



Justice Moves Slowly, Carefully In Deciding Fate Of Mass Slayer

LINCOLN, Nob. (UPI)- Mass hiller Charles Starkweather will have to wait months, perhaps years, to find out whether he will be executed under a death sentence handed down June 7. Starkwaather's execution has been set for Dec. 17 but the legal processes of Nebraska make it almost certain the sentence will not be extried out at that time. A state law passed by the 1967 Logislature requires the Nebraska Supreme Court to review all cap-ital punishment sentences.

The law is a result of attempts to outlaw the death sentence in the state. The Legislature refused to abeliah the electric chair but set, up the review as a compre-

The law gives Starkweather's court-appealed atterneys 20 days to propers an appeal. The Seprime Court then allows 10 days for the atterneys to file briefs containing citations supporting the appeal arguments.

When the appeal reaches the Supreme Court, the jurisdiction of prosecution changes from the county atterney to the attorney general.

He then has 30 days to answer the briefs filed by the defense. Next, the ease is docketed for hearing. Criminal cases have

From December 1 to June 28, however, a total of 39,879,972 gallons were purchased either in retail or institutional sises or as bulk concentrate.

The report estimated that 30, 754,472 gallons would disappear between June 29 and next December 1, leaving only 7,500,000 gallons on hand that date. If the Commission-Mutual prediction ma-terializes, it will be the small-est carry-over recorded in a number of years. In summary, the report deem-

ed the new season "extremely favorable for every segment of the trade," and said, "there will be increasing emphasis on improved internal and external quality of fresh fruit." It predict-ed, also, consolidation of sales agencies in fresh fruit within Florids, and saw fewer fresh citrus packing houses in operation next year than in the past. Processors were expected to increase
