Community Action Units Open Doors

Seminole Community Action Inc. (SCA) and the Seminole Employment and Economic Development Corp. (SEEDCO) officials Thursday opened the doors of their poverty-fighting, community service operations to the public for open house and

guided tours. SCA's primary objective is to enhance self-help among low-income families throughout the county, according to SCA Board Chairman S. T. Muller and Executive Director Rev. Amos C. Jones. Jones said federally-funded SCA isn't

Prices Creep Up, Inflation Slowing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Consumer prices rose three-tenths of a per cent in October, the government said today. It was the smallest increase in seven months as the nation's inflation rate continued its moderating trend.

The increase in the Consumer Price Index followed a rise of four-tenths of a per cent in September and monthly advances of five-tenths of a per cent during the June-August period. The Labor Department said October's price increase was the smallest since a two-tenths of a per cent rise last March. Over the past 12 months, retail prices have risen 5.3 per cent, marking the smallest increase since the 12-month period ending in April 1973, when they rose 8.1 per cent.

In a separate report, the department said the purchasing power of the average worker's paycheck rose last month as it declined in August and September.

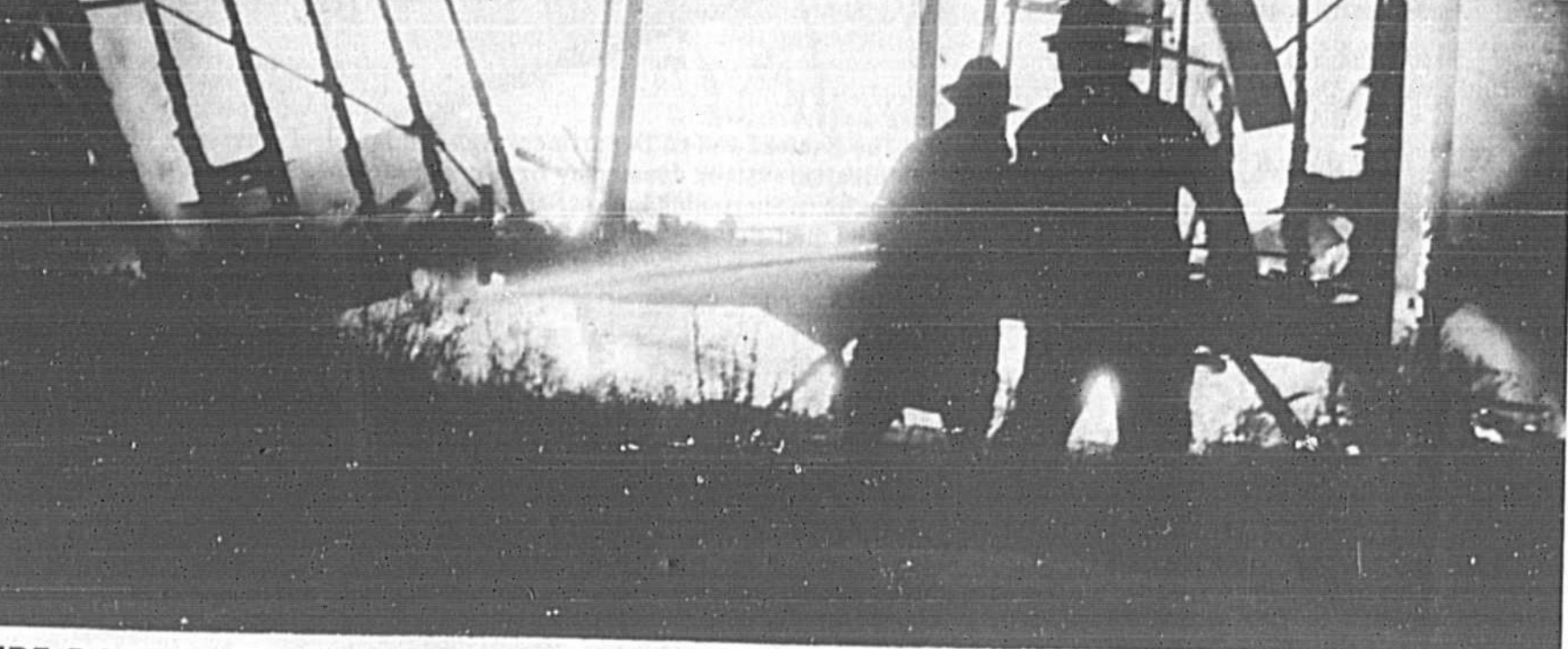
ST. PETERSBURG (AP) — "Gentlemen, the first step in crime prevention is to make sure no one can pull off the crime."

The Zoo Cries Help! Today -- \$30,000 Needed

Central Florida Zoological Society Finance Committee Chairman Wayne Simpson reported Thursday afternoon that the zoo facility needs \$30,000 immediately to bail it out of a "desperate short-term financial crisis."

With outstanding debts of over \$20,000 and no cash on hand, Simpson said, the zoo may be forced to close if area organizations and the public do not come to its rescue.

Simpson revealed that the zoo is in a state of financial crisis because of a year's supply of food for the animals.

The zoo has had to lay off 11 employees in the past four months to cut down expenses, Simpson said, and the final four were let go last week. The maintenance man is now doubling in the refreshment stand, he added.

Simpson said several factors triggered the financial problems which forced the zoo to spend an unexpected \$66,000 out of the current expense account. He said \$15,000 had been budgeted for insurance, but the insurance carrier had raised the premium to \$31,000.

