The old political gatherings were entirely outmoded at the birth of radio," he said. "When I present to you the national union I present a new forum as modern as the radio, uncontrolled and uncontrollable by the machinations of politicians who will not be able to return from Washington and alibi that they did not know your wishes.

"After outlining the operation of the union he swung into the heart of his discourse, 'social justice' having it on the second of 10 points which concerns the living wage.

3. Property ownership does not argue unlimited control.
4. The hourly wage contract should be abolished and should be replaced by an annual wage. Moreover there should be a partnership, not in ownership, but in profits.

Washington Daybook

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—Few political observers here believe that President Roosevelt will make any radical departure in his strategy of handling the incoming Congress.

The White House compromised last winter with the silverites, with the backers of the railroad pension bill and the Frazer-Lemke farmers bankruptcy act.

The President will have much the same situation with which to contend in the coming session. The great Congress promises to be a spending board perhaps even more so than was the last.

However much the Administration might wish to limit the total outlay in the face of unemployment figures recently made public by the American Federation of Labor.

Mr. Roosevelt's task, therefore, will be to arrive at a figure he can reasonably expect to hold against the onslaught of those who would spend to the limit.

France Warned That Germany Is Ready For War

Colonel Fabry demanded a strong government and domestic unity to face such a danger. Archibaudi, in making his budgetary report, which was given in the chamber of deputies for study, described Germany's 1935 military force as follows:

(1) A terrific, lightning-like air raid. (2) The swift invasion of small powerful forces by way of Belgium and Switzerland to complete the destruction from the air. (3) The surging wave of a powerful occupying force capable of ending the war within a few weeks.

Borah Fires Away At Cost Of Relief, Says Probe Is Due

Borah said nothing had occurred to justify modification of his accusations. Instead, he went into more detail regarding reports of "waste" which he said had poured into his office.

The spur of waste seems to come from administration in the field, he declared. "The administrative payroll is enormous. Those in authority in different sections of the country, through pressure or desire, seem to play a wholly unnecessary number of persons on the administrative payroll at salaries beyond what the service justifies."

"Many of these persons cannot qualify on the basis of relief or of experience. The payroll becomes clogged and padded and the cost of administration runs in some instances from 25 percent to 50 percent of the sum administered."

Governor Ely, who nominated Alfred E. Smith at the Chicago Democratic convention in 1932, spoke at a luncheon meeting of the development board, which was organized yesterday "to sell the South to the nation."

"We must continue them, and we must improve them. There is no patent medicine that will cure our economic ills. But of all the quick remedies the worst that is offered in this nation in the cold gray dawn of recovery from the intricate follies of 1929 is to get drunk again in another orgy of inflation."

The Massachusetts governor called upon the business men of America "to forget any apprehension and take advantage of encouraging signs, adding that he was at first astounded that the American people were willing for the government to take over the matters hitherto privately controlled."

Coast Line Wants To Settle Sarasota Tax On Low Basis

SARASOTA, Nov. 20.—An offer of the Atlantic Coast Line Railway to settle \$3,200,21 of contested county taxes on a 30 percent basis, or for \$1,260, was presented by J. A. Franklin, the railway's attorney in Fort Myers.

The commission took the offer under advisement, notifying Mr. Franklin that they would advise him of their decision in a few days.

The contested taxes, amounting to \$3,200,21 are, for what the railroad has contended in litigation filed in Leon county circuit court, Tallahassee, "are excessive levies."

He advised the board how to proceed in adopting a resolution should it agree to the settlement. The resolution is to be forwarded to the state comptroller and in turn it is to file a "consent" in the Tallahassee litigation. He said that a number of other counties had agreed to a 30 percent settlement.

ROLLINS SEEKS DATA ON EARLY LIFE OF SCHOOL

Officials Plans 50th Anniversary Fete Early Next Spring

WINTER PARK, Nov. 20. — Who in Florida can shed light on the inter-rivalry which existed among Florida cities for the Rollins semi-centennial plans, Prof. A. J. Hanna, chairman of the Rollins semi-centennial plans, makes this inquiry as he delves into dusty records of fifty years ago in preparation for programs of Florida's first institution of higher learning.

