# Seminole Readies For Gigantic Fourth Of July Explosion

This year's Independence Day, marking the 199th birthday of freedom from British rule, will be celebrated locally with gala activities countywide.

In Sanford, the steering committee of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce is coordinating Friday's celebration.

The events will include a gigantic fireworks display sponsored by the Downtown Business Association (DBA). Among the other groups sponsoring events are the Junior Woman's Club of Sanford; Jaycees, Jaycees, Telephone Pioneers, Sanford Recreation Department, Pilot Club; Ministerial Association, Democratic Women's Club, Lions Club, Seminole County Gun and Archery Club, Child Evangelism Fellowship, Antique Car Club and the Black Bicentennial Committee.

In Geneva, an old fashioned Fourth of July is set with a parade beginning at 11 a.m. from the fire station and ending at the Community Center where the keynote speaker will be Dick Veranes, former publisher of the "Reader's Digest" in Cuba.

L. Clark, secretary of the volunteer fire department, said hamburgers, hot dogs and a watermelon eating contest are planned and all sorts of games will be played. Those attending have been asked to wear pioneer and early American costumes, the secretary said.

In Longwood, the Longwood Area Chamber of Commerce has recently completed organizational plans for its second annual Fourth of July festival.

Located in front of the Longwood Fire Station, the carnival midway for this year's festivities will extend the length of Wilma Street between Warren and Church Streets.

The activities are scheduled to begin promptly at noon. The celebration will continue until 7 p.m. when everyone will be invited to attend the county fireworks display at Sanford.

Groups participating in the Children's Festival include: the Longwood Chamber of Commerce, handling the snow cones, cotton candy and moonwalk; Bill Klasky's Seminole baseball team, the Longwood Chamber of Commerce "Pirates" operating the Tic-Tac-Toe Booth; VFW Post 807 Auxiliary overseeing the food concession, the Tip The Cat game and selling helium filled balloons; the Longwood

Other highlights of the Children's Festival include two karate demonstrations by American Karate Studios at 1:30 p.m. and again at 3:30 p.m., and a Dixieland Band will entertain from 5 to 7 p.m.

# Call Case Puzzler Police Issue Appeal For Help In Slaying

Sanford police today reported they are still searching for leads in their around-the-clock investigation of the Friday night slaying of an Orlando man at a downtown bus station.

Detective L. William Lykens said this morning that investigators still have no motive, no suspect and very little information on the murder of George W. Helmsdorfer Jr., 45, of 5410 Lee Ann Drive, Orlando.

Lykens said detectives have learned that Helmsdorfer was a maintenance supervisor at the Lynatronics plant, U.S. 17-92, Longwood, in addition to operating, with his wife, Eula, the Hilltop Nursery, at Orlando.

Helmsdorfer's body was found crumpled against the outside front wall of the Greyhound Bus Station, Second St. and Park Ave., behind a trash can in a well-lighted area about 10:35 p.m. Friday.

L. Lykens today renewed a request made Saturday by detective Capt. C. B. Fagan that anyone with any possible information on the slaying or who was in the downtown area of the bus depot Friday night contact police.

Police found the body after a passerby reported hearing what was believed to have been three gunshots.

L. Lykens said investigators believe that Helmsdorfer had either made or was going to make a telephone call from one of two public telephone booths outside the depot. The victim's 1974 Cadillac sedan was parked adjacent to one of the telephone booths.

Police said Helmsdorfer apparently was shot two or three times in the chest and abdomen with a small caliber handgun. Lykens said a possible motive of robbery hasn't been discounted even though several hundred dollars cash was found in the dead man's pocket. Officers said the victim's wallet and wristwatch hadn't been disturbed.

Sheriff's crime scene technicians assisted police in dusting the telephone booths for fingerprints and police impounded Helmsdorfer's auto for examination by technicians for possible clues in the slaying.

Officers today would be commencing on reports that a witness has reported seeing a man run from the shooting scene toward First Street.

# Principals, Assistants Get Nod To Bargain With Board

The Public Employee Relations Commission (PERC) has turned thumbs down on a request from school officials to place principals and their assistants in the "managerial" category and exempt them from collective bargaining.

PERC made that decision Saturday in Miami, according to Harry Pelley, the school board's chief negotiator. The vote was 2-1.

"I'm disappointed," Pelley said this morning. "I still feel principals and assistants are managerial, and there's no way you can class them any other way."