Simpson said inflation has raised to \$150,000 the cost to develop leased county park

property to satisfy the "after the fact" requirements of the \$100,000 federal grant obtained through the state. A 355-ft. deceleration lane on 17-92 was also an unexpected expenditure.

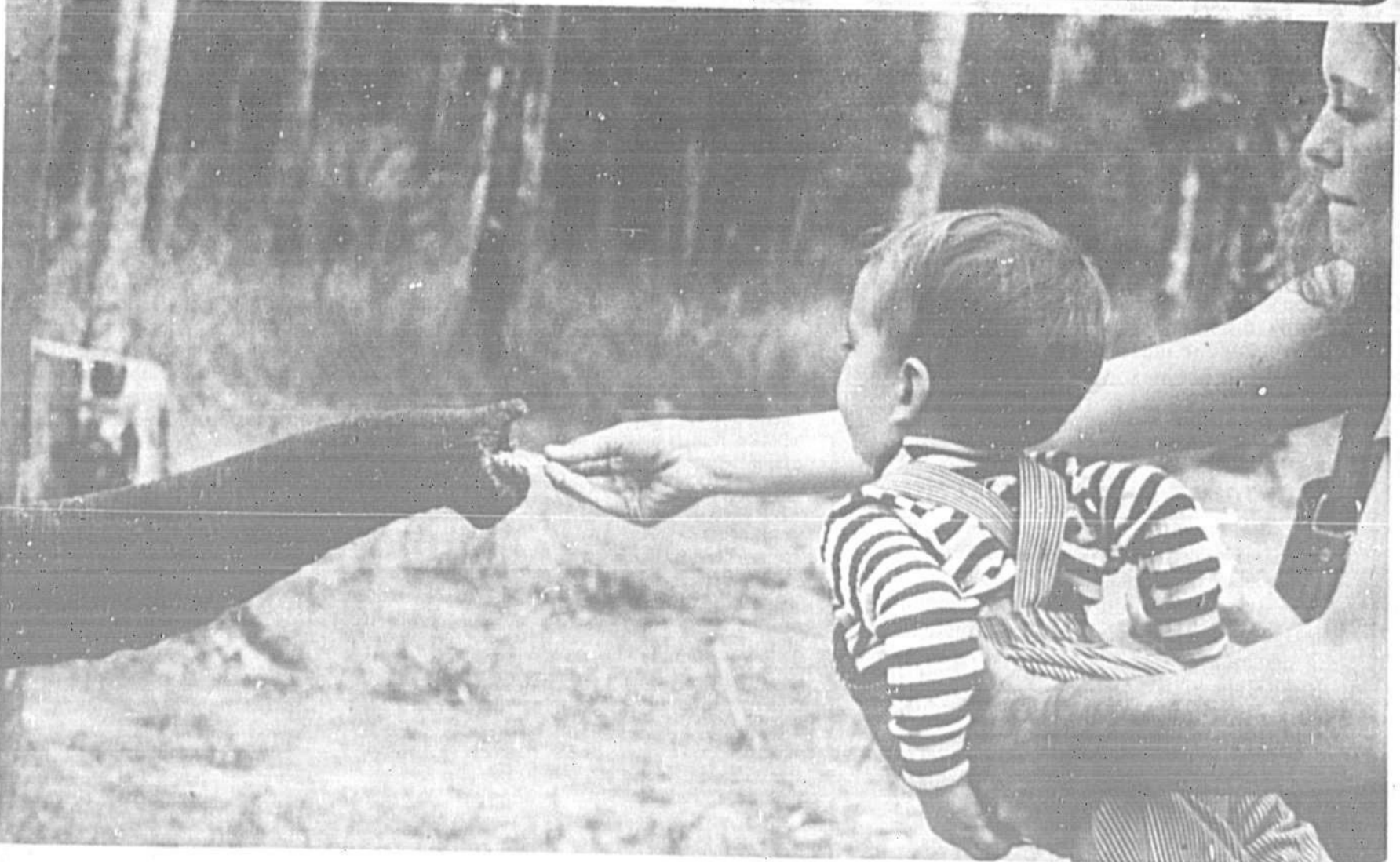
Under state law these funds could not be used to develop the zoo proper, but went for such items as picnic facilities and comfort stations. To raise matching funds a group of 57 local citizens signed a \$100,000 note with local banks. When inspected and audited in July, the park met state approval.

Simpson said the society hopes to meet the long-term financial problem of paying off this note through a three-month special promotion beginning in March. Plans are not yet complete but the promotion would involve an area business, he said.

He pointed out that the zoo receives no tax funds and is one of two zoos in the country not subsidized by the state. "We have talked to local politicians and they will ask for \$100,000 a year subsidy from the state," he said.

Another problem has been wet weekends that cut down on gate receipts. Simpson said that although no money has been available for advertising and promotion, the zoo has been grossing between \$2,000 and \$4,000 on a good weekend.

Jail Screening Program May Reduce Inmate Population

By January 1, 1977, officials expect to begin a diagnostic program at Seminole County Jail at Sanford aimed at reducing repeat incarceration of offenders in the short-term county facility.

A \$9,810 grant from the Federal Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) is being used with state and county funds to pay the \$10,500 first year cost of the program.

Jail Administrator George Proudfoot said it took two years of work to obtain the federal crime-fighting funds for the program which will entail screening of inmates who remain in jail after initial court appearances.

