PARIS, Nov. 10 .- (INS)-Bainbridge Colby, secretary of state in President Wilson's cabinet, has been authorized to demand a divorce by the Tribunal of Versailles, t was learned today.

The Tribunal, in a decree dated October 29, admitted Colby's application and overrode the application made by Mrs. Colby before the Seine Tribunal. The decision favoring Colby came after an investigation by the court of Mrs. Colby's attitude towards a reconci-Mrs. Colby filed an application

for divorce before the Seine Tri bunal in December, 1925, The court set April 22, 1926, as the date for a reconciliation hearing. Mrs. Colby, however, did not appear at the set hearing. Colby then filed an application

for divorce before the Versailles court stating that the attitude of his wife had not changed since the filing of her application.

Bainbridge Colby is well known as a lawyer and a statesman, having held many important governmental and political posts. Before serving as President Wilson's sec retary of state from March 22, 1920 to March 4, 1921, he was a member of the American mission to the inter-allied conference at Paris in 1917. From that year to 1919 he was a member of the United States



NEW STRETCH OF TAMIAMI TRAIL IS ALMOST FINISHED

Section Of Cross-State Highway Lying BetweenCarnestown And RoyalPalm HammockSpeededToComplettion

FORT MYERS, Fla. Nov. 10-INS- With work being rushed on the 15-mile stretch of the Tamiami trail between Royal Palm hammock and Naples in Collier county, the new trail south through Carnestown and Everglades will probably be opened to traffic by Christmas of this year, it was announced by D. Graham Copeland, chief engineer of the Alexander, Ramsey and Karr, construction branch of the Barron G. Collier organization.

The grading crews, working northward from the hammock, are about two miles south of Naples and expect to complete an additional half mile this week. The New Royal Palm hammock-Naples section of the trail will replace the old road which passes through Marco junction.

In its efforts to expedite the trail project the state highway department recently awarded to the Collier organization a hurryup contract for the remaining mile and one-half of grade south of Naples, and in order to speed the construction work Alexander, Ramsey and Kerr let a sub-contract to Stewart and King of an additional dragline and grading outfit, Fort Meyers which will supply

The H. E. Wolfe Construction company, of St. Augustine, resurfacing the entire section, is already on the ground, Copeland said, The surfacing work will be expedited through distribution of materials from Bell Meade, a new station on the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad at Henderson's creek, located at about the mid-Railroad at Henderson's dle of the project.

In the meantime a surveying crew of the state road department is laying out a new line for the trail from Naples to the Lee county line, one mile south of Bonita springs. On a recent visit to this city Fons A. Hathaway, chairman of the state highway department, announced that contracts for this section would be awarded immediately upon the com-pletion of the survey. 




