Longwood Youths Kill Rattler



A huge six foot long rattlesnake was killed by three Longwood area boys Friday afternoon, near the orange grove adjacent to the Longdale subdivision. The "grand-daddy rattler" had 15 rattles and a button, was over six feet long and the boys reported that the snake was "bigger around than their two hands."

Bruce Carlson, Bill Ramsey and Steve Harmon, 14 year olds, saw half a dozen preschool children throwing sticks at something in a gully between the housing area and the orange grove and upon investigation saw that it was the rattlesnake. While Steve ran home to get a shotgun, the other boys succeeded in sending the small fry home, after warning them against "fooling around with snakes." The snake later tried to strike Bill Ramsey, but Bill killed him with two blasts from the shotgun, "just to make sure." Ramsey reported later that when he arrived home, he killed a 29 inch coral snake in his mother's greenhouse.

## Frederick Raps Bryant On Progress

More and better educational facilities are needed in Florida, it was agreed by Gordon V. Frederick and Jan Fortune when they campaigned before the Sanford-Seminole Jaycees Thursday noon at the Civic Center.

But the two candidates for the Legislature in Tuesday's election aimed their arguments from different angles.

Frederick, a former Representative and the Democratic candidate in this election, charged increased taxation will be necessary to give increased services in the state.

"To obtain quality education," Frederick stated, "we need quality teachers and to obtain quality teachers we must give them quality pay."

Frederick further charged that Governor Bryant "curtailed progress of Florida by two years by not asking for new taxes. Schools," he pointed out, "now receive 65 per cent of the tax dollars."

Queried from the audience, Frederick responded that "the easy way for the Legislature is to increase the sales tax. Such as, a full three per cent sales tax on new automobiles."

The attorney also argued that Florida's prison system should be modernized, telling that in one prison eight inmates are confined to an 8 x 8-foot cell. He told of needs to care for Florida's indigent patients.

Frederick said he "lost any ideas of halos when I first went to the Legislature. I can only promise to do my best to make my contribution to the state and county."

Fortune, the Republican candidate, on the other hand, attacked waste in governmental operations and stated he would oppose new taxes because "the Legislature should be more considerate in taking dollars from the taxpayer's pockets."

He explained that "where I work we try to get four missiles for the cost of three. Therefore, we should try to get four classrooms for the cost of three. We should be more conscientious in levying taxes."

Fortune proposed new schools on a sort of production-line basis, purchasing hardware and other furnishings in quantity lots for many schools rather than confining all purchases to an individual school.

"Loopholes must be closed," Fortune stated, "with no increase in taxes until we get dollar for dollar." He agreed teachers should have more pay.

Pointing to the fact he is a new resident of Seminole County, Fortune said that "one thing we need is to bring to the county a good two-party system, bringing better solutions and answers to the problems to be faced."



MACK CLEVELAND JR. 'Hits Apathy'

## Voter Apathy Strongly Hit By Cleveland

Unopposed State Senate candidate Mack Cleveland Jr. Thursday night strongly criticized past apathy at the polls and urged that Seminole County citizens "turn out in large numbers for next Tuesday's special legislative election."

Cleveland and other county legislative candidates with the exception of Republican Jan Fortune, appeared for the Bear Lake Community Club at a meeting attended by roughly 30 people. Others speaking were Legislator Joe Davis; Gordon Frederick, Democratic legislative candidate and Bob Fox who represented Fortune, Republican legislative candidate.

In opening remarks of the program Cleveland said that although he has no opposition this "will not lessen my desire to serve the county to the best of my ability."

"I will welcome any opportunity to discuss any question with you at any time, either on a state, county or local level," he added.

Davis, who said that he "came out more or less as an interested citizen" also emphasized that "the people must vote," adding that he, too, wants to hear from the people and will welcome all opinions.

Frederick, backing his campaign qualifications on past legislative experience and the fact that he is a Seminole County native whose "future is tied with the county's," pointed out that although there will have to be some tax raises on the state level, he will fight against any tax on food or medicine.

He said that although the easiest way to increase the income would be to impose additional sales tax, "there are many other sources of revenue," naming among them an increased tax on purchases of automobiles and on the state gambling businesses.

Fortune's prepared statement as read by Fox, stressed the importance of establishing a two-party system in the state and the fact that he "sees no need for tax increase."

"They're not organized at this time to efficiently reduce costs. Spending money can only be done by trained and qualified persons," the statement read.

# Full Steam Ahead To Get College Here

An "all-out drive" in efforts to obtain the proposed state university for Seminole County has been launched by the Chamber of Commerce.