Daytona Beach, it is known, was an interested contender for the academic shades. There, as early as 1882, Miss Lucy A. Cross, a graduate of Oberlin, had agitated the establishment of a college so that her pet doctrine of "The education of the South at the South" might be carried out. Rev. C. M. Gingham, early missionary of the Congregational Church in Daytona announced in 1885, according to records in possession of Professor Hanna, "I have to see very busy canvassing our place to see what inducements we can offer."

"In Mount Dora, Col. J. C. McDonald, Col. Alexander, Dr. Abraham Spofford, R. C. Tremain, and Rev. W. W. Winchester headed a movement which offered ten acres of land which they valued at \$10,000, \$5,000 cash and \$20,000 in pledges.

Orange City, another bidder, presented "big pine land with an extended view over Orange City." Nothing was said about cash. Winter Park possessed the advantage then as now of having a group of wealthy citizens who offered \$114,000. Dr. E. P. Hooker, in reference to this offer, wrote: "We are this week making up our proposals for the location of the Christian college here. If any town or city in the state shall bid higher than this young but enterprising community, it will do nobly." And, according to the decision, which was reached Apr. 17, 1885, none did more nobly than Winter Park.

But where are the old newspapers, letters, diaries, announcements, appeals, etc., which made up this significant chapter in the early beginning of higher education in Florida? Professor Hanna asks that all such records be given or loaned to Rollins College in order that the entire story of these pioneer days may be revealed.

14 Die As Storm Lashes California; Flood Cycle Seen

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 20. — (AP) — A storm from the ocean lashed at parts of the Pacific Coast yesterday causing 14 deaths, and Captain Thomas J. J. See, retired Navy mathematician, declared a cycle of severe floods was beginning.

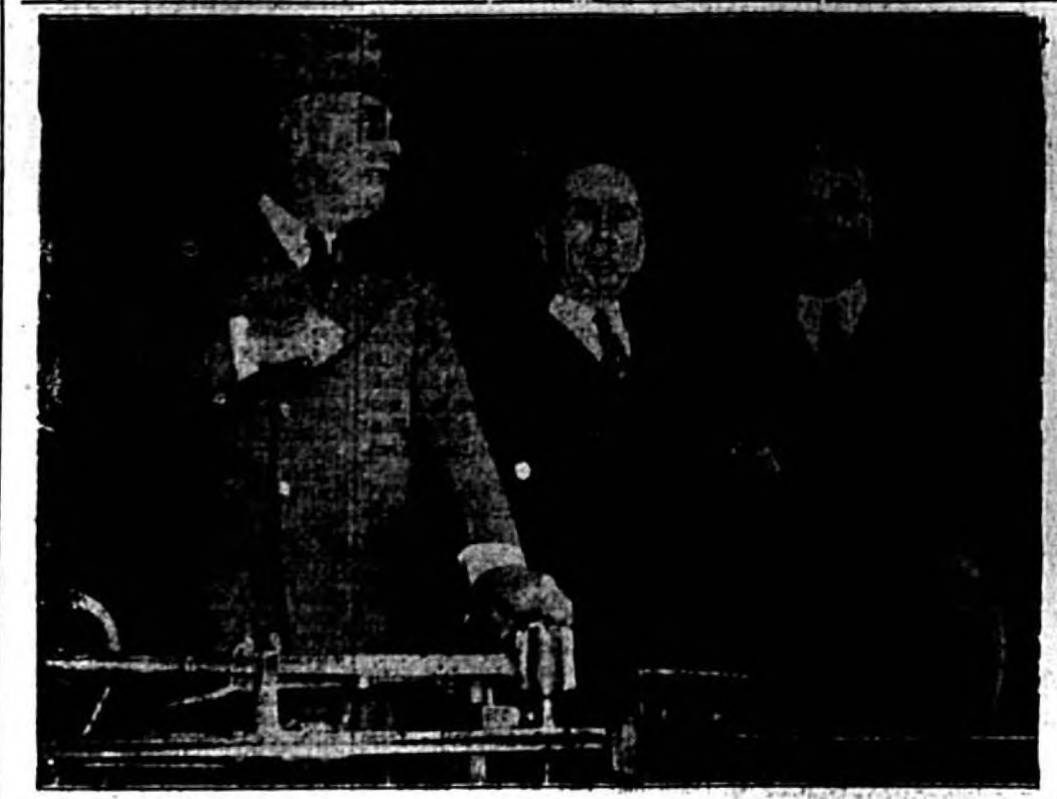
Captain See said he based his forecast for the ending of drouths and the beginning of floods on the increase of sunspots.

