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Timberland Drops In Total Acreage

LAFAYETTE, Ind. (UPI)— Unless U. S. forest lands are better managed in the future than they are now, this country may have trouble meeting its timber needs, says a Purdue University forester.

Population increases, more reservoirs and highways and land urbanization are combining to reduce the amount of commercial forest land, three-quarters of which is privately owned.

Most of the trouble, said the forestry expert, is that forests are not supporting as many trees as they should. Some areas, he said, have less than 10 per cent of the trees they are capable of maintaining.

Republicans Plan Election Strategy

CHICAGO (UPI)—The high command of the Republican Party is meeting here to persuade itself that the GOP can win back control of Congress this year—and then figure out how to do the job.

To pull it off, the Republicans must first what has appeared to be a Democratic trend in the two years since President Eisenhower won reelection by a landslide without bringing in a GOP Congress with him. They must also buck history, which has shown that the party in control of the White House normally loses congressional seats in mid-term elections.

Must Reverse Trend
To reverse this trend the GOP is trying to develop issues on a local and national basis, rally support for Eisenhower and stress the importance of nominating "attractive" candidates. However successful these approaches might be, many GOP leaders would count it a moral victory if they could hold their own.

All 400 House seats and 34 of the 96 Senate seats are at stake this fall. Ratification of Alaskan statehood would mean one more House member and two more Senators.

While the GOP needs to show a net gain of 21 House seats and only one Senate seat to its present membership, the Senate job looks tougher.

Of the 34 seats outside Alaska, 24 are now held by Republicans and 10 by Democrats. Six are "safe" Democratic seats in the South. Of the remaining seven, all except Sen. Williams Proxmire (D-Wis.) managed to win in 1952 when Eisenhower was carrying their states in the presidential vote.

Of the 21 Republican seats, about a dozen are considered in the tossup class. If the Democrats win half of these, even if Proxmire loses, they still would show a net gain of five.

Democratic Hopes
The Democrats claim the seat of Sen. Charles E. Fawcett of Michigan already is theirs, and the Republicans admit it has them worried. Elsewhere, the Democrats believe their chances are better than even to displace Republican senators in Connecticut, Pennsylvania, California, Mary-

Eisenhowers Plan Another Vacation In Rhode Island

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President and Mrs. Eisenhower plan tentatively to fly to Newport, R.I. Thursday or Friday for their vacation, the White House said today. They vacationed at the same site last fall.

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said he had no idea how long the vacation would last. He said that depended on domestic and foreign developments.

The Eisenhowers will live in quarters at Port Adams across Newport harbor from naval base headquarters on Coasters Harbor Island. The residence is about two miles from the golf course.

Last year, the President and first lady lived in the quarters of the base commandant across the bay.

The President's vacation at Newport last year was marred by the Little Rock school dispute.

On one occasion, he conferred with Gov. Orval E. Faubus of Arkansas on the situation but failed to head off the violence that ensued. Another time, he flew from Newport to Washington to make a nationwide television address on the controversy.

He was suspended for billing the county for work that records did not substantiate.

ALGERS (UPI) — The lucky wife and children of Methodist missionary Lester E. Griffith Jr., who vanished in rebel-infested territory a week ago, today received a glimmer of hope for his safe return.

"We are praying for him, all of us," said his wife, the former Edith Thompson, of Mason, Ohio. "I am confident he will be back soon."

Griffith, 31, is the son of Mrs. L. H. Griffith of Cleveland, Ohio. He was captured last Monday while straggling alone through the Grand Kabylie hills to his temporary mission post at Les Quadras, 70 miles east of Algiers.

The following day French troops found his French-built station wagon, which was burned. There were no bullet holes in the vehicle and no signs of violence at the scene.

"We have been working in Algeria since July 1955," said Mrs. Griffith. "This is the first incident involving my husband."

The theory is that my husband was known to everybody, French or Muslim, in the region. He was captured by the rebels and is working under guard in one of their field hospitals.

He is untrained as a doctor, but he does know "first aid."

He is a big man, six feet four, with blonde hair and blue eyes. He wears glasses. People could not miss a mile off.

Mrs. Griffith and two of her three children, Ernest, 10, and Valerie, 11, were at a summer camp near Algiers, and Eric, 3, is with his mother.

