Large Crowd Expected To Witness Legion's Second Boxing Show Of Present Season

32 Rounds Have Been Put On Bill

Receipts To Be Used To Purchase Drum, Bugle Corps Uniform

Sanford fight fans will have an opportunity tonight of seeing one of the best boxing programs ever arranged for this city. Rene Duray, fast French scrapper, will be pitted against Happy Henry, Tampa pugilist in the main attraction of the American Legion program which will be staged at the Municipal Athletic Field.

In addition to the 10-round affair which brings together Henry and Duray, Promoter Harry Godale has also arranged a corking semi-final match between Young Boston and Daniels.

Proceeding these two stellar fights, will be three other preliminaries to claim local fans' attention. Altogether 32 rounds will be offered for the approval of Sanford freedom. In addition, the American Legion boys have arranged to furnish music between bouts, a six piece orchestra having been engaged for the occasion.

The first program given this season last Wednesday night drew a good crowd and tonight's turnout is expected double that of last week.

A large number of Orlando fans are expected to be present tonight. The advance sale of tickets in Sanford indicates a good turnout from this city and county.

CLYDE CRABTREE GROOMED TO FILL BOWYER'S PLACE

Elusive Gator Halback Given Position Left Vacant By The Recent Injury Of Regular; Florida Misses The "Goof"

UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA, GAINESVILLE, Nov. 9.—(Athletic News Bureau)—Clyde Crabtree, who was brought up under the machine gun fire of Chicago, out in the little suburb of Cicero, seems destined to be the spark in Florida University's offense for the remainder of the season.

Crafty Clyde has been nominated to fill the quarterback post left vacant by "Goof" Bowyer, confined to his bed with a broken leg—suffered in the Georgia game at Jacksonville Saturday, and upon his slim shoulders rest the non-too-easy burden of directing Florida's attacks against Alabama, Washington and Lee and Maryland.

Just a sophomore, 150 pounds, five feet eight inches, Crabtree in his collegiate togs might easily be picked out as the mascot choice of some fair group of sophomore coeds, but there are no girls in this institution, and so the "cute boy" of Florida football finds himself today with a more serious responsibility.

Crabtree loves football, and there isn't anything this lad, almost 20 years of age, doesn't do well. Bowyer was Florida's big triple threat man, and his passing kicking and running with the ball will be greatly missed, but Crafty Clyde, most spectacular of all Gator ball carriers, is expected to fill the gap most ably.

RICKARD TARGET FOR NEW MOVE IN FIGHT MONOPLY

Rumors Say Gene Tunney Is To Cast Aside Gotham Promoter After Next Fight; J. Kearns Also After Rickard's Scalp

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—There were indications today that tended to prove that George L. Rickard, the man with the one-way luck, may soon find himself running against traffic for the first time in his public life.

To those close to Tunney, it is no secret that the champion is bound to Rickard only by a matter of commercial instinct; that between promoter and champion the love would fill a large eye in a small needle. It is a good guess that, if Tunney can see his way clear at all, he will refuse to hurt himself with Rickard beyond the next championship fight.

So much for some alleged anti-Rickard sentiment from a source that really counts. It counts just this much; that, if Tunney really cares to bolt the party, Rickard's

This man failed to enthuse over the fact that Tunney and Dempsey split a million and a half in Chicago and the Garden got some \$400,000 for making the match possible and more recently the organization failed to pass a contract Rickard made for Paulino and Phil Scott.

The promoter laughed that one off with a deep contralto but the fact continued to register that the contract remained unapproved. Even the majority stockholder, it would seem, has something to worry about if his own organization failed to stay with him.

All of which brings us around to Jack Kearns and the Dempsey fight which is due in New York next week. According to Kearns' statement, he is going after Rickard just as hard as he will attempt to hurt Dempsey; for Kearns has declared eternal vendetta against the promoter and this may prove to be more important than it sounds.

Nobody takes Kearns seriously about sending Mickey Walker out as a heavyweight contender but what he is today is a man who might very well produce another heavyweight champion. If he ever got one, Kearns wouldn't let Rickard see tickets at the door.