The screening and evaluation program to be headed by a professional staffer, yet to be hired, will lead to decisions on cell assignment based on the offense, the offender's age and personal background.

ment for inmates found to need the help. Outside professional counseling services will also be used on a contract basis.

Proudfoot believes the diagnostic program, by furnishing personality profiles and background data on inmates, will help shorten the time period required for pre-sentence investigations ordered by the court from state probation and parole department officials.

One objective of the new screening program is to reduce the average inmate population at county jail. For the three-month period ending in September, the average jail population was 91.5 prisoners. A jail record survey just completed shows 27 per cent of those arrested remain in jail.

Of the prisoners booked into jail, 38 per cent bonded out. Eight per cent were released on their own recognizance by judges, one per cent were released to probation and parole officials, 15 per cent completed sentences, three per cent were released when charges were dropped, and four per cent were transferred to states and other counties.

If current correction facility standards were used, the county jail would be able to house 40 prisoners. But the county is allowed to exceed this figure because the 1954-vintage facility was built before the current criteria was adopted.

By the end of January, a new modular jail addition will be usable for housing 46 minimum security prisoners, including trusts and work-lease inmates, Proudfoot said.

Once the new modular staffer is hired for the screening program and a contract is entered for counseling services and testing of inmates, Proudfoot said the new program is expected to process an average of three to six persons a day plus evaluation of inmates already in county jail.

"If an inmate is found to have educational needs," Proudfoot

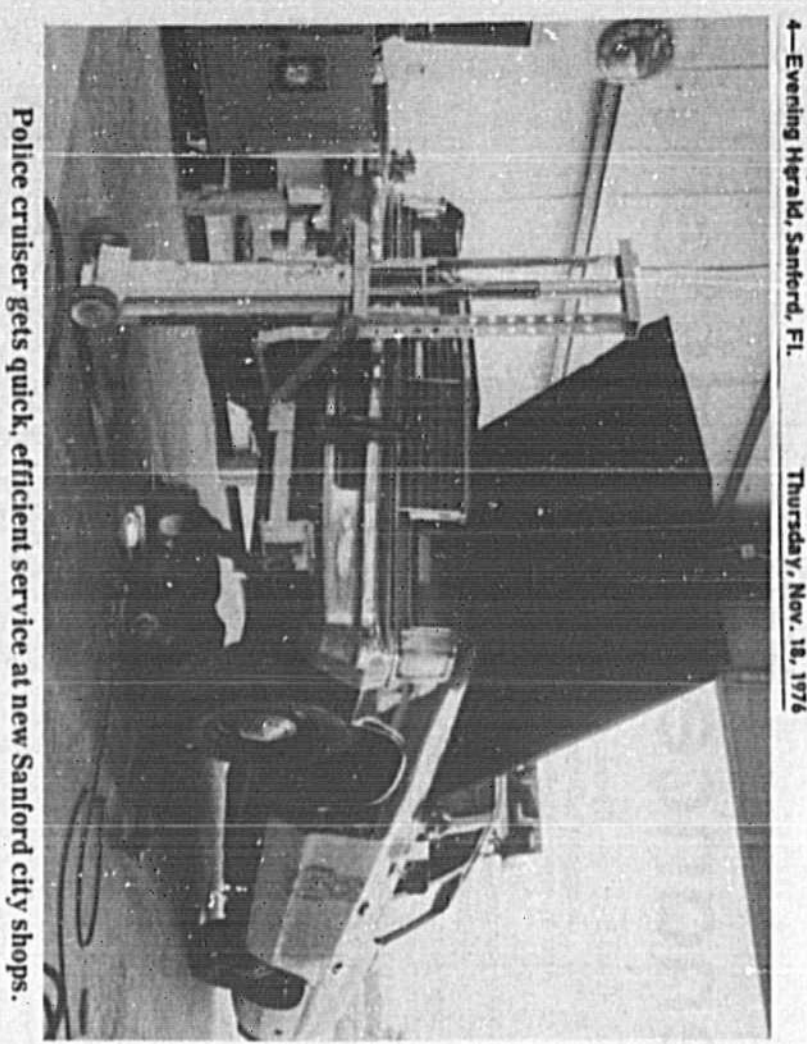
said, "we'll encourage him to continue his education through classes already offered in the jail."

He said an average of 300 persons are booked into county jail each month.

The diagnostic screening program will utilize present space at the sheriff's department and provide increased guidance and counseling based on inmates' needs instead of the current almost-random selection due to a lack of staff to screen inmates.

Professional consulting services are budgeted for \$1,400 of the first year's program cost. The salary of the jail intake counselor, with a college degree in human behavioral disciplines, is \$9,500 the first year.

Proudfoot said that when the new staffer is hired there will be a 30-day training period on the screening program implementation for county correctional officers who run the jail and handle booking procedures. — Bob Lloyd.