This was the report this morning of Douglas Stenstrom, chairman of the Chamber's long range committee on education, who asked for countywide unification in the drive to have the new school placed "somewhere in Seminole County."

"Right now we simply are getting ready to make an all-out effort to obtain establishment of the proposed new state university," Stenstrom reported.

"The executive committee of the Chamber of Commerce met Thursday afternoon to discuss the proper procedure in making it known to the State Legislature and other state officers our interest in having the university in Seminole County."

The executive committee, President Francis Houmilt and the leadership of the Chamber are prepared to make an all-out effort on this project.

"We are discussing the matter with our State legislators; we are trying to obtain all information contained in the McDonald Report. We are securing counsel of experts in other areas, and we are preparing to try to mobilize support of the county government and the municipal governments."

## Incorporation OK, Lormann Claims

The incorporation of Fern Park was given a voice of approval by Longwood Mayor A. R. Lormann at a meeting of the City Council Thursday night.

Lormann said, "I think it would be a fine thing if Fern Park is incorporated and want it known that the City of Longwood has no quarrel with Fern Park."

In other business the council unanimously passed a resolution requesting the 1963 Legislature for passage of a special act requiring re-registration of all voters in Longwood and providing for voting by absentee ballot.

Copies of the resolution will go to Legislator Joe Davis for presentation to the Seminole County Legislative Delegation.

The request for a retail liquor license for the Longwood Hotel and Bar to William J. Lancaster was approved by a 4-1 vote with Councilman Carl Lommiller objecting "on general principles."

It was agreed to advertise for bids for resurfacing of Warren St. from W. Lake St. to a point approximately 300 feet west of W. Lake St. with bids to be submitted by 8 p.m. on April 18.

Purchases of badges for the Longwood Volunteer Fire Dept. and of 200 1963 dog tags were okayed and a motion was approved for the city to take steps towards the purchase of a new "city" seal.

A water rate increase and a part of an annexation plan were approved by Casselberry Town Council in continued session Thursday evening.

## Board To Get River Plans

Preliminary planning for the proposed St. Johns-Indian River waterway will be outlined to the State Board of Conservation Monday at Tallahassee.

Making the presentation at the session, called by Governor Bryant for conservation and planning, will be John Kridler and Harold Scott, chairman and engineer, respectively, of the St. Johns-Indian River Navigating Committee.

Kridler revealed today the committee, in session with Sen. Bernard Parrish and others last Wednesday at Tallahassee, was enlarged to include Volusia County.

He also stated Scott's firm, Reynolds, Smith and Hills, is exploring a proposed right-of-way for the canal, using aerial photographs of the East Central Florida Regional Planning Committee and other preliminary surveys.

Route of the canal being studied is from Lake Monroe to Lake Harney and then a short-cut directly across to the Indian River in the vicinity of Maytown. The study is for a 100-foot wide, nine-foot deep waterway, with locks 250 x 250 feet at each end and with side approaches

to permit individual boats to pass the locks.

"The aerial photos and the preliminary surveys," Kridler said "will permit us to pin down the cost element."

Harris Saxon, chairman of the Volusia County Commission, today named Steve Shindler and F. E. Watson, both of New Smyrna Beach to represent that county on the navigating committee.

They joined Kridler and John Brunley, Seminole; C. E. LeGette and Ransom Downes, Orange, and R. C. Brady and D. S. Nisbet, Brevard,

## Anti-Poll Tax OK Asked By JFK

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy sent telegrams to 23 governors today urging them to seek ratification of their State Legislatures of the Anti-Poll Tax Amendment to the Constitution this year.

Asserting that he hopes the amendment can be effective in the 1964 presidential elections the President said that "as of today, 24 State Legislatures have ratified the proposed amendment by virtually unanimous action."

"Because very few State Legislatures will meet in 1964," he added, "action by individual states now is essential if the proposed amendment is to be effective during the 1964 elections."