Snow and heavy rains were borne on blustering gales and the precipitation, causing slippery pavements, was blamed for five traffic deaths in the San Francisco Bay region and six at Los Angeles. Three men were drowned in the bay here when their fishing boat was swamped.

Captain See, explaining floods depend on the sunspots which chill the earth and act as rainmakers, forecast a cycle of storms and floods that declared he was confident "that 1935-36 and '37 will be good years and add to the comfort and relief of the whole world."

Captain See, whose researches on the direct radiation through the outer layers of the sun's globe have been carried on for 30 years, recently predicted the cycle of drouths of the last several years was drawing near its end.

Volusia Sheriff Warns Operators To Remove Slot Machines From County

DELAND, Nov. 20. — Sheriff Stone Friday sounded the death knell for operation of slot machines in Volusia county, pointing out they are subject to seizure under the supreme court's recent ruling in the Duval county case.

"Slot machines, which in addition to vending mints or other small articles of merchandise, throw out slugs, checks, pieces of metal or souvenirs, which have an intrinsic value, are looked upon as a gambling device in light of the court's decision," Sheriff Stone said.

"The machines must come out and stay out," he declared. The supreme court has ruled against them; the Governor wants the law enforced, and that's what I'm going to do," the sheriff said.

He directed attention to the second section of the court's decision that establishes the rule in this state. The court said such slot machines which throw out slugs, checks "is not, as a matter of law, such a nongambling device that a court of equity should undertake

to enjoin the sheriff or other officers of a county from seizing and holding such slot machine."

The sheriff did not indicate when he would take steps to remove all machines, except to say the machines had to be moved, "and moved at once." He gave a copy of the court's opinion which is quoted here, and called particular attention to the second section.

At the same time another move for co-operation was in progress

at a luncheon attended by the federal advisory council, which has been frequently and emphatically at odds with the Administration, and the federal reserve board, with which it also has had its differences.

The advisory council consists of 12 prominent bankers, one each from the 12 federal reserve districts. Its function is to gather at intervals in Washington bringing opinions and reports of conditions from the far corners of the country, and then formulate recommendations for the guidance of the reserve board and the Administration.

The foremost figure in the move for co-operation of business with President Roosevelt, Henry I. Harriman, president of the national chamber of commerce, is himself a foremost figure in the field of public utilities. He is chairman of the board of the New England Power Association and a director in numerous power companies.

Its view is that the utilities, far from being owned by a comparatively few individuals, have thousands of small stockholders scattered throughout the country whose economic status would be hurt should the government take over the power companies.

If any further reforms are to be made in the utilities field, or other fields of business, the chamber holds that the government should point out what it considers to be the abuses, and the businessmen will set about correcting them themselves. A case in point is the investigation of the financial setup of American Telephone and Telegraph recently ordered by the communications commission.

Those who follow the power issue closely, and have been equally interested in the effort at co-operation, noted yesterday that shares in industrial concerns were strong on yesterday's stock market, which they attributed to the general spirit of confidence now prevailing and the promised co-operation. Utilities shares were heavy, which they interpreted as a reflection from the President's speech.

LONG WANTS TO HEAD 3RD PARTY TICKET IN 1936

Huey Thinks He Will Run Against Roosevelt Next Campaign

HATON ROUGE, La., Nov. 20.—(AP)—Huey Long plans to run for the presidency in 1936 on a third party ticket.

He does not believe President Roosevelt's popularity can survive two more years and considers he will have a chance to win his way to the White House on an anti-Roosevelt platform. He does not even give serious consideration to the probability of the Republicans returning to power in '36.

He has not made a formal announcement of his ambitions but he is laying the ground work for his campaign and privately says he would make the kind of president this country needs.

Questioned about the third party angle and the failures of Theodore Roosevelt and Fighting Bob LaFollette, Huey, the kingfish, said: "Ah, that's nothing, times have changed. This new and young crop of voters want a government for the plain people. Why, the Republican party was a third party. When that was organized the Whig and Democratic parties were the main parties."

