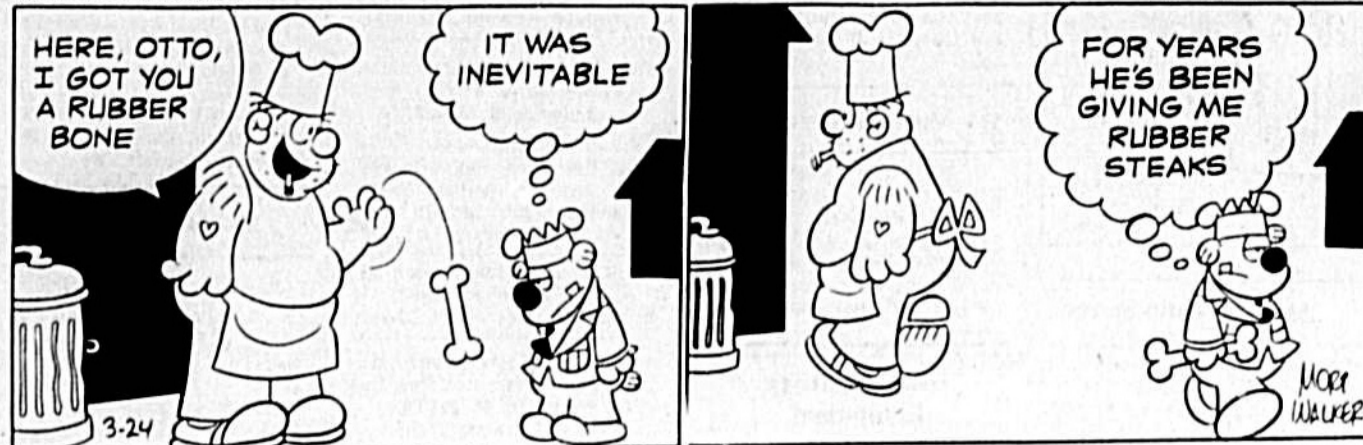

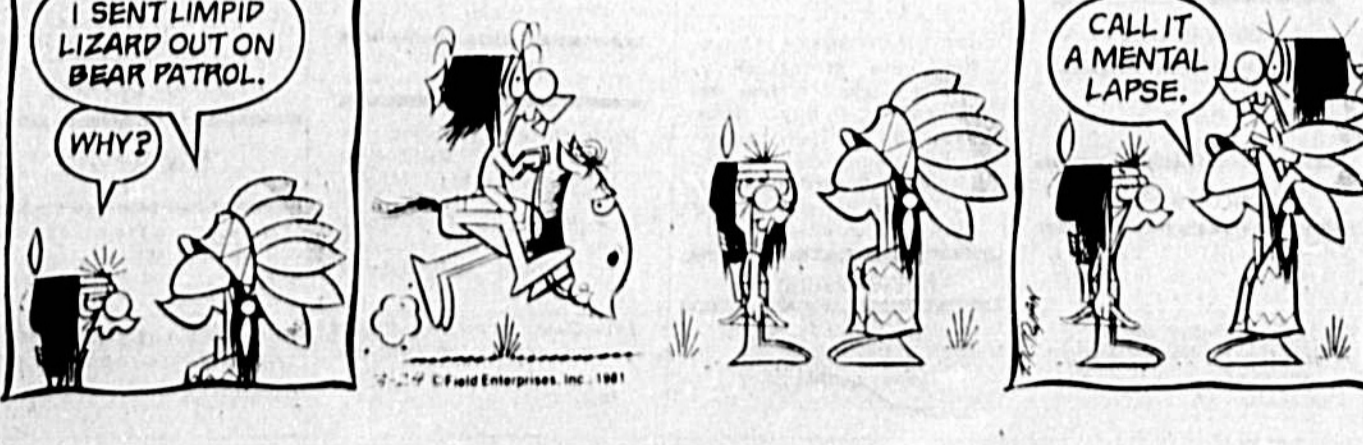

Panel Searching For Ways To Curb Alcohol, Drug Use

Responding to the results of a survey of drug abuse by Seminole County secondary students, about 200 parents and other interested persons gathered Tuesday night at the Sanford Civic Center to discuss possible solutions to the problem. School Superintendent Robert Hughes discussed results of the survey conducted anonymously and by random sample of 1,442 Seminole County students in grades 6-12 in February which asked about the students' drug habits.

