And a good sized crowd it was too - 450 animal lovers stopped by Sunday to bid farewell to their four-footed. urred and feathered friends in the old zoo. It was hardly a sad occasion however, because the goodbyes were only until Friday, when all the animals may be revisited in the new Central Florida Zoological Park.

Always bustling with activity, the old zoo was busier than ever this past weekend. For while the visitors strolled among the cages, and kids romped in the petting zoo or fed peanuts to the elephant, zoo officials were busily dismantling the decrepit facility. "We couldn't have lasted another three weeks without

closing for major repairs," called zoo director Jack Hanna from atop the commissary building where he and Zoological Society president Jim Ryan were helping tear down the laded and weatherbeaten Sanford Zoo sign.

Solar Power In Future,

Researchers Tell Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) - Federal energy researchers told Congress today that solar power may be of major potential use in the 21st century but that the nation will still be importing oil until at least 1995.

The Energy Research and Development Administration, in a report titled "Creating Energy Choices for the Future," said a number of energy alternatives must be pursued to allow sufficient margin for inevitable failures.

The report also said throwing all support toward a single target, such as nuclear power or creating synthetic fuel from coal or oil shale, even if successful, would not solve the nation's energy problems.

Dr. Robert C. Seamans Jr., the head of ERDA, told reporters he could place no pricetag on energy development through the year 2000.

McGovern Eyes '76 Race

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen. George S. McGovern, who lost by a landslide as the 1972 Democratic presidential nominee, is weighing the cption of running again for president in 1976.

In a letter sent last week to fewer than 50 of his key 1972 supporters, McGovern asked their advice on three options he is considering, including one of becoming a presidential contender.

However, the South Dakota Democrat said that, "as things stand now, I do not intend to become a candidate." The other options listed in the letter were endorsing a

liberal candidate or making a statement specifying what potential candidate would be unacceptable to him. After his hard-fought battle for re-election to the Senate

last year, McGovern said, "I am not going to be a candidate in 1976" for the presidency.

Dad Hurls Daughters Again

NEW YORK (AP) - In April 1973, 4-year-old Pamela Winfree and her 2-year-old sister Michelle were thrown through the window of their Brooklyn tenement by their father. They survived and their father, Herman White, went to prison.

On Saturday, White, 30, on weekend furlough from Manhattan's Bayview Correctional Facility, went to the Brooklyn home of his common-law wife. Police said he seized the girls, took them to the roof of an apartment building, and hurled them five stories to the pavement

Pamela and Michelle, now 6 and 4, survived the latest assault but were reported in critical condition today at Kings County Hospital. In the incident two years ago, Michelle suffered a broken leg and Pamela was not seriously injured in their three-story falls.

Jobless Benefits Extended

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Ford is signing a bill extending the law that provides jobless workers with up to 65 weeks of unemployment compensation.

The law expires today and, without the extension, workers would be eligible to collect benefits for only 52

weeks. About 250,000 persons would lose payments. The new bill also provides 39 weeks of benefits to workers not covered by state unemployment compensation insurance - mostly state and local government employes, farmworkers and household domestics.

The bill signing today begins a busy week of work, politics and travel for the President. Also on the schedule today was a White House ceremony in which Daniel P. Moynihan will be sworn in as U.S. ambassador to the United Nations.

Colby Opposes Open Budget

WASHINGTON (AP) - Central Intelligence Agency Director William E. Colby has opposed a suggestion of the Rockefeller Commission that at least cart of the CIA's secret, multimillion dollar budget should be made public. Colby said that disclosure of even the CIA's overall spending total inevitably would lead to disclosure of

details which need to be kept secret. "There are certain things, of course, in our clandestine activity that must be kept from public exposure and even the risk of public exposure," Colby said Sunday on NBC's "Meet the Press."

MIAMI (AP) - The 1975 Atlantic hurricane season's

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Political Paranoia And Report On CIA

It is going to take more than the Rockefeller commission report to exorcise the political paranoia that grips a large segment of the population at the mention of the Central Intelligence Agency.

But the Rockefeller report is a sound, con-structive and reassuring document as far as it goes.

The realities of CIA abuse of power are never going to be as horrible as the imaginings conjured up in the public mind by movies like "Executive Action" and "The Parallax View."

What is detailed in the report laid before the nation recently by President Ford is a shameful record of domestic intelligence actions that were plainly illegal and plainly abusive of the constitutional rights of citizens.

The report, however, falls short of documenting the kind of supersecret atrocities CIA critics hoped would be found-such as complicity in the assassination of John F. Kennedy.

The experience of that assassination and others, of Vietnam and Watergate have shaken the nation and undermined confidence in our leaders and our government.

These have been soul-shaking scourges. But our powers of recuperation are great and appropriations don't go as far or aren't forthe process is at work.