The PERC decision has statewide implications because the ruling affects all Florida school districts, as well as Seminole County.

On learning principals were allowed to form units and bargain with the board, school officials earlier this year immediately considered filing suit against PERC to disallow principals that option. But the suit was put off. Instead, Pelley was instructed to appeal to the commission.

The theory is that principals here are part of management because they hire and fire and make up budgets, all of which, Pelley says, falls under the jurisdiction of "managerial" personnel.

But PERC says principals "are not managerial in relation to the county as a whole because the ultimate decision making ability rests with the superintendent and the board."

Unless the board sues PERC and wins a decision in opposition to the one issued Sunday, principals may form units and bargain collectively. In some states, principals form units and bargain for wages just like teachers.

Earlier this year PERC officials told "The Herald" that principals may bargain as long as they don't join a teachers' organization, which in Seminole would be the Seminole Education Association (SEA).

Since principals supervise teachers, PERC felt it would not be wise to lump both groups into one organization.

# Storms Drench Area, Winds Hit 45 MPH

Thunderstorms with high winds and lightning swept across Seminole County Sunday afternoon and evening, dropping approximately 1.5 inches of rain in some areas.

No damage or injuries were reported caused by the high winds, sometimes gusting up to 45 mph, according to the county's various law enforcement departments.

The weatherman is forecasting more of the same for this evening and tomorrow, with a more than 50 per cent chance of afternoon and evening thunderstorms. Predicted high temperatures are in the high 80s and low 90s and lows in the 70s.

J.S. "Red" Cleveland, manager of the Sanford Municipal Airport, said today that winds up to 35-45 mph were recorded at the airport, but Cleveland said the winds did no damage. He reported 1.43 inches of rain fell during yesterday's storm.

Reggie Brown, Seminole County extension agent, reported today that 2.53 inches of rain which fell during the weekend brought the total rainfall for the Central Florida's rainy season to more than 11 inches. Brown said that the season usually begins around June 1. He said that 8.45 inches was recorded at the station south of Sanford during June. This was above an average 7.02 inches for the month.

Brown said that even with the above average rainfall, the area's farming lands are still "basically dry." He said that most of the vegetable crops are harvested, but some soybeans still are in the fields. He said there is "ample moisture," but the area needs a lot of rain during the summer season to balance out the dry months during winter.

Elsewhere in the nation, four tornadoes slashed through North Dakota last night killing one person and injuring four. One twister swept through the southwestern part of the state, tearing a 30-mile path of destruction. One person was reported dead on arrival in a hospital in the town of Hettinger. Hettinger County Sheriff Earl Kramer said a tornado hit about 9 p.m., and ravaged several farms and killed many cattle.

Meanwhile, the season's first tropical storm—Amy—moved northeast across the Atlantic at about 10 mph. At midnight Amy was about 250 miles east of Cape Hatteras, N.C.

# Zoo's Last Crowd Good-Sized One

If anyone's seen the crowds come and go at the Sanford Zoo, it's Ken Cochrane, man in charge of the admissions booth at the old facility. On Sunday, Cochrane saw a crowd leave for the last time.

And a good sized crowd it was too—450 animal lovers stopped by Sunday to bid farewell to their four-footed, furred and feathered friends in the old zoo. It was hardly a sad occasion however, because the goodbyes were only until Friday, when all the animals may be revisited in the new Central Florida Zoological Park.

Always bustling with activity, the old zoo was busier than ever this past weekend. For while the visitors strolled among the cages, and kids romped in the petting zoo or fed peanuts to the elephant, zoo officials were busily dismantling the decrepit facility.

"We couldn't have lasted another three weeks without closing for major repairs," called zoo director Jack Hanna from atop the commissary building where he and Zoological Society president Jim Ryan were helping tear down the faded and weatherbeaten Sanford Zoo sign.

"Just today I've seen rats running across this roof, everything's leaking and we've got four sewers stopped up. We're closing just in time and this is a happy day for us," said Hanna.

Meanwhile, zoo employees were stripping signs from old cages to be rehanged at the new zoo, and behind the scenes were assembling the assortment of boxes, bags and cages in which animals will be transported to their new home.