His immediate plans are to mould the State of Louisiana into a model of government, which he could show the people as an example of what he could do to the United States. His last amazing season of the legislature where he had 14 bills passed in less time than it would take to read the texts was just another move toward his presidential aspirations.

Long's political play is to the young voter.

"I don't care nothing about the old fogies and inowbars. I am for the plain, honest, thinking man and the generations that are coming on."

And he has succeeded in building up popularity with the youngsters. The student body of Louisiana State University, his particular pride and joy, are for him almost to a man. He believes that other college boys over the land feel the same way and they will vote in 1936.

"I have been the presidential tag, 'Huey the kingfish' has been slowly trying to turn into 'Senator Long of Louisiana.' At times his old friends hardly recognize their old blustering 'kingfish' when they look upon this dignified creature, who no longer drinks or smokes and talks about world and national affairs.

"Where is their hearty swash-bucler who at one time showed them how to practice practical politics like it had never been practiced before? They will ask each other but they don't ask him. They struggle to fit into the new picture but it is hard going for some of them.

They are on the water wagon. He says he has been for nearly a year. "A man is a fool to drink," he said. "I wouldn't take a drink for a million dollars. But I am not telling other people what they should do. I believe in state option but not national prohibition. I don't smoke because cigars give me hay fever."

\$25,000 Daily Grossed by Bean Growers Of Palm Beach County In Recent Weeks

PAHOKEE, Nov. 20.— Monetary returns to farmers of the Everglades section of Palm Beach county during the past week have averaged approximately \$25,000 daily, three-quarters of which represents profits above expenses of the crop.

Receipts in that amount have resulted from prices ranging above \$2.50 a hamper, some as high as \$3.18 and northern markets absorbing the approximate 700 car loads since the season opened the last week in October.

Good prices, expected to be some lower the latter part of the week, have enabled farmers with early fall crops to pay past due debts and farming expenses and with good prospects for net profits on following crops.

Financial conditions as compared to this time last fall are appreciably better as a whole although the bulk of the farming

population has not participated fully in the present favorable price condition. Enough farmers have been touched, however, that the territory has been greatly benefited and retail business is on the up-grade.

An instance, typical of the \$2.00 bean market, is that of a Belle Glade farmer who, with his first bean check from one car, was able to pay farming expenses on the balance of a 30-acre planting.

No "killings," favorite expression of a high-priced crop, have been made and farmers are not indulging in spending orgies this early in the season. Most of the money now coming in is going to pay notes on last year's crops or living expenses of the summer.

With approximately \$200,000 of new money sent into the territory for green snap beans already this season, financial conditions are expected to be considerably better than the season before.

MANY ENEMIES OF ROOSEVELT RETURN TO HOUSE

Voters Pay Little Attention To Rainey's Blacklist Of Party

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.— (AP)—Speaker Rainey's "black list" of Democrats who voted against the Administration may have brought results in the House, but a survey yesterday showed that voters by and large apparently paid little attention to it.

Out of the 279 late speakers listed as anti-Administration one or more times, 81 are missing in the new House. But two were elected to the Senate out of nine who sought to move up. Two others became congressmen and 16 did not choose to run.

Rainey's list was started last session when a number of these former regulars showed signs of getting out of line. When the compilation, most Administration proposals had a little smoother sailing.

In all, 21 House roll calls were tabulated at the speaker's orders. He kept the list available so that some other patronage dispenser telephoned figures as to how many times so and so lined up against the Administration and supplied immediately.

They were some protests, even speeches, but the list was up to date when the session closed. There also were dire "off the record" predictions from ultra regulars as to what would happen when constituents heard the results.

Voters did hear some of the results, but only 11 of the 279 blacklisted were actually defeated for reelection. Nine of those led before Republicans, 25 were beaten in the primaries by other Democrats.

The man recognized by all House Democrats as the "king" of anti-Administration men, had a close call, but he is coming back. If you got last session that when the name of representative Thompson (D-Calif.) was called, and he voted with Republicans, all leagues on his side of the House told him to move over with the G. O. P.

AUSTRIAN SEES WAR IN EUROPE INSIDE 3 MONTHS

Empty Treasuries Act As Brakes Now But Tension Tightening

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—(AP)—The hollow rattle of near-empty treasuries may yet rescue Europe from the threat of war, believes Julius Deutsch, leader of the socialist revolt in Austria last February, who is traveling in the United States.