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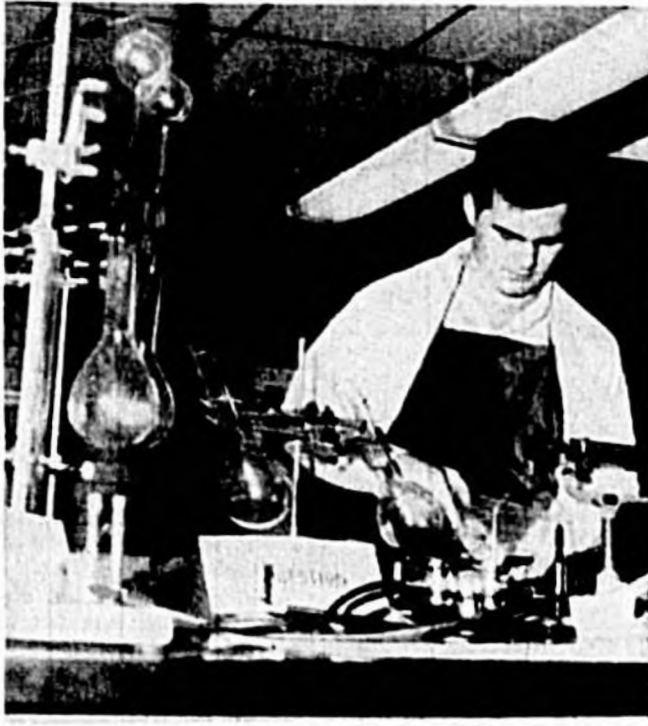

### Figures Asked

## Exemption Bill Proposed

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — State Rep. William O'Neill of Ocala proposed Thursday a bill requiring local tax assessors to furnish complete information to the state comptroller on the extent of home-land exemption.

O'Neill told the Legislative Council's Tax Committee, of which he is chairman, that the state legislature does not have sufficient information on which to plan a tax program.

He said he'd like to have figures on the total number of homes in each county totally exempt from taxation

under the \$5,000 constitutional exemption, the number that are partially exempt, and the cost to the taxpayer of granting the exemption.

The tax committee named O'Neill a one-man subcommittee to study the matter further. He said he'll meet shortly with the advisory committee of the State Tax Assessors Association.

Rep. James Sweeney of Volusia said that when the legislature talks about getting this type information it runs into "personal and political" problems.

He said tax assessors must

be persuaded that the legislature does not plan to use the information to hurt the individual assessor.

"We want to help them," he said.

O'Neill said it is costing other taxpayers money to grant tax exemptions to special classes.

He noted the cost of postage and clerical help in mailing out tax exemption notices to persons with homesteads totally exempt from taxation.

He proposed a statewide study between now and the 1965 session to find out the costs of granting exemptions.

### 4 Charged On Federal Warrants

TAMPA (UPI)—Four men, including one who was an unsuccessful candidate for the State Legislature, were free on bond today after being charged in federal warrants with making false statements to the Federal Housing Administration.

FBI agents arrested Tampa attorney William Thomas F. Fussell and Alex H. Roth of St. Petersburg Tuesday on warrants issued after a federal grand jury returned indictments against them in Miami March 5. Two other St. Petersburg men, Irving Green and Hyman Green, turned themselves in when they learned of the warrants against them.

### Congress Losing Budget Control

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senators agreed Tuesday that the Federal budget has become so huge and hard to understand that Congress is losing control of it.

Sen. Spessard Holland, (D-Fla.), said the House and Senate appropriations committees tend to overspend because of the "lack of detailed information" about the complicated annual national budget.

"We are digging ourselves into a hole," he said. "The best money we could spend would be on a joint committee on the budget."

Holland was one of several witnesses before the senate government operations committee to testify in support of reorganization legislation to set up a watchdog joint budget group to keep tabs on government spending 12 months a year.

### Starts Training

VERO BEACH, Fla. (UPI) — Pitcher Pete Richert, who had a 5-4 record with the Los Angeles Dodgers last season, is slated to begin training today after his release from the Army. Richert, 23, was discharged 45 days early from a six-month hitch under a seasonal occupation clause.

## Reds Having Woes In East

LONDON (UPI) — Things are not going well for the Kremlin in the Middle East, according to the major infiltration targets of Soviet strategy.

Having built up its influence in Iraq with considerable military and economic investments, Moscow is currently witnessing the fact that the new Iraq regime clamped down with severity on Communists and shot some of their leaders.

The new Syrian regime also has tightened its grip on Communists and is tracking them down.

After accepting quietly an anti-Communist policy of President Abdel Gamal Nasser in Egypt, Russia now finds things are getting out of hand.

This development has come at a time when Moscow has become ostensibly more sensitive to anti-Communist policies of the countries with whom it is doing business, for fear of Red China's reaction. One of Peking's arguments is that Russia is doing

too much business with the so-called bourgeois circles in developing countries and ignoring the proper revolutionary movements.

But there is a lot more at stake for the Kremlin in the Middle East presently than the future of the local Communist movements.

The Kremlin has been working hard to gain and to extend a foothold in the Middle East, it forced its way into the oil-rich and strategically important area by supplying Nasser with arms back in the late 1950s, to help undermine Western influence there.