Prophecy Could Come True; U. S. Could Find Man In Moon Is Red

A famous rocket scientist is supposed to have replied, when asked what he thought the U.S. lunar explorers would find on reaching the moon, "Russians." This wry prophecy may yet come true. At any rate, the story points up the fact that at this stage the big question is: 'Who will be first?'

There is another question of far greater long-range importance: What shall man do when he gets to the moon? There are two basic, though not mutually exclusive, alternatives. The moon could be used for military observations and the launching of missiles. The moon could also be used for scientific purposes, notably as a site for astronomical observations with a clearer view than the earth affords.

The whole question may seem a bit impractical at the moment, when no one has even succeeded in hurling a rocket beyond the pull of gravity. But one of these days a moon shot will succeed. After that, men will be near the verge of journeying to the moon. By then the question will be far from academic.

If the moon is thought of mainly as a potential military base, competition to arrive first will take on the perilous flavor of international hostility. But if scientific uses are kept uppermost in our minds, there is a chance of cooperative action, or at least of a more amicable rivalry.

Our approach to this question is a mat-

ter for decision by the President, acting on the best advice—both civilian and military, let it be emphasized—available to him. And if Mr. Eisenhower should decide to suggest to the world that exploration beyond the earth is a matter over which the United Nations should exercise guidance and some control, that might go down in history as a statesmanlike word spoken at the beginning of the space age.

Accidents On Good Roads

It is said that the classic American automobile accident is a crash on a straight stretch of dry road when visibility and weather conditions are ideal. The point was emphasized by the smashup which recently took seven lives at an open intersection near Portage, Wis.

The road was dry, the weather was good; it was said that "you couldn't find an intersection with better visibility in the whole Midwest." Yet three cars piled up in a rending crash that killed seven of their occupants.

The precise reasons for that accident are less important, now, than the general conclusion to be drawn from it. When driving, there is no substitute for vigilance, caution, and a constant awareness that another driver may not do exactly what you expect him to do. The sense of security brought on by fine weather and a clear road ahead can be not only false, but fatal.

Communism's Followers

Too many Americans have accepted the cliché that the hungry masses of the world are demanding economic betterment, and that if they do not get this quickly from the United States they will support Communism, revolt, and line up with the Soviet bloc. This is a crude simplification of the notion of "billy Communism."

The fact is that in a number of the under-industrialized new nations the appeal of Communism is stronger among the educated and the half educated than it is among the masses of the uneducated and the illiterate. The educated and semi-educated are the sponsors of Communism in the under-industrialized world. And many of them are looking toward Moscow rather than the West for reasons of personal power, and because of irrational attitudes. The future stability of the world depends on the effort to develop the under-industrialized countries, but this effort is not the sole answer to Communism.

It is not merely privation which turns men to Communism. Many men with full bellies are for Moscow. We need to stop believing in clichés, lest we go down to defeat in bewilderment and ignorance, not ever knowing why we lost.

Atomic Submarine Nautilus: A Lady

ABOARD THE U.S.S. NAUTILUS (UPI)—She's a lady.

That's the best possible description for the world's first atomic-powered ship, the submarine Nautilus. After a seven-day, record-breaking voyage from Portland, England, to New York, it's hard to say a bad word about her.

The Nautilus docked at Portland Aug. 12 after making the first voyage under the North Pole. And she was given the hero's welcome she deserved for the fabulous journey across the top of the world.

Shortly before the sub was scheduled to sail for the United States Aug. 18, three berths were opened up for the press. Which service would represent television, photos and writing was chosen by the flip of a coin. United Press-Movietone won the television spot and decided to try to get cameraman Raymond Ziesse in from the Middle East where he had been covering the current crisis in Beirut, Baghdad and Amman.

Just in time Associated Press won the photo berth and sent British cameraman Leslie Priest. UPI won the news slot and sent me for the trip. By military and commercial plans UPI managed to get Zeisse into London late the afternoon of Aug. 17. A UPI car picked him up at the airport with his tickets and equipment and then made a wild dash to the train station, picking me up on the way. We managed to catch the last train to Portland with a full two minutes to spare. It was raining and cold when we arrived at the Nautilus five hours later.

The next day was hectic. We were out of bed at 0715 for breakfast. Then came some early morning television interviews, a last chance to talk to my London office and file a story. Finally, the last of the British press, British Admiralty and visitors from all over were herded off the sub. A dockside band struck up with Yankee Doodle and the atomic-powered screws of the Nautilus set her into motion. A few last shouts and waves from the dock and we were headed to sea.

