

Simplicity itself, the "Solar Heat Exchanger" is a series of black, thin plastic panels connected by black plastic pipes and mounted on the roof

of a house. The 4' x 8' panels, all hollow, are connected to the back yard swimming pool by two more pipes - one that takes water out of the pool with the help of the pool pump and up through the panels, and another that channels it back into the pool several degrees warmer. The heat-absorption principal of the black panels is so effective, its developers say, that the unit can bring the water in a pool to boiling hot temperatures if the water circulates through

Latest Auto Layoffs Raises Total To 178,000

Flat plastic units on roof absorb sun's heat, warming pool water that circulates

The auto industry has laid off more than 50,000 workers and the Pentagon has announced a shakeup that will eliminate 11,-600 civilian jobs at military installations. The nation's two largest steel producers also announced cutbacks Friday, blaming the coal strike.

The latest auto layoffs brought to 178,000 the number of blue-collar workers who will be out of work all or part of next month, but the cutbacks also extended to office personnel as sales continued to decline. Under union contracts, many employes will continue to

draw salaries during the layoffs. Ford Motor Co., the nation's second-largest auto maker, announced production cutbacks Friday that will idle 32,474 employes for one to five weeks between Thanksgiving and March 1. Earlier this month, Ford said it would lay off 3,000

white-collar workers next month. In other cutbacks announced Friday -Chrysler Corp. said it was laying off nearly 11,000 whitecollar workers - including engineers, designers and

clerical workers - for 5 weeks, starting Dec. 2. Chrysler, the nation's third-largest auto maker, announced earlier this week that it was shutting down five of its six U.S. plants and laying off 64,000 blue-collar workers. -American Motors Corp., the No. 4 automaker, said i will suspend production of the Gremlin and Hornet for five

days next month, idling 7,000 workers in Kenosha, Wis., and 1,000 in Brampten, Ont. -U.S. Steel, the nation's largest steelmaker, said the coal miners' strike has forced it to shut down more coke and iron production. More than 13,-000 of the company's 120,000 production workers have been laid off. -Bethlehem Steel Corp., the industry's No. 2 firm, said

In other economic developments Friday: -Amstar Corp., the nation's largest sugar refiner, boosted its prices again. Within hours, two other refiners had followed suit. Amstar's price hike averages about 75 cents a pound wholesale. The increase may be passed along to the consumer, depending upon local conditions

-First National City Bank of New York, the secondlargest commercial bank in the country, lowered its prime lending rate for the eighth straight day. The latest cut was from 10.25 per cent to 10 per cent. The prime rate, which is the interest banks charge their best corporate customers, often signals the lowering of rates which af-

TVA Plans Rate Increase

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) - A 20 per cent rate increase and authority to place quotas on electricity consumption will be announced by the Tennessee Valley Authority next week, according to sources close to the TVA. The rate increase and the quota plan were expected to be revealed to the seven-state agency's 160 power distributors Tuesday at Chattanooga. The quota system, sources said, will limit the use of power to different classes of customers with heavy penalties for exceeding quotas. The meeting was called to outline the TVA's plans to cope with an increasingly critical coal shortage caused mainly by the nationwide United Mine Workers strike. Officials said Friday the strike has forced TVA's 12 coal fired steam generating plants to dip into its coal stockpiles to the tune of 300,000 tons since the strike began Nov. 12.

Congressional Race Rerun

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) - A new election has been ordered in the photo-finish race between Democrat Jeff LaCaze and Republican Henson Moore for a Louisiana Congressional seat. State Dist. Judge Melvin A. Shortess said Friday that there were enough irregularities in the election to warrant throwing out its results. Shortess said the evidence indicated that LaCaze was deprived of an undetermined number of votes by a malfunctioning voting machine, but that it was impossible for the court to determine the will of the electorate. Mcore led by only 44 votes in unofficial returns in the 6th Congressional District election Nov. 5.

Rocky May Sell Oil Stock

WASHINGTON (AP) - Vice President-designate Nelson A. Rockefeller said he is considering selling all \$1.9 million of his oil stock in an effort to lay to rest any concern over potential conflict of interest. Rockefeller also agreed during testimony to the House Judiciary Committee to talk to his brothers and sisters about giving details of the entire Rockefeller family wealth to congressional confirmation committees. But the former New York governor said, as did several committee members, that unless he can establish public confidence in his integrity, any moves to insulate himself from his



Nuclear Curb 'Complex'

VLADIVOSTOK, U.S.S.R. (AP) - President Ford and Soviet leader Leonid I. Brezhnev, meeting for the first time, launched a round of talks on nuclear arms curbs today and postponed a scheduled dinner to plunge deeper into the complex issue. Deputy White House press secretary John Hushen said the two leaders were meeting far into the evening. He said they had taken but one 30minute break in talks that began soon after they arrived at a suburban resort area in mid afternoon. Ford took advantage of an indoor pool near the meeting site to take a 15-minute swim before going into the conference. Hushen reported the President swam four laps of the crawl, one of backstroke, two breast stroke and one "miscellaneous." "He holds the American record for Vladivostok," said the White House spokesman. Ford and Brezhnev opened their talks aboard a luxurious Siberian train today and an authorative Soviet commentator declared they had "a chance to settle problems - all problems."