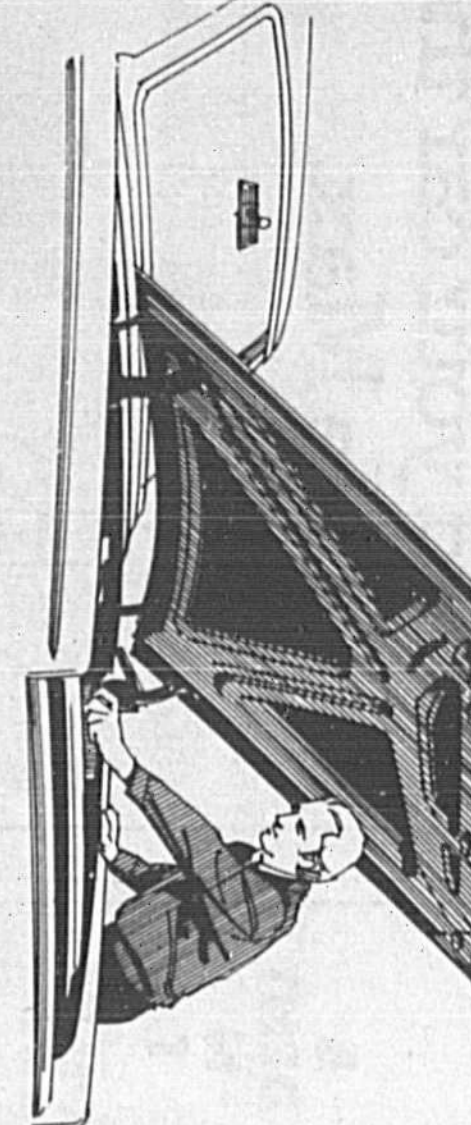

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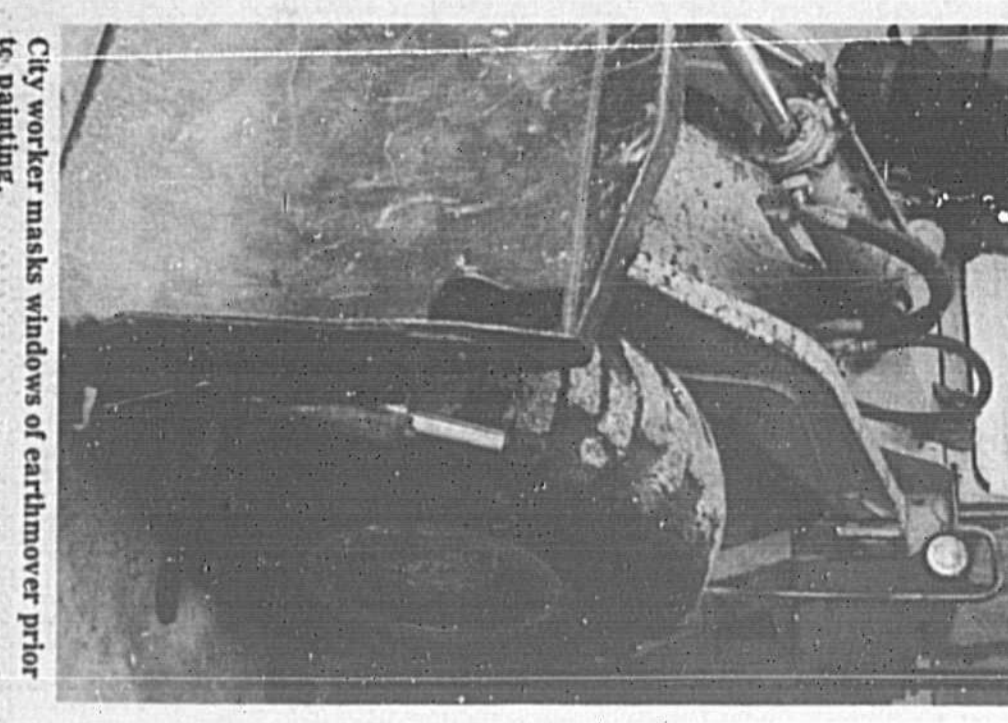

GM Workers On Strike; New Contract 'Close'

DETROIT (AP) — About 80,000 United Auto Workers struck 16 key General Motors plants today as bargainers, meeting through the night, closed in on a new national contract. "It was simply a matter of their running out of time," said one source close to the talks. He said the two sides were "very close," adding a settlement could come "within hours."

While the 16 selected plants were idled effective at midnight, about 100 other GM plants across the country continued operating in compliance with orders from the UAW.

Adopted Boy Thanks Judge

ST. PAUL (AP) — A judge in St. Paul has received belated thanks from an 8-year-old boy whose adoption he approved in 1969.

"Dear your honor," began the letter to juvenile court judge Archie Gingold from a Mangrove boy. "I thank you for letting my Mom and Dad adopt me." The letter goes on to tell how happy the boy is, that he has twin sisters, that the family goes camping and skiing and that he is learning to play the guitar.

The boy enclosed a photograph of himself and four pen pals "because you deserve it." Judge Gingold said he wrote back, saying he was pleased to learn of the boy's happiness and that his donation would be used to help less fortunate children.

Schools May Collapse

CHICAGO (AP) — Voter resistance to school tax hikes has grown so strong that schools face severe curtailment of services — or even collapse — unless they get more federal and state assistance, big-city school superintendents say.

"Don't think you can get the cities straightened out if you don't get the schools straightened out," Vincent Reed, superintendent of Washington, D.C., public schools told a meeting of heads of 27 major city school systems here.

The three-day conference of the Council of the Great City Schools, which opened Thursday, was called to develop urban educational priorities that the superintendents hope President-elect Jimmy Carter will adopt.

Stolen Film Ransomed

ERLANGER, Ky. (AP) — An movie theater recovered four reels of stolen film after honoring an unusual ransom request from some music-minded thieves.

The thieves asked for the \$100 in reward money being offered by a Cincinnati radio station — plus three free passes to the movie and a handful of record albums.