"Take Her Down"
For about two hours we stayed on the surface, heading for deep

water. It was a smooth sea and the Nautilus—well known for her stomach-churning roll and pitch on the surface—kept moving right along.

At the last moment we went into the control room. There were a couple of squawks from the Klaxon and Skipper William R. Anderson said "take her down."

All of a sudden the Nautilus was quiet. It was like being tied up at dock again.

From then until we surfaced outside New York on the run setting a new submarine speed record crossing the Atlantic we moved fast. The Nautilus has an announced speed of "over 20 knots" and we averaged just about that on the trip across, or under.

Make Meek Attack
To sharpen up the Nautilus at-

tack technique Anderson made a mock attack on a passing ship. The ship—which never knew we were within 100 miles—would have been at the bottom of the sea without knowing what hit her if it had been for real. But Anderson made certain she didn't know and took care not to alarm her if she suddenly found out we were around.

No matter how many other subs come along or whether they overshadow the Nautilus with their speed and size, she'll go into history.

She's a lady—the first lady.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The world's richest nation has finally made sure that never again will an ex-president have to live off the charity of relatives.

President Eisenhower signed into law Monday a bill granting an annual \$25,000 pension to all present and future ex-presidents. The bill also grants an annual \$10,000 pension to the widows of ex-presidents.

Besides the pensions, ex-presidents also get office space, unlimited free mailing privileges and an office staff that could earn up to \$50,000.

Pensions for ex-presidents have been a long time coming. Nearly 150 years to be exact.

House Democratic Leader John W. McCormack said in pressing for action on the bill that congressmen kept the public treasury tightly closed while George Washington and Thomas Jefferson lived out their lives as "land - poor country squires."

He said James Monroe had to live off "the charity of relatives."

In his old age, James Madison had to mortgage away much of his estate, and Gen. Ulysses S. Grant had to write his memoirs to provide for himself while suffering from cancer.

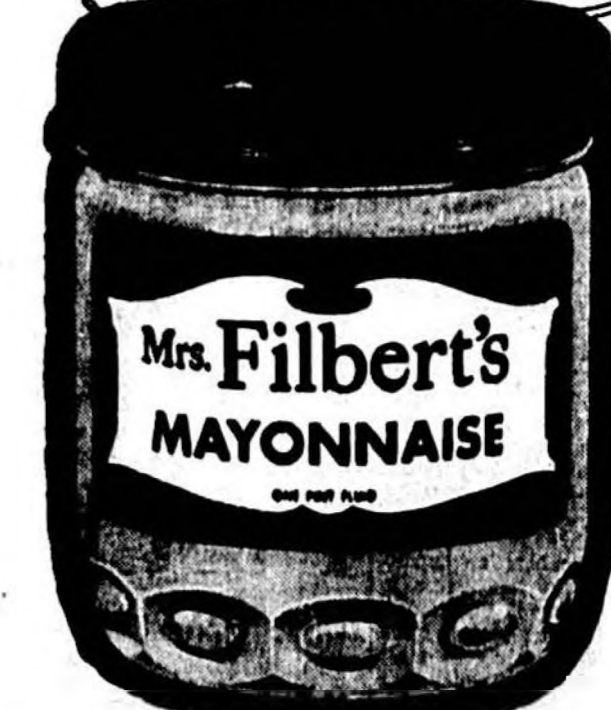

Try Kabobs Next Family Cook Out

There is almost no limit to the variety you can achieve in making kabobs—food on a stick. A green stick happened to a point does the trick for cooking. Forks with handles that extend are available at hardware stores or special skewers may also be purchased.

Your choice may be almost anything: meat, fish, poultry, fruit, vegetables, alone or in combination. For a simple kabob, place 1 1/2 - 2 inch cubes of meat, and slices of potatoes and onion on a stick; cook over fire until done. A very hot fire is best. The distance you place the kabobs from the coals will depend on what type of foods you are preparing and how done you want them to be. You may wish to rotate the skewer so that the meat can brown on all sides.

Miss Mauerman's decorating philosophy includes staying away from what she called the ordinary colors, such as navy, maroon and dark brown. She feels that the more subtle the color, the more exciting and useful it is in the home.