The survey indicated alcohol is used by as much as 78 percent of 11th graders and that marijuana is used by as much as 47 percent of 10th graders.

'Suitable Rebuff' Task Troops See

BYDGOSZCZ, Poland (UPI) — The Solidarity union today warned of an "extremely dangerous situation" in Poland and told members to avoid provocations during their two nationwide strikes. Moscow said Polish troops were prepared to give "a suitable rebuff" to threats to the state.

Poland has mass food shortages and a \$2 billion foreign debt, and Communist Party leader Kania described the strike call as suicidal. "Who can encourage the countryside to strike, threaten farmers' strikes when there is a lack of food? Who has the courage to make a national situation that may lead from a local conflict to a national catastrophe?"

Eleanor Anderson, a veteran of nine years in county employ, officially became the director of the county's Office of Management, Analysis and Evaluation (OMAE) today. The office of director has been vacant since Jeff Eltinger resigned to become city manager of Altamonte Springs last October. The appointment of Mrs. Anderson was confirmed by county commissioners Tuesday night. Her salary in the new job is \$28,294 annually.

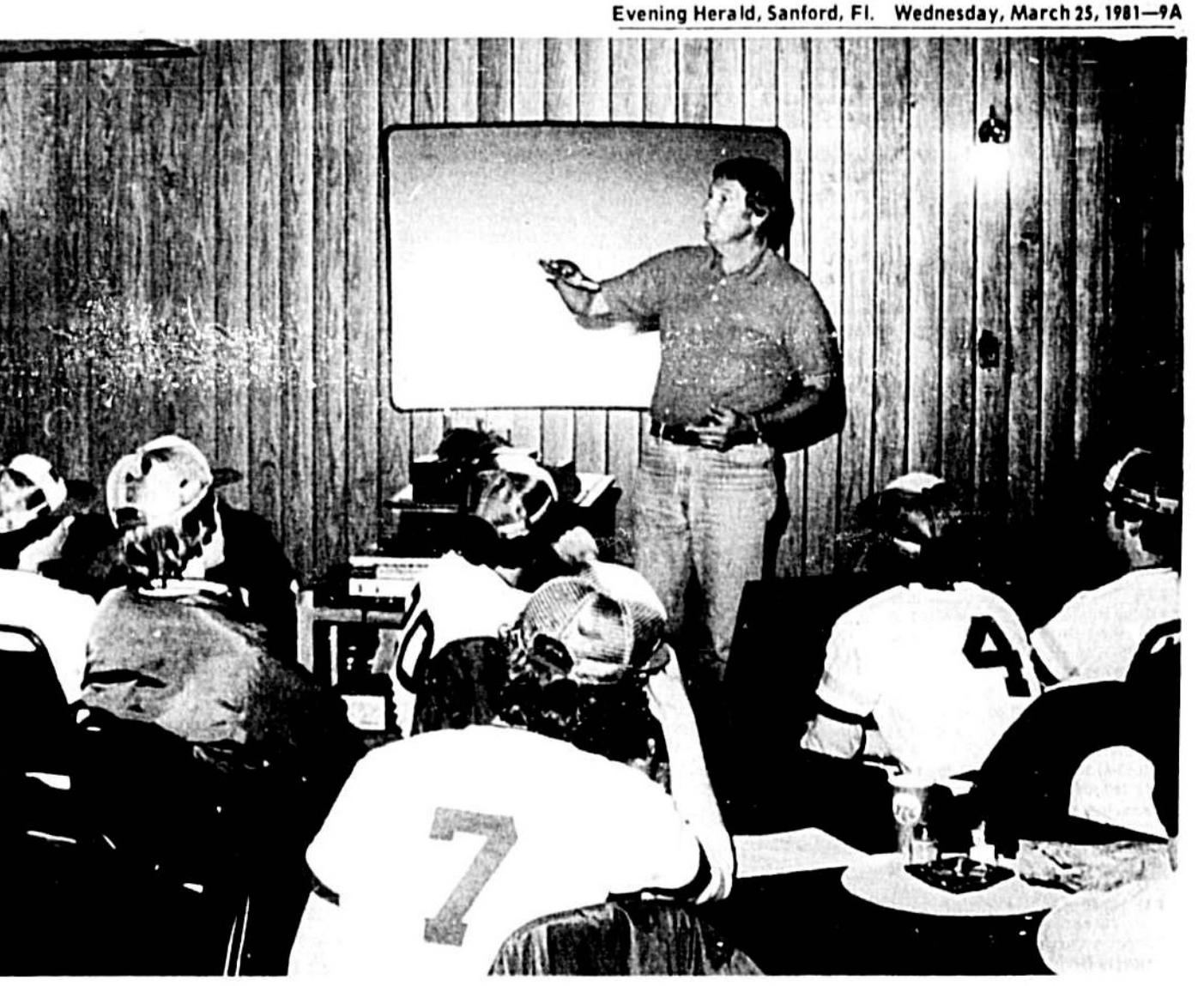

FJC's Robin Jower stretches to grab a throw which nips SCC's Bobby Manuel at first base in junior college softball action.

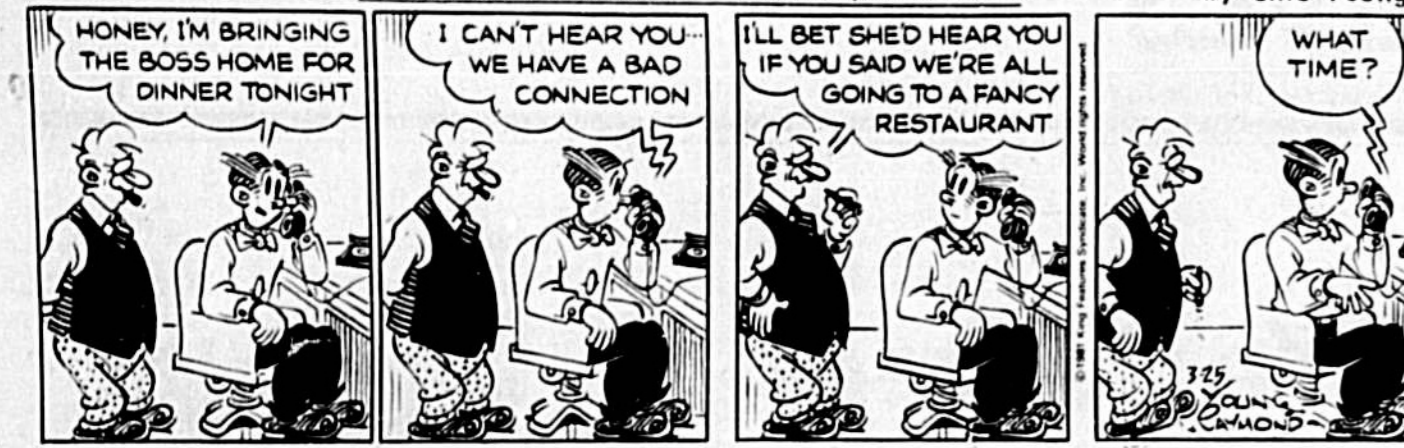

DEAR DR. LAMB — I am 43 years old and going through the change, with hot flashes and irregular periods. For a while my periods will be regular, then may skip a couple of months or may be several days late.