The question of CIA involvement in foreign assassination plots remains unanswered. It was higher costs has been passed on to the student purposely excluded from the published report. It population. now must be thoroughly examined by the Congress. The findings must be made public in as much detail as possible, consistent with national security.

The Congress also must consider the reasonable recommendations of the report for strenghtening legislative and executive oversight over the CIA.

The CIA's powers are necessarily broad. Secrecy necessarily shrouds many of its operations. Those are good reasons for making sure that oversight of this agency is unusually close and effective. It hasn't been in the past.

It would appear that previous presidents participated in abusing the CIA's power. It is unnecessary to pass judgment on their decisions. taken in circumstances much different from the present circumstances. But it is mandatory to eliminate any "gray area" in the law that appeared to authorize such abuse.

We must have and we can have an effective foreign intelligence service that operates entirely within the framework of the Constitution. The President has taken the first step toward that objective.

Navajos Snub AIM

The Navajos, disillusioned with the tactics of violent protest, have refused to allow the American Indian Movement (AIM) to hold its annual convention on the Navajo reservation. It was a 48-0 yote in the tribal council of the largest and most

powerful American Indian nation that denied the militants' request

Peter MacDonald, Navajo chairman, said he had some sympathy with AIM in the beginning three years ago, when AIM members sat-in at the offices of the Bureau of Indian Affairs in Washington.

But the most recent AIM action on the Navajo reservation backfired. Three months ago a sit-in at a Fairchild semiconductor plant at Shiprock was staged by armed AIM members to protest the layoff of 140 Navajo workers. It resulted in the company's decision to close the plant permanently. Five hundred Navajos lost their jobs.

No wonder the tribal elders were unanimous in rebuffing AIM. They have learned the hard way how unproductive indeed counterproductive - violent protest by a militant minority can be.

DON GRAFF Bank Funds Invested In Learning

It certainly comes as no news to parents of college-bound and based students that the cost of higher education has been getting increasingly higher in recent years - and at a more rapid rate than inflation has been jacking up prices in

That's the bad news, and even worse is that there is nothing in the economy's prolonged inflation-recession dilemma to indicate any forthcoming change in this particular trend. Both institutions and individuals are caught in

the bind. Once flush or at least satisfactorily solvent schools find endowments and legislative hooming in the amounts required.

Higher education remains a largely subsidized public activity. But inevitably the impact of

Various government assistance programs, expanded in recent years, and institutional scholarships help. But it can still be tough going. Good news in such a situation is any way to increase financial resources available to students, such as the program a Philadelphia bank has initiated which may be described as a do-it-themselves scholarship program for its

Under the First Pennsylvania Bank plan, purchase of a certificate of deposit also establishes a college scholarship. The CD pays the investor 5.5 per cent annual compound interest. The scholarship money comes from the difference between this rate and the maximum -7.25 per cent - the bank is permitted to pay on four-year certificates.

Scholarships are payable to any accredited institution of higher learning in the United States when the ceertificates are purchased. They range in size from \$350 with a \$5,000 CD up to \$7,000 for a \$100,000 purchase.

While the certificates are available to h dividual purchasers, the program is especially tailored for businesses, church, fraternal and similar organizations which may wish to put their reserve funds to work for the children of their employes or members.

The bank is looking for something like \$20 million to be invested in the program, which adds up to a lot of good scholarship news.

TOM TIEDE President As A GOP Candidate

suspense-creating efforts Gerald Ford was actually the first of all current candidates to put his helmet in the 1976 presidential ring.

Though he originally said he would not seek the office on his own, he changed his mind three days after assuming power last August. He has apparently had third thoughts since then, in part because of the health of his wife, in part because of the wisdom of it all. But those close to him insist he has in effect been campaigning now for almost a year.

"And what you've seen," says a Ford ally in the House, "is what you will see. I don't think the President is suddenly going to transform, presto, into a hard-charging, finger-pointing presidential aspirant. I think he'll be an enthusiastic candidate, but from his own moid. I think that he'll want to indicate to the voters that when he kisses a baby he really wants to kiss the baby."

No doubt credibility will be the major pursuit of the Ford campaign, for after 11 months in b office it has become the President's strongest suit. He can't very well solicit votes on his record of legislative genius or intellectual creativity. As a Republican committee officer says, "too many people will remember the oil tariff and Whip Inflation Now." Instead the task will be to convince people that whatever he does if elected will be done for them.

Will it work? Many think not. Clare Booth Luce, for one, believes Ford as a person is a L dream: "Open, honest, commonsensical, unapologetically patriotic, intellectually unpretentious." But can he be clected? Not a

chance, says she. Luce's negativism is rooted in personal misgivings about the contemporary philosophies of Ford's party, her party, the GOP. She says it has strayed widely from its political reason for being - the promotion of conservative values and has therefore lost the support of millions. With all his earthy charm, she implies, Ford can not ride 22 per cent of the voters to victory next