She also tries to avoid over use of the neutrals—such as beige or "greige," which is a combina-

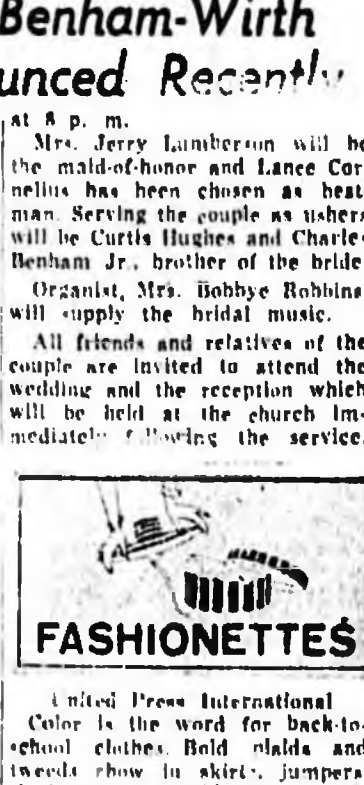

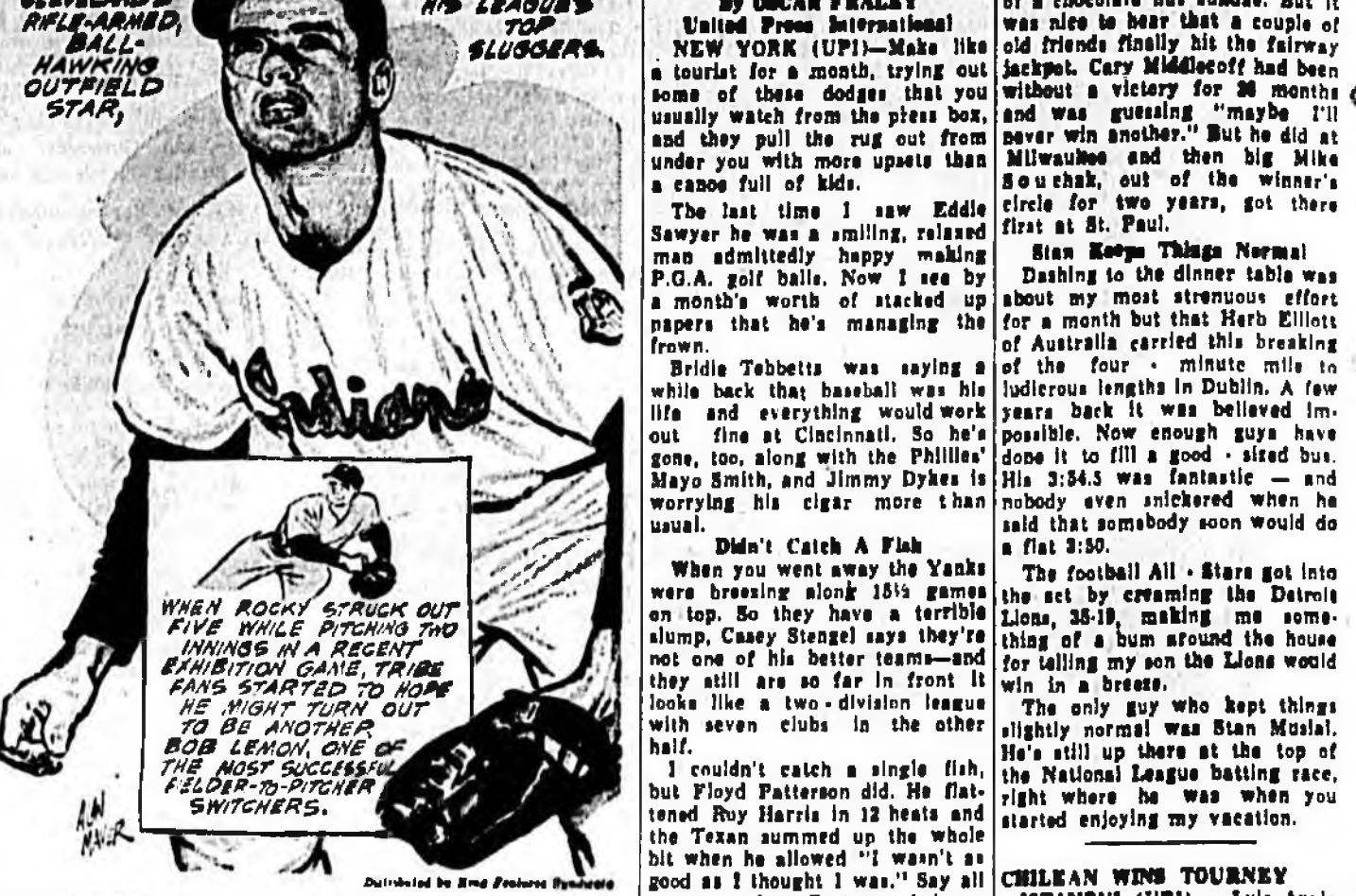

WASHINGTON—(UPI)—Capital Airlines' Viscount 280 has more troubles in one day than the average airliner encounters in a year.

Viscount 280 loses engines with grim regularity. She gets fire warnings at least 12 times a week. She seldom completes a trip without suffering various electrical, hydraulic or mechanical failures. She dotes on thunderstorms, thrives on malfunctions and welcomes the worst flying weather possible.

But 280 is a brain, not a plane. She is Capital's half-million-dollar "flight simulator"—a giant computer that acts like a real airplane, with a cockpit identical to that of a real Viscount.

Simulators are used by all major U. S. airlines. Capital's pilots dubbed this one "280" because the airplane's real Viscount fleet is numbered starting with ship 281.

The purposes of 280 are to sharpen and refresh pilots on instrument flying, to "transition" them from Capital's DC-3's and Constellations to the turbo-prop Viscount, and to test their reactions to potential emergencies.

Inside 280, the pilot's movements at the controls are fed into 100 tubes and about two miles of wiring. Outside, at a seven-foot-long panel, technicians can feed into the cockpit virtually every situation that could go wrong with an airplane—from losing two engines on takeoff to thunderstorm turbulence.

The 280 is startlingly realistic. I found that out when Capt. Dick Collins, Capital's Chief of Flight Simulator Training, put me through a two-four "flight" in the 280.

The cockpit is a tiny, windowless world of instruments and controls. It has windows, but they are frosted. Only a dim white light shows through, as if you were flying in the center of a cloud.

