There is a possibility that five St. Augustine players face ineligibility to play organized baseball, and another man who played for the Saints earlier in the year faces a years suspension as a result of the alleged attack on Umpire Larry Lavelly which is said to have happened in DeLand on the night of Sept. 6.

The five players, whose names have not been published, have received a copy of a letter from Judge Bramham, which was sent to President Ernest Padgett of the Florida State League in which Bramham, it is reported to have said, that on the basis of reports received from Lavelly Umpire Spike Davis, he will be constrained to ban the five players from organized play.

Bramham indicated by his request that he wanted the full story of the incident and wished the players to submit any evidence in their favor in writing so that both sides of the case could be aired.

Both Lavelly and Davis have submitted affidavits to Judge Bramham stating that Lavelly was attacked during the playoff game between Sanford and St. Augustine in Sanford on the night of Sept. 6, and later in a DeLand eating establishment he was attacked by a man who had played for the Saints, but had been released.

As a result of the fracas, the St. Augustine players were suspended for one year.

Senator Pepper May Abandon O.P.A. Support

Says Price Controls Are Useless Without Support Of Public Opinion, Congress

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9, (AP)—Senator Claude Pepper today said he is seriously considering abandoning his support of price controls because the program does not seem to be working out. Pepper was one of the staunchest supporters in last summer's fight in the Senate for the agency's life. He issued this statement: "If price control is getting back like prohibition in its last days so that public opinion is not going to support effective price control and the Congress is not going to support it, we might just as well try to have it."

Pepper's statement advocating the junking of all price control was made as President Truman pressed his personal survey of the meat shortage.

New York's Democratic Senator James H. Watson, emerging from conference with White House, CPA and Agriculture Department officials—said he is hopeful that an emergency decision will be forthcoming very shortly which will help to relieve the meat shortage.

Political Wangle On Meat Shortage Continues Today

The controversy over the meat situation continued bitter today with more political charges and counter charges. Meanwhile, the shops continue to offer little or no meat. Most authorities agree that there is plenty of meat, but that it is getting on the ranges instead of showing up at the packing plants.

UNRRA Director General La Guardia denied that meat is going overseas in UNRRA cartons. He says the only meat going abroad from his organization is some canned horsemeat.

Incidentally, 38 Texas steers arrived in Flushing, New York, to temporarily solve the meat problem for 150 New Yorkers.

The president of the General Steel Products Corporation bought the steers and will have them butchered for distribution among his lucky employees.

Celestial Displays Slated For Tonight

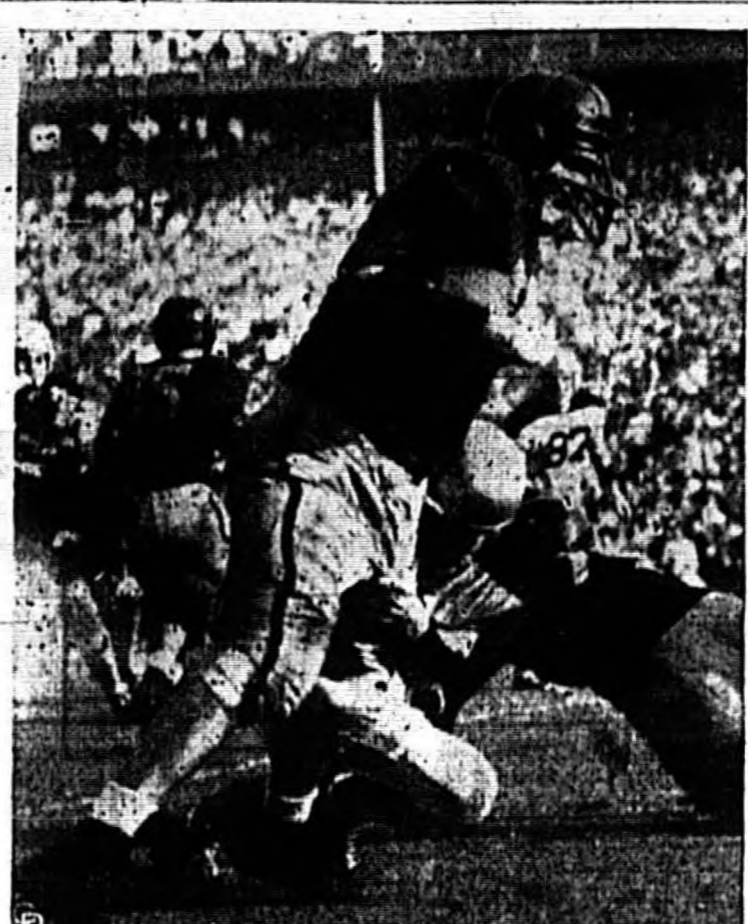

Declares Measure Is Undemocratic Way To Keep Adriatic Under Britain, U. S.

