BUCHAREST, Dec. 2.—(AP)—On her arrival home Friday night Queen Marie will find a much clearer political horizon than has been the case in past days since reports of the serious illness of her husband, King Ferdinand, gained circulation.

This clarified atmosphere is due in a large measure to King Ferdinand's letter to Premier Averescu, on Tuesday, in which he said his condition was growing better, that he proposed to continue on the throne as long as he lived and that he was unalterably opposed to the return to Rumania of his wayward son, Carol.

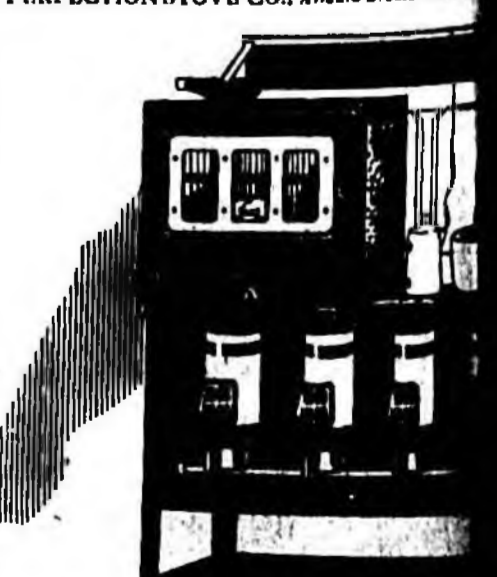

### Eighty Of 112 Legislative Seats Captured By Those Pledged To Support Wet View Of Premier Ferguson

TORONTO, Dec. 2.—(P)—The province of Ontario, dry for 10 years, has gone wet. In elections held yesterday throughout the province for the 112 seats in the legislature at least 80 members, pledged to support Premier G. Howard Ferguson's policy for government control of the sale of spirits, and beer, were elected. Only two remote constituencies remained unreported.

On the liquor issue, Ferguson, a conservative, can count on the support of four independent liberal leaders, who broke away from W. E. N. Sinclair, the liberal opposition leader and the solitary Labor member elected.

By the vote of the people they have indicated that the operation of the Ontario Temperance act as a method for enforcing temperance was not considered a success. Much antagonism against the act, which provided for the sale of liquor only on doctor's prescriptions, was due to the claim that it had made things easy for bootleggers.

Premier Ferguson on the stump pointed out that persons feigning illness could secure prescriptions for liquor at a vendor's store. He charged that \$5,000,000 was spent annually for liquor purchased on prescriptions.

It is expected that Premier Ferguson will call the newly elected Legislature into session at an early date for the purpose of giving effect to his proposals for government control.

During the campaign it was stated that Premier Ferguson's program would provide for permits for every person over 21 years of age to obtain liquor or beer at government's vendors' places at a reasonable cost. The cards would be subject to cancellation if the privileges they gave were abused.

### NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—(P)—Indications of a possible effort to curtail the power of Commissioner Landis are contained in a statement by Jacob Ruppert, president of the New York Yankees.

"I am in favor of continuing Landis in office," he says, "but I have in mind a plan that both leagues appoint committees of three men to revise the major league agreement and the agreement with Landis. Such changes as they recommend can be reported back to all the club owners next spring, who can then adopt them and re-elect the commissioner."

This, Ruppert said, is the view of a great many American League owners, hold, but his refusal to describe the changes he has in mind has led baseball men to believe that a concerted effort will be made by American League owners to curtail the power of the commissioner when the leagues hold their annual meeting in Chicago, Dec. 16.

National League magnates have indicated their desire to return Landis to office for seven years at the coming meeting, although his term does not expire until Nov. 20, 1927. The heads of the older circuit seek no change in the conditions under which Landis now rules organized baseball.

Ruppert said he believed he would have the backing of the majority of American League owners in opposing the election of Landis in December. "I think next winter is the proper time to consider re-election," he explained. While it is true his term may expire in November, 1927, he has the right to call a joint meeting at any time he sees fit.

### BOSTON, Dec. 2.—(P)—Two New York City magistrates are included among those under investigation by the government in connection with the gigantic conspiracy which was taken in the seizure here last August of the steamer Cretan and a \$300,000 cargo of alcohol, the Boston Advertiser says today.

More than two score persons including Lewis H. Rothchild, vice-president of the Chelsea Exchange Bank of New York, and two of his assistants have been indicted.

The Advertiser quotes an unnamed official as saying that the New York judges used their influence to secure immunity for members of the gang, in providing protection to those unloading cargoes and in getting money back for the enterprises.

At least a score have been made millionaires by the operations of this vast rum ring," the official declared.

Rothchild has issued a statement denying any connection with the ring.

**Spanish Woman Is Donor to Red Cross**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—(P)—Moved with sympathy for hurricane sufferers in Florida, a Spanish subject, Senora Pilar E. Sanchez Y. Junco, of Madrid, has sent a check for \$4,000 to the American National Red Cross for rehabilitation work in the stricken area. The check was forwarded by Ogden H. Hammond, American ambassador to Spain, to Frank B. Kellogg, secretary of state, and transmitted by Mr. Kellogg to the Red Cross.