Even though you know it's make-believe, you sweat a little. Collins briefs you for a solid hour on what commands to give, what the major instruments mean, how to handle the controls.

But when you settle down in the left hand seat (traditional place for airline captains), you feel as if you were intruding on a world off-limits to the average guy.

Your flight consists of simple, routine takeoffs, approach pat-

terns and the landings themselves. To an airline pilot, it's as easy as walking around the block. To a novice, it's playing in the World Series, fighting Floyd Patterson and trying to get through the Cleveland Browns' line.

"Take her off," says Collins. You swallow hard and in that last split second you try to remember all the commands you're supposed to deliver in what Collins says must be "a brief, terse and authoritative voice."

"Full power," you call out in what you hope is a brief, terse, authoritative voice.

"How about the flap?" Collins reminds you.

"Flaps 30," you say. You watch your airspeed as you move the 280 down the runway. At 80 knots, you move back on the wheel.

At 110, you puff back more. Theoretically, we're airborne. Another red light flashes. "Flame-out number four engine," says Collins.

"You've lost your electrical system," says Collins. "You're in a thunderstorm and you've got one engine out. Now, Capt. Berling, what do you do?"

"Ring for the stewardess and have her take me back into the cabin," you reply weakly.

Then you make the mistake of commenting to Collins:

"This isn't so hard as I thought."

Collins grins. He murmurs something into his mike that only the technicians at the trouble panel can hear.

The white light outside suddenly darkens, then flashes brighter. 280 bucks violently. The wheel almost jerks out of my hand. The white bar that I had been holding confidently on course jumps sharply to the left.

"Thunderstorm turbulence," says Collins. A red light glows on the panel. A loud buzzer sounds.