Canada Limits U.S. Oil

OTTAWA (AP) - Canada has announced plans to reduce oil exports to the United States next year by up to 28 per cent and completely eliminate them by 1982. The plan was announced in a Friday night address to Parliament by Energy Minister Donald Macdonald. Macdonald said the 900,000 barrels a day now being exported to the United States - about 15 per cent of U.S. oil imports - would be reduced to 800,000 by Jan. 1, 1975. and be further cut to 650,000 in July if the main oilproducing provinces, Alberta and Saskatchewan, agree. Macdonald said the immediate purpose was to arrange for sufficient oil to be shipped to eastern Canada when the country's first east-west pipeline link is completed, while the long-term objective was to avert an oil shortage predicted for the next decade.

Palestinians Kill Passenger

TUNIS, Tunisia (AP) - Palestinian hijackers today killed one of 41 hostages aboard a captive VC10 British jetliner and threatened to shoot another if demands for release of imprisoned Palestinians were not met. The hijackers, angered at a false Tunisian government report that 13 Palestinian prisoners had been flown in from Cairo to meet one of their demands, shot the hostage in the open door of the plane and let the body drop to the ground. The Tunisian officials who admitted planting the false story said that in fact an official Palestine Liberation Organization deegation had arrived from Cairo in the early hours of the morning but brought only one of the 13

UN Head To Mid East

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) - U.N. Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim leaves tonight on a mission aimed at easing tension in the Middle East. A U.N. spokesman confirmed Waldheim's departure date but gave no details. Sources said he would make a quick trip to Syria, Israel and Egypt, probably returning by midweek for Security Council meetings on U.N. peacekeeping operations on the Israeli-Syrian front. The six-month mandate of the 1,200-man U.N. Disengagement Observer Force manning the Golan Heights buffer zone runs out at the end of next week.

FLORIDA IN BRIEF

Satellite Orbit Scheduled

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - British space scientists are optimistic that the firing of an engine aboard their Skynet 2 satellite will place it in a proper orbit Sunday, ending a string of recent failures. Launched by a Delta rocket, the military communications satellite reached a temporary orbit late Friday. Officials said the Sunday maneuver would place it in a stationary orbit 22,300 miles over the Indian Ocean "This satellite is very important," said Leonard Gray director of the Skynet program. "If this one fails, I fear the government will consider defense satellites too expensive for the United Kingdom."

Medicare Coverage Increased

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) - State Insurance Commissioner Thomas O'Malley says Blue Cross-Blue Shield has agreed to increase the coverage in its supplemental Medicare policies next year without increasing

The 250,000 Blue Cross-Blue Shield policy holders Florida will receive some economic relief as a result of the plan filed by the firm and approved by O'Malley, he said Friday in a news release. The supplemental policies cover the deductible items in the Medicare Part A coverage.

Pointless To Compare '46-'72 Buck

DON OAKLEY

A familiar and effective way of bringing home the nation's economic situation is to compare the value of the dollar with what it was in some other, presumably more prosperous, year. According to one recent analysis, for example

in the lifetime of half of all Americans-those born since 1946-the value of the dollar has shrunk by 60 cents. At this rate, the "1946 dollar" will be worth only 16 cents in another 28 years. To put it another way, to have the same purchasing power as today's "40-cent dollar," a personmaking \$7,200 today would have to earn \$18,000 in the year 2002. A \$30 pair of shoes will cost \$75. The average family's weekly food budget will rise from \$62 to \$152, and so on. It could happen sooner than 28 years if the present rate of inflation were to continue un-

The dollar would look even more minuscule, however, if we were to compare it with its 1939 unterpart, as we used to do back when inflation was a minor, and some thought a necessary and welcome, factor in the economy. But how many people would like to return to 1939? For all the ravages of inflation, most Americans are far better off than they were in 1939, or 1946 for that matter, the "40-cent dollar"

This is not to minimize inflation, which has grown to such dimensions that, as President Ford has warned, it threatens the future of all of us. It is merely to point out the fallacy of using the shrinking dollar as the only yardstick to measure where we have been and where we



And, sometimes the best intentions of municipal governments do the same thing.

Take for example, the case involving the City of Sanford and Mrs. W.B. Ellerbe. It was in March of 1950 that the then city manager of Sanford, Clifford McKibbin, directed a letter to Mrs. Ellerbe and her late

husband, who resided at 108 West 18th Street in Sanford. The Ellerbe's had constructed a frame home on the property some years prior to that. There was an alley easement at the rear of the property line. Since the City of Sanford did not use the alley easement the Ellerbe's did.

They first put in a lawn, then shrubs, later some citrus trees, and maintained it as a part of their back yard. Everything was life-style. And, in this busy day going along fine until they received the 1950 letter from City and age precious time and Manager McKibbin.

The letter advised Mr. and Mrs. Ellerbe that the City Commission had decided to open the alley so that refuse trucks and other city vehicles could utilize the easement as well as privately owned utility company trucks and the general public The letter also informed the Ellerbe's that the opening of the alley easement would be accomplished in about 20 days and the City would appreciate it if the Ellerbe's would remove their shrubs and citrus trees if they wanted to save them. The Ellerbe's did just that.

Well, it's been nearly 25 years since that letter was written and the Ellerbe's complied.

But the City never did open the alley. The area now is a jungle. There are weeds, reeds and grass, according to Mrs. Ellerbe and also City Manager Warren Knowles - following an inspection the other day, up to 30 feet in

Consequently, Mrs. Ellerbe decided that since it was apparent that the City was not going to utilize the easement she'd at least ask the City to clean up the jungle. The City has cleaned the area.

Further, the City has set a public hearing to vacate that portion of the alley easement. One half of the easement will become the property of Mrs. Ellerbe and the other half will go to other owners of property abutting that portion of the alley. Of course, the utility easement rights will remain in full force and Better late than never, I guess.