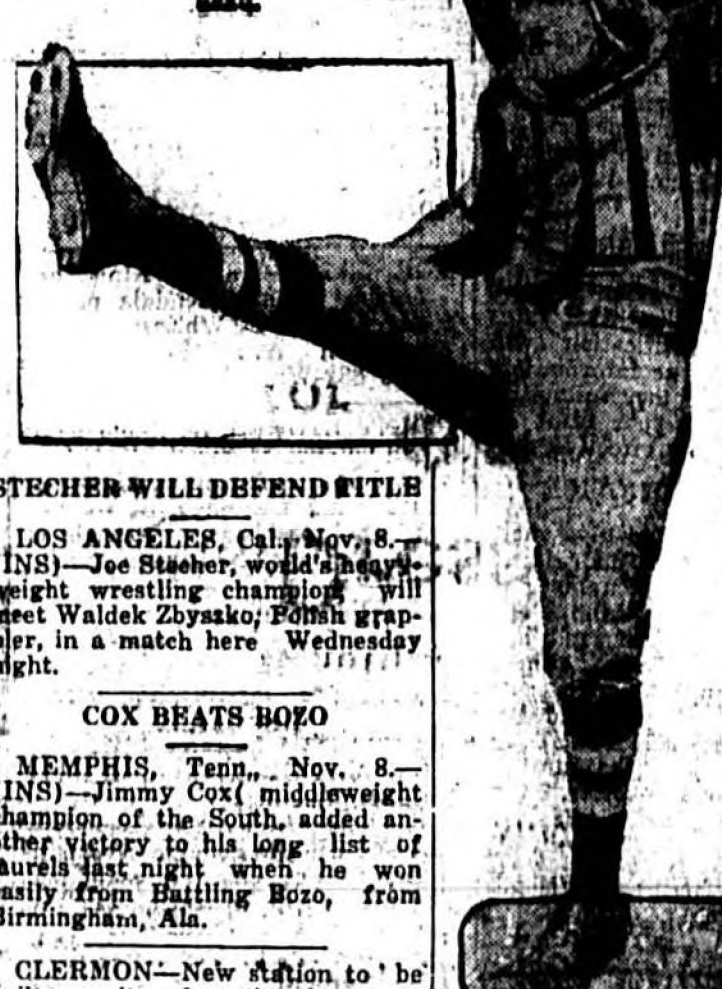
Elis Lose Services Of Bruce Caldwell By Faulty Ruling

NEW STRETCH OF TAMiami TRAIL IS ALMOST FINISHED

Section Of Cross-State Highway Lying Between Carnestown And Royal Palm Hammock Speeded To Completion

FORT MYERS, Fla., Nov. 10.—(INS)—With work being rushed on the 15-mile stretch of the Tamiami trail between Royal Palm Hammock and Naples in Collier county, the new trail south through Carnestown and Everglades will probably be opened to traffic by Christmas of this year, it was announced by D. Graham Copeland, chief engineer of the Alexander, Ramsey and Kerr, construction branch of the Barron G. Collier organization.

The grading crews, working northward from the hammock, are about two miles south of Naples and expect to complete an additional half mile this week. The new Royal Palm Hammock-Naples section of the trail will replace the old road which passes through Marco junction.

In its efforts to expedite the trail project the state highway department recently awarded to the Collier organization a hurry-up contract for the remaining mile and one-half of grade south of Naples, and in order to speed the construction work Alexander, Ramsey and Kerr let a sub-contract to Stewart and King of Fort Meyers which will supply an additional dragline and grading outfit.

The H. E. Wolfe Construction company, of St. Augustine, recently awarded the contract for surfacing the entire section, is already on the ground, Copeland said. The surfacing work will be expedited through distribution of materials from Bell Meade, a new station on the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad at Henderson's creek, located at about the middle of the project.