But, said Deutsch last night, the chance is slender and the time is short—three months, if the world is lucky.

Chancellor Schuschnigg's conversations with Mussolini this week-end are but another thrust in the direction of war, he said. "And this is why:

"Two dictators have their eyes on Austria, both equally determined to dominate it. Hitler and Mussolini, if either of them wins it means war. For Mussolini cannot tolerate German military might on his northern border; nor, on the other hand, can Jugoslavia tolerate an Italian-controlled Austria on its northern border.

"Meanwhile, so long as neither Mussolini nor Hitler has definitely won the tug-of-war, the pit and tug of foreign rivalries and intrigues exerts on Austria's already tense internal situation a pressure likely at any moment to set off catastrophic explosions.

"There is only one way out. The powers must guarantee the neutrality of Austria and make it, like Switzerland, forbidden ground for German, Italian or any other foreign intrigue.

"But how can such a guarantee of Austria's neutrality as you suggest be achieved," the exiled socialist leader was asked, "when the events of this year have shown the difficulty of reaching any agreement involving Germany, Austria and Italy?"

"There is one hope," replied

the plump, middle-aged man from Vienna. "And that is in the empty pockets of Germany and Italy. Both Hitler and Mussolini are, as you would say in America, ' broke.' Neither can finance Austria. And Austria needs money.

"Soon Austria will have to have more money. But if the powers which have the money, Britain, France and the United States—refuse to assist any Austria except a neutral Austria, then the neutrality of Austria can be made a fact. The international struggle for control of our unhappy country will cease, and the greatest menace to peace will have been removed. But if the powers again are fooled into financing an Austrian government ready to fall into arms of Italy the outbreak of war on that side is inevitable—and before many months go by.

10 Bushels Of Beans Bring Grower \$3500

The 10 bushels were planted at the rate of about a bushel to the acre at which rate the yield averaged about 170 hamper to the acre the first picking.