The reels, valued at \$1,000, were stolen from the theater lobby Wednesday afternoon, two days before the movie, "Led Zeppelin — The Song Remains the Same," was scheduled to open.

Economy Meeting Described

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional leaders who met with President-elect Jimmy Carter did not team up to urge an economy-boosting tax cut and Carter gave no indication of a decision, one of the participants says.

Rep. George H. Mahon, D-Tex., said the problem of stimulating business and reducing unemployment was extensively discussed during the three-hour session Wednesday in Lovejoy, Ga., where Carter met with Democratic leaders.

"I did not detect a unanimity of the leadership concerning a tax cut," Mahon said.

Seattle Begins Ad Campaign

SEATTLE (AP) — This Northwest metropolis, sometimes cited as one of the nation's most livable cities, has started running television commercials aimed at keeping its middle-income residents.

A January 1979 survey of 50 cities by Harpers' Magazine ranked Seattle No. 1 in livability. That magazine and The Atlantic magazine described Seattle, ringed by two snowcapped mountain ranges, Puget Sound and two lakes, as an urban jewel.

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Terror Trio Takes 60¢ From Boys, Girls

Sanford police are probing two Thursday afternoon incidents near Seminole High School in which three juvenile girls armed with knives terrorized and robbed other juveniles.

Police reported the three girls "attacked" three juvenile boys "on the south side of Seminole High School" and robbed one of the boys of 25 cents.

Officers said approximately 10 minutes later two 11-year-old girls walking home from Lakeview Middle School were approached by three girls who held knives to their necks, robbing one of the 11-year-olds of 35 cents before fleeing on foot.

Altamonte Springs police have returned two burglary suspects from Duval County to face felony charges in Seminole. James Frank Back, 24, of 604 Prairie Lane, Fern Park, and Michael Antonini, 20, Jacksonville, were booked into Seminole County Jail at Sanford in lieu of \$5,000 bond each on local circuit court warrants charging burglary and grand larceny.

Altamonte officers Thursday night arrested four Orlando men on charges of receiving stolen property. Bond for each suspect was set at \$5,000.

Two men were being held in county jail today without bond following their arrests on charges of probation violation. They are William Michael Lane, 34, of Winter Garden, and Dwight Jack Smukler, 23, of Orlando, according to jail records.

Sanford police are investigating the reported theft of a \$600 mobile radio-telephone owned by a Winter Park firm.

Patty Leaves Prison — Free On Bond?

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Patricia Hearst was wisked out of a federal prison here in the dead of night, an official at the Metropolitan Correctional Center said today.

Her destination was unknown, but with \$500,000 bond posted by her family to free her while awaiting trial in Southern California, she needed only the approval of a San Francisco judge to be free for the first time in more than a year while she appeals her bank robbery conviction.

The official at the correctional center, who declined to have his name used, said Miss Hearst was driven away by two federal marshals about 4:50 a.m. EST.

Members of a television camera crew stationed at the prison said they saw a black-and-white car speed away in the darkness.

U.S. District Court Judge William Orrick, who in September sentenced Miss Hearst to seven years in prison, was expected to rule today on a request that the 22-year-old newspaper heiress be released in her parents' custody under a secret security plan.

Orrick must decide whether she is still a flight risk. She had been ordered held without bail after her capture in September 1975.

The only other obstacle to Miss Hearst's freedom was removed on Thursday when her father and uncle signed a \$500,000 personal surety bond on pending Los Angeles charges of kidnap, assault and robbery.

Miss Hearst faces a January 10 trial in that case involving a wild shooting at an Inglewood, Calif., sporting goods store that occurred while she was a fugitive member of the terrorist Symbionese Liberation Army.

Her father, Randolph A. Hearst, president of the San Francisco Examiner, and his twin brother, David, president of the William Randolph Hearst Foundation, pledged their assets to obtain Miss Hearst's release.

Attorney Albert Johnson asked Superior Court Judge William Ritz to reduce the \$500,000 bail, but the judge said he would wait to see whether she is still a flight risk.

"If she is released by the San Francisco court, and if bail is substantial in that case, I certainly would consider reduction in bond," he said.

Miss Hearst, now imprisoned at the Metropolitan Corrections Center in San Diego, has spent 14 months behind bars, including time served during the 1974 \$100,000 robbery of San Francisco's Hilbert Bank.

Orrick told her during sentencing: "Miss Hearst, the violent nature of your conduct can not be condoned. Violence is unacceptable in our society and will not be tolerated."

She has since shunned her radical associates and plans to testify against them. Johnson told Orrick she should be released because she cannot be adequately protected in prison from those who might want a stop such testimony.

DuPont Estate Showdown Averted

JACKSONVILLE (AP) — A showdown in the battle among trustees of the billion dollar Alfred I. duPont estate has been avoided with postponement of action on a proposed sale of one of its major assets.

Alfred duPont Dent's proposal to sell the St. Joe Paper Co. was tabled at Thursday's day-long, closed door meeting.

'That Darned Kid'

DAYTONA BEACH (AP) — Police have charged a grocery clerk with offering an undercover detective a share of an expected \$15,000-\$25,000 inheritance to arrange the death of his 80-year-old mother.

Gregory J. Tatarian, 50, was charged with soliciting to commit murder, police said Thursday.