DEAR READER — I'm always surprised how many people do not fully understand such a vital basic function. Regardless of what you have heard, the most reliable date for ovulation is 14 days before your next menstruation, with a day or two before or after that magic date.

And even the 14 days before your next period is not an absolute certainty all the time. You can use graphs, temperature charts and other means to plot your cycle if you are regular.

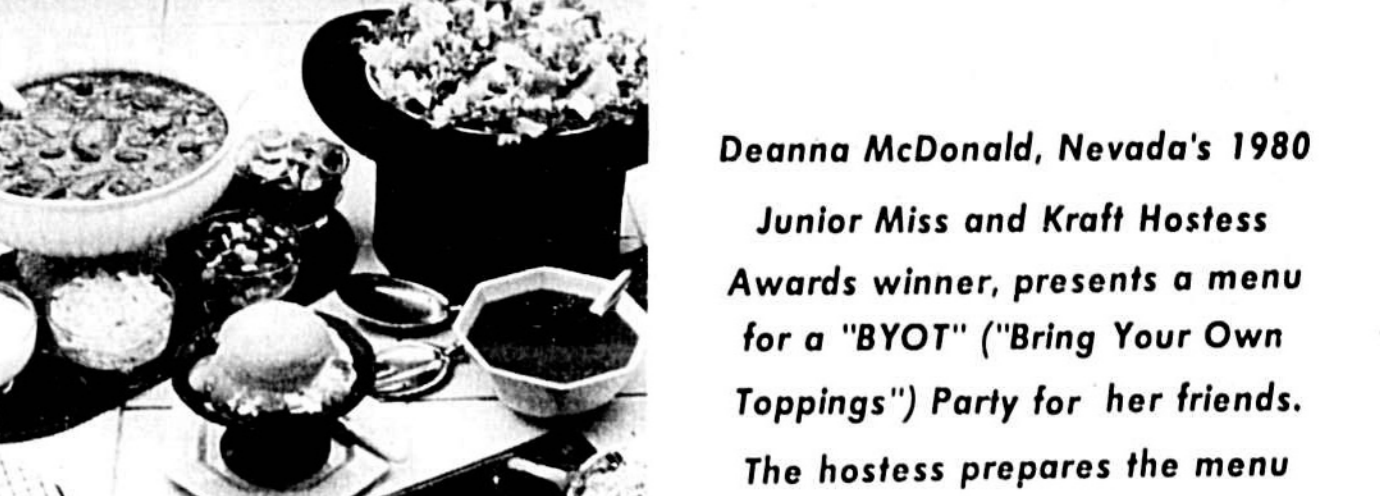

For base, heat oven to 350 degrees F. Combine all ingredients; mix until crumbly. Press about 3 cups of mixture into greased 13x9-inch baking pan. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 10 minutes; cool slightly.

For filling, combine all ingredients; blend well. Spread mixture to within 1/2 inch of edge of base. Sprinkle remaining base mixture over filling. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 25 to 30 minutes. Cool; refrigerate on bowl 1 hour or until firm. Cut in bars. Store, covered, in refrigerator. Makes 13x9 inch pan of bars.

