George Urges Quick Passage Of Trade Bill

Republicans Introduce Substitute Measure With Flexible Import Fee

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Senator George (D-Ga.) today urged the Senate to pass the Administration's reciprocal trade agreement bill quickly and without amendment.

By ruling out amendments, George made clear the Administration will offer no compromise to Republican critics of the bill.

George opened debate as chairman of the Finance Committee which approved the bill.

Before George obtained the floor, Senator Malone (R-Nev.) offered as a substitute his own measure calling for a flexible import fee. This idea has been cold-shouldered by the Senate in the past.

Both George and Malone made references to the current British-Canadian-American talks on the British dollar crisis.

George said the trade agreement bill "is very pertinent" to the talks. Malone suggested the conference could develop into a "smoke screen" for the bill.

Malone said that as a result of reciprocal trade agreement, "free trade is actually working" and unemployment is reaching an alarming state.

George said the British crisis was caused by many factors. But it is clear, he continued, that if the United States had not had a "workable" trade set in the New York Republic crisis would have come sooner and been "even more critical" than today.

Dulles Will Run For Republicans In Senate Race

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Senator John Foster Dulles (R-N.Y.) said today he would "gladly accept" the Republican nomination to run for the Senate in the Fall's special election.

Dulles said he has been urged by many Republican leaders to make the race.

Former Governor Herbert Lehman has announced he will accept the Democratic nomination if it is offered.

The contest is to fill the unexpired term of Senator Robert F. Wagner, Democrat, who resigned as Governor Dewey, in a statement issued at Albany, said:

"I am sure the people of New York will thrill to the news that Senator Dulles has consented to become a candidate for continued service in the United States Senate. This is a unique opportunity to elect to the Senate one of the great statesmen of the world."

"His wisdom and lofty idealism, combined with his vigor and unflinching experience in world affairs, will be a tower of strength in our national government at a time when the cause of peace and the very existence of human freedom hang in a perilous balance."

Camden Slayer Of 13 Persons Is Questioned By Two Psychiatrists

CAMDEN, N. J., Sept. 7.—(AP)—Two psychiatrists today questioned Howard Unruh, 26-year-old war veteran who massacred 13 persons on River Road.

Twelve five men, five women and two children—were killed yesterday as the silent, methodical Unruh put his "preconceived plan into execution." Three others—a woman and two youths—were wounded.

The 13th, John Wilson, 10, died this morning at Cooper Hospital, where Unruh underwent a successful operation for the removal of a bullet from his hip.

Prosecutor Mitchell Cohen said Unruh's wound is not serious and that he is physically able to undergo extensive questioning by mental health experts.

Should the psychiatrists find that Unruh was sane, Cohen said he will press for an immediate grand jury indictment, early trial and death by hanging, the penalty for murder in New Jersey. Unruh already has been charged with murder.

"He wasn't asked that question," Cohen said, "and he didn't volunteer any motive other than the fact that he said he had been building up a grudge against his neighbors for two years since he returned from the army."

The mother of the gunman was prostrated today in her grief over the tragedy.

Cohen was asked whether Unruh said anything of his reaction to having killed innocent men, women and children.

"He wasn't asked that question," Cohen said, "and he didn't volunteer any motive other than the fact that he said he had been building up a grudge against his neighbors for two years since he returned from the army."

Effort Made On Safety At Monroe Bridge

A resolution was passed yesterday by the County Commission to request State Road Maintenance Engineer William Kratzer to take steps to make the Seminole County approach of the St. Johns River Bridge at Monroe safer for traffic.

Mero pointed out the tragic accident which recently took a toll of seven lives at the bridge, and stated that to his knowledge 14 lives have been lost on the Seminole County side of the bridge. He reported that in answer to a letter from Mr. Kratzer, received by him shortly before the accident, he had listed the bridge approach as hazardous, and had made other recommendations for safety on County roads.

COCOA, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Fred Ogden, about 30, former intelligence officer on General George S. Patton's staff, was being held in jail at Titusville today in connection with the fatal shooting of his wife, Flossie.

District Attorney Murray Overstreet said no formal charges had been filed against Ogden pending a coroner's investigation.

Rockledge City Marshal W. H. Wimbley, said Ogden former executive secretary of the Cocoa Chamber of Commerce, shot his wife through the spine yesterday as a climax to domestic trouble.

Wimbley, neighbor and close friend of the couple, said he had just left the home when the shooting occurred. He said Ogden surrendered and would make no statements concerning the shooting.

A coroner's jury will convene Friday to investigate the shooting. The Ogdens had lived here about three years and had one child.