Mrs. Tatarian said that her son had lived at home most of his life and rarely went out at night except for church activities. If he plotted to kill her, she said, it was because he was influenced by television violence. She said she'd told him to stop watching TV. So she When told about his bond, Mrs. Tatarian said, "Where am I going to get \$10,000. That darned kid!"

ERA Backer Claims Votes

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — The chief Senate backer of the Equal Rights Amendment says she has 22 sure votes to get the constitutional amendment ratified in the Senate.

Sen. Lori Wilson, I-Cocoa, also said Thursday that she felt confident the measure would get out of the Rules Committee even if Senate President Lee Brantley does not appoint two more members, as he has said she might.

Brantley said he was considering appointing Sens. Alan Trask, D-Fort Meade, and Ralph Poston, D-Miami, to the panel because both have requested to be put on.

Childers Sides With FDCL

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Sen. W.D. Childers says his personal investigation has convinced him that the Florida Department of Criminal Law Enforcement is not a "political espionage arm of the governor."

Childers, D-Pensacola and chairman of the appropriations subcommittee which reviews the agency's budget, said Thursday he would support any request the agency makes for an emergency fund transfer.

More People Are Working

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — More people were working in Florida last month than in September but the state's unemployment rate remained unchanged at 9.4 per cent, the state Department of Commerce says.

The department said Thursday that manufacturing and construction payrolls increased in October as the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate held steady.

Assistant Commerce Secretary C. Betty Wimbish said the figures showed that solid economic recovery from the recession had not begun but that there was scattered improvement in some industries in Florida.

"Total employment in Florida increased 24,800 jobs, unemployment dropped by 9,300 and employment in the crucial construction industry showed a slight rise for the fifth month," she said in a news release.

A Costly Loss For Candidate

ST. PETERSBURG (AP) — Five unsuccessful Republican candidates have filed suit asking a new election be held in the wake of an investigation into faulty Pinellas County voting machines used Nov. 2.

A state attorney's probe, requested by the supervisor of elections, has shown that at least 30 machines malfunctioned during the general election.

Senate Critical Of PERC

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — A high turnover rate in the Public Employees Relations Commission has kept the agency from becoming a strong mediator of the state's collective-bargaining law, a Senate staff report says.

Judge Arrested

JACKSONVILLE (AP) — A respected circuit judge with 16 years on the bench is accused of trying to induce a Florida sheriff to give him 1,600 pounds of seized marijuana with the prospect that each could make \$100,000.

Judge Samuel S. Smith, 54, of Lake City, was arrested by the FBI Thursday on a charge of distributing marijuana. He was allowed to go free under a \$25,000 signature bond.

simply a series of numerical results. "It is also a means of arousing, of mobilizing, of harnessing the moral energies and conscience of the American people. It's not just a cluster of government programs or just a government effort. Community Action must involve all sectors of the economy and all the people of our country. Mobilization of community resources is the essence of Community Action," Jones said.

SCA volunteers manned four vans taking interested citizens over the county Thursday to see first-hand the projects of SCA and the private business ventures of SEEDCO that boost the Seminole economy and offer services to the low-income families of the area.

First stop for the tour was SCA's community center at 504 Celery Ave., Sanford, where SCA's Energy Conservation and Home Winterization Program is also headquartered.

Caney coordinator Laura Clark explained that the facility shows citizens how to can their own food and furnishes jars and lids and processing at low cost.

Residents with poverty-level incomes aren't charged processing fees. The center offers free transportation for seasonal farm migrants and free classes on home canning, nutrition and pickling.

Winterization program supervisor Alfred DeLattre said 17 workers are now involved in repairing homes owned by low-income families under a

county to become competitors in the free enterprise system.

Published figures indicate SEEDCO commercial "ventures" employ at least 218 in Seminole. The ventures include Central Florida Ornamentals Inc., with two locations near Sanford; Seminole Bakery Products Inc., Sanford; J. Smith Fruit Co. Inc., Oviedo; Evergreen Enterprises, a holding corporation; Seminole Community Federal Credit Union; and "Product" Movement Systems Inc. and Neptune Winch Corp., both located at the I-4 Industrial Park, west of Sanford.

Manager John Stutzman of Central Florida Ornamentals told four groups that the firm is a profitable ornamental foliage operation employing 30 persons at parking buildings, offices and greenhouses totaling 136,450 square feet. Facilities are on Cameron Ave., Midway, and Marquette Road, east of Sanford.

"We have a job for about one out of every 20 people wanting a job," Stutzman noted, as trucks were being loaded with plants to be sold by distributors over the state.

Product Movement Systems Inc. (PMSI) and Neptune Winch are located in a building in the industrial park and presently employ 14, including production, design and executive personnel.

Vice-president Ollie Johnson said PMSI has a backlog of orders for hydraulic lift trucks utilized by paper box manufacturers and high-pressure cleaning systems to keep workers busy for the next four months.

He said Neptune Winch is developing additional marine equipment lines to complement its hydraulic winch used by the fishing and shrimp industries.