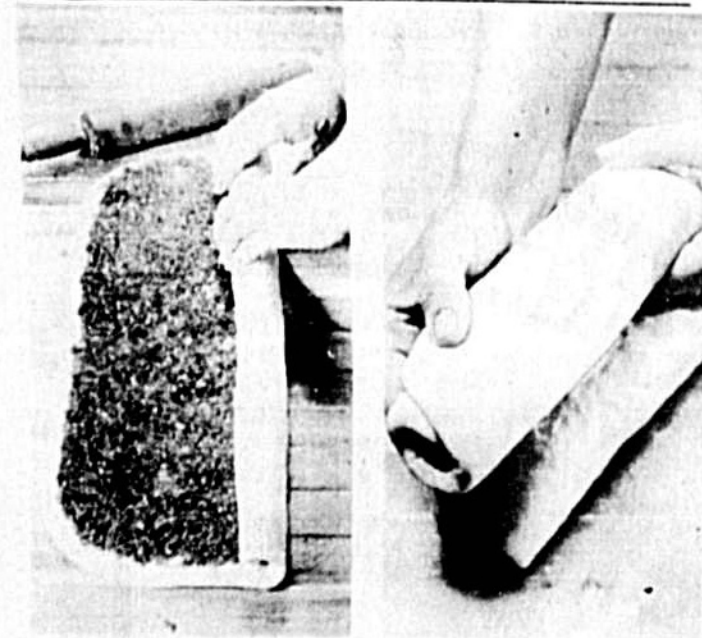

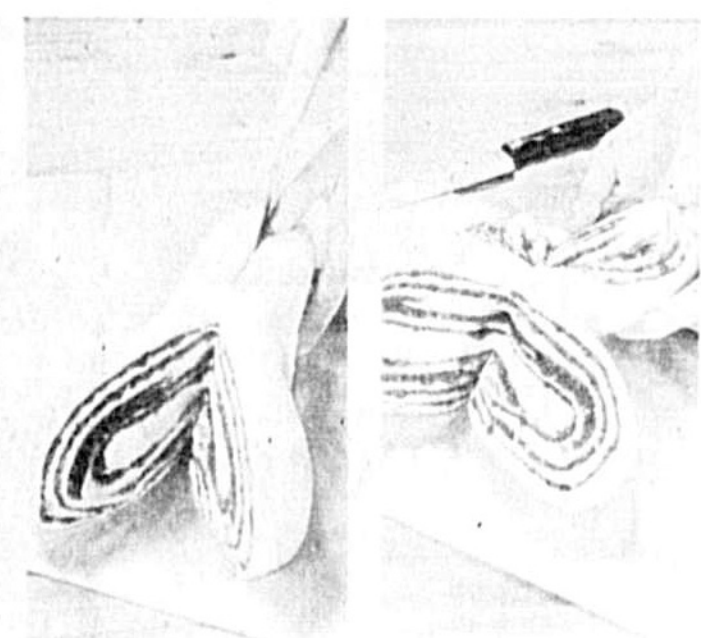

Springtime often inspires the spirit of sharing an informal meal with friends. Designed to make a company buffet luncheon or supper a breeze are Pork Strip Stroganoff and Blushing Pear Salad. The simple-to-make convenient-to-serve entree pairs pork and mushrooms in a wine-laced sour cream sauce. The pork strips can be cut with ease from blade steaks, an economical pork cut that is meaty, tender and flavorful.

Blushing Pear Salad is so simple to make, yet looks picture-perfect when served in individual dessert dishes. Unflavored gelatin is used to create a shimmering rose wine gel, the perfect complement to canned pear halves garnished with nutty cream cheese balls.

HAM EN CROUTE

- 5 to 8-pound canned ham
- 1 package (1 1/2 cups) hot roll mix
- 1 cup fine soft bread crumbs
- 2 jars (4 ounces each) pimiento, drained and chopped
- 1/2 cup chopped red olives
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 2 tablespoons prepared horseradish
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 tablespoon water
- Pickled Pear Garnish

Place ham on rack in an open roasting pan. Insert roast meat thermometer so the bulb is centered in the thickest part. Do not add water. Do not cover. Roast in a slow oven (325 deg. F.) until meat thermometer registers 130 deg. F. to 140 deg. F.

Allow approximately 15 to 18 minutes per pound. Let stand 15 minutes. Meanwhile prepare the hot roll mix according to package directions and the filling. For filling, combine bread crumbs, pimiento, red olives, onion and horseradish. Place ham on lightly greased jelly roll pan; spread filling over top, pressing lightly. Roll out dough on a lightly floured surface into a 16-inch square. Cut three 1/2x16-inch strips from one side; braid, cover and reserve.