Report Is Made To Gov. Dewey On Peekskill Riot Last Sunday

ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 7.—(AP)—Governor Dewey today released a report of the Westchester county district attorney claiming "every precaution possible was taken to insure the safety of all present" at the Paul Robeson concert near Peekskill Sunday.

The report, a preliminary one by the prosecutor, George M. Farrell, was contained here as a rebuttal to the contention of negro baritone Robeson that state and Westchester county police attacked concert-goers.

Dewey released the report without comment. James C. Hagerity, the Governor's press secretary, said the Governor would not have a statement until full reports were in, including one from the Westchester sheriff, Fred W. Rucoco, and one from John A. Gaffney, state police superintendent.

Farrell said that approximately three automobiles were overturned and that about 70 persons were injured after the concert Sunday.

Unofficial reports had placed the number of injured at more than 100.

Some of these were victims of overturned automobiles and others were injured by the mob which attacked the Robeson concert from the grounds.

Fire Destroys Big Building In Philadelphia

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 7.—(AP)—The walls of a blazing seven-story building buckled and collapsed today hurling flames and embers high into the air and setting fire to buildings as far as three blocks from the scene.

Flying embers started fires in 15 establishments in the heart of the city's business district—hotels, restaurants, warehouses.

Most were roof top blazes which quickly were put out by firemen using hand extinguishers.

Six firemen were hurt, none seriously. Hundreds of hotel and guests and store employees fled safely from the burning buildings.

The fire in a vacant building being torn down on Sanson Street in the midtown area four blocks from city hall, was discovered shortly before 9 A. M. by a passing police officer.

In rapid fire succession, four alarms called more than 10 pieces of apparatus to the area.

As many as 100 firemen said they had the blaze under control.

But it burst out again with a roar that could be heard for blocks. Huge sections of wall crashed into the street. Chunks of blazing wood flew through the air to land in various portions of other buildings.

No one was hurt.

The neighboring St. Francis Hotel caught fire, forcing its guests to leave the building. Damage to the hotel did not appear extensive.

A small fire also broke out on the roof of the St. James Hotel, which blocks away, it was quickly extinguished.

A piece of fire apparatus was hit by flying embers and some equipment was set ablaze.

Demolition of the structure was under way when the fire of undetermined origin broke out. The fire broke out in the rear of the building and spread to the front.

A huge section of one wall fell into the street, and a 40-foot tall chimney in one pier and crashed through the roof of an adjoining restaurant which had been cleared of people a short time earlier.

Other walls cascaded in smaller sections.

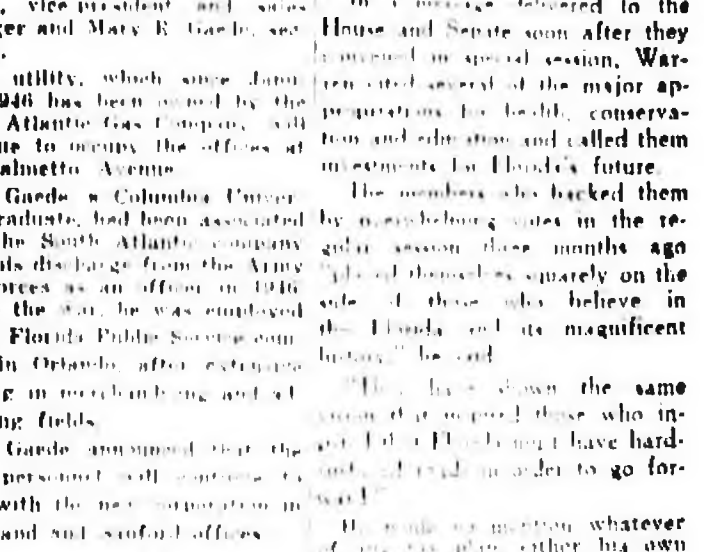

Business Leaders Differ Over Nation's Economic Prospects

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Business observers differ widely in their guesses as to what lies ahead in the fall months—a little boom, or a further slow decline.

Some say business has hit the bottom of the cycle and is starting up again. They point to a pick-up in orders which has increased output at many mills and factories, and to advancing prices in some raw materials and finished products.

Others say the shake-down of prices from the inflation peak has not gone far enough yet to furnish a sound foundation for a general business upturn. They say the pick-up in orders is in part seasonal, the customary preparation for Fall and Christmas retail business, and in part refilling of inventories which went too low when some businessmen got too panicky and bought too sparingly.

This reasoning has led to the factory pick-up and to the stiffening in prices, but those observers contend that the ordering has not been in anything like the volume of 1948 ordering and should be viewed merely as a passing phase and not as a sure sign of recovery.