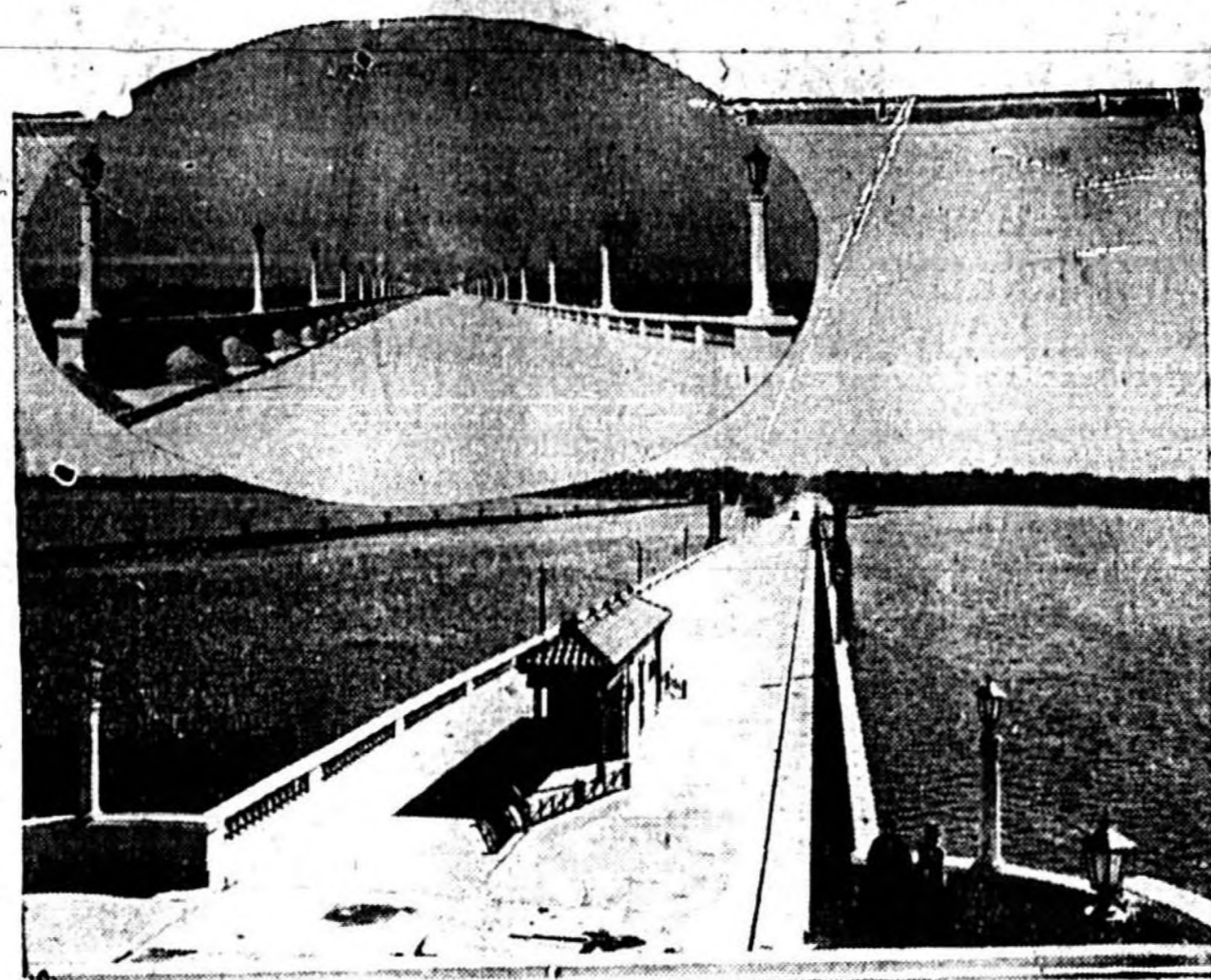
In the meantime a surveying crew of the state road department is laying out a new line for the trail from Naples to the Lee county line, one mile south of Bonita springs. On a recent visit to this city Fons A. Hathaway, chairman of the state highway department, announced that contracts for this section would be awarded immediately upon the completion of the survey. While waiting action by the state department county forces are maintaining the old road to Naples in good condition.

Progress on the trail from the east coast side is being made rapidly, the chief engineer reported. Drilling crews of the C. Huffman Construction company, working in Dade county westward into Monroe to meet the grade of the south branch of the famous cross-state highway loop, have passed the eastern end of the north branch. It is possible, Mr. Copeland pointed out, that the entire grade into Miami, by way of the north, or Collier county branch, will be completed by the end of this year. The state department is bending every effort to have the trail opened across the state by April 15 and work is being speeded on bridges which are an important part of the project.

PUTNAM COUNTY MEMORIAL BRIDGE OPENS FRIDAY



Another link in Florida's fast growing chain of fine bridges in the state's highway system has been provided by the people of Putnam County Memorial Bridge stretching across the St. John's River, at Palatka. The half mile concrete span was erected at a cost of \$1,250,000, by the Stein Construction Company, of Milwaukee, and about 18 months of actual construction was necessary for its completion, foundation conditions in the St. Johns varying practically every foot of the way. The roadway of the bridge is 30 feet wide.

Not only does the new span provide an important link in State Road No. 3 extending from the Georgia-Florida line to Orlando, but it serves as well as a memorial to the heroes of the county who gave their lives in the recent conflict across the sea. Dedicatory exercises will be held on Armistice Day.

Mississippi River Towns Plan Docks For Operation Of Large Fleet Of Barges

DES MOINES, Nov. 10 (INS)—Visions of mighty barges plying up and down the Mississippi, laden with grain ore and other commodities are regarded with mixed favor by cities along the upper reaches of the Mississippi.

On both sides of the immense waterway the talk of river development has brought with it the question of docks and other improvements which mean money, and money to the middle westerner right now, is regarded with a feeling approaching awe.

In several cities, along with talk of a survey by the government to determine the possibilities of Mississippi river transportation, bond issues are now pending for dock projects.

The city of Burlington, Ia., through its docks commission has asked the city council to issue bonds for \$220,000 to improve its harbor facilities. In Clinton, Ia., the proposition was put to a popular vote, and defeated by a decisive majority.

Other cities, urged by their chambers of commerce, are preparing to improve their dockage, but the plans in most cases are meeting with determined opposition from taxpayers who object to further obligations.

"Electricity brings increased comfort"