PARIS, Oct. 9, (AP)—Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov today condemned the Italian Peace treaty draft plan to create the free state of Trieste.

Molotov declared, in his first appearance before a plenary session of the Paris Peace Conference since his return from a recent visit to Moscow, that the plan was what he termed an "undemocratic" means of keeping the strategic Adriatic area under the control of the United States and Britain.

Molotov appealed, however, for conciliation between the Slav and non-Slav nations. He coupled this with a warning that the western nations must respect the rights and position of the slave states.

Molotov said: "An accord is possible among all to the extent nations do not attempt to impose their will on other nations."

The Soviet minister said, before a full meeting of the peace parley, that the statute adopted by the Italian commission on the Trieste issue, judged absolute power in a foreign governor. Under such a system, the Russian delegate added, the population of Trieste would be left disenfranchised under foreign troops.

Foreign Minister Molotov demanded that the conference transfer power in Trieste to a government elected by the popular assembly, similar to the pre-war government in Danzig.

Rep. Cox Calls On South To Put Its Own Welfare First

MACON, Ga., Oct. 9 (AP)—A Georgia Democrat, Representative Eugene Cox, today called upon the South to put its own welfare first and if necessary break with the Democratic party. In a speech before the Georgia State Democratic Convention, Cox declared that such a break should be made if the Democratic party continues its association with the CIO Political Action Committee.

Cox asserted that the marriage between government and the PAC must be dissolved if the country will be doomed.

Cox was the keynote speaker at the convention, called to rally the party and to elect a new Georgia Governor. He bitterly denounced outgoing Governor Ellis Arnold as a tool of those who would end state supremacy in the South.

Murray Urges CIO-Trainmen Merger Today

Labor Chief Says Groups Must Fight For Price Controls, & Tax Legislation

MIAMI BEACH, Oct. 10.—President Philip Murray of the CIO charged today that this nation has a hoarded stockpile of durable and non-durable goods worth \$37,000,000,000. The CIO chief said he believed the Commerce Department and the Civilian Production Administration should investigate the alleged goods hoarding to determine the reasons for it.

MIAMI BEACH, Oct. 10.—(AP)—CIO President Philip Murray today extended a formal invitation to the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen to join the Congress of Industrial Organizations. In an address to the convention of the independent trainmen, Murray urged them to merge forces with the CIO in a fight for price control and tax legislation to head off what he predicted would be a new depression.

The CIO chief asserted that his unions and the brotherhood long ago had recognized the value of political action. He urged that the two groups stand together against the development of a situation whereby the wage earners would be unable to buy their products.

Murray also upheld the position of the brotherhood in the railroad strike last May which ended only after President Truman proposed emergency anti-strike legislation. The President's action, he asserted, had threatened to spend \$2,500,000,000 of union funds to help support the CIO's Executive in the event that Mr. Truman runs again.

Murray assailed the A. F. of L. following a fuddy-duddy leadership along the path of the CIO, and stating, "me too, wait for baby."

Sanford Citizens View Big Celestial Display Last Night

Meteors, hundreds of them, slipped southward last night through the atmosphere, and ended their careers in brief, brilliant bursts of multi-colored flame in one of the most interesting celestial fireworks displays ever seen by local residents, who stood on street corners peering upward. The meteors started flashing at about minute intervals at 10:00 o'clock last evening, as forecast by astronomers, who say that the comet Giacobini-Zinner, the head of which passed by eight days ago about 24 million miles away, switched at the end of its tail which was only about 131,000 miles away or half the distance to the moon.

The meteors, of meteorites little orphans following in the wake of the comet, appeared to be heading southward for the most part. The moon did its best to outshine the meteors.

A meteorite is a meteor that has entered the earth's atmosphere and, being intensely heated by impact with the air, is partially consumed before reaching the ground. It is seen at night as a ball of fire, frequently leaving a brilliant trail of incandescent gas behind it. Some meteorites are as big as 10 times more massive than iron ones; in the latter the metal forming more than 90 percent of the mass.

Eight Airlines Seek New Route In State

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The Civil Aeronautics board has been advised by eight airlines seeking to establish new routes in Florida that they will be prepared for hearings within 90 days.