Drain reserved dough over ham; mix to shape of meat. Trim off extra dough at bottom. Cut sides to sides of dough.

Place reserved bread lengthwise down center of ham. Combine egg with water; brush top, including braid, and sides with egg wash. Bake in moderate oven (350 deg. F.) 20 minutes or until crust is browned. Serve Pickled Pears with ham.

PICKLED PEAR GARNISH

- 1 can (29 ounces) Bartlett pear halves
- 1 cup sugar
- 2-3rd cup white vinegar
- 1/2 teaspoon finely sliced orange peel strips
- 8 whole allspice
- 6 whole cloves
- 1 cinnamon stick

Drain pears; reserve 1/2 cup syrup in a small saucepan. Add sugar, vinegar, orange peel, allspice, cloves and cinnamon stick; boil 5 minutes. Prepare the hot roll mix according to package directions and the filling. Add pears; return to rolling boil. Remove from heat. Cover and refrigerate overnight. Drain and use pears as garnish for ham. Yield: about 7 garnishes.

EASTER BLOSSOM PIE

- 1 envelope unflavored gelatin
- 6 tablespoons sugar
- 2 eggs, separated
- 1 cup milk
- 1/4 cup cream de menthe liqueur
- 24 chocolate wafers
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted
- 1 cup (1/2 pint) whipping or heavy cream, whipped

In medium saucepan, mix unflavored gelatin with 4 tablespoons sugar; blend in egg yolks beaten with milk. Let stand 1 minute. Stir over low heat until gelatin is completely dissolved, about 5 minutes; add liqueur. Pour into large bowl and chill, stirring occasionally, until mixture mounds slightly when dropped from spoon. Meanwhile, cut 1/4 inch from 11 wafers. Crush 1/4 inch pieces and remaining whole wafers; combine with butter. Press onto bottom of 9-inch plate. Stand out wafers, cut side down, against side of plate; chill. In medium bowl, beat egg whites until soft peaks form; gradually add remaining sugar and beat until stiff. Fold egg whites, then whipped cream into gelatin mixture. Turn into prepared crust and chill until firm. Garnish if desired, with additional whipped cream and mini chocolate chips. 8 servings.

PORK STRIP-STROGANOFF

- 3 pounds pork blade steaks, cut 3/4 inch thick
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 3/4 teaspoons white pepper
- 3 tablespoons cooking fat
- 1 large globe garlic, minced
- 1/2 teaspoon thyme leaves
- 1/2 cup water
- 1-3rd cup white or rose wine
- 2 cups sliced mushrooms
- 1/2 cup sliced green onions, including tops
- 1 jar (4 ounces) pimiento, cut in strips
- 1 cup dairy sour cream
- Cooked spinach noodles, if desired

Remove bones from pork steaks and cut meat into strips 1/2 inch wide and 3 inches long. Combine flour, salt and pepper; dredge pork strips and brown (1/2 at a time) in cooking fat in large frying-pan. Pour off drippings. Add garlic, thyme, water and wine to the meat. Cover tightly and cook slowly 30 minutes. Add mushrooms, onions and pimiento and continue cooking 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Stir in sour cream and serve with cooked spinach noodles, if desired. 8 servings.

BLUSHING PEAR SALAD

- 2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
- 2 1/2 cups rose wine or cranberry juice
- 1 can (29 ounces) Bartlett pear halves, drained (reserve syrup)
- Cream cheese
- Chopped walnuts

In medium bowl, sprinkle unflavored gelatin over 1/2 cup wine; let stand 1 minute. Mix reserved syrup with enough water to equal 1 1/2 cups and bring to a boil; add to bowl and stir until gelatin is completely dissolved. Stir in remaining wine. Pour into 8 dessert dishes and place one pear half, cut side up, in each dish; chill until set. Garnish with cream cheese balls rolled in walnuts. 8 servings.

Baking Gets Family Together

Families who enjoy coffeecakes and rolls may find that baking at home will save money during the year. Even more important, baking brings members of the family together as they share in the experience.