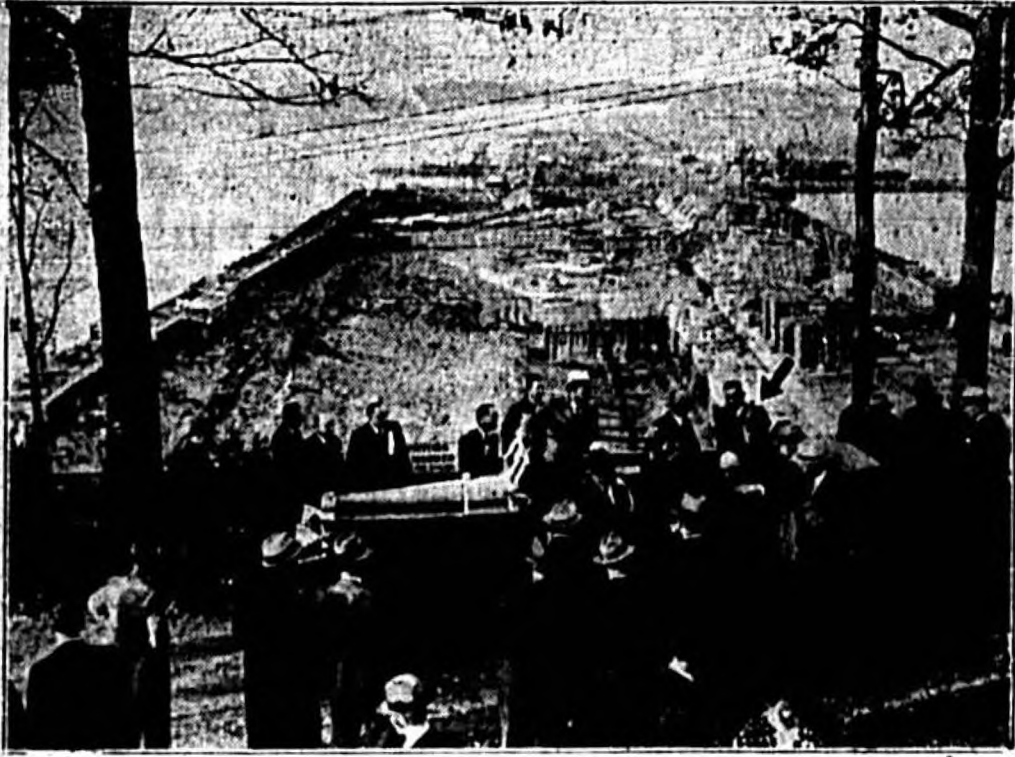

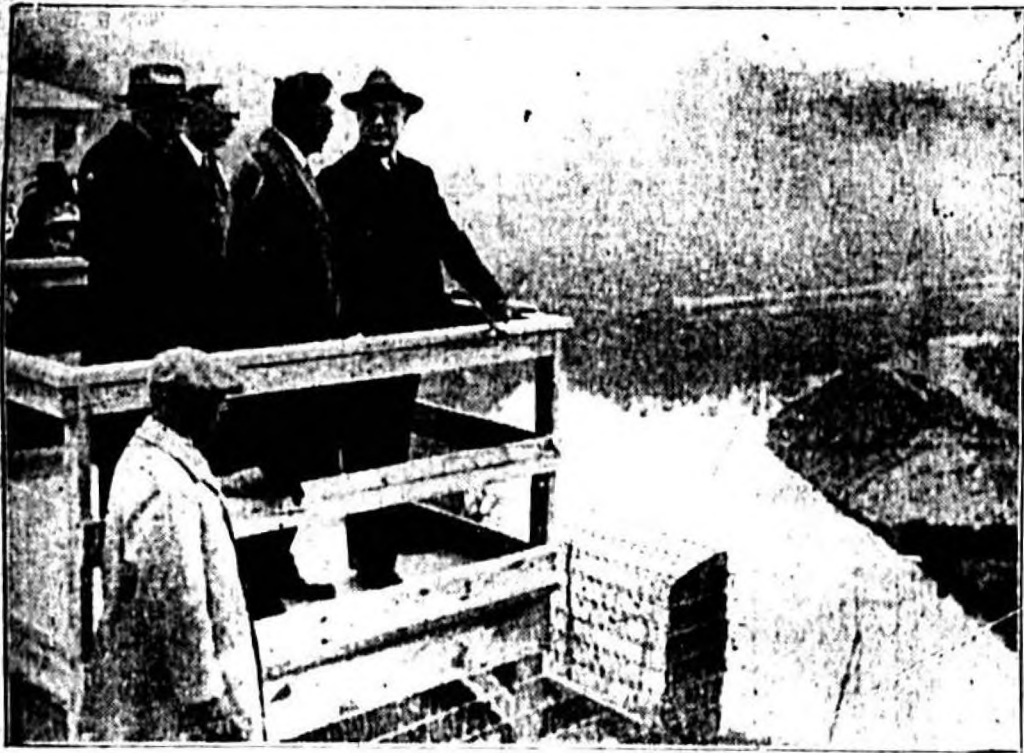

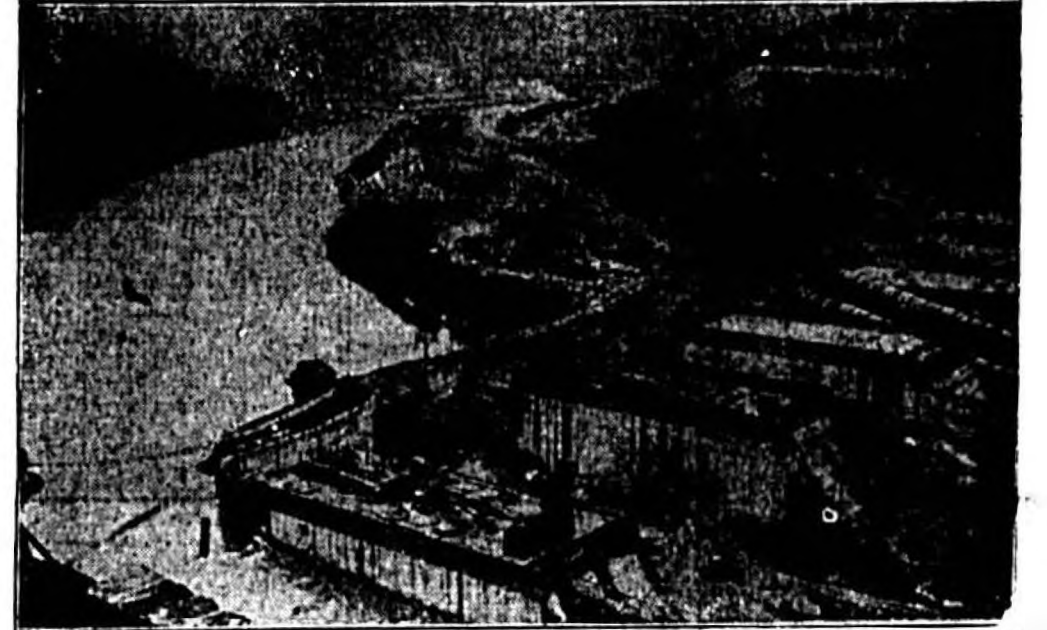

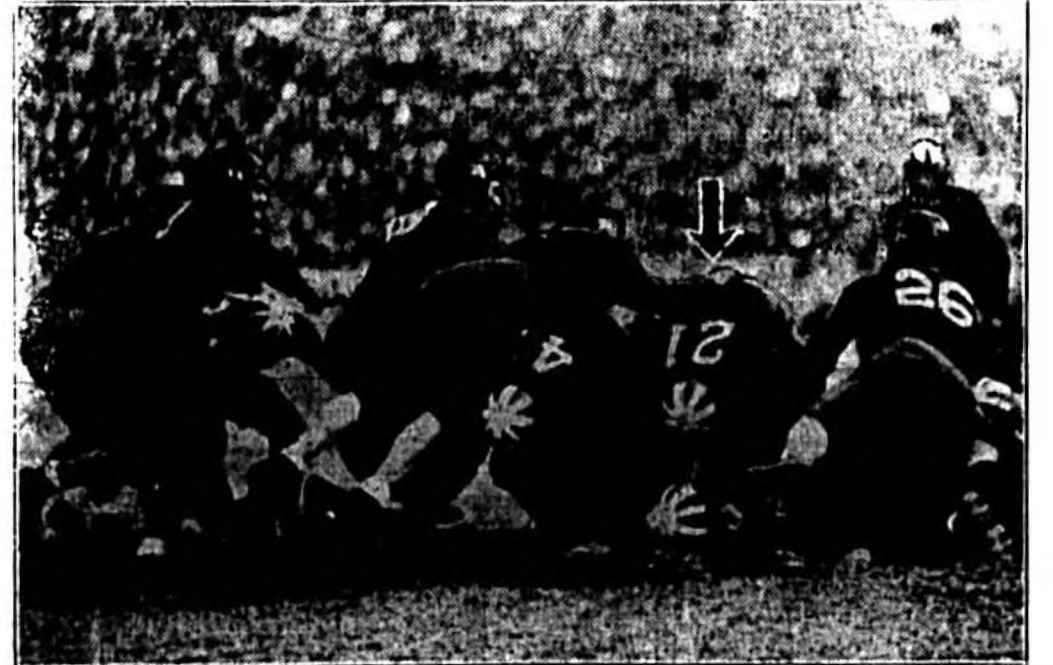

Dairymen Can Have Cows Tested Free For Serious Disease

Seminole County dairymen who wish to have their herds tested for Bang's disease should make their wishes known to County Agent C. E. Dawson. The test will be made free of charge and dairy animals found to have the disease will be condemned, slaughtered, and paid for by the government. At the same time a test will be made for Mastitis, an infectious udder disease, and payments will be made on the same basis as for Bang's disease. Both these diseases are incurable and the dairyman is fortunate in being able to be rid of such animals. Information gathered over a long period of years from three to 400,000 cows shows that animals affected with Bang's disease have brought a 25 1-3 to 50% lower production per cow as

a result of this disease. Therefore, he said, it is advisable to eliminate these cows at this time when grain prices are exceptionally high, with a good possibility of going much higher, while the dairymen get the bonus of free testing, plus the cash indemnity payments. The present prices of cows are undoubtedly lower than they would be six months or a year from now, he added. "For this reason," he said, "I think our dairymen can well afford to have the test made in this way and take advantage of the indemnity offered by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration, plus the free service for making the test. The length of time that the indemnity payments will be available for Seminole County dairymen is very uncertain."
