

For this purpose he injects into he growth a solution of formalin which poisons many of the cancer cells, an thus sets free the irritating substances they contain, which were previously quiescent. These substances are carried away by the blood, and so "infuriate" the rest of the body that in the next week or so here is a sharp' struggle with the cancerous invader-instead of a long, mild, and unsuccessful cam-