But Nasser after accepting aid on a stable scale from the Russians clamped down on the Communists and outlawed the party. Moscow did not like it but swallowed the blow for the sake of political considerations.

But when Abdel Karim Kassem's revolution ousted King Feisal in Iraq the Kremlin at once approached the new regime in Baghdad and has since poured into Iraq large

quantities of modern arms and economic aid.



### Transfer Program Urged

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Lawyers from three Tennessee cities today urged the Supreme Court to approve a state program of racial transfers in public schools which Negroes claim perpetuates segregation.

The claim was made in earlier arguments by the Justice Department and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

Attorney Jack Petree, representing the Memphis school board, supported attorneys K. Harlan Hudson Jr. of Nashville and S. Frank Fowler of Knoxville in support of the program.

Other Southern states have comparable laws.

Radio-activity, engines, flying cars, chemical analysis of foodstuffs, how to grow crystals, hydroponic gardening, and the economy of bee colonies were among the top winners in the Science Fair held Thursday at Seminole High School.

Norman Leach's Biology experiment of using minute amounts of Strontium 90, Cesium-137 and Phosphorus-32 in the feeding of mice demonstrated the type of cancer induced by the various radio-active materials.

Bill Leffler used a maze of test-tubes, bottles and valves and hoses to determine the protein content of various cattle feeds and grain supplements, including hay and citrus pulp, by chemical analysis.

Bill Henderson, who placed first in Physics built a triple expansion engine, using as a model, an engine at the University of Florida, which though it was 95 percent efficient, cost much more to run than the 40 percent efficient engines now in use.

Steve Sewell and Ken Poff did an extensive and time-consuming display of how to grow crystals to take a second place medal in Chemistry.

Judi Taylor's study of a

bee colony, complete with observation hive, and drawings of the anatomy of a bee and charts showing the economy of the bee colony was awarded second place in Biology.

A homemade spectroscope by Chip Charon with accompanying charts and displays won him a second place medal in physics. The spectroscope breaks light down into colors of the spectra, and is used to study the planets.

A model of a fallout shelter complete with all the equipment and supplies needed for a two week stay, in miniature was built and exhibited by Geni Klinefelter and won her a third place medal in Physics.

Third place in chemistry went to Jimmy Thompson for his hydroponic, soil-less gardening experiment, using several different types of plants with water and certain chemicals.

Teaching a hamster how to find his way through a maze to the reward of food was the project of Sherrill Julian for which she took third place in Biology.

Biology Honorable Mentions went to Linda Spencer for her experiment in En-

cephalitis; Sharon Giles for her study of the effects of variables on the heartbeat of Mosquito Larvae; Ronnie Hall for his study of Glaucoma; Becky Hicker for her Influenza Inoculation Survey; William Young for his blood study; and Margaret Crane for her study of the Development of a Chicken Embryo.

Chemistry Honorable Mentions were won by Bill Stemper and Larry Sherwood for their study of crystals; Dwayne Clemmer and Vance Brumbaugh for their exhibit of the commercial process of soap-making; Dennis Brown for his exhibit of how to Electroplate Silver; and to Dale Alexander and Henry Finch for their exhibit of the Preparation of Gases by Electrolysis.

# Ex-Champ Near Death After Beating

## Three New World Champs After Triple Title Bouts

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Boxing has three new world champions today and one ex-champion Davey Moore, in a hospital with head injuries that threaten his life.

That's the harvest from the best triple-hitter fight show in a quarter century—a show in which Cubans Luis Rodriguez and Sugar Ramos became champions, along with Roberto Cruz of the Philippines.

It was 24-year-old Urtimino (Sugar) Ramos, a Cuban ex-ile, who wrestled the world featherweight 126-pound crown from 29-year-old Moore of Columbus, Ohio, on the 10th-round knockout that sent Davey to White Memorial Hospital.

There Dr. Phillip Vozel, a staff neurosurgeon, examined Moore and said "he is in a deep coma and his chances of living are poor."

That statement was made after a throat operation (tracheotomy) had been performed to assist the unconscious boxer's breathing.

Whether a brain operation will be necessary or of any use, the physicians at the hospital were not certain.

The Ramos-Moore fight was staged shortly after the star title bout in which Cuban Rodriguez, 26, took the welterweight (147-pound) title from slightly favored Emile Griffith of New York on an unanimous 15-round decision before a crowd of 26,112 pay-

ing fans at the Dodgers Baseball Stadium.

Griffith had won a split 10-round decision over Rodriguez in a non-title bout in 1960.