There is still a third point of view, widely held. This is the cautious wait-and-see case which thinks neither of the others has proved its point and that business can jump either way. Bolstering this point of view are the major uncertainties that lie in the present labor negotiations approaching for the October point, and in the general world trade uncertainties as the British lay bare their money troubles.

General Douglas MacArthur's renewed call for negotiation of a peace treaty with Japan is touched in such laudatory terms regarding that defeated country's progress as to demand careful consideration by the allied powers.

There are, however, stubborn complications to be overcome before the road can be made toward implementing the General's recommendation. Divergence of views among the allies thus far have precluded a settlement.

MacArthur first advocated a peace treaty more than two years ago. Subsequently the Far Eastern Big Four—America, Britain, Russia, and China—considered ways and means but couldn't agree on the method of procedure.

Russia wanted a treaty drafted by the four powers; America and American thought an agreement by the Far Eastern Commission comprising the 11 nations which fought against Japan—the United States, Russia, Britain, France, China, the Philippines, the Netherlands, Canada, Australia, India, and New Zealand—China offered an unsuccessful compromise that the Far Eastern Commission draft the treaty but that decisions be subject to the unanimity of the Big Four.

Since then the situation has become immeasurably complicated by the success of the Chinese Communists against Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's Nationalist government. Should the Chinese Reds establish a stable regime it would split the Far Eastern Big Four into two equal camps—Russia and Communist China on one side and the Anglo-American powers on the other. It would be Communism versus Democracy again.

Despite the difficulties, however, the time is rapidly approaching when action will have to be taken. MacArthur says the Japanese have "fully and faithfully observed their surrender conditions" and "are well equipped to maintain their freedom and dignity and the opportunity which alone can come with the restoration of peace."

General asserts that the "threat of Communism as a major issue in Japanese life is past. The basic causes of social unrest throughout Asia have largely been eradicated. A new social re-design of the social structure to permit equalization of individual opportunity and personal progress." The budget has been balanced.

Of course this doesn't mean that Japan's misdeeds will be forgotten. She has signed a treaty which expects the Allies to insist that "regardless of the time against further transgressions." However, Europe would seem to provide an object lesson in the desirability of peace treaties with Germany and Austria.

One of the manifestations of the cold war in Europe has been the failure to introduce summertime in an entirely new public. Backers, EAL, president and general manager, Eastern is spending over one million dollars this summer to tell northerners what a delightful place Florida is at this season. Another novel fare plan offered by National is the "family plan" for international air travel. Just as in domestic travel, the family plan over international routes would apply for travel between midnight Sunday and midnight Wednesday, the reduction being offered on one-way as well as round trip travel.

The family head (father or mother) would pay the regular fare. The other parent and all the children under 21 years old would pay only half fare. It is not necessary that both parents make the trip. Any member of the group except the full fare passenger may buy their half tickets to any destination on the route not beyond the destination of the full fare passenger with stopovers permitted. This particularly applies to Cubans who are finding Florida a popular summer vacation spot and whose families can make the trip at rates so reasonable they can easily afford it.

This family fare plan also applies to domestic travel, according to G. T. Baker, president of National. All-time passenger records were eclipsed by National on July 1, when a total of 800,004 revenue passenger miles were recorded. The day's passenger load factor was 64.4%. The line has stepped up its service to the highest level in history. 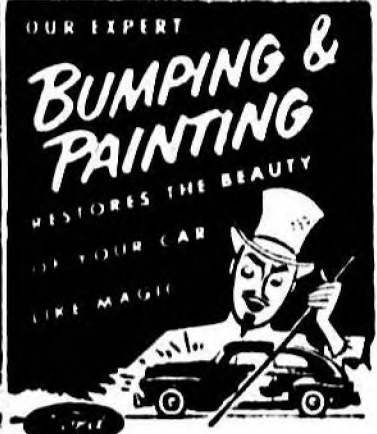

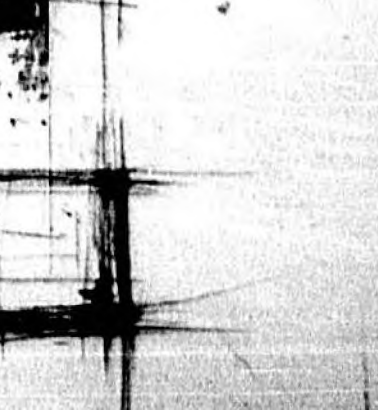

Calf or heifer branding isn't on the contest program—which puts the girls from the west, where women are women, under a handicap.