A special date for opening of the hearings will be set later by the board. The board examiner, F. M. Rabler, warned that all intervention petitions, including those of cities, must be filed within ten days.

Seven of the applicants propose feeder-type lines, while National Airlines is asking new steps on its already established routes.

Airline Halts Air Service To Middle Europe

Pan-American Takes Action In Compliance With US Order

LONDON, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The Pan-American Airways today announced that it has suspended all service to middle Europe. The announcement was made after receipt of a United States military order forbidding flights over Czechoslovakia or Russian-controlled territory in Hungary, Romania and Austria.

The official Pan-American announcement said that until further clarification of the situation, all Pan-American services to middle Europe will be halted in Brussels.

The statement said that a Pan-American clipper from Prague to Vienna had been turned back yesterday by United States military orders. The orders said that no civilian or military aircraft would be permitted to fly over Czech territory or Russian-controlled territory in Hungary or Romania from Oct. 9 to Oct. 14. The order banning flights over Russian occupied territory in German and Austria is effective until further notice.

Prisoners Make One Run, Also One Error

LANSING, Kans., Oct. 10.—(AP)—Kansas State Prison Warden Robert Hudspeth was out for a drive last night near the prison at Lansing.

As he drove along, Hudspeth was hailed by two hitchhikers. The warden stopped and Edward Moler and Harold Malicot got in.

Recognition was mutual and instant. Hudspeth greeted the men and they greeted him—and he took them back to the prison and placed them in maximum security cells.

Young Harper, a former Marine, died last Saturday on the way to Broward General Hospital after allegedly being stabbed by R. L. Miller, 54, a hog farmer. The killing occurred near Miller's farm southwest of Pompano.

