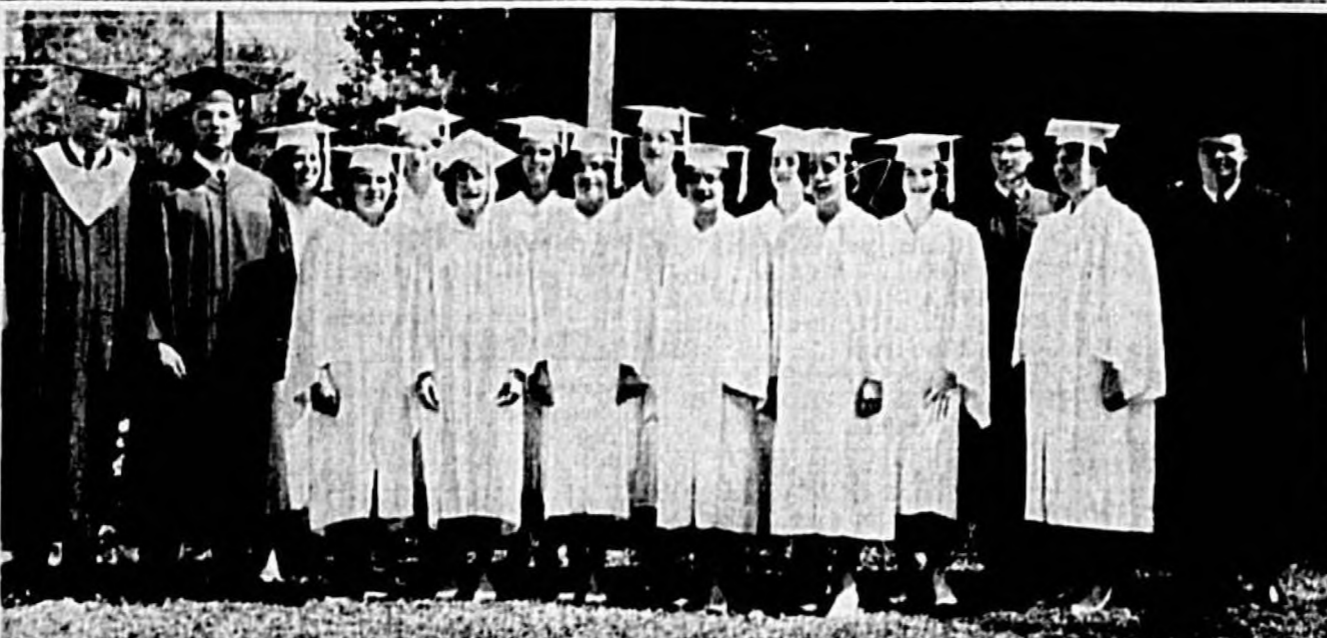

# Submerged Sub Fires 4th Polaris A-3

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI) — A nuclear submarine successfully fired two of the Navy's advanced 2,800-mile Polaris A-3 missiles today while cruising in the Atlantic Ocean off Florida.

The USS Daniel Webster, the Navy's 19th missile-firing submarine, launched the first A-3 at 11:34 a. m. EST and the second 35 minutes later.

The two successful shots ran the A-3's string of successes to six out of six, and the Webster's total to four straight.

The 31-foot missile—capable of reaching any target in the world—spurred from the ocean on a white trail of foam and sped far down the Atlantic test range.

The A-3, designed to carry

a nuclear warhead equal to nearly one million tons of TNT, is expected to become ready on the Webster in August.

The Navy now has 14 nuclear submarines on patrol with Polaris missiles. Five of them carrying the 1,375-mile range A-1 models and nine are armed with 1,725-mile range Polaris A-2's.

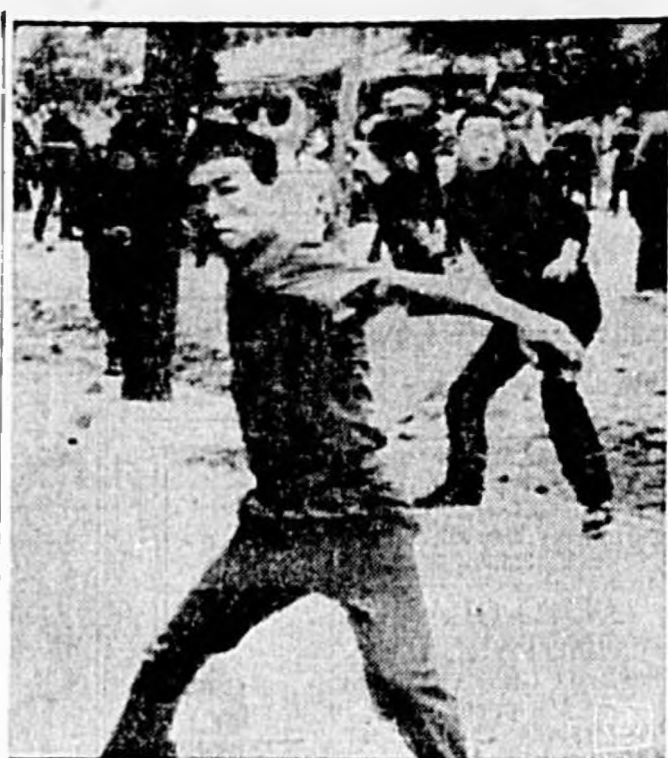

## Red China Now Calls The Tune In Asia

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (NEA)—Not the Russians but the Red Chinese now determine and co-ordinate Communist moves and strategy in Southeast Asia.

Specialists on China see a direct link between the successes of the Communist guerrillas in South Viet Nam and the Pathet Lao victories in Laos.

Yet some of President Johnson's advisers persist in their refusal to face the grim reality. They defend past attempts to apply half-hearted and piecemeal solutions to the problems facing the little nations in Southeast Asia.

American policymakers, though in search of a peaceful solution in Laos and Viet Nam, tend to ignore the fact that Asia is dominated today by the Chinese dragon which Napoleon hoped would be allowed to sleep undisturbed. They are critical of French President De Gaulle's view that there can be no peace in the Far East without Red China's consent.

In his forceful speech at the United Nations, U. S. Ambassador Adlai Stevenson pointed an accusing finger at Moscow. He warned the Russians that they were running risks by encouraging Communist aggression in Southeast Asia. Nevertheless, the State Department's diplomats continue to pin their hopes on Moscow's dubious pledge to support a neutral government in Laos, and on Nikita Khrushchev's policy of peaceful co-existence.

situation in Laos and Viet Nam.

Nor is it in Russia's interest to work for peace in Southeast Asia. As long as the United States is engaged in a costly conflict with Moscow's Chinese enemy, Khrushchev can sit on the sidelines and cheer.

This was Stalin's policy in 1939 when he signed his pact with Hitler. He also hoped that the Allies would fight Nazi Germany to exhaustion while Russia reaped the benefits and picked up the pieces.

Under the circumstances, there is a good deal of realism in President De Gaulle's proposal for another international conference on Laos that will include Red China.

Such a conference may not bring peace to strife-torn Viet Nam and Laos. The United States may have to intensify its military effort.

At the same time, by sparring the "little wars" in Laos and South Viet Nam, Mao seeks to convince his enemies in the Red camp that it is China's revolutionary policy and not Khrushchev's revisionism that wins victories over the American "paper tiger."

Thus, even if Khrushchev were a man of his word and not a deceptive opportunist, he could do little to affect the