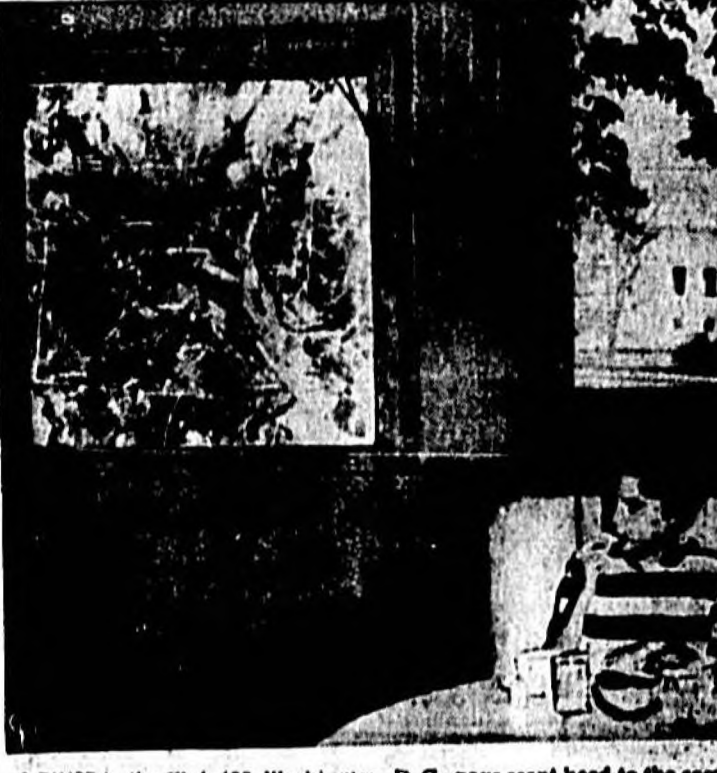
Miss Arkansas will be one of the few entrants with a circus-like three University of Arkansas students who decided to go to Atlantic City and root for her.

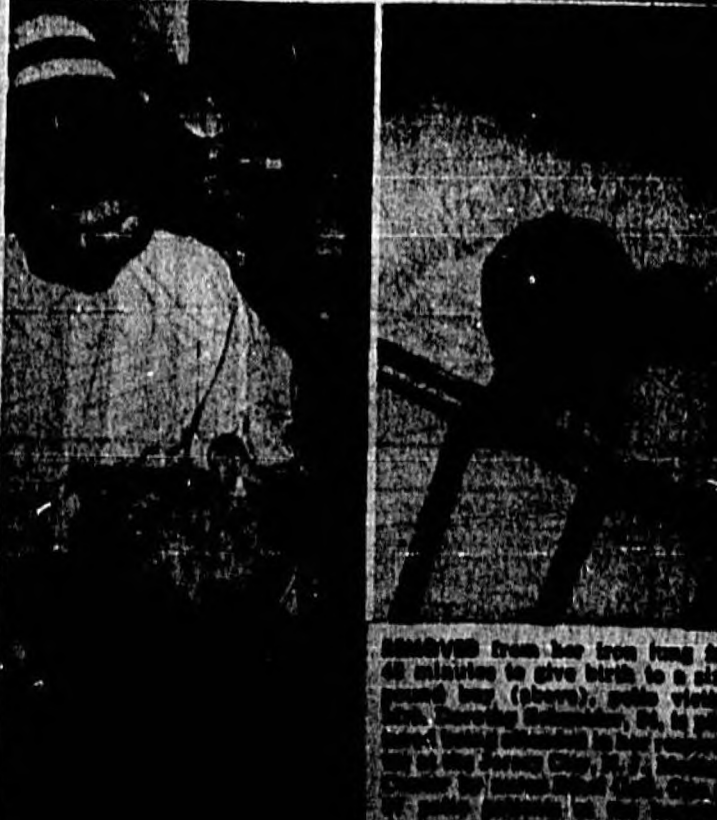

Fall Kills Girl, Injures Another On Luxury Liner

Texas Socialite Dies In Fall With Friend On Ship's Staircase

BOSTON, Sept. 7 (AP)—A fall down a staircase brought death to a Texas socialite girl and grave injury to a male companion who were returning with college friends from a European cruise aboard the luxury liner Escalibur, an American Export Line spokesman said today.

The girl, who died yesterday, four days after she tumbled down a nine-foot stairway from the boat deck to the promenade deck, was identified as Adrienne Atwell, 20, of Dallas.

The big liner has been speeded up to bring her companion Robert M. Willard, 21, listed as of 4209 Arcady, Dallas, to Boston.

The American Export official said Willard will be taken off in a launch which will meet the Escalibur in Boston Harbor about 6 P. M. tonight. The vessel originally was scheduled to arrive tomorrow afternoon.