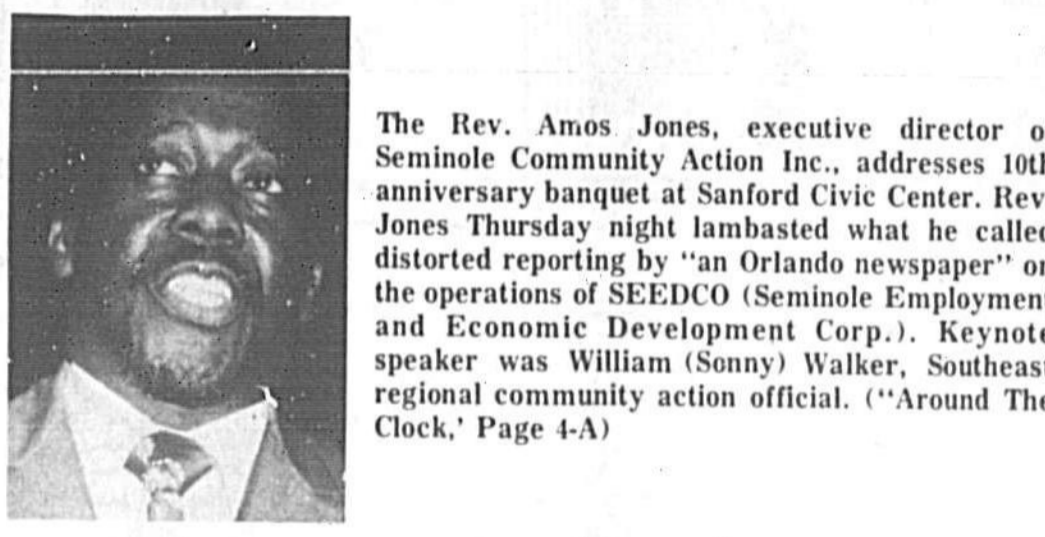
Seminole Bakery Products Inc., S. Laurel Ave., Sanford, has 24 employees working on two shifts to turn out specialty bakery products that are sold by distributors throughout Florida, Tennessee and other southern and coastal states.

The firm bakes on order for several chains of health food stores. Seminole Bakery also operates a retail store catering to local area customers at the same location.

Now in its third year of operation, Seminole Community Federal Credit Union is managed by John Lawson, and has current assets in excess of \$8,000 and 500 stockholders. The credit union, headquartered at SEEDCO offices at the airport, is open to the public and makes small loans to \$600. There is a \$1 membership fee and shares sell for \$5 each. The credit union employs five persons.

SEEDCO also has a three-year-old Local Business Development Organization (LBDO) that recently received a \$131,000 federal grant to establish a construction contractor assistance center and hiring of two construction specialists to serve a seven county radius in central Florida.

Officials said the LBDO has provided service and counseling to more than 300 persons and has brought in excess of \$1 million into the area through its services to clients.

Longwood Laws Challenge Due

Longwood City Attorney Ned N. Julian Jr. has been notified that a suit will be filed to place Daves' name on the ballot for the Dec. 7 city election as a council candidate running against incumbent J.R. Grant.

Daves attempted to qualify as a candidate earlier this month but was rejected when it was learned he had only lived in the city for seven months and not the 12 months required by the city charter.

Julian said he will answer the suit by pointing out that court action ordering Daves' name placed on the ballot at this late date will disenfranchise those persons who have already voted absentee. He said he has instructed Mrs. Shomate to continue handling the election process and the absentee votes as usual.

Daves has contended that he was misinformed by city officials concerning the residency requirement.

Julian said that Daves could have filed the suit three weeks ago, when the attorney informed him that the residency requirements stand at this time, rather than waiting so long and attempting to disrupt the city election.

A recent federal appellate court decision upheld six month residency requirements, but, Julian said, other federal courts in the nation have set aside the requirement. "It will be up to the judge to make the decision," Julian said, adding that the city has the charter requirement is law.