Sensing the charged atmosphere of excitement and

## Solar Power In Future, Researchers Tell Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal energy researchers told Congress today that solar power may be of major potential use in the 21st century but that the nation will still be importing oil until at least 1995. The Energy Research and Development Administration, in a report titled "Creating Energy Choices for the Future," said a number of energy alternatives must be pursued to allow sufficient margin for inevitable failures. The report also said throwing all support toward a single target, such as nuclear power or creating synthetic fuel from coal or oil shale, even if successful, would not solve the nation's energy problems. Dr. Robert C. Seamans Jr., head of ERDA, told reporters he could place no pretag on energy development through the year 2000.

## McGovern Eyes '76 Race

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. George S. McGovern, who lost by a landslide in the 1972 Democratic presidential nomination, is weighing the option of running again for president in 1976. In a letter sent last week to fewer than 50 of his key 1972 supporters, McGovern asked their advice on three options he is considering, including one of becoming a presidential contender. However, the South Dakota Democrat said that, "as things stand now, I do not intend to become a candidate." The other options listed in the letter were endorsing a liberal candidate or making a statement specifying what potential candidate would be unacceptable to him. After his hard-fought battle for re-election to the Senate last year, McGovern said, "I am not going to be a candidate in 1976" for the presidency.

## Dad Hurls Daughters Again

NEW YORK (AP) — In April 1973, 4-year-old Pamela Whitree and her 3-year-old sister Michelle were thrown through the window of their Brooklyn tenement by their father. They survived and their father, Herman White, went to prison. On Saturday, White, 30, on weekend furlough from Manhattan Correctional Facility, went to the Brooklyn home of his common-law wife. Police said he seized the girls, took them to the roof of an apartment building, and hurled them five stories to the pavement below. Pamela and Michelle, now 6 and 4, survived the latest assault but were reported in critical condition today at Kings County Hospital. In the incident two years ago, Michelle suffered a broken leg and Pamela was not seriously injured in their three-story falls.

## Jobless Benefits Extended

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ford is signing a bill extending the law that provides jobless workers with up to 65 weeks of unemployment compensation. The law expires today and, without the extension, workers would be eligible to collect benefits for only 52 weeks. About 250,000 persons would lose payments. The new bill also provides 20 weeks of benefits to workers not covered by state unemployment compensation insurance — mostly state and local government employees, farmworkers and household domestics. The bill signing today begins a busy week of work, politics and travel for the President. Also on the schedule today was a White House ceremony in which Daniel P. Moynihan will be sworn in as U.S. ambassador to the United Nations.

## Colby Opposes Open Budget

WASHINGTON (AP) — Central Intelligence Agency Director William E. Colby has opposed a suggestion of the Rockefeller Commission that at least part of the CIA's secret, multimillion dollar budget should be made public. Colby said that disclosure of even the CIA's overall spending total inevitably would lead to disclosure of details which need to be kept secret. "There are certain things, of course, in our clandestine activity that must be kept from public exposure and even the risk of public exposure," Colby said Sunday on NBC's "Meet the Press."

## FBI Hunt Continues

PINE RIDGE, S.D. (AP) — The FBI has no positive identification on the 16 persons sought in the shooting deaths of two agents on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, but "we have a pretty good indication of who they are," a spokesman said. Spokesman Thomas Call said Sunday that more than 150 agents were searching the rolling, rugged hills of the reservation, the second largest in the country, for the 16 persons believed to have been involved in the deaths of agents Ronald Williams and Jack Cole.

# Officials Suspect Arson Was Cause Fireman Hurt Fighting Blaze In House

A Seminole County fireman received a leg injury early today while helping extinguish a fire in a house under construction in Oviedo. Firefighter Phillip Coffey, 20, was treated and released at Florida Hospital, North, Altamonte Springs, for a strain of the right foot, a hospital spokesman said. Coffey said he injured his leg when part of the floor of the frame house on SR-419 at Willingham Road collapsed as flames entered to fight the flames centered in the rear rooms of the structure. Fellow firefighters estimated Coffey

and carried him from the burning building. Sheriff's deputy R.S. Morton reported that officials suspect arson in the fire that gutted the house that had been vacant for at least three years. Morton said the name of the owner of the property, posted against trespassing, was not immediately determined.