After the Ramos-Moore bout, 21-year-old Cruz of the Philippines won the vacant world junior welterweight (110-pound) title by knocking

## Wynn, Spahn Prove Plenty In Aging Arms

Warren Spahn and Early Wynn, who can be excused for eyeing the calendar carefully, picked the first day of spring to demonstrate their plenty of life in their aging arms.

And the results of their efforts Thursday probably will be that Spahn will pitch the opening game of the National League season for the Milwaukee Braves and Wynn will be carried by the Chicago White Sox at least long enough to achieve the 300th victory of his career.

Spahn, whose 18 victories last season increased his career total to 327, allowed only one run and three hits in seven innings as the Braves bowed to the New York Mets 2-1. Wynn, whose seven triumphs last season lifted his career mark to 299, went three innings and permitted just one run in the White Sox' 7-6 loss to the Cincinnati Reds.

Spahn, who will be 42 on April 23, thinks he'll again be able to take a regular starting turn and be good for 17 to 20 victories this year. He failed to make 20 last season for the first time since 1955.

Wynn was hit hard in early spring trials but now has turned in two consecutive strong three-inning stints. He was tagged for one hit — a homer by rookie Tommy Harper—Thursday. Only last Sunday he had pitched three scoreless innings against the Mets.

The Pittsburgh Pirates dealt the Minnesota Twins their fifth straight defeat, 3-4, in 10 innings, with Dick Schofield collecting four of their 12 hits.

Three-run homers by Wes Covington and Frank Torre came off 25-game winner Don Drysdale and enabled the Philadelphia Phillies to shade the Los Angeles Dodgers 8-7.

Al Kaline hit two homers and Norm Cash and Jake Wood also homered to lead the Detroit Tigers to an 11-1 romp over the Baltimore Orioles, who suffered their second loss in a row after 10 victories.

George Altman and Duke Carrel drove in two runs each with a single and a triple each as the St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Kansas City Athletics 6-1. Ray Sadecki limited the Athletics to one run in four innings and both he and Bob Gibson struck out five men in their stints.

## In Burnett's Own Words Probers To Hear Rigged Case

ATLANTA (UPI) — A state investigating committee early next week will listen to an Atlanta insurance man's story of a telephone call in which the 1962 Georgia-Alabama football game allegedly was rigged.

George P. Burnett will tell his story to assistant State Atty. Gen. George Therrell, named by Atty. Gen. Eugene

Cook to investigate Burnett's account of the alleged fix.

Burnett said he overheard former Georgia Athletic Director Wallace Butts give vital information on the Georgia team to Alabama coach Paul Bryant just before Alabama beat Georgia 25-0.

In another development, the Justice Department said a preliminary investigation indicated that no federal law was violated in the reported rigging case.

The Post Thursday declined to discuss the story on grounds there was a possible libel.

## Frustration — Problem To FHA

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Federal Housing Administration (FHA) is knee-deep in frustration trying to unravel what must be one of the more intriguing mysteries of our charge-account society.

It is studying the motivations that are supposed to figure in a person's decision to pay—or not to pay—his bills.

The FHA has been concerned lately about the rising rate of foreclosures, and thought that maybe its procedure for evaluating credit risks needs improving.

So the agency went back to

a four-year-old housing subdivision in Texas and studied the payment records of the occupants who had FHA-insured mortgages.

The study showed that the FHA had made a lot of wrong guesses. Quite a few homeowners who had looked like good credit risks four years ago were not living up to their records.

But the perplexing thing about it was that there didn't seem to be anything wrong with the standards the FHA had used originally in grading each person's credit potential.

For instance, the FHA places great stress on a person's past bill-paying record before it decides whether it wants to do business with him. If he has a history of delinquencies or defaults on department store charges, cleaning bills, rent, and

others, the assumption is that he will be just as undependable in mortgage payments.

The Texas study showed this standard seemed to stand up. Those who were behind in their mortgage payments at the time of the survey also were behind in other debt obligations.

The study did point out that some of the original credit reports were sketchy, suggesting this may have been one of the reasons the bad risks slipped through. The FHA promptly upgraded its specifications in this area.

The feeling now is that a case-by-case study of delinquencies—possibly by a sociologist or psychologist—might be the only way to shed more light on the problem.

The task of measuring a person's ability and willingness to pay is a much more difficult one for the FHA than for private business or other groups in our economy who do a big credit business.

The reason is that the FHA must hone its criteria down to a finer point. That's because the agency's primary responsibility is to make it easier for a person to buy a house.

To do this, it must pump out on as liberal terms as possible all the mortgage insurance that the traffic can bear.

The borderline in a standard such as this can be a fleeting, changeable thing, frequently requiring such hair-line measurements that there's bound to be a large margin of error.