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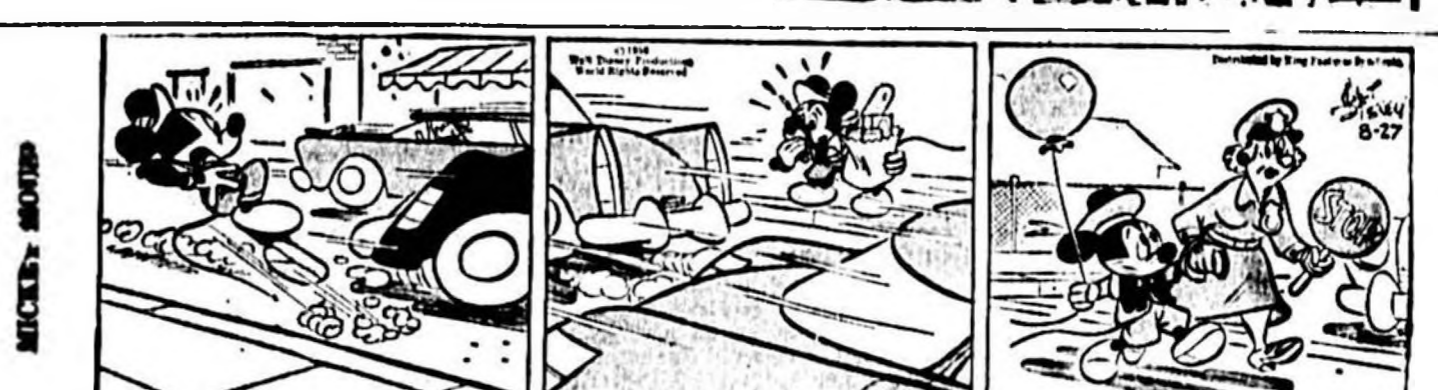

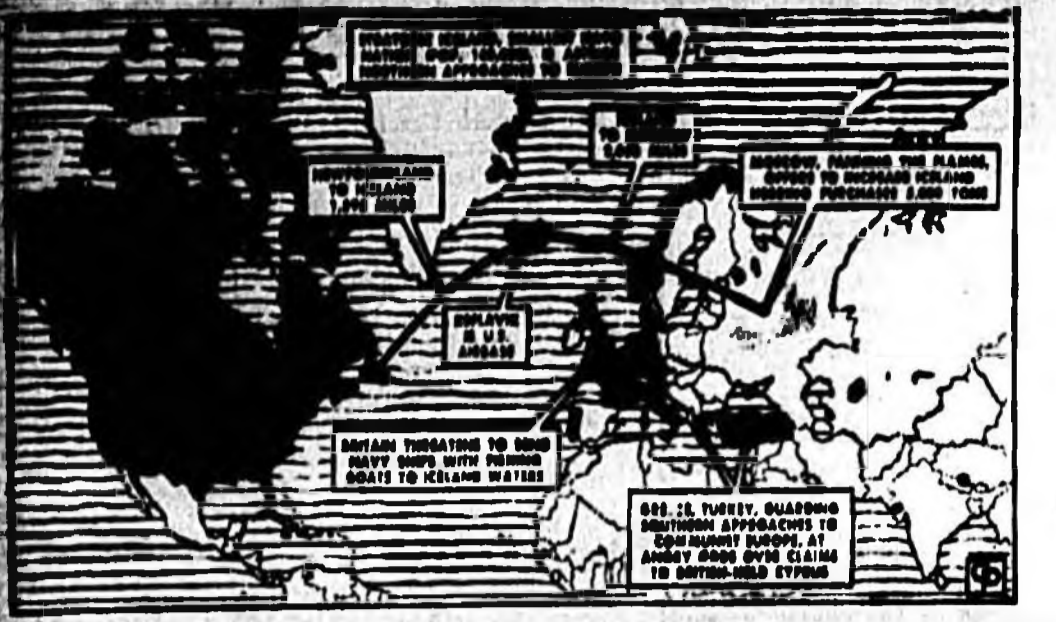

BIRMINGHAM, England (UPI)—A strangler walked out of the bedroom where he had just raped and murdered Mrs. Joyce Green and smilingly told her terror-stricken 5-year-old son, "Don't cry, sonny, your mother's all right."

Police said the 31-year-old man put up a fierce struggle before she was murdered Monday shortly after her husband had left for work.

Little Stephen Green hid under the covers of his bed when he

saw the man attack his mother. When her screams stopped he got up again and met the killer face-to-face.

After the killer spoke to him and left the house, Stephen tried to rouse his mother, then ran sobbing to a neighbor. "Mother's dead, mother's dead."

Under patient questioning by Scotland Yard's murder squad, the boy told his story and described the murderer as "a big man in blue with a white face."