Willard was in a coma for three days after the fall but now is in "reasonable physical condition," according to the report of an Army neurosurgeon who boarded the Escalibur at sea, the spokesman said.

The Army hospital ship Comfort went to the aid of the Escalibur after the first radio report of the injuries.

There were no reports of any other passengers hurt, the spokesman said. There was, he added, no explanation of what caused Miss Atwell and Willard to fall.

Miss Atwell, who was the granddaughter of Federal Judge William H. Atwell, was returning with her parents, Attorney and Mrs. Webster Atwell of 3830 Overlook Drive.

The line said the Atwells were in a party which included 6 other Texas College students who sailed June 28 for a cruise in the Mediterranean.

Atorney Atwell and Willard joined the group at Marseille, the spokesman said.

Willard and Miss Atwell fell Sept. 3 on a winding, outside stairway to the "wooded" deck. The spokesman said the girl was reported to have suffered a fractured skull and cerebral contusions. Willard suffered a concussion.

Master of the Escalibur is Samuel N. Groves of Brooklyn, N. Y.

The spokesman said the Atwell girl died "despite the efforts of three doctors."

Plane Manufacturer Denies Taking Any Part In Investigating "B-36 Memo"

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8—(AP)—Plane maker Glenn L. Martin flatly denied today that he had taken any part in investigating or suggesting the famous "B-36 memo."

Martin, chairman of the Glenn L. Martin company of Baltimore, came before a U. S. Navy court of inquiry delving into possible Navy participation in the memorandum's charges of fraud and politics in the Air Force's bomber program.

In a prepared statement, Martin denied allegations made by Cedric R. Worth, acknowledged author of the document and suspended special assistant to assistant Secretary of the Navy Dan Kimball.

Worth has named Martin as a source of some information. Martin is a competitor of consolidated-Vultee, which builds the B-36.

The plane manufacturer, in his statement, told the Naval court that the only bit of information given Worth had to do with the threatened termination of plane target contracts during the war and the transfer of that business to the Emerson Electric Company.

"I want to say that the bit of information, small as it was, was correct," Martin said.

Before Martin was called to the stand, a Navy captain who said part of his job was to "sell" Naval aviation testified he and Worth "always agreed that no airplane could be" as good as the Air Force reported the B-36.

The testimony came from Capt. LeRoy Simpson of Navy Public Relations, who testified he had been asked to investigate a memo that had set off a congressional investigation.

Violence At Robeson Concert Is Given As Example Of Outrages In The North

ATLANTA, Sept. 8—(AP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt said today the North is "quite as bad" in the racial discrimination as the South.

"We are wrong in many ways in the North. I don't think the South is all to blame," she added.

The recent violence growing out of Paul Robeson's concert in Peekskill, N. Y., she termed "perfectly outrageous."

"I don't know why the police were not able to control better the demonstration—perhaps they were apathetic," she continued.

Turning to the South in a new conference, Mrs. Roosevelt said Truman's Civil Rights program a logical excuse for racial violence.

Some critics, who blame the program in part for the South's recent racial terrorism, look at the Civil Rights proposals from a local, rather than a world wide view, she added.

She said at least once during every session of the United Nations Committee on Human Rights, of which she is chairman, that she had to answer Russian criticism of racial discrimination in the United States.

"I would always agree it is valid, but at least we know of the inequality and have people who want to change them."

"But in my years of working with the Russian delegates, I have never heard you criticize your country. I would be troubled if I were you, that there is no desire to improve."

Then she said she always agreed "it is fair to criticize or to say you no longer are so apathetic that you no longer dream of a better system."

"Nothing like democracy quick or anything like that."

Mrs. Roosevelt is in Atlanta to attend a conference of the southern church women on "the spiritual approach to social problems."

"Everyone in the county is supporting the fight against polio so that full help will be available wherever it is needed."

Grady Norton, chief storm fore-caster at Miami, said the great tropical storm's center was 60 miles east of Bermuda at 6 A. M.

"This places the islands on the weaker west side of the storm," said Norton. "Heaviest winds reach only 40 miles from the center on that side. Therefore Bermuda should be receiving only heavy gales with gusts somewhat higher, and high tides."

Norton said the storm which hung nearly stationary for three days in a war of nerves with Bermuda was now on the move and speeding up its forward pace.

"It should threaten to move inland unless there is a change in course," said the storm fore-caster.

Ships were warned to avoid the storm. Most vessels and aircraft out of the path, and others reported themselves steaming at top speed to get west of the center as it approaches the North Atlantic.