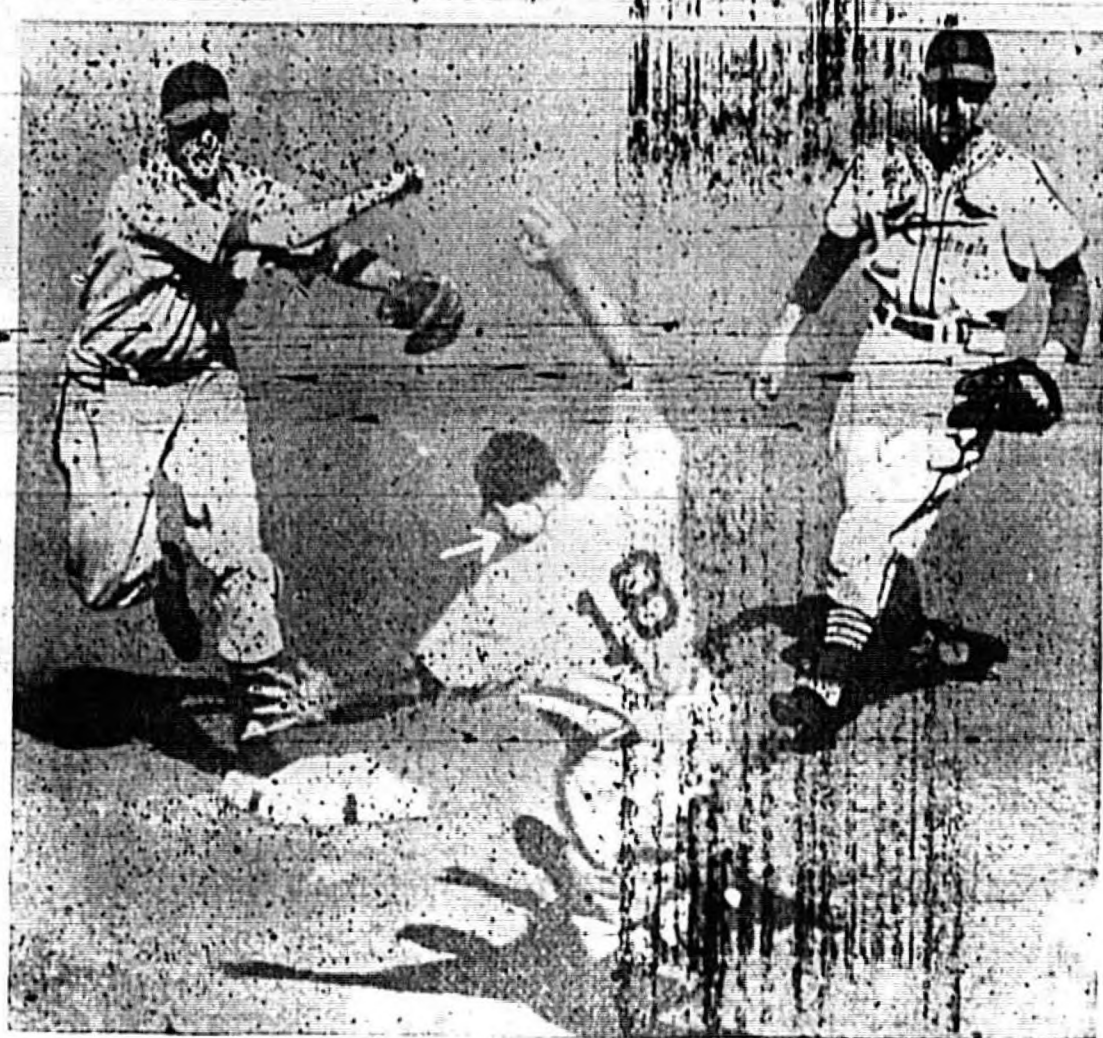
WRECKED PLANE LOCATED

Labor Problems To Be Discussed By F.V.C. Group

Committee Schedules Meeting For Orlando On Oct. 17-18

ORLANDO, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Labor problems of the Florida vegetable industry will be the subject of a meeting to be held in Orlando Oct. 17-18. The meeting has been called by Dixon Pearce of Miami, chairman of the labor committee of the Florida Vegetable Growers' Association.

According to Pearce, the purpose of the meeting is two-fold. First, to discuss the labor needs of the Florida producers for the 1947 crop season and to make plans for supplying them.

Second, to act on a proposed national program for migratory workers. Foreign labor will be available to supplement domestic workers. This will be necessary, Pearce said, because many growers said while farm and grove labor demands will be heavier this season, the potential supply of domestic migratory labor will be smaller, due to the fact that the prewar migration schedules were broken up, and the facilities for recruiting and routing domestic workers to areas where needed are inadequate.

Reports will also be made to the labor committees on the recommendations formulated recently by a national conference on migratory farm labor in Washington. The program committee of the conference unanimously proposed a plan under which the state and federal governments would cooperate with farm groups in increasing the available supply of agricultural workers.

As chairman of the tomato division of the F.V.C., Pearce has called a meeting of the division and of all tomato growers and shippers in the state, to begin at 1:00 P. M. Oct. 17, prior to the labor conference. The basic problems of Florida tomato growers will be the subject of the afternoon session, according to LaMonte Graw, manager of the F.V.C.

Hull Shows Slight Improvement Today

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Former Secretary of State Cordell Hull is disclosed today to have shown slight, but definite improvement. The announcement was released at the Bethesda Md. Naval Hospital, just outside of Washington, where the retired cabinet officer has been in a critical condition since Sept. 17. The hospital announcement said that Mr. Hull rested well during the night.

One of the men, Roy Burgess, a Hialeah taxi driver is being detained by St. Augustine authorities where he is wanted on a larceny charge, Stuart said.

The other three, according to Capt. Stuart, were riding in the taxi with Burgess and are being held at the request of Broward county authorities who are sending a representative to St. Augustine to question the men.

Stuart reveals that a 32 caliber pistol was found in the taxi, and from questioning it was learned that the men came from Broward county right before last Sheriff Walter P. Clark of Broward county told Stuart that a 32 caliber pistol was used in the slaying which occurred yesterday.

Missing Youths Are Located This Morning

Two eleven year old boys, who disappeared yesterday afternoon after attending Sanford Grammar School in the morning, have been located, according to Principal Steele, and are back home.

\$25,000,000 Credit To Greece Is Announced

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The State Department announced today a \$25,000,000 credit to Greece for the purchase of surplus United States Army material overseas. The announcement followed informal discussions among British and American diplomats three weeks ago during the Greek civil war crisis.

These diplomats reached the conclusion that the United States would back the present Greek government with substantial economic assistance. A similar decision is said to have been made in the case of Turkey, whose rejection of Moscow's latest demands on the Dardanelles have the support of the United States and Britain.

STILWELL SAID CRITICAL

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Doctors at the Letterman General Hospital in San Francisco have placed General Joseph Stilwell's name on the critical list. The Sixth Army commander, a veteran of the Asiatic war, is suffering from liver ailment believed to have been contracted during his campaign against the Japanese in the Burma jungles.