Units of the county fire department, Oviedo and Chulavita Fire Departments brought the blaze under control. County fire units extinguished a small fire at 401 Lake Dr., Loch Arbor, Sanford, last night during a rainstorm. Sheriff's deputies reported that high winds apparently

### Depression 'Amy' Continues Slow Drift Into Atlantic

MIAMI (AP) — The 1975 Atlantic hurricane season's first tropical storm is drifting slowly through the open seas today, its 55-mile-an-hour winds threatening no land masses, the National Hurricane Center says. The storm, dubbed Amy, formed Saturday off the coast of North Carolina. Although it moved farther out to sea, small craft warnings were posted for the North Carolina and Virginia coasts when the storm whipped up 15-foot waves. Forecaster Paul Hebert said the rough seas caused some erosion near Cape Hatteras on the North Carolina coast. "It spent about two days around the North Carolina coast, so there's some minor beach erosion and flooding," he said.

## Indian Meditation Checked In Death

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP)—Doctors are looking to studies of meditation in India for possible clues to the unexplained death of a young Ann Arbor yoga instructor.

Robert Antoszczyk, 29, was found dead in his room June 3 in a meditation position. Pathologists at University Hospital and the Washtenaw County medical examiner's office could find no reason why Antoszczyk died. Some of the young man's friends believe Antoszczyk decided not to return to his body because his soul found a better life.

A vegetarian who jogged, weightlifted and practiced karate, Antoszczyk was in excellent health, according to friends and his mother, Lillian Antoszczyk of Detroit.

Astrophysicist is a deep meditative state designed to allow a person to enter his own unconscious. Proponents believe the soul is then separated from the body, connected only by a symbolic "silver cord." Books

such a deep trance as he meditated that he slowed down his heart beats and couldn't get sufficient blood and he died.

"The Indian scientists I have consulted tell me that this form of meditation can be very dangerous if the person does not know what he is doing," Gilas said.

WIMBLEDON, England (AP)—Wimbledon, the tennis tournament the players call the world's best, is producing its own brand of magic once again. Fans have been sleeping outside the gates of the All England Club in this tree-lined southeast London suburb as record crowds engulf the tournament which ranks high on the list of the world's most popular international sports events.

More than 1,600 newsmen, broadcasters and photographers from 60 countries vie for the time of the game's biggest stars.

"The crowds are fantastic. I haven't seen anything like it," said a gate official as the first week's attendance hit the 190,000 mark with last year's two-week record of 306,161 expected to be broken.

Ticket scalpers outside the gates were asking about \$50 for 7 center court seats, officially sold by ballot months ago.

Americans, Italians, French, Spaniards, and Scandinavians were among those waving handfuls of five-pound notes in hopes of buying tickets to watch the day's play.

As the men's and women's quarter-final round gets underway today, defending champions Jimmy Connors and Chris Evert face their first tough competition after a one-day hiatus on Sunday.

Connors, 22, has looked invincible in his four matches thus far, and Miss Evert has hardly ruffled her feathers against four opponents.

But with the All England Club's grass courts playing unpredictably, upsets may be in

Anne Smith (15-18) placed second in 200 free, and 200 fly, third in 200 free, and fourth in 100 IM, and 100 free.

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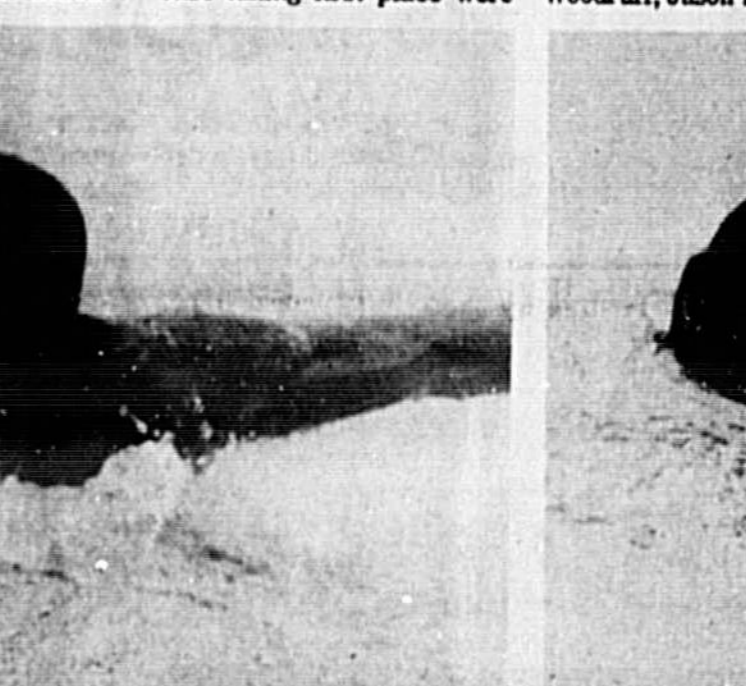
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## Ali, Bugner Ready For Title Bout Tonight

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP)—Defending heavyweight champion Muhammad Ali and British challenger Joe Bugner today completed training for their outdoor title match.

