Final Action Scheduled By SRB May 28

County's proposed \$1.39 million road improvement program for the fiscal year starting July 1 will be held by the State Road Board on May 28

at Tallahassee, County Engineer William Bush this morning informed the County Commission the State has given tentative approval to the primary and secondary program, subject to the May 28 Tallahassee hearing. This program has been previously publicized when recommended by the County Commission to the State Road Department in a meeting at DeLand several weeks ago.

The \$610,000 primary program includes four-laning and general improvement of 2.2 miles of 8-436 already under way between I-4 and E-15, costing \$250,000.

Proposed in the primary program is four-laning and general improvement of 8-46. 1.02 miles, between French and Melionville Avenues, \$200,000; paving of 5-415, 1.32 miles, between Sanford Avenue and the city limits, \$15,-000; paving of 8-436 (old), 4.42 miles, from Lake Howell southward, \$45,000, and paving 5-436 (new), 2.1 miles, from the Orange County line

to Lake Howell. The county-wide sec program includes \$50,000 for preliminary ouginouring studies. The \$360,000 program also includes these improvements; 5-436, 4.1 miles, from Goldenrod to Oviedo, general imthree phases, all in general and 5.5 miles at \$135,000, and four sets of railroad signals at \$10,000 each, all on the ACL, northeast of Altamonte Springs, Lake Mary, 25th Street west of Sanford, and O'Brien Road at Altamonte



The Wrongs Of Civil Rights

Civil Rights Bill, 1963, TITLE II -PUBLIC ACCOMMODATIONS Public accommodations forbids discrimination based

on race, color, religion, or national origin in hotels, motels, restaurants, gasoline stations, theaters, and sports arenas. Anyone denied acess could seek a court order prohibiting the discrimination, or the Attorney General could do so if he felt that the purpose of the act would be "materially furthered" by his intervention.

HAYION BURNS SAYS: "This is a clear invasion of property rights, an attack on 'Free Enterprise' and the destruction of States Rights."

TITLE VI — FEDERAL FUNDS

Gives Federal agencies authority to take affirma-tive action — including, as a last resort, a cutoff of Federal funds — to end discrimination in Federally assisted programs such as school or hospital construction or vocational training. HAYDON BURNS SAYS: "The threat of cut-

off of Pederal funds is sheer economic blackmall. These funds are our own taxes coming back to us in form of aid programs such as milk to school children, old age assistance, and so forth.

Title VII — Job Discrimination

Makes it unlawful for union or management to follow practices that "deprive any individual of employment opportunities" on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. A new Equal Employment Op-portunity Commission would seek court injunctions against discriminatory practices if conciliation efforts fail.

HAYDON BURNS SAYS: "This is diabolical provision actually making the Federal bureaucrate partners in every business in Florida, and giving them virtual control over hiring and firing of pernunnel. Business efficiency goes out the window with this intervention."



You Might Censor This

Parents may want to censor this item before their kids see it. Some manufacturers might like to censor it before anybody sees it.

Anyway, a dentist has recently stated that "brushing teeth makes no difference in preventing cavities." As reported in the Health Bulletin,

Dr. Ralph Steinman, professor of oral medicine at Loma Linda (Calif.) University School of Dentistry, claims that at least two studies show that children who brush the most have slightly more decay than those who skip brushing.

"The areas most susceptible to decay," says Dr. Steinman, "can't be reached with a toothbrush." The real answer to tooth decay, Dr. Steinman believes, lies in changing our

eating habits. The chief causes of decay, he says, are, first, between-menl snacks; second, desserts; and third, refined grains, such as macaroni, cold cereals and white bread. The amount of nibbling children do, says the dentist, has a "very, very close relationship" to the number of cavities they

The average person consumes about 100 pounds of sugar a year. Dr. Steinman has cut his family's individual consumption to 12 pounds.

Toothbrushing is such an ingrained habit with Americans, and the merits of various brands of toothpaste are so constantly and forcibly presented to our eyes and ears, that most of us would consider it heresy to give up brushing our teeth.

Dr. Steinman undoubtedly has a good point about diet, though. Too many of us have the idea that wielding the brush and tube two or three times a day is all we need worry