If it is a yeast dough, such as that required for a fig butterfly coffee cake, it's a job for the man in the family. Why? Formal and informal studies show that men like to make bread and those that need kneading get their special attention. Perhaps this activity allows them to work off their frustrations from the job and is a creative outlet.

FIG BUTTERFLY COFFEECAKE

- 3 1/2 to 3 3/4 cups unsifted flour
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 package active dry yeast
- 1-3rd cup milk
- 1/4 cup water
- 1/4 cup margarine
- 2 eggs

In a large bowl, combine 3/4 cup flour, sugar, salt and active dry yeast. Combine milk, water and margarine in saucepan. Heat over low heat until liquids are very warm (120 to 130 degrees F.). Margarine does not need to melt. Gradually add to dry ingredients and beat 2 minutes at medium speed of electric mixer, scraping bowl occasionally. Add eggs and 1/4 cup flour.

Beat at high speed 2 minutes, scraping bowl occasionally. Stir in enough additional flour to make a stiff dough. Turn out onto lightly floured board; knead until smooth and elastic, about 5 to 6 minutes. Place in greased bowl, turning to grease top. Cover, let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until double in bulk, about 1 hour.

Punch dough down; turn out onto lightly floured board. Roll out to an 18-by-12-inch rectangle. Spread fig filling (recipe below) over rectangle to within 1-inch of edges. Starting from long side, roll up like a jelly roll; pinch seam to seal. Place roll on a large greased baking sheet, seam side down. Cut roll in half lengthwise, starting at ends, leaving 2-inch uncut section in center. Turn cut sections filling side up. Placing roll in a vertical position, coil top 2 cut sections down in opposite directions, bringing ends to meet uncut center section. Coil bottom 2 sections up, bringing ends to meet uncut center section. Cover. Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until double in bulk, about 1 hour.

Bake at 325-degrees for 35 minutes, or until done. Remove from baking sheet and cool on wire rack. Decorate with confectioners' sugar frosting if desired. This kitchen-tested recipe makes 1 butterfly.

Fig Filling: In saucepan, combine 1 cup chopped dried figs, 1/4 cup firmly-packed brown sugar, 2-3rd cup water and 1 tablespoon lemon juice. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring. Continue cooking until mixture is thick enough to spread. Remove from heat; stir in 1/2 cup chopped pecans.

NATURE'S OWN DINNER LOAVES

- 3 1/2 to 4 1/4 cups unsifted white flour
- 1/2 cup yellow cornmeal
- 1/2 cup unsifted whole-wheat flour
- 1-3rd cup unsifted rye flour
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 4 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 cup margarine
- 1 1/2 cups warm water (105-115 degrees F.)
- 1 cup wheat germ
- Yellow cornmeal
- 1 egg white, slightly beaten
- 1 tablespoon water

Combine 2 cups white flour, 1/4 cup cornmeal, whole-wheat flour and rye flour. Scald milk; stir in sugar, salt and margarine. Cool to lukewarm. Measure warm water into large warm bowl. Add sprinkle in active dry yeast, stir until dissolved. Add lukewarm milk mixture and flour mixture; beat until smooth. Add wheat germ and enough additional white flour to make a stiff dough. Turn out onto lightly floured board; knead until smooth and elastic, about 8 to 10 minutes. Place dough in greased bowl, turning dough to grease top. Cover; let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 1/2 hours.

Punch dough down and turn out onto lightly floured board. Divide into 4 equal pieces. Shape each piece into a smooth round ball and place on greased baking sheets that have been sprinkled with cornmeal. Cover; let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 1/2 hours.

Bake at 400-degrees for 10 minutes. Combine egg white and 1 tablespoon water. Remove bread from oven and brush tops of loaves with egg white mixture. Return to oven and bake an additional 5 minutes or until done. Remove from baking sheets and cool on wire racks. This kitchen-tested recipe make 4 small round loaves.