Bugner shadow boxed and skipped rope at Negara Stadium and declared himself "fit and strong... I shall give a very good show tomorrow."

Bugner said he weighed 226 pounds today and that he expected to shed about 14 pounds in the humid heat against Ali Tuesday. The fight starts about 9:30 a.m. local time and, thanks to the international date line, will be seen on closed circuit theater television in North America in prime time tonight.

It's the first heavyweight title fight in this part of the world. Ali vs. Bugner is to be screened as one-third of a championship triple bill involving light heavyweight champion Victor Galindez against challenger Jorge Ahumada and middleweight titleholder Carlos Monzon against Tony Licata. The latter two fights are being held in Madison Square Garden.

Ali was rated a 3-1 favorite by oddsmakers in his 16th title fight. At 33, he's eight years older than the European heavyweight champion.

Ali weighed 225 at the official weigh-in Saturday but was expected to enter the ring under to be in the 80s.

The champion collects \$2 million dollars for his efforts. Bugner gets \$500,000.

## Pair Of Bouts Precede Heavy Screen Matchup

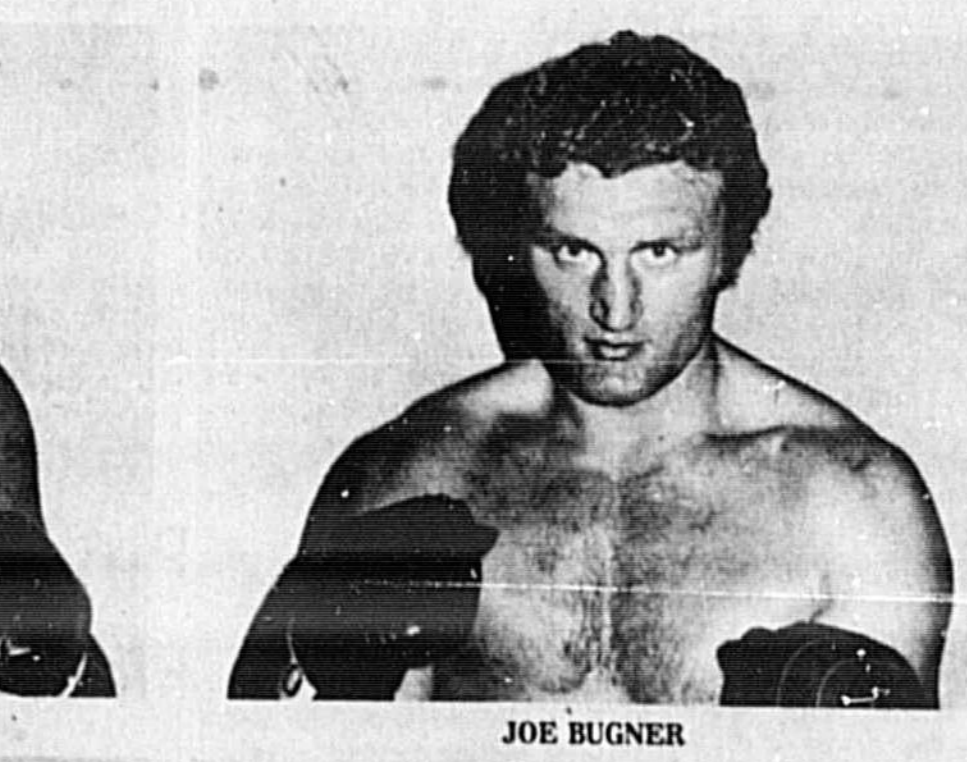
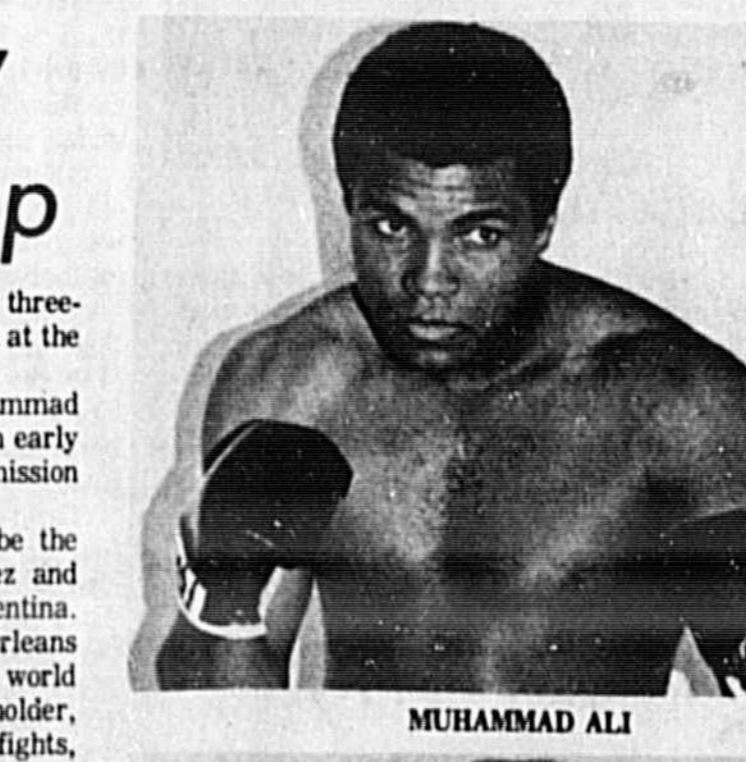
ORLANDO — Boxing fans will be treated to a three-championship closed circuit television fight card tonight at the Municipal Auditorium here.

