

Sixth Amendment Upheld

Florida has the dubious distinction of being the state to force all states to open their eyes and read the Sixth Amendment of the Constitution as avidly as they have read the 10th Amendment.

States not only have rights not delegated to the union, as the 10th says, but they have responsibilities to see that rights protected by the union are observed in the states. One of those rights is to make sure that a man has counsel to assist him if he is to be tried, as the Sixth says.

A poor man in Florida was deprived of his liberty because he could not hire a lawyer to try to prove him innocent.

Clarence Earl Gideon of Bay County may be guilty of the charge of breaking and entering. However, he claims he is not guilty. He asked the trial lawyer for an attorney, and one was refused him. He was convicted and sent to prison. There he wrote the Supreme Court to attack the Florida law which provides only that a man may seek services of an attorney at public expense if he has been charged with a crime whose mandatory penalty on conviction is death.

The Court this week said the Sixth applies to all criminal cases.

Also knocked out as an impediment to justice was the refusal of states to furnish indigents with records of their trials to aid in an appeal. Emanating from Washington, the refusal was based on a law of that state which said such requests could be granted only if there was no show that the request was frivolous. In the case of two men sentenced for robbery to a 4 year term, the state Court there ruled that the request was frivolous because the evi-dence overwhelmingly said they were guilty.

As in Gidcon's case, these men may be guilty too. But the Sixth Amendment also says a man has a right to "compulsory process" in a criminal procedure against him, just as the state has.

This will have an effect on thousands of cases in the U.S., just as the ruling in the Florida case will have an enormous effect on thousands of cases in the great majority of states which do not provide a Public Defender.

All of it will be very costly.

It costs considerable money to provide transcripts of a trial, Lawyers include the costs of their fees when they defend their clients — if they have clients who can afford the fees. Now the state must stand the cost of these transcripts if a man can't afford to put it in any kind of fee he might be able to pay.

The other ruling is a step toward establishing the system in states of Public Defender in all cases - the Judicial Counsel of Florida is asking for such a system this year.

It costs enormous sums of money in the states to provide for Public Prosecutors, with their investigators, staffs and offices.

If, at last, we are ready to uphold the Sixth Amendment all the way, the prosecuting angle of justice's triangle of Court, prosecutor and defender will have to embrace the man who takes a paupers oath, and furnish him with means of defense.

With the state facing gigantic problems in broadening education, health services and other public demands, it is too had that we face this burden now - a burden we have avoided since the Sixth Amendment was incorporated in the Bill of Rights.

But the problem can't be ignored for lack of money. Justice is as the Constitution says it is, and it does-n't intimate that it is to be paid for by the public only to prosecute a man, but also to be paid for to defend him too.

This week's decision is to be questioned only in that it reads ... if the accused can not pay for it" into the Sixth Amendment. It says no such thing.