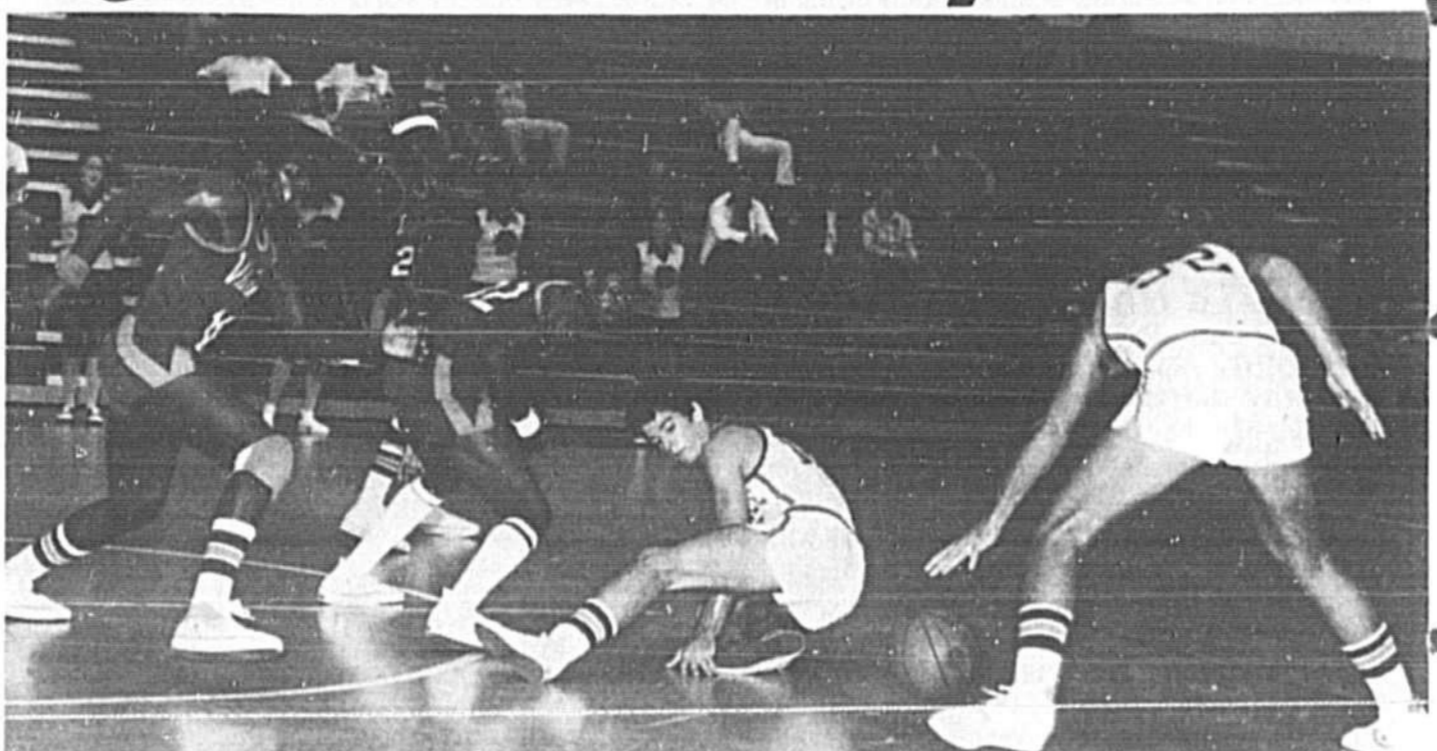

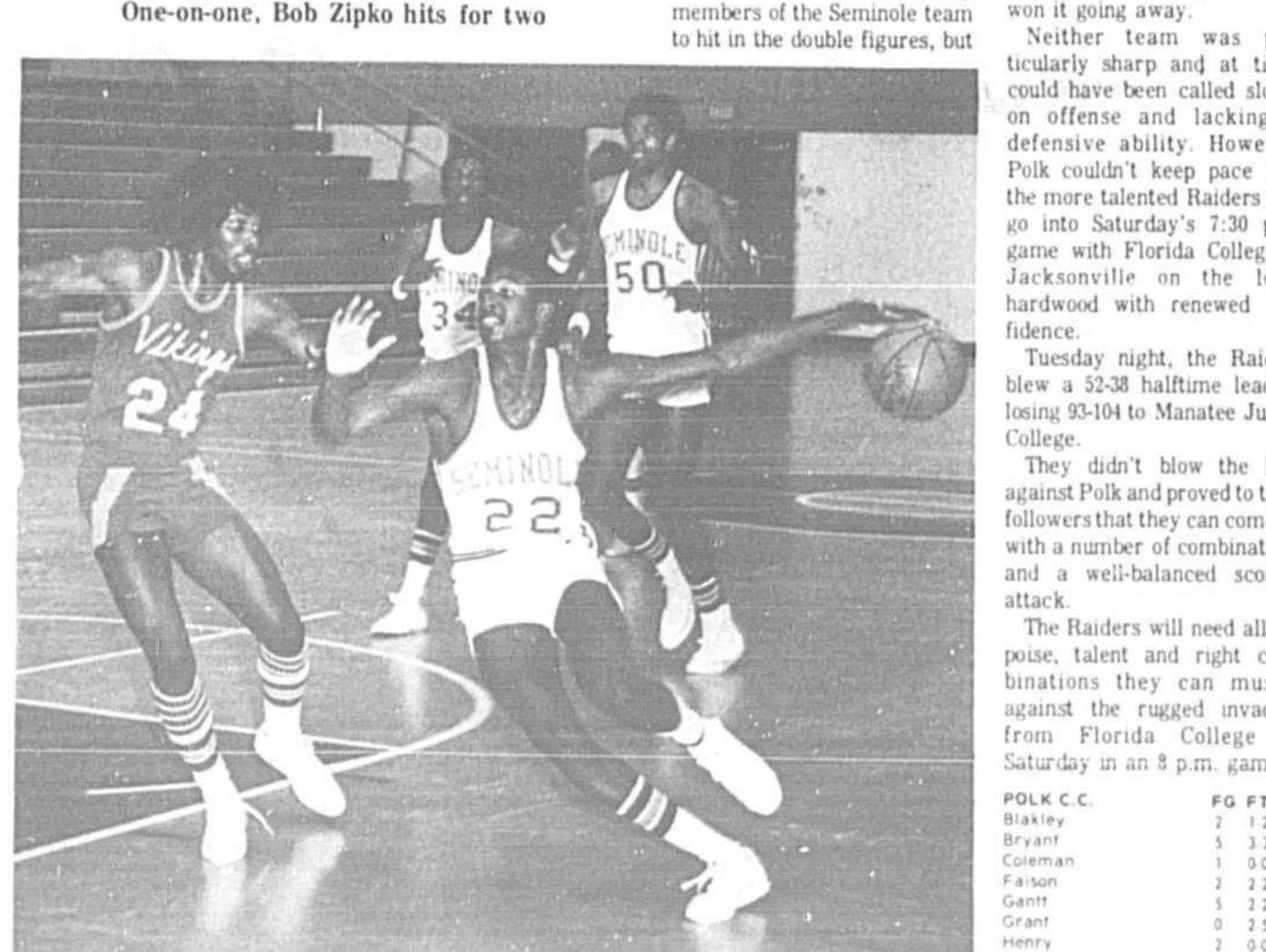