Leading off the championship preliminaries will be the light-heavy title go between champion Victor Galindez and challenger Jorge Ahumada. Both fighters are from Argentina.

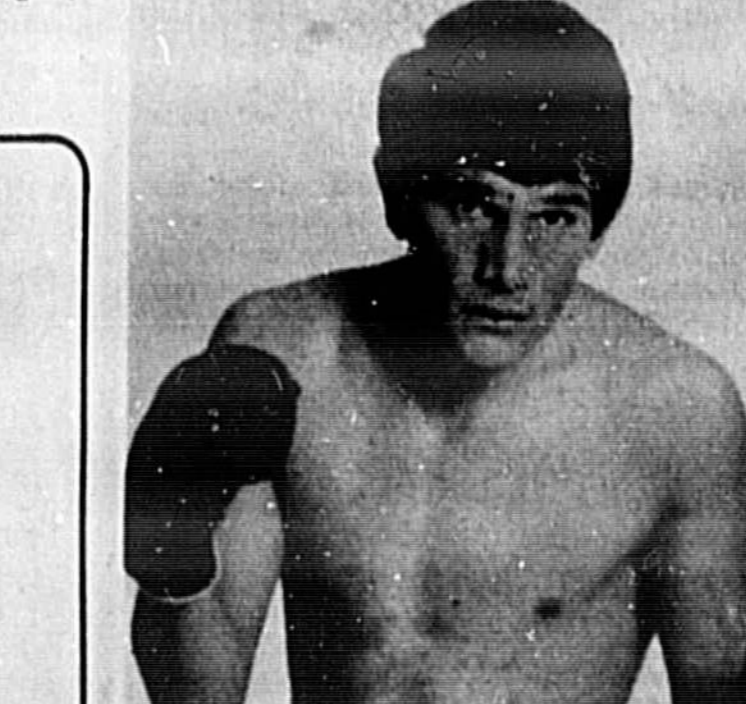

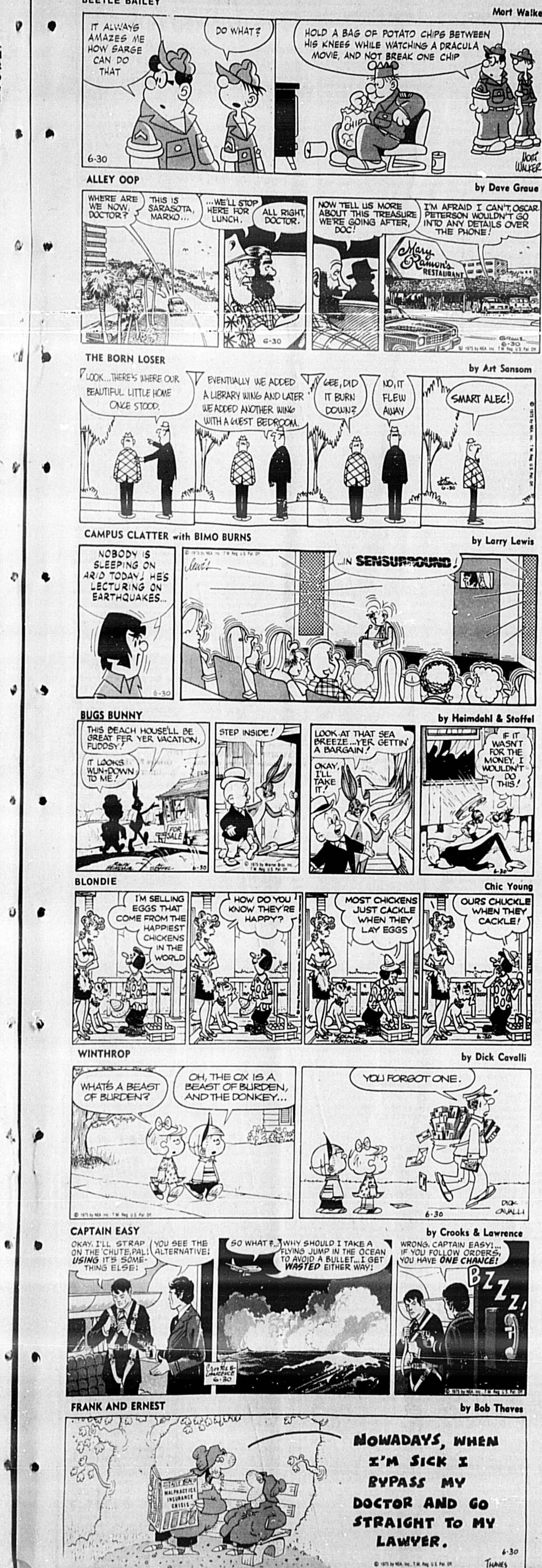

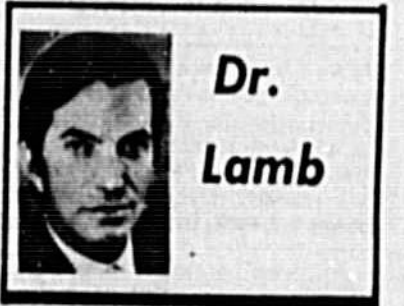

**Alcohol Won't Help Diabetes**

**DEAR DR. LAMB** - I am 37 years old and have had diabetes since 1968. I have been going to several doctors, always trying to avoid the insulin injections which I fear fiercely. I have been on pills to control my blood glucose.  
 The doctor I am seeing now says there is only one thing left to do if this doesn't bring the blood sugar down, and that is the needle. I don't want to start that because I will have to take it the rest of my life.  
 Since October my blood test results have been 320, 289, and 283. Then I joined Weight Watchers and from December 26 to January 31 it dropped to 269.  
 Now I am having trouble with my driver's license. The doctor won't sign a statement on uncontrolled diabetes. I asked him what my blood sugar must be before he will sign the card so I could get my license back and he said 120. Don't you think this is unfair? I have had this for seven years and not had any dizzy spells or blacking out. Do you think I should go to some other doctor who might give me a better break?  
 You had a column once that mentioned a certain kind of alcohol which would drop the blood sugar. What was it?  
 Also, is losing weight a definite answer to a safe and sure way of bringing the blood sugar down? Or is there still a possibility of having to take insulin? Is being depressed and losing your temper connected with diabetes?  
**DEAR READER** - The kind of alcohol that drops blood sugar is the kind you mix in cocktails or get in beer. It acts by chemically tying up an important enzyme in the liver (NAD) used to convert food stores to glucose. It won't help you though, and will make your diabetic problem worse. I don't approve of alcohol for diabetics.  
 I do approve of your effort to lose weight, if you have any obesity problem at all. Many overweight women will have normal blood sugar tests after they get down to normal weight. I usually consider a good diet and correction of any obesity the first step in treatment of the obese patient with high blood sugar levels. Diet alone usually is as useful as the pills. It requires more effort, but if you want to avoid that needle, I'd recommend being conscientious about getting your weight under control.  
 Exercise also lowers blood sugar. A good exercise program, done sensibly, might help with your diet program. Those high blood sugar levels you have indicate that the liver is converting more food to glucose than your body uses, not just that you have a problem in absorbing too much sugar.
